Upon motion made and properly seconded, it was
VOTED, That the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board of Regents
of the University of Wisconsin System held on July 14, 1978, be approved as
sent out to the Regents.

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REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

President Hales introduced Mr. James N. Elliott, the newest member of
the Board of Regents. President Hales noted that Mr. Elliott is the President
of the Wisconsin Board of Vocational, Technical and Adult Education, and is also
President of the Milwaukee Building and Construction Trades Council. President
Hales welcomed Mr. Elliott to the Board.

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President Hales introduced Dr. Edward Penson, the new Chancellor at the
University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh.

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Regent Erdman moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion
was seconded by Regent Beckwith:

That Chapter IV, Section 3 of the By-Laws be amended by deleting the
word "pronouns" and substituting "words chairman," so that the Section
would read:

The words chairman, he, him, and his, as used through-
out these By-Laws are to be taken as nondescriptive
with regard to sex of the incumbent of the position
being described.

President Hales noted that at the last meeting there was some discussion relative to the use of the word "Chairman" in the By-Laws and there was some discussion concerning whether or not some clarification should be made. Regent DeBardeleben stated there was some discussion three or four years ago as to whether or not the word "chairman" should not be replaced by a neutral word such as "chair" or "chairperson" or something of that order, and it was voted down. He said it appeared to him that this has the same infirmity as the situation it is trying to correct and suggested we use a word which is non-descriptive so far as sex is concerned. He said he was going to vote against the resolution.

Regent Barkla stated she agreed with Regent DeBardeleben's sentiments and was also going to vote against the resolution. Regent Lavine stated he was the person who introduced the proposal to use "chair" or "chairperson" a few years ago and the motion was defeated. He said he was going to vote against the proposed resolution because he felt the Board's feelings have changed and there is general sentiment to look at using the word "chairperson". Regent Erdman said she was going to vote for the resolution because she hated to see the English language ruined and we would be in a foolish kind of inconsistency constantly.

The question was put on the proposed resolution and it failed on a roll call vote, with Regents Beckwith, Elliott, Erdman, Fish, Hales, and Neshek voting "Aye" (6) with Regents Barkla, DeBardeleben, Fitzgerald, Grover, Lavine, Lawton Thompson, and Walter voting "No" (8), and with Regents Gerrard and McNamara absent (2).

President Hales referred to the report of the July 18, 1978, Wisconsin Board of Vocational, Technical and Adult Education meeting (attached as EXHIBIT A). There was no discussion of the report.

President Hales referred to the report of the Higher Educational Aids Board meeting held on July 28, 1978 (attached as EXHIBIT B). Regent Walter inquired as to the opposition to the Work/Study Program. Regent Grover responded that the opposition basically came from the Executive Secretary of the Higher Educational Aids Board, who felt that the kind of workload that you create through a program such as was proposed would put other kinds of people out of work and deprive them of opportunities. Senior Vice President Donald Smith stated that in our discussions with HEAB the question of whether or not Work/Study should be linked exclusively to federal need standards, and whether or not it can also be broadened to include educational consideration of placement of people in work opportunities, has been one of our basic disagreements with the HEAB staff. President Young stated he was misrepresented in the discussions by suggesting that we recommended no limit on family income for people on the work program. He said we were recommending a higher one than HEAB wanted, but we suggested a \$25,000 family income limit, which two weeks later was adopted by the federal government as its standard. He said that as he gets around the state and talks with Legislators and others, he found there is a great deal of sympathy for the Work/Study program. He said he did not know how the particular new issue of taking jobs away from other people had been raised, but before he suggested the program he had discussed it with leaders of various labor groups and they were supportive of the idea. He said unless he got a clear direction not to, he would bring the subject up in the budget. Regent Grover stated he felt there is great public reception for the concept and he had no

problems selling that in the Legislature and hoped that the University would go ahead and do its thing. Regent Lavine stated all the Regent members of the HEAB were not present and the vote was close. He said he did not feel the matter got the kind of full airing in terms of discussion it should have and it would seem appropriate that we would go back and look at it in that form as well.

President Hales noted that the Association of Governing Boards will be meeting in Chicago on October 30-31, 1978, and any Regents planning to attend should notify the Secretary of the Board.

Regent Grover moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1725: WHEREAS, C. Philip Johnson of Darien served simultaneously as an ex officio member of the Board of Regents and as president of the State Board of Vocational, Technical and Adult Education from November 1976 to July 1978, and

WHEREAS, he brought to the Board of Regents and its Physical Planning Committee valuable experience, knowledge and judgment gained in farming and business and as a member of the VTAE Board and the Wisconsin Higher Educational Aids Board, and

WHEREAS, he gave high priority to developing and maintaining good relationships between the Vocational-Technical System and the University of Wisconsin System,

BE IT RESOLVED, that the members of this board commend and thank C. Philip Johnson for his contributions to higher education in Wisconsin.

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REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE SYSTEM.

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1726: That the Report of Non-Personnel Actions by Administrative Officers to the Board of Regents and Informational Items Reported for the Regent Record be received for the record; and that actions included in the report be approved, ratified, and confirmed. (EXHIBIT C, attached)

President Young reported that preliminary figures indicate that we have approximately 1,000 more students than we had a year ago and the final enrollment will bring it anywhere from 1400 to 2,000 more than the total enrollment for the 1977-78 fall, very close to the projected enrollment of 148,600 students. He stated that the System enrollment is not declining in number, and, in fact, has been rising, and we have been taking thousands of students with very little extra money to pay for their education, and this will continue for another two or three years, and then reach a plateau.

President Young reported that he had attended a conference at Wingspread in Racine, Wisconsin, on the previous day sponsored by the University of California System to discuss the implications of the Bakke decision. He stated that he had been asked to talk about the position of the University of Wisconsin System and what it meant to us. He said he hoped that he represented the Board accurately when he suggested that we had not expected the Bakke decision to make any difference to us because we had a firm direction from both the Legislature and the Regents to continue to bring people into the System who have been outside or alienated, and to bring people who have been culturally and economically deprived, and we were going ahead with that program. He noted that we are ahead of our goal in this matter in the medicine and law fields, we are not doing quite as well as we expected in other areas, but we have set a very high target for ourselves. President Young reported that a member of the press asked, "How do you explain what is happening in Wisconsin?", which gave him a great opportunity to explain that Wisconsin is a very special place, and then he told them about the advanced opportunity grants. He noted that the Regents asked for the money and the Legislature appropriated funds to provide opportunities for graduate students who are not necessarily residents of the State of Wisconsin. He continued that there seemed to be a good deal of amazement that we were going along our way and not running into opposition.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The report of the Education Committee was presented by Regent Lawton.

Regent Lawton reported that there had been a special presentation in the Committee meeting on the previous day by UW-Superior on University and Cooperative (with UW Extension) Outreach by Dr. O. Gayle Manion and the Extended Degree Program by Dr. Sue Desmonde.

He said Dr. Manion described the organization and activities of the Center for Continuing Education, drawing particular attention to the provision of off-campus extension courses, field services, and adult continuing education programs. These activities, often presented in cooperation with other UW institutions, UW-Extension, vocational schools, and County Extension personnel, have experienced dramatic growth during the last year, now serving a total of more than 12,000 students in a 21-county area. Regent Lawton stated Dr. Desmonde discussed the UW-Superior Extended Degree (Individually Designed Major) program dealing with the following major topics:

1. What type of student can use the Extended Degree Program?
2. What is the Individually Designed Major?
3. What are the advantages and disadvantages?
4. How do the students meet university degree requirements?

During the question period following the presentations, Committee members appeared to be especially interested in the account, given by Dr. Manion, of the procedures followed before off-campus courses are offered in the service areas of other universities, the effects of the Extended Degree and other Outreach programs upon traditional campus-based instruction, and the growth of programs serving non-traditional students.

Regent Lawton reported that Attorneys John Tallman, System Administration, and David Hansen, Attorney General's Office, joined the Committee for discussion of the Residence Determination for Tuition Purposes. Regent Lawton reported discussion dealt with questions of due process, informing students of their due process rights, and the appeals procedures available to them, establishing a set of affirmations stating what appeals procedures each institution must minimally provide, and the need for a System review mechanism beyond the campus level. He said the Committee was not unanimous in their enthusiasm for the proposed resolution. There was concern about the student's due process rights, concern about protecting the state from soft decisions on residency, and a neutral attitude. He said suggestions of a higher level of appeals was brought up and may deserve discussion at this time. He said there appeared to be agreement that guidelines for residence tuition decisions should provide for the initial resident/non-resident determination to be made at the campus level, the provision of a campus review procedure, and a review mechanism established at the System level to assure uniform and equitable application of the law throughout the System. The fact that the resident/non-resident decision has no direct fiscal impact upon particular campuses was suggested as an additional justification for establishing policy which would insure uniformity. Information from the Inventory of Existing Procedures was cited as indicating a lack of uniformity among the decisions currently being made at the various institutions. There was also concern expressed that, so far as possible, decisions should be made at the campus level.

He stated Vice President Smith suggested that System Administration undertake a systematic audit of appeal cases and appeal procedures across the System to elicit what information may exist of discrepant judgments and inconsistent processes as a basis for determining whether to proceed with additions to the appeal procedures. His suggestion received a favorable reaction and a timetable of the proposed audit, expected to extend over the next 12 to 15 months, will be reported to the Committee and the full Board. Regent Erdman noted there was no mention of participation by UW-LaCrosse and yet the Committee had indicated they had done a complete inventory of all the institutions within the System. Attorney John Tallman advised that the UW-LaCrosse had been part of the team and that it was an inadvertent omission.

Regent Lawton moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1727: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System, and pursuant to authority vested in the Board of Regents by Sec. 36.27 WIS. STATS., authority be delegated to each Chancellor or his/her designee to make final decisions concerning the residence classification of students for tuition purposes.

Regent Lawton moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine:

Resolution 1728: That the entitlement to plan the Bachelor of Liberal Studies Program at UW-Oshkosh be approved with the understanding that the entitlement will be brought forward in October for final program approval.

Regent Erdman inquired what entitlement to plan now means in the light of this resolution. She noted the material says that UW-Oshkosh has over the past two years been developing a plan for a new major. She said it was her understanding that entitlements to plan meant the Board of Regents approved a planning process in each of the institutions, and if Oshkosh can go ahead over a two-year period and come up with a plan, and then come up with the order that we have not only to approve the entitlement to plan as a matter of procedure, and then ask us to approve the program so that it can be implemented this coming semester, isn't this making a mockery of the entire entitlement to plan procedure? Regent Lawton stated there had been a conversation with Vice President Smith concerning this matter. He said he was fed up to the eyeballs with being rushed into decisions by the bureaucracy because the federal government gave a grant and it is due October 1, and we have to pass on it right now.

Senior Vice President Smith stated the relationship between entitlement to plan and the final decision on the program has only begun to reach maturity in the past year. When we started out six years ago we did not have the entitlement to plan process and in the first two or three years of our review program nearly all of our programs were brought forward on a regular schedule. Exceptions to the time table were much more frequent than the observance of the timetable. He said we established an entitlement to plan process to regularize that and for the most part it has become an effective process which brings nearly all of our proposals in in a reasonable sequence. However, the time differential between the entitlement to plan and the final decision on the program is going to remain quite discrepant because some of the entitlements have been granted for programs which will not be brought forward for four years because of institutional fiscal requirements, prior requirements on the faculty and what not. In this particular case and probably for some cases in the future, you are going into a dramatically different sort of format with weekend seminars, late evening seminars, and you have a very serious issue at the campus level as to whether or not the program is going to be viable, whether or not the faculty is going to be aboard, whether or not there is sufficient potential in the faculty development processes to create both the curricular materials and resources to enable the approval process required at the campus level even before they seek entitlement to plan to be completed and to enable us to make a relevant judgment as to whether or not this is the kind of program that ought to be built into the array provided by the University and the System. He said we expect the occurrences of this sort to be very infrequent, but on the other hand we were struck by the fact that the institution had gone through an extensive period of faculty development and an extensive period of internal interaction to satisfy itself that it had a viable program--that the program was responsive to a couple of the most important priorities in the System. One is, how are we going to in the future provide better service to adults in terms of degree opportunities, and particularly how are we going to free up those opportunities so that they are available on weekends and evenings in a way which provides equitable progress toward a degree. He said he did not have any particular enthusiasm for short circuiting, but on the other hand he had a total enthusiasm for the prospect we should not allow our own

bureaucratic procedures to stand in the way of culmination and implementation of a program which in our judgment at this time is going to meet all of the requirements for implementation, and he had said from the beginning if we hit unusual cases, which he hoped would be infrequent, they ought to be brought forward. That was the reason for moving in this out-of-cycle manner.

Regent DeBardeleben stated that Vice President President Smith's remarks gave another reason why we should abolish the entitlement to plan concept and procedure. He said it is really an entitlement to think and does lead to unnecessary bureaucratization. He said he felt there is a need for a review of the entire procedure. Senior Vice President Smith stated we agreed in the Education Committee that we will be bringing forward a revision of ACIS-1, which will incorporate some proposals and will affect in an as yet undetermined way the entitlement to plan process. He said we still have very great differences of opinion throughout the System as exactly what is the optimal way to conduct these related processes and relate them to the Board. He said it looks as though we are not going to be able to reach consensus, but we will bring forward a proposal and lay before the Board the issues that are relevant. He said we hope to do that this Fall, before the end of the Fall term. Regent Lavine said that at least between Regent DeBardeleben and himself, there are two perspectives. Some of us saw a tremendous waste of energy on the part of campuses spending vast amounts of the most valuable thing we have--time, planning programs which have no chance of going anywhere because they were apparent somewhere else in the System and that the timing was inappropriate or otherwise. He said we have put a brake on looking at programs-- a brake that is not easy in a System of this size. He said some of us have real questions that it should be done away with.

President Hales said that when some of the members of the Board met with the Legislative leadership they were told about the entitlement to plan procedure and they were quite impressed that we had a handle on what was going on in terms of new programming; so we should keep that in mind if we consider seriously abandoning this kind of plan.

Regent Neshek said that this was also a significant part of the Legislative Audit Bureau review, and they seemed impressed with it. Regent DeBardeleben observed that all of these are good arguments for abolishing it.

The question was put on Resolution 1728, and it was voted.

Regent Lawton reported that the Committee next considered the first reading on the following academic program proposals:

Regent Lawton reported Regent Fitzgerald questioned the UW-Milwaukee proposal for the MS-Criminal Justice Program referring to its likely adverse effect upon enrollments in existing Bachelor's degree programs at Platteville, Oshkosh, and Eau Claire. Vice President Smith supported the proposal noting

that it conforms to definitive advice regarding Criminal Justice programming provided by an external consultant (Professor Donald Newman - State University of New York) after visiting all of the System programs. He reported the consultant's advice emphasized the importance of the availability of students desiring the program as well as practical, clinical experience, and observation of opportunities available in the metropolitan area, among other points. He reported Dr. Smith noted that the proposed program will be oriented to the baccalaureate programs currently existing throughout the state. Regent Lawton reported that Regent DeBardeleben commented briefly to suggest it is not appropriate for Board members, as non-academicians, to be called upon to approve or not approve, academic programs. He said Dr. Smith responded, noting the beneficial effects of the rigorous review process to which new program proposals are subjected. He explained that the integrity of that review process is enhanced by the public defense of System recommendations which Board approval necessitates.

Regent Erdman stated there was not discussion of the other programs within the System. When we were given a tour yesterday of the Superior Campus, the Admissions Counselor who guided the group said that Superior was the only institution in the System which had a Master's in Computer Science or Applied Computer Systems. If we are going to approve new program proposals, in which we have another institution not too far away offering the same major, it would be a piece of information that she felt the Regents should have so that we can more fully evaluate the missions of each of the schools. Senior Vice President Smith stated the BFA in Film is unique, the MS in Criminal Justice is unique, the Managerial Accounting programs are indicated as programs of which there is one other in the System, and the Human Services and Hospitality and Tourism are obviously unique. He said the Computer Program, which was discussed at inordinate length yesterday, is based on the report that we brought to the Board on our planning for undergraduate computing majors, and in that report we indicated our belief that computing had become sufficiently integral to the intellectual processes of life in America, and the academic life in America, so that it was entirely defensible to say that in every institution with sufficient faculty and equipment resources, it is quite appropriate for that institution to go ahead for development of an undergraduate major, but in order to maximize opportunity within the System, we would like those majors, insofar as possible, to have distinguishing features or distinctive features about them--for example, the one at River Falls follows one of the models which we have proposed and about which we are quite enthusiastic, which is to bring together relevant faculty resources in business, and in the case of River Falls in Agriculture and in the Mathematics Department to set up what is in effect a core faculty which in an interdisciplinary sense can provide a reputable applied computer science program which will be maximally effective, not only in the preparation of a limited number of majors, but in the preparation of people in the College of Education in Business and in Agriculture. He said that in our planning report we are no longer asking the question do we have too many programs, but whether or not this particular program has the relevant resources to be a good quality program and whether or not it has been designed to maximize the effectiveness of it in that entire institution in ways which we hope will not simply replicate a kind of program that might be available elsewhere in the System, but will have some distinctive character in its curriculum and some distinctive nature for students who might have particular kinds of interest. He said that in terms of systemwide planning we are no longer treating the question of duplication in quite the same mode that we would have treated it for example if someone else were to propose a Master of Science in Criminal Justice or if we were to have another proposal come forward on Managerial Accounting at some particular point in time. He said this was part of our planning study on Computer Science, which was a very extensive study, and it is one that we have discussed before with the Board.

Regent Lavine noted that the consultant's report that was done for the System and the Board was first-rate and it appeared that the members who have come on the Board since the reports were made should have these reports made available to them. He suggested that the Secretary's Office make available to the Board members copies of studies relevant to these matters as they arise. Senior Vice President Smith said he felt that is an excellent suggestion and that rather than bundling them and sending them we should send them seriatim as they become relevant.

Regent Beckwith stated he was not very pleased with the title of MS in Hospitality and Tourism--it is not a title he would strive for and there should be a better way to describe it in a more academic manner. He said he was not sure he could evaluate the content, but would hope it would be a little better than hospitality. He said he was not clear of the content of the BS in Human Services other than it being an opportunity for an adult to get a Bachelor's degree. Senior Vice President Smith stated it is not a unique degree nationally--it has ample precedent across the country and the logic behind it is rather compelling. He said that in the forecasting of the changing nature of our society almost all the demographers, sociologists, futurologists and what-not say that an increasing segment of our society is going to be involved in one of a variety of human services. This is about the only thing the futurologists are able to agree on; so when we talk about future careers and future opportunities in terms of what will expand and what will be static, the human services area is the one clearly that is unsaturated and likely to expand and it is the one that has been expanding. If you look at the disposition of the Universities in response to this kind of phenomenon we have gone through and are still in the process of, degree fractionization-- you see that as new categories in human services emerge, there is a very strong tendency for us to have the particular kind of baccalaureate degree linked to that particular career begin to develop and multiply across the nation, and their number is incredible at the present time. There is a counter-opportunity to faculty, which is to try to begin to find the linkages, the conceptual and intellectual linkages between a grouping of career opportunities and to bring together a more generic kind of degree in which you can consolidate your teaching resources and you can share the opportunities for particular kinds of course work among people who are doing a whole variety of different things, all of which are linked by this concept that they are forms of human services. He said, as a result, most of the universities that have moved toward this undergraduate degree in human services see it as a very strong counter-movement to continuous fractionization of the curriculum, that it improves the intellectual quality of the degree by moving toward a broader intellectual base of what is common in the learning of these several areas, rather than what is technical and particular to each of the areas. He said it is therefore a desirable kind of movement.

Regent Lawton moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardleben, and it was voted:

Resolution 1729: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of UW-Oshkosh, UW-Oshkosh is authorized to recruit for a Dean of the College of Nursing.

Regent Lawton moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 1730: That, upon recommendation of the President of the UW System and the Chancellor of UW-Milwaukee, UW-Milwaukee is authorized to recruit for a Dean of the School of Social Welfare.

Regent Hales requested involvement in the above selection.

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REPORT OF THE BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

The report of the Business and Finance Committee was presented by Regent Grover.

Regent Grover reported that in the Committee meeting on the previous day Vice President Lorenz called attention to the gift of \$255,500 from Kelab, Inc., representing the net income from the Hilldale Shopping Center, and contributions from the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation in excess of \$4,000,000. He reported that student aid receipts are presently \$3,000,000 greater than a comparable time last year, but it is anticipated that this will drop off somewhat and that receipts for this year will be about \$2,000,000 higher than last year.

Regent Grover moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Walter, and it was voted:

Resolution 1731: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System, the gifts, grants and contracts presented at this meeting (copy filed with the papers of this meeting) be accepted, approved, ratified and confirmed; and that, where signature authority has not been previously delegated, appropriate officers be authorized to sign agreements.

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Regent Grover stated that the late Alma B. Campbell bequeathed \$10,000 plus a portion of the residue of her estate to the University of Wisconsin-Superior, without restriction. He stated that it is anticipated that the bequests will total approximately \$13,000.

Regent Grover moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Walter, and it was voted:

Resolution 1732: That the bequest of the late Alma B. Campbell, La Grange Park, Illinois, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Alma B. Campbell, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Superior.

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Regent Grover reported that the late Emma Nelson, Racine, Wisconsin, bequeathed 5% of the residue of her estate to the University of Wisconsin-Madison for cancer research. The bequest is estimated at approximately \$4,800.

Regent Grover moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Walter, and it was voted:

Resolution 1733: That the bequest of the late Emma Nelson, Racine, Wisconsin, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Emma Nelson, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Regent Grover reported that the late Marie Smyth, Mauston, Wisconsin, bequeathed 3% of the residue of her estate to the McArdle Institute for Cancer Research. He reported that the bequest is estimated at \$9,000.

Regent Grover moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1734: That the bequest of the late Marie Smyth, Mauston, Wisconsin, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Marie Smyth, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Regent Grover stated that Vice President Lorenz presented a progress report on the study of selective reduction of nonresident tuition. Although a proposal containing firm recommendations will not be presented to the Committee until a later meeting, he did review several of the alternatives which are presently being considered. Included are (1) reinstating the one course remission for fully employed individuals, (2) basing nonresident fees on the variable cost per student instead of the total cost per student; and (3) instituting a partial or a full remission or reduction at universities with excess capacity, selecting one or two as the site of pilot studies. Regent Grover stated that the discussions and study by System staff will continue, culminating in a document containing several alternatives for future consideration. He emphasized that a System recommendation is to be completed in time to be included in the System's biennial budget request.

Regent Grover reported that extension of University Faculty Association Insurance Program to the staff of all institutions was given a first reading at the Committee meeting on the previous day and will be brought back for action next month. He said it was felt there had not been sufficient opportunity for the faculty who would be affected by the proposal to become aware of it or to react to it. It will be discussed by representatives of TAUWF as well as by the several faculty senates so that positions can be made known to the Committee prior to a vote.

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REPORT OF THE PHYSICAL PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The report of the Physical Planning and Development Committee was presented by Regent Barkla.

Regent Barkla reported that the concept and budget report for the Weeks Hall Energy Conservation Modifications Project at UW-Madison provides for the implementation of energy-saving modifications to the mechanical and electrical systems and the building envelope. The annual operating cost is estimated to be reduced from \$248,000 to \$96,000, or a savings of \$152,000 per year, which represents a pay-back period of 3.3 years. She reported that the concept and budget report for the Library Learning Center Project at UW-Stout requests approval of a budget increase of \$685,900 to the budget provided by the Legislature of \$6,287,000 and is primarily related to the need for more pilings than originally estimated, increased special equipment costs, and the delay in planning the project due to the Bureau of Facilities Management being required to bid for the architectural services for this project. This latter item accounted for \$400,000 of the budget increase.

Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was properly seconded, and it was voted:

Resolution 1735: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Madison and UW-Stout Chancellors and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the concept and budget reports for the following projects be approved and authority be granted to plan, bid and construct at the cost and from the funding source indicated:

UW-Madison

- (1) Weeks Hall Energy Conservation Modifications Project (\$503,000 - State Building Trust Funds - 1977-78 Energy Conservation Allocation - GPR)

UW-Stout

- (2) Library Learning Center Project (\$6,972,900 - General Obligation Bonding - GPR)

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Regent Barkla reported that the Committee next considered the request for approval of plans for remodeling/new construction at the UW Center-Waukesha County by Waukesha County. The Regents previously requested in the 1977-79

Capital Budget \$350,000 (of which the Legislature provided \$293,000) to equip the project, if it is approved for construction. Regent Barkla stated that the building project is primarily to satisfy the academic facility needs of the Center, based on an enrollment of 1,260 FTE. The enrollment in the fall of 1977 was 1,302 FTE and 1,733 head count. She noted that the Waukesha County Center is the largest in the Center System and is located in an area where it may be anticipated that current enrollment levels could be maintained. Regent Barkla noted that Regent Fish had worked quite closely with the people of Waukesha County and we are all quite pleased with the results of that work.

Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Fish, and it was voted:

Resolution 1736: That, upon the recommendation of the UW Center System Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the plans and specifications for the remodeling and new construction at the UW Center - Waukesha County of the UW Center System be approved, with the understanding that the project may be constructed in accordance with the preliminary plans and specifications, without further approval of the Board of Regents.

Regent Barkla stated that the easement for street purposes at UW-River Falls is needed to allow the City of River Falls to make minor street modifications at the corner of Third and Spruce Streets, adjacent to North Hall, to improve safety at this location.

Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek, and it was voted:

Resolution 1737: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-River Falls Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the President or Vice President and Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to execute an easement to the City of River Falls for the purpose of making street modifications at the corner of Third and Spruce Streets to improve safety at this intersection.

The legal description of the easement is as follows:

Part of Outlot 157 of the Amended Assessor's Plat of the City of River Falls, Pierce County, Wisconsin, described as follows: beginning at the Northeast corner of said Outlot 157; thence West 13' along the North line of said Outlot 157; thence Southeasterly to a point on the East line of said Outlot 157 which is 45' South of the point of beginning; thence North 45' along said East line of Outlot 157 to the point of beginning.

The grantee agrees to complete and maintain the modifications without cost to the grantor.

Regent Barkla stated that the next resolution requests a reduction in the scope and budget increase of the Pathological Waste Destructor project, UW-Madison. She said it is a request to provide for a minor increase in the budget and to allow the deletion of several items to be incorporated into other projects.

Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was properly seconded, and it was voted:

Resolution 1738: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Madison Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authorization be granted to reduce the scope and increase the budget for the Pathological Waste Destructor project by an additional \$9518 Residual Bonding Authority, for a revised total project cost of \$653,458 (GPR).

Regent Barkla stated that the next resolution is a request for approval of purchasing additional land for the Schmeckle Reserve at UW-Stevens Point. The two ten-acre parcels involved are located contiguous to the major land element of the Schmeckle Reserve and were included in the original program for the development of the Reserve. The purchase would be supported by 50% federal LAWCON funds and 50% land acquisition funds in the State Building Trust Fund. Purchase of the two parcels was previously urged by representatives of the Higher Education Subcommittee of the State Building Commission and in discussions with members of the Physical Planning and Development Committee. Regent approval of the actual purchase would be required.

Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek:

Resolution 1739: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Stevens Point Acting Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authority be granted to proceed to acquire two parcels of land as additions to the Schmeckle Reserve at UW-Stevens Point and to request Heritage Conservation and Recreation Service funding support (LAWCON).

Regent DeBardleben inquired how much state money will be involved and was advised by Vice President Winter that we have not negotiated as of this time, but it is estimated at \$60-70,000. Regent DeBardleben inquired as to the background of the Schmeckle Reserve. Vice President Winter stated that the Schmeckle Reserve is approximately 220 acres located on the north end of the campus. The land was originally acquired for academic purposes, but it is no longer needed for that and is now used primarily as an arboretum as well as a recreation area. Regent DeBardleben stated that as he understood it, this land is located adjacent to the Sentry Insurance Company's new complex and questioned whether we have as much interest in this as Sentry Insurance does. He said he was interested in knowing what properties were contiguous to it and what use we're going to make of the land if we are going to spend \$50- to \$60,000 of State money on it. Regent Fish pointed out that the actual purchase request will come back to the Regents and, therefore, this is in effect an enabling resolution for application for LAWCON funds. Mary Williams, Executive Secretary to the

Chancellor, UW-Stevens Point, said there was no agreement or persuasion by Sentry Insurance for the University to ask for approval of the purchase of this property. She said the two pieces of land which are owned privately are a kind of island in the middle of the Schmeckle Reserve area, and they are in a desirable location from the standpoint of anyone who might want to come in and buy them for commercial use and build something on it which would not be in keeping with the natural wildlife area. She said this request is for an opportunity to appraise the land and then proceed with negotiation--it is not asking for permission to buy. Regent DeBardeleben said the problem with this justification for persuading us to vote in the affirmative is that if you are going to negotiate for something, it implies that at least in principle the concept has been approved, and we will be told the next time it comes up that we don't have to give too much consideration to this because we have already approved it. He said he was not prepared to vote on that kind of premise at all.

The question was put on Resolution 1739, and it was voted, with Regent DeBardeleben voting "No".

Regent Barkla stated that the next resolution relates to the exchange of two University-owned properties on Fourth Avenue for two parcels located on Fifth Avenue in Stevens Point to provide for the future vacation of Fifth Avenue, the title to be transferred to the University. The vacated street area represents .8 acre, and it is planned that the site will be developed for parking.

Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Lawton:

Resolution 1740: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Stevens Point Acting Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authorization be granted to exchange Lot 15 for Lot 4 and Lot 16 for Lot 1, all in Block 3 of T. Helmski and Others Addition to the City of Stevens Point.

Regent DeBardeleben inquired what relationship this land exchange has to the long-term plan of development of the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point. Vice President Winter stated that System Administration will be coming to the Board with a formal request in October or November asking approval of the plan as it has been developed at the campus level. Regent Fish said that in the campus plan all of the land involved is in the campus boundary. What we are doing is pushing two pieces away from us and two pieces toward us which would facilitate parking at the University. He said he felt it is a good trade and there is no money involved in the trade. He pointed out that the owners of the land being traded to the University will benefit because they will have two better lots, facing on a residential street, and we will have two better lots because our lots will be facing University dormitories where we need the space. Regent DeBardeleben inquired if it is likely that in the future we are going to want the two lots we are trading away, and are we worsening our bargaining position as far as the future is concerned. Regent Fish stated that it would appear unlikely that we would want the lots being traded away as they are off the boundary. Regent DeBardeleben inquired if the lots we are giving up are

a part of the long-term plan for the UW-Stevens Point campus. Regent Fish stated they are not in the plan envisioned now but maybe next month the envisioning will be a little different. He said he understood Regent DeBardeleben's position, and it is a valid one, and he did not want to deceive him by saying the University will never want the property, but it does not appear it would want the properties at this stage, at least, and certainly the lots that we would be getting are far more desirable from our standpoint. He said that if at some time in the future we do want the two lots being traded away, they would be more expensive to buy at that time. Ms. Mary Williams pointed out that the Building Commission had asked that we sell land that is not in use for academic purposes. The lots in question were put for bid at one point, and the bids were so low that they were rejected.

The question was put on Resolution 1740, and it was voted, with Regent DeBardeleben voting "No".

Regent Barkla noted that King Hall, on the UW-Madison campus, was constructed in 1894 and has received only minimal remodeling since that time. The proposed remodeling is intended to meet the current requirements for the instruction and research programs in the Soils Sciences Department of the College of Agricultural and Life Sciences. A similar request was included in the 1977-79 Capital Budget request but was deleted by the State Building Commission. Approval of funds for advance planning and design would provide an opportunity to refine the construction costs based on actual plans as well as reduce the cost of construction by allowing an earlier construction date. Regent Barkla stated that the second request is for the allotment of \$157,000 in place of the \$56,500 figure included in the advance materials for preparation of a concept and budget report and the development of preliminary plans for the 1979-81 Plant Science/Agricultural Engineering Addition and Remodeling of Plant Sciences Project at UW-Madison. The Regents previously authorized advance planning for a \$13,607,000 Plant Sciences project in the 1977-79 Capital Budget. This project is a reduction in scope due primarily to the remodeling and utilization of existing space in lieu of new construction. System Administration feels that this construction/remodeling of the present Horticulture/Agronomy Building and the Agricultural Engineering Shops Building will create a Plant Sciences Center which will appropriately house the function of the departments concerned for the foreseeable future.

Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Elliott:

Resolution 1741: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Madison Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authorization be granted to request the release of advance planning funds for the preparation of concept and budget reports and to develop preliminary plans for 1979-81 biennium major project requests, in the amounts and from the funding sources indicated:

\$37,000 of State Building Trust Funds (Advance Planning Allocation) - GPR to prepare a concept and budget report and to develop preliminary plans for a 1979-81 King Hall Remodeling project at UW-Madison

(Continued)

\$157,000 of State Building Trust Funds (Advance Planning Allocation) - GPR to prepare a concept and budget report for a 1979-81 Plant Sciences/Agricultural Engineering Additions and Remodeling project at UW-Madison

Regent Walter inquired as to the reason for the change from \$56,000 to \$157,000. Vice President Winter stated that the first figure was submitted by the Bureau of Facilities Management, but after further checking it was determined that 2% of the total project cost was necessary to go through the preliminary plans stage.

The question was put on Resolution 1741, and it was voted.

Regent Barkla stated that the request in item (1) of the next resolution was necessitated by flooding of the chiller mechanical room caused by the failure of an expansion joint on the chiller piping of the centralized chiller at Eau Claire. Part of the cost may be covered by insurance. Regent DeBardeleben inquired if the insurance is provided by ourselves or are we talking about making a claim against the manufacturer. Vice President Winter responded that it may be covered by a policy that we have, and the matter is being investigated. Regent Barkla stated that in order to determine where the defect occurred, the equipment has to be torn down, but in the meantime we have to go ahead with the repair work.

Regent Barkla stated that item (2) covers the installation of economizers for the boilers and chimney to allow the extraction of more heat from the stack gasses and has a 23-month payback period.

Item (3) covers the repair of roofs on four buildings at Charmany Farms located in Madison.

Item (4) at Milwaukee is for a sprinkler system code violation corrections project in the Kenilworth Building. In response to Regent Lavine's question, Regent Barkla stated that the building was conforming at the time we received it in a gift and that as a result of change in occupancy and use we have become in violation of the city building code.

With respect to item (5) Regent Barkla pointed out that the project has a 4½-month payback period on fuel savings.

With respect to items (6) and (7) at UW-Oshkosh, Regent Barkla pointed out that the temperature control and ventilation modifications project has an estimated payback period of 2.9 years.

Item (8) at Platteville involves eight residence halls and two food service buildings, and the estimated payback period for the project is 2.85 years. Item (9) at Platteville provides for repairs to the Karrmann Library Plaza to eliminate leaks in eight identifiable separate locations.

Projects (10), (11), and (12) at UW-Stout relate to projects to repair cracks which have been discovered in the chimney of the central heating plant, above the sections which were repaired and reinforced with steel bands in 1974. The second project is a 170-space permanent peripheral parking area to replace the 178 spaces which will be lost due to the construction of the new Library

Learning Center. The third project provides for energy conservation modifications to the Communications Center with a payback period of 4 years, 1 month.

Items (13) and (14) relating to roof repairs are particularly disturbing as they request replacement of roofs previously reroofed in 1969 and 1971.

Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Elliott:

Resolution 1742:

That, upon the recommendation of the individual university Chancellors and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authorization be granted to plan, bid and construct the following minor projects, at the cost and from the funding source indicated:

- (1) Chiller Equipment Repairs Project (\$34,980 - [\$25,787 - State Building Trust Funds - GPR and \$9,193 - Program Revenues - Facilities Reserves - Non GPR], UW-Eau Claire
- (2) Walnut Street Heating/Chilling Plant Economizers Project (\$200,600 - State Building Trust Funds - Energy Conservation Funds - GPR), UW-Madison
- (3) Four Charmany Farms Buildings Roof Repair Project (\$61,260 - State Building Trust Funds - GPR), UW-Madison
- (4) Kenilworth Building Sprinkler System Code Violation Corrections (\$127,000 - State Building Trust Funds - GPR), UW-Milwaukee
- (5) Three Boilers Tube Acid Cleaning Project (\$30,000 - State Building Trust Funds - Energy Conservation Funds - GPR), UW-Milwaukee
- (6) Clemans Residence Hall Roof Repair Project (\$17,450 - Program Revenues - Residence Halls Reserves - Non-GPR Funds), UW-Oshkosh
- (7) Temperature Controls and Ventilation Modifications (\$169,300 - Program Revenues - Residence Halls and Student Center Reserves - Non-GPR), UW-Oshkosh
- (8) Temperature Controls and Ventilation Modifications (\$109,500 - Program Revenues - Residence Halls and Student Center Reserves - Non-GPR Funds), UW-Platteville
- (9) Karrmann Library Plaza Repair Project (\$20,400 - State Building Trust Funds - GPR Funds), UW-Platteville
- (10) Heating Plant Chimney Repairs Project (\$17,000 - State Building Trust Funds - GPR Funds), UW-Stout
- (11) Northeast Campus Parking Area Project (\$137,000 - Program Revenues - Parking Receipts - Non-GPR Funds), UW-Stout
- (12) Communications Center Energy Conservation Project (\$21,000 - State Building Trust Funds - Energy Conservation Funds - GPR), UW-Stout
- (13) Baker/Salisbury Winther Halls Roof Repair Project (\$133,500 - State Building Trust Funds - GPR Funds), UW-Whitewater
- (14) Fischer Residence Hall Roof Repair Project (\$30,600 - Program Revenues - Residence Halls Reserves - Non-GPR Funds), UW-Whitewater

President Hales noted that the total of the projects above comes to \$1,109,590 and suggested that in the future the resolution should indicate the total amount involved. Regent Lavine observed that we apparently have no guarantees that roofs will last longer than eight or nine years. Regent Fish stated that we have to understand that with the total number of buildings that we have, there is no way that we are going to have Regent meetings without having to consider roof repairs. He said what disturbed the Committee the most was the number of new buildings with roof failures. He said it did not bother him to approve roofing repairs on buildings that are thirty years old, but the six or seven-year-old roofs and in some cases three and four-year-old roof repairs were very disturbing. He recalled that the Committee had met with a roofing contractor whose roof repair services were satisfactory, and that is where the discussions relative to bid procedures were aired. He said we are convinced we can save money in the long run by getting better roofs, but being forced to live with the present bidding procedures is not working out very well. He noted we complained a number of years ago about the type of roof construction that we are using--the so-called new-type roof construction, which has failed badly, and we have talked about using the old techniques of a built-up fiberboard roof in order to get some stability in the roof. Regent Lavine inquired if we have leeway from the Building Commission over the specifications for roofs. Regent Fish responded that we have a little leeway but not much. He said the members of the Committee have been consulting with the Bureau of Facilities Management to try to resolve some of these problems. Regent Lavine inquired if we want better roofs, do we have the leeway to tell the architect what we want. Vice President Winter responded that the authority for the construction program is vested in the Bureau of Facilities Management. Regent Erdman stated that she felt it would be well that a bonding arrangement be required of the contractor or the architect which would place responsibility where it belongs so that we are not left paying all the bills. Regent Fish pointed out that in many cases we have had roofs that were bonded, but the company went out of business prior to the time they were called upon to replace a defective roof. He noted that a roof bond is a warranty by the applicator that he will repair defects, but if he is out of business, he cannot make it right.

Regent Lavine noted that we are the largest real estate and building landlord in the State of Wisconsin--we have an expert staff that are telling the Physical Planning Committee that the specifications that are set for us give us roofs that are inadequate. He said he could not believe that the Bureau of Facilities Management cannot be persuaded that the experience of the largest landlord in something that is not working ought to be paid attention to. Regent DeBardeleben inquired if there is any reason why we should not insist that roofing contractors provide bonds by a surety company or insurance company that is going to be in business. He said we should have a bond that means something and should not be accepting bonds from people who are essentially fly-by-nights. Regent Fish stated that the trouble arises when the roof has failed and you try to collect on it. The roofing company claims that the problem is from a failure of the product, and the manufacturer of the product claims that it is the failure of our architect to design the roof right, resulting in difficulty in placing responsibility. He said that he did not know that such surety bonds are possible, but the matter would be looked into as he felt it is a good idea. He continued that the first problem in many cases is the roof design--a flat deck always lends itself to more problems than a sharper-pitched roof. He said another problem is concerned with the type of

materials used, especially where they have used the so-called soft boards that were very popular some seven, eight or nine years ago. He said most people in the industry did not believe they would last, and they were right. Regent Fish said a third problem is workmanship in two ways, one when you hot-pitch a roof by turning up the heat--when the inspector comes around to test the heat, and the tar is supposed to be of a certain consistency when it goes on--but everyone suspects that some of the roofers turn up the thermostat a little as soon as the inspector is gone, because they will get more coverage out of their tar, and it will go on faster and it will also leak more quickly. He pointed out that application is done at times when the weather is not perfect and that if roofs are applied in such times, the odds are that we are going to have problems.

The question was put on Resolution 1742, and it was voted.

Regent Barkla stated that the development plan for the UW-La Crosse was deferred at the request of Regent Gerrard to allow him to be present when it is discussed. She reported that the UW-Superior development plan was presented by Chancellor Meyer and his staff and represents a reduction in the boundaries from those previously approved by the Regents. She stated that this is due to the construction of the Wisconsin Indianhead Technical Institute instructional facilities south of the Gates Physical Education Building and the acquisition of the parking lot located directly north of the Gates Physical Education Building. The area currently underutilized in the south campus area is planned to be developed for recreation, playing fields, and arboretum. The boundaries identified in the plan are considered to be adequate to accommodate the needs of UW-Superior for the foreseeable future. Regent Barkla said that the major problems pointed out by Chancellor Meyer were: (1) Financial difficulties in funding the cost of a roof replacement project on the newest portion of the Rothwell Student Center building. He indicated the need to explore the possibility of using GPR funds to finance the cost of this roof replacement rather than passing the cost on to the students. The building was paid for by student segregated fees, and the administration is attempting to find another source of funding. (2) The Department of Administration has requested that the campus consider releasing part of the south campus land for use by the State Department of Transportation for an office building, garage, and storage areas. She reported that it was the consensus of the Committee that this issue should first be explored with the City as the land has a reversion clause which provides that if the land is used for purposes other than education, the title would revert to the City of Superior. She reported that he also indicated that the proposed use by the State Department of Transportation is contrary to plans recently approved by the City of Superior and the University for this area. (3) Existing space of facilities at UW-Superior does not match current needs, and, therefore, requests have been submitted for remodeling some of the areas to correct this imbalance.

Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was properly seconded:

Resolution 1743: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Superior Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Campus Development Plan, as updated, be approved to document physical facilities and campus boundaries for UW-Superior.

Regent DeBardleben noted that the resolution reads "the plan be approved to document physical facilities and campus boundaries" and asked if that meant that it is being approved to confirm campus boundaries. Regent Barkla responded in the affirmative.

The question was put on Resolution 1743, and it was voted.

Regent Barkla stated that the Committee received a report on the joint meeting of representatives of the Regents' Physical Planning and Development Committee (attended by Regent Gerrard and herself) and the Higher Education Subcommittee of the State Building Commission. She reported that the information requested by the Building Commission will be transmitted to them at an early date.

Regent Barkla reported that the Committee reviewed the report on UW System Energy Consumption and Energy Conservation Programs in 1977-78. She stated that the report very adequately presents the System's experience by university for this past fiscal year and the Committee has nothing additional to report on this item.

Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Elliott:

Resolution 1744: That, upon the recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authority be granted to amend the lease for space occupied by System Administration in the Monroe Building, 1920-1930 Monroe Street, Madison

926 additional square feet of space at 1920-1930 Monroe Street for the period October 15, 1978 through June 30, 1979, with an option to renew for two additional one-year periods

In response to Regent DeBardleben's question, Regent Barkla stated that the cost for the original space was \$6.31 per square foot, and for the additional space the cost is \$7 per square foot, including utilities.

The question was put on Resolution 1744, and it was voted.

Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was properly seconded, and it was voted:

Resolution 1745: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Madison, UW-Milwaukee and UW-Whitewater Chancellors and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authorization be granted to plan, bid and construct the following minor projects, at the cost and from the funding source indicated:

Vilas Communication Hall Roof Repair Project (\$122,200 - State Building Trust Funds - Unprogrammed Surplus - GPR)

Regent Barkla moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was properly seconded:

That, upon the recommendation of the UW-La Crosse Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authorization be granted to purchase a 0.05 acre parcel of land at UW-La Crosse, more specifically described as:

North 54 feet of Lot 7, Block 1, Anderson and Edwards Addition (also known as 510 North 16th Street), City of La Crosse

at a cost of \$29,000 from Land Acquisition Funds (GPR).

Regent Beckwith called attention to the price of \$29,000 for .05 acre of land. Regent Barkla stated that there is a house on the property; it is not just for the bare land, and it is located in the middle of the La Crosse campus. Regent DeBardeleben stated that it appears to be a rather unusable piece of land and inquired of its value to the owner. Regent Fish stated that the house on the property is occupied, but he would assume that the owner has neither the room nor the legal authority to make any repairs of any consequence in it. He agreed that although this is a very high price for a small lot of land, it is an isolated piece all by itself, and for the appraised figure of \$29,000 we could wipe out the island in the campus. Regent Erdman noted that it might be appropriate to wait until the Chairman of the Physical Planning

Committee is present and can answer some of the questions, since he is an expert in this field and there does not appear to be any special rush in approving the resolution. Regent DeBardleben stated that it appeared this is a real bonanza for the person who owns the property, and he did not feel that we should act on it today. He said the idea of an appraisal did not impress him as an appraisal should be based to some extent on comparables and he could not imagine that there is a comparable property in the City of La Crosse. He said he felt that the appraisal is probably influenced inordinately by the amount of money that the seller would like to get for this property. He said we have been getting along all this time without it and he felt we should defer the matter. With the consent of the maker of the motion and of the second, the resolution was withdrawn and is to be presented at the next meeting.

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MISCELLANEOUS RESOLUTIONS

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Barkla, and it was voted:

Resolution 1746: WHEREAS, the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System met at the University of Wisconsin-Superior Campus on September 7-8, 1978, and

WHEREAS, the visiting Regents, Central Administration, Chancellors, spouses, and staffs were impressed with the Campus, programs, hospitality and friendliness,

NOW, THEREFORE, the Board of Regents extends its deep gratitude and appreciation to the students, administrative staff and faculty of the University of Wisconsin-Superior; to Marge Meyer, and especially to Chancellor Karl Meyer.

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UNFINISHED AND MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

Regent DeBardleben requested a brief report on the implications, if any, on the proposed new School of Veterinary Science of the freeze on employing new staff. President Young stated he felt we must explore with the administration further the interpretations of the Governor's freeze on positions. He said there are some areas that are unclear to us and he did not believe we can say that these additional positions will be automatically granted, nor can we say they will be denied. He said we are calling a meeting with the Governor, and in the meantime we are going ahead with the planning because we believe that planning was mandated by the Legislature. Regent Erdman requested that the report also address the question raised by the report of the American Veterinary Association in which they predicted that within ten years there would be a surplus of 9,000 veterinarians in the country. Senior Vice President Smith stated that we will have Dr. Easterday available to discuss the entire matter with the members of the Board. He has written an extensive report and should personally discuss the matter with the Board.

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Regent Lavine moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was properly seconded, and it was voted, with Regents Barkla, Beckwith, DeBardleben, Elliott, Erdman, Fish, Fitzgerald, Grover, Hales, Lavine, Lawton, Neshek, Thompson and Walter voting "Aye" (14), and with Regents Gerrard and McNamara absent (2):

Resolution 1747: That in accordance with section 19.85(1)(g), WIS. STATS., a closed session be held to confer with legal counsel.

The meeting recessed into closed session at 11:25 A.M.

The Board arose from closed session at 1:10 P.M. and announced that no action had been taken.

The meeting adjourned at 1:10 P.M.

The Wisconsin Board of Vocational, Technical and Adult Education met at their offices in Madison on July 18, 1978. This report summarizes the agenda items I believe to be of major interest to the UW System.

Election of Officers

In accordance with the Bylaws of the WBVTAE, the July meeting is the annual meeting and officers of the Board shall be elected for terms of one year. The officers are president and vice president.

Mr. James N. Elliott was elected president. He is president of the Milwaukee Building and Construction Trades Council. He will serve as an ex-officio member of the UW Board of Regents. Mrs. Ardie A. Halyard was elected vice president.

Report of the State Director

Director Lehrmann reported on the status of several items of legislation of interest to vocational education. Of particular interest was the appropriations bill for Federal Funds for Vocational Education. A copy is attached for your information.

District Board Appointments

State statutes require that the WBVTAE approve representation plans and district board membership, in cases where there is not unanimous agreement on appointments at the district level. Seven districts had problems to resolve and an open hearing was held by the WBVTAE on July 11. July 18 the State Board considered issues in the following districts: Blackhawk, Lakeshore, Milwaukee Area, District One, District Four, Waukesha County Area, and Western Wisconsin. The State Board generally supported the majority votes of the district boards with the notable exception of District Four (Dane County) where the board retained a current district board member, Mr. Thomas, by a vote of 5 to 3.

District Descriptions

Each year the State Director is required to submit a legal description of each of the 16 districts to the Department of Internal Revenue. These descriptions may be of interest to you and thus are included with this report.

EXHIBIT A

Interstate Reciprocal Agreement

The Gateway District Board, on June 29, 1978, approved a reciprocal agreement with College of Lake County, Illinois which allows transfer of certain course credit and students between the institutions.

This proposal was approved by the State Board with the stipulation that the Director's office work with the participants to revise some parts of the agreement and clarify the language.

The UW System is interested in the impact of this agreement since the College of Lake County offers college transfer credit course work. The UW System Office of Academic Affairs is working with the WBVTAE Director's office at this time to clarify any concerns the UW System might have.

Nursing Education

It was recommended and approved that the moratorium on Associate Degree Nursing Programs be removed. This action was recommended by the Committee for the Statewide Study of Nursing and Nursing Education. The UW System moratorium on new baccalaureate programs should continue for the time being. The Study Committee letter is attached for your information.

Western District Health Center

The Western District was granted permission to borrow money to finance its share of a student health center to be constructed in a joint agreement with the UW-La Crosse.

SUBJECT: HEAB Meeting of July 28, 1978

The Higher Educational Aids Board met in Madison on July 28, 1978. Regent member Herbert Grover was present.

Report of the Executive Secretary

Mr. Jung reported that to date, all but \$200,000 of the Wisconsin Student Loan Revenue bonds had been sold at a net interest cost of 6.62%. The Board was informed of the Governor's Budget Priorities for 1979-81 which include additional property tax relief, tax reform and control of government growth. He also reported that the Governor's position had been implemented. Of the 106.5 positions authorized to HEAB under the freeze, 82 full time and 40 limited term employees were currently on the payroll. In response to Regent Grover's inquiry, Mr. Jung indicated the effort of the position freeze will require that position increases needed in revenue producing areas will come at a cost to other areas.

Goals and Objectives Report

A report on Goals and Objectives was added to the agenda. Ms. Kaplan asked why HEAB would be considering a Sallie Mae servicing contract indicating her concern about the rapid growth rate of HEAB. Mr. Jung reported that the contract would allow the Board to service loans private lenders had sold to Sallie Mae. This would be financially beneficial to the Lender Servicing program of HEAB. Mr. Jung indicated it would be a top priority for HEAB to stand outside audit of its administration for the next 17 years.

Election of Officers

Election of HEAB officers for 1978-79 was held and unanimous ballots were cast in favor of Mr. Jerry Madison as Chairman, Mr. John Geilfuss as Vice Chairman and Ms. Esther Kaplan as Secretary.

The Board concurred in the Chairman's appointment of Mr. Don Satran, Mr. Philip Johnson and Mr. Herbert Grover to join the officers on the Executive Committee. Ms. Janet Jenkins, Mr. Richard Sawicki and Mr. John Lavine as Chairman were named to the Personnel Committee.

Report of the Council on Financial Aids

Ms. Kaplan requested that the report of the Council on Financial Aids, which had been mailed directly to Board members by the Council Chairman, be placed on the agenda. She commented that she believed it was statutorily the Council's purpose to discuss relevant matters and make recommendations to the Board prior to the Board meeting and that the Council had a legitimate complaint that they had been asked to review materials without having adequate time to consider them.

The Board voted not to place the report on the agenda after Mr. Jung pointed out that the Board had established the requirement that staff review and comment on all actions taken by the Council prior to Board consideration of the Council's Report.

1979-81 Biennial Budget - Programmatic Budget Decision Issues

The Board was asked to consider a series of budget decision issues dealing with student support programs. At the October meeting the Board will be asked to concentrate on administrative aspects of the 1979-81 budget request. Prior to Board consideration of student support issues, the staff presented background reports on the current federal scene, program participation by various income groups and future enrollment trends.

Wisconsin Tuition Grant-Maximum Grant

The staff recommended that the Board request that the "maximum grant for the Tuition Grant program be set annually at the level of the instructional subsidy paid on behalf of students enrolled at UW-Madison." The estimated fiscal impact is \$1,644,000 in 1979-80 and \$2,100,000 in 1980-81. The Board tabled until the October meeting the substitute recommendation by Mr. Grover and Mr. Johnson that the maximum tuition grant be directly related to the Consumer Price Index. Mr. Grover had testified that it was inappropriate to base the Tuition Grant maximum on student fees which were set by the institution and not by the Legislature and that it seemed more rational to base any increase on changes in the Consumer Price Index.

Mr. Johnson reminded the Board that the Legislature had rejected the staff proposal before on two occasions. Thus, it would seem reasonable to base it on an index.

Wisconsin Tuition Grant-Program Eligibility

The Board approved the staff recommendation that an amendment in the program eligibility requirement of the Tuition Grant program be sought which would extend program eligibility to students enrolled at least half-time for a period not to exceed 10 semesters. The estimated fiscal impact is \$82,200 in 1979-80 and \$105,000 in 1980-81.

Wisconsin Tuition Grant-Institutional Eligibility

The Board heard a presentation by Mr. Robert Diaz representing the Wisconsin Council for Independent Education. He addressed the Board regarding Tuition Grant eligibility for students attending proprietary institutions. The Board approved a motion by Mr. Geilfuss that no recommendation on the matter be made.

Wisconsin Higher Education Grant-Estimation Process

The Board approved the staff recommendation that a sum sufficient appropriation be sought for funding the WHEG program and that specific equity levels and percentages be offered as limiting factors.

Wisconsin Higher Education Grant-Maximum Grant

The staff recommended that the Board request an increase in the maximum WHEG grant to \$1800. Following suggestions by Board members that all grant maximums be tied to the Consumer Price Index or some other inflationary index, the Board approved a motion which recommended that the maximum grant be linked to some index of inflation.

Wisconsin Higher Education Grant- Length of TIP Eligibility

The staff recommended that the Board seek additional funding for the Talent Incentive Program to allow a phase-in of extended program eligibility beginning in the second year of the biennium. The estimated fiscal effect was \$530,000 in 1980-81. Discussion by Board members indicated there were concerns about inconsistency between the recommendation and the purpose of TIP and the lack of information on reasons for drop out of students. The Board approved a motion by Mr. Geilfuss that eligibility not be extended.

Indian Student Assistance Program-Maximum Grant

The staff recommended that the Board seek an increase in the maximum Indian Student Assistance Grant equal to the maximum BEOG grant, expected to be \$1800. The estimated cost is \$100,000 in 1979-80 and \$110,000 in 1980-81.

The motion by Ms. Kaplan to increase the maximum grant to some index of inflation was tabled until the October meeting on a motion by Mr. Grover.

Mr. Grover indicated that he questioned the need for an increase in the maximum grant amount as he was aware that with all other grants some \$6,000 to \$7,000 in grant aid is available to Indian students. He requested more information.

State Direct Student Loan-Revenue Bond Authority

The Board approved the staff recommendation that a request for an additional \$20 million in revenue bond authority be sought for student loans and also to use revenue bond proceeds to purchase guaranteed student loans made by private lenders.

Health Professions Student Loans

The Board approved a staff recommendation that HEAB seek establishment of a direct state loan program for health professions students guaranteed under the federal Health Education Assistance loan program and funded by a special student loan revenue bond issue.

State Work-Study Program

The Board considered but defeated on a 6 to 5 vote the motion to approve the staff recommendation that HEAB include a request for "a pilot state-funded work-study program in the 1979-81 Biennial Budget Request." The recommended funding level for the request was \$1,500,000 in 1979-80 and \$2,000,000 in 1980-81.

Mr. Jung explained that the recommendation was included because of institutional requests. Mr. George, Financial Aid Officer, University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point, suggested the amount requested was conservative and recommended more funding. Mr. Douma, Financial Aid Officer, University of Wisconsin-Madison, noted the Council on Financial Aids was interested in providing opportunity for students who are interested in work-study as an alternative to loans.

Contract for Dental Education-Level of Support

The Board approved the staff recommendation that HEAB request the adoption of a funding formula for the Dental Contract with Marquette University and that the Board set specific funding levels at its October meeting.

Illinois-Wisconsin VTAE Reciprocity Agreement

The proposed Illinois-Wisconsin VTAE Reciprocity Agreement was reviewed relative to concerns of UW staff and a substitute recommendation was offered by Mr. Johnson. The Board concurred with the VTAE reciprocity agreement with the understanding that, under the terms of the agreement, Wisconsin residents are not able to enroll in courses offered by the College of Lake County which are intended for college transfer.

Establishment of Educational Information Center Program

The Board approved on a split vote the staff recommendation for a "Plan to Plan for the Establishment of an Educational Information Center Program." Mr. Johnson suggested that the Board table consideration of the proposal until they had time to study it. Ms. Kaplan was concerned that the plan called for three additional positions in light of the Governor's freeze on positions. Mr. Jung commented that the EIC program was a high priority with the Governor, thus reducing the likelihood of a problem resulting because of the freeze. He further indicated that the application could be authorized now and if the Board chose to, it could be withdrawn in October.
