

1975-76 Big Entertainment Year

It won't be difficult to find good entertainment in the coming months.

With two Concert Series, two Orchestra Series, a Variety Series, American Heritage Series, special events and a Debut Series, the Wisconsin Union Theater promises a variety of exciting activities during its 37th season. Scheduled to visit Madison in 1975-76 are the following artists:

Red Concert Series: the Guarneri String Quartet, Pianist Lorin Hollander, Guitarist Christopher Parkening, Violinist Endre Granat, and Contralto Maureen Forrester.

White Concert Series: Pianist Alfred Brendel, the Cleveland Quartet, Cellist Ralph Kirshbaum, Guitarist and Lutanist Martin Best and Violinist Kyung Wha Chung.

Orchestra Series A: Minnesota Orchestra, Stanislaw Skrowaczewski, conductor; Moscow State Symphony, Yevgeny Svetlanov, conductor; Stockholm Philharmonic, Gennady Rozhdestvensky, music director; and the Gulbenkian Festival Orchestra of Lisbon, Michel Tabachnik, conductor.

Orchestra Series B: the Hague Philharmonic, Jean Martinon, conductor; Moscow State Symphony; St. Paul Chamber Orchestra, Dennis Russell Davies, music director; and the Utah Symphony Orchestra, Maurice Abravanel, music director.

On the Variety Series you will hear Ferrante and Teicher, duo-pianists, play a selection of tunes from their extensive repertory; historian, actor and pianist Max Morath will perform "The Ragtime Years"; Bob Greene and the Red Hot Peppers will bring you Jelly Roll Morton's World of Jazz; and the New York Jazz Repertory Company will present a bicentennial program entitled the "History of Jazz in America".

Community and Youth Programs Grow

august - december, 1975

"Grown-ups" aren't the only segment of the community that will benefit from Wisconsin Union Theater activities in 1975-76. Several relatively new programs for young people will continue in expanded form including the Saturday Morning Youth Concert Series and the Performing Artists in the Schools Program.

A new project last season, the Saturday Morning Youth Concert Series goes from one series of four concerts to two of five events each this year. At 10:30 a.m. on the following Saturday mornings, you will find Series I artists performing in the Union Theater: Clarinetist Richard Stoltzman (Oct. 11), Pianist Emanuel Ax (Nov. 22), Violinist Ani Kavafian (Feb. 7), Guitarist and Lutanist Martin Best (Feb. 21) and Actress Niki Flacks (March 6).

Series II includes Dancer Raymond Johnson (Oct. 18), Soprano Carrol Anne Curry and Bass-Baritone Richard McKee (Dec. 13), Cellist Ralph Kirshbaum (Jan. 31), St. Paul Chamber Orchestra (Feb. 28) and Pianist Barbara Nissman (May 1).

Saturday Morning Youth Concerts are designed to acquaint young people from ages 8-12 with professional artists and their work. The events are broadcast over WHA-TV and the State Educational Television Network.

Three years ago the Wisconsin Union Theater and Madison Public Schools launched the Performing Artists in the Schools Program. The purpose of the program is much the same as that of the Saturday Morning Youth Series: to expose young people to the arts and give them a chance to talk with the professionals on a personal level.

Gift Support for the Union Broadly Based

At the latest count (July 31) 240 alumni and friends in the Madison area have subscribed \$10,409 to the Union's Golden Anniversary Fund. 479 elsewhere in the U.S. and abroad have subscribed \$19,566; and 124 former Union Board members and Union Trustees have contributed \$20,075. Altogether, 843 contributions totaling \$50,050. (This is exclusive of about 1,000 alumni who contributed to the Union through their class reunion funds.)

The total number of alumni, students, faculty, and other friends who have made gifts to the Union since the original campaign started in 1919 now stands at 44,508 or about one out of every six who have attended the University.

New Facility Construction Imminent

The State Building Commission in July approved the release of funds (contributed in the course of the Union's Golden Anniversary campaign) to retain an architect to finalize the plans for the Union's next improvement project — addition to the art gallery, reception-dining room adjoining Great Hall, and expansion of the Beefeaters Room.

With good luck, construction may be underway by year end.

Badger Bash to Bash Again

Pigskin proponents in the partying mood will again be able to enjoy pre and post-game entertainment at Union South on football Saturdays. The Snack Bar will be open for breakfast, lunch and dinner with musical entertainment from 4 to 5:45 p.m. The Red Oak Grill will be open from 10:30 a.m. to midnight. And brats and beer will be available on the front terrace where the U.W. band will play for one-half hour before the game. The popular Doc DeHaven band will play in the Carousel Cafeteria after the game from 4 to 5:45 p.m.

MovieTime Opens 36th Season

MovieTime films are still rolling on in the Play Circle. (See calendar for weekend listings.) This fall, Movie-Time will run Friday through Sunday with the following approximate show times: Friday — 7,9,11 p.m.; Saturday — 2,4,7,9,11 p.m.; and Sunday — 2,4,7,9 p.m. Some special films, such as "Lenny", Aug. 25-Sept. 4, also run Monday-Friday at 7 and 9 p.m. Call either the Play Circle box office at 262-6333 or the information desk at 262-1331 for exact show times. The Play Circle box office opens at 2 p.m. on Friday to sell advance tickets for the weekend showings and a half hour before the first showings on other days. Admission for MovieTime is \$1.

Mini-Course Registration Begins September 2

The fall session of Mini-Courses is all set to go for fourteen weeks between Sept. 8 and Dec. 12. Registration for the courses will begin for students and other Union members on Sept. 2 from noon to 5 p.m. in the second floor checkroom of Memorial Union. Faculty and staff registrations will open on Sept. 4 with a special evening registration on Sept. 4 until 8 p.m.

Put Your Guests Up at One of the Unions

Both Union South and Memorial Union have guest rooms for visitors to the campus and community. Reservations for the Memorial Union guest rooms, which range in price from \$8.25 to \$15.95, may be made by calling 262-1583. Union members receive a discount which varies according to the room. Union South rooms, ranging from \$16 to \$18 with a \$4 discount to Union members, may be reserved by calling 263-2600.

Union Theater Usage Up in 1974-75

More than 100,000 people attended events in the Union Theater during the 1974-75 season. The total audience attendance was 114,427. Average attendance for all events — including conferences, convocations, institutes, symposiums, University Theater productions and rehearsals, dance groups, dramatic performances, concerts, movies, lectures and forums, rehearsals and classes — was 860, or an increase of 7 percent over the previous year, and the highest attendance in the last ten years.

Special Events include two performances of "Don't Bother Me, I Can't Cope", a Broadway musical the entire family will enjoy; the Pilobolus Dance Theatre, Guitarist Andres Segovia; Mazowsze Singers and Dancers; Pianist Vladimir Ashkenazy; Margalit Dance Theatre Company; and Cellist Janos Starker with the University Symphony Orchestra directed by Phillip Lehrman.

On the Debut Series (general admission events sold individually) are Clarinetist Richard Stoltzman, Dancer Raymond Johnson, Pianist Emanuel Ax, Bass-Baritone Richard McKee, Soprano Carrol Anne Curry, Violinist Ani Kavafian, Actress Niki Flacks and Pianist Barbara Nissman.

Wisconsin "Football on the Road"

Four trips by bus are planned to follow our Wisconsin team to out-of-town games. They are: Wisconsin vs. Missouri at Columbia, Missouri, Sept. 26-27; Wisconsin vs. Purdue at LaFayette, Oct. 11-12; Wisconsin vs. Iowa at Iowa City, Nov. 8; and Wisconsin vs. Minnesota at Minneapolis, Nov. 22.

Sydney, Australia Dec. 21 to Jan. 1

Funded by private donations and the National Endowment for the Arts, this project enables artists appearing at the Theater as part of its regular season to set up residencies in Madison to work with students of all ages in the schools.


In 1975-76, 12 individual artists and the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra will visit a total of 29 elementary and middle schools plus all of the high schools, giving mini-concerts and lecture demonstrations. As part of the program, three free, public concerts will be given by high school music groups in the Theater. And three professional artists appearing in concert at the Theater at another date will guest solo at these high school events.

The Performing Artists in the Schools program was so enthusiastically received by students that the Theater will expand the idea this year into the Madison community. A special grant from the National Endowment for the Arts will enable artists appearing at the Theater to reside here up to five days and visit not only the public schools, but libraries, nursing homes, hospitals and other spots where people might benefit from a brief concert.

The NEA grant of \$29,300 (along with matching private funds) should provide for at least 165 mini-concerts reaching over 20,000 people.

Continuing the community idea even further next season will be the Union Theater's Affiliate Artist, a new project sponsored by Xerox Corporation. Carrol Anne Curry, a mezzo-soprano, will make four two-week visits to Madison in 1975-76.

As an Affiliate Artist, she will also perform in the community, meeting and talking with people in an effort to remove the barrier that the stage often creates in a formal concert.





Carrol Anne Curry


