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REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS

Madison, Wisconsin

Saturday, December 14, 1946, 9 A.M.

President Sensenbrenner presiding

PRESENT: Regents Callahan, Campbell, Cleary, Grady, Hodgkins, Holmes, Jones, Kleczka, Sensenbrenner, Werner.

Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Jones, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the postponed regular meeting of the Board held on November 23, 1946, be amended to include the following reasons given by Regent Grady for his negative vote on the motions adopted relating to the rescinding of the action taken at the July 25, 1945, meeting of the Board with reference to the development of the faculty housing project by the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation and the motion relating to the revised plan for the faculty housing project by the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation:

- (1) Reconsideration of the original proposal should have been taken at the next meeting following its adoption;
- (2) The original proposal was approved by the Board at a meeting subsequent to July 25 and constituted a contract;
- (3) The form of the substitute resolution is objected to because the University does not have control of the amount of rentals to be charged and does not have control with respect to the selection of tenants.

Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Callahan, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the postponed regular meeting of the Board, as amended, be approved.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE PRESIDENT

- Faculty Actions -

- 1. That the following actions by the Faculty be approved:
 - (1) Recommendation of the Faculty of the College of Letters and Science as follows:

That the language requirements for the majors in Medical Technology be changed to coincide with those for Majors in Medical Science as approved November 6, 1944, and which read as follows:

A reading knowledge of French or German. This requirement may be satisfied by the completion of the fourth semester of French or German at the University of Wisconsin or at an accredited college, with a grade of at least C, or by passing a reading knowledge or the attainment examination in either language to be given by the appropriate department at the University of Wisconsin.

Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Werner, recommendation No. 1 (1) listed under Faculty Actions was adopted.

- (2) Recommendations concerning transfer of credits from the Milwaukee Extension Center:
 - a. By the Faculty of the College of Letters and Science:

That because of the housing difficulties in Madison, certain students be permitted to do junior work at the Milwaukee Extension Center under the following regulation:

That the Dean be authorized to make such exceptions, after consultation with the resident department concerned, in cases where work of a sufficient degree of advancement is available and under regulations prescribed by the Executive Committee.

It is understood that under this regulation the Dean could permit students to transfer from the Milwaukee Center more than one-half of the number of credits required for graduation.

b. By the Faculty of the College of Engineering:

That, because of the critical housing situation existing in Madison, the Dean be authorized, as a temporary emergency measure, to make exceptions, after consultation with the resident department for each course concerned, to the rule "The maximum credit obtainable by work in absentia under the various systems of University Extension shall not exceed one-half of the unit-hours required for graduation", in cases where work of a sufficient degree of advancement is available and under regulations prescribed by the Executive Committee of the College of Engineering; and that this exception to said rule shall terminate at the end of the spring term in 1950 unless extended by faculty action.

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Cleary, recommendation No. 1 (2) listed under Faculty Actions was adopted.

- Appointments -

1. That Norman Sonju be appointed crew coach, intercollegiate athletics, beginning December 1, 1946; salary at the rate of \$5000, ten months' basis; charge to 5-C, Athletic Council, in place of Allan Walz, resigned.

Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Kleczka, recommendation No. 1 listed under Appointments was adopted.

2. That Henry L. Smith be appointed associate professor of journalism, beginning with the second semester of 1946-47; salary \$2250 for the semester (\$4500 per academic year); charge to Letters and Science faculty balances.

Upon motion of Regent Callahan, seconded by Regent Jones, recommendation No. 2 listed under Appointments was adopted.

- Leaves of Absence -

1. That Laurence C. Burke, associate librarian (rank of associate professor), be granted leave of absence, with pay, for the period January 1, 1947 to June 30, 1947.

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Cleary, recommendation No. 1 listed under Leaves of Absence was adopted.

- Miscellaneous -

1. That approval be given for the battle flag of the ship WISCONSIN, which was presented to the University by the Navy Department on October 24, 1946, to be placed in the custody of the State Historical Society.

Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Callahan, recommendation No. 1 listed under Miscellaneous was adopted.

Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Holmes, recommendation No. 1 listed under Degrees was adopted.

- Gifts and Grants -

- 1. That the following gifts and grants be accepted; and that the Director of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the agreements:
 - (a) \$7500.00 The Fruit/Growers Cooperative, Martin Orchard Co., and Reynolds Brothers, Inc., Sturgeon Bay, Wisconsin, for the establishment of an industrial fellow ship in the department of plant pathology, for a study of methods of controlling virus diseases of cherries, especially cherry yellows, for the period January 1, 1947 to December 31, 1949.
 - (b) 3000.00 Merck & Co., Inc., Rahway, New Jersey, for the renewal of an industrial fellowship in the departments of biochemistry, dairy husbandry, and veterinary science, for a study of the role of certain vitamins and sulfa drugs in the early nutrition of the calf; for a twelve months' period, beginning November 15, 1946.

Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That resignations numbered 1 to 21, inclusive, listed under Actions by the President, be approved.

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Cleary, it was VOTED, That appointments numbered 1 to 205, inclusive, listed under Actions by the President, be approved.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Cleary, it was VOTED, That salary and service adjustments numbered 1 to 18, inclusive, listed under Actions by the President, be approved.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That leaves of absence numbered 1, listed under Actions by the President, be approved.

The above actions by the President taken since the November 23, 1946, meeting of the Board and approved by the Regents in the foregoing resolutions are made a part of the records of this meeting.

President Fred reported that the faculty had elected the following feculty representatives to the Regent-Faculty Conference Committee:

The Chairman of the University Committee is <u>ex officio</u> a member of the Regent-Faculty Conference Committee.

The Regent members of the Regent-Faculty Conference Committee are Regents Kleczka, Callahan and Jones.

Upon motion of Regent Holmes, seconded by Regent Campbell, it was VOTED, That the election of the above faculty representatives to the Regent-Faculty Conference Committee be approved.

President Fred presented the recommendation of Dean Baldwin and F. B. Trenk, Extension Forester, relating to the proposal received from Mr. Walter B. Chilsen of Merrill, Wisconsin, to make a tract of woodland in Lincoln County available for demonstration purposes. Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Callahan it was

VOTED, That the offer of Mr. Walter B. Chilsen of Merrill, Wisconsin, to lease to the University, without cost, a tract of forty acres in Lincoln County described as the Southwest Quarter (SW1) of the Northwest Quarter (NW1), Section 30, Town 32 North, Range 8 East, for use in the forestry extension program, be accepted.

President Fred made a statement as to the areas of the state served by the various agricultural branch experiment stations and distributed to the Regents maps indicating the areas served by each branch station.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE DIRECTOR OF BUSINESS AND FINANCE

I. Contracts, Leases and Agreements

1. That the agreement with Gerald Grosse for the delivery of dairy products for the Department of Dairy Industry for the period July 1, 1946, to June 30, 1947, be cancelled as of October 31, 1946; that a revised agreement for the period November 1, 1946 to June 30, 1947, be approved (the revised agreement to provide for the addition of the Temporary Cafeteria to the list of University organizations to which deliveries are to be made, and for the change to \$540 per month for the compensation for deliveries to University organizations and to shipping points); and that the Director of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the revised agreement.

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Werner, recommendation No. 1 listed under the Recommendations of the Director of Business and Finance (I. Contracts, Leases and Agreements) was adopted.

II. Budget Items

1. That the following schedule of costs be approved for the installation of the Sterling Hall elevator:

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Hodgkins, recommendation No. 1 listed under the recommendations of the Director of Business and Finance (II. Budget Items) was adopted.

III. Miscellaneous

- 1. That the construction of a Central Garage for the University by the Wisconsin University Building Corporation on the ten vacant lots known as the McNees property between College Court and Fahrenbrook Court at an estimated cost of \$25,000 be approved. (Confirming verbal approval of the Finance Committee) Adopted.
- 2. That the Wisconsin University Building Corporation be authorized to refinance the mortgage in the amount of \$7000 on the McNees property for the purpose of borrowing not to exceed an additional \$25,000 to cover the cost of the construction of the University Central Garage on that property; and that the Central Garage be leased from the Wisconsin University Building Corporation by the University at annual rentals sufficient to pay the interest on the mortgage, to retire the portion of the funds borrowed for the construction of the garage over a period of ten years, and to retire the portion of the mortgage covering the purchase of the

property over a period of thirty years. (Estimated annual cost for ten years \$3288; after ten years \$357)

Adopted.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Kleczka, recommendations 1 and 2 listed under the recommendations of the Director of Business and Finance (III. Miscellaneous) were adopted.

3. That the per credit fee (\$8 per credit for Wisconsin residents and \$24 per credit for mon-residents), for students registering on the per credit basis in the Graduate School, which was approved by the Board of Regents on November 23, 1946, be effective beginning with the 1947 Summer Semester.

Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Werner, recommendation No. 3 listed under the recommendations of the Director of Business and Finance (III. Miscellaneous) was adopted.

The Director of Business and Finance presented a recommendation from the Lakes and Streams Committee for the transfer of buildings from the Trout Lake Biological Station to the Woodruff State Hatchery area. Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Jones, it was

VOTED, That the Regents of the University of Wisconsin agree to the relocation of four buildings (the chemistry building, the workshop, the plankton laboratory and the fish laboratory) from the Trout Lake Biological Station to the Woodruff State Hatchery area, by the staff of the Wisconsin Conservation Commission, to be used to house field workers connected with the cooperative research projects between the Wisconsin Conservation Commission and the University of Wisconsin and, when not so used, to be used by the Biological Division of the Fisheries Department of the Wisconsin Conservation Commission for housing other workers, with the understanding that the Wisconsin Conservation Commission will pay the cost of moving, equipping and maintaining said buildings and will hold title to them; and that Professor A. D. Hasler be designated to arrange for the removal of University property from said buildings and arrange storage for such property.

The Director of Business and Finance reported that the row houses at Badger Village were transferred to the University as of December 1, 1946, by the Federal Public Housing Authority and that the University now has control and management of the property transferred.

The Director of Business and Finance reported that the following bids had been received for the electrical work at Badger Villager

Upon recommendation of the State Chief Engineer and the Director of Buciness and Finance, and upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Hodgking it was

VOTED, That the contract for the electrical work at Badger Village, covered by Bid No. 1, be awarded to Havey Electric Company, Madison, Wisconsin, on the basis of their bid of \$32,233.00 and that the Director of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the contract; charge to 20.41(1)F.

Upon recommendation of the State Chief Engineer and the Director of Business and Finance, and upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Cleary, it was

VOTED, That the contract for electrical work at Badger Village, covered by Bid No. 2, for disconnecting and moving transformers, be awarded to Havey Electric Company, Madison, Wisconsin, on the basis of their bid of \$210.00 and that the Director of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the contract; charge to 20.41(1)F.

At the request of the Director of Business and Finance, Mr. Leroy Luberg submitted a report as to the locations selected for the temporary classroom laboratory buildings to be erected on the campus by the Federal Works Administration.

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Werner, it was VOTED, That the following resolution adopted by the Wisconsin Association of Secondary School Principals at a meeting in Milwaukee on Friday, November 8, 1946, be approved:

WHEREAS the present time finds our educational system faced with an unusual shortage of teachers in all fields of knowledge and on all levels in the system,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT a special effort be made by all educators and those interested in education in this state to bring to the attention of all seniors in our secondary schools the advantages and satisfactions of serving in the profession and,

BE IT FURTHER RESCLVED THAT all teacher training institutions be urged to give matriculation preference to those persons who desire to enter the teaching profession and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT copies of this resolution be sent to the following:

- 1. All teacher training institutions in the state
- 2. The State Congress of Parents and Teachers
- 3. The Board of Regents for the University of Wisconsin and the State Teachers College.

The Secretary read a letter addressed to the Regents from Emeritus Professor H. T. Avey expressing appreciation of his appointment by the Regents as emeritus professor of mechanical engineering.

The Secretary reported that the Regents were invited to lunch at Truax Field and to inspect University facilities there following the adjournment of the meeting.

Regent Werner presented the report of the Finance Committee. President Sensenbrenner reported that the Regents and the trustees of the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation had given consideration to, and had revised and agreed upon, the leases agreement and mortgage required to implement the plan for the faculty housing project to be developed by the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation according to the resolution adopted by the Regents at the meeting of the Regents held on November 23, 1946. Regent Werner read a resolution relating to the approval by the Regents of the various documents necessary for the faculty housing project undertaking. Upon motion of Regent Hodgkins, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the first paragraph of the resolution as read be amended as

follows:

"WHEREAS, the housing of the faculty, administrative staff and student body of the University of Wisconsin with provisions which will give preference to veterans is now necessary for the educational purposes of said University,"

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the resolution, amended to read as follows, be adopted:

WHEREAS, the housing of the faculty, administrative staff and student body of the University of Wisconsin with provisions which will give preference to veterans is now necessary for the educational purposes of said University, and

WHEREAS, suitable housing, either in quantity or quality, under private management is not available in the City of Madison or its environs and is not in prospect, and

WHEREAS, under such circumstances it is incumbent upon the University of Wisconsin to provide such housing upon its own premises and upon its own initiative, and

WHEREAS, in consultation with said University, Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation has prepared plans of buildings which will provide a part of the said required housing, and, through a subsidiary corporation is ready, willing and able to erect and construct said buildings on University lands on the Eagle Heights Farm, and to provide utilities therefor and additional lands for access from said site to the Village of Shorewood Hills and to advance the funds necessary to construct and equip said buildings, landscape said site and procure said additional land and utilities upon the security of said land and buildings,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

- l. That the said preliminary plans are hereby approved and the buildings and improvements shown thereon, together with the purposes for which they are planned and suited, are necessary for the educational purposes of the University.
- 2. That a lease of that portion of the Eagle Heights Farm which has been designated for such purpose including necessary lands or interests therein for right of way together with a lease of additional property acquired by others and given to the University for said purpose is hereby

authorized and approved in form attached hereto, on which leased property such buildings and improvements may be erected, and the President and Secretary of this Board are directed to execute such lease. The exact legal description of such lands is to be attached hereto by the Secretary when such description is available.

- 3. That the mortgage, in form attached hereto as Exhibit B, is hereby approved.
- 4. That after said buildings and improvements are ready for occupancy, a lease of said buildings, improvements, acquisitions and equipment by the corporation erecting the same to the University, in form attached here to is approved, authorized and at or before the time the same are ready for occupancy the President and Secretary of this Board are directed to execute said lease.
- 5. That to provide management of said completed properties, to avoid defaults which will or may bring about foreclosure, and other relief afforded to the mortgagee by the mortgage, a contract of management of said properties by the subsidiary corporation as agent of this Board in form attached hereto is approved and upon execution by the other parties thereto, to wit the subsidiary corporation and the mortgagor, the President and Secretary of this Board are directed to execute the same.
- 6. That the contract for utilities, in form attached hereto, between said subsidiary corporation and the Village of Shorewood Hills is hereby approved and ratified and the proper officers of this Board are directed to notify the said Village thereof.

(The papers referred to in this resolution as being attached hereto are on file in the office of the Secretary of the Regents.)

A called vote was taken, all Regents present and voting "Aye" with the exception of Regent Grady who voted "No". In explanation of his negative vote, Regent Grady presented the following summary of his objections to be included in the minutes:

"First, he objected to allowing the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation to repudiate the contract entered into on July 25, 1946. First, because it was deliberately entered into, consented to by Mr. Brittingham and Mr. Hanks, authorized representatives and trustees of the Foundation; Second, that no objection was made thereto on behalf of the Foundation for a period of more than three months; Third, that the proposed contract is not as advantageous to the University as the contract of July 25, 1946, first, because it involves a required increase of rentals of Thirty Thousand Dollars per year, and second, that it is against public policy and all precedent in this University to lease lands to a private corporation and yielding to it the right and power to fix rentals, and select the tenants.

Second, the further objection was that it established a dangerous and ill-advised precedent that might offer an opportunity for future encroachment."

Upon recommendation of the Finance Committee, and upon motion of Regent

Werner, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was

VOTED, That the option which expires January 21, 1947, for the purchase of the Thordarson Library be exercised; that the allotment of the following funds to cover the purchase of the library and the payment of the broker's commission be approved:

that the chattel mortgage held by the University on the Thordarson Library be satisfied; and that the President and the Secretary be authorized to sign the documents required to complete the purchase of the Thomdarson Library.

A called vote was taken, all Regents present and voting "Aye" except Regent Grady who voted "No". In explanation of his negative vote, Regent Grady presented the following summary of his objections to be included in the minutes:

"Mr. Grady objected to the purchase of this collection on the grounds, first, that it is not such an addition or enlargement of the library as would be of the greatest value to the students and the faculty in that the enormous cost results largely from the fact that it embraces some rare, early, and original editions, rather than the type of library that would be of greatest use to faculty and student body at this time.

Secondly, that its value is largely in the rarity of the collection rather than the usefulness to the University, its faculty and its student body, and that the enormous cost thereof is due or to great extent increased and enhanced by reason of the unusual and expensive bindings which are not of the type that the University would provide if it were enlarging or increasing its library.

Third, that in view of the pressing financial needs of the University, for buildings including housing, and for equipment, he objected to the expenditure of so vast a sum for this collection under all the circumstances, and that the appropriation of Three Hundred Thousand Dollars of money available as a free fund, could be devoted to other pressing needs. That as it was not in the best interest of the University, he could not see his way clear to vote for the purchase of this collection involving a cost of between Twenty-five and Thirty Dollars per volume, and therefore cast his vote in opposition to the purchase."

Upon recommendation of the Finance Committee, and upon motion of

Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was

VOTED, That the Director of Business and Finance be authorized to request the Emergency Board for an appropriation of 327,770 for the hospital to cover civil service salary increases approved by the special session of the Legislature in 1946.

Upon recommendation of the Finance Committee, and upon motion of Regent

Werner, seconded by Regent Grady, it was

VOTED, That the Director of Business and Finance be authorized to arrange for the use of the Congregational Church auditorium for the second semester of the 1946-47 academic year for a payment of \$1200 to cover operating expenses.

(Authority was previously granted for the use of the auditorium for the first semester upon payment of \$1000 to cover operating expenses.)

Upon recommendation of the Finance Committee, and upon motion of Regent

Werner, seconded by Regent Hodgkins, it was
