Upon motion of Regent Campbell, seconded by Regent Cleary, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the special meeting of the Board held on October 30, 1946, as distributed, be corrected by inserting "for 1947-48" after the words "miscellaneous capital" in the action on page 6 relating to the 1947-49 Legislative Budget.

Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the special meeting of the Board held on October 30, 1946, as corrected, be approved.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Callahan, it was VOTED, That appointments numbered 1 to 215, inclusive, listed under Actions by the President, be approved.

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Cleary, it was VOTED, That salary and service adjustments numbered 1 to 29, inclusive, listed under Actions by the President, be approved.

Upon motion of Regent Hodgkins, seconded by Regent Werner, it was VOTED, That promotions numbered 1 to 3, inclusive, listed under Actions by the President, be approved.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Callahan, it was VOTED, That leaves of absence numbered 1 and 2, listed under Actions by the President, be approved.

The above actions by the President taken since the October 12, 1946, meeting of the Board and approved by the Regents in the foregoing resolutions are made a part of the records of this meeting.

Upon recommendation of President Fred, and upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Campbell, it was

VOTED, That Item 4, page 3, of the minutes of October 12, 1946, be amended by inserting the words "for the 1946-47 academic year." Item 4 as amended would then read:

That Churchill Eisenhart, associate professor of mathematics, be transferred from the College of Letters and Science to the Col-

lege of Agriculture, biometry and physics section, for the 1946-47 academic year; and that his salary be paid at the rate of \$472.22 per academic year payroll payment and that he be paid \$236.11 for the period September 16-28, 1946; charge to item for Eisenhart (R), p. 110.

Upon recommendation of President Fred, and upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Holmes, it was

WOTED That in accordance with a specific request from Thomas E. Brit-Trustee. tingham, Jr., \$2640 be accepted from the Brittingham Trust to be disbursed as a pension over a six months' period for Mrs. John Steuart Curry, widow of the late John Steuart Curry, Artist in Residence. To be credited to and disbursed from 15B, Gifts (Brittingham Trust).

President Fred presented a recommendation of the University Faculty.

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Callahan, it was

VOTED, That colleges and schools of the University be authorized to recognize with appropriate citations Wisconsin citizens or others who have been connected with either the University or the State, whose achievements have been outstanding. Recommendations of the colleges and schools for such citations shall be presented to the Regents for approval in advance of granting the citations.

President Fred presented the following recommendation of the Faculty Committee of the Men's Residence Halls:

(1) It is recommended that the new men's hall now under construction, just west of Van Hise, be named the Charles Sumner Slichten Hall. The name of Dean Slichter was chosen because of his great contributions to the hall system at Wisconsin. Dean Slichter was the first chairman of the Faculty Residence Halls Committee, he was one of the men most influential in the inauguration of the House Fellow system as we know it at Wisconsin, and it was Dean Slichter's philosophy and understanding that contributed so much to the development of the Residence Halls system at Wisconsin. The first meeting of a House Fellow group ever held was at Dean Slichter's home. He was devoted to the men's halls and enjoyed the progress made during the years with great interest and gratification. He gave unselfishly of his time to the interest of the student residents and was respected and loved by the men.

We not only believe this would be a worthy honor to bestow upon Dean Slichter, but we believe it would serve as an inspiration for those men who are to live in the hall.

(2) The plan of this new hall is so designed to accommodate fifty men on each of four floors. Each floor will have its own House Fellow, its own lounge, and will be considered as one unit of our halls. The Committee recommends that each floor of the hall be named so

that these individual houses can be identified by name. This is in keeping with our present system. For the four houses or floors of the new hall, the Committee recommends that they be named in honor of outstanding former hall residents who gave their lives in World War II. We believe such honor would be most fitting and the four men chosen are men who were truly outstanding men and who left a distinct mark in our Residence Halls. It is the wish of many of our present residents that the houses be so named. Two of the men served as House Fellows and two served on the Men's Halls Cabinet - the highest governing body of the Men's Halls. A brief description follows the name of each man.

A. ROBERT C. GAVIN

Robert C. Gavin, Fond du Lac, lived in the Residence Halls two years during which time he was Fellow of Bashford House. A medical student, Bob's energies were devoted toward the activities of the men in his house rather than toward his own personal interests. Bob encouraged his men to join in the general campus activities. He guided one man in his house to the election as the first independent prom king in the history of the University.

Bob came to the University from Holy Cross, where he was in debating, track, dramatics, glee club, and journalism. He was a member of Nu Sigma Nu, honorary medical fraternity.

A gentleman in the full sense of the word with extraordinary personal charm, Bob's understanding and emotional balance were attributes which gained for him the confidence of the men in his house and the respect of men in the Residence Halls.

Bob went down in the hurricane that struck the Philippines in 1944. At the time, he was medical officer on the Destroyer Monoghan.

B. IRA GOLDBERG

Ira Goldberg was born in Yonkers, New York, on September 7, 1920. He attended the public schools in Yonkers and graduated from high school there in June, 1939. In September, 1939, Ira enrolled in the University of Wisconsin and took up residence in Turner House of the Kronshage Units of the men's residence halls. While pursuing his studies on the Hill, Ira became very active in the affairs of his house and the Men's Halls Association. In the fall of 1940 he was elected social chairman of Turner House, became a clerk in the Men's Dormitory Store, and became active in the Residence Halls Political Association. In the fall of 1942 Ira was elected to the Men's Halls Cabinet, became Chairman of the Dormitory Store Committee, and was elected President of Turner House. Because of his outstanding qualities of leadership, Ira Goldberg was appointed House Fellow of Gilman House for the 1942-43 school term. He graduated from the University with a B.S. degree in chemistry in June, 1943, and went immediately into the U.S. Marine Corps.

Goldberg rose to the rank of 1st Lieutenant and was killed in action on Iwo Jima on March 7, 1945.

C. MARVIN E. BIERMAN

Marvin E. Bierman was born at Green Lake, Wisconsin, May 17, 1916. He attended Green Lake School and graduated from the high school there in 1935. He was active in athletics and other high school activities.

He entered the University of Wisconsin the fall of 1935 and spent the last two years in the Residence Halls. He was a resident of Mack House, the cooperative house at the time reserved for men that were working for their meals. He was President of his house; he was a member of the Men's Halls Association Cabinet and a member of the Store Committee. He was a leader in various other activities and will be remembered by many residents now in the Halls for his good natured disposition, which made him popular and well liked.

Marv graduated from the University in 1940 with a B.A. degree and returned to Green Lake where he went into the insurance business until December 7, 1942, when he entered the Columbia University Midshipmen School in New York. From New York he went to the Harvard University Naval Supply Corps School from which he graduated as a Naval Supply Corps Officer.

He served aboard the U.S.S. Alikula Bay and the U.S.S. Bismark Sea in the Pacific Theater. He was lost in action off Iwa Jima on February 21, 1945, when the Bismark Sea was sunk.

D. ORVILLE E. LUEDKE

Orville E. Luedke, Milwaukee, lived in the Residence Halls four years. A journalism major, he worked part of his way through school as a waiter in the Van Hise dining rooms. In his first year, Orv was in the University Band, and on the Freshmen Tennis Squad. He worked on the Daily Cardinal his second year. As a junior he was President of Gregory House, a member of the Halls' Cabinet, and on the University House Presidents' Council. He was a moving force at this time in stimulating the latent interests of hall men in campus activities. As a senior, Orv was Halls' Editor of the Daily Cardinal and Public Relations Chairman for his house. He was a member of Sigma Nu Fraternity and Sigma Delta Chi, professional journalism fraternity.

An energetic organizer with a winning personality, Orv did much toward bringing to the campus an understanding of the activities and aims of the Residence Halls.

Orville E. Luedke was killed in 1943 while engaged in maneuvers in this country.

Our Committee further recommends:

That the two houses or units of the Stadium Dormitory be named after two outstanding athletes, David N. Schreiner and Robert F. Baumann who lost their lives in World War II. This recommendation has been made by the Athletic Board and our Committee strongly approves of these choices as we believe the recommendation is most appropriate because both men were close friends throughout their college years, both were excellent athletes, and they served together in the Marine Corps. Bob Baumann was killed while trying to get word to Dave Schreiner concerning an enemy advance. A week later Schreiner was also killed.

Dave Schreiner was a resident of Conover House in the Men's Halls and Bob Baumann lived in the Stadium in 1941-42. Dave Schreiner entered the University in 1939, won all conference honors in 1941-42; was voted the Western Conferences' most valuable player in 1942; received all-American honorable mention in 1941 and was named unanimous All-American right end in 1942. He was co-captain of the 1942 team.

Robert Baumann entered the University in 1939 from Harvey, Illinois; played left tackle on the varsity football team for three years, was graduated in 1943. He and Dave Schreiner were both serving in the South Pacific as members of the Marine's Sixth Division. Both Baumann and Schreiner were killed on Ckinawa.

The present residents of the Stadium Units join the Athletic Board and this Committee in recommending that the two units be named after David N. Schreiner and Robert F. Baumann.

Upon recommendation of President Fred, and upon motion of Regent Hodgkins,

seconded by Regent Grady, it was

VOTED, That the new men's dormitory west of Van Hise Hall be named Charles Summer Slichter Hall; that the four houses of the Charles Summer Slichter Hall be named in honor of the following outstanding former hall residents who gave their lives in World War II:

> Robert C. Gavin Ira Goldberg Marvin E. Bierman Orville E. Luedke

and that the two houses of the Stadium Dormitory be named in honor of David N. Schreiner and Robert F. Baumann, outstanding athletes, who lost their lives in World War II.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE DIRECTOR OF BUSINESS AND FINANCE

I. Contracts, Leases and Agreements

That the Director of Business and Finance be authorized to sign a contract with Pettibone Bros. Mfg. Co. of Cincinnati, Ohio, for advanced corps R.O.T.C. uniforms for 1946-47, on the basis of their unit bid of \$44.70 per uniform. Adopted.

2. That upon the recommendation of Dean Baldwin, the Director of Business and Finance be authorized to sign a lease with Mr. Sherwood Bishop for the rental of eighteen acres of land in the Town of Somers, Kenosha County, Wisconsin, for the year commencing January 1, 1947, for a consideration of \$360.

Adopted.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Campbell, recommendations 1 and 2 listed under the recommendations of the Director of Business and Finance (I. Contracts, Leases and Agreements) were adopted.

II. Budget Items

1. That the 1-E Supplies and Expense budget of the Department of Military Science and Tactics be increased by \$8707 to provide for the purchase of advanced corps R.O.T.C uniforms (reimbursement will be received from the federal government).

Adopted.

2. That upon the recommendation of the faculty of the German Department the balance of \$1690.32 in the Carl Landsee Memorial Fund be transferred from 15-B Gifts to the University Trust Funds, with the understanding that either principal or earnings may be used for the purposes provided in the original bequest.

Adopted.

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Grady, recommendations 1 and 2 listed under the recommendations of the Director of Business and Finance (II. Budget Items) were adopted.

III. <u>Miscellaneous</u>

1. That permission be granted to continue the employment of Mr. Ray Anderson, Carpenter III, until June 30, 1947. Mr. Anderson reached the age of seventy years on November 12.

Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Cleary, recommendation No. 1 listed under the recommendations of the Director of Business and Finance (III. Miscellaneous) was adopted.

The Secretary reported that the following appointments to the Board of Visitors have recently been made by the Alumni Association:

The Secretary brought to the attention of the Regents a letter from the Wisconsin Canners Association expressing appreciation of the additional service rendered by the University of Wisconsin to Wisconsin agriculture and the citizens of the State by conducting the Short Course for Cannery Fieldmen. (Copy of letter attached.)

Regent Werner presented the report of the Finance Committee. Upon motion

of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was

VOTED, That upon the recommendation of the State Chief Engineer the contract for a passenger elevator for Sterling Hall be awarded to the S. Heller Elevator Company, Milwaukee, on the basis of their bid of \$11,800, and that the Director of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the contract, chargeable to 20.41(1)(F). The following bids were received:

Otis Elevator Company \$11,308
(with certain modifications in the specifications which are not acceptable to the Bureau of Engineering and the University)

Heller Elevator Company 11,800 (recommended for acceptance)

Murphy Elevator Company 12,471 (bid received late)

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Hodgkins, it was VOTED, That the business office be authorized to honor voluntary assignments by University employees of union dues and to make payrol deductions for such dues and pay the amounts so deducted to designated union officials when requested to do so in writing by the individual employee concerned.

Regent Werner reported that the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation had presented a revised proposal replacing the proposal that the Regents had approved at their meeting on July 25, 1946, relating to the development of the faculty housing project by the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation on the Eagle Heights site. Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was

VOTED, That the following action adopted by the Regents on July 25, 1946,

be rescinded:

"VOTED, That the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation be advised that the Regents approve their proposal for a housing project to be located on the Eagle Heights Farm in an area of approximately ten to twelve acres between

the University orchard and the Village of Shorewood Hills on the following terms and conditions:

- (1) That the rate of interest on unpaid balances be 1%.
- (2) That the principal amount be amortized at the rate of 2% annually for fifty years.
- (3) That there be no personal liability on the part of the Regents or the Wisconsin University Building Corporation, and that the only recourse in the case of default would be that the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation would take over the buildings subject to the leasehold."

A called vote was taken, all Regents present and voting "Aye" except Regent Grady who voted "No". Amended 14 December 1946 to include reasons given by Regent Grady for his negative vote. See Board. 12-14-46. p. 1

"A fifty-year lease of the site from the Regents to a non-profit sharing corporation, pursuant to Section 36.06(6) Wis. Stats., subject to the right of the Regents to cancel the lease at any time on payment of the unpaid balance of the mortgage."

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the proposed resolution, amended to read as follows, be approved:

WHEREAS The Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation has submitted a proposal to the Board of Regents relating to a housing project to be erected on the Eagle Heights site of the University campus, and

WHEREAS The said proposal provides that this housing project shall be for rent to members of the faculty, student body and staff of the University, with preference given to veterans, and

WHEREAS Such proposal seems well calculated to provide promptly housing urgently needed and vital to the University's ability to fulfill its obligation to the State, and

WHEREAS No other means has been found so well calculated to provide such housing and fulfill such obligation, and

WHEREAS It is contemplated that the Regents of the University of Wisconsin will give their full cooperation to the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation in the erection and operation of said project, and

WHEREAS Said proposal provides for erection and management of said project by the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation or by some other non-profit sharing corporation to be organized for such purpose, and

WHEREAS Said proposal provides that no financial obligation be incurred on the part of the Regents of the University of Wisconsin or the State of Wisconsin with respect to any matter relating to said project, and

WHEREAS Said proposal provides that the Regents of the University of Wisconsin will furnish the site of said project.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED That said proposal of the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation to the Board of Regents in its fundamentals be approved and accepted;

That the Attorney General be requested and directed to work in cooperation with counsel for the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation upon a plan to implement such proposal;

That the Regents suggest, though without limitation, that said plan may encompass the following steps,

- 1. A fifty-year lease of the site from the Regents to a non-profit sharing corporation, pursuant to Section 36.06(6) Wis. Stats., subject to the right of the Regents to cancel the lease at any time on payment of the unpaid balance of the mortgage.
- 2. A mortgage on said leasehold from the non-profit corporation to Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation.
- 3. A lease from the non-profit sharing corporation to the Regents, pursuant to Section 36.06(6) Wis. Stats.
- 4. A management contract between the Regents and said non-profit sharing corporation.

That the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation be requested, pending the completion of such plan, to proceed immediately with the erection of said housing on said Eagle Heights site.

A called vote was taken, all Regents present and voting "Aye" with the exception of Regent Grady who voted "No".

Regent Jones presented the report of the Constructional Development Committee.
