THEATER'S 1980-81 SEASON OFFERS MORE THAN 50 ATTRACTIONS

Itzhak Perlman, the Guarneri String Quartet, Emmylou Harris, Barry Tuckwell, the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center, "A Chorus Line," Sonny Rollins, Vincent Price, "Don Giovanni," Murray Louis, "Macbeth," the Guthrie Theater, Janos Starker, the Dance Theatre of Harlem and the Los Angeles Chamber Orchestra with Carlo Maria Giulini are among the attractions which promise to make the 1980-81 season a lively and memorable experience for Union Theater patrons.

The Theater's 42nd season will feature more than 50 events in seven different series and a number of special non-series events. A detailed schedule of all of the Theater programs is included in a season brochure which will be mailed to all Union members the last week in August.

Orders are now being accepted at the Theater Box Office for the Red and White Concert Series, Great Performance Series A and B, Theater-Dance Series A and B, and the Travel-Adventure Film Series. The Box Office staff can also provide information on procedures for ordering tickets for other Theater attractions scheduled later in the season.

Regular Box Office hours are from 11:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Monday through Friday and from 1 to 4 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday. On the evenings of performances, the main box office remains open until 7 p.m., and the lakeside box office, at the entrance to the Theater, is open from 7 p.m. until curtain time.



Ten different courses in a variety of arts and crafts media will be offered this fall for children of Wisconsin Union members and University faculty and staff between the ages of three and twelve.

The courses will begin on Sept. 6 and registrations should be made soon, since the classes are filled on a first-come first-served basis. If you did not receive your brochure about the classes, call 262-1282 or 262-0330 for information.




MENDOTA LAKEFRONT IMPROVEMENT UNDERWAY

Construction began this past summer on the improvement of the Lake Mendota shore from the end of Park Street to the Limnology Building.

Promoted for years by the Wisconsin Union's Hoofers Sailing Club, the project will provide improved facilities for boat storage, piers and ramps, an access road, a running and bicycle path, walkways, and an observation deck on the top of the Lake Lab at the foot of Park Street.

The new facilities will make it possible to store Hoofer boats well up on dry land away from the lake where the club annually lost many boats in storms. The Hoofer boats will also be stored there in winter eliminating the necessity to move them inside the Memorial Union boathouse.

The Lakefront Improvement project, which will cost approximately \$250,000, is funded jointly by the State, the UW classes of 1927 and 1928, the Brittingham Foundation and the Wisconsin Hoofers.

FROM TATTING TO PALMISTRY... MINI COURSES TEACH ON

Some 200 different courses including such subjects as Strategies for Returning Students, Understanding Dreams, Basic Cooking, 20th Century Women Artists, Palmistry and Tatting, will be offered during the fall semester by the Wisconsin Union Mini Courses.

Fall classes will begin on Sept. 15 and continue through Oct. 25. Walk-in registration begins on Wed., Sept. 3 from 4 to 7 p.m. in the Union Theater. You may also register Mon., Sept. 8 to Thur., Sept. 11 from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. in the Commons lobby of the Memorial Union. Mini Courses are a self-supporting program of the Wisconsin Union Directorate and the course fees cover all instructional and administrative costs. Union members pay a discounted fee.
