

- 2. That to complete certain cost accounting in Agricultural Economics, L. S. Ellis be appointed half-time assistant for the academic year 1925-26, at a salary of \$1000 payable in tenths; that an allowance of \$800 be made for clerical work; total \$1800, to be charged to H. L. Russell.

- 3. That \$1800 of the Special Tobacco Fund of \$6950 be allotted to the Economic Fntomology department, as follows:

Adopted.
- 8. That the Business Manager be authorized to secure the approval of the Governor for the purchase of a tract of one and one-third acres of land from Richard A. Winckler of Ashland, for the sum of \$200, chargeable to 20.41 (3)K. (This property contains an old abandoned schoolhouse that is located within the area of the Ashland Branch Experiment Station. It is deemed inadvisable to have this become a residence within the limits of the experimental fields.)

That the following plans for the construction of additional green house space as provided by the last Legis-lature in an appropriation of \$15,000 for green houses for experimental work, be approved, and that the Business Manager be authorized to secure the approval of the Governor and the execution of plans and specifications, as follows:
  - Unit 1. An addition to the west side of the present bank of green houses, 100' in length by 21' in width and 12' high, utilizing existing gutter and walls, estimated cost ----- \$5,000

Units 2 and 3. - Construction of the two ends of a green house of standard width (21' wide, 12' high) which will be built to the south of the existing bank of green houses with a service driveway between. It was voted that owing to the proximity of this structure to the public drive that this house be constructed with curved rather than straight eaves.

Estimated cost of 2 units of 55 feet each, 110 feet @ \$90 per linear foot ------\$9.900
