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ANNUAL MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS

Madison, Wisconsin

Saturday, June 22, 1929, 10 A. M.

President Grady presiding

PRESENT: President Frank; Regents Bachman, Berger, Callahan, Cashman, Eimon, Faast, Grady, Olbrich, Richardson, Runge, Schmidtmann, Sholts, Waters.

ABSENT: Regents Backus, Gundersen, Mead.

A telegram was received from Regent Backus in explanation of his absence.

Upon motion of Regent Richardson, seconded by Regent Sholts, the minutes of the meeting of the Board held on April 24, 1929, were approved as sent out to the regents.

The regents then went into executive session.

Upon motion of Regent Olbrich, seconded by Regent Schmidtmann, it was voted that the bids received for the construction and equipment of the field house be rejected because of irregularities and that the business manager and state engineer be instructed to readvertise for bids, using their own judgment as to the date fixed for receiving them and for the completion of the building, but allowing ample time to insure its delivery ready for use for the basket ball season of 1931.

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The business manager advised that Miss Mary Campbell, of Riverside, California, was tendering a gift of \$15,000 to Hull House, Chicago, and \$10,000 to the University of Wisconsin, with the stipulation that she receive 6% on these sums during her life time and that upon her death the income of the \$10,000 to the University of Wisconsin be used for lectures on Internationalism and Peace. Professor Harold Bradley appeared before the Board and made a report with reference to conditions at the Memorial Union, with the following recommendations for the reallocation of space in the Memorial Union Building and Lathrop Hall:

That the use of certain rooms in the Memorial Union and Lathrop Hall be adjusted, effective for a one year experiment beginning September, 1929, as follows:

1. The entire first, or main floor of the central section shall be common to both men and women.

2. The Great Hall floor shall be private to women, except for such special functions as may be assigned to it by the Council.

3. Tripp Commons shall be a lounge, reading and study room, private to men, except for such special functions as may be assigned to it by the Council.

4. The Rathskeller floor shall be private to men as before, and a grill or coffee type of food service added as rapidly as feasible.

5. The Refectory shall be open for longer hours and provide a lunch and soda fountain refreshment service for men and women.

1. The food service on the ground floor of Lathrop Hall to be abandoned, releasing the present kitchen and lunch room for Physical Education locker space, the possibilities of tea service on the main Parlor floor to be studied by Mr. D. L. Halverson and reported later.

2. One room on the main Parlor floor of Lathrop Hall to be allocated to the <u>Women's Physical Education Department</u> with the understanding that this Department furnish this room with game equipment and maintain it for the use of all university women.

Upon motion of Regent Waters, seconded by Regent Sholts, the recommendations were adopted.

Upon motion of Regent Callahan, seconded by Regent Berger, it was voted that H. W. Kircher, of Sheboygan, be appointed member of the Board of Visitors to succeed himself, for the term ending July 1, 1933.

Upon recommendation of President Frank, it was voted that Chapter IV of the By-Laws relative to fees in the graduate school be amended to read as follows: 34- Lavra mended FRES

"In general, graduate students are required during the regular year to pay the same fees as are undergraduates, with the following exceptions: (a) regular graduate fellows and scholars are exempt from the non-resident tuition fee only; (b) honorary fellows and scholars are exempt from both the non-resident tuition fee and the general or incidental fee; (c) (instructors and (graduate assistants) are exempt from the non-resident tuition fee and from laboratory fees in courses taken in the departments in which they hold appointments.

"The following classes of graduate students who are candidates for higher degrees shall be entitled to exemption from the non-resident tuition fee but shall pay such other Higher nes pres to pay other basis f fees as may be required of graduate students who hold no officlal appointment: members of the teaching, and research staffs of the University, graduate fellows, graduate scholars, members of the State Geological and Natural History Survey, members of the technical staff of the Forest Products Laboratory, staff members of the United States Department of Agriculture stationed at the University and engaged in research, technical experts employed in any department of the state government, and officers of the United States Army detailed as students by proper authority. However, when any such person shall have paid to the University as a graduate student seven semester or summer session fees, he shall be exempt from further payment of general fees or summer session fees. In the administration of this rule, one, but only one, nine-week summer session fee or its equivalent may be counted as two of the seven fees above mentioned; also, the full amount of any prescribed fee shall be charged.

> "Graduate students who are not residents of the state and who are not members of the University staff of instruction or research and who in any semester pursue studies in amount less than half the normal amount, may have their fees prorated in proportion to the amount of such study upon securing the recommendation of the Dean of the Graduate School to the Registrar that the case comes under this rule and that he regards it as one of more than common merit. However, the prorated fee shall not be less in amount than the general fee for the semester."

The following appreciation of Mary Clark Brittingham who died on Wednesday, June 19, 1929, was presented by Regent Olbrich and unanimously adopted by the Regents. The Secretary was instructed to include it in the records of this meeting and to forward a copy to the relatives.

The Regents of the University of Wisconsin testify to their conviction that this institution had no more cherished daughter, no more loyal and devoted official, no more outstanding friend and benefactress than Mary Clark Brittingham. She personified the conviction that ability carries with it a proportionate social responsibility. She had a sense of trusteeship toward the wealth, material and spiritual, with which she had been endowed; and her social accounting was not a niggardly dedication of a minimum of what she had. Her benefactions were not the mere surrender of superfluous possessions that had ceased to have a savor, which sometimes passes for philanthropy. Her giving possessed that divine quality of giving her self. She achieved the spiritual paradox of doubling her own happiness by dividing it. She did much for this University, and did it with a sunny radiance of gracious generosity that multiplied the mere material value of her gifts a hundredfold. Her abounding goodness thus bestowed evokes a sense of gratitude deepseated and abiding. So, with a sense of pride in the thought that she was one of Wisconsin's own, so great that it almost surmounts the sadness of farewell, we place of record this, our tribute to her worth and womanhood.
