Sir: As has been our practice in recent years, most of this report is made by the Chief Clerk over his own signature.

The continued better condition of the banks and payment of taxes has enabled us during this biennium to return to the policy of keeping our funds more fully invested.

The commission is still withholding its land from sale for various reasons which we deem in the interest of the state, except in the Indian Reservations, which latter we believe should be purchased by the government to solidify those reservations.

There have been a few cases where some scattered burned over forties were wanted for completing adjoining farms.

Several small areas of blown down timber were sold.

Trespass of timber has increased in number, adding greatly to field work, although smaller in volume.

This commission has been pleased with the completeness with which its employes in the land office have handled their work—thus relieving us of much work which otherwise would have fallen upon us under our constitutional duties.

## REPORT OF CHIEF CLERK

---

December 1, 1936.

TO THE HONORABLE COMMISSIONERS:

During the last biennium it was the hope of this department to close out the state's interests in the Indian reservations to the government.

The state's interests were the result of the swamp land grant of September 28, 1850. The state claimed that the grant applied to the reservations the same as to other areas. The government land department at first conceded the point and in 1865 issued patent to more than 15,000 acres in the Menominee reservation, but in the following year denied the validity of the patent. The government land department also listed for patent large areas in the Lac du Flambeau and Bad River reservations, but delayed patenting on various pretexts. When the school section case was decided against the state, the government claimed the same rule would apply to the swamp lands and proceeded to cut the timber on swamp lands in the Lac du Flambeau and Bad River reservations. Upon the state's protest the money received for such timber was placed in escrow awaiting a decision of the Supreme Court. The decision in a Minnesota case was lost by the government as to the swamp lands and a similar case against Wisconsin was dismissed by the government. This would seem to settle the matter, but it did not.

In 1881 Governor Smith secured appointment of a commission of a man from the state land office and one from the government land office to complete the lists of swamp lands in the state. The result of their work is recorded in a special report in both offices, but has been dormant during the more than half century that has passed.

In 1899 Secretary Bliss held a conference with representatives of the state that resulted in a satisfactory settlement of the problem, but nothing came of it.

In 1935 it began to appear that the Interior Department, including the Indian Department, had assumed a more favorable attitude in the matter and at the request of Secretary Ickes a meeting was held in the office of the Governor, attended by the Governor, the land department, the school department and others. Secretary Ickes was represented by Wm. Heritage, one of the oldest and best informed men in the Indian department. As a result of the conference the following bill was passed in the Senate, but failed in the House:

"Providing for payment to the State of Wisconsin for its swamp lands within all Indian reservations in that State.

"Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That there is hereby authorized to be appropriated, out of any money in the Treasury of the United States not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$1,631,699.83, in full compensation to the State of Wisconsin for the value of the

land, timber, or any other interest said State may now have or claim in and to any swamp lands within the Menominee, Lac du Flambeau, Lac Courte Oreilles, Bad River, or any other Indian reservation in said State: Provided, however, that no part of the appropriation herein authorized shall be paid until the said State of Wisconsin, by appropriate legislative enactment, agrees to assume all expenses connected with the future education of Indian youth within its borders on a parity with that provided for white pupils, and until said State, by proper instruments of conveyance, surrenders, releases, transfers, and conveys to the United States, for the benefit of the Indians of the respective reservations therein, all right, title, and interest of said State in and to any swamp lands within any Indian reservations in said State."

The problem now is, what to do in the matter? The problem is becoming worse as time passes. The state's claim is based upon the wetness of the land, while fires, the cutting of timber, the building of roads and trails and draining them, all tend to make them dry. Already a faction in the General Land Office has attempted to substitute new lists cutting out thousands of acres from lists that were conceded to the state in lists that have been on record since 1881 and 1898. This matter should have final action without delay. I submit it to the earliest practicable attention of the commission.

Maps of the War Department indicate that there are more than fifty islands in the Mississippi river that will be flooded by the dams now being built. This office has endeavored to secure a government survey of these islands, but such survey has been avoided by rules imposed by the General Land Office. It is apparent that the commission will have to bring pressure to bear to secure a survey—which is a necessary preliminary to patent. It is believed that most of these islands are of the character granted by the Swamp Act of 1850. I suggest that the Attorney General and Mr. Bakken be sent to Washington to press this matter at the General Land Office.

I believe that a group of three or four experienced foresters should visit the heavily hemlock forested region on a study of the cause of the dying of the older trees of that class. We are advised that such areas prevail in Langlade, Forest, Florence, Rusk, Price, Sawyer, Iron and perhaps other counties.

We are pressing for government survey of approximately 12,000 acres of omitted land at the mouth of Peshtigo river in Marinette county and 100 acres within the city of Oconto. Our members of Congress could doubtless help in this matter.
