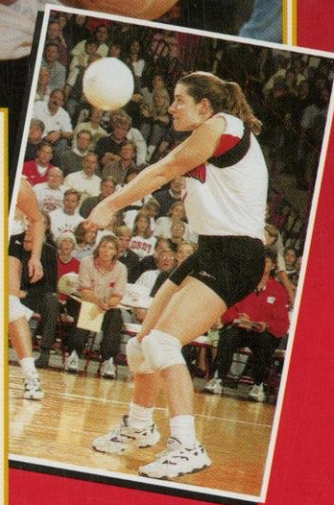
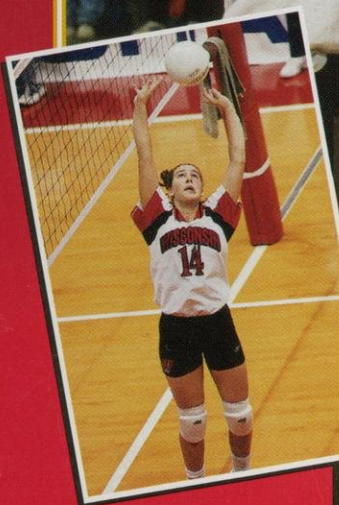
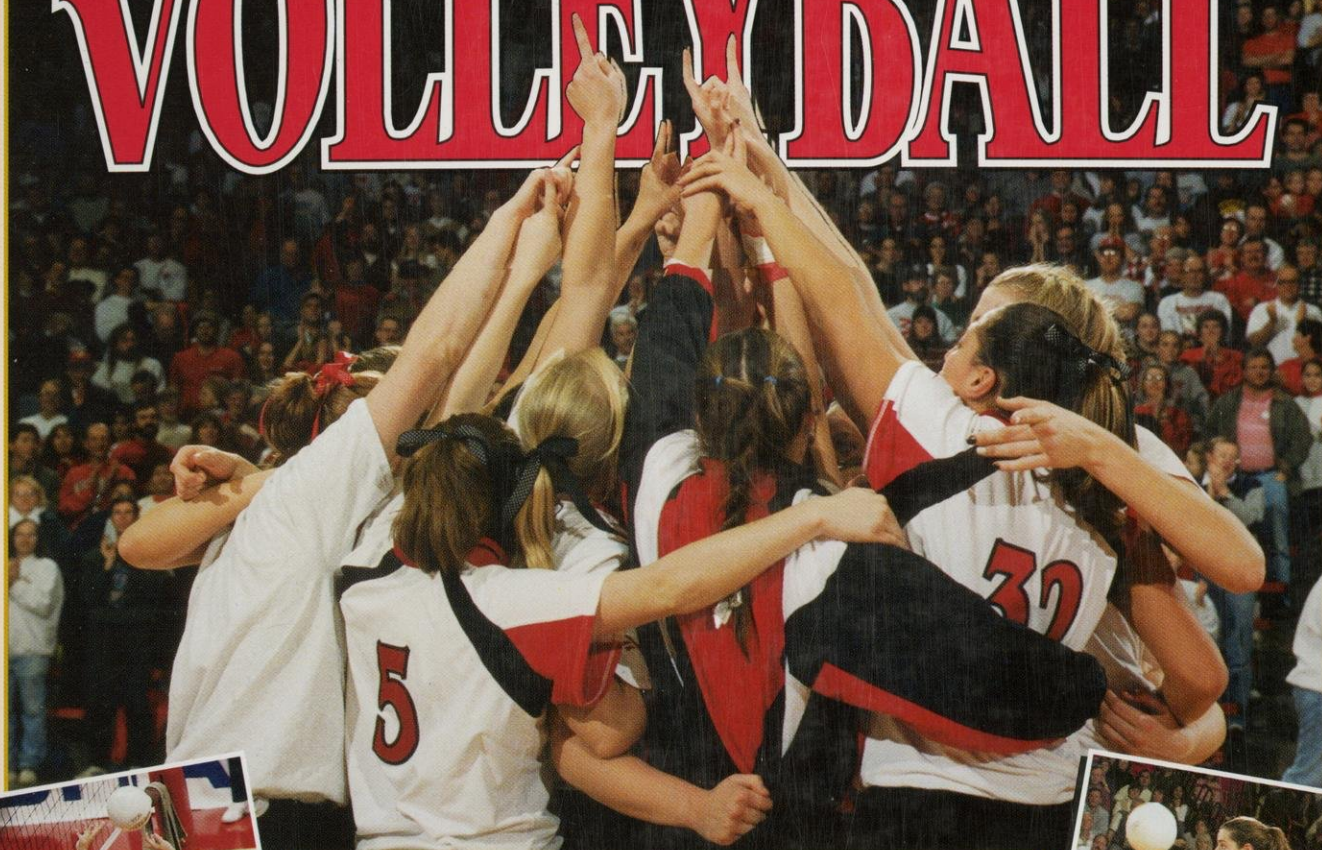

# HEAD COACH JOHN COOK

Former Olympic coach and Big Ten Coach of the Year John Cook recently completed his sixth and most successful season as the head coach at the University of Wisconsin.

In 1997, Cook led the Badgers to the NCAA Central Regional final and ended the season ranked fifth in the nation. Wisconsin finished the season 30-3, the most wins in Cook's six-year tenure.

He was named the 1997 AVCA District 2 Coach of the Year and the Big Ten Conference Co-Coach of the Year by league media and coaches. Cook led the Badgers to a share of the Big Ten title with a 19-1 mark, the most conference wins in program history.

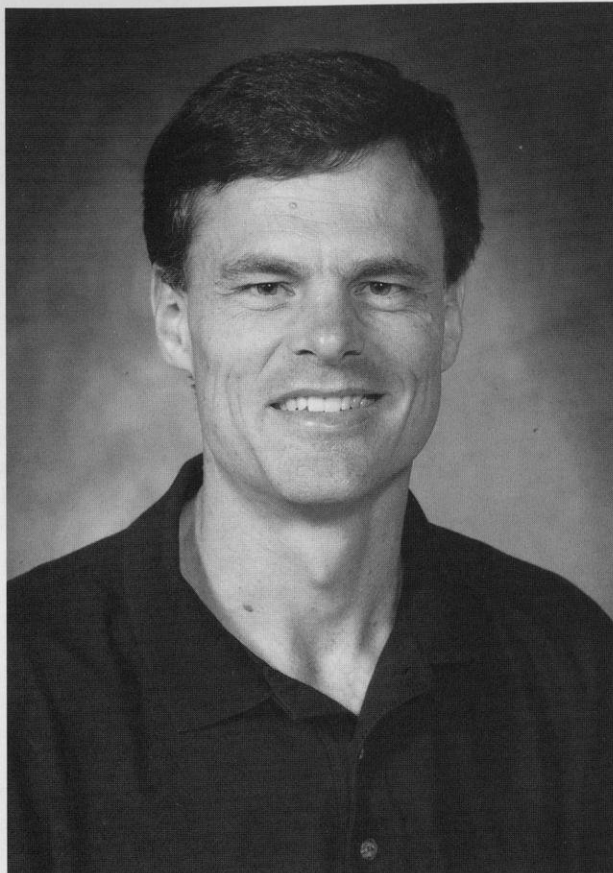
In six years, Cook has led the Badgers to five post-season tournament appearances. Wisconsin qualified for the NCAA tournament in 1993, '94, '96 and '97. In 1995, Wisconsin won the National Invitational Volleyball Championship with a perfect 6-0 record.

Wisconsin tallied its fourth consecutive 20-win season in 1997. The Badgers were 21-12 in 1994, 22-15 in 1995 and 25-8 in 1996. Cook won his 100th career match in 1996 becoming only the second UW coach to accomplish that feat.

He has coached three all-Americans, seven all-District and seven all-Big Ten honorees at Wisconsin. Cook has also had 17 Academic all-Big Ten selections during his six years.

Cook not only brings Olympic credentials but also national championship experience to the Badger program.

As the first assistant coach with the United States Men's National Volleyball team, Cook aided the U.S. to a bronze medal in the 1992 Olympic Games in Barcelona. The team's defensive coordinator, he was also in charge of scouting and supervising the team's flexibility, strength and conditioning programs.



For his Olympic coaching experience, Cook was honored in June of 1993 at the NACDA/USOC Collegiate Coaches Recognition Awards Luncheon.

Prior to his appointment with the national team, Cook served as the head assistant coach with the University of Nebraska women's volleyball program from 1988-91. During Cook's tenure at Nebraska, the Cornhuskers advanced to the NCAA final four every year including a second-place finish in 1989. Nebraska also captured the NCAA Midwest Regional and Big Eight Conference championship each of those three years.

Cook served as the Huskers' recruiting coordinator, scouting chief, strength and conditioning coordinator, and was the liaison with the

academic advising center. Nebraska garnered seven volleyball academic all-America honors during a three-year period, ranking them No. 1 in the country. As the head assistant coach at the University of California-San Diego from 1983-84, Cook aided the Tritons to a NCAA Division III national championship in 1984 and a second-place national finish in 1983.

In the U.S. Olympic Festival competition, Cook served as head coach of the bronze medal-winning North team in 1989, and was an assistant coach with the third-place West team in 1987.

Cook has won at every level of volleyball that he has coached.

A co-founder of the San Diego Volleyball Club, Cook served as a coach with the club from 1986-88. The club won two Southern California Regional Championships and finished among the final four teams twice in the USVBA Junior Olympics for girls 18 and under.

Cook's coaching credentials also include leading Francis Parker High School in San Diego to two California state championships. During his six-year coaching stint, he had a .900 winning percentage with an overall record of 162-18, including a 90-match league winning streak.

A well-known speaker on volleyball skills, Cook travels around the nation participating in clinics. He also serves as the host of the Badger Coaching Symposium, one of the best attended volleyball coaching clinics in the country, every spring.

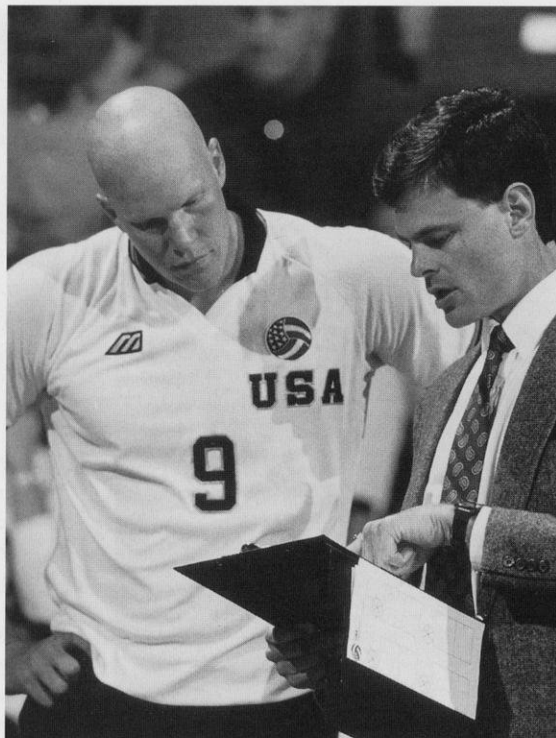
A graduate of the University of San Diego, Cook earned his bachelor's degree in history in 1979. He completed his master's degree in teaching and coaching effectiveness from San Diego State University in 1991.

Cook and his wife Wendy, a former two-time all-American setter at San Diego State, are the parents of two children—Lauren and Taylor.

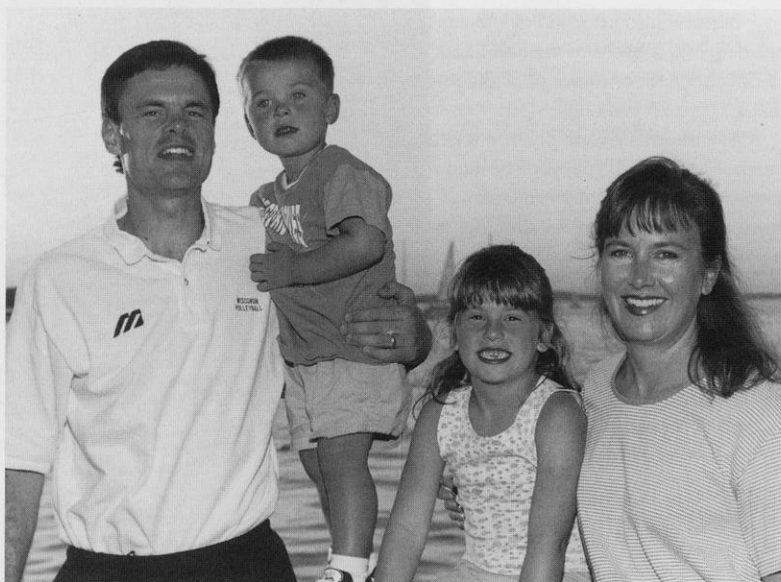

# ASSISTANT COACHES

## Chris Bigelow

Chris Bigelow, a former assistant coach at the University of Texas, begins her third season as an assistant coach at Wisconsin.

Bigelow served as an assistant under Mick Haley at Texas from 1984-90. The Longhorns compiled a 204-48 record during Bigelow's tenure winning seven Southwest Conference titles and competing in seven NCAA tournaments. Texas won the 1988 NCAA Championship and advanced to the final four in 1986 and 1987 losing in the semifinals.

Bigelow also coached at Montana State University from 1978-82 including two seasons as the head coach of the Bobcats. She was a high school coach for one year at St. Stephens Episcopal High School in Austin, Texas.

A three-sport athlete at Eastern Washington University, Bigelow was a member of the USA Volleyball training squad from 1973-74. Bigelow graduated from Eastern Washington in 1974 with a bachelor's degree in physical education. She received her master's degree from Montana State in physical education in 1980.

After leaving Texas, Bigelow served as a volleyball radio and television analyst while also coaching in the Austin Junior Volleyball Association.



## Christy Johnson

Christy Johnson, a two-time all-American at the University of Nebraska, enters her second year as an assistant coach at Wisconsin.

Johnson, a 5-8 setter, earned all-American honors for the Cornhuskers in 1994 and 1995. She was the starting setter on the 1995 Nebraska team that won the NCAA Championship. The Cornhuskers made four NCAA tournament appearances and won three Big Eight titles during Johnson's years. A two-time all-district

selection and two-time all-Big Eight Conference honoree, Johnson was also named to the 1995 NCAA Championship all-tournament team, the 1994 and 1995 NCAA Regional all-tournament team, and the 1994 and 1995 Big Eight Conference all-tournament team. In addition to her athletic honors, Johnson was a 1995 second-team Academic all-American and a three-time Academic all-Big Eight honoree.

Johnson has international experience as a member of the 1989 U.S. Junior National team and as a member of the 1993 U.S. National "B" Team. She has played with the Nebraska Tornadoes of the National Volleyball Association the last two seasons leading the Tornadoes to the league championship in 1998.

A 1996 graduate of Nebraska with a bachelor's degree in education, Johnson spent one year coaching at Millard North High School in her hometown of Omaha, Nebraska. She also served as a coach in the River City Juniors volleyball club program for two years.

# Q&A WITH COACH JOHN COOK

**Wisconsin is coming off its most successful season ever, winning the Big Ten Championship, advancing to the NCAA Regional Finals and ending the season ranked fifth in the final AVCA poll. How does this change your expectations for the upcoming season?**

Our expectations are the same every year, win the Big Ten Conference and compete for the national championship. We have made steady improvement and our experiences last year gave our team confidence and a serious dose of motivation to be in the NCAA Championship here in Madison.

**Wisconsin opens the 1998 season with its first appearance in the NACWAA-State Farm Volleyball Classic. How will this preseason tournament aid the team?**

First of all, it is an honor to be selected to play in the NACWAA-State Farm Volleyball Classic. The invitation is a sign that we are now considered among the nation's elite volleyball programs. Our matches will be televised nationally which will help our exposure across the U.S. Even though there is no extra practice time associated with playing early, the elite competition will pay off in our nonconference schedule and provide a barometer of what we need to do to compete for a national championship.

**The Badgers play the U.S. Women's National Team in an exhibition on Sept. 20. How will this experience benefit the team?**

Playing the U.S. National Team will be a fun experience for our team, fans, and the sport of volleyball. I anticipate of a festive atmosphere and our team will be excited at the opportunity to play against our country's best and future Olympians. Our fans will be exposed to the national team program, players, and the challenge ahead to qualify for the Sydney Olympics. Madison and the Field House is a wonderful place to showcase both programs.

**Wisconsin was ranked third in the country in attendance in 1997. How does the support of the Madison community help the team? How tough does this make it for teams to play in the Field House?**

Our fans are the best and they make the Field House a tough place to play. I'm most pleased that not only was Wisconsin third

in the nation in attendance, but Wisconsin also hosted the largest crowds in all four rounds of the 1997 NCAA tournament. **The Badgers have a strong senior class led by three-year starters Marisa Mackey and Colleen Neels. How will this experience help the team?**

Marisa, who is our primary passer, and Colleen, who is our setter, will touch the ball more during a match than anyone else on our team. These are our most experienced players and they give the Badgers a tremendous advantage. That will make

the difference in many of our most competitive matches.

**For the first time in program history, you have a returning all-American in junior middle blocker Kelly Kennedy, who led the team in hitting percentage and blocks last year. How will this honor and her return help the team?**

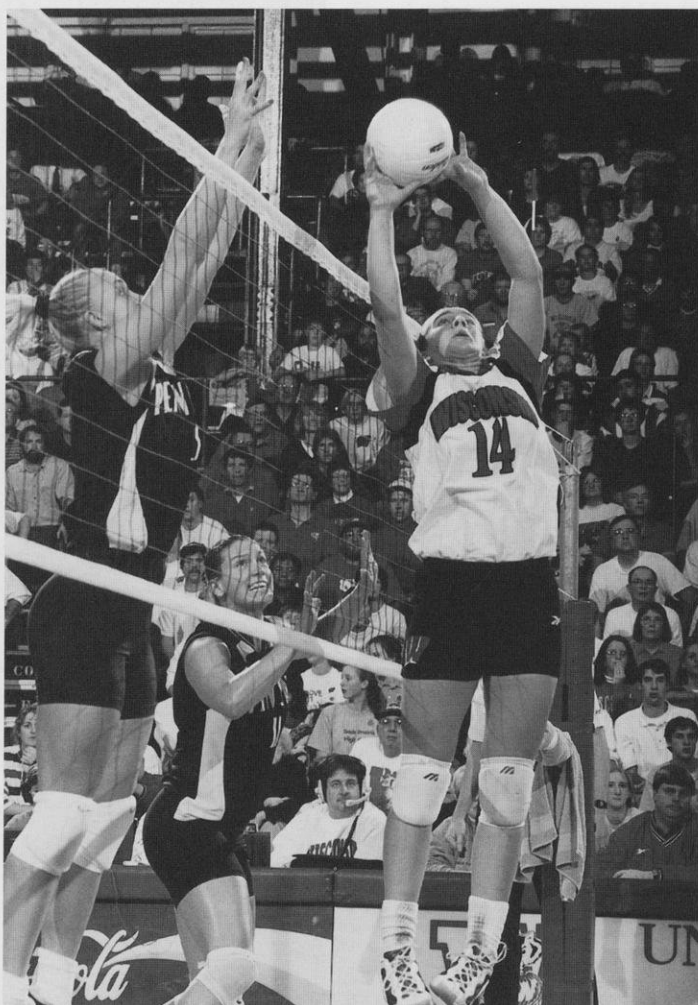
The most important factor is that Kelly has not rested on her honors. Our

team needs Kelly to take over tight matches and be the difference. Her role will change and she has worked very hard this summer to make sure she is ready to go to the next level. Every team in the final 4 had their dominant player that the team looked toward in tough matches; Kelly needs to be that player for the Badgers.

**The 1998 Badgers will be the tallest team in UW history with 10 players 6-0 or taller. How will this effect your style of play? What are the benefits of this height? The disadvantages?**

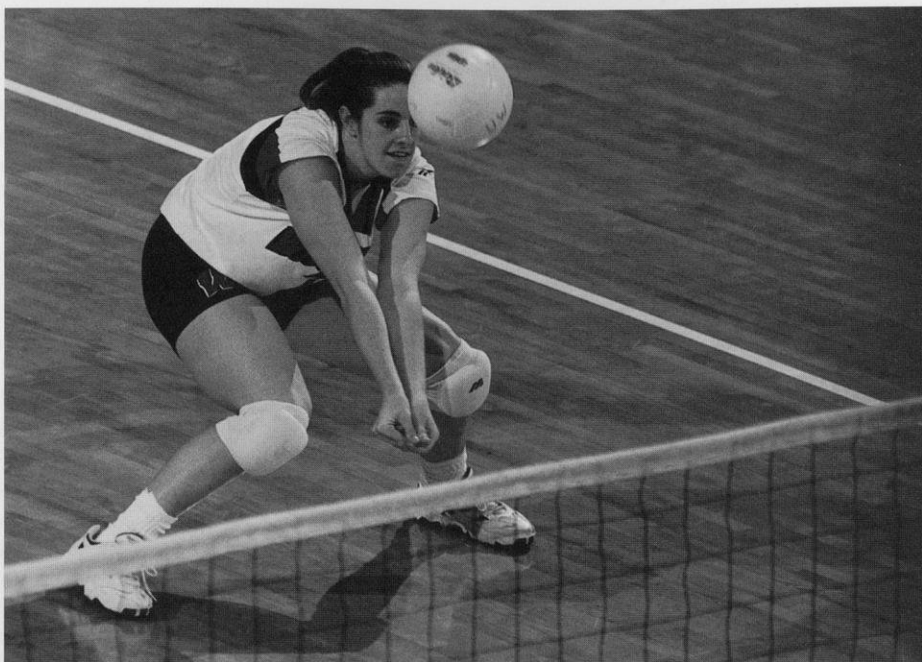
Each year the players get taller and play a more physical style of play. We have to keep up with the other top programs in that trend. However, winning and losing is still dependent on fundamental skills, executions, and team chemistry. I think this year's team will be strong in all three areas.

**The Badgers lost two of the best all-around players in UW history, Heather Dodaro and Amy Lee, to graduation. How hard will these two be to replace?**

Anytime you graduate two four-year starters, replacing their positions will be challenging. But it also provides opportunity for new players to step forward. A common theme for this fall will be improving every day. If the team can accomplish that goal, we will become a better team than last year.

**The 1998 Wisconsin volleyball recruiting class was ranked seventh in the nation by *Volleyball* magazine. What will this group of talented athletes add to the Badger team?**

This recruiting class is the deepest and most talented of any recruiting class here at Wisconsin. All four freshman are good students with lofty goals. We will all know how good they were four years from now.

**Wisconsin has competed in three consecutive post-season tournaments including two NCAA appearances. How will this post-season experience benefit the team?**

We were four points away from going to the NCAA Championship in 1997. The players have not forgotten what that feels like. That feeling has driven our players all spring and summer to improve their conditioning and mental toughness. Our opponents will have to outplay us in every phase of the game because the Badgers are on a mission to go to the NCAA Championship this year. We were at the door of the national championship party but couldn't get in. Every decision we made in the last eight months and will make for the next four months are based on taking advantage of the opportunity that is in Madison this year. It's like watching for Haley's Comet: you'd better be ready because once it goes by, you may never get another chance to see it again.

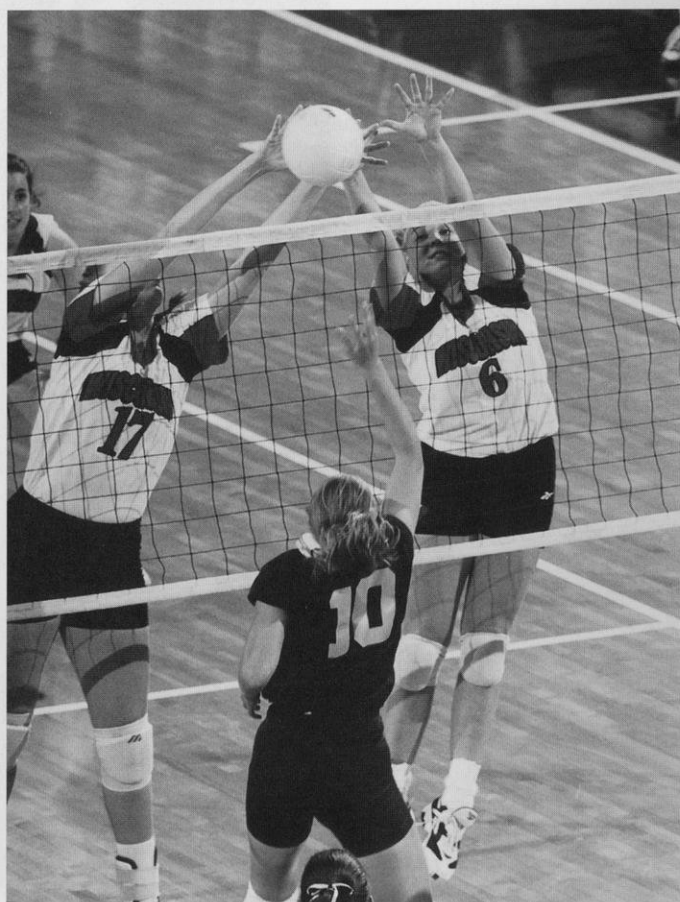
**Wisconsin is the defending Big Ten Conference co-champion. How will this change the expectations of the team? What teams will challenge for the Big Ten title in 1998?**

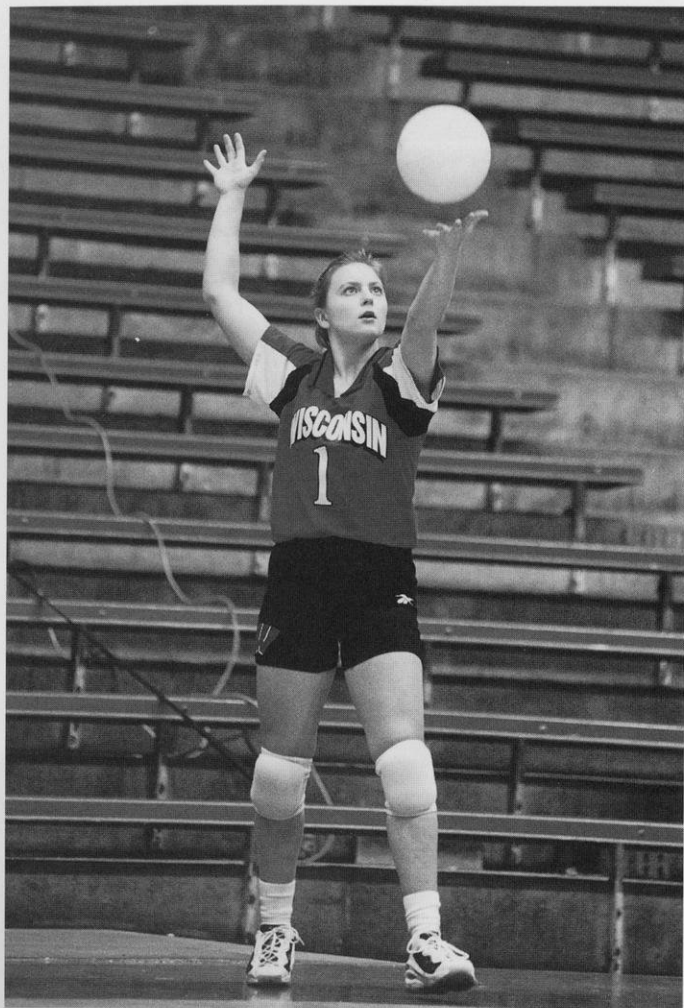

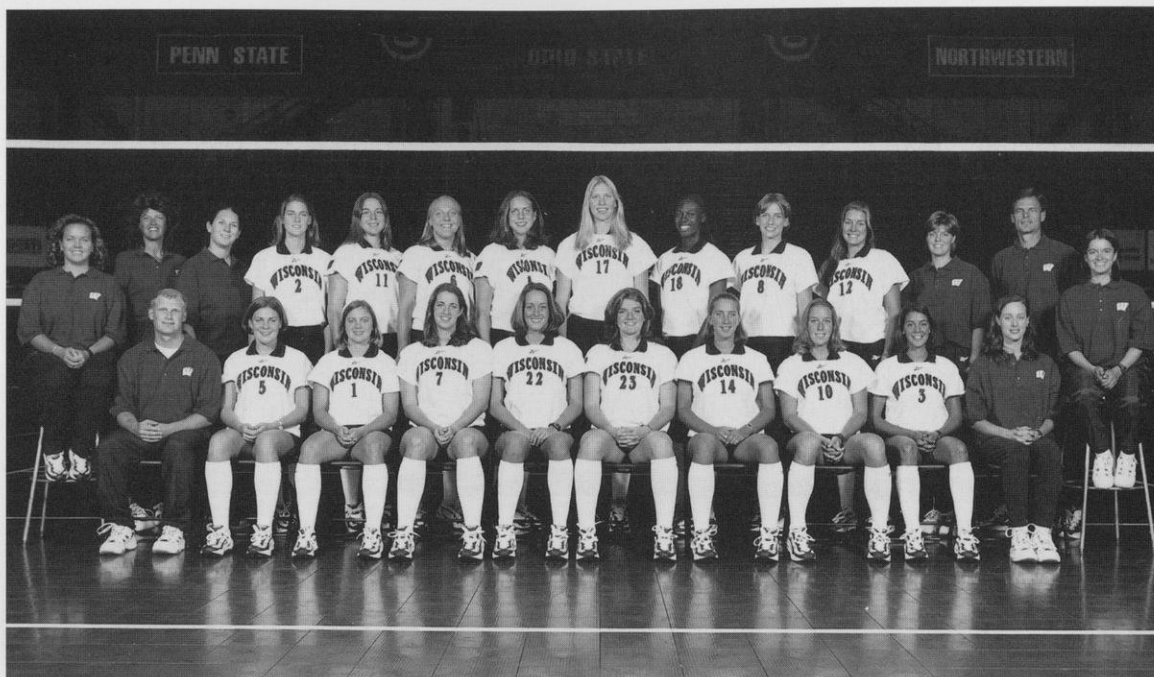

Our team understands that if they improve daily, stay together and support each other especially under stress, that when the opportunity presents itself to go to the NCAA Championship, they will seize that moment.

# BADGERS SHINE IN 1997

**Badgers Advance to NCAA Regional Final** Wisconsin's record-breaking season ended in the Central Regional final with a five-game loss to Florida. The Badgers, who were seeded fourth in the 1997 NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Championship, played host to an NCAA Regional for the first time in program history.

The Badgers made their sixth appearance in the NCAA tournament. Under coach John Cook, Wisconsin has appeared in the "Big Dance" four out of the last five years including the last two in a row.

**Badgers in the Top 10** Wisconsin achieved the highest ranking in program history coming in fourth in the USA Today/AVCA Coaches poll for two weeks in November. The Badgers ended the season ranked fifth, the highest season-ending rank in program history. Wisconsin was ranked among the top 10 teams in the nation for a record 11 consecutive rankings.

**Two Named All-America** Senior Amy Lee and sophomore Kelly Kennedy were named to the Tachikara/AVCA all-American second team in 1997. The honor was the first for both athletes and marks the first time in Wisconsin history that two Badgers were honored in the same year.

**Three Named All-District** Three Wisconsin players were named to the 1997 AVCA All-District 2 team. Senior Amy Lee, junior Colleen Neels and sophomore Kelly Kennedy were named to the honor team. The honor was the first for all three athletes and marks the first time in Wisconsin history that three Badgers have been named to the first team.

**Cook Named Coach of the Year** John Cook was named the 1997 Tachikara AVCA All-District 2 Coach of the Year, and Big Ten Conference Co-Coach of the Year by league media and league coaches. He shares the Big Ten selections with Penn State's Russ Rose.

Cook led the Badgers to a share of the 1997 Big Ten Conference title with Penn State. Wisconsin was 19-1 in league matches, the most Big Ten wins in program history. The UW is currently 29-2 overall, the most wins in Cook's six-year tenure.

Cook was a semifinalist for the 1997 Tachikara AVCA National Coach of the Year.

**Big Ten Champions** Wisconsin won its second Big Ten Conference title in program history. The Badgers share the title with Penn State as both teams finished 19-1. The title is the first for Wisconsin since 1990.

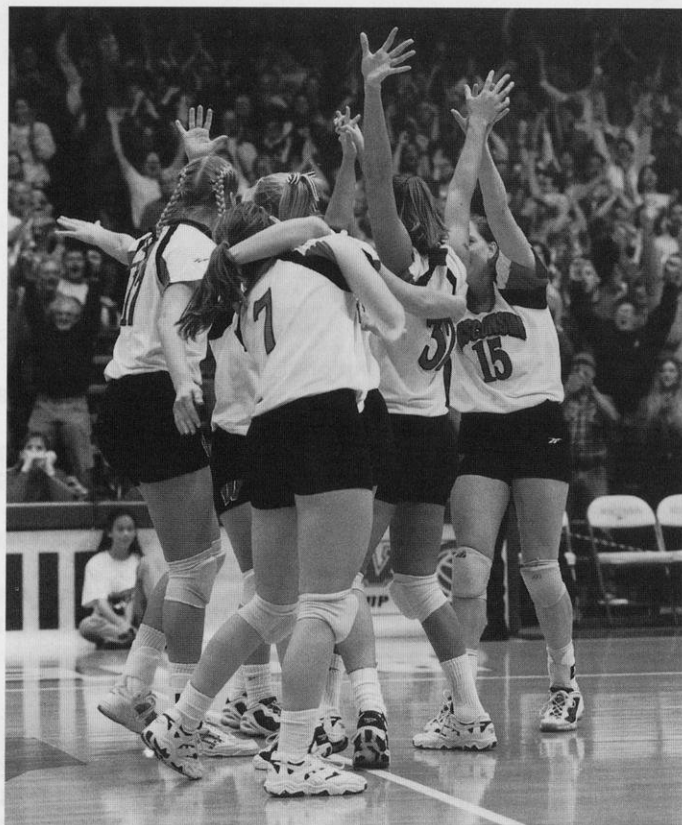
**Four Land on All-Big Ten team** Wisconsin landed four players on the 1997 All-Big Ten team. Senior Amy Lee was a unanimous selection while senior Heather Dodaro, junior Colleen Neels and sophomore Kelly Kennedy were named to the honor team. Dodaro earned her second honor while Lee, Neels and Kennedy earned first-time honors.

Wisconsin led the team with four selections while co-Big Ten champion Penn State landed three players on the team.

**Badgers 10-0 in Big Ten matches at home** Wisconsin finished the 1997 Big Ten Conference season undefeated at home at 10-0. That marks the only the second time in program history that the Badgers have went undefeated at home. The 1990 team, which also won the Big Ten title, was 9-0 at home.

**Longest Winning Streak Ever** Wisconsin won 18 straight matches from Oct. 4 through Dec. 13, the longest in-season winning streak in program history and tying the longest overall winning streak.

**Win No. 500** The Wisconsin volleyball program recorded its 500th win in program history with a 3-0 victory over Central Florida in the second round of the NCAA tournament. In 24 years of competition, the UW has an all-time record of 501-341-13 for a .594 winning percentage.



Wisconsin celebrated a Big Ten Championship and an appearance in the finals of the NCAA Central Regional in 1997.

**Badgers Against Ranked Teams** Wisconsin was 7-3 against ranked teams this season and is 14-15 against ranked teams since 1995. The Badgers completed a series of six consecutive matches against ranked teams from Sept. 19 through Oct. 3 finishing with a 4-2 mark.

**Badgers Set Road Record** Wisconsin finished the Big Ten Conference road season with a 9-1 record, the best in program history.

Wisconsin was 6-2 in 1990 when it won the Big Ten Championship and 7-3 in 1991, the first year that Penn State joined the conference.

**Dodaro Sets Blocking Record** Senior **Heather Dodaro** became Wisconsin's all-time career blocking leader with her first block at Minnesota on Oct. 25. The 6-0 middle blocker has 672 blocks in her career. She is also the Big Ten's all-time career block assist leader with 603.

**Lee Sets Kill Record** Senior **Amy Lee (Milwaukee, WI)** became Wisconsin's all-time career kill leader with her fifth kill against Indiana on Nov. 1. The 6-0 outside hitter has 1,627 kills in her career becoming only the 16th league player to go over the 1600 mark.

**Kennedy, Lee Named Players of the Week** Sophomore Kelly Kennedy and senior Amy Lee were named Big Ten Conference Players of the Week during the 1997 season. Kennedy earned the honor on Oct. 13 while Lee was named on Nov. 3.

**Wisconsin Sets Attendance Record** Wisconsin averaged a school record 3,457 spectators per match, which ranks third in the nation, and has totalled a UW season record of 62,227 fans in 18 matches. The previous record was an average of 2,639 and a total attendance of 48,898 in 1991.

# BADGERS IN RUSSIA

From June 22 through July 12, 1997, the University of Wisconsin volleyball team spent 20 days traveling to Finland and Russia. The trip was the first foreign tour for any Badger volleyball team. The team started its trip with four days at the Finnish resort and training center of Vierumaki just north of Helsinki. From there the Badgers spent a week in St. Petersburg and wrapped up their trip in Moscow.

Here a just few excerpts from the journals the players and staff kept during their trip.



*June 26, by Coach John Cook Vierumaki, Finland*

The travel party is divided up into three cabins located in the woods and overlooking a lake. The food is great and we begin training tomorrow immediately following the Finnish Men's National team practice. It will be interesting to see how the players perform in our first practice. Most of them slept all day on the plane when they shouldn't have and will probably be awake most of the night. When we practice on Tuesday, it will be 2 a.m. Mad City time.

Second day in St. Petersburg, I already feel more comfortable than I did yesterday. The people here are friendly, but you wouldn't know it. You really have to make the effort to get their attention but once you snap them out of their world, they are more than willing to share.

All the buildings here are so massive. Everything is on a much grander scale. I tried to imagine how they were built and I can't. Can't wait to see the inside of St. Isaac's Cathedral and the Hermitage. They look so beautiful from the outside.

We rode on the bus for about an hour to Pushkin. When we finally got there and made our way into Catherine's Palace, I was amazed. The palace stretches over 300 meters and the estate itself is beautiful with large gardens and ponds. Inside the palace, we toured some rooms that have been restored since it was bombed during World War II. The restorations were beautiful and a lot of the artifacts, pictures and even the wood floors were original because they had been stored in Siberia during the war.

We visited Red Square, St. Basil's Cathedral and the Kremlin this morning. The Kremlin is a huge fortress with cathedrals and buildings that date back to the tsars. Just outside the walls is a platform where people were executed while the tsars looked on from atop the towers that surround the Kremlin. The enormity of it all, picturing the history that took place there, is amazing. The Russian people survived such extraordinary times. At first they seem cold and hard, but knowing their history helps us understand why they behave the way they do. But underneath it all is a strong, warm spirit.

One afternoon we watched a concert of skits that the young children in MSCA camp prepared for us. They were trying so hard to impress us—and it worked! These kids were so interested in us. Many of them came up to us afterward for autographs and pictures. It was such an honor.

Then the senior team took us down to the river for a cookout and bonfire. We had amazing shish kabobs, cooked onions, tomatoes, cucumbers, leafy greens and herbs. We ate while they played the guitar and sang Russian folk tunes. Later, we exchanged gifts and made the walk back to camp with our new friends. It was a great cultural experience and it meant a lot to the Badgers.

# WISCONSIN FIELD HOUSE

The Wisconsin Field House has been the permanent home of the Badger volleyball team since 1986.

The first volleyball match played in the Field House was on Oct. 23, 1977, when the U.S. Men's National Team played Cuba. The first women's match followed soon after when Wisconsin played host to the 1977 Big Ten Conference Championship. The semifinal and championship matches were played on Oct. 29 as Ohio State defeated Wisconsin, 2-1, to win the title.

It wasn't until 1980 that the Badgers again competed in the Field House playing host to the Badger Invitational and the AIAW Midwest Regional that year. In 1981, the team played all its home matches in the Natatorium but returned to the Field House for all but one match in 1982. The entire 1983 season was played in the Field House but the 1984 season saw a split with half the matches at the Natatorium and half the matches in the Field House. In 1985, all but two matches were played in the Field House with the official move to the Field House being made in 1986.

Since 1990, when the Badgers won their first Big Ten title and competed in their first NCAA tournament, the Field House has become one of the toughest places to play in the country. Wisconsin has ranked among the top 10 in national attendance average for the last seven years including a third-place ranking in 1997. The Badgers led the Big Ten Conference with a league-record 3,457 spectators per match. Wisconsin also led the league in 1990, 1991 and 1994.

The Field House was the site of the 1993 NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Championship which drew record crowds. A total of 21,085

watched the two-day event including 11,155 for the championship match. That figure set the then-NCAA single-match attendance record and still ranks as the No. 2 volleyball attendance figure of all time.

The Field House was also the site of the No. 4 attendance of all time as 10,935 fans watched the Badgers defeat Illinois in the first round of the 1990 NCAA tournament.

With the Kohl Center opening, the Badger volleyball team will be the sole occupant of the Field House in the fall. One of the improvements will be a permanent Sport Court for all UW home matches and practices.

The Badgers also move to improved locker room facilities this season taking over the former basketball locker rooms. One locker room will be turned into a team lounge and study area while the other will continue to be used as the Wisconsin home locker room.

The Field House has a total of four locker rooms for hosting tournaments as well as an athletic training room and equipment room.

Action on the volleyball court isn't the only thing you'll find when you come to the UW Field House. Bucky Badger and the UW pep band lead the cheers while there are always exciting contests to entertain fans between games.

For the second time in six years, the University of Wisconsin will serve as the host to the NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Championship. Wisconsin is only the third university to play host to the championship more than once.

This year's championship moves to a new venue, the Kohl Center, but still promises to be another success. Two semifinals will be played on Thursday, Dec. 17 while the championship match will be held on Saturday, Dec. 19. (Times TBA)

Wisconsin first played host to the championship in 1993 drawing record crowds to the UW Field House. A record attendance of 21,085 watch the two-day event including 11,155 who watched Long Beach State defeat Penn State in the championship match. That figure still stands as the championship final attendance record and is the No. 2 volleyball attendance figure of all-time.

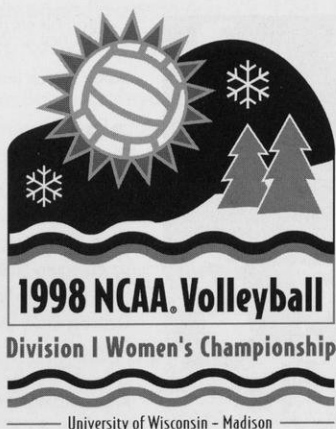

# STEVE LOWE MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

When Steve Lowe unexpectedly passed away on Aug. 22, 1991, the University of Wisconsin and the Madison community lost a true friend and a winner on and off the court.

With Lowe at the helm, the Badger volleyball program burst onto the national scene. In 1989, he directed the Badgers to the title in the inaugural National Invitational Volleyball Championship, their first post-season appearance ever.

The following year he steered Wisconsin to its first Big Ten Conference title, their first NCAA tournament appearance and first national ranking, finishing 10th in the final 1990 NCAA poll. Lowe also produced Wisconsin's first volleyball all-American with Lisa Boyd earning second-team honors in 1990.

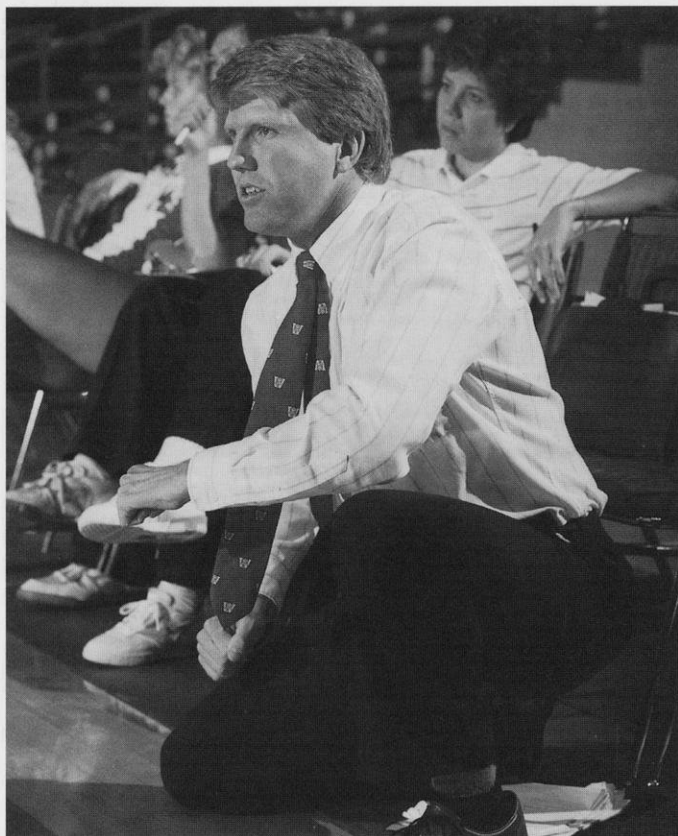
Lowe, who had a 108-64 career record in five years at Wisconsin, earned 1990 Big Ten and AVCA Mideast Coach of the Year honors.

Every year Wisconsin's Big Ten Conference home opener will be designated "Steve Lowe Night." This year's match is on Saturday, Oct. 3 versus Minnesota. A Badger volleyball player is also named the Steve Lowe Scholarship recipient with this year's honoree being senior Pauline Bresky.

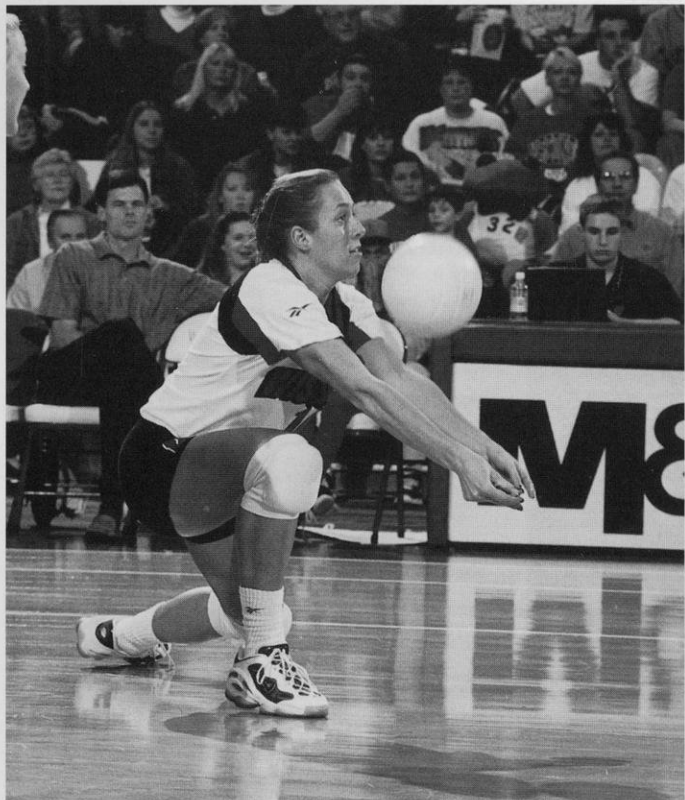

One of the premier athletic leagues in the nation, the Big Ten Conference is proud of its leadership in the area of women's athletics.

Big Ten women's athletics programs lead the nation in basketball attendance, and rank second in volleyball attendance. In addition, the league receives more television exposure than any conference in the nation. More than 200 Conference athletic events are televised each year on national and regional networks.

Begun in 1895, the Intercollegiate Conference of Faculty Representatives (popularly known as the Big Ten) has changed little from its original philosophy of faculty control of athletics with emphasis on the student-athlete. Comprised of 11 institutions in eight states, the conference has long set the national standard for athletics and academics. As a whole, league institutions graduate student-athletes at overall rates between 10 and 22 percent higher than their peers at other Division I conferences.

Women's athletics programs became affiliated with the Conference officially in 1981, although unofficial conference championships had been held among the member institutions since 1972.

Big Ten women athletes compete in conference championships in basketball, cross country, field hockey, golf, gymnastics, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball.

The Big Ten Conference volleyball champion is determined by the match record within the conference. Teams play a double, round-robin schedule facing each other at home and away, for a total of 20 matches.

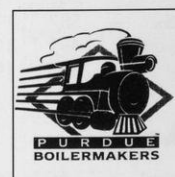
The conference champion earns an automatic bid to the NCAA tournament. In 1997, the Big Ten was represented by six universities in the NCAA Volleyball Championship.

Members of the Big Ten Conference have competed in the NCAA championship eight times including three-time participant Penn State. Illinois and Ohio State have each made two championship appearances and Michigan State one.

For five of the last seven years, the Big Ten Conference has led the nation in volleyball attendance. In 1997, six schools finished in the top 20 in attendance, and overall the league drew a total of 243,513 spectators for the season, which was second in the nation.

Wisconsin set a league record with 3,457 fans per match, which ranked third in the nation. The Badgers averaged 3,497 spectators per match for conference-only matches, also a league record.

Penn State ranked fifth in the country in attendance averaging 2,490 per match while Minnesota was ninth (2,136) and Illinois finished 10th (1,962). Also in the top 20 were Michigan State (14th with 1,528 per match) and Purdue (16th/1,314).

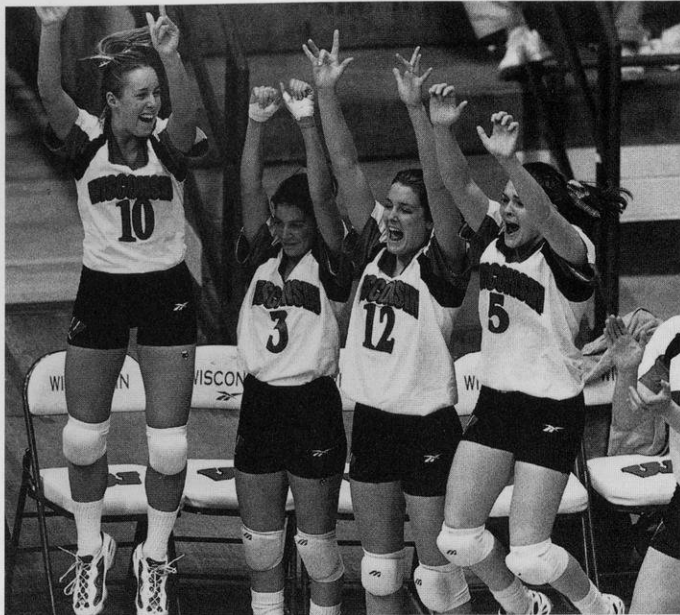

## A World-Class University

The University of Wisconsin-Madison, one of the nation's leading institutions of higher education, is dedicated to the support of academic freedom.

Founded in 1848, the first class of 17 students enrolled February 5, 1849. Today, UW-Madison ranks as the nation's seventh largest university with 40,196 students. It is one of the nation's largest and most productive institutions of higher learning and the student body is one of the most diverse in the country with students coming from every state. Wisconsin also ranks fourth in the nation for foreign student enrollment.

More than 4,546 courses and 13,122 sections are offered in UW-Madison's 13 schools and colleges. Majors are available in 146 undergraduate, 169 master's, and 125 doctoral and professional degree programs.

Award-winning research spanning the academic disciplines has earned UW-Madison a place among the world's elite institutions of higher education. Wisconsin has ranked among the top 10 universities in the United States in many scholarly reputational studies since 1910. The quality of its undergraduate, graduate and research programs is recognized around the world.

UW-Madison undergraduate academic programs ranked third among public universities in 1996 according to *U.S. News & World Report*. The business and engineering programs were tied

for 11th best in the nation while the business school's real estate program was ranked first.

UW-Madison faculty or alumni have won 14 Nobel Prizes and 23 Pulitzer Prizes. Forty-four faculty members have been awarded the National Science Foundation's Early Career Development awards, 10 have won the National Medal of Science, and four are Searles scholars. Forty-six professors are members of the National Academy of Sciences, 18 are mem-

bers of the National Academy of Engineering, three are in the National Academy of Education and 50 are fellows in the American Physical Society.

UW-Madison is one of the nation's first land-grant colleges, establishing a tradition of research in agriculture and the life science. The founders of the university developed the "Wisconsin Idea" ensuring "the beneficent influence of the university available to every home in the state."

UW-Madison is the largest institution in the University of Wisconsin System. It has the only public law and medical schools in the state as well as the only school of veterinary medicine.

## A Scenic Campus

One of the most picturesque college campuses in the country, UW-Madison covers 932 acres along the beautiful shores of Lake Mendota.

One mile from the capitol, traveling down historic State Street, the city was designed so the University and state would be linked, signifying the interrelated nature of the academic and political life of Wisconsin.

Madison's lakes, rolling hills, architecture, parks and arboretum have enhanced UW-Madison's reputation for scenic beauty.

Tree-lined Bascom Hill features a bronze statue of Abraham Lincoln, one of the University's most famous landmarks. Others include North Hall, the first building on campus; the Carillon Tower in front of the Social Science building; Library Mall, with its clock tower and fountain; and Picnic Point, which lies at the end of a 129-acre peninsula complete with hiking and biking trails—one of the most romantic spots on campus. Camp Randall Stadium is a fun place to be on a Saturday afternoon, especially during the infamous Fifth Quarter after a football game when the band entertains. The newly opened Kohl Center is home to the UW basketball and ice hockey teams as well as a regular concert stop.

A favorite area for UW students to gather is the Memorial Union and its lakeside terrace. Here students can study or socialize against a backdrop of sailboats, canoes, sailboards, kayaks and swimmers, while enjoying the sunshine and breezes from Lake Mendota.

## The Student Body

Over 40,000 students populate the UW campus, including more than 10,700 graduate and professional students in numerous fields.

Although a UW Board of Regents policy limits undergraduate enrollment from outside the state to 25 percent, the University still maintains one of the nation's most diverse student bodies.

Students hail from every county in the state and every state in the nation, as well as from 119 foreign countries. UW-Madison ranks fourth in the nation for total foreign student enrollment.

A greater effort is also being made to recruit and retain minority students and faculty. In the fall of 1997, African-Americans, Hispanics, Native Americans and other minority groups accounted for more than nine percent of the student body.

## The Community

Madison, located in southern Wisconsin, is not only pretty to look at but fun to be in. Draped around five lakes, "Mad City" is the home of the University of Wisconsin and the state capital.

With a diverse population of 200,814, Madison offers the "big city" spheres of politics, arts and entertainment, as well as the attributes of a small town. It is a family and action-oriented community that promotes participation in government, education, the arts, sports and

recreational activities.

Madison was named the best place to live in America in 1996 by *Money* magazine.

Again, in 1998 *Money* magazine rated Madison the best mid-sized city in the Midwest. The July 1995 issue of *Outside* magazine called Madison a "Dream Town." The magazine also rated Madison as one of the top 15 "great sports towns" in the country. *U.S. News and World Report* named it one of the country's 10 Hottest Cities. Madison was also featured on the front page of the Life section of *USA Today* on July 12, 1995.





## WHERE WISCONSIN RANKS

Since 1910, the University of Wisconsin has ranked on the top 10 lists in every objective national faculty reputational survey. The quality of Wisconsin's undergraduate, graduate and research programs is recognized worldwide.

The 1997 *Fiske Guide to Colleges*, the best-selling guide to colleges, gives the UW-Madison its highest academic ranking. In fact, UW-Madison is one of only eight public institutions in the country to receive the five-star rating. In 1998, *U.S. News & World Report* listed UW-Madison as eighth for academic reputation among public universities and 38th among all universities.

In 1996, UW-Madison's undergraduate reputation was rated third among public universities according to *U.S. News & World Report*. In 1995, the National Research Council placed 16 UW-Madison doctoral programs in the nation's top 10 and another 35 programs in the top 25.



### Funding and Support

► **Federal Grants:** UW-Madison received over \$242 in federal awards in 1997.

► **Research and Development Funds:** UW-Madison ranked third in the country for research and development expenditures in 1996, with \$423 million, according to the National Science Foundation.

► **Tuition:** Over the last 10 years, tuition for resident undergraduates at the UW-Madison has been consistently lower than the average for public Big Ten schools. The UW-Madison has the second-lowest resident undergraduate tuition and the third-lowest nonresident undergraduate tuition of the public Big Ten institutions.

► **Private Support:** With private gifts totaling \$212.5 million in 1997, Wisconsin ranks first among all public institutions and fifth among all institutions.

► **Alumni:** The Wisconsin Alumni Association has a network of 116 chapters around the world helping to serve some 300,000 alumni. The chapters have raised \$3.5 million in scholarships.

► **Internet:** UW-Madison was named one of the 100 Most Wired Colleges by *Yahoo! Internet Life* magazine.

### Degrees

► **Graduates:** Standard & Poor's 1996 survey lists the Wisconsin as one of the nation's top producers of corporate executives, ranking second in producing BA degree winners who go on to become corporate executives.

► **Doctoral Degrees:** UW-Madison is a national leader in number of doctoral degrees awarded ranking third in 1996. Between the school's founding and 1997, the University of Wisconsin-Madison awarded 32,785 doctoral degrees.

### Departmental Academic Rankings

► **Liberal Arts:** In its ranking of graduate programs in the liberal arts in 1998, *U.S. News & World Report* cited UW-Madison's sociology department as tops in the country. The magazine also ranked education eighth; social work ninth; economics 10th; psychology 12th and political science 14th; and history 11th.

► **Science Programs:** According to *U.S. News and World Report's* annual graduate school ratings, published in 1997, six UW-Madison science programs ranked in the top 10: computer science, 10th; chemistry, 10th; and nursing, 18th.

► **Education:** The School of Education is the nation's best according to a survey by the University of Illinois released in 1994. The UW's educational administration and elementary education programs ranked second.

► **College of Agricultural and Life Sciences:** In 1993, the College of Agricultural

and Life Sciences was ranked one of the top 10 agricultural schools in the country according to *Farm Futures* magazine.

► **Film and TV:** *The College Finder* ranked UW-Madison as one of the top 35 schools in the nation for studying film and television in 1997.

► **Libraries:** The UW-Madison has the 14th largest university library collection in the United States, with more than 5.8 million books in 45 libraries across campus.

► **Business:** The School of Business' undergraduate program ranks seventh in the nation according to *U.S. News & World Report* (1996). The MBA program ranks in the top five percent and the real estate program ranks third. *Business Week* ranked the school among the top 50 business schools in the nation. *Computerworld* ranked the business school's Information Systems program as one of

► in the synthesizing of genes. Former biochemistry professor Har Gobind Khorana synthesizes the first gene. He received the Nobel Prize in 1968 for his work in genetic coding.

► in finding which wavelength of ultraviolet light produces skin cancer (1941)

► in synthesizing the anti-cancer drug, fluorouracil (1957)

► as Elizabeth and James Miller, UW Medical School professors of oncology, were the first to identify characteristics among chemicals that cause cancer (1950s, 60s)

► with launching the Orbiting Astronomical Observatory, the world's first true observatory in space (1968)

► in revolutionizing brain surgery, as Dr. Manucher Javid, UW Medical School professor of surgery, became the first neurosurgeon to use a solution from the compound urea to relieve pressure during brain surgery on a human (1956)

► in laying the foundation for the U.S. Food and Drug Administration's adoption of Sun Protection Factor (SPF) on sunscreens (1960)

► the National Organization for Women is founded in Madison by UW political scientists Kathryn Clarenbach and Betty Friedan (1966)

► in developing new techniques to measure bone-tissue loss, known as osteoporosis

► with the Biotron, the first research building where environmental conditions for experimental purposes can be controlled

► with bone-marrow transplants. Using techniques developed at UW—Madison, the first bone-marrow transplant in the U.S. was done at UW Hospital. A UW team also discovered how



to predict the success of bone marrow transplants by matching genes

► in finding evidence linking cancer in laboratory animals with saccharin and cyclamates

► in finding that the anti-estrogen drug tamoxifen can prevent breast cancer from recurring in certain women who have had cancer (1980)

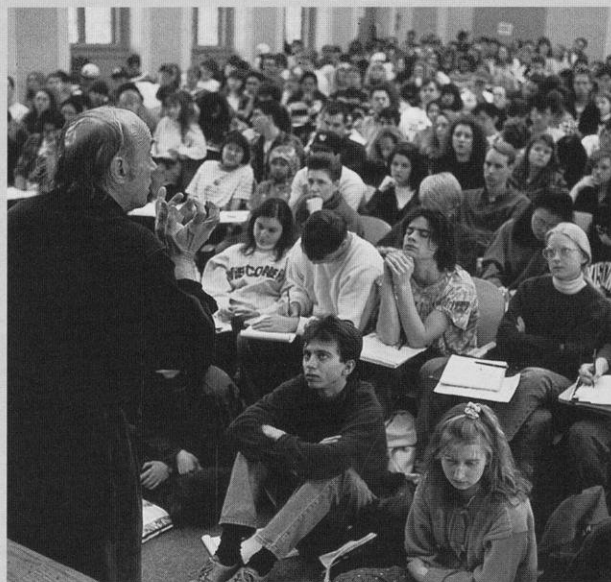
► as UW Hospital and Clinics develop the nation's first Mobile Critical Care Unit, which duplicates facilities of a hospital intensive care unit and laboratories

► with the first medical physics department in the nation to exist within a medical school

► as UW—Madison researchers describe the atomic structure of a common cold virus (1985)

► with the establishment of the Center for Dairy Research, the nation's first such center to be established at a university (1986)

► in organ preservation breakthroughs. In 1987, Dr. Folkert Belzer and biochemist James Southard used a cold storage preservation solution to preserve dog livers up to 36 hours and dog pancreases up to 72 hours. Clinical use of this new solution decreases the need for emergency transplantation, increases the number of livers and pancreases available to people who



need transplants, and improves organ sharing among transplant centers

► in improved world map projection developed by professor Arthur H. Robinson (1960s)

► with the development of the world's first genetically altered trees that are resistant to Dutch Elm disease

► in Hector F. Deluca, discoverer of a "super vitamin-D" compound, and continuing techniques for synthesizing the compound

► with access features for disabled people in everyday computer programs designed by the UW's Trace Research and Development Center





## David Ward



David Ward was named chancellor of the University of Wisconsin-Madison in June 1993.

Ward has provided strong leadership for efforts to improve the quality of undergraduate education. Changes inspired by Ward include enhanced student advising, particularly for freshmen and sophomores; expanded course access; a core curriculum; and increased opportunities for undergraduates to conduct research.

Ward chairs the Board of Trustees of the University Corporation for Advanced Internet Development and also serves on the Board of Directors of the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges and chairs the Big Ten Council of Presidents/Chancellors.

The chancellor was born in Manchester, England, and received bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Leeds. He earned a Fulbright Travel award to the United States in 1960 and received a doctorate from UW-Madison in 1963.

He served as chair of the geography department from 1974 to 1977 and as associate dean of the Graduate School from 1980 to 1987. He became vice chancellor for academic affairs at UW-Madison in 1989, and in 1991, was also named provost, chief deputy to the chancellor.

## Jim Hoyt



Jim Hoyt, a professor in the UW's School of Journalism and Mass Communication, has served as the chair of the UW Athletic Board and as a UW Faculty Representative since 1991.

As the chair of the Athletic Board, Hoyt oversees the governing body that supervises the day-to-day running of the athletic department. As a faculty representative, he serves on a number of committees of the NCAA, Big Ten Conference, and Western Collegiate Hockey Association.

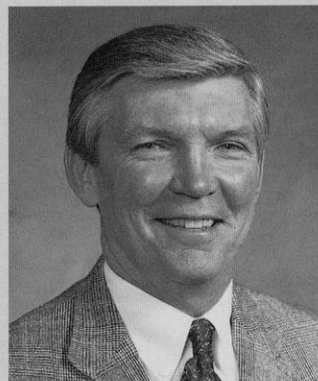
A UW professor since 1973, Hoyt was the director of the School of Journalism and Mass Communication from 1981 to 1991. He teaches courses in the school's broadcast news sequence and has conducted extensive research on the effect of cameras in the courtroom. A former producer and editor for NBC News in Washington, D.C., he now consults for NBC News and a number of local television stations throughout the country.

Hoyt received his bachelor's, master's and Ph.D. from Wisconsin.

## Pat Richter

Pat Richter, a former UW student-athlete, professional football player, and successful businessman, was the perfect choice to become Wisconsin's athletic director in December of 1989.

An all-America tight end for Wisconsin's 1963 Rose Bowl football team, Richter had a distinguished career with the National

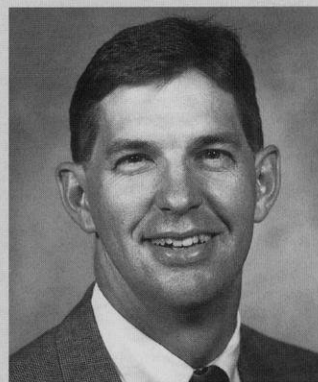


Football League's Washington Redskins from 1963-71. He was inducted into the National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame and the Rose Bowl Hall of Fame.

Richter earned his bachelor's degree in landscape architecture from the UW in 1964, earning Academic all-America honors in 1962 and was named Wisconsin's Big Ten Medal of Honor recipient in 1963. He received his law degree from the UW in 1971. In 1995, he was inducted into the GTE/CoSIDA Academic Hall of Fame, and was honored as an NCAA Silver Anniversary Award winner for post-college achievements.

After employment with a Madison law firm, he joined the Oscar Mayer Foods Corp., and worked his way up to vice president of personnel.

## Al Fish



Al Fish begins his 10th year as the administrative officer for the division overseeing facility planning, event management, technical services, equipment services and the University Ridge Golf Course. He

also begins his first year of supervising the sports of football and men's and women's rowing.

Fish has been instrumental in the planning and construction of the Kohl Center and Fetzer Academic Center. Future projects under Fish's direction include the Goodman Softball Complex, a new swimming facility, and new and expanded rowing facilities.

In 1989, Fish came to the division after three years as the Director of Policy and Budget for the Department of Health and Social Services. He worked as a liaison for Governor Tony Earl to the State Assembly, a budget analyst for the State Budget Office, and as a program evaluator for the Legislative Audit Bureau.

A 1973 graduate of Luther College in Decorah, Iowa, Fish was a four-year letterwinner in golf.

## Cheryl Marra



Cheryl Marra begins her ninth year as an associate athletic director at Wisconsin. Marra oversees the men's and women's programs of basketball, golf, swimming and diving, and women's volleyball. She also serves as the primary women's athletic administrator to the Big Ten Conference and the NCAA, and coordinates all booster clubs.

Under Marra's guidance, Wisconsin has served as host to several highly successful NCAA and Big Ten events including the 1993 NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Championship, which garnered record-setting attendance, and the 1998 NCAA Division I Women's Golf Championship. Wisconsin will again play



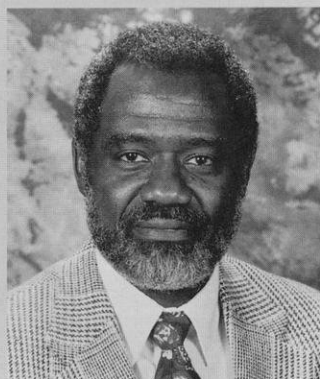
host to the NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Championship in 1998.

## Mike Moss



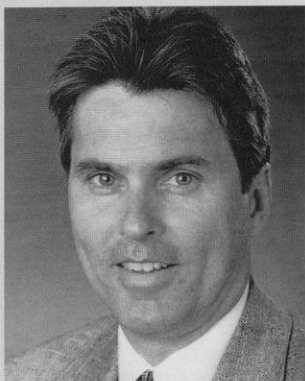

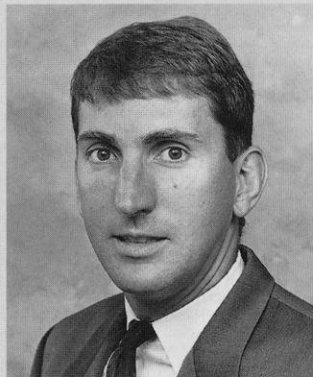

# UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN ATHLETICS

The University of Wisconsin-Madison offers its student-athletes one of the premier intercollegiate athletic programs in the country.

As a member of the prestigious Big Ten Conference, Wisconsin offers its student-athletes the best in education, athletic opportunities, coaching and on-field competition at the NCAA Division I level.

With a number of sports begun more than 100 years ago, Wisconsin men's teams compete in basketball, cross country, football, golf, ice hockey, rowing, swimming and diving, soccer, tennis, track and field, and wrestling.

Established July 1, 1974, the 12-sport women's athletic program offers basketball, cross country, golf, lightweight rowing, rowing, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, track and field, and volleyball. Ice hockey will begin its first season of intercollegiate competition in 1999-2000.

Wisconsin has ranked among the top 35 NCAA Division I programs for the past four years. In 1997-98, Wisconsin finished 34th in the Sears/National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics Directors Cup competition, which recognizes the best Division I college sports programs in the nation.

Fifteen of Wisconsin's 22 sports qualified as teams or individuals for their respective national championships in 1997-98. The men's and women's cross country teams both finished fifth at the NCAA Championships while the women's volleyball team advanced to the elite eight of the NCAA tournament and ended the season ranked fifth. Badger athletes earned 53 all-American honors during the year.



The Wisconsin football team takes to the field for a home game. The Badgers have participated in four bowl games in the last five years winning three times including the 1994 Rose Bowl.

Qualifying for post-season competition as teams or individuals were women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's rowing, men's and women's swimming, men's and women's tennis, men's and women's track and field, volleyball and wrestling.

Wisconsin finished second in the 1997-98 Big Ten Conference composite rankings. The Badgers crowned two Big Ten team champions in women's cross country and volleyball while second-place finishes were earned by men's cross country, men's and women's indoor track, and men's and women's outdoor track.



The Badger volleyball team won the 1997 Big Ten Conference championship and ended the season ranked fifth in the national poll.

The first-place team receives 11 points while the 11th-place team receives one point. The total points are divided by the number of sports in which each school participates.





The Wisconsin women's swimming team had a record year in 1997-98 finishing 14th in the NCAA Championship and picking up 20 all-American honors.

Two Badger coaches were named the Big Ten Coach of the Year in their respective sports while two athletes were named the Big

Ten Athlete of the Year and one was named the Big Ten Freshman of the Year. Wisconsin athletes also claimed 20 Big Ten individual titles. A total of 55 all-conference honors were earned during the season.

Academic honors also came in with three athletes earning Academic all-American honors and 138 athletes earning Academic all-Big Ten honors.

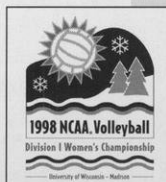
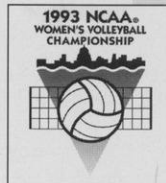
## NCAA Championships

In the last six years, the University of Wisconsin has played host to five NCAA Championships.

The Badgers have played host to the NCAA Men's Ice Hockey Championship in 1993 and 1997. The 1993 event sold out in three months, the fastest sell out in NCAA hockey history.

Wisconsin will also play host to the NCAA Women's Volleyball Championship for the second time in 1998. When the Badgers first hosted the championship in 1993, the attendance records for the championship match and two-day event were both shattered.

The UW was also the site of the 1998 NCAA Women's Golf Championship. The event was the first national championship held at University Ridge Golf Course and the first women's championship shown live on national television showcasing the Ridge.



The Wisconsin women's basketball team ranked third in the nation in attendance last season setting a Big Ten Conference single game record of 16,329 and a season record with 10,455 per game.

## Academic & Student Services

The mission of the Academic Affairs Office is to provide student-athletes with the maximum opportunity for academic and athletic excellence. University of Wisconsin athletes have a history of academic success and much of the credit for that impressive record is due to the advising system available to the student-athletes.

Director **Alan Zussman** supervises a staff of six advisors which conduct the program offered to the nearly 700 student-athletes. The advising staff of **Mary Weaver-Klees, Craig Hudson, Chris Butler, Doug Tiedt, Liane Kosaki** and **Jerry Darda** have a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all university departments. The staff renders quality academic and personal support to student-athletes and assists coaches in providing the best possible collegiate experience.

For those student-athletes who request assistance, advising sessions are offered on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the athlete. Wisconsin athletes are degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The advising staff takes a personal approach to each athlete in determining his or her individual needs, personal or academic.

Student-athletes at Wisconsin receive recognition for outstanding academics in a number of ways. The Big Ten Conference honors scholar-athletes with Academic all-Big Ten honors while the UW Athletic Board recognizes Athletic Board Scholars for the highest grade point average in each sport. In addition, student-athletes may be nominated for Academic All-America honors through the sports information office.

## Fetzer Student Athlete Academic Center

Opened in the spring of 1997, the Fetzer Student Athlete Academic Center is the newest aid to Wisconsin student-athletes in achieving their academic goals.

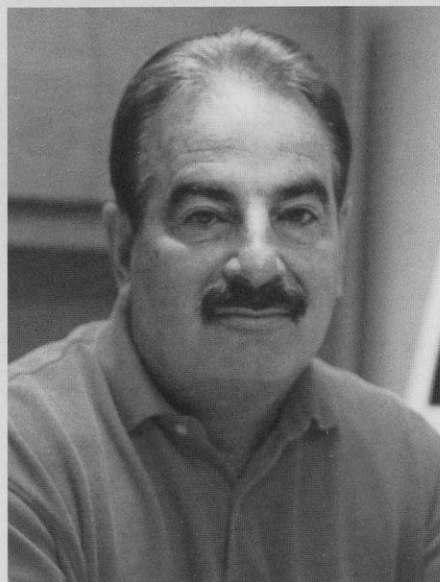
The 15,000 square-foot, state-of-the-art facility serves the needs of all men and women student-athletes. The Center features an open area with carrels that can accommodate up to 30 students. There are 11 study rooms of differ-

## Sports Medicine

The goal of the sports medicine staff is to provide all University of Wisconsin student-athletes with high quality health care. Wisconsin's Sports Medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

The sports medicine staff consists of team physicians, dentists, athletic trainers, and other medical and allied health professionals. The day-to-day care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Wisconsin athletes is supervised by a staff of eight full-time and three graduate assistant N.A.T.A.-certified athletic trainers. Under the direction of head athletic trainer **Dennis Helwig**, the Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Staff members **Chuck Hart**, **Jan Helwig**, **Mike Johnson**, **Barb Pearson**, **Henry Perez-Guerra**, **Heidi Stettler**, and **Andy Winterstein** utilize functional measures, provide dietary analysis, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve flexibility.

The Sports Medicine facility in the McClain Center features an extensive collection of therapeutic and rehabilitation equipment including a 50-foot, two-lane-rehabilitation pool, and an on-site x-ray facility. Considered one of the nation's finest, the McClain Sports Medicine Center offers an environment conducive to expedient care, and a healthy return to competition.

Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affiliated with the world-renowned UW Hospitals and Clinics.

Medical director **Dr. Ben Graf** is responsible for all services provided to our student-athletes. Orthopedic care is directed by team physician **Dr. John Orwin** while general medical care is directed by the head of primary care, **Dr. Greg Landry**.

In addition to the headquarters in the McClain Athletic Facility, auxiliary athletic training rooms are located in the Stadium, Natatorium, UW Field House and Kohl Center. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus.

## Sports Information

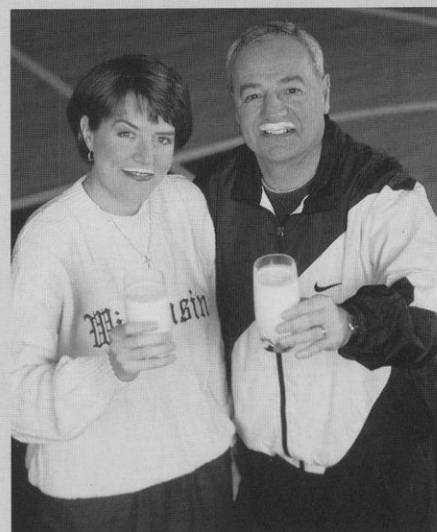


## Community Service

# WISCONSIN SPORTS FACILITIES



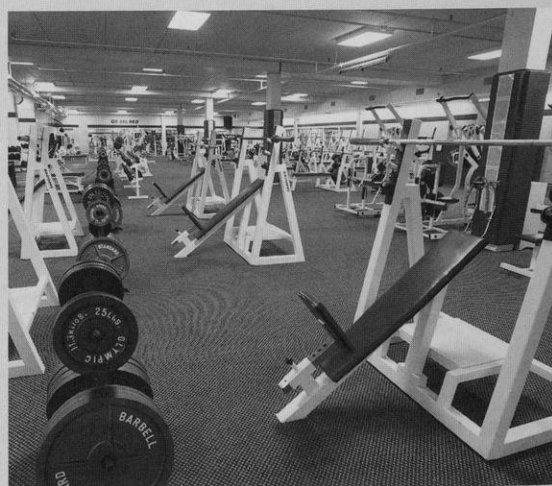
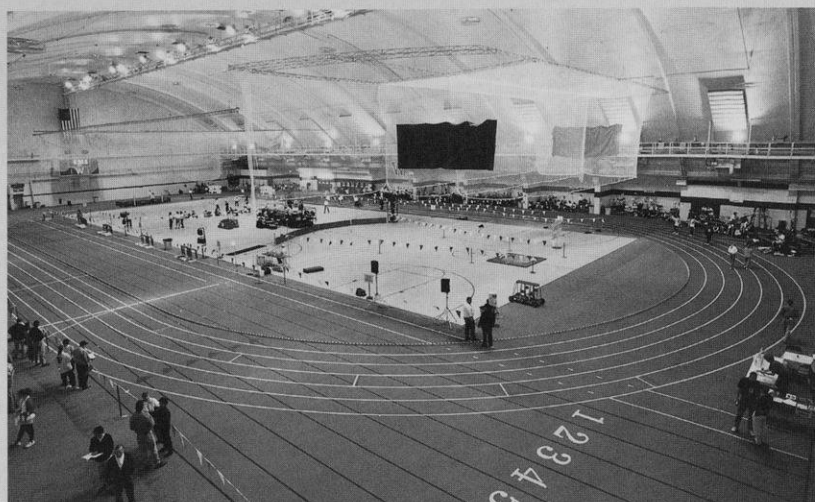
The McClain Athletic Facility offers indoor practice facilities for football, soccer and track and field. A 90-yard newly resurfaced artificial turf practice area is contained in the 76,380-square foot main floor. The lower level houses the Fetzer Student Academic Center, the headquarters of the Badgers Sports Medicine staff, a fully-equipped weight room and locker rooms for football, men's and women's track, softball and men's and women's soccer.



Top: UW golfers have the opportunity to compete on one of the finest courses in the Midwest—University Ridge. The facility features a par-72, 18-hole course, 15,000-square foot practice green and 5,000-square foot chipping green. It was the site of the 1998 NCAA Division I Women's Golf Championship.

Left: The Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center or Shell features a 200-meter Martin rubber track surrounding four basketball/volleyball courts that double as throwing and jumping areas for indoor track meets. The Shell, which has a seating capacity of 2,500, will be the site of the 1999 Big Ten Conference Indoor Men's Track & Field Championship.

Bottom Left: The Kohl Center, which opened in January of 1998, is the home of the Badger basketball and hockey teams. One of the finest on-campus athletic facilities in the nation, the \$76 million facility includes a separate practice gym, locker rooms and lounge areas, and coaches' offices. Bottom Right: Weight training areas in the McClain Center and Camp Randall Stadium feature free weights and stereo music in spacious, carpeted rooms. Four full-time and two part-time weight training instructors monitor and advise all Wisconsin student-athletes.





The Wisconsin Field House, which seats 9,500, is the practice and competitive facility for the Badger volleyball team as well as the competitive facility for the wrestling squad. It features four locker rooms, and an athletic training area.



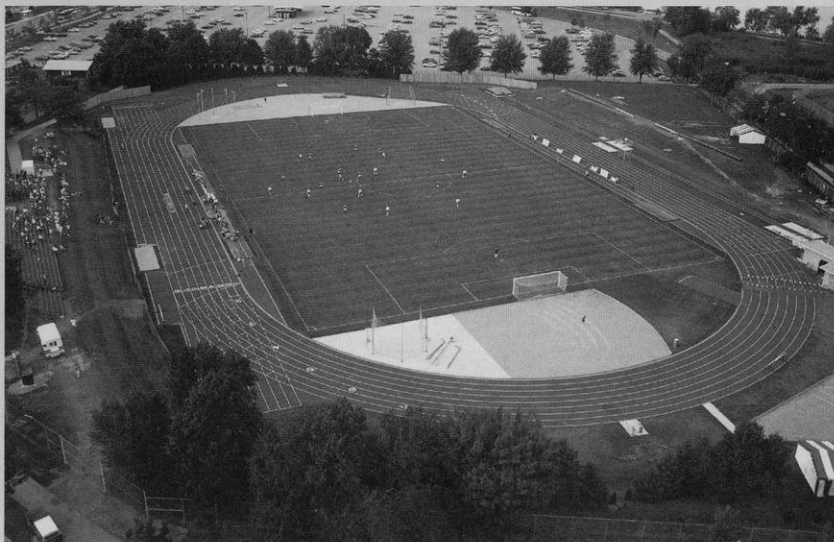
The Wisconsin tennis teams have the competitive advantage of playing year-round at one of the best college facilities in the United States—the Nielsen Tennis Stadium. The stadium features 18 tennis courts (12 indoor and six outdoor), five squash courts, one squash doubles court, and seats 1,500 spectators.



The swimming and diving teams have two pools for practice and competition—the Natatorium and Southeast Recreational Facility. The “Nat” contains an eight-lane, 25-yard pool equipped with an automatic Colorado Timing System and digital readout score board. The 50’ x 40’ diving well is fitted with three one-meter and two three-meter Dura (Maxi) Flex boards. The SERF (pictured above) features an indoor long course pool with movable bulkheads that more than double the program’s training space.



Ground was broken on the Goodman Softball Complex on the west end of the UW campus in June of 1998. The facility, which will open during the spring of 1999, will have an NCAA-regulation, natural grass field with a centerfield distance of 225 feet, and left and right field foul line distances of 200 feet. The facility will include dugouts, locker areas, players’ lounge, grandstand seating for 1,600 and media facilities.

# WISCONSIN TRADITIONS

## Badger Nickname

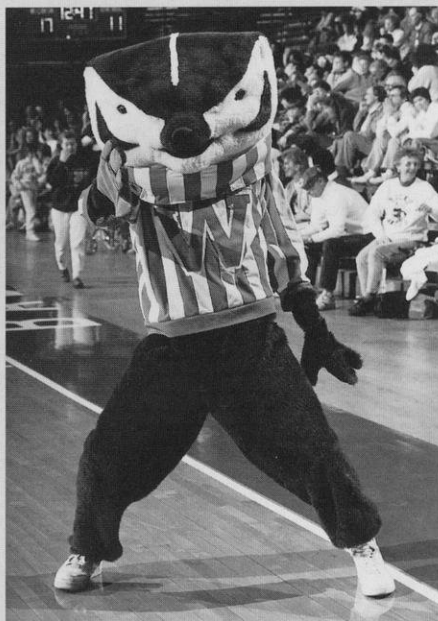
The sports program's nickname "Badgers," was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin. The territory was dubbed the "Badger State," not because of animals in the region, but rather by an association with lead miners in the 1820's. Prospectors came to the state looking for minerals. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

## Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

The original badger mascot was too vicious to control. On more than one occasion, the live badger escaped handlers before a sideline hero recaptured the animal. It was decided in the interest of fan and player safety that Wisconsin's mascot would be retired to the Madison zoo.

In 1949, a student in the university's art department, Connie Conrad, was commissioned to mold a paper-mache badger head. Gymnast and cheerleader, Bill Sagal of Plymouth, Wis., was directed by homecoming chair Bill Sachse, to wear the outfit at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name. The rally committee opted for its own name: Buckingham U. Badger. The name is said by some to have originated in a line from "On, Wisconsin" that exhorts the UW to "buck right through that line."

## On Wisconsin

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy of Chicago, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. The song was an instant hit at the Wisconsin campus and soon spread throughout the world, being very popular with military bands. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

## Varsity

The traditional arm waving that comes at the end of the song "varsity" was the 1934 brainchild of then-UW band leader Ray Dvorak. He had originally gotten the idea from University of Pennsylvania students who waved their caps after a losing game. Dvorak later instructed UW students to wave as a salute to UW President Glenn Frank.

## Fifth Quarter

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as they play traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song. Originally, the post-game concert was designed to give fans something to listen to on their way out of the stadium, but it developed into a post-game party as the band built in audience participation.

## Bud Song

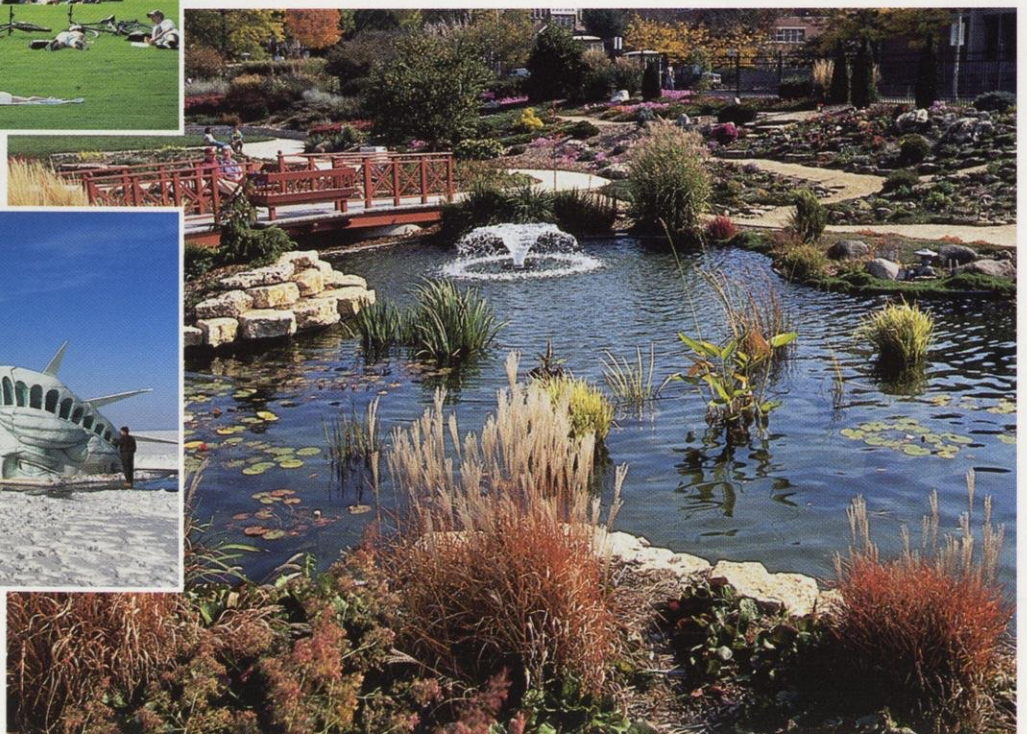
An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. Copyrighted by Sandlee Publishing Corporation in 1970, the song has become legendary at the University because of its polka-like rhythm. Band director Michael Leckrone said the song's popularity got started at a 1975 hockey game. "The crowd wanted to hear a polka," he said. "I didn't have any polkas. Just by accident, we had this beer commercial in the tunes we play. I told the band if we substituted the word 'Wisconsin' for 'Budweiser' it would work."

Leckrone said the song became a football tradition after a 1978 come-from-behind victory over Oregon. "Wisconsin was behind by three touchdowns, and the crowd was really dead. I played the song to get everyone pepped up. About 20 seconds after that, Wisconsin scored a touchdown. I played it again, and Wisconsin scored another touchdown. From then on, the band could never play enough 'Bud.'"
