# DOCUMENT 244 - 1923-24

In 1920 the faculty approved a combined five-year course leading to a certificate of graduate nurse from the School of Nursing and a B.S. degree from the College of Letters and Science. It appeared best, however, to delay the organization of this course until the completion of the Wisconsin General Hospital. The hospital will soon be completed and it now is advisable to make a preliminary announcement of the courses for nurses which will be established. In announcing the combined five-year course in Letters and Science and nursing the committee in charge believe that some modification in detail, though not in substance, be made of the course previously approved by the faculty. The following combined course is now recommended:

# FIVE-YEAR NURSING COURSE

This course leads to the degree B.S. (Hygiene).
The following specific requirements must be satisfactorily met:

- a. English. Ten credits as follows: Six credits in composition (3 credits per semester for two semesters to be taken in the first year of residence); four credits in literature, to be taken normally in the sophomore year. Students securing a grade of A in the first semester of composition may, if they so desire, omit the second semester of it.
- b. Foreign Language. Two years of either French of German in college, if students do not meet the foreign language requirements for the B. A. degree.
- c. Chemistry I, 10 credits; history, 6 credits in a continuous year's course, or mathematics, 8 credits.
  - d. Physiology, pathology and hygiene, 6 credits.
- e. Economics and psychology, 16 credits; or science in addition to Chemistry I, 16 credits.

  If economics and psychology be chosen, they must include Economics 1a, 46, and 141 and Psychology I.

  If science be chosen, it must include biology
  10 credits and organic chemistry 4 dredits.
- f. Electives. Electives must be taken sufficient to bring the total amount of work in the College of Letters and Science, including major study, and thesis, up to 94 credits and 94 grade points. This does not include the 2 credits per semester in physical education required of all freshman and sophomore students.
- every candidate should be well started in his major study, which must be chosen from the majors offered in the College of Letters and Science, including the majors in medical science. This major must include a thesis to be prepared during the final years of the combined course.
- h. Twenty-seven months of residential professional training in nursing. (Details to be submitted for approval later).

This combined course leads to the degree B.S. Home Economics and to the certificate R. N. Requirements are as follows:

# THREE-YEAR COURSE FOR NURSES LEADING TO A CERTIFICATE OF GRADUATE NURSE

# Admission Requirements

For matriculation in the School of Nursing a student must furnish evidence that she has satisfied the requirements for admission to the College of Letters and Science. Fifteen high school units are required. Not more than four are accepted in any one subject. The following units are required of all:

English 2 (3 if 2 units in a foreign language are not offered);

Algebra, 1 unit; Geometry, 1 unit.
Two units must be presented from one of the following:
Foreign Language, Science or History.

Students are admitted at the beginning of each semester of the college year.

# Certificate of Graduate Nurse

Upon the successful completion of at least one semester of academic college work including the special subjects outlined below and of 32 months of professional training in residence in the school of nursing, a Certificate of Graduate Nurse will be granted.

# PRE-HOSPITAL COURSE

Candidates for the certificate of Graduate Nurse who have had no college work or whose college work has not included work in chemistry and physiology are required to take the following special pre-hospital academic course before being admitted to residence in the school for hospital training. This course is offered each semester.
