## FORMER WILLIAMS BAY ASTRONOMER DISCOVERS SECOND STAR PERSEI

Scientists from all parts of the country will learn that the star Phi Persei has been found to be twins, when they gather at Columbus, Ohio on Tuesday this week to attend the American Astronomical society's annual meeting in connection with the American Association for the Advancement of Science convention.

This discovery will be explained by Dr. J.A. Hynek of Perkins observatory, Delaware, Ohio, on Friday morning at the convention. The director of Perkins observatory is Dr. N.T. Bobrovnikoff, also a former member of the staff of Yerkes observatory, Williams Bay.

The star Phi Persei has been found to be two stars revolving around their common center of mass and completely enveloped in a gas shell. One of the pair is found to be 100 and the other 15 times as bright as the sun. The primary star's brilliance makes the lesser one invisible. Research material was supplied by the Yerkes observatory. Phi Persei has been studied intensively for 50 years.

Twenty-five observatories will present research results at the astronomy group's meeting. (Con't).

Dr. Bobrovnikoff will present for the first time a law of variation of the brightness of comets, as developed in several years' study of brightness as a function of comets' distance from the sun and earth. In another paper he will discuss the most famous of variable stars, Mira, which changes from great brilliancy to invisibility by the naked eye in a period averaging 330 days. (From Columbus, O.)

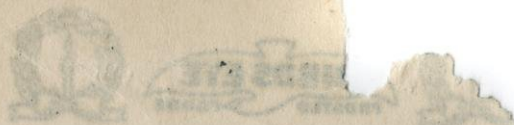
