L.D.S. CHURCH- BELFRY THEATRE

It may be of interest to those who attend the plays at Belfry Theatre to know something of the history of the building.

The building was built in 1888 by members of the Reorganized Church of Jesus of the Latter Day Saints. Three years before the congregation was formed at the Anthony DeLap home on the corner of what is now STH 50 and Elkhorn Road.

The settlement included several families which had come from Hancock County, Illinois, where in 1838, the entire following of Joseph Smith had settled and founded the cities of Nauvoo and Plano. Others had come from near Burlington, Wis. where Strang had founded a similar sect.

Chas. Burr, one of the members was the architect and supervised the construction while the group of 40 members gave liberally of their means and time for its building.

Some of the members during its existence as given by Mrs. Paul DeLap, wife of a grandson of Anthony were: Henry Southwick, who gave the land and his wife; Mr. and Mrs. A. DeLap; Mr. Burr, wife and daughter, Stella; Albert Hare and wife; Willis Mc Dowell and wife; Lester Williams and wife; Gene Gaylord, wife and daughter, Daisy; Fred Ball and wife, Frank Ball and wife; Albert DeLap and wife; Mrs. Equires, mother of Mrs. Mc Dowell; Ed. Williams.

The church prospered and took in The Local Dairy on Cherry St. many members, the first to be received being Mrs. Emma C. DeLap. However in 1930 the membership had dwindled to just a few, due to so many having MILK- CREAM- BUTTER-BUTTERMILK moved away and the church was closed and title to the property given to the main body with offices in Independ-__ ence, Mo.

The sect believes thoroughly in YOU DO NOT GET YOUR COPY LET US the Bible and in Jesus and except for its organization and the belief in the Book of Mormon could feel at home in other church groups.

Joseph Smith claimed and submitted proof sworn to by several that in 1823 an angel visted him and again in 1827, this time to reveal to him the bible of the Western continent. Though written on gold plates and bound together with gold rings in a strange language, he was able to translate it with the aid of the Urim and Thummin which accompanied it and thus write the "Book of Mormon which he published in 1830.

Dissensions arose in the group of followers over the question of polygamous marriages and many of them broke away and formed an independent body. This local group being followers of the new sect, which still believes that Joseph Smith did not countenance the plural marriages and point out that the Book of Mormon contains strong denunciations of polygamy.


Joseph and his brother Hyrum were snot to death in Carthage, the county seat of Hancock County on the night of June 27, 1844.

The group believe in the power of healing by the laying on of hands by the Saints and that today as of old the Lord is revealing himself to his followers and that it is possible to be a prophet and tell of God's will to men.

It is to Mr. and Mrs. George Hotton that the idea of using the abandoned building for a place to hold the practices for the plays came one day in passing the building and through Mrs. Paul DeLap taking the matter up with the home office in Independence, Mo. a lease has been secured.

Some day the Belfry Players vision the possibility of owning the land and building.

The Delfry Players deserve the support of the community and last night, tonight and Saturday night are giving a play entitled," Saturday's Children "by Maxwell Anderson, written up last week.
