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REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS

Madison, Wisconsin

Saturday, November 6, 1943, 9 A.M.

President Hodgkins presiding

FRESENT: Regents Callahan, Campbell, Cleary, Jones, Grady, Hodgkins, Kleczka, Sensenbrenner, Werner.

ABSENT: Regent Holmes.

Regent Holmes was unable to attend the meeting because of a special hearing on the 5th of November.

Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Grady, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board held on October 16, 1943, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE PRESIDENT

- Administration and General -

- 1. That C. A. Smith be appointed emeritus secretary of the faculty, to take effect at the beginning of the academic year 1943-44.

 Adopted.
 - 2. That the following actions of the Faculty be approved:
 - (1) Recommendation of the Faculty of the College of Letters and Science that the foreign language requirement for the Bachelor of Music degree be changed to permit Spanish to be used as an option in addition to French, German or Italian.
 - (2) Recommendation of the Faculty of the Lew School. (WITHDRAWN).

- (3) Recommendations of the Special Committee on Emergency Educational Policy, including the 1944-45 University Calendar. (Exhibit A attached)
- That arrangements be completed for the early publication of a revised edition of the Faculty rules and Regent laws and by CONTRACTOR ENGINEERS

Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Cleary, Nos. 1 to 8 in Document 688, Exhibit A, including Nos. 1, 2 and 3, as acted upon above, were

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Kleczka, recommendation No. 1 and Nos. 1 and 4 under recommendation No. 2 under Administration and General were adopted.

The above actions mean that recommendations 1 and 2 under Administration and General were fully approved except as to No. 2 under recommendation No. 2, which was withdrawn.

- Letters and Science -

That Wilfred J. Brogden, assistant professor of psychology, be promoted to associate professor of psychology, beginning January 1, 1944, and that his salary be increased from \$3,000 to \$3,250, academic year rate; to be charged against balances in Letters and Science budget. Adopted.

Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Werner, recommendation No. 1 under Letters and Science was adopted.

- Agriculture -

1. That Walter W. Wilcox be appointed professor of agricultural economics at the beginning of the second semester of 1943-44, salary at the rate of \$4,500 per annum, charge to vice Johnson, \$2,000 to fund 1 EI, and \$250 to fund 15 AR, p. 82. agr. econ.

Upon motion of Regent Sensenbrenner, seconded by Regent Campbell, recommendation No. 1 under Agriculture was referred to the Executive Committee with power to act.

2. That Perry W. Wilson, associate professor of agricultural bacteriology, be granted leave of absence, without pay, from November 15, 1943 to the close of the first semester of 1943-44. Adopted.

Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Callahan, recommendation No. 2 under Agriculture was adopted.

Engineering -

- 1. That Willard S. Cottingham, associate professor of civil engineering, be granted leave of absence for the winter term, November 1, 1943 to February 29, 1944, without pay, p. 152. Adopted.
- That the request of Edward Bennett, professor of electrical engineering, for retirement under the University retirement rule be accepted; and that he be granted the emeritus status, beginning November 1, 1943, p. 153. Adopted.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Cleary, recommendation No. 1 under Summer Session was adopted.

- Degrees -

- 1. That upon the certification of the Registrar degrees be granted as shown in Exhibit B on file.

- 2. That the degree of Doctor of Medicine be voted as of November 20 1943 subject to the certification of the Registrar.

 Adopted.

Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Cleary, recommendations 1 and 2 under Degrees were adopted.

- Comptroller -

1. That the Comptroller be authorized to sign supplementary agreements to the original Meteorology "B" and Meteorology "C" contracts, making minor revisions

in terminology and establishing termination dates as of the end of the respective programs covered by the original contracts.

Adopted.

Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Campbell, recommendation No. 1 under Comptroller was adopted.

2. That \$2,400 be transferred from Regents Unassigned 1-D to General Business Administration - Accountant's Office, for the purchase of equipment needed to prepare payrolls, tax reports, etc.

Adopted.

Upon motion of Regent Sensenbrenner, seconded by Regent Werner, recommendation No. 2 under Comptroller was adopted.

- Gifts and Grants -

1. That the following gifts and grants be approved:

(1) \$1,200.00 - Universal Oil Products Company, Chicago, Illinois, for the re-establishment of a research fellowship in chemical engineering for one year, and that the Comptroller be authorized to sign the agreement.

Tayer (2) \$10,000.00 - Oscar Mayor & Company, Madison, Wisconsin, for research to be conducted in the College of Agriculture.

Fearl for file (3) \$500.00 - George W. Mead, Wisconsin Rapids, Wisconsin, for the University of Wisconsin School of Music.

\$50.00 - From an anonymous donor to be added to the scholarship fund of the Law School. | Rooted.

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Campbell, recommendation No. 1 (1) to (4) under Gifts and Grants was adopted.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Cleary, it was VOTED, That the actions of the President taken since the October 16, 1943 meeting of the Board be approved and made a part of the records of this meeting.

Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Callahan, it was VOTED, That authority be granted for the sale of approximately sixty-

eight course syllabi to the U.S. Armed Forces Institute.

(It is understood that the amount received from the sale of the syllabi will pay all costs.)

President Dykstra brought up the report of the President of the Regents and the President of the University regarding a Centennial Committee. Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Cleary, it was

VOTED, That the President of the Regents and the President of the University appoint a committee of seven. The personnel of the committee will consist of the President of the Board of Regents as honorary chairman, the active chairman to be someone on the campus, the President of the University to be ex officio a member of the committee, and the committee of seven to include a representative of Alumni. The responsibility of the Working Committee is to be as follows:

- 1. To initiate plans and organize machinery for celebrating the Centennial, including setting of date.
- 2. To suggest necessary budget.

- 3. To set in motion work upon a history of the University.
 - 4. To discuss proposal of Alumni to create a Centennial Gift Fund.
 - 5. To create sub-committees for specific tasks such as "symposia," "celebration program," "publication," etc.
- 6. To discuss the creation of an honorary committee of which the Governor might be chairman.
- 7. In general, to do those necessary things involved in the undertaking.

The President made further report on the anonymous gift in excess of \$200,000, which was approved at the last meeting of the Board, stating that he had expressed the appreciation of the Regents, as requested, and read a letter from the donors.

The President presented a communication and resolution from the Milwaukee Turners regarding athletics and physical training and reported that he had replied to the Milwaukee Turners that provisions had been made for the program suggested. The communication was placed on file.

The matter of the postwar building program was discussed. It was explained that the Freehoff Committee would meet in the Capitol on November 16, that

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a public hearing with reference to the raising of funds would be held on November 17, and that Senator Freehoff requested that some of the Regents attend the latter meeting. Upon motion of Regent Campbell, seconded by Regent Werner, it was VOTED, That President Dykstra be requested to keep in touch with the Freehoff Committee and advise the Constructional Development Committee of any items affecting the University program.

Provision for additional library facilities was discussed at considerable length. Regent Jones suggested that a study be made to determine what is the best program to be devised to adequately meet the library requirements of the University and to estimate the cost of doing it, that arrangements be made for a definite plan and an alternate, and that an all-day meeting of the Building Committee be held to consider the matter.

Upon recommendation of President Dykstra, and upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Werner, it was VOTED, That the following additional gift be accepted:

500.00 - Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation, Madison, Wisconsin, for the establishment of an industrial fellowship in the Department of Economic Entomology for a study of the insecticidal value of sabadilla, for the period November 1, 1943 to June 30, 1944, and that the Comptroller be authorized to sign the agreement.

Comptroller Peterson presented a request from the Signal Section of the Fairfield Air Service Command to establish a school for women radio repairmen (civilians) at the Milwaukee Center, the school to start December 4, 1943. Upon motion of Regent Sensenbrenner, seconded by Regent Werner, it was

VOTED. That this matter be left to the judgment of the Milwaukee members of the Board together with Comptroller Peterson and Dean Holt.

The Secretary reported that the Varsity Apartments at 415-417 North Park Street, which were offered to the Regents for a consideration of \$35,000 and referred to the Constructional Development Committee, had been sold to a private party.

The Secretary also reported that the transcripts of the public hearing on the School of Commerce matter had not been received but would probably go out in the mail on Monday, November 8, 1943.

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Regent Callahan presented the following report of the joint meeting of the Executive and Educational Committees of the Regents on the matters referred to these committees at the October 16, 1943 meeting of the Board:

"Nos. 2, 3 and 4 of the memorandum presented by Superintendent Alexander, (/ and Librarian Doane were discussed and no action taken.

The proposed promotions of L. C. Burke and Ethel M. Lynaugh of the University Library with increases in salary were discussed. Upon motion of Regent Grady. it was

VOTED, That the promotions recommended be approved, to become effective when Librarian Doane leaves for Army Service.

Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED to recommend to the Board that the recommendation for increases in salary of L. C. Burke and Ethel M. Lynaugh during the absence of Librarian Doane be disapproved."

Upon motion of Regent Sensenbrenner, seconded by Regent Campbell, adopted.

Regent Werner, Chairman of the Personnel Committee, made verbal report on the matter of securing a successor to Dean Holt as Dean of the University Extension Division.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Grady, the meeting adjourned at 11:50 A.M.

EXHIBIT A

(Over)

- 1. That a Summer Semester be offered in 1944 extending over a period of $15\frac{1}{2}$ weeks.
- 2. That an eight-week Summer Session be offered in lieu of the sixand eight-week sessions.
- 3. Adoption of the calendar for the year 1944-45, including (see attached copy)

(a) Summer Semester

- (b) Eight-week Summer Session
- (c) First and Second Semesters.
- 4. That an undergraduate student in the eight-week session may carry not less than six credits nor more than 8 credits without special permission of the dean of his college.
- 5. Since it is clear that registration will not justify as wide an offering of upper group subjects in the summer as in the winter, departments are advised to select courses that will allow seniors to fulfill their departmental major requirements, and to arrange for substitutions of one course for another in these requirements when necessary.
- 6. That two forms of assignments to summer teaching be made, namely:

(a) Salary guaranteed

(b) Salary subject to enrollment. In exceptional cases, salaries subject to the amount and kind of teaching.

It is suggested that the adjustment of salaries be made jointly by the individual staff member, the departmental chairman, dean of the college involved, and the director of the summer session on the basis of total departmental program and enrollment rather than on the basis of individual enrollment.

- 7. That payment for teaching on a fee basis be abolished save in individual cases subject to arrangement by the individual staff member, departmental chairman, dean of the college involved and the director of the summer session.
- 8. That payment for post-session teaching be abolished.
