

Badgers Face Nittany Lions in Final Big Ten Home Game

The Wisconsin football team (8-1, 5-1 Big Ten) plays its final conference home game today, hosting Penn State (6-3, 4-2). Kickoff is scheduled for 11:10 a.m. and the game will be televised by ABC. Brad Nessler, Bob Griese and Paul Maguire will handle the commentary in the booth with Bonnie Bernstein on the sideline.

The game will also be televised on a tape-delay basis by Wisconsin Public Television. Mike Heller and former Badger Scott Nelson will handle the commentary. The game will be shown statewide beginning at 10:30 p.m.

Fans can listen to the game on the 53-station Wisconsin Radio Network. Locally in Madison the game can be heard on WIBA (1310 am/101.5 fm). Matt Lepay and Mike Lucas are on the call.

The Badgers have won five straight games and are 16-1 at Camp Randall Stadium since the start of the 2004 season.

Wisconsin is coming off a 30-24 come-from-behind win over Illinois last Saturday. UW trailed 24-10 at halftime but scored 20 unanswered points and held the Fighting Illini scoreless in the second half. John Stocco led the comeback, going 11-of-15 for 158 yards and two touchdowns after halftime.

Penn State is coming of a 12-0 win over Purdue and has won four of its last five games. PSU's defense is giving up just 12.6 points over those five games. The Nittany Lion defense, which is giving up only 95.2 rushing yards per game, is led by 2005 Butkus Award winner Paul Posluszny.

On offense, junior quarterback Anthony Morelli has started all nine games and is averaging 187.0 passing yards per game. Running back Tony Hunt leads the PSU running attack with 99.6 yards per game.

At halftime, former Badger All-American and UW Director of Athletic Pat Richter will be honored and his No. 88 will be retired. Richter was a nine-time letterwinner in football, basketball and baseball at UW and served as Wisconsin's Athletic Director from 1989-2004.





Notable, Quotable and Promotable Our top 10 items for this week ...

1 With the win over Illinois last Saturday Bret Bielema set a Wisconsin record for victories by a first-year head coach with eight. The previous record was held by Phil King (7-1-1 in 1896) and William Juneau (7-0-0 in 1912).

2 UW enters its game against Penn State 21-4 in its last 25 home games. That includes a perfect 5-0 record this year and a 16-1 mark since the start of 2004. Wisconsin is one of six teams in the country with one or no home losses over that span.


3 For the 12th time in the past 14 seasons, and a school-record tying fifth consecutive year, Wisconsin is bowl eligible. Among Big Ten schools, only Ohio State and Michigan can match UW's run of bowl appearances over the last 14 years.

• • •

Wisconsin entered the fourth quarter of last Saturday's game trailing 24-20. It was the fifth time in John Stocco's career that he led a fourth quarter comeback for a win. The other games were at Arizona (Sept. 18, 2004), at Purdue (Oct. 16, 2004), vs. Michigan (Sept. 24, 2005) and at Minnesota (Oct. 15, 2005).

• • •

5 Wisconsin is 8-1 this season. The Badgers have won at least eight games in a season for the 11th time in the last 14 years. Prior to 1993, UW had at least eight wins in a season just eight times (104 years).



Offensive tackle Joe Thomas has been ranked as the top senior available in the 2007 NFL Draft by both ESPN's Mel Kiper, Jr. and *Sports Illustrated's* Peter King.

6 Wisconsin is third in the Big Ten and ranks 10th in the country in scoring defense, allowing just 12.9 points per game. The Badgers' defense has given up just 10 touchdowns this season. UW's defense has given up eight touchdowns in the last eight games. The average length of those TD drives is 49.6 yards and four of those drives have been shorter than 40 yards.

7 Wisconsin head coach Bret Bielema will attempt to become just the second UW head coach to win his first three games since Jack Ryan did so in 1923. Dave McClain won his first four games in 1978.


Wisconsin defeated Indiana (52-17), Northwestern (41-9), Minnesota (48-12) and Purdue (24-3) in consecutive weeks. The Badgers had never won four straight conference games by at least three touchdowns in school history.

• • •

9 John Stocco's 27 wins as UW's starting quarterback are tied for second-most in school history (tied with Mike Samuel). Brooks Bollinger, who was 30-12 as a starter, holds the school record for career victories.

10 Travis Beckum and wide receiver Luke Swan are the only two Badgers to have caught at least one pass in every game this season. Swan notched career highs in catches (four) and yards (85) vs. Illinois.

The Badgers lead the Big Ten and rank second in the country in pass defense, allowing just 135.6 yards per game. Michigan is the only team to throw for more than 200 yards against UW this season.

Wisconsin-Penn State Series Notes:

Wisconsin is 4-0 against Penn State when the Nittany Lions are not ranked ... the Badgers are 4-2 against Penn State at Camp Randall Stadium and 4-2 overall in the past six meetings between the two schools ... UW won the last meeting in Madison by a 16-3 count ... UW's 1998 win over the Nittany Lions clinched a Big Ten title for Wisconsin.


Nearly Mistake Free

UW committed just one penalty for 10 yards against Illinois. The last time Wisconsin had just one penalty was Oct. 22, 2005 vs. Purdue. Illinois and Wisconsin combined for just 18 penalty yards, the fewest penalty yards in a UW games since the same two teams combined for 13 penalty yards on Nov. 11, 1993. Wisconsin is tied for 16th in the country in fewest penalties per game (4.7).

Tough Sledding

UW ranks second in the Big Ten and seventh in the country in total defense, allowing just 250.9 yards per game. The best performance by a Badger opponent this season was 322 yards by Michigan on Sept. 23. Sixty-three teams in Division IA are allowing more than 322.0 yards per game.

The Badger defense has given up fewer than 300 yards of total offense in seven

games this season, including each of the last five. That five-game stretch is the UW's longest streak of limiting opponents to fewer than 300 yards since a six-game streak to start the 2004 season.

Getting His Kicks

Junior kicker Taylor Mehlhaff tied a career high with three field goals vs. Illinois, earning Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week honors. He has made seven straight kicks, matching the longest streak of his career. His only misses this season were a 55-yarder vs. San Diego State and a 47-yarder at Indiana.

Mehlhaff's 51-yard field goal in the second quarter of the Purdue game was his career long. That ties for the fifth-longest field goal in school history. It was the Badgers' longest field goal since Vitaly Pisetsky hit a 53-yarder vs. Ball State on Sept. 11, 1999. Mehlhaff had been 0-for-6 in his career on field goal of 47 or more yards.

Mehlhaff has also been a weapon on kick-offs. The junior has 33 touchbacks on 57 kickoffs (58 percent) this season.



chairs both the Big Ten Council of Presidents and Chancellors and the board for the Council on Higher Education Accreditation, and is a member of the National Security Higher Education Advisory Committee. He also serves on several local and community boards, including the William T. Evjue Foundation and the Greater Madison Chamber of Commerce. He also has been deeply involved in fundraising from individual and corporate donors and charitable foundations.

From 1994-2000, Wiley served as UW-Madison's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs. In this role as the university's chief operating officer and deputy chancellor, he worked closely with deans, faculty, academic staff, and student committees in the exercise of shared governance and the overall management of the institution. Prior to becoming provost, he was dean of the Graduate School and the university's senior research officer, and from 1986-89, he served as associate dean for research in the College of Engineering.

Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964. He attended graduate school at UW-Madison as a National Science Foundation Fellow, receiving master's and doctoral degrees in physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively. He joined the technical staff of Bell Telephone Laboratories at Murray Hill, N.J., from 1968-1974, and then spent a year at the Max Planck Institute in Stuttgart, Germany as an awardee of the Alexander von Humboldt Senior U.S. Service Award for Research and Training.

Joining the UW-Madison faculty in the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering in August 1975, Wiley began a productive career in teaching and research, focusing on topics related to semiconductors and other materials and processes important to the electronics field. He is a co-founder of several highly successful research centers, including the Center for X-ray Lithography and the Engineering Research Center for Plasma-Aided Manufacturing. From 1982-86, he chaired the Materials Science Program, a graduate-level, interdepartmental-committee program for master's and doctoral degrees.

Chancellor John D. Wiley has more than four decades of experience with the University of Wisconsin-Madison, having been a graduate student, a professor, and an administrator during his illustrious university career. Assuming office on January 1, 2001, he is the 27th person to lead the university since its founding in 1848.

As UW-Madison's chief executive officer, Wiley is responsible for the overall vision and direction of the university. He represents the institution for a variety of constituents, including alumni groups, chambers of commerce and service clubs, the state legislature and governmental bodies, the UW System Administration, and the UW System Board of Regents. 

Accomplishments, notes and items of interest on Barry Alvarez ...

- Coached nine first-round NFL draft choices (Troy Vincent, Aaron Gibson, Ron Dayne, Chris McIntosh, Jamar Fletcher, Michael Bennett, Wendell Bryant, Lee Evans and Erasmus James)
- Coached 59 NFL draft choices
- Coached 34 All-Americans, including seven consensus first-team choices
- Coached 62 first-team All-Big Ten selections
- Coached 119 Academic All-Big Ten selections
- Big Ten-record 10 straight seasons with a 1,000-yard rusher (1993-2002)
- Four Big Ten Defensive Players of the Year
- Two Big Ten MVPs
- Two Big Ten Offensive Players of the Year
- Three Big Ten Freshmen of the Year
- Three Big Ten and Rose Bowl championship teams (the only other Big Ten coach with at least three Rose Bowl wins was Ohio State's Woody Hayes)
- Eleven bowl qualifiers
- Coached or played in 22 bowl games (at Wisconsin, Notre Dame, Iowa and Nebraska)
- Was a head coach in the 1995 Blue-Gray Game, 1996 East-West Shrine game, 2000 Hula Bowl and 2004 Florida Gridiron Classic
- Received a Distinguished Alumnus Award from the Univ. of Nebraska in May of 2003
- Inducted into the Washington County (Pa.) chapter of the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame in 2000
- Alvarez and his wife, Cindy, endowed a football scholarship at the UW in the spring of 2000
- Grew up in a small mining town (Langeloth) in western Pennsylvania. He played all sports as a kid and idolized former Pittsburgh Pirates outfielder Roberto Clemente.
- Babcock Hall, which houses the UW's nationally acclaimed dairy school, developed an ice cream flavor in honor of the Badger head coach in 1994. It was named Berry Alvarez, and the flavor was a mixture of raspberry, strawberry and blueberry.
- Helped honor former Chicago Cubs' announcer Harry Caray by singing "Take me out to the ballgame" during a seventh-inning stretch in May of 1999
- A finalist for ESPN's College Football Coach of the Decade Award in 1999. He was one of 18 coaches named to a new position in 1990 and was the only one still at the school that hired him when he retired in 2005.
- Got his college coaching start with Hayden Fry at Iowa in 1979, one season after leading Mason City High School to the 4A state championship.
- Named one of the "100 Most Influential Hispanics" by *Hispanic Business* in October of 2001
- Alvarez and his wife, Cindy, gave \$100,000 to support the opening of Gilda's Club of Madison, a free support center for families dealing with cancer.
- Numerous former Alvarez assistants at Wisconsin have gone on to success on the professional level, among them Bill Callahan (former Oakland Raiders head coach, now head coach of Nebraska), Brad Childress (Minnesota Vikings head coach), Jay Hayes (Cincinnati Bengals defensive line coach) and Jay Norvell (former Oakland Raiders tight ends coach, now with Nebraska)

Barry Alvarez is in his third year as UW Director of Athletics, but his first without the additional title of head football coach.

For 16 years (1990-2005), Alvarez guided Wisconsin's football fortunes. He plotted the Badgers to three Big Ten Conference and Rose Bowl titles (including back-to-back in 1998-99) en route to becoming the winningest football coach in school history (118-73-4 record).

Alvarez was just the 10th coach in Big Ten history to win 100 games at one conference institution. His 8-3 (.727) record in bowl games with the Badgers is the best in college football history (among coaches with at least 11 bowl appearances). The 2004 AFCA Region 3 Coach of the Year, he also was the 1993 national coach of the year, a two-time Big Ten coach of the year and a finalist for ESPN's coach of the decade (1990s) honor.

In 2004-05, Alvarez served as athletic director and football coach and has been at the forefront of the revival of the Badger athletic program during his entire tenure in Madison.

He is a 1969 graduate of Nebraska, where he played linebacker and went on to earn his master's degree. He received a Distinguished Alumnus Award from his alma mater in 2003.

Alvarez and his wife, Cindy, are the parents of three children, Dawn (Mrs. Brad Ferguson), Stacy (Mrs. Mike Delzer) and Chad (wife Stephanie). Barry and Cindy are grandparents to Joe and Jake Ferguson, Grace and Jackson Delzer, and Scarlet Alvarez.



Head Coach Bret Bielema

Bret Bielema is in his first year as head football coach at the University of Wisconsin. The second-youngest head football coach in the Division I-A ranks, he brings a remarkably strong background to the position.

Bielema was Wisconsin's defensive coordinator in 2004 and 2005, a period in which the program produced a 19-6 record under former head coach Barry Alvarez. The 2004 Badgers were sixth nationally in scoring defense and ninth in total defense. The 2005 club, which earned Wisconsin's first shutout since 1999, finished its 10-win season with a 24-10 victory over No. 7 Auburn in the 2006 Capital One Bowl; UW limited the



Head coaches for whom Bielema has worked—Alvarez, Snyder, Ferentz and Fry—have combined to win 547 games and guide their teams to 41 bowl games, so the first-year Badger mentor has learned from some of the best in the business.



high-powered Tigers to just 236 yards of total offense.

During Bielema's two years guiding the Badger defense, two players (DE Erasmus James and DB Jim Leonhard) earned first-team All-America honors and

two others (DT Anttaj Hawthorne and DB Scott Starks) were first-team All-Big Ten selections. While coaching the Badgers' linebackers, Bielema developed Mark Zalewski and Dontez Sanders, both of whom earned honorable mention all-conference acclaim.

Bielema was co-defensive coordinator at Kansas State under former head coach Bill Snyder from 2002-03. The Wildcats were 22-6 during Bielema's time there and finished in the top 10 nationally (in both 2002 and 2003) in scoring and total defense. The Wildcats won their first Big 12 title in 2003. Among Bielema's standout players at Kansas State were first-team All-American Josh Buhl, 2003 NFL second-round draft pick Terry Pierce and second-team All-Big 12 selection Bryan Hickman.

Prior to his years at Kansas State, Bielema spent nine seasons as an assistant coach at his alma mater, Iowa, where he worked for head coaches Hayden Fry and Kirk Ferentz. The 1997 Hawkeyes posted three shutouts and ranked No. 4 nationally in scoring defense. Bielema coached Fred Barr (first-team All-Big Ten), Vernon Rollins and Matt Hughes (both honorable mention All-Big Ten) at Iowa.

Head coaches for whom Bielema has worked—Alvarez, Snyder, Ferentz and Fry—have combined to win 547 games and guide their teams to 41 bowl games, so the first-year Badger mentor has learned from some of the best in the business.



Bielema earned four letters (1989-92) after joining the Iowa football program as a walk-on. He was a member of Iowa's 1990 Big Ten championship team. A starter as a junior in 1991, he was a team co-captain as a senior. Bielema signed a free agent contract with the Seattle Seahawks and later completed his playing career with the Milwaukee Mustangs of the Arena Football League. Bielema has participated in 10 bowl games as a player or coach.

A 1992 graduate of Iowa with a bachelor's degree in marketing, Bielema was born in Prophetstown, Ill., on Jan. 13, 1970.



Pat Richter To Be Honored Today

Pat Richter, a three-sport letterwinner and former athletic director, is considered one of the greatest figures in Wisconsin sports history. Today he will be honored when his number 88 is officially retired and unveiled amongst fellow Badger legends on the west side of the stadium façade.

Pat Richter's legend began right here in Madison where he was a three-sport star at Madison East High School. While there, he helped the Purgolders win the 1958 WIAA State Basketball Championship as well as earning all-city honors in both football and basketball the next year.

In September of 1959, Richter arrived on campus with a basketball scholarship and officially became a Badger. He went out for the freshman football team and wound up as a co-captain.

Richter made the varsity team as a sophomore. He earned a starting role in head coach Milt Bruhn's double tight end system as a receiving tight end. In his first game as a Badger, a season-opening 24-7 victory at Stanford, Richter set a school record with seven pass receptions for 75 yards. A few weeks later, in Wisconsin's Big Ten opener, Richter matched his record-setting performance as he caught another seven passes for 110 yards in a 24-12 victory over seventh-ranked Purdue.

As the Badgers entered their homecoming game against Michigan on Oct. 29, Richter's 24 pass receptions for 326 yards left him just one catch shy of tying Jerry Witt's school-record for pass receptions in a season and just 60 yards short of Dave Schreiner's record for most receiving yards in a season.

On the third play of the game Richter caught a 36-yard pass, tying Witt's record. However, as Richter went back to the huddle after being tackled by Michigan defender Benn McRae, he instantly realized that he had broken his collarbone.

Richter didn't let his shoulder injury hamper the rest of his sophomore year. After rejoining the basketball team in December, Richter appeared in 13 games, scored 37 points and managed 55 rebounds en route to earning his first basketball letter.

Richter's legend grew as he moved from one sport to another. Once basketball season was over, it was time to concentrate on baseball. Richter had four hits in his first collegiate game. He split time between outfield and first base that season. Richter earned All-Big Ten honors as he led the team in games played (29), runs scored (28), hits (43), doubles (13), triples


(4), home runs (7), RBIs (23) and batting average (.398).

When the 1961 football season rolled around, there was much hype surrounding Richter, the preseason All-American. During that 6-3 season for the Badgers, Richter led the nation with eight touchdown receptions and 817 receiving yards. He went on to earn All-Big Ten and first-team All-American honors. That year, Richter continued to play basketball and baseball. His 10 straight games with two or more hits and 10 consecutive games with scoring at least one run were school records, and helped him to earn second-team All-Big Ten honors.

As a senior co-captain on the 1962 football team, Richter continued making a name for himself. Playing through a painful hip pointer in the home opener against Indiana, Richter caught five passes for 72 yards and one touchdown. After a big win against Notre Dame, the Iowa Hawkeyes came into Camp Randall Stadium. During that game Richter suffered a broken ring finger, but that didn't stop him from catching six passes for 56 yards and one touchdown. The following week the Badgers were ranked fifth in the Associated Press poll.

The last game of that season was a battle for the Big Ten title versus Minnesota. In what turned out to be a wild game in front of a sold-out crowd at Camp Randall Stadium, Richter had six catches for 82 yards, but it was his punting that saved the day for the Badgers. At the end of the game UW failed to run out the clock forcing Richter to punt from his own goal line. His 51-yard boot ended the Gophers' hopes and earned Wisconsin a Big Ten title and Rose Bowl berth. Richter concluded that season by not only leading the Big Ten in passes caught with 32, but he also led in punting with a 39.5 yard average.

Despite losing the 1963 Rose Bowl, a game in which Richter set records with 11 passes caught and 163 receiving yards, Richter earned national recognition. He was named first-team All-Big Ten and All-American by many national publications. After appearing in eight games for the basketball team, Richter finished his Wisconsin athletic career on the baseball diamond. He tied for the team lead in home runs (6) and hits (38) that season. Richter ended his baseball career with 20 home runs, 74 RBIs while hitting an impressive .339 in 82 career games. Richter was awarded his third "W" letter in baseball in 1963, making him Wisconsin's first nine-time letterwinner

since 1927. Since then, nobody has been able to accomplish this feat.

After much thought about what sport he wanted to pursue professionally, Richter finally chose football by signing a contract with the NFL's Washington Redskins. (NFL stats)

In 1989, Richter came back to the Wisconsin athletic scene when he was named the ninth director of intercollegiate athletics in school history. Richter inherited a program that was \$2.1 million in debt, had decaying facilities, several struggling teams and eroding fan support. In what may have been Richter's greatest accomplishment as a Badger, he eliminated the athletic department's debt and turned it into a surplus, hired future athletic director Barry Alvarez, oversaw the building of the Kohl Center the Camp Randall Renovation project and the Fetzer Academic Center, all while instilling his competitive edge into Badger athletics and preserving the integrity of the department.

Today we recognize these achievements of one of the greatest Badgers ever as Pat Richter's name and number will forever live on where it should, among the greatest in Camp Randall Stadium.




Wisconsin Assistant Coaches

Bob Bostad Tight Ends

Bob Bostad (pronounced BO-stad), a state of Wisconsin native who coached the offensive line at New Mexico from 1999-2005, is in his first season as an assistant football coach at Wisconsin.

Bostad coaches the Badgers' tight ends. Bostad's 2005 offensive line featured a pair of first-team all-conference selections, including center Ryan Cook and guard Robert Turner. New Mexico averaged 200 yards per game on the ground in 2005. Cook was a second-round draft choice of the Vikings, while tackle Terrance Pennington was a seventh-round pick of the Bills.

During Bostad's tenure at New Mexico, 14 Lobo offensive linemen earned all-conference mention. Among the players Bostad coached at New Mexico were: tackle Claude Terrell, a third-team A.P. All-American and fourth-round draft choice of the St. Louis Rams (he started as a rookie for the Rams in 2005) and tackle Jason Lenzmeier, who became the first offensive lineman in conference and school history to earn MWC offensive player of the week honors in 2003.

Bostad was offensive line coach (1997-98) and offensive coordinator (1998) at San Jose State prior to his years at New Mexico.

Bostad coached the offensive line at Cal State Northridge in 1995-96 and spent three seasons (1992-94) as an offensive line graduate assistant at Minnesota under head coach Jim Wacker.

Bostad got his coaching start at his alma mater, UW-Stevens Point, where he coached the offensive line from 1990-91.

Bostad graduated from UW-Stevens Point in 1989 with a degree in physical education. He was a four-year starter as a line-backer for the Pointers and earned all-conference mention each year. Bostad earned a master's degree in kinesiology from Minnesota in 1994.

Bostad, 39, is a native of Pardeeville, Wis. He and his wife, Cara, have three daughters: Rachel, Bryn and Annika, and a son, John Robert.

Paul Chryst Off. Coordinator / QBs

Paul Chryst is in his second consecutive season at Wisconsin and his third overall as an assistant coach for the Badgers.

Chryst, UW's co-offensive coordinator and tight ends coach last season, is now the program's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach.

Chryst, the Badgers' tight ends coach in 2002, returned to Wisconsin in 2005 and his impact on the UW offense was immediately evident. The 2005 Badgers set school records for points scored in a season (446) and for season scoring average (34.3 ppg). The Badger passing game was much improved, with QB John Stocco setting school season records for passing yards, passing TDs and pass completions.

Chryst was offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Oregon State in 2003-04. He helped the Beavers rank No. 6 nationally in passing yardage per game and 10th in total offense in 2003. The 2003 Beavers became the first team in Division I history with a 4,000-yard passer, 1,500-yard rusher and two 1,000-yard receivers.

Chryst came to Wisconsin in 2002 after serving as an assistant coach with the San Diego Chargers, where he developed Freddie Jones into one of the NFL's top tight ends.

Previously, Chryst was an assistant coach at Oregon State (1997-98), the Saskatchewan Roughriders (1996), Illinois State (1995), the Ottawa Rough Riders (1994), UW-Platteville (1993) and the World League's San Antonio Riders (1991-92). He was a graduate assistant at West Virginia (1989-90).

Chryst was a three-time football letterwinner at Wisconsin, where he earned a degree in political science in 1988. He added a master's degree in educational administration from West Virginia in 1990. Paul's late father, George, was a longtime head coach at UW-Platteville and a former Badger player and assistant coach.

Chryst and his wife, Robin, have three children: Katy, JoJo and Danny.

Kerry Cooks Defensive Backs

Kerry Cooks, defensive backs coach at the University of Minnesota last season, is in his first year as defensive backs coach at Wisconsin.


Cooks comes to Wisconsin after one year coaching the Golden Gophers' secondary. Minnesota qualified for the Music City Bowl last season, while Cooks' unit allowed opponents to complete just 56.8 percent of their passes (fourth-best in the Big Ten). That figure dropped to 55.3 percent in conference games, tied for second in the league with Penn State.

Prior to his year at Minnesota, Cooks coached defensive backs and assisted on special teams for one season (2004) at Western Illinois. Under Cooks' direction, Leathernecks limited opponents to a Gateway Conference-best 157.2 passing yards per game; held opponents to the lowest completion percentage (45.4) in the conference; and finished second in the league with 17 interceptions.

Cooks began coaching at his high school alma mater, Nimitz High (Texas) in 2003 before joining the staff at Kansas State as a graduate assistant for the 2003 campaign. While at Kansas State, Cooks worked mostly with defensive game plan preparation and assisted with the Wildcats' secondary. Kansas State registered an 11-4 record in 2003 and won a Big 12 title with a defense that was sixth nationally in total defense.

Cooks was a four-year letterwinner at his two-year starter as a strong safety at Iowa from 1994-97. He was a team captain as senior and earned All-Big Ten honors and a spot in the East-West Shrine Game. A fifth-round draft choice of the Minnesota Vikings in 1998, Cooks also played for Green Bay Packers, Atlanta Falcons and Jacksonville Jaguars before retiring from the NFL in 2001. He also played for the Chicago Enforcers of the XFL in 2001.

Cooks has played or coached in six bowl games. A 2000 graduate of Iowa with a bachelor's degree in sociology, Cooks' wife's name is Valencia.




Wisconsin Assistant Coaches

Dave Doeren Co-Def. Coordinator / LBs / Recruiting Coordinator

Dave Doeren, who ascended to become the co-defensive coordinator at Kansas after just three seasons, is in his first season as an assistant coach at Wisconsin. Doeren serves as co-defensive coordinator, linebackers coach and recruiting coordinator for the Badgers.

Doeren has risen quickly through the college coaching ranks. Beginning in 2002 he served as the linebackers coach and recruiting coordinator at Kansas. He was promoted last summer to co-defensive coordinator. The Jayhawks, who routed Houston, 2-13, in the 2005 Fort Worth Bowl, led the Big 12 Conference and ranked No. 3 nationally in rushing defense (83.3 ypg) this past season. Kansas also was No. 2 in the Big 12 and 11th nationally in total defense (303.3 ypg). KU linebacker Nick Reid was a two-time, first-team All-Big 12 selection, a third-team A.P. All-American and was the Big 12 Defensive Player of the Year in 2005.

Doeren went to Kansas after spending two seasons as the secondary coach at Montana. The Grizzlies won the NCAA Division I-AA title in 2001. Doeren coached seven all-conference defensive backs at Montana, including two who earned All-America honors.

Prior to his time at Montana, Doeren was a two-year (1998-99) graduate assistant at Southern California and started his college coaching career as an assistant at Drake from 1995-97.

Doeren began coaching at Shawnee Mission (Kan.) Northwest High School in 1994. A graduate of Bishop Miege High School in Shawnee Mission, Doeren was a four-year letterwinner at Drake and earned academic All-America honors as a senior.

The 34-year-old Doeren, who has coached in three bowl games and two national championship contests, is a native of Shawnee Mission, Kan. He and his wife, Tara, have three sons: Jacob, Luke and Connor (born in April of 2006).

Mike Hankwitz Defensive Coordinator

Mike Hankwitz is in his first season as Wisconsin's defensive coordinator.

Hankwitz spent the past two seasons as defensive coordinator and outside linebackers coach at Colorado. He served as the program's interim head coach for the Buffaloes' 2005 Champs Sports Bowl appearance against Clemson. Hankwitz went to Colorado after serving as Arizona's defensive coordinator (and later interim head coach) in 2003.

Prior to his stint at Arizona, Hankwitz was the defensive coordinator and outside linebackers coach at Texas A&M (1997-2002) where he guided the Aggies' famed "Wrecking Crew" defense. Among Hankwitz's standout players at Texas A&M was Dat Nguyen, who won the Lombardi and Bednarik Awards, as well as being named Chevrolet Defensive Player of the Year.

Hankwitz spent two seasons (1995-96) as defensive coordinator and inside linebackers coach at Kansas after enjoying a highly successful 10-year run as defensive coordinator at Colorado from 1985-94. Colorado put together the nation's fifth-best record (58-11-4) from 1989-94, including a national title in 1990, three Big 8 titles, two appearances each in the Orange and Fiesta Bowls and six national top-20 rankings (including three top-five finishes).

Hankwitz was defensive coordinator at Western Michigan from 1982-84 and outside linebackers and punting coach at Purdue from 1977-81. Prior to his time at Purdue, Hankwitz was the outside linebackers and secondary coach at Arizona from 1973-76.

Hankwitz began his coaching career as a graduate assistant (1970-72) at his alma mater, Michigan, under head coach Bo Schembechler.

The 58-year-old Hankwitz is a native of Ludington, Mich. He was a three-year football letterwinner for the Wolverines and started on the 1969 Big Ten championship squad. Hankwitz earned a B.S. in education in 1970. He and his wife, Cathy, have a son, Jacob, 12.

Henry Mason Wide Receivers / Assistant Recruiting Coordinator

Henry Mason is in his 12th season coaching wide receivers at Wisconsin.

Under Mason's guidance, Wisconsin has consistently produced some of the nation's best pass-catchers since the mid-1990s.

Mason's most recent standouts were Brandon Williams and Jonathan Orr, both of whom were selected in the 2006 NFL Draft. Williams, a 2005 second-team All-American, finished his career ranked first in receptions (202) and second in yards (2,924) at Wisconsin. Orr is third all-time at UW with 19 touchdown catches and eighth in school history with 1,824 receiving yards.

Mason also coached Bedford, Ohio, products Lee Evans and Chris Chambers. Evans, a 2001 Biletnikoff Award finalist and first-team All-American, is UW's career leader in receiving yards (3,468) and touchdowns (27) and was a 2004 first-round draft choice of the Buffalo Bills. Chambers, a second-round draft pick of the Miami Dolphins in 2001, is fourth on the school's list for career receiving yards with 2,004.

Early in Mason's career at Wisconsin, Tony Simmons and Donald Hayes developed into standout receivers and eventual NFL draft picks.

Prior to coming to Wisconsin in 1995, Mason coached receivers at Western Michigan from 1991-94. Mason was head coach at Smith-Cotton (Mo.) High School from 1982-90. His 1988 team became the first in 13 years at the school to post a winning record. Mason also was an assistant coach at Baker University (1981) and was an assistant coach at Lexington (Mo.) High School (1979-80).

Mason, who has coached in nine bowl games with the Badgers, is a 1979 graduate of Central Missouri State, where he lettered in football and baseball. He was drafted by the Baltimore Colts and played one season with the St. Louis Cardinals.

Mason's wife's name is Debbie.





Wisconsin Assistant Coaches

Randall McCray Defensive Line

Randall McCray, who coached the defensive line and linebackers during the past three seasons at Toledo, is in his first season as Wisconsin's defensive line coach.

The 36-year-old McCray coached Toledo's defensive line last season, helping the Rockets to a 9-3 record and a 45-13 MAC Bowl win over UTEP. Toledo was 21st nationally in total defense last season and 1st in the MAC in scoring defense, total defense and pass defense efficiency.

In his first season at Toledo, McCray was faced with replacing two first-team All-MAC linebackers, from the previous season. The two players who stepped in, Anthony Jordan and Brock Dodrill, finished the 2003 season ranked fifth and sixth, respectively, in the MAC in tackles.

McCray was assistant head coach and defensive coordinator at Illinois State in 2002 after serving as defensive coordinator and inside linebackers coach for the Cardinals from 2000-02. In 2002, McCray guided Gateway Defensive Player of the Year Homer Grigsby to three All-America nods and a third-place finish for the Buchanan Award (top defensive player in Division I-AA football).

McCray coached inside linebackers at Murray State (1997-99) and became the linebackers' defensive coordinator in 1999; defensive ends at Bethune-Cookman (1996); was in charge of quality control at Clemson (1995); defensive line at Tennessee-Martin (1993-94) and was a graduate assistant at South Carolina from 1991-92.

A two-year letterwinner as an outside linebacker and running back at Appalachian State, McCray was a member of the Mountaineers' 1987 Southern Conference championship team.

McCray earned a bachelor's degree in communications from Appalachian State in 1991 and a master's degree in higher education from South Carolina. A native of Monroe, N.C., McCray and his wife, Michelle, have a son, Matt (4).

Bob Palcic Offensive Line

Bob Palcic, an assistant coach in the National Football League from 1994-2005, is in his first season as Wisconsin's offensive line coach.

Palcic coached tight ends for the New Orleans Saints from 2000-05. Prior to that post he was offensive line coach for the Cleveland Browns (1999), tight ends coach for the Detroit Lions (1997-98) and offensive line coach for the Atlanta Falcons (1994-96).

Palcic went to Atlanta after spending 19 of the previous 21 seasons coaching offensive linemen at seven different universities, including Wisconsin. He coached the 1993 UCLA offensive line that matched up against the Badgers in the 1994 Rose Bowl. Palcic tutored the Southern California offensive line in 1992 and helped the Trojans to a Freedom Bowl appearance. He was offensive line coach at Ohio State from 1986-91.

Arizona's offensive line was under Palcic's direction from 1984-85 (the Wildcats played in the Sun Bowl during that time). A two-year stint (1982-83) with the Canadian Football League's Toronto Argonauts (1983 Grey Cup title) was preceded by a four-year (1978-81) stop as Wisconsin's offensive line coach under head coach Dave McClain.

Palcic was Ball State's offensive line coach in 1976-77 (he went to Wisconsin with McClain, who was Ball State's head coach) and Dayton's linebackers/offensive line coach in 1974-75. He got his college coaching start guiding Ball State's linebackers as a graduate assistant in 1973.

Palcic, 58, is a native of Gowanda, N.Y., and has a bachelor's degree in education (1971) and a master's degree in education (1974), both from Dayton. He was a linebacker for the Flyers from 1968-70. He and his wife, Theresa, have three children: Joe (currently the defensive coordinator at Indiana); Amy (an assistant in the Cleveland Browns media relations office) and Monica, who is married to Philadelphia Eagles LB Mark Simonau.

John Settle Running Backs

John Settle is now in his first season as running backs coach at Wisconsin. Settle most recently served eight seasons as running backs coach at Fresno State, where he tutored six 1,000-yard rushers, including Wendell Mathis, who rushed for 1,313 yards and 15 touchdowns along with making 19 catches for 156 yards and a TD for the Bulldogs last season. Rodney Davis set the school rushing record with a 1,586-yard campaign in 2002. Settle also developed Derrick Ward, the 1999 team rushing leader, freshman All-American and current New York Giant. In addition, Settle coached 1998 WAC Pacific Division Offensive Player of the Year Jamie Kimbrough.

Settle went to Fresno State after a three-year stint (1995-98) as an offensive assistant with the Cleveland Browns/Baltimore Ravens franchise under head coaches Bill Belichick and Ted Marchibroda. Settle began his coaching career at his alma mater, Appalachian State, where he assisted with running backs in 1994.

Settle was a four-year letterman (1983-86) as a running back at Appalachian State. Settle finished as the school's career rushing leader with 4,409 yards (then third-most in NCAA Division I-AA history) and 43 touchdowns. He was the Southern Conference Player of the Year as a senior after rushing for 1,661 yards and 20 TDs.

Settle signed with the Atlanta Falcons as a free agent and played a total of six seasons in the NFL, four with Atlanta (1987-90) and two with the Washington Redskins. He accumulated 1,594 yards of total offense in 1988, becoming the first free agent in NFL history to rush for 1,000 yards in a season. He was named to the Pro Bowl and the All-Madden Team in 1988. He also played for the Redskins' Super Bowl championship team in 1991.

A 1989 graduate of Appalachian State with a degree in criminal justice, Settle and his wife, Karen, have three children: Jonathan, Leighton and Devynn.

Bill Naves

Assistant AD / Football Operations

Bill Naves, football operations coordinator / team travel with the Seattle Seahawks since February of 2000, is in his first year as assistant athletic director/director of football operations at Wisconsin.

Naves joined the Seahawks in 1999 (he went with head coach Mike Holmgren from Green Bay to Seattle) as administrative assistant / football operations. Among his duties were the organization and operation of the team's mini-camps and training camp; assistance with the team's group travel operations; creation and implementation of team operations schedules; and administrative duties with practice organization and football operations.

Naves was promoted to football operations coordinator / team travel in February of 2000. In that role he was responsible for all aspects of the team's group travel, including budget, team charters, hotel accommodations, meal arrangements and ground transportation.

Naves was also an administrative assistant / football operations for the Green Bay Packers from 1997-99. A program associate for the Wisconsin football team from May of 1994 until April of 1997, Naves assisted with advance travel, recruiting, community outreach and coaches support for the Badgers. Naves was a student manager for the Wisconsin football team from 1989-94.

A native of Madison, Wis., Mack attended East High School and later graduated from UW-Platteville in 2001. Mack's father, Jeff, is the offensive coordinator at Madison East High and his uncle, Rick, is the defensive coordinator at Lodi (Wis.) High.




Jake Sprague





There's Nothing Else Like It

Sports Illustrated on Campus said last fall that Wisconsin has the best gameday atmosphere in the Big Ten Conference. That's quite a statement, but that may not go far enough. The fact is there may not be a better way to experience college football than spending a day at Wisconsin's fabled Camp Randall Stadium.

First of all, Wisconsin fans love a good time and they love to watch the Badgers win. There are plenty of both at Camp Randall. Badger backers arrive early – they are legendary tailgaters – and stay late, with thousands remaining inside the stadium to sing and dance as the UW Marching Band conducts its festive "5th Quarter" routine.

And there is nothing like the often-imitated-but-never-duplicated madness that is "Jump Around." Between the third and fourth quarters of every home game, thousands of Wisconsin fans, band mem-

bers (and sometimes even players) jump to the 1990s hip-hop tune by House of Pain. The stadium rocks and rolls and shakes and bakes!

Badger fans are also loyal. Camp Randall Stadium has witnessed crowds of at least 70,000 for 81 consecutive home games and 71 of them have been sellouts. The stadium record was set at the 2005 Iowa game when 83,184 fans packed the facility for former head coach Barry Alvarez's final game.

A Wisconsin football gameday experience is a tradition that has been handed down from generation to generation of Badger fans. From the cooking of brats to the marching of the band, from the singing of "Varsity" and the "Bud Song" to the chants of "Rooooonnn Daaaynnnn!", from the ghosts of Crazylegs and the Horse to more recent heroes like Alvarez, Panos and Evans, the Badger gameday experience is a happening that any fan of college football will relish.

Since 1992, Wisconsin has compiled a 62-23-3 (.722) record at Camp Randall Stadium. In 2004 and 2005, the Badgers put together an 11-game home winning streak, the school's longest in the modern era.

Since the expansion of Camp Randall Stadium prior to the 2004 season, UW has averaged 82,460 fans at its home games. The Badgers have ranked 13th nationally in attendance in each of the past two seasons.



Badger Nickname

The nickname "Badgers" was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin, which was dubbed the "Badger State." The name didn't come from the animals in the region, but rather from an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

In 1949, a student wore a badger outfit with a papier-mâché head at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name—Buckingham U. Badger.

Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. The song has become legendary at the UW because of its polka-like rhythm.

Fifth Quarter

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as it plays traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song.

On, Wisconsin

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

Hall of Fame

The UW Athletic Hall of Fame was established in 1991 to recognize and honor former student-athletes and staff for their exemplary athletic achievement and contributions to the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department.

Camp Randall Stadium

35 AMECHE 33 DAYNE

One of college football's finest facilities – Camp Randall Stadium – completed a four-year, \$109 million renovation prior to the 2005 football season. The improvements are plentiful: new FieldTurf, new suites and club seats, new video scoreboards, new offices, increased seating capacity and better fan amenities like concession areas, restrooms and traffic flow.

The enhancements have not detracted from Camp Randall's charm but rather the stadium's character has been enhanced greatly by the improvements, ensuring that future generations of Badger fans will have a first-rate facility at which to watch the Badgers play on Saturdays.

Camp Randall was originally used as a Civil War training site. In fact, some 70,000 soldiers trained at the camp, which also included a hospital and a prison for Confederate soldiers on its grounds. Named for Alexander Randall, the state of Wisconsin's first wartime governor, Camp Randall Stadium opened in 1917 and was officially dedicated when the Badgers defeated Minnesota, 10-7, on Nov. 3.



Senior Associate Doug Beard



Senior Associate Shawn M. Eichorst



A Father's Dream, A Son's Opportunity

***Senior Safety Roderick Rogers Wants
To Go Out On Top***

Growing up in Stone Mountain, Ga., Roderick Rogers was the guy everyone liked to be around. He was funny, he was friendly and he was an exceptional athlete. At Stephenson High School, Rogers was a three-sport athlete, lettering in football, wrestling and track. But as the story goes, like father like son, Rogers chose the path his father had once dreamed of taking. Football was his destiny.

Without hesitation, Rogers names the most influential person in his life as his father, Roy Rogers. He doesn't blink when he says "that is my father," but smiles a little. A smile possibly triggered by memories of playing football with his father in their backyard. Roy and Roderick Rogers not only shared the same dream, but they both live it today through Wisconsin's No. 22. Rogers knows his father will always be there for him, not only to give him constructive criticism, but to congratulate him for his hard work and success.

"My father was a football player when he was young, so I'm basically living his dream," Roderick Rogers said. "But don't get me wrong, I love the game too, so it all fits together well. He's always been my biggest critic after every game, but he is always there to motivate me as well."

In 2003, Rogers earned his first varsity letter as a Badger. As a rookie, he saw action as a reserve defensive back and on special teams and made six tackles, including two apiece against third-ranked Ohio State and 13th-ranked Purdue.

That year and the one following were stepping-stones for what Rogers was about to accomplish at the UW.

In his third season, Rogers stepped into his own. Not only did he start all 13 games at free safety, but he contributed to the team's 10-3 record by making 56 tackles, the fourth-most on the team and recorded a team high-tying three interceptions. It was one of those interceptions that created Rogers' favorite memory at Wisconsin.

"My most memorable moment as a Badger took place in the Purdue game last year," said Rogers. "I took a pick and ran it back 84 yards."

That 84-yard return for a touchdown made the record books as the fifth-longest return in school history.

But today is what matters to Rogers. Not the 84-yard return, not the 56 tackles, not even the Capital One Bowl victory over Auburn on Jan. 1 of this year. The past was in the past. Although it is important to cherish those memories, as a Division I football player, it is impossible to keep them as a focal point. Rogers knows there is always room for improvement.

One year after being named a second-team All-Big Ten selection, Rogers walked onto the field at the start of the 2006 campaign, a confident senior ready to lead the experienced UW secondary.

always straight with me and let's me know what I need to work on."

Cooks thinks Rogers is having a good and promising senior year, but also recognizes the ability and potential he has and wants to see all that Rogers can bring to the table.

"I'm on him every day that he's got to step up and defend as a force," said Cooks. "Rod's another guy in a similar situation like Jack (Ikegwuonu), with a lot of ability, but the difference is, Rod needs to believe in his talents."

But Cooks knows with time, everything will fall into place for Rogers.

"He is not playing scared out there," he added. "He is playing his butt off and he's in the right situation. I know he's working hard. He's up studying tape and things like that. It's just a matter of time. The biggest thing for him is that he can't get frustrated because of some of the things he should make, but he's not. He's just got to keep pressuring them."

The 22-year-old Rogers knows that he is working hard, but realizes there is room for improvement. In eight games, Rogers ranks sixth on the team in tackles, with 23, just two behind Ikegwuonu, and 24 behind Mark Zalewski and Jonathan Casillas who lead the team with 57. With three pass breakups, he stands second on the team. He has yet to come up with an interception, although he has had a few close calls.


Rogers understands that confidence is his biggest challenge on the field. He also recognizes that if everyone of the secondary knows their roles, they can be extremely successful. He has even adopted head coach Bret Bielema's 1-0 philosophy, making sure to put the last game behind him.

Off the field, Cooks can guarantee that Rogers was one of the kids back in high school who the teacher put the hat on and sat in the corner of the room. With the exception of football, which he takes seriously, Cooks describes Rogers as a "clown".

"I can see him being one of the trouble-makers back in high school," laughed Cooks. "He's a great person though. He's a great teammate and loves his teammates and he's also a confident person. But he is always making a joke."

For Rogers, his playing days at Wisconsin are nearing the end of the road. But he is not about to let that fact affect his performance. He's wanted the same thing since he started playing at Camp Randall four years ago. And he's not going to go down without a fight.

"Hopefully we'll go to the Rose Bowl at the end," said Rogers when asked what he wants to accomplish in his senior year. "That's what we've been trying to do since I've been here. I just want to finish out every game strong."


Iowa tied the game at 14 early in the third quarter and the game remained deadlocked until late in the fourth. After an Iowa punt pinned UW at its own 10-yard line, Tony Davis broke off a 73-yard run to move the Badgers into scoring position. However, Davis could not punch it in on four tries from the six-yard line, the last two from one yard out, and Iowa took over on about their own six-inch line.

Two runs by fullback Frank Holmes moved the ball out to the three-yard line where Iowa faced third-and-8. Harris took a pitch left but was met by **Chris Davis** (left)


and **Dave Schrader** (right) causing him to slip down in the end zone. The safety gave UW a 16-14 lead with 3:42 left in the game.

Daniels Leads Texans' Comeback Bid

Making his sixth start of the season for the Houston Texans, tight end Owen Daniels set numerous personal and team records in a 28-22 loss to the Tennessee Titans in Nashville. Daniels set career marks in catches (9), yards (99) and touchdowns (2) and his five touchdown catches on the season are the most by a rookie in Houston history.

Faced with a fourth down and trailing 28-10 with less than eight minutes to go in the fourth quarter, Daniels hauled in a 26-yard touchdown pass from Houston quarterback Sage Rosenfels. However, after Titans head coach Jeff Fischer challenged the spot of the ball, the touchdown was wiped away and the ball was instead placed on the one-yard line. On the next play, Daniels again found the end zone on a play-action pass from Rosenfels, but the extra point was block to keep the score 28-16.

On the Texans' next drive, Daniels caught passes of seven and 21 yards before capping off the drive with a two-yard touchdown catch to bring Houston within six with 1:54 to play. But the Texans would get no closer, failing on the subsequent two-point conversion and only having time to run one play on their final possession.

On the season, Daniels has 18 catches for 183 yards and five touchdowns. His five touchdown catches lead the team.

After missing last week with a bruised knee, Ron Dayne rushed for 16 yards on five carries and caught two passes for 17 yards.

Bennett Returns to Action

After missing three weeks with a hamstring injury, Kansas City Chiefs' running back Michael Bennett returned to the field in a 35-22 victory over Seattle in Kansas City.

Even workhorse running back Larry Johnson, who set Chiefs' single-game records for rushing attempts (39) and total attempts (41) from scrimmage, needed a breather at times in the win and Bennett was there to provide it, rushing for 38 yards on 11 carries.

Tauscher Leads Powerful Green Bay Rushing Attack

Led by veteran tackle Mark Tauscher, the Green Bay Packers' offensive line played perhaps its finest game of the season in a 31-14 victory over Arizona Sunday in Green Bay.

Both Ahman Green (106 yards) and Vernand Morency (101) went over the century mark, the first time the Packers have had two 100-yard rushers in a game since a Dec. 1, 1985 victory over Tampa Bay at Lambeau Field.

"We have great backs, and our linemen are really starting to find their groove," fullback Brandon Miree told Packers.com. "They're looking like some of the best linemen in the NFL."

Tauscher and his fellow offensive linemen also stifled the Cardinals' pass rush, holding them without a sack.

Starks, Greisen Stifle Eagles


Jaguars cornerback Scott Starks had three tackles and linebacker Nick Greisen had two as the former Badger teammates helped shut down the Eagles' prolific offense in Jacksonville's 13-6 victory in Philadelphia.

The Eagles sported the NFL's top-ranked offense coming into their match-up with Jacksonville, averaging 417.1 yards per game and 28.6 points per game. They did not even approach those totals Sunday against the Jaguars, gaining only 227 yards while being held to six points.





Award Winners

Every great program is built on the shoulders of outstanding players. It is no different at Wisconsin. With the remarkable success of the football team in recent years has come national recognition for a number of Badger players.

The most well-known of those players is former running back Ron Dayne. The NCAA's all-time leading rusher, Dayne won the 1999 Heisman Trophy in a landslide, outdistancing runner-up Joe Hamilton of Georgia Tech by more than 1,000 points. As a senior, Dayne also won the Maxwell, Walter Camp and Doak Walker Awards.


Dayne was the second Heisman Trophy winner from UW as Alan Ameche took home the award in 1954.

In recent years, Badger players have been fixtures on national award lists. UW players have been finalists for the Rimington Trophy (best center), Outland Trophy (interior lineman), Lombardi Award (lineman), Chuck Bednarick Award (defensive

player), Bronko Nagurski Trophy (defensive player), Ted Hendricks Award (defensive end), Fred Biletnikoff Award (receiver), Lou Groza Award (placekicker), Mosi Tatupu Award (special teams) and Ronnie Lott Trophy (defensive player).

In addition, Badger players walked away with two major awards in 2000. Cornerback Jamar Fletcher earned the Jim Thorpe Award as the nation's best defensive back while Kevin Stemke won the inaugural Ray Guy Award, given to the nation's best collegiate punter.

This year a number of UW players are in contention for major awards. Offensive tackle Joe Thomas, a preseason *Playboy* All-American, can be found on both the Lombardi Award and Outland Trophy watch lists. Punter Ken DeBauche was a second-team All-American last year and is one of the top candidates for the Ray Guy Award. QB John Stocco is on the Maxwell Award watch list and DE Matt Shaughnessy is on the Ted Hendricks Award watch list.





Joe Thomas enters the 2006 season as a leading candidate for the Outland Trophy and the Lombardi Award.



Camp Randall Stadium Policies

Conduct Code

In order to keep Wisconsin football games as enjoyable as possible for our fans and their families, we ask that you respect others around you. If a ticket holder's conduct endangers or disrupts players, coaches, officials or other patrons, the University reserves the right to remove the ticket holder from the premises. No refund will be made in such cases. Stadium violations (body passing, throwing objects, and possession of alcohol) and object passing may result in a \$181 fine.

Smoke-Free Facility

Smoking is prohibited in all state-owned buildings, including Camp Randall Stadium. Designated smoking areas are located within the stadium perimeter.

Entry / No Re-entry

Please enter the gate printed on your ticket to allow for the most efficient entry to the stadium. Gates open 90 minutes prior to kick off. Fans may not leave the stadium and then re-enter during the game. If an emergency arises, check with gate security.

Alcohol

No alcohol may be brought into the Stadium. Possession may result in police arrest and a fine of \$181. The fine for first offense for underage possession/consumption of alcohol is \$243.

Guest Services Center

For general game day information, visit the Guest Services Center located under Section YZ, in the south end zone concourse.

Emergencies

In the event of a medical emergency, immediately notify a security guard, usher, police officer or paramedic in your area. UW Health First Aid Stations are located in the upper deck at Section FF, in the 5th level concourse behind Section T, and under Section YZ in the south end zone concourse.

It is possible to contact a patron during a game if you know their exact seat location by calling (608) 265-8676. No announcements will be made over the stadium sound system.

Lost and Found

If you lose an article on game day, please go to the Guest Services Center located under Section YZ, in the south end zone concourse, or call (608) 265-8676. For lost-and-found inquiries on non-game days, please call or visit the Camp Randall Welcome Center in Kellner Hall (608-262-1866).

Items Not Permitted

For the safety and security of all patrons, certain items are prohibited, including, but not limited to: any food or beverage items, cans, bottles, coolers, thermoses, backpacks (gym, duffel and tote), luggage, strollers, laser pointers, banners, flags, signs, noisemakers, weapons, balloons, beach balls or umbrellas. All patrons entering Camp Randall Stadium are subject to search. Storage facilities are not available for checking prohibited items.



Nov. 21, 1998 - Wisconsin 24, Penn State 3

The 13th-ranked Badgers got on the board late in the first quarter when Nick Davis returned a Penn State punt 82 yards for the first touchdown of the game. Wisconsin went on to upend the Nittany Lions, ranked 14th in the nation, 24-3. The victory clinched a spot in the Rose Bowl for UW.

In the second quarter, Chris Chambers made it 14-0 when he caught a 26-yard pass from quarterback Mike Samuel. Just before halftime, Matt Davenport converted a 38-yard field goal to put Wisconsin up 17-0. The Badger defense was just as stingy in the second half of play, and Penn State was only able to get a field goal in the third quarter. An insurance touchdown came with just under 12 minutes to play in the final period. Samuel took it in himself with a 1-yard run to put to game out of reach.

Ron Dayne collected 95 yards on the afternoon while Samuel rushed for 89 yards of his own. On the defensive side of the football, Jason Doering tallied 13 tackles while Donnel Thompson had 12 and Chris Ghidorzi recorded 10.

Sept. 30, 1995 - Wisconsin 17, Penn State 9

Wisconsin came out with a roaring with a 10-0 lead after the first quarter of play and upset sixth-ranked Penn State 17-9 in front of 96,540 fans under the lights at Beaver Stadium. The contest was the first Big Ten game between the two schools, as Penn State was in its first year as a member of the conference. It also snapped PSU's 20-game winning streak.

On the first drive of the game, the Badgers took the ball 72 yards in 6:39 capped by a John Hall 26-yard field goal. After a missed field goal attempt by Penn State, Wisconsin got the ball back and marched 78 yards in just six plays. A 21-yard pass from Darrell Bevell to Matt Nyquist capped the drive. After a scoreless second period, the Nittany Lions tallied a field goal to come within a touchdown midway through the third quarter. Another 21-yard touchdown pass from Bevell, this time to Tony Simmons, gave the Badgers some breathing room.




Sept. 25, 2004 - Wisconsin 20, Penn State 3

Wisconsin, ranked 20th in the nation, limited the Penn State offense to just 157 yards en route to a 20-3 win at Camp Randall stadium. Kicker Mike Allen was a perfect 3-of-3 on his field goal attempts and John Stocco ran for a touchdown to lead the Badgers to victory in front of 82,179 fans, the fifth-largest crowd in school history.

The Stocco touchdown from five yards out gave Wisconsin a 7-0 lead at the end of the first quarter. Two Allen field goals came in the second quarter, from 39 and 38 yards out, respectively. In the third period, Allen made it three in a row with a 26-yard kick.

Penn State finally got on the board with a field goal with 2:16 left to play in the game. The Wisconsin defense limited the Nittany Lions to just 70 yards rushing and 87 yards passing.

Oct. 4, 2003 - Wisconsin 30, Penn State 23

After a 46-yard Mike Allen field goal gave Wisconsin a 10-9 lead early in the second quarter, the Badgers were able to hold off a relentless Penn State team en route to a 30-23 win in front of over 107,000 fans in Happy Valley. Quarterback Jim Sorgi passed for two touchdowns and the Badgers rushed for 234 yards while limiting Penn State to just 45 yards on the ground.

Late in the second quarter, Brandon Williams hauled in a 20-yard touchdown pass from Sorgi to put Wisconsin up 17-9 at the half. The Badgers would increase their lead when Jim Leonhard returned a punt 65 yards to give UW a 23-9 advantage.

Penn State came roaring back with a 73-yard touchdown pass from Michael Robinson to Matt to bring the Nittany Lions within a touchdown. A 6-yard run from Booker Stanley proved to be the game winner. The Badgers shaved 7:02 off the clock to open the fourth quarter and go 80 yards for the score.

Bowling with the Badgers

Over the last 13 seasons, no team in the country has won more bowl games than Wisconsin. The Badgers' eight bowl victories over that span ties them with Boston College, Nebraska and Ohio State. UW has participated in 11 bowl games over the past 13 seasons, a mark matched by only Ohio State and Michigan among Big Ten teams. During that time, the Badgers have made seven appearances in January bowl games, including three Rose Bowl wins.

Last season, Wisconsin played in its second consecutive January bowl game, trouncing seventh-ranked Auburn 24-10 to capture the Capital One Bowl. That contest marked the final game in the head coaching career of Barry Alvarez.

It was fitting that Alvarez's last game was a bowl victory since he led UW to an 8-3 (.727) record in bowl games. That is the best bowl winning percentage in NCAA history among coaches with at least 11 bowl appearances.

Bowl games with the Badgers are also a big hit with Wisconsin's renowned fans. In the past decade, thousands of fans have traveled to watch the Badgers in prime winter destinations like California, Florida, Arizona and Texas.




Badgers Give Back


In appreciation for that support, many student-athletes volunteer frequently in community service projects. Every season, the football team works together on a community service project to give back to Madison.

Last season, seniors Jonathan Orr and Joel Nellis helped organize the "Yes, We Can" campaign. The UW football team, the Madison School District's Elementary Schools and the Community Action Coalition of South Central Wisconsin teamed up to assist the hungry in the Madison community.

From mid-September through mid-October, Madison Elementary School students were encouraged to bring canned goods or other non-perishable food items to school with them. 
ACADEMIC HALL OF FAMERS


Robert Butler (elected in 1972) was a three-year letterwinner at tackle and won all-league (1912-13) and All-America (1913) laurels.




Pat Harder (elected in 1993), an All-America fullback, was the Big Ten's scoring and rushing champion in 1941.




Dave Schreiner (elected in 1955), the two-time All-America end, was the Western Conference MVP in 1942.

The Big Ten Conference

This is the Big Ten Conference

The Big Ten Conference is an association of 11 world-class universities whose member institutions share a common mission of research, graduate, professional and undergraduate teaching and public service. Intercollegiate athletics has an important place within the mission.

Founded in 1896, the Big Ten has sustained a comprehensive set of shared practices and policies that enforce the priority of academics in student-athletes' lives and emphasize the values of integrity, fairness and competitiveness. Big Ten universities provide in excess of \$89 million in athletic scholarship aid to more than 8,400 men and women student-athletes who compete for 25 championships, 12 for men and 13 for women. In 2005-06, the Big Ten distributed over \$117 million in revenues to its 11 member institutions. Conference institutions sponsor broad-based athletic programs with more than 270 teams.

- Big Ten Universities are members of the nation's only conference whose constituency is entirely composed of institutions that are members of the AAU, a prestigious association of major academic and research institutions in the United States and Canada.

- Big Ten Universities have more than four million living alumni and over 300,000 undergraduate students attending Big Ten universities.

- Big Ten Universities house on their campuses nine of the nation's 30 largest academic libraries. Conference libraries hold more than 66 million book volumes and institutions freely share their materials with other league members.

- Since 1992, the Big Ten has created in excess of 2,000 new opportunities for women student-athletes and established 28 new women's teams.

- Based on the federal graduation rate average for the 1995-98 freshman classes, Big Ten student-athletes graduated at 70 percent compared to 62 percent for all Division I student-athletes. As a conference, student-athletes tend to graduate at rates consistent with the general student body (71 percent). In 2006, the NCAA also introduced a new calculation- the Graduation Success Rate (GSR) - that accounts for transfer student-athletes. The Big Ten's GSR was 81 percent compared to the Division I average of 76 percent.

- The Big Ten recognized 1,992 Academic All-Big Ten honorees during the 2005-06 academic year, the highest total in the last decade. Over the past five years, the Conference has annually acknowledged nearly 1,700 student-athletes as Academic All-Conference honorees.

- The Big Ten has claimed at least four team national championships in seven of the last nine full seasons, including six national titles during 1999-2000 alone, the most for the conference in more than a decade. Big Ten national champions in 2005-06 included Northwestern women's lacrosse and three national crowns for Wisconsin in men's cross country and men's and women's ice hockey.

- The Big Ten showcased more than 300 events that were televised nationally, regionally and locally last year, representing over 600 hours of programming.

- Big Ten Conference schools are among the national attendance leaders in football, men's and women's basketball and women's volleyball. During 2005-06, more than 8.2 million fans attended Big Ten home contests in those sports.

BIG TEN INSTANT REPLAY FACTS

Beginning with this season, all Division-I conferences and independent institutions will have the option of using a version of instant replay standardized by the NCAA - a system based upon an instant replay model created by the Big Ten Conference three years ago.

The objective of football instant replay is to allow for specific types of officiating mistakes to be immediately reviewed and corrected during games. Only specific plays are reviewable, and only those plays where the absolute standard of indisputable video evidence is met can a play be overturned. The replay system will not guarantee that all officiating mistakes are identified and corrected.

Head coaches may now utilize a timeout to request a review of a play no more than once per game. A coach initiates this challenge by taking a timeout before the ball is in play and informing the official that the ruling on the previous play is being challenged. If the ruling is overturned, the timeout will be returned to the team. If the ruling is not overturned, the team will lose that timeout. A team must have a timeout in order for the coach to challenge a play and a coach can only challenge one play per game. Head coaches may not challenge a ruling in which the game was stopped by the Technical Advisor and a decision has already been made on that specific ruling. If a head coach requests a timeout to challenge a ruling and the play is not reviewable, the team will lose that timeout. The Technical Advisor will continue to examine all reviewable plays during a game.

The Technical Advisor serving as the review official for the game can initiate reviews throughout the game. The head coach can initiate one review per game by calling a timeout. Game officials may not ask for a review.

NCAA Guidelines



What Every Badger Fan Should Know

With increasing numbers of NCAA rules governing outside intervention in recruiting, coaches cannot afford to have any extra "help" in recruiting elite student-athletes to the University of Wisconsin. The penalties are too severe.

Here are some tidbits of information concerning you and Badger athletics ... You are a "representative" of the UW's athletics interests (i.e., booster) if any of the following apply:

- a) you are an alumnus of the University of Wisconsin;
- b) you have ever made financial contributions to the athletics department, to an athletic booster organization of the UW, or to a UW athletics program;
- c) you have ever helped to arrange employment of enrolled student-athletes and/or National Letter of Intent signees;
- d) you have ever been involved in any way promoting the Badger athletic program.

Once an individual is identified as an "athletics representative/booster," the person retains that identity forever, even if that person no longer contributes to or supports the athletics program.

NCAA Bylaw 13.01.5 states: In Division I, a representative of the UW's athletics interests is prohibited from making in-person, on-or-off campus recruiting contacts, or written or telephonic communications

with a prospect or the prospect's relatives or legal guardians.

A prospect is any student who has started classes for the ninth grade. In addition, any student younger than ninth grade could become a "prospect" if they receive any benefits from an institution or a booster. Student-athletes enrolled in preparatory school or two-year colleges are also considered prospective student-athletes.

What Can You Do?

If you know of a high school or junior college student-athlete who might want to attend the UW, the only permissible activity for a representative is to call the appropriate UW coach.

Extra Benefit Rule

A representative of UW athletics interests cannot provide an "extra benefit" to a prospective or enrolled student-athlete. An extra benefit is any special arrangement by an institutional employee or a booster to provide for a student-athlete or a student-athlete's friend or relative not expressly authorized by NCAA legislation. Some examples of prohibited activities are:

- a) providing gifts or reduced cost services;
- b) providing a loan, or arranging for or co-signing a loan;
- c) employing relatives or friends of a prospective student-athlete as an inducement for the enrollment of the prospect;

- d) providing use of an automobile;
- e) providing rent-free or reduced-rent housing;
- f) providing tickets to an athletic, institutional or community event;
- g) entertaining or contacting a prospective student-athlete or a prospective student-athlete's family on or off campus;
- h) promising to provide any of the above;

According to NCAA rules, the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department reserves the right to withhold any benefit or privilege associated with their athletic department (i.e., booster clubs, ticket privileges, etc.) from individuals that are involved in a violation of NCAA legislation.


Employment

NCAA rules are such that opportunities for your interaction with student-athletes are very limited. One of the best opportunities for alumni or friends of the program to assist student-athletes financially and provide them with a valuable internship experience is through employment. A representative of athletics interests is permitted to provide employment for student-athletes under the following conditions:

- Compensation can't include any remuneration for value or utility that the student-athlete may have for the employer because of the publicity, reputation, fame or personal following that he or she has obtained because of athletics ability;
- Compensation for only work actually performed; and
- Compensation at a rate commensurate with the going rate in that locality for similar services.

With more than 700 student-athletes competing at the UW, the Department of Athletics encourages businesses to hire Badger student-athletes. 

What's Happening on Campus

Coming Soon: UW Libraries Go Google

Hundreds of thousands of books and documents contained on the University of Wisconsin-Madison campus will soon be available to anyone in the world at the click of a mouse.

UW-Madison recently announced an agreement with Google to make portions of its 7.2 million library holdings available through Google Book Search, an Internet engine that allows users to perform keyword searches on millions of full texts. Google will scan a massive collection of public-domain and historical documents from UW-Madison libraries and the Wisconsin Historical Society, creating a vast online resource for anyone interested in learning more about Wisconsin history and other topics.

Wisconsin's library system will become the eighth institution to join Google's ambitious effort to digitize the world's books and make them searchable on Google Book Search, which includes collections from the University of Michigan, the University of California, Oxford University, and the New York Public Library. Officials are particularly excited by the educational value of making these collections available online.

"UW-Madison's digitizing program has given special attention to state and

regional collections related to history, the environment and the arts," says Elizabeth Burmaster, Wisconsin superintendent of schools and a member of the UW Board of Regents. "I'm encouraged by the emphasis on expanding access to collections that are useful to Wisconsin educators and students."

"This project reflects the spirit of the Wisconsin Idea — the notion that the boundaries of the university are the boundaries of the state and beyond — by making some of our most valuable resources readily available to the public," adds Edward Van Gemert, interim director of the UW-Madison General Library System.

People can use Google Book Search to scan through millions of pages of text and locate pertinent information. Initially, the UW's collection will be limited to documents free of copyright restrictions, although Google plans to include basic information about copyrighted materials, such as where those books can be purchased or borrowed.

The combined library collections of UW-Madison and the Wisconsin Historical Society comprise one of the largest collections of documents and historical materials in the United States. In addition to public documents, the UW-Madison digitizing program will target other high-use collections, such as history of medicine, patents and discoveries, history of engineering, early publications of scientific societies, American and Wisconsin history, genealogical materials, Wisconsin state documents, decorative arts, visual and material culture, maps and sheet music.

"The original material will not be harmed in the digitizing process and it will, of course, be retained for future generations," Van Gemert says. "This project makes significant inroads toward safeguarding great stores of human knowledge."

Game On — In the Classroom

A team at the UW-Madison School of Education will play a significant role in a national research project on the potential of digital media to enhance the way students learn.

Funded by a \$50 million grant from the MacArthur Foundation, the project involves two dozen national projects that

are examining different aspects of the digital revolution and its implications for schools and society. Two of those projects — supported by \$3 million in grant funds — are taking place at UW's Advanced Digital Learning laboratory, which is studying how gaming can be used as a tool in the classroom.

"The core message of our work is that young people today are producing knowledge, not just consuming knowledge, through the use of technology," says James Paul Gee, an education professor who is leading the projects. "In fact, some of the knowledge students are acquiring outside of school can have greater value and relevance than what they're learning in the classroom."

Gee says that gaming and simulations, when used properly, can be powerful tools to promote creativity, innovation and problem-solving. They allow young people to apply concepts and simulate environments in ways that most conventional curriculum tools don't. A key goal of the lab's research is to demonstrate to educational leaders how and why digital technology integration works in an educational setting through after-school programs that focus on middle school children.

Around Campus

Laura Kiessling, a UW-Madison professor of chemistry and biochemistry, recently became the first woman to win the top prize in chemistry. A pioneering researcher who devises synthetic molecules capable of triggering reactions in living cells, Kiessling was awarded the 2005 Harrison Howe Award, given by the American Chemical Society to honor outstanding contributions to the field ... The **UW-Madison Arboretum** has received a grant from the Institute of Museum and Library Services to expand a professional development program for K-12 teachers that focuses on enhancing teaching and student learning through the process of restoring native ecosystems on school grounds ... *BusinessWeek* magazine has rated the UW-Madison **School of Business' MBA** fourth nationally in terms of how quickly students are able to recoup the cost of the degree. According to the magazine's findings, students who earn a UW-Madison MBA earn enough salary to repay their investment in education within five years, compared to more than 15 years for other MBA programs.



Excerpts from "Don't Flinch"

During my first year as a Big Ten coach, I had the opportunity to sit down with Penn State's Joe Paterno.

Growing up in that part of the country — Western Pennsylvania — I always respected Paterno and what he meant to the game.

He stood for college football.

"Coach Paterno, do you have any suggestions for a new head coach?" I asked him.

"You've played for one of the best, Bob Devaney," he said. "You worked for two of the best, Hayden Fry and Lou Holtz."

"Take the lessons you've learned from them — because those guys know how to win — and apply it to what you're doing at Wisconsin."

Since I had his ear, I threw out another question.

"How have you survived as a head coach for all those years in Pennsylvania?" I asked. "Football is so important for people in the state that they take it to a different level."

"Everyone thinks they know everything there is to know about the game. Everyone has an opinion on how it should be played. So how have you survived?"

Paterno said, "The one thing I told them when I took the job was, 'You're going to have to trust me. You've given me

this job, you've entrusted me with this job, now you have to trust me. I need your support, particularly your financial support."

"But I do not need your advice. Don't tell me what plays to call and who to play. 'Support me, instead of questioning me...and I do need your money.'"

When I was a high school senior, Joe Paterno was the guest speaker at an all-star banquet in Pittsburgh and I always tease him, "I thought you were old THEN."

Penn State never recruited me.

"Alvarez, you were a fat ass," Paterno still likes to say whenever we get together. "You were slow. That's why I didn't recruit you."

We have fun jabbing each other.

Joe has always had access to so many good players. He's had plenty to choose from. And I've always respected the type of football that he has played.

He recruits tough kids. They're not going to be fancy, but they're going to be sound in everything they do.

Going into his 40th year as a head coach, it's mind-boggling what he has done for the school.

Joe Paterno IS the school.

He put Penn State on the map. I liken it to what Knute Rockne did at Notre Dame.

What's even more amazing is that Joe has spent all those years — well over 50 years — at the same school.

That's not easy.

Lou Holtz used to say, "Don't stay any place longer than seven years because the fans are going to get tired of you."

Spike Dykes liked to say, "You lose 10 percent of your supporters every year."

Even Bobby Bowden has coached at different schools, and somewhere other than Florida State, where he will retire someday.

At Paterno's age — he'll be 80 in December — it's so impressive that he's still coaching on the field every practice.

I know how much coaching takes out of you, physically and mentally. The stress is 24/7.

Especially for someone like Paterno who can't go anywhere without being recognized.

But he's still sharp today, and outspoken as ever.

Any time we beat Penn State, it was a good win, and it was very gratifying for me, because of my Pennsylvania roots, and the fact that I knew they had so many good players.

For my family and friends in Burgettstown and Langeloth, it was bragging rights for a year.

For everything to work in our favor at the end of the 1998 season, we needed Ohio State to beat Michigan in Columbus and we needed to beat Penn State at Camp Randall Stadium.

All I wanted was our brand of football back after losing the way we did in Ann Arbor. That's what we talked about all week.

If it's not good enough, fine. But I wanted to play old school football and that's how we played against the Nittany Lions.

The Buckeyes beat the Wolverines, and we beat Penn State, 24-3, to create a three-way tie atop the Big Ten standings.

Better yet, we had the tie-breaker and the trip to Pasadena.

It's November, and the 2006-07 men's and women's basketball seasons are set to get underway.

The men's team opens at home against Mercer Nov. 12, in the Kohl Center. The women's team travels to Air Force Nov. 10, for its opener. The women will then play at home Nov. 14, against Western Michigan.
