Regent Gelatt was present at committee meetings on Friday,

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was
VOTED, That the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board held on
November 12, 1949, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE PRESIDENT

- Faculty Actions -

1. That the following actions by the Faculty be approved:

- (1) To rescind that portion of its action of November 7, 1949 which changed the last date for final examinations in the second semester from June 13 to June 12.

Upon motion of Regent Hodgkins, seconded by Regent Campbell,
recommendation No. 1 (1), listed under Faculty Actions was adopted.

- (2) Recommendations of the special committee appointed to study the matter of granting one credit per semester for the basic R.O.T.C. course and three credits per semester for the advanced course, as follows:

- (a) That the basic courses (first and second years) in the

(Cont.)

recently established department of Air Science and Tactics may be substituted for the present military science requirement for "all able bodied male freshmen and sophomores."

- (b) That the advanced courses (third and fourth years) in Air Science and Tactics be allowed two credits per semester. (A total of eight credits may be counted toward the baccalaureate degrees in the same manner as is now allowed for the third and fourth year of advanced military science.)
- (c) That credit for the basic course (the first and second years) in both Military Science and in Air Science required of "all the able bodied male freshmen and sophomores," be continued as at present, i. e., no academic credit for the basic courses (first and second years).

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Jones, recommendation No. 1 (2), listed under Faculty Actions was adopted.

- 1. That the resignation of Walter W. Wilcox, professor of agricultural economics, be accepted; to take effect at the close of the first semester of 1949-50. (Professor Wilcox will join the staff of the Legislative Reference Service of the Library of Congress as Senior Specialist in Agriculture.)

Upon motion of Regent Hodgkins, seconded by Regent Campbell, recommendation No. 1, listed under Resignations was adopted.

- 1. That Laurence F. Graber, professor of agronomy, be granted leave of absence, with pay, for the second semester of 1949-50, on summer service leave basis.

Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Hodgkins, it was VOTED, That resignations numbered 1 to 7, inclusive, listed under Actions by the President, be approved.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That appointments numbered 1 to 27, inclusive, listed under Actions by the President, be approved.

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Jones, it was VOTED, That Salary and Service adjustments numbered 1 to 9, inclusive, listed under Actions by the President, be approved.

The above actions by the President taken since the November 12, 1949, meeting of the Board and approved by the Regents in the foregoing resolutions are made a part of the records of this meeting.

President Fred reported that the numerous petitions received from various groups and communities with reference to the retention of the Pro Arte Quartet had been given careful consideration and made the following statement:

"It is my recommendation that the Pro Arte Quartet be reappointed for 1950-51. I am not recommending that they be given faculty status.

(Cont.)

"My recommendation that the Pro Arte Quartet be continued is based on the assumption that the present membership will be maintained next year! The value of the Pro Arte Quartet is in considerable measure due to the harmonious working together of the four individuals. If any member of the Quartet should leave, it may be necessary to reconsider the entire situation."

Regent Grady stated: "I doubt if we are entitled or authorized to spend money for musical programs not involved in the instructional service of the University. It comes out of the same fund as for your professors and other faculty members. All I care to do is to keep the record straight. I have been voting this way consistently, and I desire now that if my vote in approving the list of Appointments embraced that of the Pro Arte Quartet, it be corrected so as to oppose the appointments of the members of the Pro Arte Quartet for the reasons I have stated. I desire to vote in favor of the recommendation that professorial rank be denied."

Regent Jones moved that the recommendation of the President be approved by the Board. The motion was seconded by Regent Arveson and was carried, Regents Grady and Werner voting "No".

Regent Grady stated: "I vote 'No' for the reasons just assigned and made a part of the record on that portion of it retaining the Quartet and making provision for this expenditure. I vote 'Aye' in favor of denial of professorial rank."

Regent Werner voted "no" and explained: "This is a luxury in which I don't think we are justified in indulging and having thrown up to us when we come before the Legislature next year for our requests. If means can be found to finance the Quartet other than through State funds, all right; otherwise I vote 'no'."

President Fred said that the administration would continue to study the situation and consider the possibility of supporting the Quartet from other sources of funds.

At the request of President Fred, Vice President Peterson reported that the Governor's Committee on State Supported Higher Education in the Central Lakeshore Area of the State met on November 17 and voted to appoint an Executive Committee consisting of Governor Rennebohm, Senator Robinson, Assemblyman Clark, State Superintendent of Public Instruction Watson and one representative each from the State Teachers Colleges and the University - the latter two appointees to be designated by the appropriate Board of Regents; and that this committee was authorized to employ the necessary staff for this study after consideration of the various groups of individuals who might be available.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Hodgkins, with Regent Jones putting the question, it was

VOTED, That President Sensenbrenner be designated as the representative of the University on the Executive Committee of the Governor's Committee on State Supported Higher Education in the Central Lakeshore Area of the State.

President Fred reported that the records should show two corrections in his statement entitled "Higher Education for Wisconsin" which was quoted in the Report of the Educational Committee as adopted by the Regents on November 12, 1949.

Upon recommendation of President Fred and
Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Watson, it was
VOTED, That the following corrections in the statement entitled
"Higher Education for Wisconsin" as quoted in the Report of the Educational
Committee, which was adopted by the Regents on November 12, 1949, be made a
matter of record:

- (a) In the first paragraph on page 2 of the Report of the Educational Committee, the estimated valuation of buildings and equipment of the Milwaukee Vocational School is revised to read "\$31,000,000" instead of "\$13,000,000".
- (b) In the third paragraph on page 2 of the Report of the Educational Committee, the last sentence is revised to read, "Stout Institute is authorized to give masters' degrees in industrial education, vocational education and home economics education."

I. Report of Actions Taken

1. In accordance with authority granted by the Regents for the Vice President of Business and Finance or, in his absence, the President of the University, to sign proposals, agreements, contracts and contract supplements of the United States Government for research work, educational programs and for services requested by the Government for military personnel and/or veterans assigned to or enrolled in the University of Wisconsin, and for other educational services of the University, the following contract supplement has been signed:

- (a) Supplement No. 3 effective June 21, 1948 to Veterans Administration Contract No. V3030V-263 covering the period June 21, 1948 to June 17, 1949, which supplement provides: 1) For the payment by the Veterans Administration of typing and binding charges not to exceed a total of \$100.00 for a doctorate thesis, \$75.00 for a Master's Thesis or seminar; and \$35.00 for a Bachelor's Thesis or seminar; and 2) for the renumbering of Supplement No. 1 to this contract, dated June 1, 1949, to Supplement No. 2. This contract covers the enrollment of veterans in the University.

2. In accordance with the authority granted by the Regents on September 27, 1947, for the Vice President of Business and Finance to sign contracts and leases not in excess of \$2500.00, the following contracts, leases, and orders have been signed:

Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Grady, recommendations Nos. 2 and 3 listed under the recommendations and report of the Vice President of Business and Finance (II. Miscellaneous) were adopted.

Regent Werner presented the report of the Finance Committee. Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was

VOTED, That the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign a lease between the Echo Company, Milwaukee, Wisconsin and The Regents of The University of Wisconsin covering space in the Republic Building, 922 North Fourth Street, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, to be used for a student health center for the Milwaukee Extension Division, for a term of three years beginning January 1, 1950, at a monthly rental of \$160.00 to amortize remodelling costs, and a monthly rental of \$135.00 for use of space and services, with options to the lessee to cancel lease at any time after June 30, 1951, and to renew the lease for an additional two year period beginning January 1, 1953, together with such other provisions as are incorporated in the lease as submitted to the Regents.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Jones it was

VOTED, That the bequest by the late James D. Phillips of the City of Los Angeles, California, to the Regents of The University of Wisconsin, to be used for scholarships to be known as the "James D. and Clara Moore Phillips Scholarship" and for medical research be accepted by the Regents of The University of Wisconsin in accordance with the terms and conditions of the last Will and Testament of James D. Phillips, deceased; and that the President, the Secretary, or the Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign receipts in the name of the Regents for the funds received under this bequest or to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the Regents.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Hodgkins, it was

VOTED, That \$6,000 of unused balances in 16B federal research appropriations carried forward from 1948-49 be added to the 16B federal research budget for salaries in the College of Agriculture for the year 1949-50; and that \$5,000 be transferred from Supplies and Expense 16B federal research funds to Salaries and Wages in the budget of the College of Agriculture; and further that \$6,000 be transferred from Salaries and Wages to Equipment in the 16C Extension federal funds budget of the College of Agriculture.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was

VOTED, That, upon the recommendation of the special committee appointed by the Governor to explore ways and means of making a study of higher education in the central and southern lake shore areas of Wisconsin, the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to request the Emergency Board for an appropriation of \$10,000 to be added to 20.415(1) for the purpose of financing approximately one-half of the estimated cost of the study. (Confirming written approval by the Regents, on the basis of which the request was made to the Emergency Board on November 30, 1949.)

The following motion was made by Regent Werner and seconded by Regent Hodgkins:

(Cont.)

That the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized and directed to pay \$1,893.07 to the Midwest Inter-Library Corporation as the University of Wisconsin's share of costs in the operation of the Midwest Inter-Library Corporation for the fiscal year 1949-50, and that \$1,893.07 be transferred from unbudgeted LE receipts to the budget of the General Library for this purpose.

A voice vote was taken with Regents Grady and Kleczka voting "No",

Regent Grady stated, "I vote 'no' for the reasons I have heretofore stated in connection with this matter. In order that the record may show the reasons I object to the appropriation on the ground that we are not authorized to remove any part of the University beyond the limits of the State, and my objection is based upon the idea that if you can move 30,000 or 40,000 volumes out of the Library to the State of Illinois, you could move the whole Library. In theory it is a violation of the Constitution that requires the University to be established and maintained at or near the seat of government in the State of Wisconsin. I object further on the ground that under the contract proposed, the Regents become in a sense a partner and a participant and stockholder, I take it if stock is issued, in a foreign corporation, and I contend the Regents, being a body corporate created by the Legislature, are limited in their powers to the authority conferred, and that we have no authority and no right to devote the money of this State and of this University to the maintenance of any organization, much less a storehouse for a portion of the Library that has been purchased by the people of this State, and have it located outside its limits. The Constitution, it seems to me, very clearly provides that the University, not in part but in its entirety, shall always be maintained within the State and at or near the seat of government. If you can appropriate \$4,000 a year indefinitely for this purpose, you could appropriate \$40,000 or any other sum which to me would be entirely illegal and contrary to both the idea, theory and the expressed provisions of the framers of the Constitution of this State. By this action, which it seems to me is so clearly in violation of both the law and the Constitution that I must oppose it, we will be entering upon a program that will establish a dangerous precedent and will offer opportunity for future encroachment. I wish to vote 'No'."

In reply to a statement by Regent Campbell that the University had spent money on extension centers and branch stations in other parts of the State, Regent Grady stated: "The Constitution further provides - I'm glad you called that to my attention - that there may be connected other colleges throughout the State - and note the language 'throughout the state' - as the needs of education may require. It is under that theory that the action was taken in reference to extension centers and to some other activities. But there is no place in the Constitution where it is provided you may devote money to maintenance of buildings or any part of the University outside the State."

Regent Kleczka stated: "I want to record my vote as 'No' on the proposal because in my opinion such action would be unconstitutional, despite the opinion rendered by the Attorney General and despite the action taken by the State Legislature attempting to legalize the proposed entry into the contract which was voted by the majority of the Regents heretofore, and to make my position consistent, I now vote 'No' on the proposal."

(Cont.)

A called vote was taken.

Regents Arveson, Campbell, Hodgkins, Jones, Sensenbrenner, Watson and Werner voted "Aye". Regents Grady and Kleczka voted "No".

The motion was declared carried.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the Attorney General of Wisconsin and Mr. George I. Haight, Special Counsel, be directed to appeal to the United States Supreme Court the decision of the Supreme Court of Illinois upholding a tax upon the bequest of the late Kemper K. Knapp to The Regents of the University of Wisconsin.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Hodgkins, it was VOTED, That the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign a contract with the W. M. Welch Manufacturing Company, Chicago, Illinois, for University diplomas required for the period December 1, 1949 to October 1, 1951.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the elevator liability insurance policies be cancelled and that the Vice President of Business and Finance request a refund of the unearned premiums and negotiate with the insurance company for elevator inspection service.

Regent Jones presented the report of the Constructional Development Committee. Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED,

- (1) That \$17,862 be allotted from 1-E unbudgeted receipts for the purchase of Dairy Building classrooms and office furniture and for lockers.
- (2) That the cost of equipping the sales room in the new Dairy Building be charged to the 3-K Dairy and Farm Sales revolving appropriation.
- (3) That inasmuch as only one bid was received on November 3 for Group 4, sales room and miscellaneous equipment, the bid be rejected because of insufficient competition and that new bids be requested for this group of equipment.
- (4) That the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign contracts with the following low bidders for Dairy Building equipment and that the costs be charged to the items for equipment and contingent in the schedule of costs for the Dairy Building project and to 1-E and 3-K as above provided:

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Campbell, it was
VOTED, That the preliminary plans for the Cardiovascular Research
Unit of McArdle Memorial Laboratory be approved and authority be granted the State
Architect to proceed with the development of final plans and specifications.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Hodgkins, it was
VOTED, That the Executive Committee be authorized to act for the
Board in awarding contracts for storm sewers for the Dairy Building for which
bids will be opened on December 23, and for Engineering Building equipment for
which bids will be opened on December 20.

Mr. Jones stated that in order that there may be definite under-
standing of the reason for the resolution to be presented as the next item,
it would be helpful if Mr. Peterson would sketch out briefly some of the events
that have occurred during the past several months leading up to this resolution.

Vice President Peterson explained that the University of Wisconsin
Center Building will be located in the area between the Men's Gymnasium and
Lake Street to the north boundary of the fraternity property which is owned by
Wisconsin Alpha of Phi Delta Theta. This fraternity property is needed by the
University as a part of the site for the Wisconsin Center Building. The Univer-
sity of Wisconsin Foundation has deposited \$100,000 with the University to be
used for property purchases and with the understanding that any balances remaining
in the fund are to be used toward the construction or purchase of equipment for
the Wisconsin Center Building. The University has tried to negotiate with the
owners of the Phi Delta Theta Fraternity property for the purchase of the
property on a mutually satisfactory basis. The Secretary of the fraternity
organization which owns the property refused the request of the University for
permission for impartial appraisers to enter the premises for the purpose of
making an appraisal. An appraisal was then made by the University on the basis
of known facts regarding the property and on October 18, 1949, the Regents
made an offer to Wisconsin Alpha of Phi Delta Theta House Association for the
purchase of the property for a cash consideration of \$82,450. The offer to
purchase provided that the offer was good until noon on December 15, 1949. There
has been considerable correspondence before and since the offer was made be-
tween this office and the Secretary of the Phi Delta Theta House Association.
The Secretary has consistently refused to name a price that the Fraternity would
accept for the property and the owners did not act to accept the offer of
\$82,450 made by the University. The University administration is of the opinion
that the Fraternity has been given ample opportunity to negotiate with the
University on a basis that will be to the mutual advantage of the University and
the owners of the property. Having failed in these negotiations, there appears
to be only one alternative, which is to resort to condemnation.

(Cont.)

Regent Jones moved the adoption of the following resolution:

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, additional lands are required by The Regents of the University of Wisconsin for university purposes in the City of Madison, Dane County, Wisconsin, and

WHEREAS, funds are available for acquisition of such lands, and

WHEREAS, the property owned by the Wisconsin Alpha of Phi Delta Theta House Association, located at 620 North Lake Street, Madison, Wisconsin, and more particularly hereinafter described, is required for the building program which the Regents have planned for needed university expansion,

NOW, THEREFORE, Be It Resolved, by The Regents of the University of Wisconsin, in regular meeting assembled, in accordance with section 32.07, Wisconsin Statutes, that it is necessary to take and acquire for university purposes by condemnation proceedings, and it is hereby so determined, the following described real estate situated in the City of Madison, Dane County, Wisconsin:

Part of Lots 11 and 12, Block 2, Original Plat, City of Madison, Dane County, Wisconsin; Beginning on W line Lake Street 182' N of Langdon Street, then N 100', then W 115', then N at right angles to lake shore, then westerly along lake shore to E line of Lot 10, then S to point 182' N of Langdon Street, then E 132' to point of beginning.

Be It Further Resolved, that subject to approval of the Governor of the State of Wisconsin, the Attorney General of Wisconsin be and he is hereby requested, authorized and instructed to commence and prosecute proceedings in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 32, Wisconsin Statutes, and to take any other appropriate legal action which may, by him, be deemed necessary to acquire said property free and clear of all encumbrances.

The motion to adopt the above resolution was seconded by Regent Campbell and a call vote was taken, all Regents present voting "Aye". The motion was declared carried unanimously.

The Secretary reported that the meeting of the Regent-Faculty Conference Committee would be held on Friday, January 13, 1950.

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Hodgkins, it was VOTED, That a committee be appointed to draft a resolution in memory of the late Julius P. Heil, former governor of the state of Wisconsin, and that the resolution be presented at the next meeting of the Board of Regents.

President Sensenbrenner appointed Regents Kleczka, Werner and Grady to the committee to draft a memorial resolution in memory of former Governor Heil.

The meeting adjourned at 11:10 A.M.
