

Union Renovations

Two big improvements that will make it easier to use some of the Union facilities are scheduled to begin in the summer of 1991. The Information Desk and Commons Desk will be combined and located where the Commons Desk and Deli now stand. The new Deli will be located on the first floor where the women's restroom now stands and will feature an outside window.

Also this summer, a new air conditioning system will be installed in Great Hall and Tripp Commons. This improvement will make these rooms comfortable even on the hottest days of the summer and make them even more attactive for wedding receptions and other summer celebrations.

This course will teach parents and children about bluebirds and participants will build two birdhouses to help restore this native species.

For those who would rather experience the environment in a more adventurous way, Mini Courses offers CAVE EXPLORATION, SNOW BOARDING, CROSS COUNTRY SKIING, SNOW CLIMBING, ROCK CLIMBING and HANG GLIDING. And the truly adventurous will want to sign up for the Wolf River WHITEWATER RAFT-ING ADVENTURE.
