Wednesday, April 28, 1926, 10:00 A. M.

The Secretary read the following communication from Professor A. R. Hohlfeld and Mrs. Hohlfeld:

April 21, 1926

To the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin

Ladies and Gentlemen:

In memory of our son, Rudolf Libbert Hohlfeld, B.A. 1923, who was born September 13, 1900, in Nashville, Tennesee and lost his life on November 28, 1925 in the Huallago River in eastern Peru, while engaged in geological survey work for the Standard Oil Company, Mrs. Hohlfeld and myself desire to establish an annual undergraduate scholarship to be known as the Rudy Hohlfeld Memorial Scholarship.

For the next few years we propose to pay \$200.00 annually for this purpose. Within about five years, however, we are planning to endow the scholarship permanently with a trust fund of \$5,000.00, provision for which has been made in our wills in case that we might not live to carry out this plan ourselves. The annual mount of the scholarship should then be the interest earned by this fund from year to year.

The conditions on which we desire the award of the scholarship to be made by the committee on scholarships are the following. The recipient of the scholarship is to be a young man of the junior or senior class of the College of Letters and Science of the University of Wisconsin who is an able and promising student (not necessarily with a record of high numerical grades), actively interested in athletics, and of strong upright character. Other things

being equal, candidates majoring, or at least doing a considerable part of their work in geology, are to be given prior consideration.

A student who has held the scholarship during his junior year may be reappointed for a second year as senior.

If your honorable body is prepared to approve the establishment of such a scholarship upon the terms here outlined, we shall be pleased to make at once a payment of \$200.00 to cover the first award of the scholarship for the academic year 1926-27.
