#### REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS

Madison, Wisconsin

Saturday, April 28, 1945, 9 A.M.

President Hodgkins presiding

PRESENT: Regents Callahan, Cleary, Grady, Hodgkins, Holmes, Jones, Kleczka,

Sensenbrenner, Werner

ABSENT: Regent Campbell

At the request of the Secretary Recommendation No. 2 under Letters and Science, adopted by the Regents on March 21, 1945, was amended by striking out the following words in the first and second lines "beginning with the academic year 1944-45" and substituting therefor "beginning with the academic year 1945-46". Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Sensenbrenner, it was

VOTED, That the minutes of the postponed regular meeting of the Board held on March 21, 1945, be approved as amended.

#### RECOLMENDATIONS OF THE PRESIDENT

- Administration and General -
- 1. That the following actions by the faculty be approved:
  - (a) The revised curriculum for the course in occupational therapy and the establishment of the course in the School of Education as shown in EXHIBIT A, attached.

Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Sensenbrenner, recommendation No 1 (a) under Administration and General was adopted.

(b) The changes in the requirements concerning the transfer of students to the Law School as candidates for the Letters and Science degree as follows:

(Gen. Ann. of Courses 42-44, p. 55, paragraph 8)

Candidates for the B.A. or Ph.B. degree may count toward either of these degrees certain credits earned in the Law School, providing their elections outside the college have been confined to that school. If they have completely satisfied the conditions specified in paragraphs (a) and (b) above, a maximum of 26 30 credits may be counted. If, however, they were admitted to the Law School without having met all the specific requirements of paragraph (a), the maximum is 15 credits, and such students must earn at least 40 credits acceptable toward their degree in residence in this college.

(p. 56, paragraph 2)
Students transferring to the Law School under these provisions may credit not to exceed twenty-six thirty law credits as free electives toward their B.A. or Ph.B. degree, provided, however, that they secure at least thirty-fear thirty credits in residence at this University in regular Letters and Science courses, and take no other work for credit by correspondence or under the Twenty Credits Rule.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Kleczka, recommendation No. 1 (b) under Administration and General was adopted.

#### - Business and Finance -

- 1. That the fund 26 budget for free University Extension instruction for Wisconsin citizens serving in the Armed Forces be increased \$1,714, making a total of \$16,714 for the fiscal year 1945-46.

  Adopted.
- 2. That the President be authorized to file an application with the Navy Department for the establishment of a Naval Reserve Officers Training Corps Unit at the University of Wisconsin. (Confirming oral approval by the Executive Committee) Adopted.

  Adopted.
- 3. That the Director of Business and Finance be authorized to sign releases of claims against the United States arising under or by virtue of Article 1 (Commissioning Expense) of Contract NOd 3103 and Contract NOp 175. (Confirming approval by the Executive Committee)

  Adopted.
- 4. That the gift of \$1,000 from the Wisconsin Alumni Club of Milwaukee to establish the Wisconsin Alumni Club of Milwaukee Scholarship Loan Fund be accepted and that authority be granted to accept additions to the fund from time to time. The fund shall be administered in accordance with the following conditions which have been established by the Wisconsin Alumni Club of Milwaukee:
  - (a) Loans are to be available to men and women.
  - (b) Students must reside in Milwaukee county or adjoining counties.

(c) Loans are available to Juniors and Seniors only.

- (d) Student must be or have been partially or wholly self-supporting.
- (e) Students must have at least a 1.5 grade point average based on all courses taken.
- (f) Maximum loan per student shall not exceed \$100.00 for any one school year.

(g) No student may be loaned more than \$200.00. (h) Interest rate shall be not less than 3%. (i) Duration of the loan shall be at the discretion of the Faculty Committee on Loans and Undergraduate Scholarships.

(j) All loans should be made upon the recommendations of the Faculty Committee on Loans and Undergraduate Scholarships. Collection of these loans shall be under authority of the Regents' Office.

(k) The manager of the student loans, Administration Building, shall give the Wisconsin Alumni Club of Milwaukee a statement as of May 1st showing all outstanding loans and the amount of funds available for future loans. This report is to be presented at the May meeting of the Wisconsin Alumni Club of Milwaukee.

Adopted.

- That the agreement for the twelve month period, March 1, 1945 to February 28, 1946, covering the sub-lease of 14 acres of land operated by the Department of Public Welfare, the land to be used in the hybrid corn breeding project, at \$30.00 an acre, total \$420.00, be approved; charge to 3-K fands, and that the Director of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the agreement. Adopted.
- That S. Lee Burns be appointed Director of Residence Halls with the rank of Assistant Professor of Residence Halls Administration, effective May 1, 1945, without change in salary for the balance of the 1944-45 fiscal year; this appointment to fill the vacancy created by the appointment of D. L. Halverson to the position of Associate Director of Business and Finance. Adopted.
- 7. That upon the recommendation of Dean Fowlkes, authority be granted to conduct a four week Sports Session from May 28 to June 23 in the Department of Physical Education for Women and that the student fee for the session be established at \$26, including the infirmary and union fees. Adopted
- That the Director of Business and Finance be authorized to sign agreements with Johnson & Johnson of Argentina and Johnson and Johnson of Brazil for a grantin-aid to provide funds for a study concerning the biochemistry and pharmacology of digitalis glucosides during the period from April 1, 1945 to April 1, 1946. The total grant is \$6,000 and the study is to be carried on under the direction of Dr. Harold C. Bradley and Dr. Edgar J. Witzemann of the Department of Physiological Chemistry. (Confirming approval of the Executive Committee) Adopted .

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Werner, recommendations 1 to 8 under Business and Finance were adopted.

#### - Letters and Science -

That the appointment of John M. Gaus, professor of political science, be changed to full time from April 23, 1945 to the close of the academic year 1944-45; salary \$861.11 for the period; charge to L & S balances. Adopted.

- 2. That Llewellyn E. Pfankuchen, professor of political science, be granted leave of absence, without pay, from April 21, 1945 to the close of the academic year 1944-45, p. 43.

  Adopted.
- 3. That John T. Salter, associate professor of political science, be granted leave of absence, without pay, from April 30, 1945 to the close of the academic year 1944-45, p. 43.

  Adopted.

Upon motion of Regent Callahan, seconded by Regent Kleczka, recommendations 1 to 3 under Letters and Science were adopted.

#### - Agriculture -

1. That the resignation of Isaac W. Rupel, associate professor of dairy husbandry, be accepted to take effect at the close of the academic year 1944-45, p. 84. Adopted.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Cleary, recommendation No. 1 under Agriculture was adopted.

Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Sensenbrenner, recommendations 1 and 2 under Degrees were adopted.

#### - Gifts and Grants -

- 1. That the following gifts and grants be approved:
- (a) \$ 1,000.00 E. I. duPont de Nemours & Co., Wilmington, Delaware, for the renewal of the post-graduate fellowship in chemistry for the period June 1945 to June 1946.
- (b) 1,000.00 E. I. duPont de Nemours & Co., Wilmington, Delaware, for the establishment of a fellowship in chemical engineering for the period June 1945 to June 1946.
- (c) 3,500.00 The Nutrition Foundation, Inc., New York, for the annual renewal of the grant entitled "relation of nutrition to dental caries in the monkey", on July 1 of the years 1945-6-7, and that the Director of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the agreement.
- (d) 6,000.00 Johnson & Johnson, Argentina, and Johnson and Johnson, Sao
  Paulo, Brazil, for a study to be carried on in the Department of Physiological Chemistry; (See recommendation #8,
  Business and Finance.) and that the Director of Business and
  Finance be authorized to sign the agreements.
- (e) 3,850.00 National Cheese Institute, Inc., for the continuation of industrial fellowship No. 4 to study the methods of sampling and analyzing cheese until April 1, 1946, in the department of dairy industry, and that the Director of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the agreement.
- (f) 4,200.00 National Dairy Council for the continuation of the fourth industrial fellowship to carry on a study of the influence of dietary fat on growth and the micro-flora of the intestinal tract of rats, for 12 months, beginning July 1, 1945, in the departments of biochemistry and agricultural bacteriology, and that the Director of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the agreement.
- (g) 2,000.00 National Dairy Council, for the renewal of the fifth industrial fellowship to carry on the studies on the relationship between the nicotinic acid content of milk and its antipellagra activities, for 12 months, beginning July 1, 1945, in the department of biochemistry, and that the Director of

Business and Finance be authorized to sign the agreement.

- (h) \$ 1,250.00 Commercial Solvents, Terre Haute, Indiana, for the establishment of a research fellowship to carry on the study of the importance of biotin, folic acid, and related compounds in poultry nutrition, for 12 months, beginning July 1, 1945, in the department of biochemistry, and that the Director of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the agreement.
- (i) 3,750.00 The Rockefeller Foundation, New York City, for researches in immuno-genetics in the department of genetics, for 12 months, beginning July 1, 1945.
- (j) 6,000.00 The Rockefeller Foundation, New York City, for researches in vitamins and related substances to be carried on in the department of biochemistry for the period July 1, 1945 to June 30, 1947.
- (k) 10,000.00 H. V. Kaltenborn, New York City, for the creation of a scholar-ship trust fund, the income from the fund to be used to provide an annual scholarship to assist deserving students of junior standing or above in the pursuit of education and training in some phase of radio broadcasting, with particular emphasis whenever possible on training for the presentation of news and news analysis.
- (1). 1,000.00 Wisconsin Alumni Club of Milwaukee, for the establishment of the Wisconsin Alumni Club of Milwaukee Loan Fund. (See recommendation #4, Business and Finance.)
- (m) 2,500.00 Schlitz Foundation, Milwaukee, for scholarships for teachers during the 1945 summer session who will be members of the Curriculum Workshop.
- (n) 300.00 American Foundation for Pharmaceutical Education for addition to scholarships for the academic year 1945-46 for capable students in the School of Pharmacy who need financial help and encouragement.
- (o) 10.00 Lieutenant J. A. Sipfle, U.S.N.R., A.P.O. 500, San Francisco, contribution to be credited to funds available for the purchase of equipment or for the construction of buildings.
- (p) 100.00 Addition to the Gertrude E. Slaughter fund in the School of Music.

Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Kleczka, recommendation No. 1 (a) to (p) was adopted.

Dean Elwell was called into the meeting and presented a plan for a Summer School for Bankers sponsored by the Wisconsin Bankers Association, the first term to run from August 20, 1945 to September 1, 1945, at which forty students would be

enrolled, the course to be completed in three years, when a certificate will be issued, this to be similar to the Rutgers plan. The usual plan of registration and payment of fees through the University offices will be followed. Upon motion of Regent Callahan, seconded by Regent Jones, the plan was approved.

Upon motion of Regent Sensenbrenner, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the actions taken by the President since the March 21, 1945, meeting of the Board be approved and made a part of the records of this meeting.

President Fred called attention to a communication from Fred J. Kelly, Chief of the Division of Higher Education, regarding the Office of Defense Transportation regulations relating to educational gatherings and a communication from Frank Perrin, Secretary of the War Committee on Conventions, limiting the attendance of out-of-town persons to fifty at commencement and graduation exercises. Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Cleary, it was

VOTED, That the University comply with the regulations of the Office of Defense Transportation; that commencement exercises be held in the Field House at the time originally scheduled, namely the morning of May 26; that no invitations or admission tickets be issued; that commencement be advertised as a local affair, but it is understood that if parents of seniors are in Madison anyway, they may attend

the ceremonies.

The Director of Business and Finance reported that the Navy Department has notified the University that as a result of a change in service requirements for radiomen, it has been determined that no further trainees will be assigned to the University of Wisconsin after the class entering on April 30, 1945, and that the radio school contract will be discontinued upon the graduation of that class on or about September 17, 1945. He also reported that the Navy has notified the University that the official quota of V-12 engineering students assigned to the University of Wisconsin for the academic term beginning on July 1, 1945, is 325 and that the minimum number of trainees for which the University will be compensated is 293. He stated further that a communication had been received from General G. C. Marshall of Washington requesting that Army ROTC be continued on the campus after the war.

The Director of Business and Finance reported that the Executive Committee, by mail vote, had authorized the President to fixe an application for the establishment of a Naval Reserve Officers Training Corps unit at the University of Wisconsin and that the application was sent to the Navy Department on April 11, 1945.

The Director of Business and Finance reported that the University would be allotted up to 500 army reservists, beginning July 1, 1945. Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Sensenbrenner, it was

VOTED, That the plan for army reservists be approved.

President Fred presented a report from Registrar Merriman with reference to registration - copies were distributed to the Regents. Following a discussion of this report and upon recommendation of President Fred, and upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Kleczka, the following recommendations were adopted:

- (1) That the administration be authorized to establish such procedures relating to enrollment and housing as may be necessary to provide educational opportunities to students in the following order of priority:
  - (a) Wisconsin residents, including veterans
  - (b) Veterans from other states
  - (c) Non-veterans from other states
- (2) That the recommendation of the Administrative Committee to move the last date for cancellation of room reservations without forfeit of deposit from September 1 to July 1 be approved.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Grady, it was VOTED, That the administration be authorized to proceed with plans for establishing a central Housing Bureau under the general supervision of the Director of Business and Finance.

President Fred discussed the Theta Chi case. Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Werner, it was

VOTED, That the testimony in this case be referred to the Regent Committee on Welfare and Student Life (Regents Grady, Campbell, Holmes), this committee to meet with the two committees of the faculty that have previously heard the case.

President Fred distributed to the Regents a report on student-veterans at the University of Wisconsin prepared by the office of the Personnel Council.

President Fred presented the names of the following persons recommended and approved by the faculty to receive honorary degrees at the 1945 Commencement:

Edward J. Dempsey - Doctor of Laws

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Werner, adopted.

The Director of Business and Finance stated that the budget would not be ready at the time of the annual meeting and advised the Regents that it would be necessary to have a special budget meeting in June 1945.

The Director of Business and Finance reported that the Racine College property would not be available until after Labor Day and that since extensive alterations are necessary, the instructional program cannot be started until the opening of the second semester of 1945-46.

ELL

Upon recommendation of the Director of Business and Finance, and upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Werner, it was

VOTED, That \$200 be transferred from unbudgeted balances to the Office of the Dean of Women to provide for additional clerical help on the housing problem.

The Secretary reported that the amount of donations in the Halpin Hall Fund at the present time amounted to \$21,105.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, Chairman of the Committee on Constructional Development, and seconded by Regent Sensenbrenner, the following action was taken:

That the action of the Board of Regents of February 15, 1945, authorizing the chairman of the Campus Planning Commission to appoint a committee to visit other institutions, be amended to read as follows:

That the Chairman of the Campus Planning Commission be authorized to appoint such committees as in his judgment are necessary to visit other institutions for the purpose of obtaining first-hand information with respect to building features that will be helpful to the State Architect and those associated with him in the preparation of plans for structures on this campus, the membership of each committee to be limited to not more than five persons; the expenses of these committees to be paid from the sum of \$1500 which has been allotted for this purpose.

Regent Jones stated that a meeting of the Constructional Development Committee would be held at the close of this Board meeting.

The meeting adjourned at 10:05 A.M.

## Revised Curriculum for the Course in Occupational Therapy

Leading to the Degree of Bachelor of Science (Occupational Therapy)

A four-year course, leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science (Occupational Therapy), is hereby authorized in the School of Laucation. For entrance to this course a student must satisfy the general admission requirements of the University. The course is under the joint control of the Schools of Education and Medicine, and the physician in charge of the Division of Physical Medicine is adviser to these students.

The curriculum requirements are the completion of 124 credits and at least 124 grade points, the subjects meeting the following requirements. No one is to be advanced to the junior year unless she has a grade point average of 1.3.

The requirements for this course are as follows:

English-6 credits in freshman composition

Science—20 credits to include at least one course in each of the following subjects: physics, zoology, anatomy, physiology, kinesiology.

Psychology-10 credits

Foreign language—14 credits to be earned in college, not more than 8 of which may be in a first year college course; or intermediate knowledge in one foreign language as disclosed by an attainment examination.

Sociology—3 credits Speech—2 credits

Technical training—37 credits to be earned in the Departments of Art Education, Physical Education, and Home Economics, and to include courses in creative design, major arts and crafts, minor crafts, first aid, and therapeutic, recreational, and physical activities for hospital patients.

Occupational therapy—12 credits - theory and practice, to include studies in surgery, medicine, neurology, communicable diseases, theory of Occupational Therapy and supervised clinical practice.

Electives--20 credits

This course is to be followed by 36 weeks of clinical training in the following types of hospitals:
