





hen Pete Waite was named the head volleyball coach at the University of Wisconsin, it was like coming home. Waite, a native of Monona, Wis., was named the Badgers' ninth head coach in the 26year history of the program in April.

Waite, 39, comes to Wisconsin from Northern Illinois University where he was the all-time winningest volleyball coach in program history. He had been the head coach at NIU since 1988 with an 11-year record of 266-102 (.723 winning percentage) including nine 20-win seasons. The Huskies were 81-19 (.810) in the last three years including three consecutive NCAA tournament bids. Northern has appeared in four NCAA tournaments under Waite advancing to the second round three times including in 1997 when they lost to national runner-up Penn State. The Huskies also appeared in the National Invitational Volleyball Championship in 1991, '92 and '94, and declined an invitation to the NIVC in 1995.

Northern Illinois has won eight regular-season conference titles and six conference tournaments under Waite. The Huskies won the 1998 Mid-American Conference regular season title and the 1997 MAC tournament. He has earned three conference coach of the year honors including the 1997 Mid-American Coach of the Year.

In 1998, the Huskies were 27-7 overall and 15-3 in the Mid-American. NIU upped its home winning streak to 36 matches with a perfect 14-0 mark in 1998. The Huskies, who advanced to the second



round of the NCAA tournament before losing to Louisville, received votes in the final 1998 USA Today/AVCA Coaches poll and were ranked eighth in District 2.

Waite has coached four AVCA all-district selections and 18 first-team all-conference honorees. Eighteen of his athletes were named to all-tournament teams with seven receiving tournament most valuable player honors. He has had five athletes on all-newcomer teams and four earning newcomer of the year recognition.

Prior to being named the head coach at Northern Illinois, Waite spent two years as an assistant coach at Illinois State. In 1984 and 1985, he was the head coach at Moraine Valley Community College in Palos Hills, Ill., leading the Cyclones to the 1985 North Central Community College Conference championship. Waite was named the conference coach of the year in 1985.

Waite spent one year as the director and coach of the Chicago Power Junior Volleyball Club in Orland Park, Ill., and two years as a coach with the 2nd City Junior Volleyball Club in Chicago.

He started his coaching career in 1981 at Muncie (IN) Northside High School and spent the next year as a junior varsity coach at his alma mater, Monona Grove (WI) High School. Waite also coached one year at Bremen High School in Midlothian, III.

Waite played volleyball and graduated from Monona Grove High School. He played at Ball State University in Muncie, Ind., from 1977-81 with a team that consistently ranked in the


top 10 nationally. The 1979 Cardinal squad finished fourth in the NCAA tournament after winning the Midwest Intercollegiate Volleyball Association title with a perfect 14-0 record. Waite received all-MIVA honors his junior and senior years, and was named team co-captain and co-MVP in 1980. He received his bachelor's degree in education from Ball State in 1981.


Waite and his wife, Carrie, have two sons, Ryan, 15, and Eric, 11.



Christy Johnson

Christy Johnson, a twotime all-American at the University of Nebraska, enters her third year as an assistant coach at Wisconsin. She spent her first two years as an assistant under John Cook and begins her first year under Pete Waite.

Johnson, 25, has provided the Badgers with crucial NCAA experience. She also guided setter Colleen Neels to two all-Big Ten honors.

Johnson earned all-American honors for the



Johnson has international experience as a member of the 1989 U.S. Junior National team and as a member of the 1993 U.S. National "B" Team. She played with the Nebraska Tornadoes of the National Volleyball Association for two seasons leading the Tornadoes to the league championship in 1998.

A 1996 graduate of Nebraska with a bachelor's degree in education, Johnson spent one year coaching at Millard North High School in her hometown of Omaha, Neb. She also served as a coach in the River City Juniors volleyball club program for two years.

While at Northern Illinois, Pulliza aided the Huskies to the second round of the 1998 NCAA Tournament and the Mid-American regular season championship. Under his tutelage, junior setter Alison Frasor finished



third in the Mid-American Conference in assists per game.

Before heading to NIU, Pulliza spent two years as an assistant coach at James Madison University. The Dukes finished 25-9 in 1996 and were one of the nation's most improved teams. He also turned walk-on setter Kari Kopnicky into an all-conference player.

Pulliza, 26, started his coaching career at Burris High School in Muncie, Ind., where he was an assistant coach. Burris won two state championships and in 1994 was named *USA Today's* national runner-up. He has also worked numerous camps and clinics.

Pulliza played college volleyball at Ball State University where he was the back-up to all-American setter Eduardo Ferraz and served as the team captain two years. The Cardinals advanced to the NCAA final four in 1994 and 1995.

In addition to playing volleyball, Pulliza also served on Ball State's Student-Athlete Advisory Board. He earned Dean's List honors in 1995–96, and also received an academic recognition scholarship. Pulliza graduated from Ball State in 1996 with a degree in general studies and sports administration with a minor in business. Pulliza earned his master's in sports administration and coaching from James Madison in 1998.

He is married to the former Jamie Sides.

Q&A with Coach Pete Waite



You were named Wisconsin's ninth head coach in the 25-year history of the program in April. How does it feel to take over one of the top teams in the country?

I am honored to have been selected to head this program. Having grown up in the Madison area I was always a huge fan of Badger Athletics. I never imagined that one day I would be in the middle of it all. Now I have the chance to work with one of the best teams in the country! I will have a front row seat to some of the most exciting matches in the nation and I have a chance to bring my family back to the city I love. The excitement level in my life just turned up about ten notches and I am happy to be a Badger again.

You know from having grown up in the city, Madison is one of the top places to live in the country. What made you want to come back and accept this position? What would you tell a recruit about Madison, the University, and your coaching style?

Coming back to Madison was something that was bound to happen—it was just a matter of when. This is just a beautiful city! I love all the lakes, trees and hills, and the recreational opportunities. The University of Wisconsin is a great academic institution and the fan support here is fantastic. Even though this is a new job for me, it sure feels good to be home. I love Madison. I love this University! I think we have a lot of exciting times ahead.

At Northern Illinois, you were the school's winningest coach and led the Huskies to four NCAA tournament appearances. How will this winning experience help the Badgers?

When I took over at NIU my goal was to make the program regionally and then nationally competitive. People wondered how long I would stay at NIU, but all I wanted

to do was to take the program to a higher level each year. I am proud that we took the team from a bottom 100 ranking to ranks in the top 30, nationally.

Wisconsin is coming off two very successful seasons, having advanced to the NCAA Regional Finals, finishing among the top eight teams in the

country. What are the team's expectations for the upcoming season?


Over the course of 11 years I learned a lot about managing a team, getting them to win at the end of the season. I know I have a lot more to learn at the Big Ten level and taking over at Wisconsin will challenge me to step outside my comfort zone and improve myself as a person and a coach. When my team steps on the court, I want them to work hard, play smart and find a way to win. Between the players and the staff, that will always be our goal. If we do that, the wins will come and we can continue the strong tradition of Badger Volleyball.

At the start of each season, every team wants to improve upon its performance from the season before. For the last two years these players have been knocking on the door to the NCAA Championship. Everyone wants to take it one step further and we will do everything we can to get there.


The Badgers have two of the top middle blockers in the country in senior all-American Kelly Kennedy and sophomore Sherisa Livingston, who was named the 1998 Big Ten Freshman of the Year. How will you use this as a team strength? What other aspects of the game will be considered strengths? Does this team have any weaknesses?

In all my years of coaching my best teams had a strong group of middle blockers. I am thrilled to have Kelly and Sherisa returning and add Claudia Rodriguez to that list of strong middles. Opponents will have to honor those players and that will open up things for our other hitters along the net. We have good size and athletic ability throughout our roster and I see a very balanced attack this season. I will know more about our weaknesses once our preseason practices start. When we pinpoint those areas we will work hard to eliminate them.

Wisconsin is consistently one of the top teams in the country in attendance. How does the support of the Madison community help the team? How tough

to fill the holes they left. Lizzy Fitzgerald returns as a sophomore setter and brings with her a year of collegiate workout experience. This summer she is training with the U.S. A-2 program. Morgan Shields is also an exceptional setter and those two will be one of the best tandems in the setting position in the Big Ten. Both players can also attack the ball well, so I feel good about our setting position.

We have a number of returning starters, including Kelly Kennedy, Sherisa Livingston, and Jenny Maastricht. On the left side we'll have Allyson Ross, Keylee Wright and Erin Byrd in a solid rotation for us. We will know a lot more once preseason begins and the players settle in their positions

and we decide on their roles on the court.

Fab 50 selection Erin Byrd, and Claudia Rodriguez, a member of the Mexican National Team. What will this group of talented athletes add to the Badger team?

This is an excellent recruiting class and they all have the ability to make an immediate impact on the program. All three are great athletes and intense competitors. I look forward to working with them as they improve and mature over the years.

The Badgers consistently seem to be getting taller and more physical each year. How is this different from the type of teams you've coached at Northern? Does this make the team more competitive? Less competitive?

No doubt this is a big team and I noticed that the first time I met them. We would have some players this size at Northern, but just not so many of them. This group is big, athletic and they can play the game well. To compete nationally you need this kind of size and jumping ability. While people will notice our height, I am not going


Badger Volleyball fans are unbelievable! They come in big numbers and support the staff and team in everything they do. When our team walks out on the court for a home match, the crowd helps the players raise the level of their play and undoubtedly it helps them play their best. When the Field House is packed, it's extremely intimidating for opponents. Both the fans and the band are right on top of the visiting team. The Field House is a great place to play and our fans give us a couple of points a game. That can make a difference in a big match, and we love the noise.

The Badgers have to replace two starters from 1998 including all-Big Ten setter Colleen Neels. Who will fill the starting setter role? What other players will battle for starting spots?

Marisa Mackey and Colleen Neels were both great players and it will be a challenge for the staff to decide who is going Several members of the team trained with the U.S. National Team this past summer. What sort of commitment have this year's players made to improving during the off season? How will this help the team?

I am happy to have four players playing within the U.S. National training system this summer: Sherisa Livingston, Kelly Kennedy, Lizzy Fitzgerald and Jenny Maastricht will learn a lot and this will pay off as we get into our season. They will have more confidence on the court and be ready for any situation.

Wisconsin signed three athletes to national letters of intent including

to overlook our smaller players and their ability to swarm the court and make great defensive plays. I like variety in my players and you need that when you're matching against certain opponents.

The athletes returning this year are used to winning, with Wisconsin having competed in five consecutive post-season tournaments, including four NCAA appearances. How will this post-season experience benefit the team?


Post-season experience is important. Just look at the recent Chicago Bull's dynasty: they weren't the most talented team as far as depth goes, but they played well as a team and had veterans with great playoff experience. Our returners are very important because they have been to the 'Big Dance' before.

Wisconsin finished second in the 1998 Big Ten Conference race. How will the Badgers fit into the Big Ten race? What teams will challenge for the Big Ten title in 1999?


You never really know how conference play will go until you get into it. There are three new coaches in the Big Ten including myself. Penn State won the Big Ten in 1998 and took second at the NCAA Championship. I still see them as the team to beat.

The Big Ten Conference is the toughest in the country and the Badgers also play a strong non-conference schedule. How would you rate Wisconsin's 1999 schedule? What matches will be key?

Our schedule is one of the toughest and most challenging in the country. We have some great matches that will prepare us for the NCAA tournament with teams like Nebraska and Florida, and we finish with a tough Big Ten schedule playing at Ohio State and Penn State, the last weekend

Badgers Finish Among Nation's Best



SEASON ENDS AT REGIONAL For the second year in a row, Wisconsin ended its season with a five-game match in the finals of a NCAA Regional.

In 1997, the Badgers lost to Florida in five games in the finals of the NCAA Central Regional at home. In 1998, Wisconsin took to the road and was downed by third-ranked Nebraska in five games in the finals of the Pacific Regional in Lincoln, Neb.

30 WINS AGAIN The Badgers ended their season at 30-5, their second consecutive 30-win season and the fourth in program history. Wisconsin's winning percentage of .857 is the second best in program history behind last season's .909 (30-3).

BIG TEN RUNNER-UP Wisconsin was 17-3 in Big Ten Conference play to finish second behind perennial powerhouse Penn State. The finish ties the third best in program history behind two Big Ten championships (1990 and 1997) and one second-place tie (1991).

COOK LEADS BADGERS TO POST-SEASON SUCCESS John Cook led Wisconsin to its six consecutive post-season tournament in 1998. The Badgers have competed in the NCAA tournament five times under Cook including the last three consecutive years. Wisconsin also won the 1995 National Invitational Volleyball Championship. Cook is 161 -73 (.688) after seven years at Wisconsin.

WISCONSIN RANKED NO. 7 The Badgers were ranked seventh in the final *USA Today*/AVCA Top 25 Coaches poll released Dec. 22. Wisconsin moved up to 10th in the final *Volleyball* Magazine poll released Nov. 30.

KENNEDY NAMED ALL-AMERICAN Junior Kelly Kennedy earned AVCA second-team all-American honors in 1998. She becomes the first two-time volleyball all-American in Wisconsin history after also earning second-team honors in 1997.

THREE NAMED ALL-DISTRICT Senior Colleen Neels, junior Kelly Kennedy and freshman Sherisa Livingston earned AVCA All-District honors. It was the second consecutive honor for Neels and Kennedy while Livingston became the first freshman in UW history to earn all-district honors.

THREE NAMED ALL-BIG TEN Senior Colleen Neels and junior Kelly Kennedy were named to the 1998 All-Big Ten honor team while freshman Sherisa Livingston earned honorable mention honors. It was the second consecutive honor for Neels and Kennedy.


LIVINGSTON NAMED FRESHMAN OF THE YEAR Sherisa Livingston was named the 1998 Big Ten Conference Freshman of the Year, the first honor for a Badger player.

RECORD BREAKERS The Badgers broke a number of records this season:

Wisconsin set the team hitting percentage record for a match against Arkansas-Little Rock hitting .506 percent. That broke the old mark of .470 set against Loyola in 1989.

✓ Freshman Sherisa Livingston set the Big Ten-season only hitting percentage for an individual as she hit .375 percent during conference matches. The previous best was .366 set by Kelly Kennedy in 1997.

✓ Senior Colleen Neels set the single season record for assists with 1,675. She broke the old UW record of 1,653 set by Laura Abbinante in 1995.



Kelly Kennedy earned her second consecutive all-American honor in 1998 becoming the first two-time all-American in Wisconsin history.

WISCONSIN SCHEDULE ONE OF THE NATION'S TOUGHEST

During the 1998 season, the Badgers played 17 matches against teams that were ranked in the *USA Today*/AVCA Top 25 at the time they played them. In addition, nine regular-season opponents advanced to the 1998 NCAA tournament.

Wisconsin's schedule was the fourth toughest in the nation according to the AVCA/Sagarin Division I Power Ratings. The Badgers ended the season ranked fifth in the ratings.

BADGERS BREAK HITTING RECORD, AGAIN For the third year in a row, the Badgers broke the UW season record for hitting percentage. In 1997, Wisconsin hit .271 percent for the season breaking the old record of .256 set in 1996. The previous best was .227 percent set in 1989. The Badgers finished the 1998 season hitting .281 percent.

wisconsin ranked fifth in the unofficial national attendance rankings. The Badgers averaged 2,632 spectators for all matches and 3,190 spectators for Big Ten matches. The UW drew a regular-season record crowd of 7,001 against Penn State on Nov. 6, which was the 10th largest crowd in the nation this season.

Wisconsin has ranked among the top 10 teams in the nation in volleyball attendance since 1990 including a third-place finish in 1997.

FOUR NAMED ACADEMIC ALL-BIG TEN Four members of the Wisconsin team were named to the Academic all-Big Ten team. In order to be named to the honor team, a student-athlete must have a cumulative grade point average of 3.00 or above, be a letterwinner and a non-first-year student.

Named to the team were seniors Lindsey Buswell and Marisa Mackey; junior Allyson Ross and sophomore Hayley Jones.

Wisconsin Field House

the Wisconsin Field House has been the permanent home of the Badger volleyball team since 1986. In 1998, the volleyball team took over sole possession of the Field House adding a Sport Court and improving its locker room facilities.

The first volleyball match played in the Field House was on Oct. 23, 1977, when the U.S. Men's National Team played Cuba. The first women's match followed soon after when Wisconsin played host to the 1977 Big Ten Conference Championship. The semifinal and championship matches were played on Oct. 29 as Ohio State defeated Wisconsin, 2-1, to win the title.

It wasn't until 1980 that the Badgers again competed in the Field House playing host to the Badger Invitational and the AIAW Midwest Regional. In 1981, the team played all its home matches in the Natatorium but returned to the Field House for all but one match in 1982. The entire 1983 season was played in the Field House but the 1984 season saw a split with half the matches at the Natatorium and half the matches in the Field House. In 1985, all but two matches were played in the Field House with the official move to the Field House being made in 1986.

Since 1990, when the Badgers won their first Big Ten title and competed in the their first NCAA tournament, the Field House has become one of the toughest places to play in the country. Wisconsin has ranked among the top 10 in national attendance average for the last seven years including a third-place ranking in 1997. The Badgers set the Big Ten Conference record with 3,457 spectators per match. Wisconsin also led the league in 1990, 1991 and 1994.

The Field House was the site of the 1993 NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Championship which drew record crowds. A total of 21,085 watched the two-day event including 11,155 for the championship match. That figure set the then-NCAA single-match attendance record and still ranks as the No. 4 volleyball attendance figure of all time.

The Field House was also the site of the No. 6 attendance of all time as 10,935 fans watched the Badgers defeat Illinois in the first round of the 1990 NCAA tournament.

With the Kohl Center opening, the Badger volleyball team is the sole occupant of the Field House in the fall. One of the improvements is a permanent Sport Court for all UW home matches and practices.

The Badgers also moved into improved locker room facilities with a team lounge and study area separate from the team's home locker room.

The Field House has a total of four locker rooms for hosting tournaments as well as an athletic training room and equipment room.

Action on the volleyball court isn't the only thing you'll find when you come to the UW Field House. Bucky Badger and the UW pep band lead the cheers while there are always exciting contests to entertain fans between games.

he Badgers made their seventh NCAA tournament appearance in 1998. Wisconsin is 10-7 in the championship with its best finishes coming in 1997 and 1998 when it advanced to the finals of the NCAA Regional (elite eight). The UW has appeared in the "Big Dance" five out of the last six years including the last three in a row.

The Badgers also won the National Invitational Volleyball Championship twice during its seven-year history. Wisconsin won the inaugural NIVC in 1989 and won the final championship in 1995.





Record-breaking Championships

The University of Wisconsin served as the host to the NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Championship twice in the last six years. Wisconsin is only the third university to play host to the championship more than once.

In 1998, the UW set the NCAA single-match attendance record when 13,194 spectators watched the finals of the championship. Wisconsin also set the NCAA semifinal attendance record of 12,327 bringing the two-day total to 25,521, which breaks the championship record of 21,086 set in 1997 at the Spokane Arena.

Wisconsin first played host to the championship in 1993 drawing record crowds to the UW Field House. A then-record attendance of 21,085 watch the two-day event including 11,155 who watched Long Beach State defeat Penn State in the championship match. That figure still stands as the No. 4 volleyball attendance figure of all time.



Then Steve Lowe unexpectedly passed away on Aug. 22, 1991, the University of Wisconsin and the Madison community lost a

true friend and a winner on and off the court.

With Lowe at the helm, the Badger volleyball program burst onto the national scene. In 1989, he directed the Badgers to the title in the inaugural National Invitational Volleyball Championship, their first post-season appearance ever.

The following year he steered Wisconsin to its first Big Ten Conference title, their first NCAA tournament appearance and first national ranking, finishing 10th in the final 1990 NCAA poll. Lowe also produced Wisconsin's first volleyball all-American with Lisa Boyd earning second-team honors in 1990.

Lowe, who had a 108-64 career record in five years at Wisconsin, earned 1990 Big Ten and AVCA Mideast Coach of the Year honors.

Every year Wisconsin's Big Ten Conference home opener will be designated "Steve Lowe Night." This year's match is on Friday, Oct. 1 versus Michigan. A Badger volleyball player is also named the Steve Lowe Scholarship recipient with this year's honoree being sophomore Marie Meyer.

ne of the premier athletic leagues in the nation, the Big Ten Conference is proud of its leadership in the area of women's athletics.

Big Ten women's athletics programs lead the nation in basketball attendance, and rank second in volleyball attendance. In addition, the league receives more television exposure than any conference in the nation. More than 200 Conference athletic events are televised each year on national and regional networks.

Begun in 1895, the Intercollegiate Conference of Faculty Representatives (popularly known as the Big Ten) has changed little from its original philosophy of faculty control of athletics with emphasis on the student-athlete. Comprised of 11 institutions in eight states, the conference has long set the national standard for athletics and academics. As a whole, league institutions graduate student-athletes at overall rates between 10 and 22 percent higher than their peers at other Division I conferences.

Women's athletics programs became affiliated with the Conference officially in 1981, although unofficial conference championships had been held among the member institutions since 1972.

Big Ten women athletes compete in conference championships in basketball, cross country, field hockey, golf, gymnastics, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball, and beginning in 2000, women's rowing.

The Big Ten Conference volleyball champion is determined by the match record within the conference. Teams play a double, round-robin schedule facing each other at home and away, for a total of 20 matches.

The conference champion earns an automatic bid to the NCAA tournament. In 1999, the Big Ten was represented by six universities in the NCAA Volleyball Championship for the second consecutive year.

Members of the Big Ten Conference have competed in the NCAA championship 10 times including five-time participant Penn State. Illinois and Ohio State have each made two championship appearances and Michigan State one.

For five of the last eight years, the Big Ten Conference has led the nation in volleyball attendance. In 1998, six schools finished in the top 17 in attendance, and overall the league drew a total of 241,141 spectators for the season, which was ???? in the nation.

Wisconsin ranked fifth in the nation averaging 2,632 spectators per match. In 1997, the Badgers set a conference record with 3,497 spectators per match.

Penn State led the league and ranked third in the country averaging 2,847 per match while Illinois was 10th 91,828) and Minnesota finished 12th (1,629). Also in the top 20 were Purdue (15th with 1,300 per match) and Michigan State (17th with 1,253 per match).

UW-Madison is one of the nation's first land-grant colleges, establishing a tradition of research in agriculture and the life science. The founders of the university developed the "Wisconsin Idea" ensuring "the beneficent influence of the university available to every home in the state."

UW-Madison is the largest institution in the University of Wisconsin System. It has the only public law and medical schools in the state as well as the only school of veterinary medicine.

A Scenic Campus

One of the most picturesque college campuses in the country, UW–Madison covers 933 acres along the beautiful shores of lake Mendota.

One mile from the capitol, traveling down historic State Street, the city was designed so the University and state would be linked, signifying the interrelated nature of the academic and political life of Wisconsin.

Madison's lakes, rolling hills, architecture, parks and arboretum have enhanced UW-Madison's reputation for scenic beauty.

Tree-lined Bascom Hill features a bronze statue of Abraham Lincoln, one of the University's most famous landmarks. Others include North Hall, the first building on campus; the Carillon Tower in front of the Social Science building; Library Mall, with its clock tower and fountain; and Picnic Point, which lies at the end of a 129acre peninsula complete with hiking and biking trails—one of the most romantic spots on campus. Camp Randall Stadium is a fun place to be on a Saturday afternoon, especially during the infamous Fifth Quarter after a football game when the band entertains. The newly opened Kohl Center is home to the UW basketball and ice hockey teams as well as a regular concert stop.

A favorite area for UW students to gather is the Memorial Union and its lakeside terrace. Here students can study or socialize against a backdrop of sailboats, canoes, sailboards, kayaks and swimmers, while enjoying the sunshine and breezes from Lake Mendota.

The Student Body

Over 40,000 students populate the UW campus, including more than 10,500 graduate and professional students in numerous fields.

Although a UW Board of Regents policy limits undergraduate enrollment from outside the state to 25 percent, the University still maintains one of the nation's most diverse student bodies.

Students hail from every county in the state and every state in the nation, as well as from 119 foreign countries.

UW-Madison ranks fourth in the nation for total foreign student enrollment.

A greater effort is also being made to recruit and retain minority students and faculty. In the fall of 1997, African-Americans, Hispanics, Native Americans and other minority groups accounted for more than nine percent of the student body.


Madison, located in southern Wisconsin, is not only pretty to look at but fun to be in. Draped around five lakes, "Mad City" is the home of the University of Wisconsin and the state capital.

With a diverse population of 200,814, Madison offers the "big city" spheres of politics, arts and entertainment, as well as the attributes of a small town. It is a family and action-oriented community that promotes participation in government, education, the arts, sports and recreational activities.

"Wisconsin-Madison is a world-class American university located in a world-class college town. With over 800 campus organizations, 14,000 works of art, and even a nuclear reactor to call their own, the nearly 30,000 undergraduate students at Wisconsin would be hard-pressed not to find something to do."

Madison was named the best place to live in America in 1996 by Money magazine. Again, in 1998 Money magazine rated Madison the best mid-sized city in the Midwest. The July 1995 issue of Outside magazine called Madison a "Dream Town." The magazine also rated Madison as one of the top 15 "great sports towns" in the country. U.S. News and World Report named it one of the country's 10 Hottest Cities. Madison was also featured on the front page of the Life section of USA Today on July 12, 1995.



WHERE WISCONSIN RANKS

Since 1910, the University of Wisconsin has ranked on the top 10 lists in every objective national faculty reputational survey. The quality of Wisconsin's undergraduate, graduate and research programs is recognized worldwide.

In 1999, U.S. News & World Report listed UW-Madison as tied for eighth for academic reputation among public universities and 36th among all universities.

Wisconsin was alos ranked sixth in Kiplinger's Top 100 Values in States Universities in 1999.

The 1998 Fiske Guide to Colleges, the best-selling guide to colleges, gives the UW-Madison its highest academic ranking. In fact, UW-Madison is one of only eight public institutions in the country to receive the five-star rating.



Funding and Support

- ➤ Federal Grants: UW–Madison received over \$242 million in federal awards in 1997.
- ▶ Research and Development Funds: UW-Madison ranked third in the country for research and development expenditures in 1997, with \$458 million, according to the National Science Foundation.
- ▶ Tuition: Over the last 10 years, tuition for resident undergraduates at the UW–Madison has been consistently lower than the average for public Big Ten schools. The UW–Madison has the second-lowest resident undergraduate tuition andthe third-lowest nonresident undergraduate tuition of the public Big Ten institutions.
- ▶ **Private Support:** With private gifts totally \$220 million in 1998, Wisconsin ranks first among all public institutions and fifth among all institutions.
- ➤ Alumni: The Wisconsin Alumni Association has a network of 116 chapters around the world helping to serve some 300,000 alumni. The chapters have raised \$3.5 million in scholarships.

Degrees

- ▶ **Graduates:** Standard & Poor's 1997 survey lists the Wisconsin as one of the nation's top producers of corporate executives, ranking second in producing bachelor's degree winners who go on to become corporate executives.
- ▶ Doctoral Degrees: UW-Madison is a national leader in number of doctoral degrees awarded ranking second in 1997. Between the school's founding and 1997, the University of Wisconsin–Madison awarded 32,785 doctoral degrees.

Departmental Academic Rankings

- ▶ Liberal Arts: In its ranking of graduate programs in the liberal arts in 1999, U.S. News & World Report sited UW-Madison's sociology department as tops in the country. The magazine also ranked library sciened, eighth; education, ninth; social work, ninth; economics, 10th; history, 11th; psychology, 12; political science, 14th; English, 17th; fine arts, 19th; and music, 20th.
- ➤ Science Programs: According to U.S. News and World Report's annual graduate school ratings, published in 1999, seven UW–Madison science programs ranked in the top 20: computer science, ninth; chemistry, 10th; biology, 12th; math, 14th; geology, 17th; physics, 18th; and nursing, 18th.
- ▶ Engineering: In 1999, U.S. News and World Report ranked Wisconsin's College of Engineering 12th in the nation. Three specialities ranked among the top five in the country: nuclear, fourth; chemical,

fifth; and industrial, eighth.

- ▶ Professional Schools: U.S. News and World Report ranked four UW-Madison Schools or Colleges among the top 20 in the country: veterinary medicine, ninth; engineering, 12th; pharmacy, 16th; and nursing, 18th.
- ▶ Film and TV: The College Finder ranked UW-Madison as one of the top 35 schools in the nation for studying film and television in 1997.
- ▶ Libraries: The UW-Madison has the 14th largest university library collection in the United States, with more than 5.8 million books in 45 libraries across campus.
- ▶ **Business:** Business Week ranked the school among the top 50 business schools in the nation.

Computerworld ranked the business school's Information Systems program as one of the top 25 in the nation.

University Administration



David Ward

David Ward was named chancellor of the University of Wisconsin-Madison in June 1993.

Ward has provided strong leadership for efforts to improve the quality of undergraduate education. Changes inspired by Ward include enhanced student advising, particularly for freshmen and sophomores; expanded course access; a core curriculum; and increased opportunities for undergraduates to conduct research.

Ward chairs the Board of Trustees of the University Corporation for Advanced Internet Development and also serves on the Board of Directors of the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges and chairs the Big Ten Council of Presidents/ Chancellors.

The chancellor was born in Manchester, England, and received bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Leeds. He earned a Fulbright Travel award to the United States in 1960 and received a doctorate from UW-Madison in 1963.

He served as chair of the geography department from 1974 to 1977 and as associate dean of the Graduate School from 1980 to 1987. He became vice chancellor for academic affairs at UW-Madison in 1989, and in 1991, was also named provost, chief deputy to the chancellor.



Jim Hoyt

Jim Hoyt, a professor in the UW's School of Journalism and Mass Communication, has served as the chair of the UW Athletic Board and as a UW Faculty Representative since 1991.

As the chair of the Athletic Board, Hoyt oversees the governing body that supervises the day-to-day running of the athletic department. As a faculty representative, he serves on a number of committees of the NCAA, Big Ten Conference, and Western Collegiate Hockey Association.

A UW professor since 1973, Hoyt was the director of the School of Journalism and Mass Communication from 1981 to 1991. He teaches courses in the school's broadcast news sequence and has conducted extensive research on the effect of cameras in the courtroom. A former producer and editor for NBC News in Washington, D.C., he now consults for NBC News and a number of local televsion stations throughout the country. Hoyt received his bachelor's, master's and Ph.D. from Wisconsin.



Pat Richter

Pat Richter, a former UW student-athlete, professional football player, and successful businessman, was the perfect choice to become Wisconsin's athletic director in December of 1989.

An all-America tight end for Wisconsin's 1963 Rose Bowl football team, Richter had a distinguished career with the National Football League's Washington Redskins from 1963–71. He was inducted into the National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame and the Rose Bowl Hall of Fame.

Richter earned his bachelor's degree in landscape architecture from the UW in 1964, earning Academic all-America honors in 1962 and was named Wisconsin's Big Ten Medal of Honor recipient in 1963. He received his law degree from the UW in 1971. In 1995, he was inducted into the GTE/CoSIDA Academic Hall of Fame, and was honored as an NCAA Silver Anniversary Award winner for post-college achievements.

After employment with a Madison law firm, he joined the Oscar Mayer Foods Corp., and worked his way up to vice president of personnel.



Vince Sweeney

In his ninth year at Wisconsin, Vince Sweeney is the associate athletic director in charge of external and internal communications. He oversees the areas of marketing, promotions, sports information, special events and fundraising as well as serving as the liaison with the Athletic Board and Alumni Association.

Sweeney serves on the Board of Directors of the National Association of Collegiate Marketing Administrators and of the Greater Madison Convention and Visitor's Bureau. He is a member of the NCAA's subcommittee on basketball marketing and is a consulting editor for Collegiate Sports Marketing.

In 1994, Sweeney was named "Marketeer of the Year" by the Madison Chapter of the American Marketing Association. His department won two "Awards of Excellence" from Athletics Management magazine in 1995.

Prior to joining the UW, Sweeney worked for 13 years in sports journalism, where he earned several awards as a reporter and editor for the Madison Press Connection, Milwaukee Journal, Milwaukee Sentinel, The Capital Times and the Los Angeles Times.

Sweeney is a 1978 graduate of UW-Madison with a bachelor's degree in journalism and mass communication.

Cheryl Marra



He also oversees the academic affairs and sports medicine departments as well as serves as the campus student-athlete services coordinator.

Moss served as a Director of Sports Operations for the Atlanta Olympic Games Committee from 1993–96. He was responsible for coordinating the sports of archery, boxing, cycling (road and track), equestrian, modern pentathlon and tennis.

Prior to his work with the Olympics, Moss served as the associate athletic director for business and student services at the University of California for 13 years.

Moss is a 1961 graduate of Ohio University with a bachelor's degree in journalism. He received his master's in science and physical education from California State University—Hayward. He is a retired lieutenant commander in the U.S. Naval Reserve.



Terry Gawlik

Terry Gawlik is in her second year as an assistant athletic director at Wisconsin. She oversees the men's and women's soccer and tennis programs. Gawlik is also in charge of the department's program assistants as well as coordinating tournaments and special projects.

Gawlik has been with the UW since 1994 as an administrative assistant and event coordinator. She supervised game-day operations from men's and women's basketball and volleyball as well as assisting with the marketing and promotions for those events. he University of Wisconsin-Madison offers its student-athletes one of the premier intercollegiate athletic programs in the country.

As a member of the prestigious Big Ten Conference, Wisconsin offers its student-athletes the best in education, athletic opportunities, coaching and on-field competition at the NCAA Division I level.

With a number of sports begun more than 100 years ago, Wisconsin men's teams compete in basketball, cross country, football, golf, ice hockey, rowing, swimming and diving, soccer, tennis, track and field, and wrestling.

Established July 1, 1974, the 12-sport women's athletic program offers basketball, cross country, golf, Ice hockey, lightweight rowing, rowing, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, track and field, and volleyball.

Wisconsin has ranked among the top 35 NCAA Division I programs for the past four years. In 1998-99, Wisconsin tied for 25th in the Sears/National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics Directors Cup competition, which recognizes the best Division I college sports programs in the nation.

Fifteen of Wisconsin's 22 sports qualified as teams or individuals for their respective national championships in 1998-99. The women's cross country team finished fifth at the NCAA Championship while the men's team was sixth. The ootball team ended the season ranked fifth while the women's volleyball team advanced to the elite eight of the NCAA tournament for the second consecutive

year. Individually, Badger athletes earned 35 all-American honors during the year.

Qualifying for post-season competition as teams or individuals were men's basketball, men's and women's cross country, football, men's and women's rowing, women's soccer, men's and women's swimming, women's tennis, men's and women's track and field, volleyball and wrestling.

Wisconsin was the unofficial 1998-99 Big Ten Conference All-Sports champion. The Badgers crowned two Big

Ten team champions in women's cross country and football while second-place finishes were earned by women's soccer, women's tennis, women's outdoor track and volleyball.

Two Badger coaches were named the Big Ten Coach of the Year in their respective sports while three athletes were

named the Big Ten Athlete of the Year and three were named the Big Ten Freshman of the Year. Wisconsin athletes also claimed 17 Big Ten individual titles. A total of 77 all-conference honors were earned during the season.

Academic honors also came in with two athletes earning Academic all-American honors, seven earning Academic all-district honors and 134 student-athletes earning Academic all-Big Ten honors.

NCAA Championships

In the last seven years, the University of Wisconsin has played host to five NCAA Championships.

The Badgers have played host to the NCAA Men's Ice Hockey Championship in 1993 and 1997. The 1993 event sold out in three months, the fastest sell out in NCAA hockey history.

Wisconsin played host to the NCAA Women's Volleyball Championship in 1993 and 1998. The Badgers shattered the attendance records for the championship match and two-day event both years.

The UW was also the site of the 1998 NCAA Women's Golf Championship. The event was the first national championship held at University Ridge Golf Course and the first women's championship shown live on national television showcasing the Ridge.

The NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament will come to Wisconsin in 2002 when the Badgers play host to a regional in the Kohl Center.


Academic & Student Services

The mission of the Academic Affairs Office is to provide student-athletes with the maximum opportunity for academic and athletic excellence. University of Wisconsin athletes have a history of academic success and much of the credit for that impressive record is due to the advising system available to the student-athletes.

Director Alan Zussman supervises a staff of six advisors which conduct the program offered to the nearly 700 student-athletes. The advising staff of Mary Weaver-Klees, Craig Hudson, Chris Butler, Doug Tiedt, Liane Kosaki and Jerry Darda have a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all university departments. The staff renders quality academic and personal support to student-athletes and assists coaches in providing the best possible collegiate experience.

For those student-athletes who request assistance, advising sessions are offered on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the athlete. Wisconsin athletes are degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The advising staff takes a personal approach to each athlete in determining his or her individual needs, personal or academic.

Student-athletes at Wisconsin receive recognition for outstanding academics in a number of ways. The Big Ten Conference honors scholar-athletes with Academic all–Big Ten honors while the UW Athletic Board recognizes Athletic Board Scholars for the highest grade point average in each sport. In addition, student-athletes may be nominated for Academic All-America honors through the sports information office.

The Fetzer Student Athlete Academic Center

Opened in the spring of 1997, the Fetzer Student Athlete Academic Center is the newest aid to Wisconsin student-athletes in achieving their academic goals.

The 15,000 square-foot, state-of-the-art facility serves the needs of all men and women student-athletes. The Center features an open area with carrels that can accommodate up to 30 students. There are 11 study rooms of different shapes and

sizes including a 55-seat auditorium. A computer room houses 22 PC's while the entire Center is wired with voice/data jacks and power ports.

Student-athletes can drop in before practice or between classes to study or meet with the advisors and grant-in-aid staff whose offices are also located in the center.



The Fetzer Student Athlete Academic Services center, a state-of-the-art facility located in the lower level of the McClain Center, opened in 1997. The \$2.1 million center is one of the best of its kind in the nation and includes 11 study rooms, a computer room, and a 55-seat auditorium.

Scholarships

UW-Madison is proud to offer to its prospective student-athletes one of the most comprehensive athletic scholarship programs in the nation. As a Division I member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), scholarships are awarded to athletes on a one-year renewable basis if scholastic and athletic commitment are maintained.

Scholarships are available in all varsity sports with the exception of men's rowing, which does not grant scholarships. Full scholarships include the cost of room and board in addition to tuition and fees. The selection of scholarship recipients is based on athletic ability and projected academic success at Wisconsin.

Sports Medicine

The goal of the sports medicine staff is to provide all University of Wisconsin student-athletes with high quality health care. Wisconsin's Sports Medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

The sports medicine staff consists of team physicians, dentists, athletic trainers, and other medical and allied health professionals. The day-to-day care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Wisconsin athletes is supervised by a staff of eight fulltime and three graduate assistant N.A.T.A.-certified athletic trainers. Under the direction of head athletic trainer Dennis Helwig, the Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Staff members Chuck Hart, Jan Helwig, Mike Johnson, Barb Pearson, Henry Perez-Guerra, Heidi Stettler, and Andy Winterstein utilize functional measures, provide dietary analysis, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve flexibility.

The Sports Medicine facility in the McClain Center features an extensive collection of therapeutic and rehabilitation equipment including a 50-foot, two-lane-rehabilitation pool, and an on-site x-ray facility. Considered one of the nation's finest, the McClain Sports Medicine Center offers an environment conducive to expedient care, and a healthy return to competition.

Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affili-

ated with the world-renowned UW Hospitals and Clinics. Medical director **Dr. Ben Graf** is responsible for all services provided to our student-athletes.
Orthopedic care is directed by team physician **Dr. John Orwin** while general medical care is directed by the head of primary care, **Dr. Greg Landry**.

In addition to the headquarters in the McClain Athletic Facility, auxiliary athletic training rooms are located in the Stadium, Natatorium, UW Field House and Kohl Center. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus.

Sports Information

Directing the communications for the 23 sports in the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics is the responsibility of the University of Wisconsin Sports Information Offices.

These offices utilize a variety of communications systems including the world wide web to provide student-athletes the opportunity to be recognized for their athletic endeavors.

The offices provide and maintain many resources such as records, fact sheets, photographic files, statistics, media guides and event programs in meeting the information requests of the media, coaches, administrators, opponents and the general public.

The director's of women's and men's sports information Tamara J. Flarup and Steve Malchow, and their respective offices, maintain close contact with local, regional and national media as well as the athlete's hometown media in providing information. These offices prepare news releases, design sports brochures and media guides, and provide post-event results for print and electronic media, and the department's web pages. Besides the directors, members of the women's staff include associate director Diane K. Nordstrom and assistant Paul Capobianco, and several students. The men's staff includes associate director Justin Doherty, assistant director Julie Kluge, and interns Britt Kinder and Brian Lucas, as well as a number of student assistants.



The McClain Athletic Facility offers indoor practice facilities for football, soccer and track and field. A 90-yard newly resurfaced artificial turf practice area is contained in the 76,380-square foot main floor. The lower level houses the Fetzer Student Academic Center, the headquarters of the Badgers Sports Medicine staff, a fully-equipped weight room and locker rooms for football, men's and women's track, softball, and men's and women's soccer.

The Wisconsin Field House, which seats 10,600, is the practice and competitive facility for the Badger volleyball team as well as the competitive facility for the wrestling squad. It features four locker rooms, and an athletic training area.



The Wisconsin tennis teams have the competitive advantage of playing year-round at one of the best college facilities in the United States—the Nielsen Tennis Stadium. The stadium features 18 tennis courts (12 indoor and six outdoor), five squash courts, one squash doubles court, and seats 1,500 spectators.



The swimming and diving teams have two pools for practice and competition—the Natatorium and Southeast Recreational Facility. The "Nat" contains an eight-lane, 25-yard pool equipped with an automatic Colorado Timing System and digital readout score board. The 50' x 40' diving well is fitted with three one-meter and two three-meter Dura (Maxi) Flex boards. The SERF (pictured above) features an indoor long course pool with movable bulkheads that more than double the program's training space.



Ground was broken on the Goodman Softball Complex on the west end of the UW campus in June of 1998. The facility, which will open during the spring of 1999, will have an NCAA-regulation, natural grass field with a centerfield distance of 225 feet, and left and right field foul line distances of 200 feet. The facility will include dugouts, locker areas, players' lounge, grandstand seating for 1,600 and media facilities.

Wisconsin Traditions

Badger Nickname

The sports program's nickname "Badgers," was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin. The territory was dubbed the "Badger State," not because of animals in the region, but rather by an association with lead miners in the 1820's. Prospectors came to the state looking for minerals. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

Bucky Badger


Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently know as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

The original badger mascot was too vicious to control. On more than one occasion, the live badger escaped handlers before a sideline hero recaptured the animal. It was decided in the interest of fan and player safety that Wisconsin's mascot would be retired to the Madison zoo.

In 1949, a student in the university's art department, Connie Conrad, was commissioned to mold a paper-mache badger head. Gymnast and cheerleader, Bill Sagal of Plymouth, Wis., was directed by homecoming chair Bill Sachse, to wear the outfit at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name. The rally committee opted for its own name: Buckingham U. Badger. The name is said by some to have originated in a line from

"On, Wisconsin" that exhorts the UW to "buck right through that line."

On Wisconsin

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy of Chicago, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. The song was an instant hit at the Wisconsin campus and soon spread throughout the world, being very popular with military bands. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

Varsity

The traditional arm waving that comes at the end of the song "varsity" was the 1934 brainchild of then-UW band leader Ray Dvorak. He had originally gotten the idea from University of Pennsylvania students who waved their caps after a losing game. Dvorak later instructed UW students to wave as a salute to UW President Glenn Frank.

Fifth Quarter

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as they play traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song. Originally,


the post-game concert was designed to give fans something to listen to on their way out of the stadium, but it developed into a post-game party as the band built in audience participation.

Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. Copyrighted by Sandlee Publishing Corporation in 1970, the song has become legendary at the University because of its polka-like rhythm. Band director Michael Leckrone said the song's popularity got started at a 1975 hockey game. "The crowd wanted to hear a polka," he said. "I didn't have any polkas. Just by accident, we had this beer commercial in the tunes we play. I told the band if we substituted the word 'Wisconsin' for 'Budweiser' it would work."

Leckrone said the song became a football tradition after a 1978 come-frombehind victory over Oregon. "Wisconsin was behind by three touchdowns, and the crowd was really dead. I played the song to get everyone pepped up. About 20 seconds after that, Wisconsin scored a touchdown. I played it again, and Wisconsin scored another touchdown. From then on, the band could never play enough 'Bud.'"
