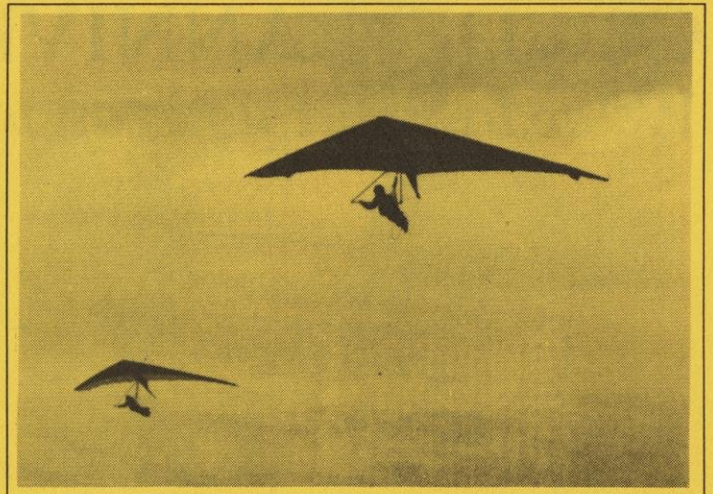
While learning such skills as wilderness cooking, fishing and whitewater canoeing, friendships are formed with a variety of people from all walks of life.

Soar to new Heights!

"I stood at the top of Henson Gap in Georgia, and looked down. The ground below was 1400 feet away. The wind was blowing at a modest ten m.p.h. and the instructor gave the go ahead for launch. Realizing that I soon would run straight off the platform dangling from an eighty pound kite, my adrenalin pumped and my mind raced. I surveyed the landing site and went through one last safety check. My three wingmen were pushing me towards the edge and instantly I was airborne. The excitement of the launch, the incredible view and the feeling of soaring were too much. Sensory overload is common for first mountain flights, but it only lasts a few seconds. My instructors now were relaying messages to me via the two way radio on my glider. The command "speed up" barked through, and I obliged. Then I heard "Do a 180 (degree turn) and then 360 opposite." My ship responded easily and the months of training had finally paid off. I neared the landing zone and dove below the tree line,



floating my feet to the ground, a perfect landing! My first mountain flight was an experience I will never forget. If you too would like to experience the exhilaration of hang gliding, join the Hoofers Hang Gliding Club."

Maybe soaring 1400 feet above the ground makes you break out in a cold sweat. Then Hoofers has six other clubs - sailing, outing, mountaineering, scuba diving, riding and skiing - to make your summer the best ever!

All Union members and University faculty/staff are eligible for membership with Hoofers. There is a general Hoofers membership fee of \$5.00, which is independent of the number of clubs joined, in addition to each club's membership fee. Those fees are: Sailing - \$140, Outing - \$24.00, Mountaineering - no charge, Scuba diving - \$12.25, Hang gliding - \$56.50, Riding - \$25.00 and Skiing - \$5.25.

Pardon our Dust!

There will be some extensive remodeling done at both Union South and Memorial Union this summer. Union Station at Union South will be getting a new ceiling, floor, light fixtures and chairs; in addition the tables will be sanded and redone. A wider entrance will greet the hungry throngs when Union Station reopens on August 22.

Access to all floors of Union South will be made easier with the addition of a central staircase in the atrium. The staircase will go from the basement to the third floor. Completion is set for August 1.

Now that Pack, Pole & Parka in Memorial Union is closed, Video Break will move to the front of the store. The remainder of P3 space will be added to the existing Games Room to accommodate more billiards and games, along with booths for table games. The Games Room desk will also expand its snack food selection to include pizza. New carpeting, paint and a double door entrance where the ride board is now, will give the Games Room a refreshed look. Renovations should be complete by the middle of August.

The Service Center will move from the back of the P3 area to a location adjacent to Video Break. Union memorabilia such as terrace t-shirts will be available at the center. During the renovations, the Service Center and Video Break will be located in the Popover Room on first floor by Lakefront Cafeteria.
