Scientists from all parts of of Old" and after "Away in A Man- the country will learn that the sta Phi Persei has been found to be twins, when they gather at Columbus Ohio on Tuesday this week to attend the American Astronomical society's annual meeting in connection with the American Association for the Advancement of Science convention.

> This discovery will be explain observatory, Delaware, Ohio, on Friday morning at the convention. Yerkes observatory, Williams Bay.

The star Phi Persei has been around their common center of mass and completely enveloped in a gas shell. One of the pair is found to be 100 and the other 15 times as bright as the sun. The primary' star's brilliance makes the lesser one invisible. Research material was supplied by the Yerkes observat intensively for 50 years.

Twenty-five observatories will present research results at the astronomy group's meeting. (Con't).
