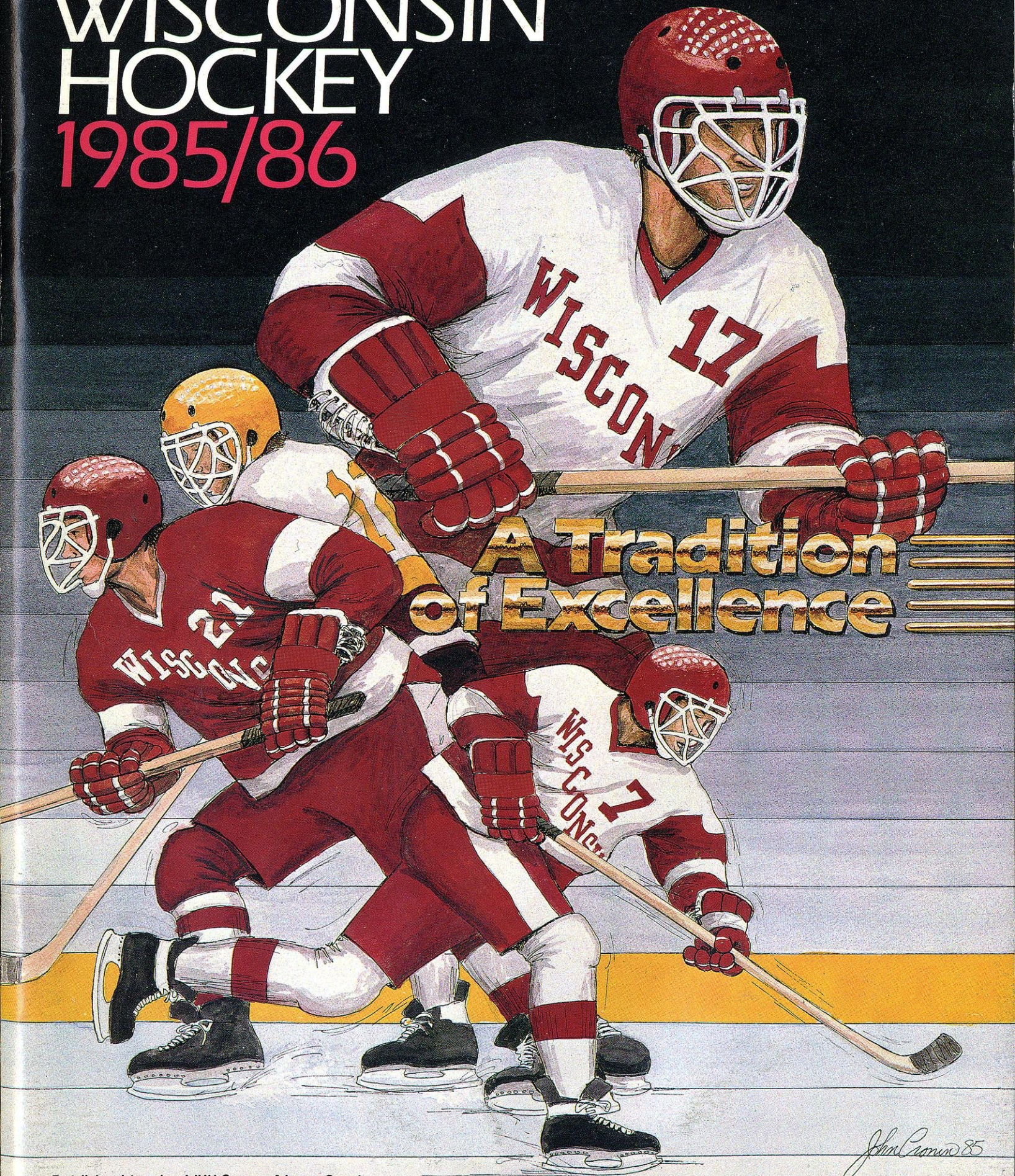

COVERING THE BADGERS

WORKING PRESS

Wisconsin's working press-radio-television facilities are very limited at the Dane County Memorial Coliseum. The Press should enter the Coliseum through the Player's Entrance at the North end of the building.

WORKING TICKETS

All Requests for working press credentials must be made through the Sports News Service office. Upon acceptance of applications, appropriate tickets are either mailed or held for pick-up at the Player's Entrance of the Coliseum. Working press tickets contain assigned locations.

RADIO

Visiting radio stations will be admitted upon the recommendations of the visiting school. Booths are assigned based on involvement with the co-op line arrangement. Tickets will be held at the Sports News Service office or at the Player's Entrance of the Coliseum the day of the game.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

Photo passes are limited because of space at the Coliseum. Photographers are asked to consider the hockey fans when working in the Coliseum. Requests will be granted on a priority first-come, first-served basis.

PARKING

There is no reserved press parking at the Dane County Coliseum.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS

Player interviews may be conducted immediately outside the Wisconsin dressing room following each game.

Media representatives will be able to interview Wisconsin players after each game following a short post-game meeting of the squad and coaches.

COACHES INTERVIEWS

Jeff Sauer will meet with media representatives following each game after a short post-game session with team and coaches. The post-game interview of Coach Sauer will be conducted in the media interview room adjacent to the Wisconsin dressing room.

Best time to interview Coach Sauer is between 10 and 12 noon at the hockey office or daily after practice.

Your hosts in the Dane County Coliseum and at all University of Wisconsin athletic events are **Jim Mott**, Sports Information Director, **Bob Leu**, Radio-TV Director, and **Doug Spencer**, Sports Information Assistant.

Jim Mott is a Madison native and has B.A. degrees in Zoology and Journalism from the University of Wisconsin. As an undergraduate, he served as Wisconsin's basketball team manager for four years, earning a major "W" award for his work.

Jim is a past president of the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) and the Madison Pen and Mike Club. He was named to the CoSIDA Hall of Fame in 1979.

He and his wife **Dorothy** are the parents of three sons — **William**, 23, **David**, 20, and **Eric**, 18.

Bob Leu joined Wisconsin's Athletic Department staff as Radio-TV Director in September, 1973 from WHA-

TV where he had served as producer-director and director of sports.

He's a Milwaukee native and a 1960 graduate of the University of Wisconsin with a Bachelor of Arts degree in speech.

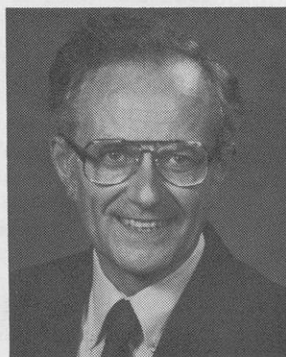

He and his wife **Janis** are parents of daughters **Dawn**, 26, **Amie**, 23 and son **Adam**, 14.

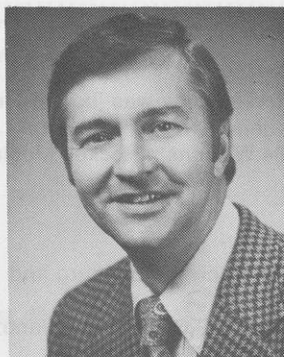
Bob is a past president of the Madison Pen and Mike Club.

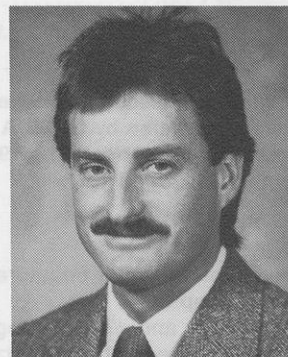

1985-86 WISCONSIN HOCKEY OUTLOOK

If sheer numbers are any indication, the 1985-86 University of Wisconsin hockey team should be a contender for the WCHA Championship - what with 20 lettermen - including seven of their top ten scorers, five of six defensemen, and two goaltenders - returning.

But sheer numbers will mean little once the 23rd season of Badger Hockey gets underway October 11th at the Dane County Coliseum. Wisconsin does not want a repeat of the "shootouts" of a year ago - a season in which Badger opponents scored at least six goals on 15 different occasions. What unquestionably will be the team's No. 1 priority of '85-86 as well as a key to the Badgers' fate this winter will be the team's measure of success in cutting down the goals-against average.

Fourth-year Head Coach Jeff Sauer saw his Badgers put together 25 victories a year ago, an impressive feat indeed with nine freshmen and just two seniors in the starting lineup. The youthful Badgers were one of the surprise teams in the '84-85 WCHA race with a 20-14-0 record and third place finish, but eventual elimination in the second round of the league playoffs found them unprepared for the off-season.

A year ago, the Badgers yielded an uncharacteristic 4.33 goals-per-game (as compared to the 2.78 in the NCAA Championship season of '82-83), yet were still able to win 25 games - including a 19-7 record from November 30th to March 9th. Undoubtedly then, a significant factor in Wisconsin's 25-17-0 record was the team's impressive offensive production. Led by Tony

Granato, Tim Thomas and Paul Houston, the Cardinal and White averaged 4.93 goals-per-game a year ago, including 18 contests in which they scored six or more times. In those 18 games, incidentally, the Badgers posted a remarkable 17-1 record, with the lone loss being the 8-7 decision to Minnesota in the semi-finals of the WCHA Playoffs in Minneapolis.

Granato and Thomas, solid candidates for All-American honors again (both earned second-team All-American honors in '84-85), finished one-two in team scoring a year ago and ranked among the top producers in the WCHA (Granato was third and Thomas eighth). Both were members of the 1985 U.S. National Hockey Team that played in the IIHF World Championships in Prague, Czechoslovakia last Spring, and both also participated in

last summer's National Sports Festival.

A forward from Downers Grove, Illinois, Granato had 33 goals and 34 assists for 67 points in 42 games a year ago, was a second-team All-WCHA selection with 26 goals and 29 assists for 55 points, and led the UW with 13 power-play goals and six game-winners. Thomas was a first-team All-WCHA pick and was the highest scoring collegiate defenseman in the nation with 13 goals and 50 assists for 63 points in 42 games. He hails from Richfield, Minnesota.

"Without a doubt, Tony and Tim will again play a critical role in our potential success," said Sauer. "Comparable seasons to the ones they enjoyed in 1984-85 will go a long way in helping us to our goals."

Sauer, who owns a 79-44-5 mark and a .637 winning percentage at Wisconsin in three seasons, will also look to a larger senior class for leadership - something missing a year ago with only Houston and Paul Houck being fourth-year players. The Badgers return eight seniors - defensemen Marty Wiitala and Matt Walsh, forwards Dave Maley, Ernie Vargas, Jim Johansson, Tom Ryan and Steve Tschipper, and goaltender Gary Baxter. Wiitala, who made a successful switch from forward to defense a year ago, was selected by his teammates to serve as team captain for the '85-86 campaign.

"One crucial point as to how well we fare this season will be the leader-

ship and production we receive from our eight senior squad members," said Sauer. "Those players all have had three years of experience now and they have all played on an NCAA Championship team. By sheer virtue of three years in college hockey they should supply the type of leadership in critical situations that can make the difference between success and failure."

If the Badgers are to be a force to reckon with they will also need improved offensive performances from the likes of Johansson (16-24-40), Maley (19-8-27), Vargas (8-16-24) and Ryan (5-5-10). Although not considered explosive scorers, Vargas and Ryan are hard-working players who came through with some of the best hockey of their careers last year. Johansson had his best year offensively as a Badger, yet should be capable of scoring even better. Maley, meanwhile, had his highest goal output with 19, but saw his assists drop from a high of 28 in '83-84 to eight last year.

Other experienced veterans who could play key roles are Tschipper and junior Paul Graveline - two players who would like nothing better than to work into a regular shift. Tschipper has earned three varsity letters and Graveline two.

Up front, the Badgers also received solid freshman campaigns from forwards Scott Mellanby, Pat Ford and Paul Ranheim while Steve Tuttle and Glenn Revak acquired valuable experience. These players should all take

charge in their sophomore seasons, and will challenge the veterans in every phase of the game. An effective cornerman, Mellanby was one of the most productive first-year players in the WCHA in '84-85 with 14 goals and 24 assists for 38 points in 40 games, while the scrappy Ford had 16-10-26 and the swift-skating Ranheim 11-11-22. Tuttle and Revak also showed glimpses of great ability last winter, and figure to challenge for regular spots on the 20-man traveling roster.

"Our sophomore class gained great experience during their rookie seasons in the WCHA," said Sauer. "It's a tremendous transition from high school and juniors into the nation's foremost collegiate hockey conference, but these young men successfully made that jump. We expect Mellanby, Ford and Ranheim to continue playing well while the coaching staff looks for Tuttle and Revak to blossom and begin to have the productive type of seasons that we expected of them when they arrived on our campus last Fall."

Defensively, the Badger blueline will be built around Thomas, Marty Wiitala, Matt Walsh, Garry Bunz and Ken MacKenzie. (Standout Gary Suter gave up his final two seasons of collegiate eligibility for an NHL contract.) Thomas, Wiitala, Walsh and MacKenzie all played 42 games a year ago, with Bunz seeing action in all but two. The loss of Suter was a great blow to the team, but Sauer hopes the experience of Thomas and Walsh, the leadership of Wiitala, and the improve-

ment of Bunz and MacKenzie will give the UW five solid performers. Also hoping to work his way back into the lineup is Eric Faust, who missed all of last season with a wrist injury.

"With Wiitala, Thomas and MacKenzie on the blueline we should have a defensive corps capable of moving the puck out of the end zone very rapidly," said Sauer. "Each of them has fine offensive skills which will prove to be quite an asset to our club. Bunz and Walsh, on the otherhand, give us the next dimension on the backline through solid defensive performances.

"Marty made a great transition during the second half of his junior season - from forward to defense. He made the switch far more successfully than we had anticipated, and our entire staff firmly believes he will only improve as this season progresses."

In goal, the Badgers return sophomore Dean Anderson and seniors Gary Baxter and Mark Passalino. Anderson posted a strong 21-13-0 record a year ago, with a 4.29 goals-against average and an .875 save percentage in 2,072 minutes. At the outset of the '84-85 season, no one could have predicted the "work-horse" effort Anderson was called on to put in. From Oshawa, Ontario, "Dino" set single season Wisconsin records for most games played (36), most minutes (2,072) and most saves (1,036), and tied the season record for most wins with 21. He played very well at times,

while at others his WCHA inexperience showed. But he does give the Badgers a solid foundation. Baxter, meanwhile, played in 11 games with a 4-4 record and a 4.44 goals-against average and looks to bounce back this year and battle for the No. 1 spot again as a senior. Passalino - the team's top junior varsity netminder the past two seasons - also hopes to earn a shot in the lineup.

"We feel the goaltending position may be our deepest spot," said Sauer. "With the return of three-year letterman Gary Baxter, sophomore Dean Anderson coming off a very impressive record-setting freshman campaign, and the addition of freshman Mike Richter we will have a trio that we think should give us the depth reminiscent of other outstanding Badger teams.

"Obviously, the most glaring statistic from last season was our goals-against average. And it's safe to say that the biggest task of our team this year will be to reduce that average and return our defensive statistics to the levels we've come to know from past Wisconsin hockey teams."

In addition to Richter (Flourtown, PA), new to the Badgers in '85-86 are defensemen Paul Stanton (Foxboro, MA), Bo Nickoloff (Hibbing, MN) and Kurt Semandel (W. Allis, WI), and forwards Todd Geisness (Rice Lake, WI), Andy Akervik (Eau Claire, WI), John Byce (Madison, WI) and Brian Sergenian (Madison, WI). Geisness is

a transfer from UW-Eau Claire who sat out the '84-85 season. The competition for the playing roster is expected to continue throughout the season, and several of these newcomers could find their way into the lineup at one time or another.

Twenty of Wisconsin's 38 regular-season games will be played in the Dane County Coliseum in '85-86. The Badgers open October 11th and 12th against CCHA-member Western Michigan University in Madison, then open the WCHA schedule hosting the University of Denver October 18-19th. Other home series this year include Minnesota-Duluth on November 1-2, North Dakota on November 22-23, New Hampshire on November 29-30, Harvard on December 21-22, Providence on January 3-4, Maine on January 10-11, Minnesota on January 31-February 1, and Northern Michigan on February 14-15.

On the road, the Badgers will be at Lowell for a Saturday-Sunday series October 26-27, then at Boston College November 8-9 and at Northeastern November 15-16. In December, the UW plays at Minnesota December 6-7 and at Boston University on December 29-30. January finds the Badgers traveling to North Dakota for a January 17-18 series, and to Colorado College on January 24-25. The final road appearance of the regular season will be February 21-22 at Michigan Tech.

In all, Wisconsin will play 34 games against WCHA and Hockey East foes.

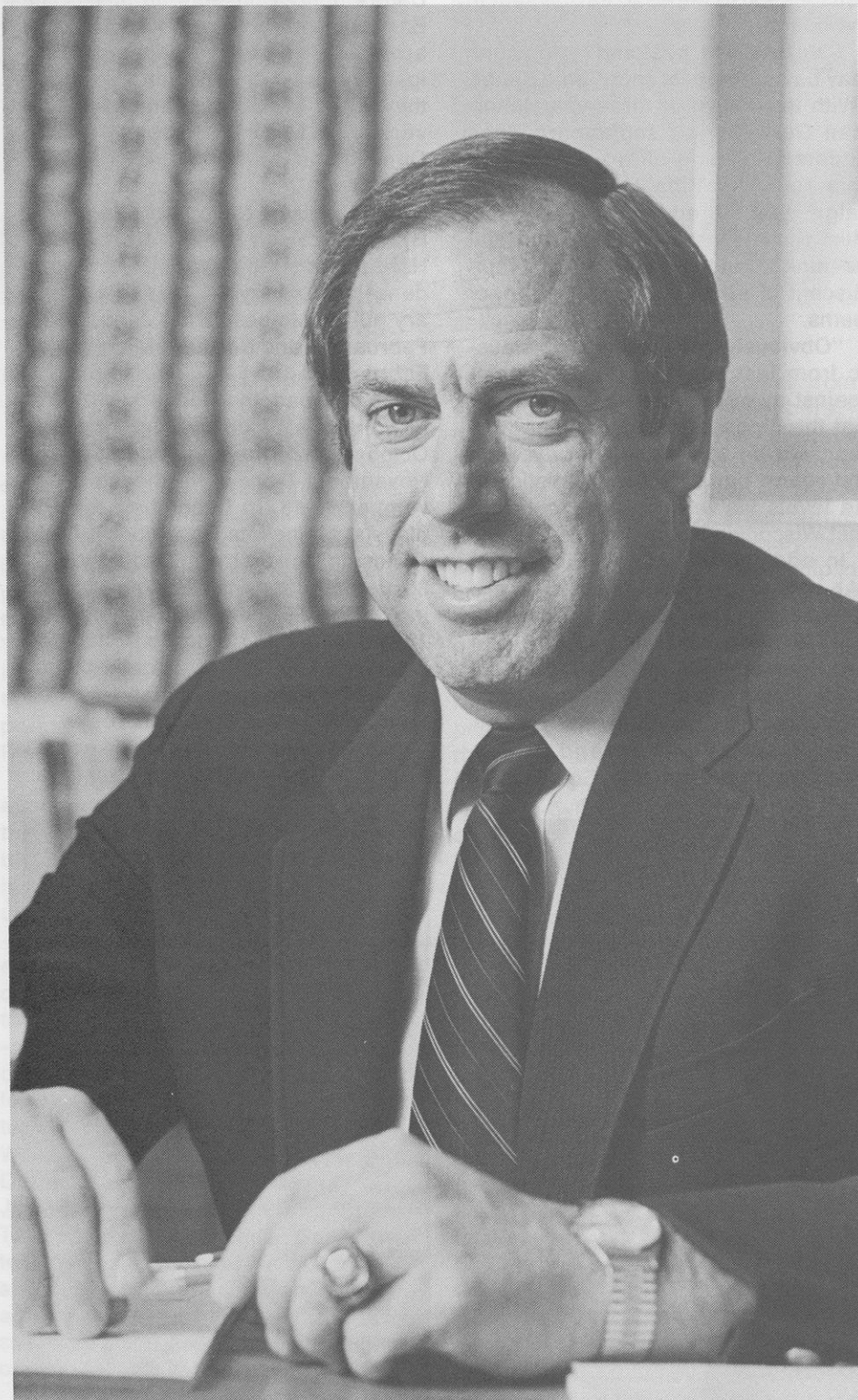

HEAD COACH JEFF SAUER



One of the most respected and influential collegiate hockey coaches in the game today, 1985-86 will mark the fourth year for Jeff Sauer as the guiding force of the University of Wisconsin program.

In three seasons at the UW helm, Sauer's teams have averaged 26 victories per year and have compiled an impressive 79-44-5 record and a .637 winning percentage. His 1984-85 squad put together a 25-17 overall mark and a 20-14 third place WCHA finish with nine freshmen and just two seniors in the regular lineup, while two of his current players - Tony Granato and Tim Thomas - were accorded second team All-American honors a year ago.

The Badgers' 25 victories in '84-85 marked the eighth time since 1971 that Wisconsin teams have won at least 25 games, and was the 15th time in the past 18 seasons that the UW has won 20 or more games. Under Sauer, the Badgers have won at least 21 games all three seasons.

Jeff was honored this past Spring with the opportunity to serve as assistant coach to Dave Peterson of the 1985 USA Hockey Team that participated in the annual IIHF (International Ice Hockey Federation) World Championships in Prague, Czechoslovakia. A mixture of professionals and amateurs, the '85 U.S. National Team put together a fine fourth place finish - just out of the medal picture and behind World Champion Czechoslovakia, runner-up Canada, and third place Russia. Also included on the U.S. team were Badgers Tony Granato, Tim Thomas and Gary Suter.

Sauer enters the 1985-86 campaign just four wins shy of 250 career victories, putting him in select company in college hockey circles. Only 42 years old, Jeff will also mark his 15th season as a Western Collegiate Hockey Association Head Coach in '85-86, qualifying him as the "Dean" of league coaches.

In his first year at Wisconsin in 1982-83, Sauer accomplished what no other first-year college hockey coach

had done before. His Badgers captured the 1983 NCAA Championship, earned the No. 1 ranking in the final poll, and posted one of the best marks in school history at 33-10-4. It marked the fourth national championship for Wisconsin since 1973. Four members of that team - Pat Flatley, Chris Chelios, Bruce Driver and Marc Behrend - played in the 1984 Winter Olympic Games in Sarajevo and have since become standout players in the National Hockey League.

Known for their second-half peaks, Sauer's '82-83 team compiled a 23-4-2 record and an .828 winning percentage after Christmas, while his youthful '84-85 club ran up a 19-9 mark and a .679 winning percentage after November 30th.

Among his other list of "notables" in the coaching profession are: Head Coach of the South team at the 1983 National Sports Festival; member of the 1984 U.S. Olympic Hockey Committee; 1983 Chairman of the WCHA Coach's Committee; and a stint on the NCAA Ice Hockey Rules Committee. Jeff also directs his own hockey school in Madison and works with the Stan Mikita Hockey School for the Hearing-Impaired in Chicago.

Sauer had big shoes to fill when he left a comfortable position at Colorado

College to replace the almost legendary Bob Johnson in 1982. But his character, determination to succeed and his positive rapport with the public and the media have proved he was the ideal choice. At Colorado College, where he had served as the Tigers' Head Coach since 1971 and where he also served as athletic director in 1981, Jeff won more than 180 games and was twice named WCHA "Coach of the Year". His first award came following his rookie season of 1971 and

the second following the 1975-76 campaign when Colorado College posted a fine 23-14-0 record and finished third in the final WCHA standings. Sauer also guided his '80-81 Tigers to third place in the WCHA.

Wisconsin hockey fans will probably never forget the almost legendary "Black Sunday" in March of 1981 when Sauer's CC Tigers came back with a miraculous 11-4 upset over the Badgers in the Dane County Coliseum to claim the two-game, total-goals

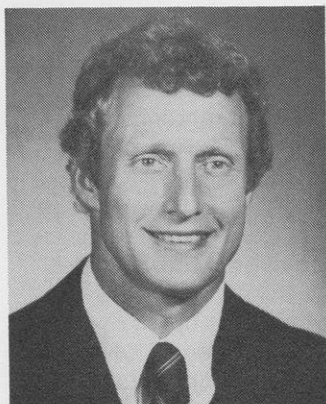
playoff victory. (Wisconsin had won the opening game 8-2.)

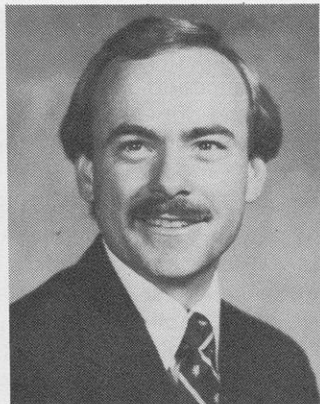

Jeff and wife, Jamie, are the parents of two children - Chip, 10, and Beth, five.

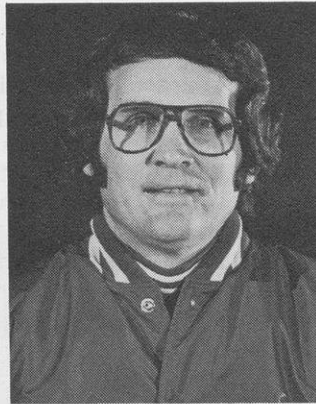

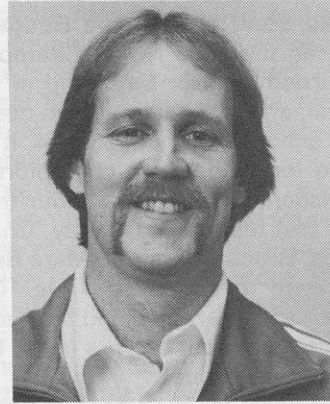

GRANT STANDBROOK Assistant Coach - 10th Year

In his 10th season as assistant coach at the University of Wisconsin in 1985-86 is Grant Standbrook.

A premier tactician and recruiter, Standbrook has played an instrumental part in the success of Wisconsin Hockey since 1975. He has been assistant coach for three Wisconsin national championship teams - 1977, 1981 and 1983. In addition to his numerous on and off-ice duties with the Badger team, Kemp also serves as a primary recruiter for the UW.

From 1983-85, Mike was administrative assistant coach to Jeff Sauer and was also the executive director of the Blue Line Club. This past summer, Mike became the team's second full-time assistant coach.

In 1981-82, the 32-year-old native of Duluth, Minnesota served as administrative assistant under former Badger coach Bob Johnson, but moved on to Illinois-Chicago for the '82-83 season as an assistant coach for the Flames under Val Belmonte.

Kemp is a 1975 graduate of Gustavus Adolphus, where he majored in public relations and business.

Mike and his wife, Julie, were married in September of 1982.

BILL HOWARD Assistant Coach

The Badgers' goaltending coach is Bill Howard, the man credited with the team's on-going tradition of developing standout goaltenders.

Howard, 40, was a successful high school coach during his ten years at Madison Memorial when his Spartan teams won two state titles and posted an impressive 136-72-1 record.

As a collegiate player, Howard enjoyed a distinguished career at Colorado Col-

lege, where he played for former Wisconsin coach Bob Johnson.

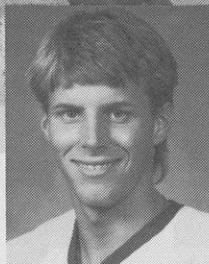
With the hockey program, Perrin serves as varsity reserve coach and academic coordinator, but he is also involved with off-ice training and conditioning.

THE HISTORY OF THE WCHA

Recognized as the premier collegiate hockey league in the United States, the Western Collegiate Hockey Association marks its 27th year in 1985-86.

In all, WCHA teams have won 19 NCAA Division I Championships in the past 26 years, including ten of the last 13. And since the national tournament began in 1948, the WCHA has claimed 29 NCAA collegiate ice hockey titles! Three member institutions - Wisconsin, North Dakota and Minnesota - have accounted for nine national championships since 1973. The Badgers won in 1973, 1977, 1981 and 1983; North Dakota earned the crown in 1980 and 1982; and Minnesota won in 1974, 1976 and 1979. And in NCAA final four competition, the WCHA has had two teams in the final four 33 of 37 times since 1949. An impressive record, indeed.

The names of ex-WCHA players is legendary. How about John Mayasich, Bill Hay, Bill Masterton, Gordon "Red" Berenson, Lou Nanne, Tony Esposito, Keith Magnuson, Wayne Thomas, Dennis Hextall and Ron Grahame to start with? The list is too numerous to display here. Since 1950, the WCHA has had more than 125 of its players earn All-American honors while another 70 have played on U.S. Olympic Hockey Teams (14 were members of the 1980 United States Gold Medal Team). And for good measure, a current check of National Hockey League rosters finds at least 60 former WCHA standouts on NHL teams. By school, they are:

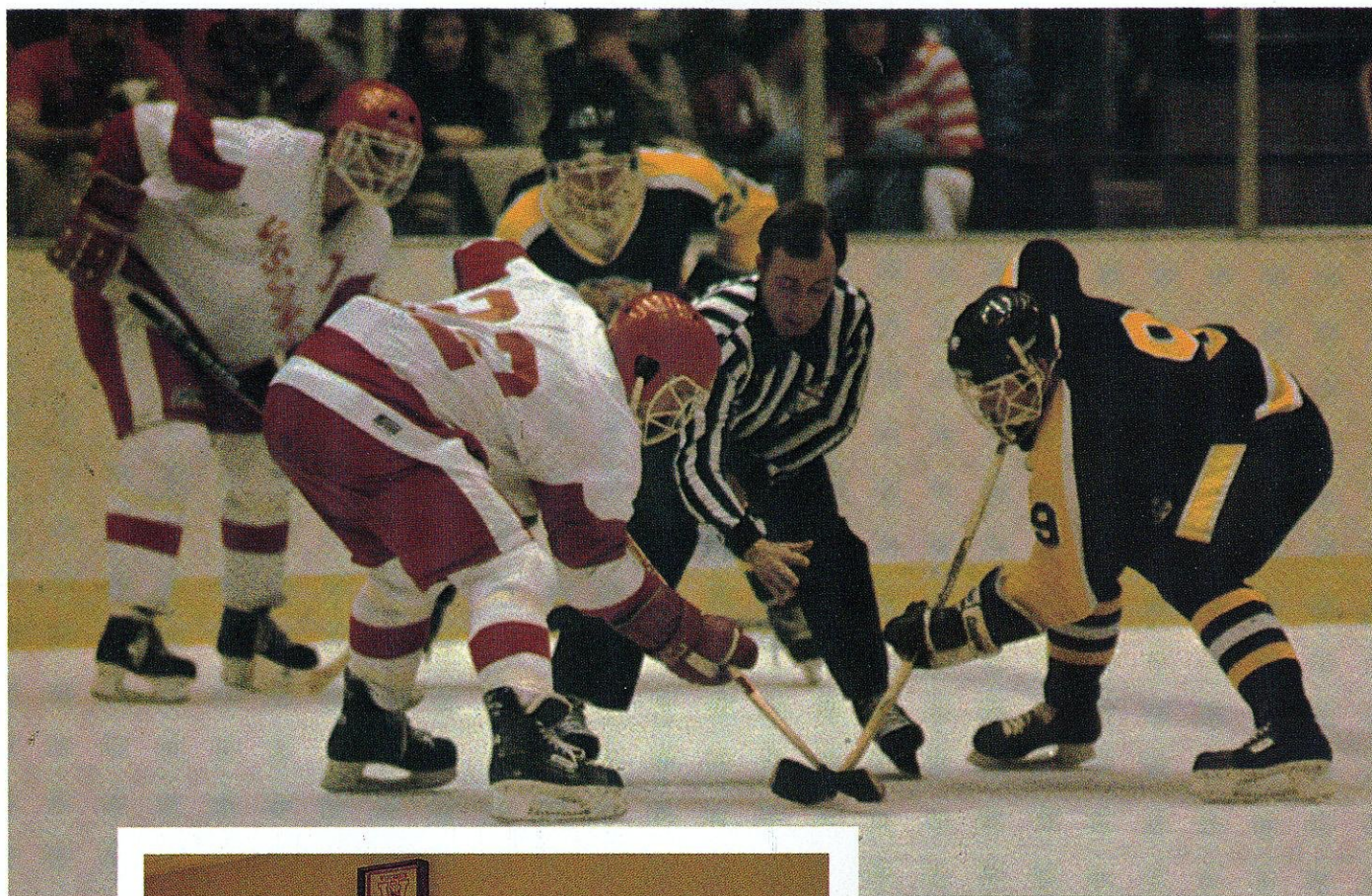

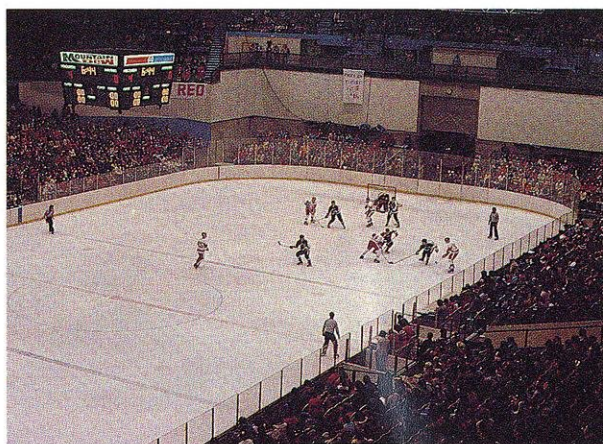
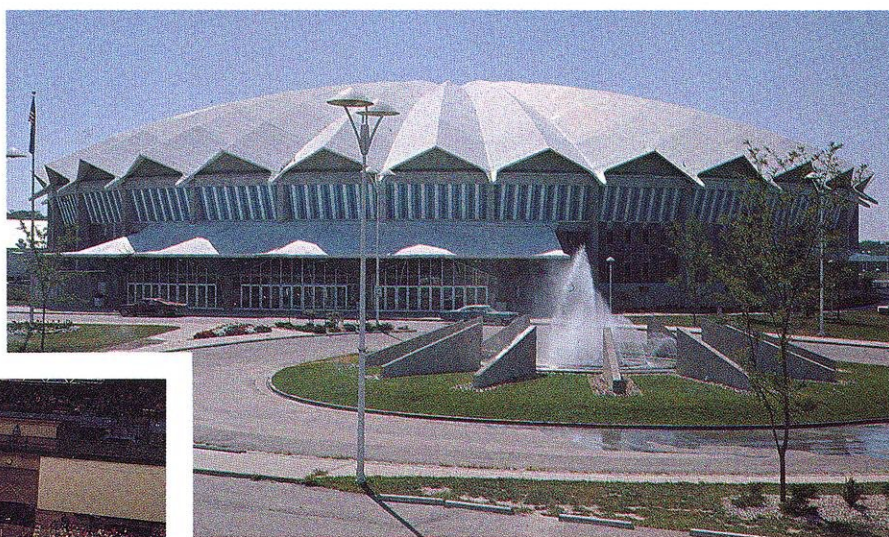
BADGER HOCKEY 1985/86



Sometime during the 1985-86 season, Wisconsin will record its 500th hockey victory since gaining full recognition as an intercollegiate sport in 1963. The Badgers entered the '85-86 campaign with an impressive all-time won-loss record of 491-266-33 for a winning percentage of .643.

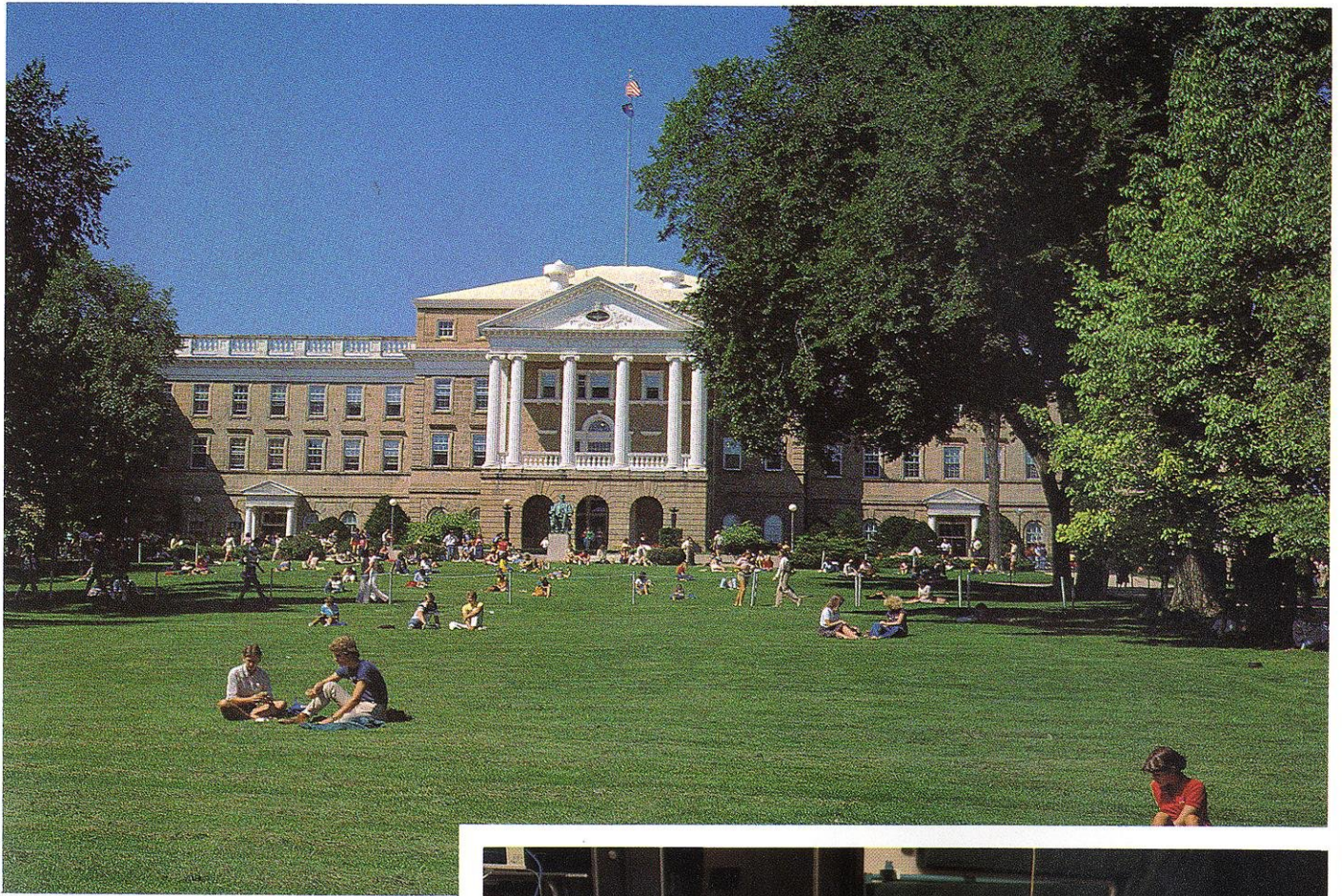
The Badgers' home-ice record of 303-118-16 and winning mark of .712 since 1963 reflect the program's dedication to its loyal fans. The Dane County Memorial Coliseum - one of college hockey's premier arenas with theater-style seating for 8,664 - has been one of the focal points of the collegiate game the past two decades. Wisconsin has set American college hockey attendance records for 16 consecutive seasons, dating back to 1970.

Winning records are the norm at the UW. Try these, for instance. 37-7-1 in 1976-77. 35-11-1 in 1981-82. 33-10-4 in 1982-83. And 29-9-2 in 1972-73. As a matter of fact, Wisconsin Hockey teams have recorded 20 or more victories in 15 of the last 18 seasons, with an average of better than 27 wins per year since 1976.



Nearly three million fans have watched Badger hockey in the Dane County Coliseum since 1967. Since 1972, Wisconsin has drawn 2,526,368 people for an average of better than 8,400 per game - or better than 97% of capacity.

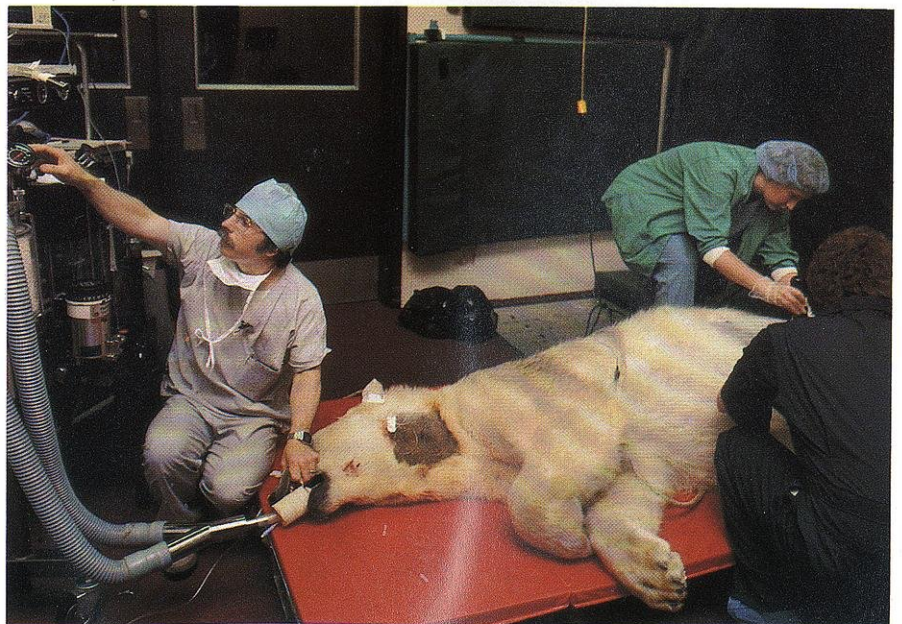

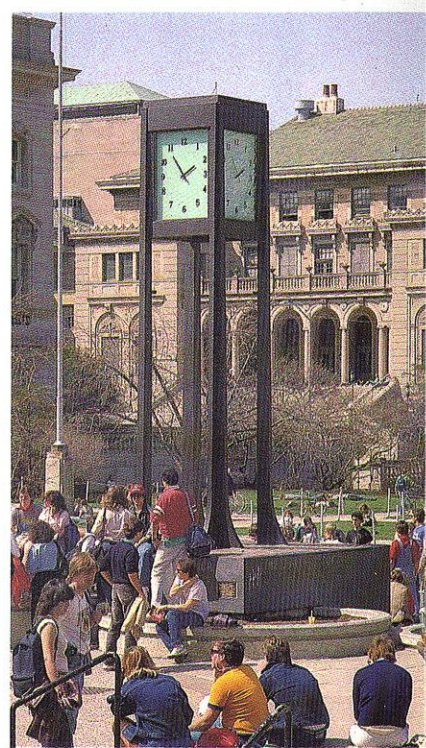
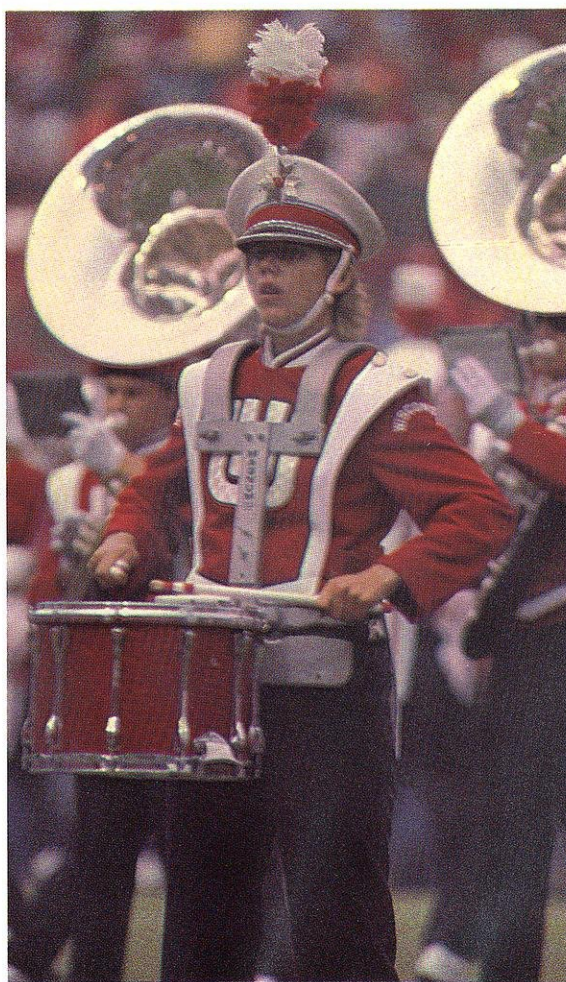
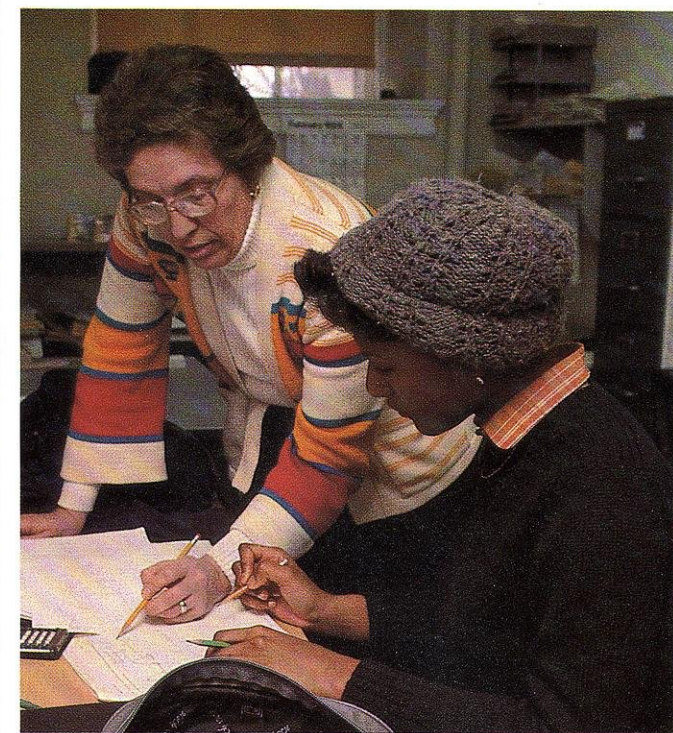
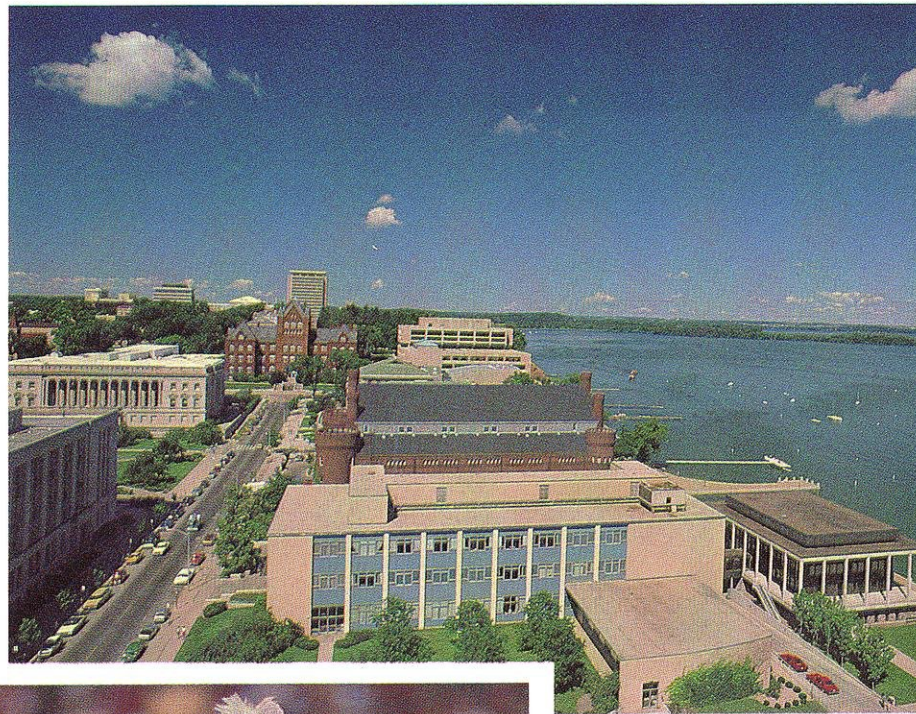
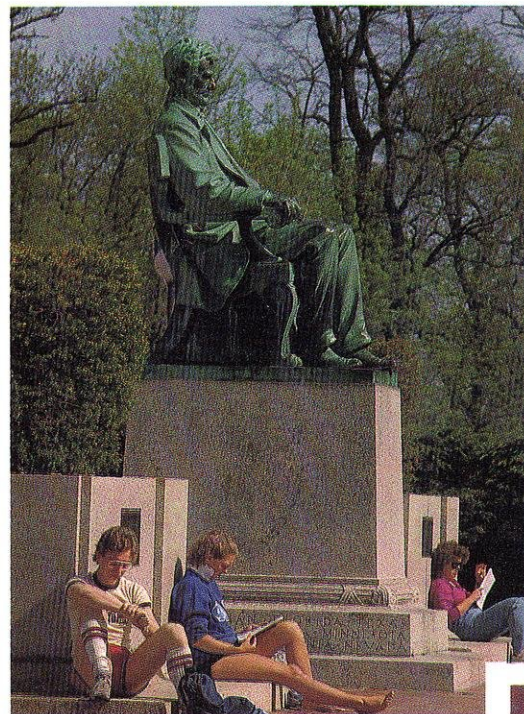
It's a word heard consistently on the University of Wisconsin campus: reputation. Students say they enroll here because of it, faculty members are lured by it, administrators cite it often and proudly.

But just how good is the University of Wisconsin's reputation, and how does such a reputation grow?

Certainly, much of any university's reputation comes from testimonials of graduates, and there are more than 200,000 living UW alums, many prominent. More than 120 Wisconsin companies are headed by University of Wisconsin grads.

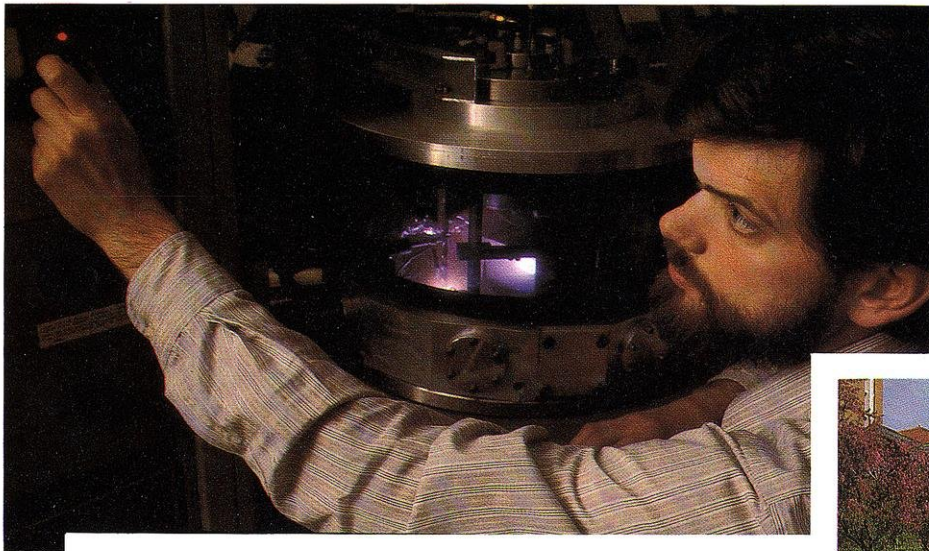
The prestige of the faculty also contributes heavily to the reputation. Three UW faculty members have won Nobel Prizes, the last being cancer researcher Howard Temin in 1975; and seven former students or faculty members went on to win Nobels after leaving the University. The University of Wisconsin also is home to more "most-cited" scientists than any campus other than Stanford or Harvard, according to a national study.

But the most quantifiable evidence of academic reputation comes from national opinion surveys, where the University of Wisconsin consistently ranks near the top.

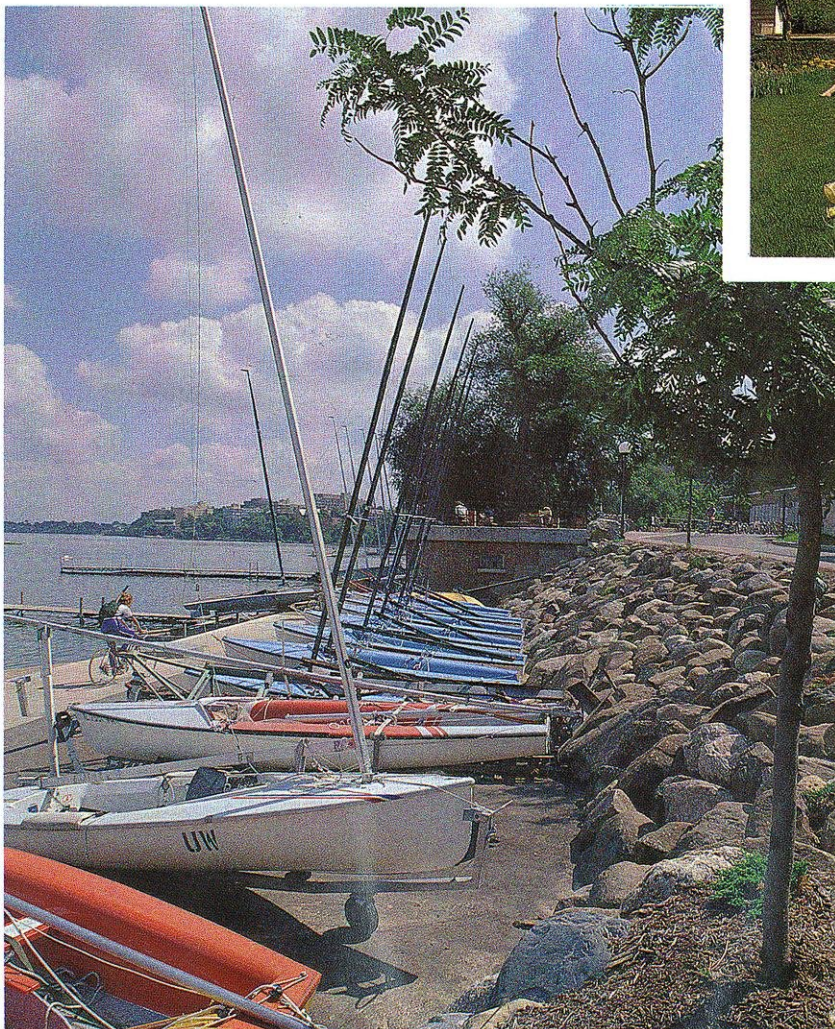
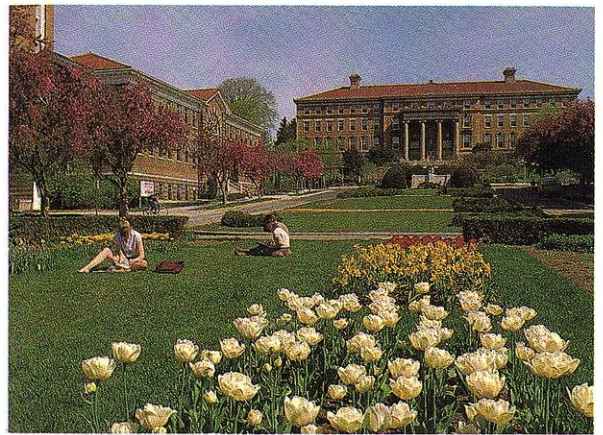
The most comprehensive survey of graduate education in the United States — the "Assessment of Research Doctorate Programs in the United States" (1982) — polled 5,000 faculty members and rated 228 universities in a 1982 study. That survey listed the University of Wisconsin as the eighth best graduate school in the nation. Those rated ahead of the UW included California-Berkeley, and private institutions Stanford, Harvard, Yale, MIT, Princeton and the University of Chicago.

Wisconsin's undergraduate teaching also is highly regarded. The national Gourman Report, published in 1983, ranked 49 University of Wisconsin departments among the country's top ten for undergraduates. In addition, the latest figures compiled by the National Science Foundation put the UW third among all U.S. universities in total funding spent for research and development. The UW's expenditures in those areas totalled \$158 million for fiscal year 1982, behind only John Hopkins and MIT.

Some 4,000 different courses are offered at Wisconsin. Majors are available in more than 149 bachelor's, 188 master's and 121 doctor's degrees programs. A few of Wisconsin's recent rankings included first in Dairy Science, seconds in education, microbiology, zoology, agriculture and physical education, fourth in foreign languages and sociology, fifth in history, sixth in chemistry, seventh in mathematics, and eighth in engineering and political science.



The University of Wisconsin has its own nuclear reactor, one of the finest textile collections in the country, a building in which nearly every conceivable environmental condition can be simulated, a collection of more than 1,700 United Artists Corporation movies from 1919-51, produces its own dairy products (including 75 flavors of ice cream), and a mastodon skeleton.



Situated amidst five fresh-water lakes and rolling hills, the University of Wisconsin is one of the most enchanting campuses in America. It sits on the South shore of Lake Mendota, encompassing more than 300 buildings and 900 acres of land — most within two blocks of the lake. There is beautiful and green Bascom Hill. A 129-acre peninsula known as Picnic Point. The vibrant pedestrian State Street Mall — lined with unique shops and restaurants. The on-the-hour ringing bells of Carillon Tower and 78,000-seat Camp Randall Stadium.

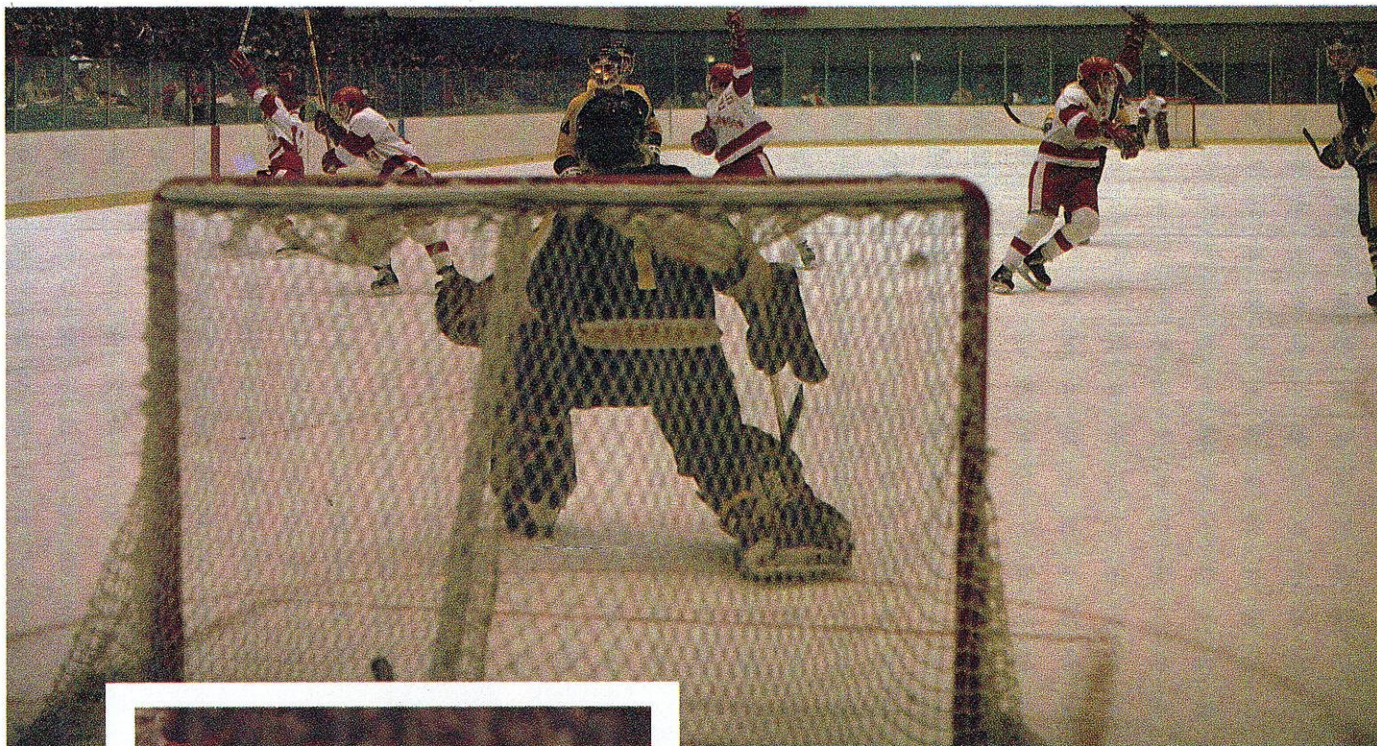
BADGER HOCKEY 1985/86

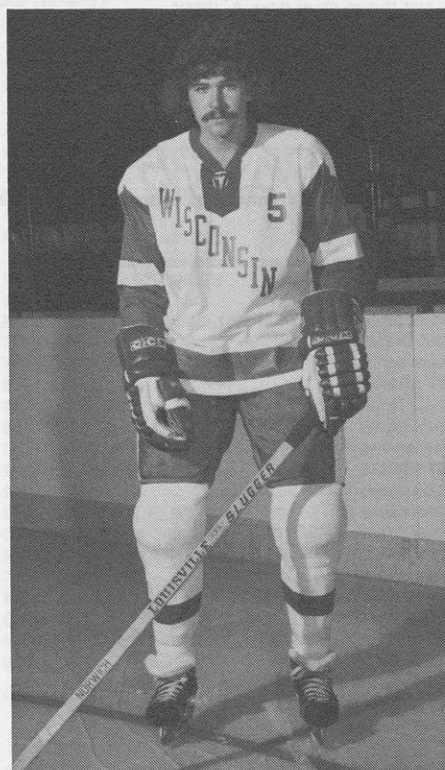

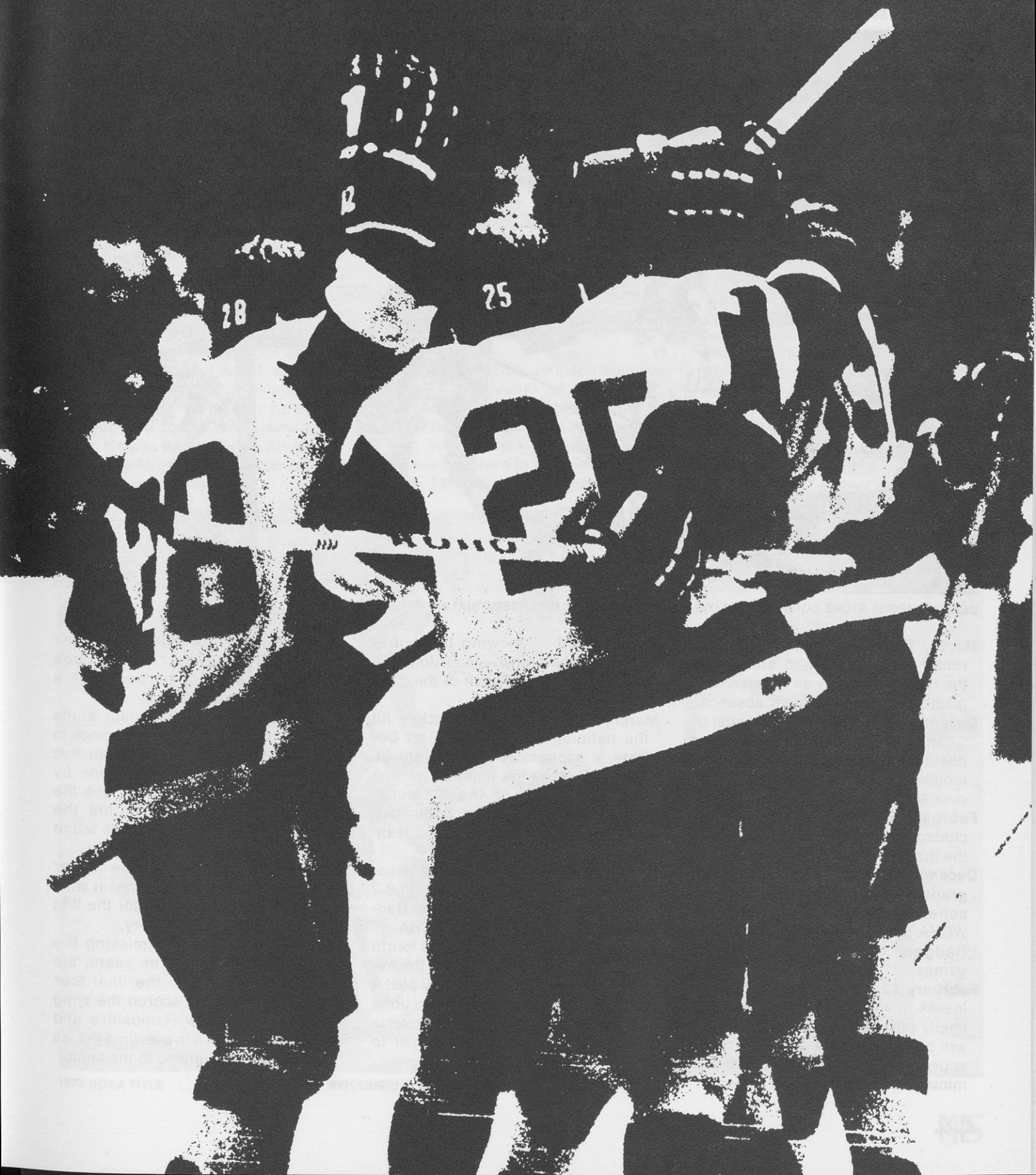

BADGER HOCKEY HISTORY



GREAT MOMENTS IN WISCONSIN HOCKEY

March, 1962—Wisconsin Athletic Director Ivan Williamson announced the return of hockey as an intercollegiate sport after a 28-year absence.

December 6, 1963—A rebound goal by Chan Young 5:10 into the sudden death period gives Wisconsin its first modern collegiate win, a 3-2 victory over Macalester.

February 22, 1964—Wisconsin concluded its first season of hockey in the modern era with an 8-5-3 record.

December 11, 1964—In an effort to upgrade their program, the Badgers scheduled eight games against WCHA teams, but unfortunately, the Badgers lost all eight of those games.

February 22, 1966—After 13 straight losses to WCHA teams, the Badgers finally post a victory, a 5-4 overtime win over Minnesota. Jim Petruzates scored on a break-away just two minutes into the overtime period.

April 1, 1966—Following the retirement of John Riley, Bob Johnson was named head coach of the Badger hockey program.

March, 1968—Wisconsin hockey hit the national spotlight as Bert DeHate, a sophomore center from St. Paul, MN, wins the national scoring title with 77 points on 47 goals and 30 assists. DeHate hits for seven hat-tricks, a Badger record, as the team goes 21-10.

March 30, 1969—After another successful season, including an 11-9-2 mark against WCHA teams, the Badgers were admitted to the WCHA.

March, 1970—Wisconsin places fourth in the WCHA and qualifies for the national tournament, where they post a third place finish. Defenseman John Jagger of Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario becomes the first Badger player to win All-American honors.

March, 1972—The Badgers make their second NCAA appearance in three years, but again come away with a third place finish.

March, 16, 1973—Wisconsin stuns Cornell 6-5 in overtime to advance to the NCAA finals. A goal with five seconds left in regulation time by sophomore Dean Talafous ties the game. Talafous then tallies the game-winner with 33 seconds left in overtime.

March, 17, 1973—With a 4-2 win over WCHA rival Denver, Wisconsin wins the NCAA championship for the first time in the school's history.

March, 25, 1977—After missing the NCAA playoffs for three years, the Badgers make it to the final four again. Les Grauer scored the tying goal against New Hampshire and Mike Eaves won it in overtime 4-3, as the Badgers advanced to the finals.

March 26, 1977—Senior Steve Alley culminated the Badgers' finest season ever with a goal 23 seconds into overtime to give Wisconsin a 6-5 win over Michigan for their second NCAA title. Wisconsin finished the season at 37-7-1 and was the first team to capture the Big Ten, WCHA and NCAA titles in the same season. Three players were named to the All-American squad. Johnson was named Coach of the Year, and his son Mark was named Freshman of the Year.

March 25, 1978—Wisconsin fans took Providence by storm for the NCAA tournament, and were proclaimed the "World's Greatest Hockey Fans". Mike Eaves finished his career as the school's all-time scoring leader, while he and Mark Johnson were All-Americans. Wisconsin was fourth in the NCAA's.

March, 1979—Record crowds saw the Badgers (25-13-3) play as 21 of the 23 home games were sell-outs and the average crowd of 8,654 was just eight short of a sell-out. Mark Johnson closed out his Badger career as the top goal scorer in Wisconsin history. He was named to the All-American squad again and was the college "Player of the Year".

March 27, 1981—Wisconsin returned to the NCAA final four after defeating the best team in the East, Clarkson, 9-8 in a total goal series at Potsdam, NY. After a 5-1 win over Northern Michigan, the Badgers advanced to the finals again.

March 28, 1981—The Badgers regained the NCAA crown for the third time with a 6-3 win over Minnesota. The "back door" Badgers proved they were the champions after defeating the #1 teams in the ECAC (Clarkson), CCHA (Northern Michigan) and WCHA (Minnesota). The season also marked the end of the ten-team WCHA, as the three Michigan schools and Notre Dame dropped out to join the CCHA.

March 27, 1982—Badgers finish 2nd in NCAA tournament, and compile the second best record in Wisconsin Hockey history at 35-11-1. Center John Newberry and Defenseman Bruce Driver receive All-American status.

June 1, 1982—Bob Johnson resigns after fifteen years at Wisconsin. Johnson had guided the Badgers to three NCAA Championships and the best attendance of any college hockey program in the country.

July 8, 1982—Jeff Sauer, Head Coach

at Colorado College and former assistant to Bob Johnson at Wisconsin, is named as the second full-time coach of the Badgers.

March 5, 1983—Sophomores Chris Chelios and Paul Houck score the tying and winning goals as the Badgers beat North Dakota 6-5 in triple overtime to advance to the WCHA Playoff championships in Minneapolis.

March 24-26, 1983—After sweeping Minnesota in Williams Arena to gain the WCHA Playoff Championship and the No. 1 seed in the West, first-year Coach Jeff Sauer's team swept St. Lawrence 6-2, 7-1 in the NCAA Quarterfinals in Madison to move to the final four for the third straight year. In Grand Forks, ND, the Badgers claimed their fourth NCAA Championship since 1973 with a 2-0 win over Providence in the semifinals and a 6-2 victory over Harvard in the finals. Senior goaltender Marc Behrend was named the Tournament MVP for the second time in his career.

January 7, 1984—Wisconsin becomes the first and only American college team to defeat the 1984 U.S. Olympic Team when the Badgers stun USA 4-2 before 8,732 at the Coliseum.

The home of the University of Wisconsin Hockey Team is the beautiful and spacious Dane County Memorial Coliseum.

With theater-style seating for 8,664, the Badger home is the second largest college hockey arena in the nation. The ice surface is 200' by 85'.

Inside, the Badgers make use of one of the finest dressing room facilities in college hockey. Each player is assigned an individual stall (3½ × 6) for his equipment and personal belongings. Also located adjacent to the Wisconsin dressing room is a modern training room which includes a whirl-

pool and all the various modalities and exercise equipment for treatment of rehabilitation of injuries. The Badgers also make use of a fully-equipped weight room inside the Coliseum.

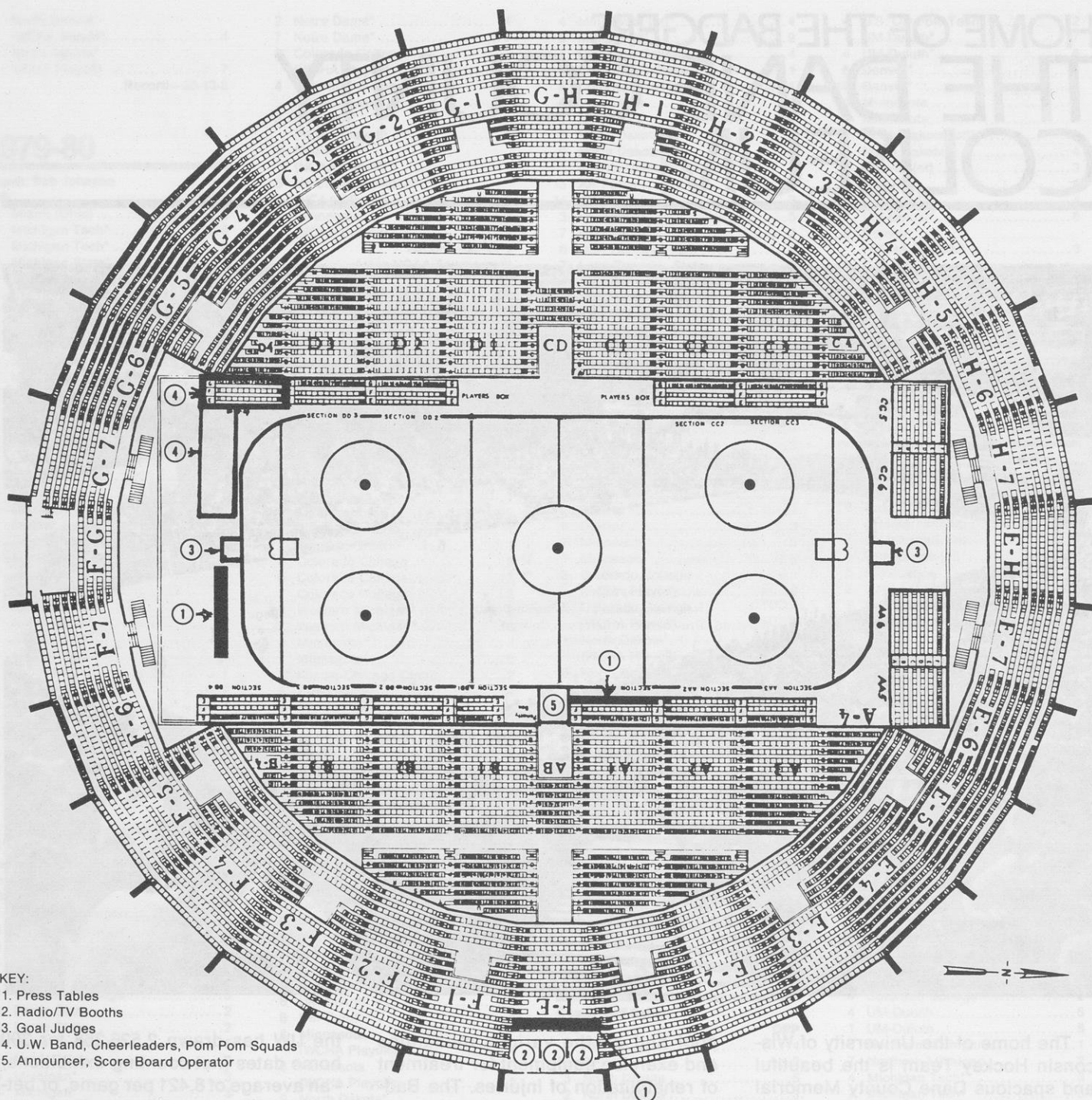
Recognized as the home of some of the nation's very best hockey fans, the Coliseum and the University of Wisconsin hockey team have attracted record crowds since the Badgers joined the Western Collegiate Hockey Association for the 1969-70 season.

Wisconsin has set American college hockey attendance records for 16 consecutive seasons dating back to 1970. More than three million fans have watched Badger Hockey in the Coliseum since 1967, and since 1972,

the UW has drawn 2,526,368 for 300 home dates (not counting exhibitions) - an average of 8,421 per game, or better than 97 percent of capacity.

In 1981-82, the Badgers drew 240,095 fans for 28 home games to set an all-time NCAA record, while the 1978-79 average attendance of 8,654 is both an NCAA and University of Wisconsin record.

Without doubt, witnessing a Badger hockey game in a sold-out Dane County Coliseum is like nothing else in college hockey.

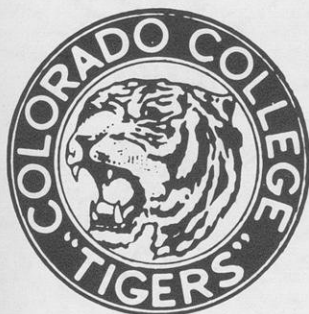
