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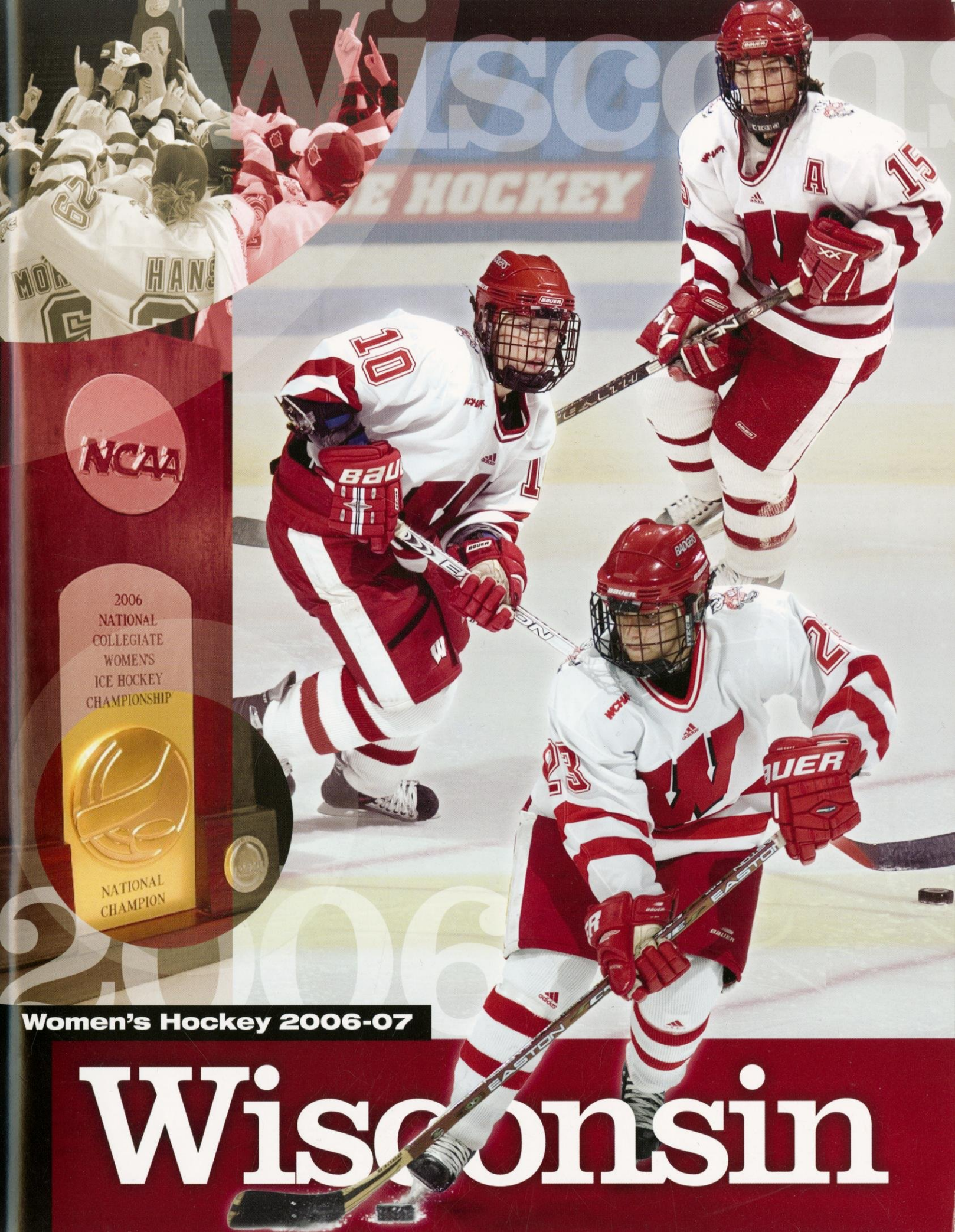
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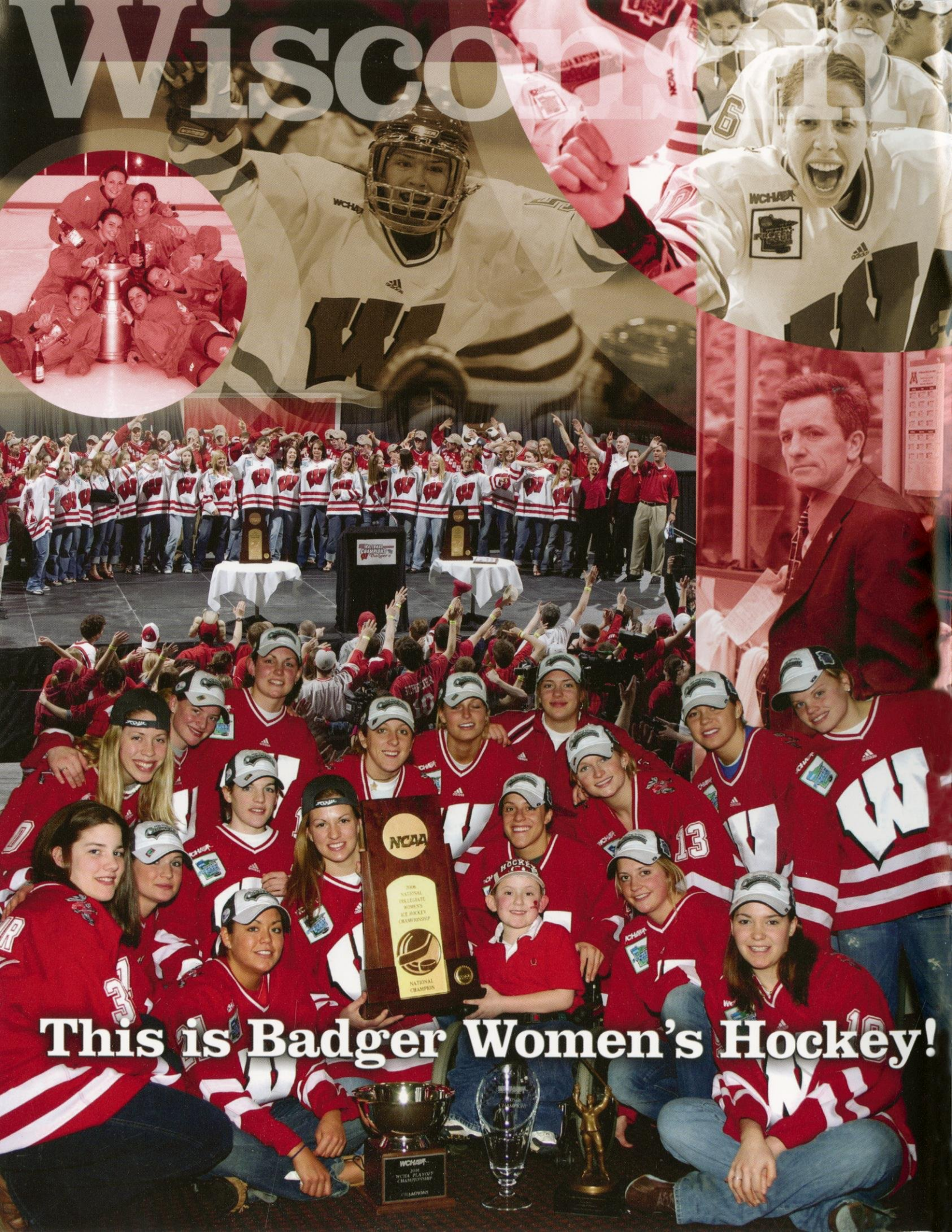

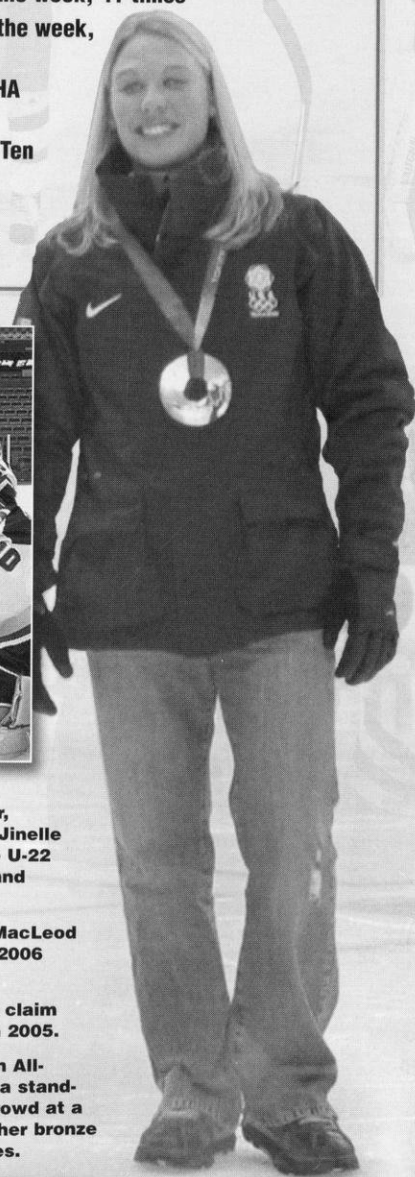
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This Is Wisconsin Women's Hockey...

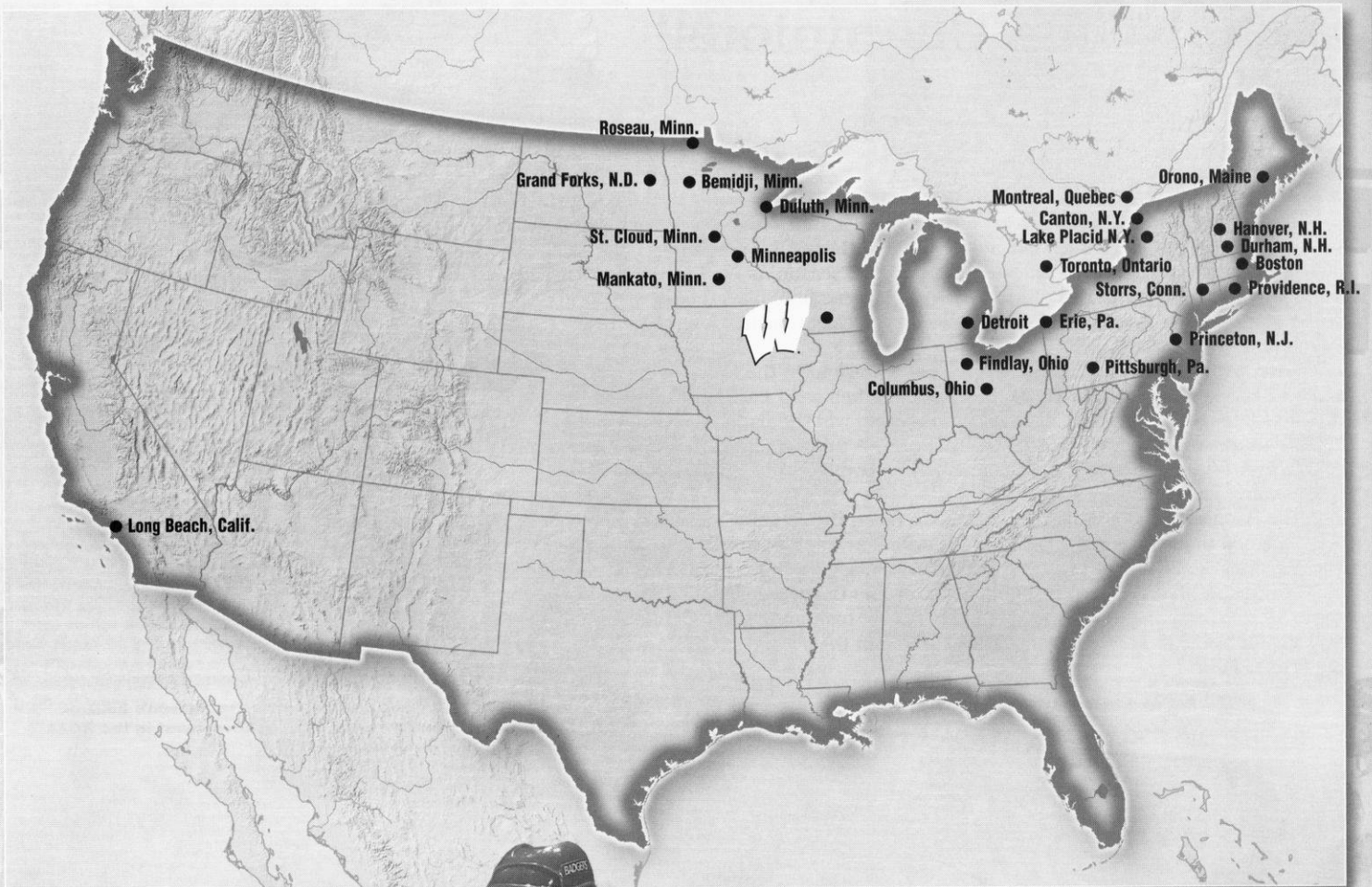

Kerry Weiland became Wisconsin's first first-team All-American in 2002. She was also a second-team All-American in 2001, making her one of only three Badgers to earn the honor twice.

Meghan Hunter was a two-time second-team All-American, earning honors in 2001 and 2002. Hunter and Weiland were the first Badgers to be named All-Americans. Hunter remains UW's all-time leading scorer with 177 points.

2006 NCAA Champions!

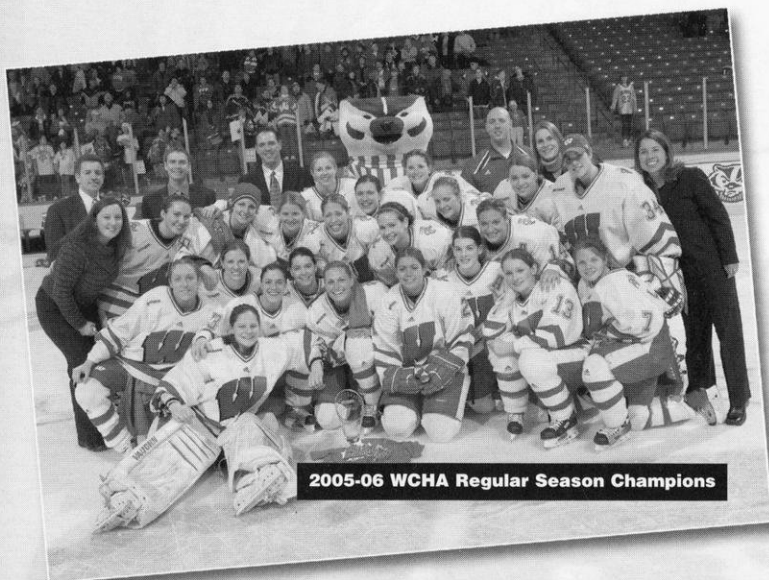
The 2005-06 season was a dream year for the Wisconsin women's hockey team as it captured the program's first national championship with a 36-4-1 record. Along the way, the Badgers also won their first WCHA regular season and playoff championships. Postseason awards reflected UW's special season as Sara Bauer became the first Badger to receive the Patty Kazmaier Award as national player of the year and head coach Mark Johnson earned the 2006 American Hockey Coaches Association Division I Coach of the Year award.

Wisconsin became the first school to post a shutout in the Frozen Four with a 1-0 win over St. Lawrence on March 24. The Badgers then went back and repeated the feat two days later in a 3-0 victory against Minnesota to win the national championship. Freshman Jessie Vetter, who started all three NCAA tournament games and allowed one goal in over 200 minutes of NCAA tournament action, was named the Frozen Four Most Outstanding Player.

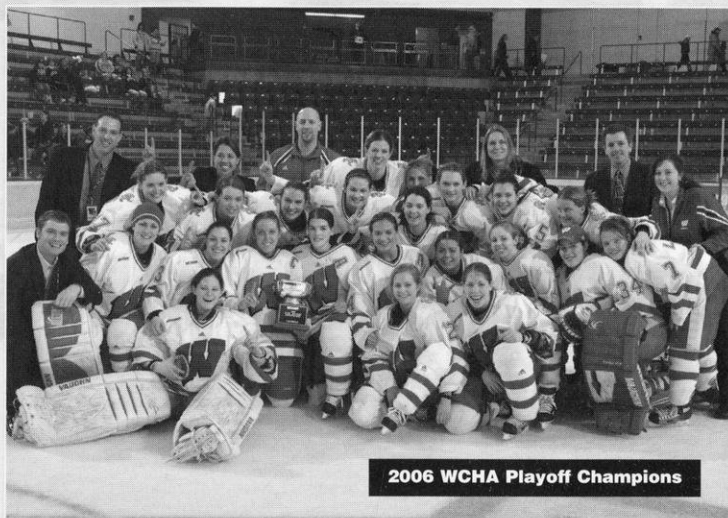
The Badgers faced a difficult challenge to reach the Frozen Four when Mercyhurst was assigned to play against UW in a quarterfinal at Capitol Ice Arena in Middleton, Wis. The game marked the first time that Wisconsin earned the right to host an NCAA tournament contest. Although Mercyhurst struck first, the Badgers responded quickly to tie the game with six minutes left in the opening period. It took more than 75 minutes for the next goal to come, but Tia Hanson's goal 10:10 into the second overtime sent UW on to the Frozen Four.

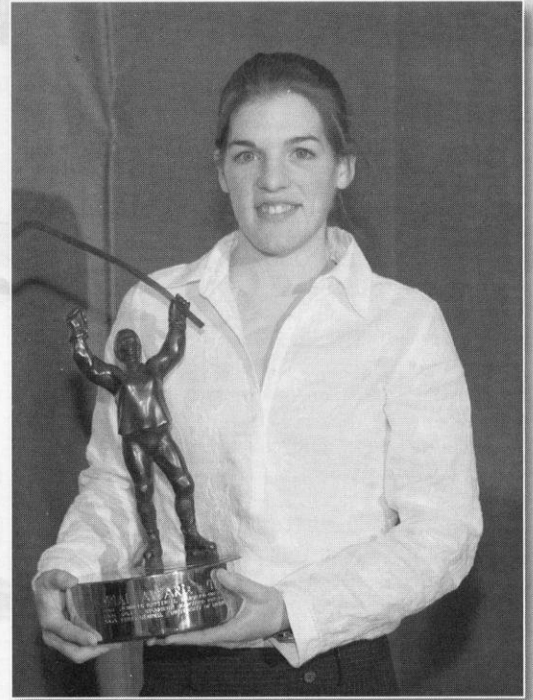

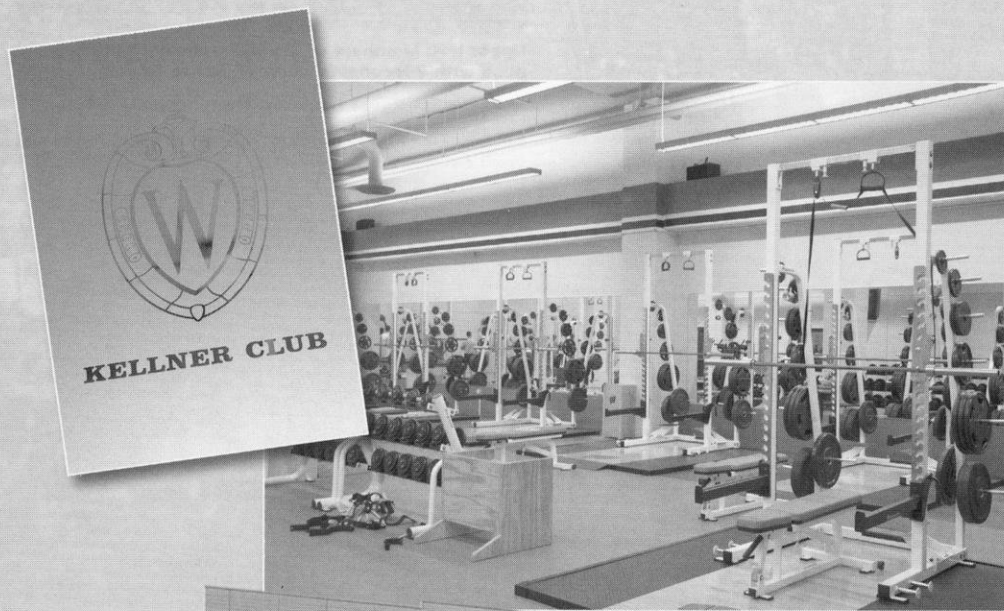
The Kohl Center

Opened in 1998, the Kohl Center is one of the premiere facilities in all of college hockey. Since the 2004-05 season, the Kohl Center has been the permanent home for women's hockey games. In the last two years at the Kohl Center, the Badgers are 30-4-1 at home for a winning percentage of .871. The arena, which also hosts the men's hockey team as well as the men's and women's basketball teams, seats 15,237 when set up for hockey, making it the second-largest college-owned hockey arena in the country. The facility also holds 17,142 for basketball.

The Kohl Center is named after U.S. Senator Herb Kohl, a 1956 UW-Madison graduate who donated \$25 million towards the construction of the arena. Kohl's gift is the single-largest private donation in UW history.

Recent additions to the Kohl Center include a new scoreboard and ring beam. The main Kohl Center scoreboard includes 9-by-14-foot video boards on all four sides that provide Wisconsin fans the chance to watch video replays. The ring beam, which runs the circumference of the arena at the first balcony level, makes Wisconsin one of a select few college venues with a ring beam, creating a unique and exciting game atmosphere.

New additions for the 2006-07 season include a new and expanded weight room as well as an on-site satellite office for the Fetzer Academic Center. Student-athletes will also use the Kellner Club as a dining hall. Located on the second floor of the Kohl Center, the Kellner Club is an exclusive dining club available on event days.

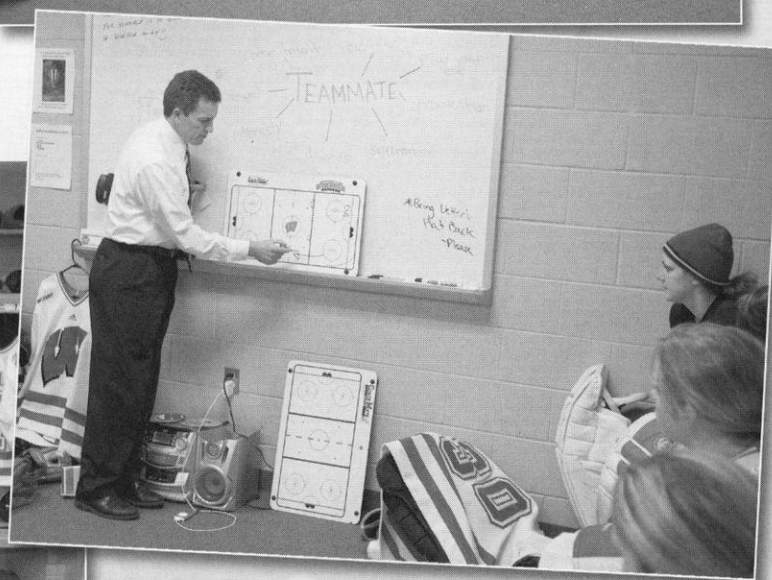
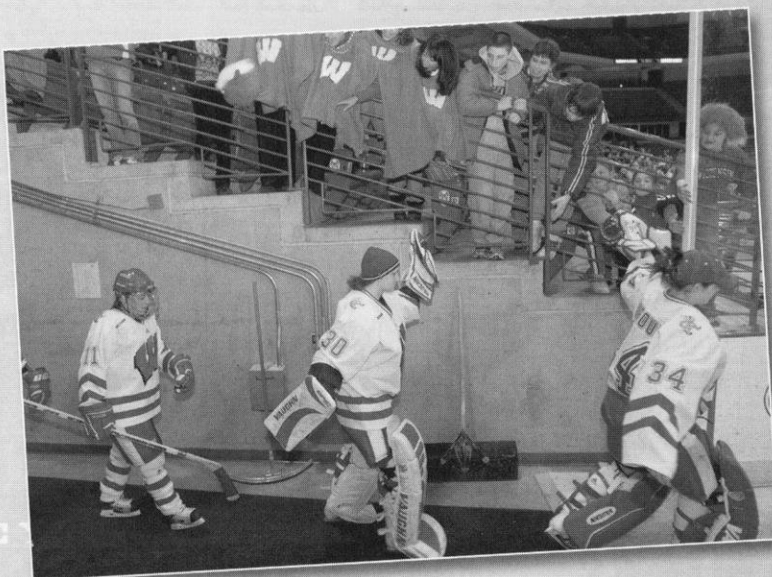

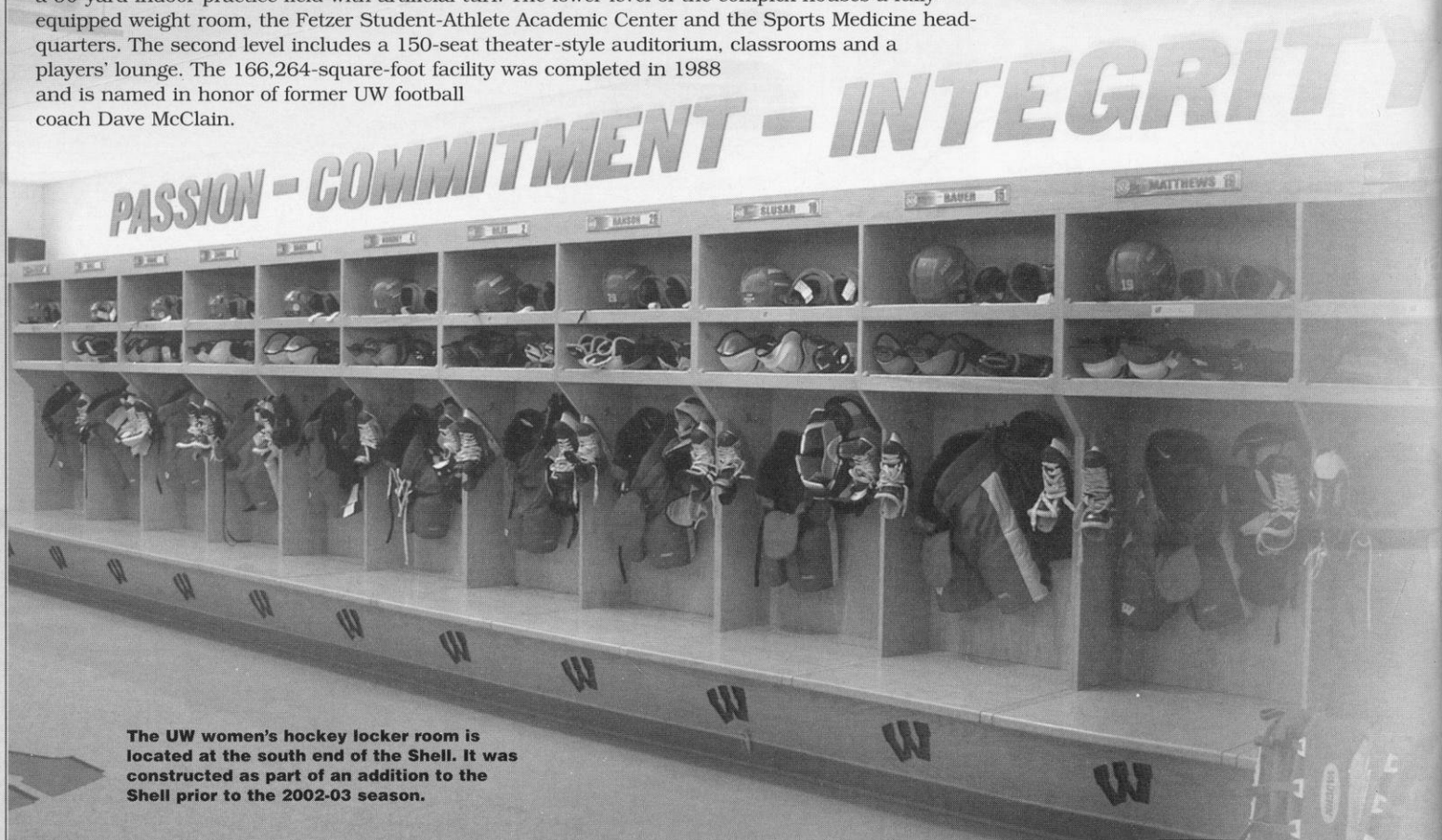
The Shell and The McClain Athletic Facility



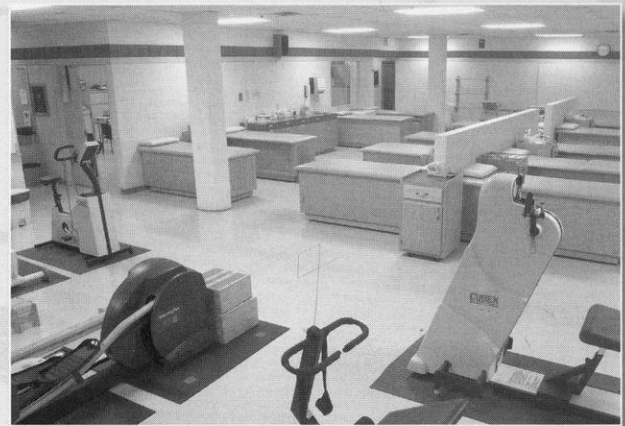
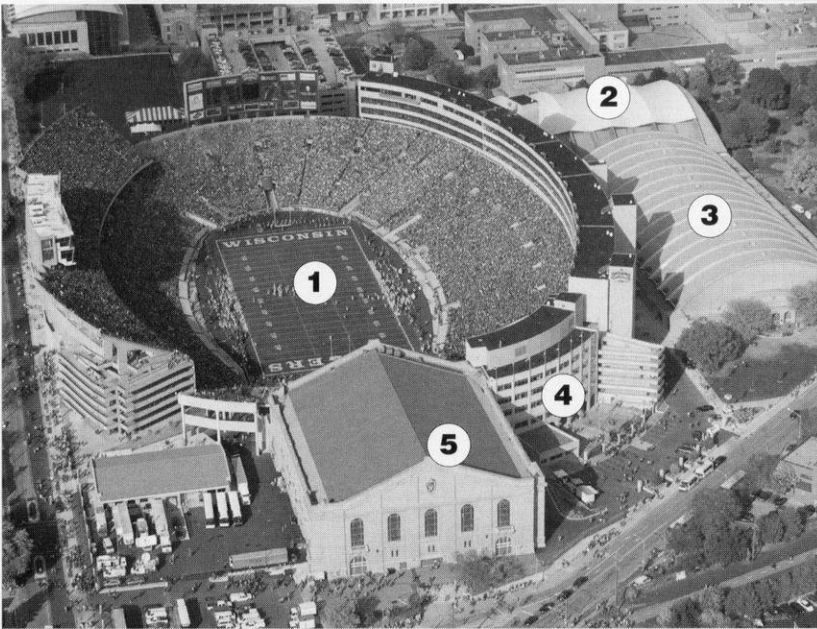
The Wisconsin women's hockey team utilizes a number of top-class facilities in and around Camp Randall Stadium. The primary home for the Badgers is the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center, more commonly referred to as the Shell.

The Shell is located on the east side of Camp Randall Stadium and houses the main women's hockey locker room as well as an NHL-sized practice rink. The locker room was built before the 2002-03 season as an addition to the south end of the practice facility. The complex includes a skate sharpening room, coaches' room, classroom complete with practice goals and boards, as well as dress down and locker rooms.

The Dave McClain Athletic Facility is another important complex to Wisconsin women's hockey. Located adjacent to the northeast side of Camp Randall Stadium, the McClain Facility features a 90-yard indoor practice field with artificial turf. The lower level of the complex houses a fully-equipped weight room, the Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center and the Sports Medicine headquarters. The second level includes a 150-seat theater-style auditorium, classrooms and a players' lounge. The 166,264-square-foot facility was completed in 1988 and is named in honor of former UW football coach Dave McClain.



The UW women's hockey locker room is located at the south end of the Shell. It was constructed as part of an addition to the Shell prior to the 2002-03 season.



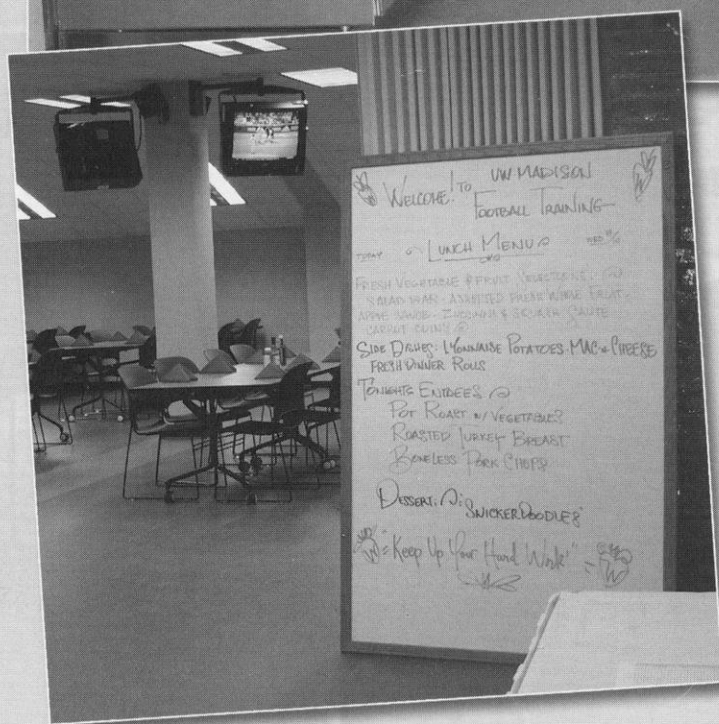

The dining hall offers a chance to build friendships with student-athletes from other sports because it is a natural gathering place. Players from most of Wisconsin's 23 different teams utilize the dining hall, creating a unique environment for all student-athletes.

Quality food and service is provided by the Department of Athletics' food and beverage staff.



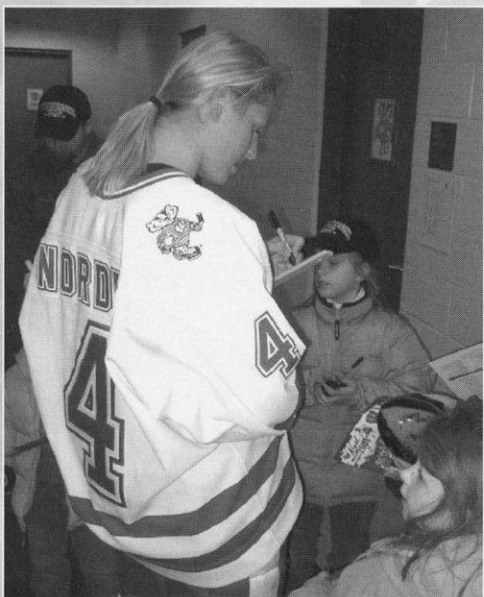

Badgers in the Community

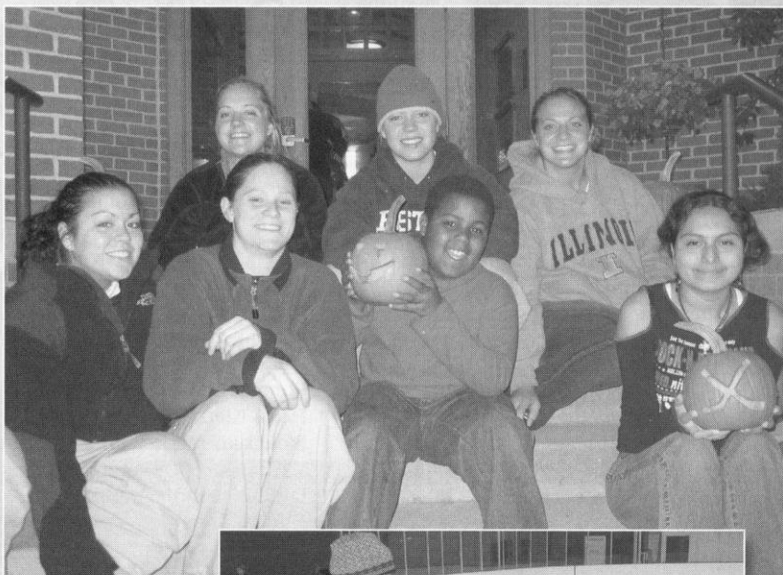

2006-07 Season Outlook

Last season was a year of firsts for the Wisconsin Badgers. The team tied an NCAA record with 36 wins en route to the program's first WCHA regular season, WCHA playoff and NCAA championships. Playing in their first Frozen Four in program history, the Badgers recorded the first two shutouts in Frozen Four history and became the first school outside the state of Minnesota to claim the national title.

Returning 17 letterwinners from last year's team, including Patty Kazmaier winner Sara Bauer, Patty Kazmaier finalist Bobbi-Jo Slusar and Frozen Four Most Outstanding Player Jessie Vetter, expectations are once again high in Madison. The Badgers are hoping they can take head coach Mark Johnson on a memorable trip back to Lake Placid, N.Y., in March, site of the 2007 Frozen Four.

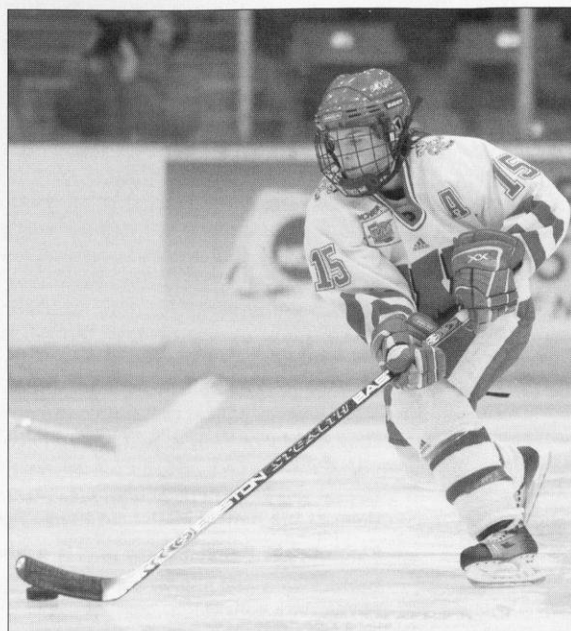
Wisconsin will begin its quest to repeat as national champions without the leadership of five seniors and one junior from last year's roster. Captain Sharon Cole, assistant captain Nicki Burish, Grace Hutchins and Cyndy Kenyon all depart after helping Wisconsin record the second-most goals in program history last season (155). Meanwhile, goalie Meghan Horras, who leaves UW as the school's all-time leader in shutouts with 16, and converted defender Vicki Davis will leave a void in a defensive corps that allowed the third

fewest goals per game in NCAA history (1.24).

The responsibility of replacing that leadership will fall to a seven-member senior class led by captain Bobbi-Jo Slusar. Bauer returns for her second year as assistant captain and will be joined in that role by Phoebe Monteleone. Forward Heidi Kletzien, defenders Meghan Mikkelsen and Kristen Witting, and goalie Christine Dufour will also help the Badgers in their quest back to the top.

Six new faces will come to Madison this fall to help Wisconsin continue its development into a national power. Four of the newcomers will fill the holes in UW's offense left by the four departing senior forwards: Meghan Duggan, Jasmine Giles, Emily Kranz and Kyla Sanders. At the other end of the ice, defender Ally Strickler and goalie Alannah McCready will help bolster Wisconsin's defense.

Wisconsin seems to have shed its perception as a defensive-oriented team after ranking in the top three in national scoring in each of the last two seasons.



Senior assistant captain Sara Bauer will begin the 2006-07 season 31 points shy of the UW career points record. Bauer's 146 points through three years ranks third on the UW all-time list behind Meghan Hunter (177 points) and Kendra Antony (159 points).



Captain Bobbi-Jo Slusar will help lead the 2006-07 Badgers from the blue line. Slusar was the highest-scoring defender in the nation last year and was a Patty Kazmaier finalist.

This year will be no exception as the Badgers return six of their top seven scorers and over 73 percent of their point production from last season.

Fresh off of a 58-point campaign that earned her the Patty Kazmaier Award as national player of the year, Bauer will lead the UW offense in 2006-07. With one season left to play as a Badger, Bauer ranks third in school history in goals (56), assists (90) and points (146). Slusar will also help create offense from the blue line. The 2006 WCHA Defensive Player of the Year and Patty Kazmaier Award finalist ranked first in the nation among defenders in points with 40 last season.

Junior Jinelle Zaugg will be expected to continue her growth as a player. After notching 26 points in her rookie campaign, Zaugg led the team in goals (24), power-play goals (10), game-winning goals (eight) and shots (154) last year. Sophomores Angie Keseley and Erika Lawler will also be asked to carry a larger load after 33- and 32-point years as rookies, respectively.

The Badgers will rely on a great wealth of experience within their defensive corps this season. Seven defenders return from last year's team that allowed the fewest goals per game in program history with all of them having played at least 30 games. Three of the seven (Slusar, Mikkelsen and Witting) have played over 100 games for the Cardinal and White while another, junior Emily Morris, played in all 41 games as a sophomore last season to push her

career total to 77. Wisconsin's seven returning defenders have played in an average of 72.9 games in their careers.

With Slusar's WCHA Defensive Player of the Year Award last season, a Badger has now claimed that honor in three consecutive seasons. In that time, Wisconsin has finished the year ranked among the top three teams in the nation in fewest goals against per game each year.

Last year's 1.24 goals against per game was the lowest ever by an NCAA championship team. However, opposing teams found goals even harder to come by once the postseason started. In seven WCHA and NCAA tournament games, the Badgers allowed just three goals and recorded a penalty kill percentage of 96.7, a trend the team will look to continue in 2006-07.

Wisconsin's goaltenders provide an intriguing combination of experience and potential. Dufour, a senior, has split time in net in each of her three seasons as a Badger. In 35 career games, Dufour has posted 29 wins including 11 shutouts. She boasts a career save percentage of .934 and a goals against average of 1.19, both of which would rank first in program history. Until last season, Dufour's goals against average of 0.80 from her rookie year stood as the single-season school record.

Sophomore Jessie Vetter demonstrated her potential during Wisconsin's postseason run last season. After playing just eight games in the regular season, Vetter was between the pipes in five of UW's seven postseason games, including all three in the NCAA tournament. In the NCAA tournament, Vetter allowed just one

goal, posted the first two shutouts in Frozen Four history and earned the Frozen Four Most Outstanding Player Award. She finished the year with a stunning .962 save percentage and 0.78 goals against average, both of which are single-season school records.

Wisconsin's success in the WCHA may be decided in the first and final four conference series of the regular season. The Badgers play at home in three of the first four weekends of the conference season before concluding with a similar stretch. UW won a school-record 17 games at home last season and owns a home winning per-

centage of .871 (30-4-1) since making the Kohl Center its permanent home before the 2004-05 season.

Immediately following the season, Mark Johnson will serve as the head coach of the U.S. Women's National Team at the 2007 International Ice Hockey Federation Women's World Championship April 3-10, 2007, in Winnipeg and Selkirk, Manitoba, Canada. The post will give Johnson, the 2006 American Hockey Coaches Association Women's Division I Coach of the Year, another chance to add to his impeccable playing and coaching career with USA Hockey.

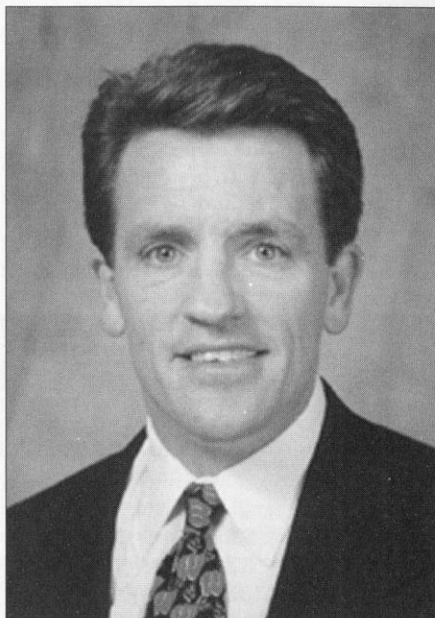

Head Coach Mark Johnson

With strong ties to Wisconsin as a coach's son, player and assistant coach, Mark Johnson stepped into the role of head women's hockey coach beginning with the 2002-03 season. In four seasons, Johnson and the Wisconsin women's hockey team have continued to shatter school records and make program history. Johnson's crew has set a new school record for wins each season he has been at the helm, including an NCAA record-tying 36 victories in the 2005-06 campaign. Johnson was named the 2006 American Hockey Coaches Association Division I Coach of the Year after leading the Badgers to their first WCHA regular season, playoff and NCAA championships as well as having one of his players, Sara Bauer, earn the program's first Patty Kazmaier Award.

As an accomplished athlete, coach and humanitarian, Johnson continues to be honored with awards year after year. He received the NCAA Silver Anniversary award, one the most prestigious honors given by the NCAA, in 2005 for his accomplishments in the 25 years following his days as a student-athlete. In 2004 he was inducted into the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame for his individual accomplishments as a player and coach. He was previously inducted as a member of the 1980 U.S. Olympic hockey team in 2003. Vince Lombardi Charitable Funds honored Johnson's volunteer work by presenting him with the 2004 Award of Excellence. He also has earned the honor of coaching the U.S. women's national team at the 2007 International Ice Hockey Federation Women's World Championship this coming April in Winnipeg and Selkirk, Manitoba.

Named the 2003 WCHA Co-Coach of the Year and also one of eight finalists for the AHCA Division I Coach of the Year, Johnson guided Wisconsin to a 22-8-5 overall and 14-6-4 WCHA record that season.



In the 2004-05 season, the Badgers made history under the supervision of Johnson, winning a program-record 28 games (28-9-1) and earning the program's first-ever NCAA postseason berth. The team climbed as high as second in the national rankings by defeating then-No. 2 Minnesota Duluth in the WCHA tournament semifinals and dramatically forcing overtime by scoring two goals in the final minute of regulation vs. No. 1 Minnesota in the championship game.

Johnson carried the momentum into the 2005-06 campaign as Wisconsin debuted at No. 1 in the USCHO.com preseason poll and then went on to validate that distinction with a 36-4-1 record and a national championship.

Leadership

The third head coach in the program's history, Johnson joined the staff after serving as an assistant coach with the men's program from 1996-2002.

During that time, he helped the men's team to a WCHA regular-season title during the 1999-2000 season, as well as a WCHA Final Five championship in the 1997-98 campaign.

Prior to his time with the Badgers, Johnson coached professionally, directing the expansion Madison Monsters to a 37-30-7 mark in the 1995-96 season and earning Colonial Hockey League coach of the year honors.

He also led a pair of area high schools, serving as the head coach of Verona from 1994-95 and as the assistant coach for Madison Memorial from 1993-94.

Beyond collegiate and professional experience, Johnson has often worked at the international level. In September 2001, Johnson served as an on-ice assistant coach at the U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Orientation Camp in Colorado Springs, Colo., featuring 38 of the top American players in the National Hockey League.

Johnson served as an assistant coach with the 2002 U.S. Men's National Team that competed in the International Ice Hockey Federation World Championship in Gothenberg, Jonkoping, and Karlstad, Sweden. He had previously served in a similar capacity for the 2000 World Championship in St. Petersburg, Russia.

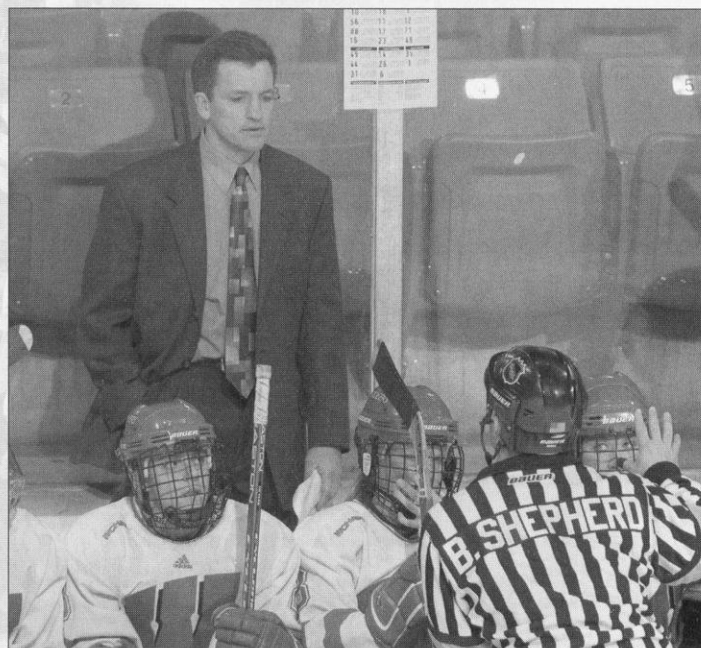
Most recently, he spent time in Lake Placid coaching at the 2004 USA Hockey 17-18 Year-Old Player Development Festival.

In his playing career, Johnson helped Wisconsin to the 1977 national championship during his freshman campaign. The first Badger ever to win WCHA Rookie of the Year honors, he went on to become the school's second all-time leading scorer with 256 points on a school-record 125 goals and 131 assists in just three seasons.

The 1978-79 WCHA MVP, Johnson was a two-time, first team All-WCHA pick and a two-time All-American. In 2002, he was also selected as one of the WCHA's "Top 50 Players in 50 Years."

Johnson has represented USA Hockey as a player in 13 international tournaments, with his most recent appearance as part of the U.S. national team at the 1998 IIHF (A-Pool) World Championship Qualification Tournament in Austria. Most notably, he led the 1980 U.S. Olympic Team's gold medal-winning

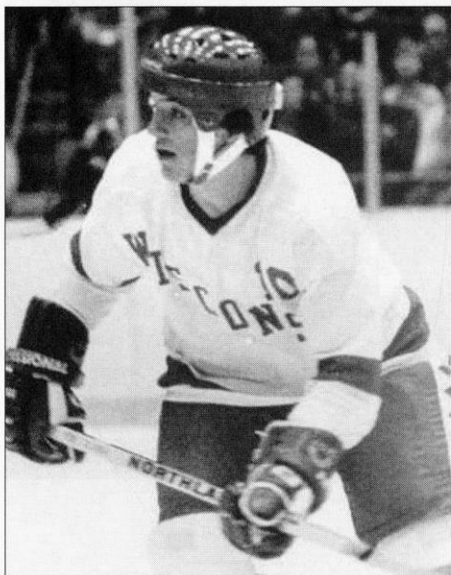

effort with 11 points, including two goals in the "Miracle-On-Ice" against the Soviet Union and an assist on the game-winning goal against Finland in the final contest.

The team attended the opening ceremonies of the 2002 Olympic Winter Games to light the flame and was honored by *Sports Illustrated* as giving us the 'Greatest Sports Moment of the Century.'

In 2004, Disney produced the blockbuster movie, "Miracle," chronicling the 1980 USA hockey team's unlikely climb to the top.

The Next Level

Following his Olympic experience, Johnson embarked on a successful 11-year NHL career. He began his pro tenure with the Pittsburgh Penguins (1980-82), before moving onto the Minnesota North Stars (1982).

He also enjoyed stints with the Hartford Whalers (1982-85), St. Louis Blues (1985) and New Jersey Devils (1985-90). Over his 669 career NHL contests, the forward collected 203 goals, 305 assists

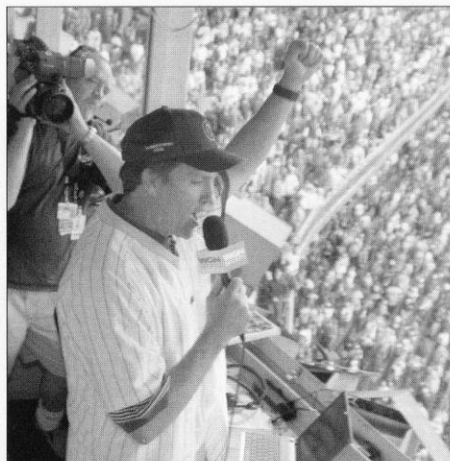
and 508 points, highlighted by his 87-point season as captain of Hartford in 1983-84. He also tied an NHL All-Star game record with three assists that season.

A Hockey Family

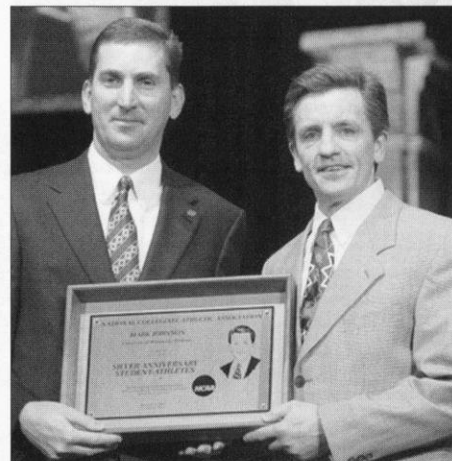
A 1999 inductee into the International Ice Hockey Federation Hall of Fame, Johnson is the son of legendary Wisconsin men's head coach Bob Johnson (1966-82) and brother of former men's assistant coach Peter Johnson (1987-91).

One of Wisconsin's most decorated athletes in any sport, Johnson was inducted into the State of Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame in 2003 and is also a charter member of Wisconsin's National W Club Hall of Fame.

Johnson, 49, earned his bachelor of science degree in kinesiology from Wisconsin in 1994. He resides in Verona, Wis., with his wife Leslie and his five children: Douglas, Christopher, Patrick, Mikayla and Megan.

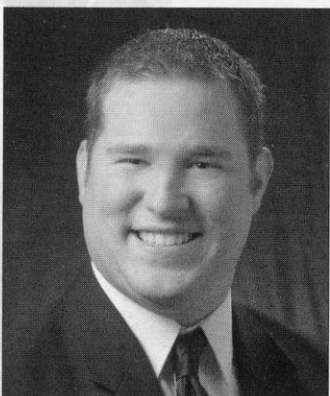
Volunteer Assistant Coach Jeff Sanger

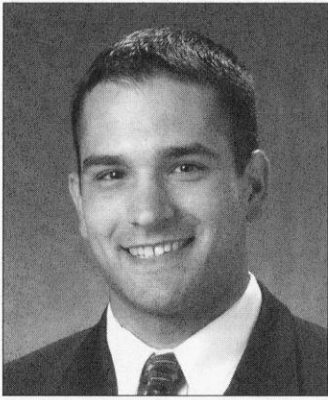
Program Assistant Sharon Eley

A 2000 Springfield College graduate, Potenza earned his bachelor of science degree in applied exercise science. From there, the Providence, R.I., native went to Boston University

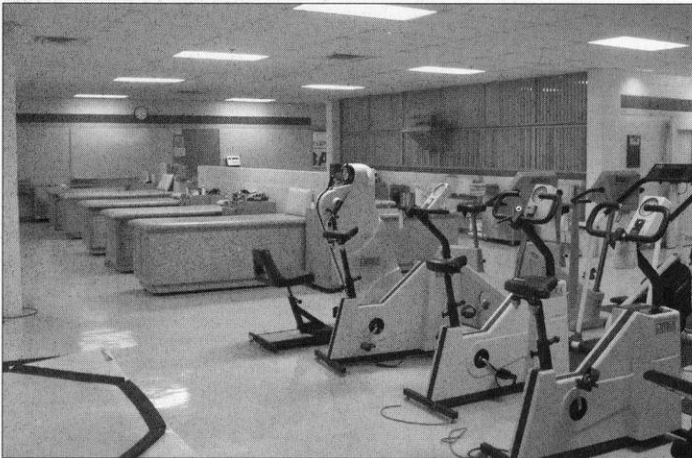
where he was a graduate assistant until 2002, earning his master's degree in human movement science.

2005-06 Season Review

The 2005-06 season was the most successful year in Wisconsin women's hockey history. UW raked in the hardware, nabbing all the trophies possible beginning with the WCHA regular season, behind a 24-3-1 record, then the WCHA playoffs, the NCAA title and the Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award.

With a 36-4-1 final record, the team set a record for wins in a season (36), fewest losses (4), best winning percentage (.890) and most games played (41). The championship also marked the first women's NCAA title for the University of Wisconsin since 1985 when cross country won the national championship.

Bauer earns Player of the Year

The Patty Kazmaier Award was presented March 25 in Minneapolis to UW junior Sara Bauer as the most outstanding player in collegiate women's hockey. Bauer was recognized by nearly every outlet as the most outstanding player. Her laundry list of awards included the Patty Kazmaier Award, All-America first team honor, USCHO.com Player of the Year, WCHA Player of the Year, WCHA tournament MVP, All-WCHA first team and All-USCHO first team.

Johnson earns Coach of the Year

For his efforts in leading UW to the school's first NCAA women's hockey championship, Mark Johnson was named the AHCA Women's Division I Coach of the Year and the WCHA Coach of the Year.

UW in the Postseason

UW played host to a first round best-of-three playoff series to start the WCHA tournament. It was the first time the WCHA used a campus-site playoff format on the women's side of the conference tournament. The series was also the first women's postseason action to be held at the Kohl Center.

The NCAA regional quarterfinal held at Capitol Ice Arena in Middleton, Wis., was the first time Wisconsin had played host to an NCAA postseason game.

Working Overtime

Wisconsin played its longest game in program history with 30:10 of overtime against Mercyhurst to gain entrance to the Frozen Four. The Badgers played five overtime games this season, tying the program record for most in a season.

Raking in the Awards

The Badgers dominated the WCHA awards with Player of the Year, Sara Bauer;

Defensive Player of the Year, Bobbi-Jo Slusar; and Mark Johnson as Coach of the Year. Bauer is Wisconsin's first conference player of the year, two seasons after being named the WCHA Rookie of the Year. Slusar made it three straight for Wisconsin in the Defensive Player of the Year category, joining two-time winner Molly Engstrom. Johnson garnered his second honor in four seasons as WCHA Coach of the Year.

Bauer and Slusar were also named to the All-WCHA first team. Sharon Cole, Meghan Mikkelsen and goaltender Meghan Horras were selected to the All-WCHA second team.

Bauer was also named the WCHA tournament MVP while Cyndy Kenyon, Horras, Emily Morris and Slusar were all named to the all-tournament team.

By the Numbers

The Badgers' offense was led by junior Sara Bauer with 58 points in 41 games. The team was 16-0-1 when Bauer scored a goal and 27-1-1 when she had a point.

On defense, Bobbi-Jo Slusar had 40 points, 28 coming from assists. Wisconsin was 22-0 when she had an assist.

Year of 100s

In his fourth season as head coach, Mark Johnson has become the first women's hockey head coach at UW to reach the 100-win milestone. The Badgers' 3-1 victory over Minnesota, Feb. 11, was the 100th of his career.

The Badgers earned their 100th WCHA win in a 3-2 decision vs. North Dakota Oct. 28 at the Kohl Center.

Also reaching the 100-mark, but in points, was Sara Bauer on a short-handed goal on Oct. 29. She joins just four other Badgers to reach the mark.

Senior Sharon Cole eclipsed 100 points on Feb. 24, becoming the sixth Badger to reach the mark.

Badgers Go Streaking

The Badgers finished the season on a 12-game winning streak dating back to Feb. 11. It is tied for the longest in program history.

The Badgers first set the mark at the beginning of the season. After losing the first game of the season, the Badgers won until the streak was snapped with a 2-1 loss to then-No. 4 New Hampshire, Nov. 27. They were closing in on that number again with a 13-game unbeaten streak (10 winning), but a loss to St. Cloud State Feb. 4 snapped that streak and marked the only time the Badgers were shut out.

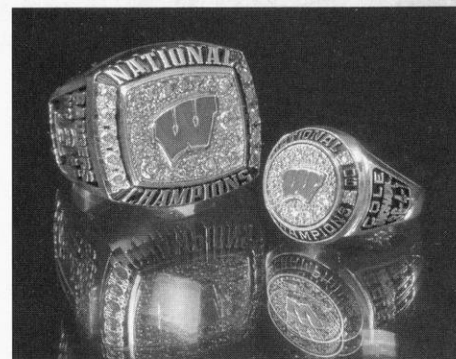
Polls

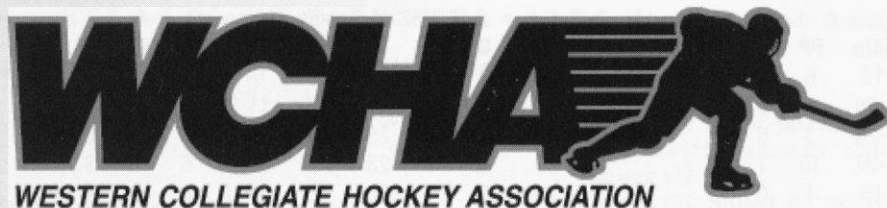

The Western Collegiate Hockey Association



With a noteworthy past that spans six decades and marks its 55th season overall in 2006-07, three characteristics that continue to define the Western Collegiate Hockey Association are history, tradition and success.

From the founding days as the Midwest Collegiate Hockey League (MCHL) from 1951-53, to the Western Intercollegiate Hockey League (WIHL) from 1953-58, and ultimately on to the Western Collegiate Hockey Association in 1959, this prestigious athletic conference has developed and maintained a tradition of excellence that truly is second to none.

In fact, no collegiate conference—in any sport—can top the impressive list of national scale accomplishments of the WCHA and its member teams. Since its founding in 1999-2000, teams representing the women's WCHA have now captured seven consecutive national championships in 2000, 2001, 2002, 2003, 2004, 2005 and 2006. And since 1951, teams representing the men's WCHA have earned a record 36 NCAA (national) championships, finished as the national runner-up another 27 times, and qualified for a berth in collegiate hockey's national championship round—the NCAA Men's Frozen Four—in 51 of 54 seasons overall.

In addition to its successes in national championship tournament play over the years, the Western Collegiate Hockey Association owns an enviable reputation for producing outstanding coaches and student-athletes, with hundreds upon hundreds of its alumni moving on to successful professional and Olympic playing careers. On top of the more than 100 league alumni who have Olympic experience playing for the likes of the United States, Canada, Italy, Norway, Austria and France, conference-member teams and players have also received additional international exposure on a regular basis since 1951. The women's WCHA has regularly put together all-

star teams. In 2005-06 the WCHA All-Star Team played games against the U.S. National Team at both Xcel Energy Center and the Duluth Entertainment & Convention Center. In 2004-05, a total of 16 conference players participated in the annual women's IIHF World Championship in Sweden, including five on the gold medal-winning U.S. Team. The conference will again be represented at the 2007 IIHF Women's World Championships with Wisconsin women's head coach Mark Johnson set to lead the U.S. National Team.

The WCHA also continues to lead the way in college hockey attendance—for both men and women—as member teams, who regularly play in some of the sport's finest facilities, regularly top the Division I ranks in average home attendance. In 2005-06, the women's WCHA marked its seventh straight season at the top of the national rankings while the men's conference drew a total of 1,360,030 fans, the 13th consecutive season in excess of one million.

Over the last decade, the WCHA has been able to showcase its exciting brand of hockey to an ever-increasing number of fans, thanks to such impressive facilities as Ralph Engelstad Arena in Grand Forks, Colorado Springs World Arena, the Kohl Center in Madison, Magness Arena in Denver, Mariucci Arena and Ridder Arena in Minneapolis, the National Hockey Center in St. Cloud, and Midwest Wireless Civic Center in Mankato.

Under the leadership and guidance of Commissioner Bruce M. McLeod and Associate Commissioner Sara R. Martin, the Western Collegiate Hockey Association will proudly celebrate its 55th season of men's competition and eighth in women's competition in 2006-07.

History of Wisconsin Women's Hockey

On April 17, 1998, the University of Wisconsin Athletic Board unanimously voted to add women's ice hockey to the intercollegiate athletic program.

The sport was brand new to the athletic department, but it already had a long-standing history at the UW.

A women's hockey club had been on the Madison campus for more than 25 years. Founded in 1973 by three women—Marianne (Anderson) Larson, Jill Steinberg and Karen Schwarz—the UW Women's Hockey Club has had hundreds of players take to the ice over the years.

The first head coach for the varsity Badgers was announced on July 9, 1998, when Julie Sasner was introduced to the Madison media and public.

A former member of the first U.S. National Team in 1990, Sasner came from Cornell University, where she had coached for five years and mentored current Wisconsin assistant coach Tracey Cornell.

The Badgers officially opened their history on October 8, 1999, when 3,892 people watched the Badgers face Minnesota Duluth at the Kohl Center.

With Olympic gold medalists Cammi Granato, Karyn Bye and head coach Ben Smith, along with Gov. Tommy Thompson in attendance, the game was televised around the state on Wisconsin Public Television.

Five years later, the team notched its 100th program win during the 2003-04 season. Continuing to exceed the previous year's standard, the Badgers started another chapter in Wisconsin history with the 2004-05 season. After winning a record 28 games during the season, Wisconsin earned its first NCAA tournament berth on March 13, 2005.

The city of Madison is now fortunate to have five rinks and a wealth of enthusiasm for the sport of hockey. Attendance at Wisconsin women's games grows larger every year.

The Wisconsin women attracted an average of 1,275 fans to each game during the 2005-06 season, ranking second in the nation behind Western Collegiate Hockey Association rival Minnesota.

The Badgers reached the pinnacle of college hockey in the 2005-06 season, posting a 36-4-1 record en route to WCHA regular season, WCHA playoff and NCAA championships. Junior Sara Bauer ranked fourth in the nation in points and claimed the Patty Kazmaier Award as the national player of the year, beating out teammate Bobbi-Jo Slusar, who was also a finalist. Wisconsin also played host to its first NCAA tournament contest, a 2-1 double-overtime win over Mercyhurst on March 18, 2006 at

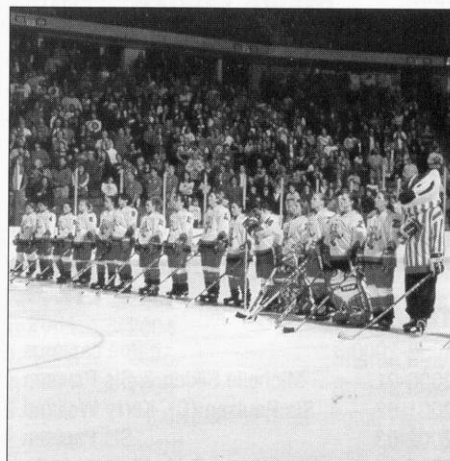

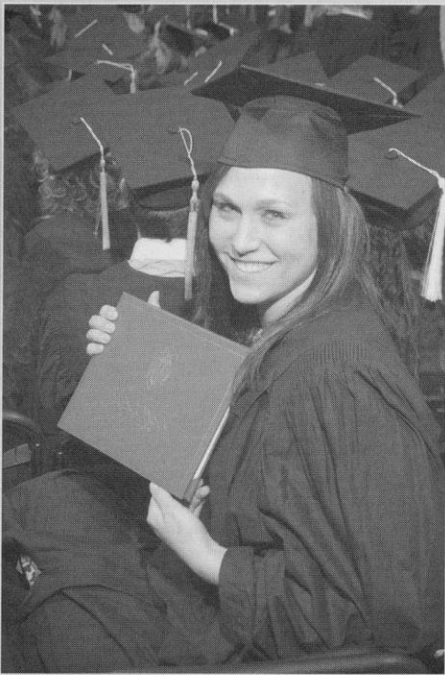

Growing with the times to meet changing needs in education and research has kept the university great. With an eye to the future, the university continues to change, guaranteeing a community and environment where true learning can take place.

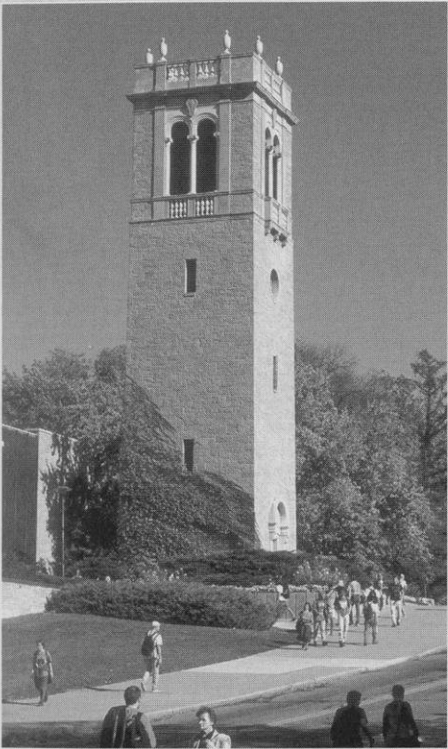

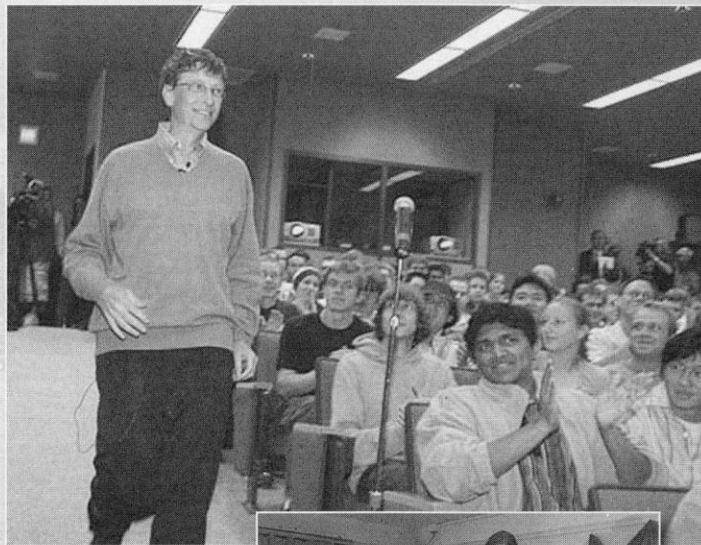
Student Life

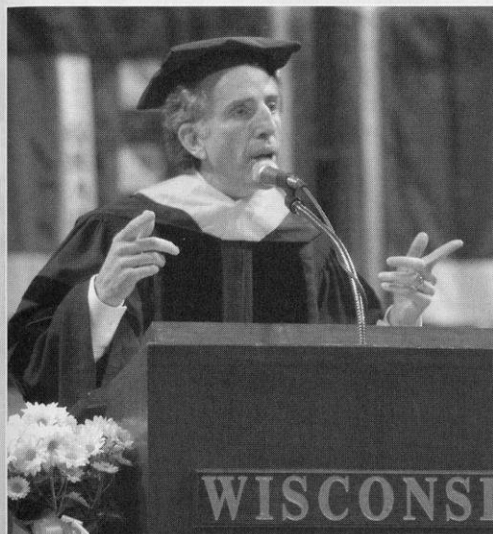

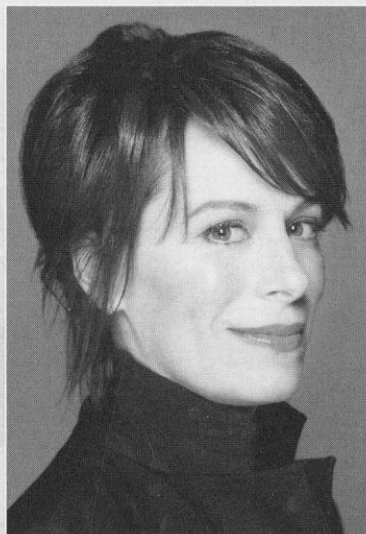

A Winning Athletic Program

In 2005-06, the University of Wisconsin won an astounding three NCAA championships in the same school year. The Badgers also added a national title by the women's lightweight rowing team and three individual national championships.

The men's cross country started the season off by winning its fourth national title in program history in November. Senior Simon Bairu won his second consecutive individual title.

In March, the women's hockey team won its first NCAA title. It was just the second NCAA post-season appearance and first run at the Frozen Four for the Badgers.

Wisconsin became the first school in NCAA history to win both the women's and men's ice hockey championships when the Badger men won the program's sixth title two weeks after the women.

The women's lightweight varsity eight crew won its third consecutive title at the Intercollegiate Rowing Association National Championships in 2006.

Junior Chris Solinsky earned two individual national titles in 2006. He won the 3,000 meters at the NCAA indoor championships for the second consecutive year

Wisconsin Traditions

Badger Nickname

The nickname "Badgers" was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin, which was dubbed the "Badger State." The name didn't come from the animals in the region, but rather from an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

In 1949, a student wore a badger outfit with a papier-mâché head at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name—Buckingham U. Badger.

Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. The song has become legendary at the UW because of its polka-like rhythm.

Fifth Quarter

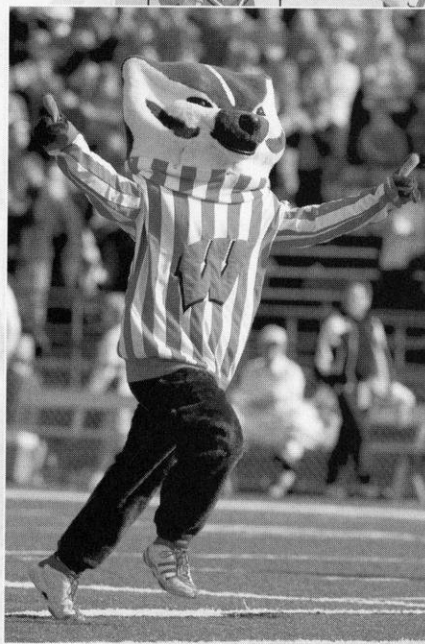
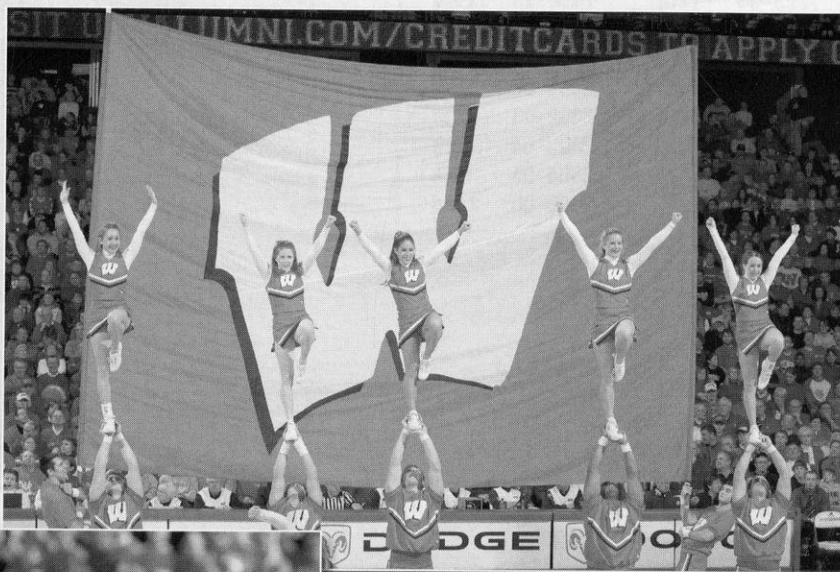
The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as it plays traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song.

On, Wisconsin

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

Hall of Fame

The UW Athletic Hall of Fame was established in 1991 to recognize and honor former student-athletes and staff for their exemplary athletic achievement and contributions to the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department.

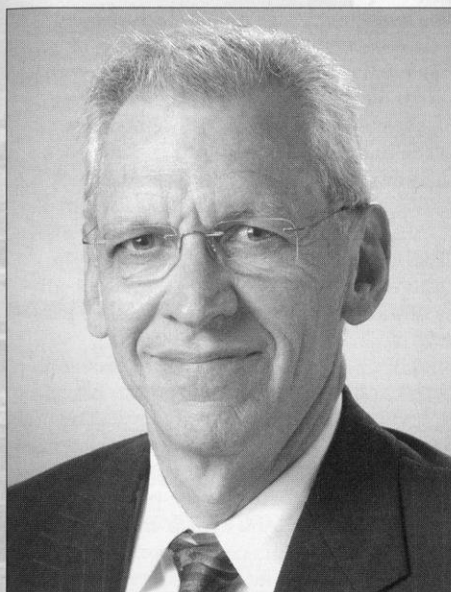

**Chancellor
John D. Wiley**

John D. Wiley is the 27th chancellor of the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He assumed office Jan. 1, 2001.

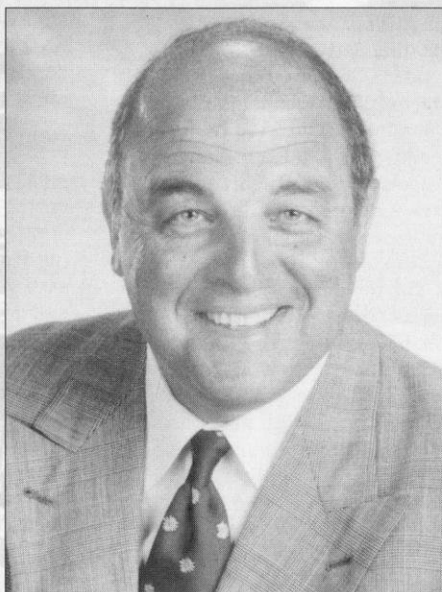
Wiley has served the university community in a variety of roles, including an associate dean in engineering, dean of the graduate school and the university's senior research officer, and most recently, the university's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs.

In his campus-level positions, Wiley has represented the institution for a variety of external constituencies. He also has been deeply involved in fundraising from individual and corporate donors, and charitable foundations.

Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964; attended graduate school at UW-Madison as an NSF Fellow and received master's and doctoral degrees in physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively. He spent a year at the Max Planck Institute in Stuttgart, Germany as an awardee of the Alexander von Humboldt Senior U.S. Service Award for Research and Training.

Wiley joined the UW-Madison faculty in the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering in August 1975. His research and teaching focused on a variety of topics related to semiconductors and other materials and processes important to the electronics field.

Wiley currently serves as the president of the Big Ten Conference Council of Presidents/Chancellors.



**Athletic Director
Barry Alvarez**

Barry Alvarez is in his third year as UW Director of Athletics, but his first without the additional title of head football coach.

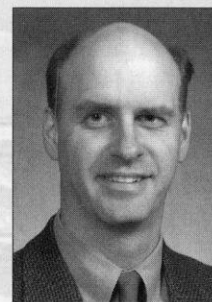
For 16 years (1990-2005), Alvarez guided Wisconsin's football fortunes. He piloted the Badgers to three Big Ten Conference and Rose Bowl titles (including back-to-back in 1998-99) en route to becoming the winningest football coach in school history (118-73-4 record).

Alvarez was just the 10th coach in Big Ten history to win 100 games at one conference institution. His 8-3 (.727) record in bowl games with the Badgers is the best in college football history (among coaches with at least 11 bowl appearances). The 2004 AFCA Region 3 Coach of the Year, he also was the 1993 national coach of the year, a two-time Big Ten coach of the year and a finalist for ESPN's coach of the decade (1990s) honor.

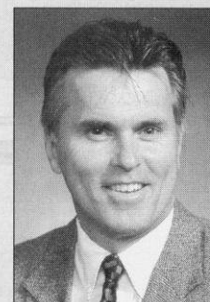
In 2004-05, Alvarez served as athletic director and football coach and has been at the forefront of the revival of the Badger athletic program during his entire tenure in Madison.

He is a 1969 graduate of Nebraska, where he played linebacker and went on to earn his master's degree. Alvarez received a Distinguished Alumnus Award from his alma mater in 2003.

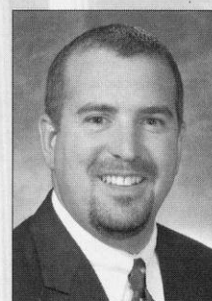

Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center

The Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center, named after Wade and Betty Fetzer, provides for the academic needs of more than 700 student-athletes at the University of Wisconsin. The center is home to both the academic advising and learning support staffs of the Office of Academic Services.

The 15,000-square-foot, state-of-the-art facility is fully wireless and features a large open study area that is surrounded by nine small to mid-sized classrooms, a 55-seat auditorium, staff offices, a computer lab and a canteen area. The open study area has 30 individual carrels as well as several study tables. The state-of-the-art computer lab, under coordinator Jim Eisenmann, allows student-athletes to work on assignments, access online library or course materials and check their email. The computer lab also has several checkout laptop computers for student-athletes who are traveling for competitions and other team-related activities.

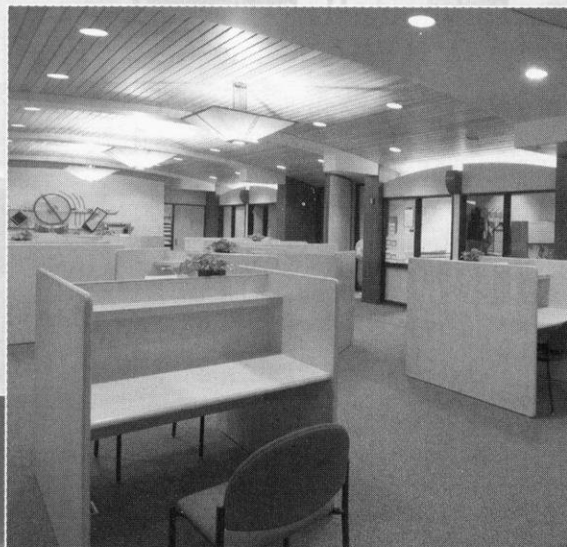
The center features a staff of six advisors, four learning specialists, a life skills coordinator and a tutor coordinator. The staff monitors academic eligibility and progress while providing study groups for selected courses, access to tutors, and hosting a variety of academic and career planning events throughout the year.

Under the direction of assistant athletic director Doug Tiedt, the advising staff of Chris Butler, Jerry Darda, Nelson Edmonds, Ragean Hill, Mary Weaver-Klees and Alan Zussman as well as tutor coordinator Jill Hadfield work along with learning specialists Dan Ott, Toni O'Keefe and Nancy Gatyas to render quality academic and personal support to student-athletes and assist coaches in providing the best possible collegiate experience. CHAMPS/ Life Skills Coordinator Kelli Richards oversees programs in career and personal development as well as community outreach.

The staff, including program assistant Nancy Kreklow, has a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all university departments.

Student-athletes can drop in before practice or between classes to study or meet with the advisors and learning specialists. Sessions are offered on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the student-athlete. Athletes are degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The staff takes a personal approach to each student-athlete in determining his or her individual needs, personal or academic.

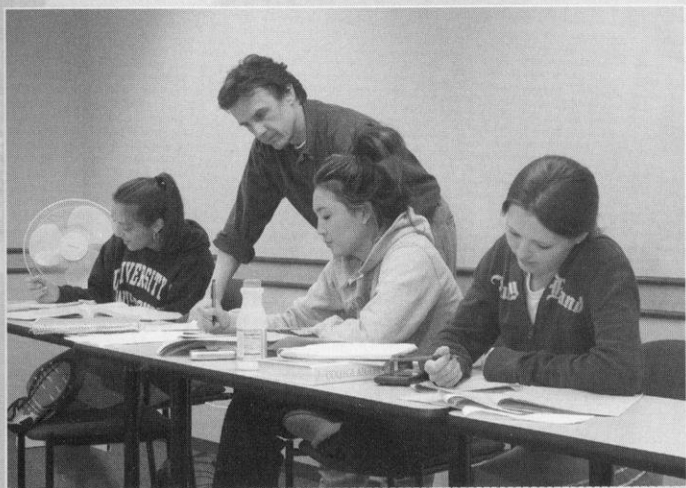
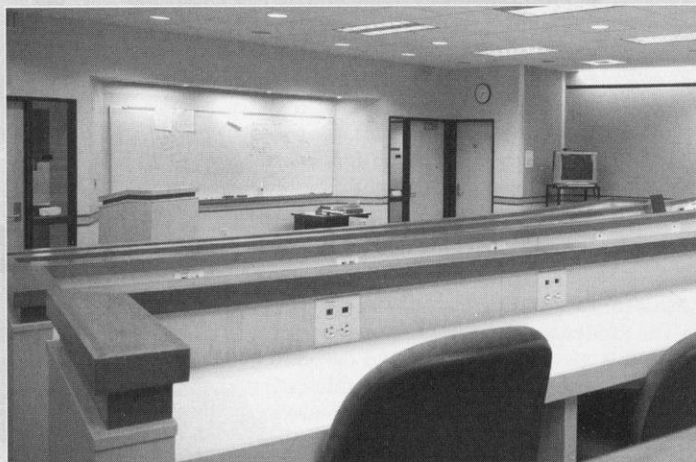

CHAMPS (Challenging Athletes Minds for Personal Success) is a total development program that uses athletics as a preparation for success in life. Under the direction of Kelli Richards, the goal of the CHAMPS program is to support student development initiatives that enhance the quality of the student-athlete experience within the university setting.

The UW's CHAMPS program was selected as one of four 2005 Program of Excellence recipients. The award is presented annually to schools that have displayed a highly effective and pervasive program benefiting their student-athletes in the five components of the program.

CHAMPS provides support and opportunities for UW student-athletes in the following areas:

Athletic Excellence

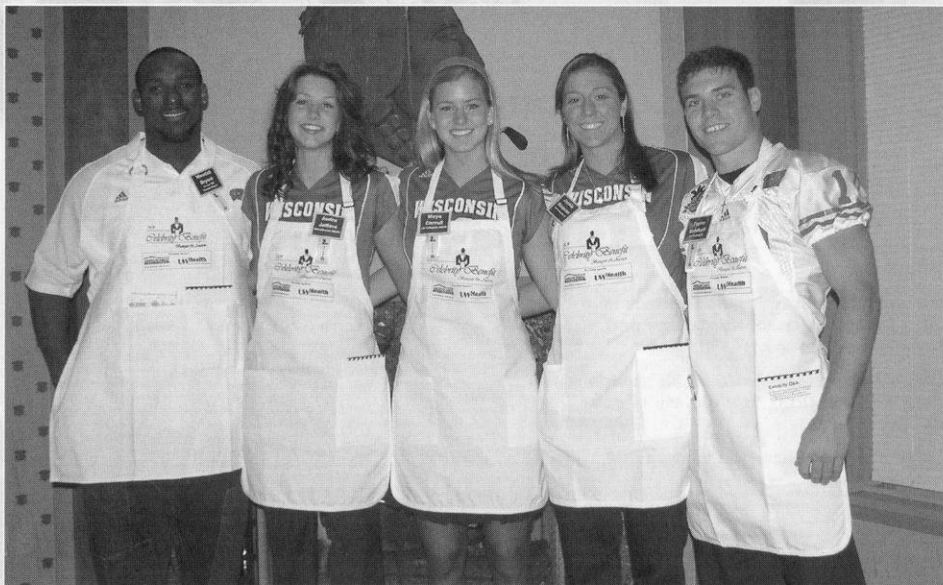
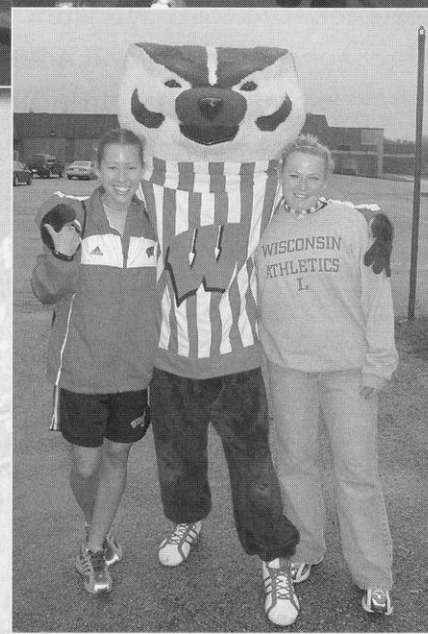
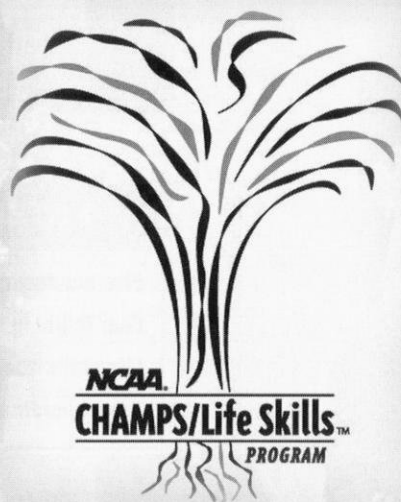
- The student-athlete advisory committee (SAAC) works with the CHAMPS program to make sure all of the student-athletes' needs and concerns are being addressed.

Academic Excellence

- Through the Fetzer Academic Center, advisors, tutors, mentors and learning specialists are available to all student-athletes.
- A one-credit, 10-week course available to freshman and sophomore student-athletes discusses issues that most incoming college students face in their transition, such as time management, alcohol abuse and nutrition.
- Scholarships and internships are available through the NCAA for student-athletes continuing their education.
- The Academic Excellence Banquet is held each April to recognize the many academic achievements of our student-athletes.

Personal Development

- The UW CHAMPS program requires all student-athletes to attend three personal development activities each year.
- Workshops are offered for teams as well as any student-athlete on topics such as safe sex, fiscal responsibility, alcohol, peak performance, multiculturalism and many others.
- Opportunities for team and individual leadership development are also available through both the UW and the NCAA.

Career Development

- Workshops on various career topics are offered to student-athletes throughout the year. Topics include writing resumes and cover letters, interviewing tips, networking strategies, dining etiquette and job search strategies.
- Career assessment and career counseling is available for individuals as they work to declare a major and gain experience within their career field.
- UW Athletics partners with the National W Club and the Wisconsin Alumni Association as well as local corporations to assist student-athletes in finding jobs and internships as well as assisting in networking and career opportunities.
- UW Athletics hosts Career Night every January. This event is a networking dinner and career fair for all junior and senior student-athletes.
- Corporations also host information sessions and screening interviews within the Fetzer Center for student-athletes.

Community Service

- The CHAMPS coordinator organizes individual and team community service requests.
- Opportunities for involvement through one-time events as well as on-going volunteer opportunities in the Madison area.
- UW has structured programs, such as Bookin it with Bucky. Through this program, athletes are scheduled to read in fourth grade Madison classrooms to encourage literacy and continued learning.

CHAMPS Cup

The CHAMPS Cup is an all-sport competition, rewarding teams who exemplify all aspects of the student-athlete.

Student-athletes earn points for their teams in six categories:

Academic Achievement

Teams receive points their team GPA, scoring at least 925 mark in the Academic Progress Rate (APR) as well as points for individual academic all-conference honors.

Athletic Achievement

Teams that place in the top three of their conference are awarded points based on their finish. Conference champions—100 points; second place—90 points; third place—80 points.

Personal Enhancement:

Teams or individuals earn points for attending any CHAMPS/Life Skills on-campus event related to personal development.

Community Outreach:

Community service done as a team, with other student-athletes or individually will be rewarded.

Badger Pride:

Points are awarded to teams that go the extra mile to support their fellow student-athletes by attending each other's sporting events. Each team will choose one competition in their traditional season that it will label as Badger pride night. Any athletes who attend this competition will receive points, individually or as a team.

SAAC Participation:

Teams will earn 10 points for each meeting they have two representatives in attendance.

The Scoring System:

Individual Points—Individuals will earn 100 points for their team for each individual effort. At the end of each week, the points will be divided by the number of student-athletes on the active roster for each sport.

Team Points—Team efforts, defined as 70 percent participation or 20 members, for all categories earn 100 points per event. All mandatory events require 100 percent participation in order to receive points.

Reward

One men's and one women's team will be recognized as the overall winners at the Academic Excellence Banquet in April. The men's and women's team with the highest GPA as well as the team with the most community service points will also be recognized at the banquet.

Sports Medicine

The sports medicine staff provides all University of Wisconsin student-athletes with high quality health care. Wisconsin's Sports Medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

The sports medicine staff consists of team physicians, dentists, athletic trainers, and a full-time nutritionist. The day-to-day care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Badger athletes is supervised by a staff of 12 full-time and two graduate assistant National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA) certified and State of Wisconsin licensed athletic trainers.

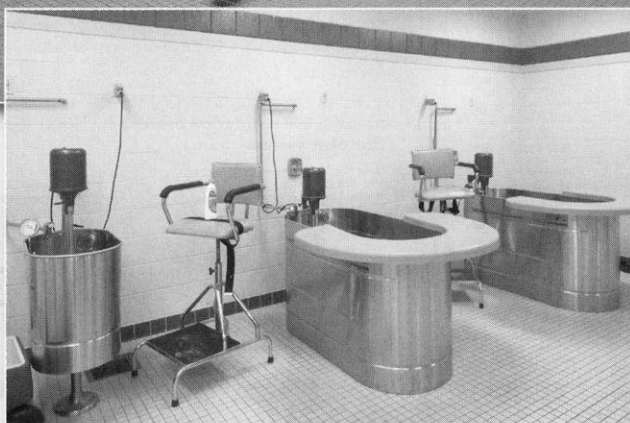
Under the direction of head athletic trainer Dennis Helwig, the Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Full-time athletic trainers Karen Bloch, Tricia DeSouza, Bill Gierach, Chuck Hart, Andy Hrodey, Jesse Donnenwerth, Mike Moll, Clark Pearson, Henry Perez-Guerra, Ashley Parr, Jen Pepoy, and Kristy Walker as well as graduate assistant trainers Kayla Schipman, Jenna Street and Stephanie Westrick utilize functional measures, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve flexibility.

Full-time nutritionist Jeremy Isensee provides dietary analysis and supervises training table meals to enhance the performance of the student-athletes.

The Sports Medicine facility in the McClain Center features an extensive collection of therapeutic and rehabilitation equipment including a 50-foot, two-lane rehabilitation pool and an on-site x-ray facility. Considered one of the nation's finest, the McClain Sports Medicine Center offers an environment conducive to expedient care and a healthy return to competition.

Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affiliated with the world-renowned UW Hospital and Clinics. Medical director Dr. Ben Graf, an orthopedic surgeon, is responsible for all services provided to student-athletes. Orthopedic care is also provided by team physician Dr. John Orwin and Dr. Lee Kaplan. General medical care is directed by the head of primary care, Dr. Greg Landry, and he is joined by Dr. David Berhardt, and Dr. Kathleen Carr.

In addition to the headquarters in the McClain Athletic Facility, auxiliary athletic training rooms are located in Camp Randall Stadium, Natatorium, UW Field House, and the Kohl Center. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabil-

Strength & Conditioning

The Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a key component in all of the Badger teams' success on the playing field. The program's goal is to increase the overall performance of each student-athlete, prevent injuries and help athletes reach their potential.

Strength and conditioning coordinator John Dettmann along with assistants Brian Bott, Ben Herbert, Scott Hettenbach, LaKeysha McClenton, Mike Potenza and Greg Young work with the UW coaches to develop training programs to enhance each athlete's performance.

Badger athletes work on their strength programs in weight rooms in the McClain Center, Kohl Center and Camp Randall Stadium.

The McClain Center weight room is the largest of the facilities and features more than 45,000 pounds of free weights and more than 50 weight machines. The room has seven squat racks, eight bench press stations, eight flat-to-incline benches, six Olympic lift platforms and numerous other free weight stations.

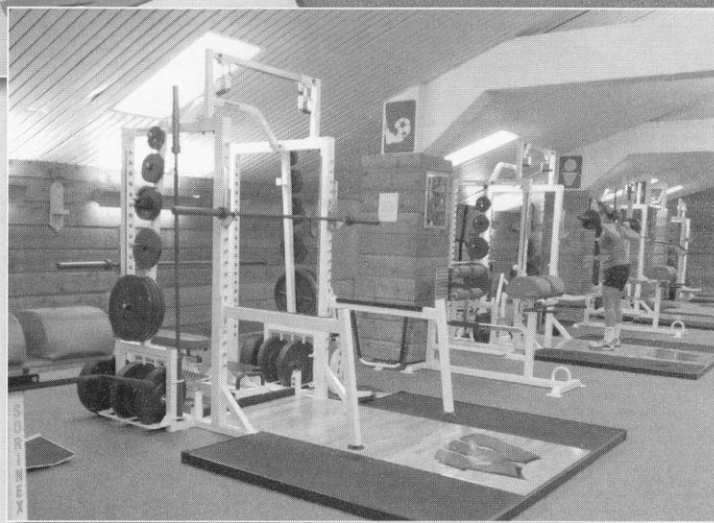
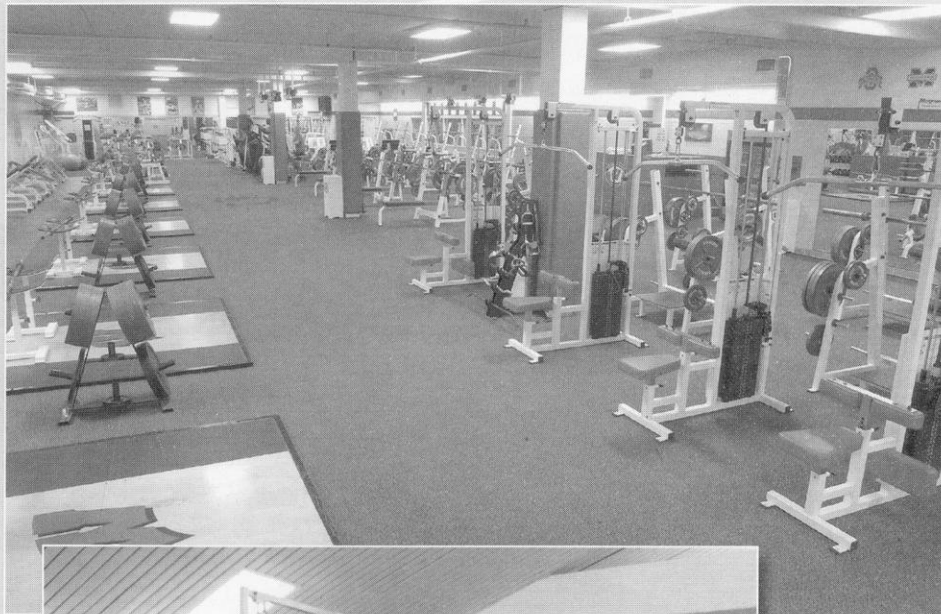
The Kohl Center weight room is equipped with five custom-built free weight power platforms and 4,000 pounds of free weights. The room has nine pieces of cardiovascular equipment and three Vertimax jump trainers.

The Badger Den has five power stations with each station consisting of a platform for Olympic style lifting as well as a squat rack, bench press, incline bench press, pull-up station and a dip station. There are three lat-pull machines and seated row machines, a complete set of dumbbells and a complete set of plyometric boxes.

"The goal of the Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is to train for total athletic excellence. We profile each student-athlete upon arrival and set up specific training regimens to help athletes reach their individual potential.

The plan is to build overall strength, speed, agility and stamina. Our program is comprehensive and the end result is that we are as productive on the athletic field as possible."

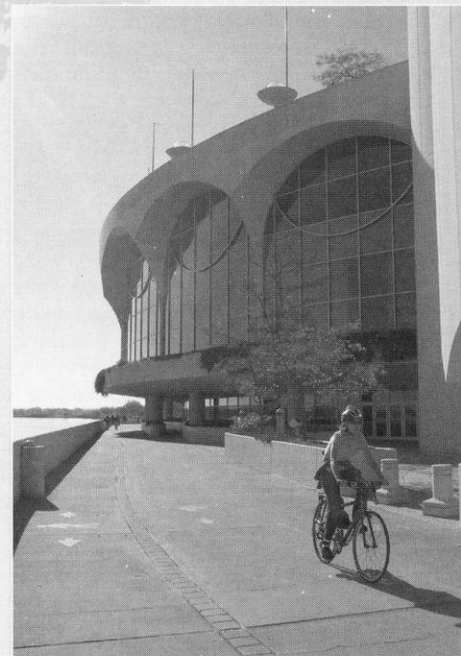

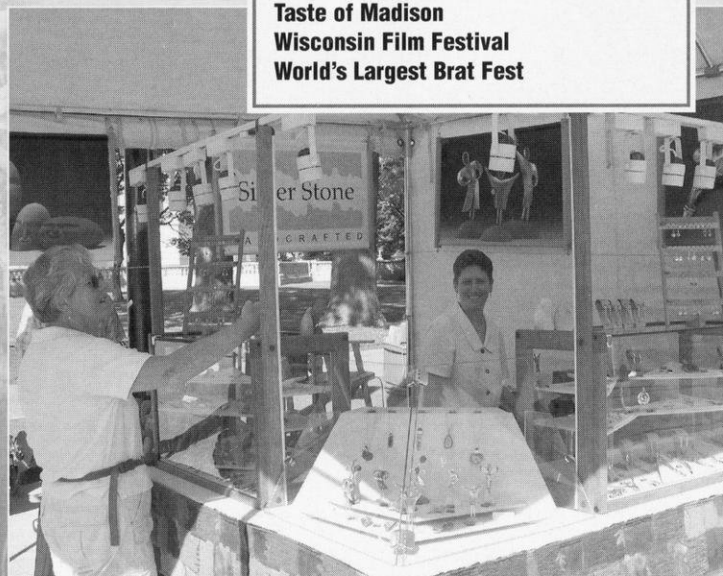

- Madison is one of only a few cities in the world built on an isthmus. Downtown Madison is set on a narrow strip of land between two glacial lakes—Lake Mendota and Lake Monona. A total of five area lakes, plus more than 250 parks and 120 miles of designated bike routes within the city limits provide an abundance of year-round outdoor activities, from hiking, biking, swimming and sailing to cross-country skiing, ice skating, and ice fishing.

- The Wisconsin State Capitol is the city's signature landmark. No building in Madison may be built higher than the 284-foot white granite dome of the Capitol, which is modeled after our nation's Capitol.

- State Street, a one-mile pedestrian mall linking the Capitol Square to the beautiful lakeside campus of the University of Wisconsin, is lined with diverse ethnic eateries, eclectic boutiques, galleries, coffeehouses and more.

- Famed architect Frank Lloyd Wright spent his childhood years in Madison and returned to live in the area at the height of his international

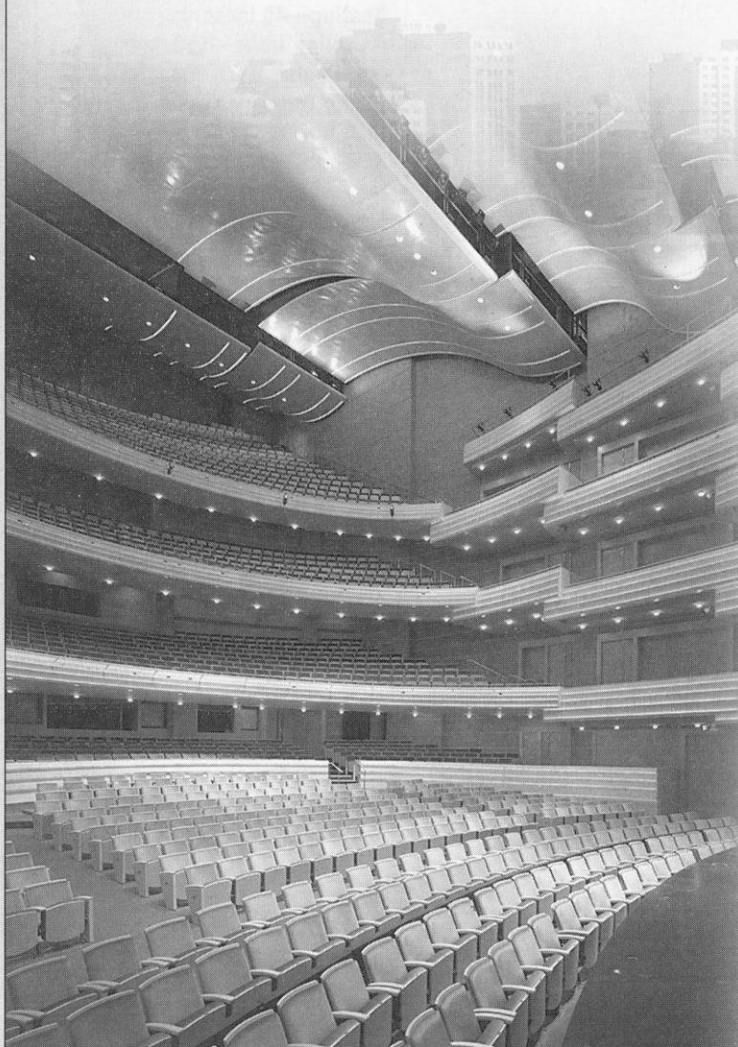
fame. The Madison area is home to a generous selection of Wright-designed buildings.

- Ecologist Aldo Leopold, conservation pioneer John Muir, playwright Thornton Wilder, novelist Jacquelyn Mitchard, actor/comedian Chris Farley, Olympians Beth and Eric Heiden, composer/performer Ben Sidran, professional golfers Jerry Kelly, Sherri Steinhauer and Steve Stricker, and NASCAR's Matt Kenseth are other notable people associated with Madison.

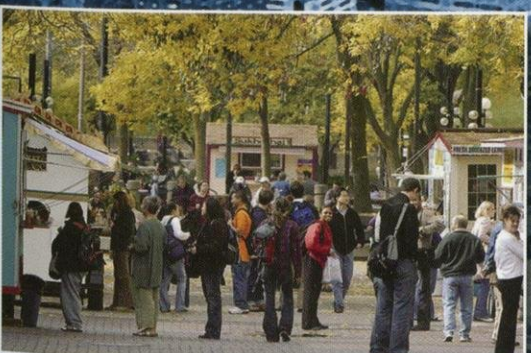
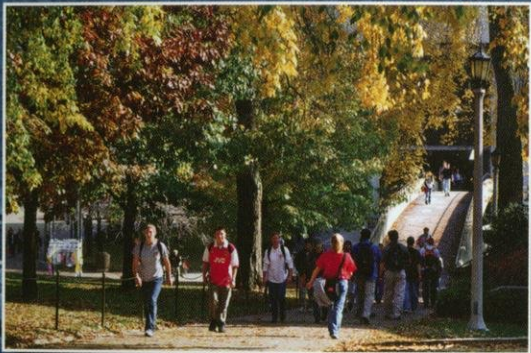
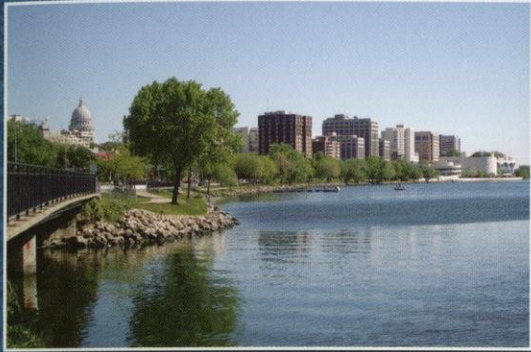
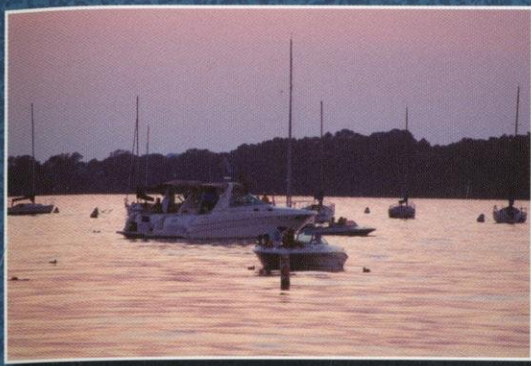

- Overture Center for the Arts (left), a 400,000 square foot world-class visual and performing arts facility in downtown Madison
- A number of galleries and museums including the Chazen Museum of Art, Madison Children's Museum, Madison Museum of Contemporary Art, the UW Geology Museum, Wisconsin Historical Museum and Wisconsin Veterans Museum
- Monona Terrace® Community and Convention Center, the Frank Lloyd Wright-designed masterpiece on the shore of Lake Monona
- Olbrich Botanical Gardens featuring 16 acres of outdoor display gardens, the ornate Thai Pavilion (above) and the tropical Bolz Conservatory
- State Capitol, featuring a dome that is over 200 feet and topped by a bronze statue entitled "Wisconsin." Built between 1906 and 1917, it is the only State Capitol ever built on an isthmus.
- Henry Vilas Zoo, one of the nation's few free zoos, featuring 800 animals and the new Conservation Carousel
- UW Arboretum, a 1,260-acre nature preserve on the southern half of Lake Wingra used for research, education and recreation
