
The K. H. S.


We also thank the members of the School Board, who have so successfully steered this institution in the proper channels.

Salutatory

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





Next we have brave Harold Petrie, How he trips the light fantastic!


We can boast one girl debater Esther Moudry—with that talent.

seeking and finding in the dangers and disasters of a new world the one boon they craved, "Freedom to worship God!"


Is it necessary to carry the history further? Is not the record of our own continual progress as familiar to every one of us as our A. B. C?


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

The Senior Class




The Latin Club re-organized, this year, with a membership of twenty-one persons. Students who have taken Latin at any time in their High School course are privileged to join.

The Gym





The men all reported regularly for practice, which helped to make a good team and a successful season.

WEST GREEN BAY

On September 23rd, we played our first game with the strong West Green Bay team. Green Bay had a very heavy team and had several experienced players on it. Although our team was much lighter and had several players who never played a game, we made Green Bay work for their victory. During the first half of the game, Green Bay succeeded in scoring, twice making the score 13 to 0. In the second half we kept Green Bay from scoring and also worked the ball near to Green Bay's goal, several times. When the final whistle blew, Green Bay was leading, 13 to 0.

TWO RIVERS

MANITOWOC



STURGEON BAY






TOURNAMENT

or playing of the local boys that enabled them to win.


Their victory over Luxemburg placed the Kewaunee team in running, in the finals which were held on Saturday evening. They met the Manitowoc
