Media Information

Media Credentials

UW Women's Basketball credential requests should be made in writing and in advance through Tam Flarup at the Women's Sports Information Office, (608) 263-5502. Game-day credentials for the Kohl Center will be left at the main ticket office *will call* window located at Gate B.

Parking

Parking for media during Wisconsin basketball is reserved on a limited basis near the Kohl Center. Special arrangements must be made in advance. Please contact the Women's Sports Information Office for parking credentials at least one week in advance of the event.

Media Services

Working facilities for all media are located courtside at the Kohl Center. Electrical outlets are available at every seat. Telephone lines must be installed in advance of the game by calling Mike Huffman at the Kohl Center, 608-265-4702. Event programs, media guides, event notes and computerized statistics will be available in the interview/work room adjacent to the main floor at the Kohl Center. The credentialed media entrance is on the Frances Street (East) side of the Kohl Center adjacent to the media parking area. The media entrance is open two hours before tipoff.

Photographers

Photographers may work from either end of the Kohl Center court in the section designated for photographers. Photographers may not work from in front of team and scoring benches, or in front of media row. Contact Mike Huffman at the Kohl Center, 608-265-4702, to arrange for the rental of strobe lights.

Post-event Interviews

All post-event interviews will be conducted in the media interview room located adjacent to the Kohl Center main court. The large interview area contains recording couplers for hookup to the house sound system for TV and reporters. The visiting coach and players will be interviewed approximately 10 minutes following the completion of the event. The Wisconsin coaches and players will follow immediately. All requests for interviews should be

Jane Albright appears every Monday at the UW news conference at 1 p.m. in the Kohl Center. This season weekly Big Ten teleconferences with all 11 coaches will be held every Tues., 9-11 a.m. CST, beginning Jan. 4 through the Big Ten Tournament.

Badger Radio Broadcasts



For the fourth-straight year, nearly all of the home and away UW women's basketball games will be broadcast by WIBA Radio 1310 AM or WTSO 1070 AM and Learfield Communications.

Many games are available via the internet by contacting www.broadcast.com.

The radio voice of BadgerBall belongs to Brian Posick, sports director at WIBA and WTSO and morning sports anchor for WIBA and ESPN Radio 1070.

A communications graduate of UW-Stevens Point in 1989, Posick became the play-by-play announcer for the national champion Pointer hockey team. He arrived in Madison in 1991, and lobbied the station to catch up with the public's enthusiasm for BadgerBall. He begins his fourth full season as the play-by-play announcer for both home and away games.

Television Broadcasts

A record 12 UW games will be available regionally and nationally on television this season. BadgerBall will appear on Fox Sports Chicago three times and Midwest Sports Channel (MSC) eight times. In addition, a number of games can be viewed locally and statewide via Wisconsin Public Television (WPT) and local Madison cable station TVW.

OCBS SPORTS

Wisconsin Public Television is entering its eighth year of broadcasting Badger Women's Basketball on its statewide network. The WPT announce team features veteran announcer Ken Syke, and former Badger Camille (Williams) Burkes. Syke has been calling play-by-play on television for more than two decades at the high school and collegiate level. He is also the play-by-play announcer for Badger Volleyball on WPT.

Camille Burkes has a unique insight on BadgerBall drawn from her four years as a player (1991-95). She ranks among the top 15 in six UW women's basketball career categories.

The Badgers had their national network debut in 1998 in a thriller on CBS beating Georgia in overtime. Wisconsin has also


1998-99 BadgerBall Review

Wisconsin concluded the season at 18-14 just earning its fourth post season bid in the last five years under Jane Albright. Although missing the NCAA tournament, Wisconsin did gain one of 32 Women's National Invitation Tournament (WNIT) bids finishing 4-1 and losing at Arkansas, 64-67, in the championship final. It was the first national finals championship appearance by any Badger women's basketball team.

The Badgers proved what they had been saying since the end of January. They had improved, playing their best basketball of the season, and having a lot of fun reaching the WNIT final. After first and second round blowouts of Indiana State (80-43) and Siena (107-85), respectively, Wisconsin needed overtime to defeat Big Ten foe Michigan State, 70-69, in the quarterfinals. The Badgers defeated Memphis, 92-73, to advance to the national championship. It was the Badgers' first appearance in the National Invitation Tournament.

Sophomore LaTonya Sims, and freshman Tamara Moore were recognized as members of the six-person WNIT all-tournament team.

The Badgers played "senior-less" ball throughout much of the season with injuries to three-year starter Tanisha Boston (out for season after Jan. 10) and Wiersma (missed 11 games). That left juniors Kelley Paulus and Dee Dee Pate, sophomore LaTonya Sims, and freshmen Jessie Stomski and Tamara Moore as the youthful starting unit. The Badgers used



Since Jane Albright arrived in 1994-95, the Badgers have continued to set women's basketball attendance records with an all-time high of 136,182 fans attending home games in 1998-99. That total is No. 1 in the Big Ten Conference and ranks third nationally behind Tennessee and Connecticut.

10 different starting lineups this season. The freshman class scored over 43 percent of Wisconsin's points (.433), over 37 percent of its rebounds (.372) and played over 38 percent of its minutes (.388). The 1998 Badger class lived up to its 10th in the nation 1998 ranking by *Basketball Times*.

The Highlights

- Wisconsin (18-14) recorded an unprecedented fifth consecutive winning season for the first time in school history.
- The Badgers ended the regular season with four straight victories that brought them a share of fourth place in the Big Ten Conference. The 9-7 Big Ten record equaled 1998, but achieving fourth place was UW's best Big Ten finish in three years.
- Wisconsin won eight of its last 10 games to end the season on a high note. The last loss was in the WNIT championship final at Arkansas, a 1998 NCAA Final Four participant.
- UW had an RPI of 39th and had the toughest schedule in the Big Ten and sixth most difficult schedule in the nation.
- Wisconsin was 5-4 in games decided by five points or less, including 5-1 in overtime games this season.
- Team set the all-time season best field goal percentage record in Big Ten games hitting .462 and hit .459 overall (UW record is .466) to rank second to Purdue in the conference.
- Team had season high 107 points vs. Siena (fifth highest in UW history)

■ LaTonya Sims was named to the Rice Invitational all-tourney team and hit double figures in all 32 games. She has a school record 44 consecutive double-figure scoring games dating back to the last 12 games of her freshman year.

Badgers Work Overtime

The University of Wisconsin set the NCAA record for most overtimes in a season with six.

Wisconsin's 70-69 overtime win over Michigan State in the quarterfinals of the WNIT tournament gave the Badgers a 5-1 extra period record on the season, and reset the mark previously held by Northwestern State (4-1 in 1990) and Ohio State (3-2 in 1990).

UW had already posted the NCAA record for most consecutive overtimes in a season with four, which included a win over Michigan State during the regular season. That record began Feb. 5 with its lone overtime loss, 71-73, to Penn State. On Feb. 7, Wisconsin beat Michigan State, 73-68, in overtime followed by overtime wins Feb. 12th and 14th over Ohio State, 61-70, and Illinois, 72-78, respectively. The Badgers sixth overtime game was Nov. 20, defeating UC-Santa Barbara in extra innings, 103-90. All six overtimes were at home.

Big Ten Notes and Honors

- LaTonya Sims earned all-Big Ten first team honors by the media, and second team honors by the coaches.
- Jessie Stomski was Wisconsin's second consecutive Big Ten Freshman of the Year. She was the only Big Ten player named to the All-College Freshmen national team by the *Women's Basketball News Service*, and to the *Women's Basketball Journal* Freshman all-America team. She was the first UW freshman ever to score over 400 points in a season setting UW's freshman scoring record with 459 points and tied the rebound mark with 214 replacing the marks set by teammate LaTonya Sims.
- Stomski ranked second in the Big Ten in field goal percentage hitting .572 percent.
- Sims ranked third in Big Ten scoring with 18.0 points per game. She is the leading returning scorer to the conference in 1999.
- Freshman Tamara Moore was fourth in steals in the Big Ten averaging 2.50 and set the UW frosh record with 80 on the season; set the frosh mark and ranked fifth in Big Ten ft % hitting .811.
- LaTonya Sims was the Big Ten Player of the Week for Nov. 23, and Kelley Paulus was the Player of the Week for Feb. 23.

Two Earn Academic All-Big Ten Honors

Wisconsin had two athletes named to the Academic All-Big Ten team this year. Senior Amy Wiersma (Social Welfare) and sophomore Judy Ebeling (Pre-Business) represented Wisconsin on the 1999 team.

1999-2000 BadgerBall Preview

With the return of 94 percent of their scoring and 87 percent of their rebounding, the Badgers are dreaming of bigger and better scenarios as they anticipate a successful transition into the new millennium of BadgerBall. Wisconsin will welcome its second-straight top 10 recruiting class, which includes the No. 1 recruit in the nation, to a team that finished 18-14 and went to the national final of the WNIT Championship.

Starting two juniors, a sophomore and two freshmen, the youthful Badgers spent the 1998-99 season learning to play among the top teams in the Big Ten Conference recording the highest finish in three years by tying for fourth with a 9-7 record. While missing out on its fourth NCAA bid in the last five years, UW did latch onto one of 32 WNIT postseason bids and finished the tournament with a 4-1 record losing to 1998 NCAA Final Four participant Arkansas, 64-67, in the final at Arkansas. That tournament experience, coupled with the return of all five starters and some major recruits, has made for some fun planning and dreaming by UW coach Jane Albright and staff.

Returning Starters

Returnees include leading scorers and all-Big Ten honorees junior **LaTonya Sims (Racine, WI)** and sophomore **Jessie Stomski (Oakdale, MN)**. Sims, a 6-3 forward, showed her versatility at the 3, 4 and 5 spots, and expects to face the basket even more this season. The lithe leaper is the leading scorer returning in the Big Ten averaging 18 points per game, and co-led the Badgers in rebounding with 6.7 per game. The 1998 Big Ten Freshman of the Year, earned all-conference first and second teams honors as a sophomore.

Wisconsin also claimed the 1999 Big Ten Freshman of the Year in Stomski, a 6-3 forward who started regularly after five games. She tied Sims for team rebounding honors averaging 6.7 rebounds and contributed 14.3 points per game while resetting Sims' UW frosh scoring record with 459 points. She set the school field goal shooting record and ranked second in the conference converting .572 percent of her shots.

Another freshman, 5-11 guard **Tamara Moore (Minneapolis, MN)**, stepped into the starting lineup playing the 1, 2 and 3 positions while adding 10.8 points and 4.9 rebounds per game. She led the team in steals (2.5) and co-led in assists (3.3) per game. She ranked fourth in the Big Ten and set the UW frosh steals record with 80.


Moore also set the frosh record in free throw shooting as she led the team converting 81.1 percent (86-106).

Two seniors return as starters in 5-5 point guard **Dee Dee Pate (Milwaukee, WI)**, who was the co-leader in assists with 3.3 and contributed 3.6 points per game. Also returning at guard is 6-0 **Kelley Paulus (LaCrosse, WI)**. A two-year captain and starter, Paulus added 9.7 points and 3.4 rebounds at shooting guard last season.

Other Returnees

Top reserves include 5-11 sophomore **Kyle Black (Indianapolis, IN)**, who earned the team's sixth player award while establishing herself as the main three point threat hitting 36-103 for .350 percent. Black averaged 6.1 points and played both point and shooting guard. Also seeing significant playing time last season was **Missy Konieczny (Portage, WI)**, a 6-2 forward who added 4.7 points and 2.6 rebounds. Junior 6-3 center **Krista Bird (Owatonna, MN)** was injured much of the year, but hopes to return for her first full season. Junior **Rachel Klongland (Sun Prairie, WI)** and sophomore **Sarah Jirovec**, a 6-4 center from **Stevens Point, Wis.**, should also make contributions.

With so many top stats leaders returning, one might wonder who graduated. Injured three-year starter, 6-0 forward

Tanisha Boston, did not play the second semester finishing with 5.7 points and 3.1 rebounds in 14 games. UW's tallest player, 6-5 center Amy Wiersma, also had injuries to begin the season but returned to contribute 3.4 points and 5.2 rebounds per game.

Newcomers

As exciting as Wisconsin's returning firepower is, the potential melding of talent from its 10th-ranked recruiting class is the stuff dream teams are made of. Wisconsin welcomes the 1999 Parade, WBCA and *USA Today* Prep Player of the Year in 6-4 center **Nina Smith (Waterloo, IA)**. She is joined by **Candas Smith (Madison, WI)**, a 5-6 point guard; **Leah Hefte (McFarland, WI)**, a 5-11 guard; and **Kristi Seeger (Stoughton, WI)** a 6-0 forward.

A two-time first team *Parade* all-American, Nina Smith averaged 28.5 points, 11.3 rebounds and 3.7 blocked shots while shooting 78 percent in her senior season and 71 percent for her career. She had high games of 42 points, 17 rebounds and 10 blocks, and added a three-point shot to her arsenal hitting 41 percent from three-point range.

Candas Smith was Wisconsin's Miss Basketball and the Gatorade State Player of the Year while averaging 15.1 points 2.7 rebounds, 3.4 assists and 3.9 steals per game. She shot .536 percent from the field including .608 percent from beyond the three-point arc, and hit 80 percent of her free throws.

Also from near Madison are Leah Hefte, who averaged 21.1 points, 4.8 rebounds, 3.2 assists and 3.9 steals as a senior and four-year starter for McFarland High School, and Stoughton's Kristi Seeger, who averaged 15.8 points, 9.4 rebounds, 4.0 assists and 4.4 steals per game as a senior.

With a vision of unprecedented success in the offing, expect Jane Albright's Badgers to truly contend for top honors in the Big Ten Conference, gain a sixth-straight winning season, and return to the NCAA Championship where they hope that dreams become reality.



DREAM INTO ACTION

'Dream Into Action' is the theme for BadgerBall this year. Dreaming is all the team and coaching staff has been doing since placing second in the WNIT championship final last March. That tournament experience coupled with the return of all five starters, over 90 percent of their scoring and rebounding, and the addition of the 10th-ranked recruiting class that includes the No. 1 prep in the nation, has the Badgers dreaming of bigger and better scenarios for BadgerBall 2000.

You have taken a program with one winning season in 10 years and fashioned the first five-season win streak in school history. You have completed your five year plan, is this where you calculated you would be?

Coach A: We can't really complain. Our recruiting has been a little ahead. Every coach always wants to be in the NCAA tournament. But not to be in it two years when the school had only been there once (in the previous 20 years), now you're getting a little greedy. Our expectations are higher now, and in the next five years, expectations for myself and my staff and what we are trying to do as a team will be higher.

Realistically there are a whole lot of things we haven't come close to doing. To win a back-to-back Big Ten Championship would be the biggest feat in the world. It's obviously a very hard thing to do to succeed at the level we are trying to succeed.

You have had three-straight top 10 recruiting classes including the national player of the year. How do you react to those that say, "Big things are not just being hoped for, they are expected"?

Coach A: I'd say they are in line with what I think. That is certainly the picture we are trying to paint and what we believe is in our immediate future. We think we have a

very strong foundation and we know a foundation had to be laid before we could do anything else.

To what do you attribute your success in attracting the nation's top recruits?

Coach A: Numerous things. I always point back to the team itself when you bring those kids (recruits) on campus. They like our team and the people on it; the City of Madison, the University and its degree, the Kohl Center, the people here. Players look for so many different things now that you have to have so many different things right to be able to attract one of the top notch players. Any more its not that they just need to like me or they like the place they are going to play, it has to be a combination.

Talk about having such a youthful team last year and what the strong finish says about that team.

Coach A: It confirms what everybody knows which is, experience is the best teacher. We'll have another youthful team this year in some real key spots and that's something we will have to keep reminding ourselves of because players don't tend to allow themselves the


thought of 'growing up'. When they start they already want to be in that NIT championship form. We feel like we will be starting at a higher level because of those experiences, but we want to finish at a higher level, too.

What did it mean to be in a national championship (WNIT) final last year?

Coach A: It gave us five games of experience at a high level and in tournament type play--the pressure of you win you keep playing and if you lose you go home. Anytime you can create that type of atmosphere you see how truly competitive a team is and we responded very well to that after not responding well to it in the Big Ten Tournament. Hopefully that will be a turning point. We have a couple of tournaments this year and when we get to the Big Ten Tournament hopefully we will have more experience of win keep playing, lose go home, and we will be more successful.

The Big Ten tournament has been a stumbling block for UW over the years. What will be your approach to the tournament this season?

Coach A: We are aware we haven't performed well (at the Big Ten Tournament), but I'm also aware that there are probably three teams out of the 11 that can say they

performed well down there. It's a very tough atmosphere and a very hard thing, not to make excuses for us. It doesn't make me panic about what we are doing here. My teams have always been better in conference tournaments than they were regular season (prior to Wisconsin) so hopefully these next years coming up we can change that and be more of a championship-minded team.

Discuss the luxury of five returning starters and the majority of your scoring and rebounding back.

Coach A: It's a luxury we have never had here and it's something we are very excited about. Scoring is a hard thing to do in basketball and certainly we have people who have gained some confidence in that, and they are noted throughout the conference for their abilities to score. It will allow us to be more versatility in other ways and maybe allow us to spend time on some other things that I feel we can get better at.


Is one of those things the team could get better at, taking care of the ball?

Coach A: That was what our biggest problem was last year and it sounds very simple but we were not good at making decisions quickly with the ball in our hands.

We will structure preseason to put that to the test and make sure by the time playing time comes around that it will be one of our strengths.


Wisconsin seems to have depth at every position. What kind of changes will we see in BadgerBall this season?

Coach A: Hopefully we will get to have a year of everybody being healthy. Hopefully our conditioning will pay off in that way. We hope to score more points. We are in a tougher league than a lot of teams. Seventy points in the Big Ten is equal to 90 points in some other conferences. It's hard to score night in and night out. Certainly our recruiting classes are a strength. They are ours, they know what our expectations are. The atmosphere of consistency and high expectations hopefully will combine and give them the feeling that they can succeed at a higher level than we have.



Who do you expect to be the early leaders on the team?


Coach A: I always expect seniors to be early leaders. That is where a lot of your good comes from is the ability of the seniors to teach the younger kids exactly what the system is. I know Missy (Konieczny) and Dee Dee (Pate) and Kelley (Paulus) are capable of leading in all different ways. I would think LaTonya Sims will be somewhat of a leader because of the successful experience she's had. And under classmen Tamara Moore and Jessie Stomski have shown very key signs of leadership. Leadership won't be a problem on our team whereas years before it has been. You can never have too many leaders but I think we will be very adequate there.



Senior guard Kelley Paulus has served as a Badger captain the past two years. Her leadership will be vital in taking the Badgers beyond past performances as they seek a new level of accomplishment.

With such a highly touted recruiting class last year expectations may have exceeded their experience. How will you handle the projections for the freshman class this year?

Coach A: We're really not paying a lot of attention to projections. We just know what we want to do. As long as I can keep them listening to my voice. The local kids, everybody wants them to play 40 minutes a game and be the biggest everything on the team. They aren't in a position that that can happen with any of them because of the other talent. So we'll try to keep them

focused on the team goals and anything individually those people can do to help us to get that and try to reward that.

It has been mentioned that you couldn't stop dreaming about your team this year. Tell us what those dreams were about.

Coach A: It was true. First of all—and I'm usually a very good sleeper—I dreamed one night that Cynthia Cooper was on my team and playing for the Badgers. I assume that's good. I think that must mean we are excited about our talent. Just being in the situation where I get to spend time every day with kids is terrific. I have a very hard work ethic and I have very big dreams. I get to be there with them every day and that is very exciting to me. We have a great blend of chemistry. In one of those dreams specifically we beat a school at a place we have never won at. It was a very fun dream for me to have. Obviously those things haunt you where you haven't played well and you are dreaming about it in the middle of the summer. But we were scoring a lot of points and having a lot of fun.

What do you anticipate are the team's strengths?

Coach A: Teams will have trouble guarding us. We present matchup problems. We've moved LaTonya (Sims) out to that three spot so not a whole lot of teams are going to have a 6-3 person to defend LaTonya. Believe it or not, outside shooting will be one of our strengths. That has been a weakness of ours and that will change. Our posts have been able to be successful when we've been a very average outside shooting team and that is definitely going to be one of our strengths.

Experience. We have enough playing experience that that will be one of our biggest strengths. Not a lot will happen to us this year that hasn't happened to us already, whether its on the high end or the horrible low end of the spectrum. These kids have been in both places and they know where reality is.

Our strength will continue to be in the way these kids care about each other and the staff cares about them. The family atmosphere. Going to Australia helped them to get to know one another

better. Time gives you a lot of opportunity with kids. Everybody was at our camps this summer except for Nina (Smith) of the recruiting class. Kristi (Seeger) and Leah (Hefte) and Candace (Smith), I feel like we raised them so I don't feel like they are new people coming in. And Nina, I feel like I know as well as my sister so I don't feel like there is a not of newness.

Have you identified any certain weaknesses to begin the season?

Coach A: Our first weakness would definitely be last year our inability to take care of the ball and not to get shots off. It won't matter how well we can score if we can't make decisions with the ball and if we fumble it. And we did that 37 times in a 40-minute game last year and we can't just say we are okay with that. Certainly that will be our first challenge—to prove that we can really cut those turnovers down.

Rebounding we have to move from a weakness category to a strength category, which hopefully we will be smart enough to see that is why we were winning at the end of the year. At the beginning of the year we had so many games that we were outrebounding in and as we started outrebounding teams and getting more chances in that area to score we were more successful.

Talk about LaTonya Sims.

Coach A: LaTonya Sims has the potential to be one of the best players in the Big Ten if she continues to work on her outside shooting. She can be a deadly threat driving toward the basket. Offensively she'll be hard to guard. Last year she worked on rebounding and defense and improved in those areas. In testing this fall she had her personal bests in almost every category so she has worked extremely hard over the summer on her conditioning and that will pay off for her.

UW's strength of schedule ranked No. 5 in the nation last year. Will that contribute this year, having played such a tough schedule last season?

Coach A: Yes. This year is just as tough as schedule and actually harder because we have fewer home games. Our experience with that should be better.

The Big Ten Conference has attracted the top attendance in the nation the past seven years. To what do you attribute the fact that the Big Ten continually outdraws other conferences?

Coach A: The region of the country having one or two institutions in each state and every body in that state is an artificial alumni of them. The Big Ten is awesome and in each sport. It's not just women's basketball. People love the Big Ten. Sports fanatics love it, and certainly the people in each state have proven to be very loyal to their institutions and Wisconsin is at the head of that list in their loyalty to what we are trying to do here. They will drive from all over the state to see us play. So one of our goals will be to break all of our attendance records this year.

After the initial excitement of moving into the Kohl Center the season tickets dropped off a bit last year. Do you feel it is still the asset you thought it would be and presents the proper home court advantage?

Coach A: It's got to be one of the top three things that would draw an athlete here. It's state of the art. Kids do like things and stuff, and it's impressive. We couldn't be housed in a better building. It's very practical as far as using it and how it looks. The players have their training table here, their weight room, their locker room the courts. They don't ever have to theoretically leave here. They have computers

in the locker room it's one-stop shopping. It's a great gift and we just have to keep getting it out there and showing how proud we are of it. As far as a place to play in. I don't think we have given as much. We haven't been making a race for the title. If we respond this year and are as competitive as we want to be, the crowds will come out in bigger numbers than they ever have.


Comment about switching to a Thursday-Sunday Big Ten schedule.

Coach A: We've (the coaches) been highly criticized for that. But our fans need to remember every decision in our program should be made for the student-athlete. There is no question that Thursday-Sunday is much better for them. One day preparation and rest between a big, big game in the Friday-Sunday schedule is almost an impossible physical task to turn around. I think you will see fewer injuries in the Big Ten season. You'll see better preparation for the games and better competition on those Sunday afternoon games. It won't be as convenient for the fans but they will adjust. It should be the outside adjusting and not the inside. Although we are a form of entertainment, there's no question in my mind that this is the right thing.

What do you hear other coaches saying about Wisconsin?

Coach A: I've taken a lot of kidding this summer about 'why are you out recruiting?' I'm out recruiting because we still need more players. We still haven't proven we can do anything. Pretty much Nina (Smith) is a household name on the road. People really talked about her a lot and they should. We were really fortunate to get her here and she made our stock go up with people really looking hard at us wondering why Nina chose us.

The fact that we did pretty well toward the end of the year when everyone had already written us off was very promising. The Big Ten coaches really know our kids work hard and they are have a good work ethic. People talk about playing in Madison, the Kohl Center. Scheduling has been harder than ever this year to get people to come here and play. People talk about our crowds and our overtime games. People have teased me about how many overtime games we are going to have this year.



Having fun is a part of Badger Women's Basketball, and sharing that fun with their fans is a high priority.









Head Coach Jane Albright



Badger Coach Jane Albright has led Wisconsin to an unprecedented five consecutive winning seasons for the first time in program history (5 year record 96-62).

Well on her way to becoming UW's winningest coach, Jane Albright has completed her fifth year with the University of Wisconsin women's basketball program. In her tenure the Badgers have had five consecutive winning seasons for the first time in school history (96-52).



Coach A's popularity and BadgerBall have become the rage in Wisconsin with record attendance at games and at summer camps. Nearly 1,500 young athletes attended the 1999 BadgerBall Summer Hoops camp, and over 7,000 campers have joined the BadgerBall family since 1995. .648), including three 20-win seasons and four post-season bids.

Under Coach "A", the UW women's basketball program has been revitalized. She took over a program that had just one winning season in the previous 10 years (102-176 record).

She responded by taking her first teams (1995 and 1996) to the NCAA tournament, and returned to the Big Dance in 1998. In 1999, Wisconsin entered its first-ever national championship final in the WNIT tournament finishing as the runner-up champions.


During Coach A's first two years, the Badgers had back-to-back 20-win seasons for the first time in school history. The 1996 team tied for the most wins and posted the best record in school history at 21-8. The 1998 squad tied 21 wins finishing at 21-10. Albright has posted eight 20-win seasons in the past 11 years, and has taken her team to seven NCAA tournaments in the last 10 years (at Wisconsin and Northern Illinois). In her inaugural season at Wisconsin, the team went 20-9 and received just the program's second bid to the NCAA Championship losing in the second round. She was named the 1995 Big Ten Coach of the Year by her peers when Wisconsin

placed third in the Big Ten Conference with an 11-5 record, improving from ninth place in 1994. She achieved her 200th win during that season, and was an Associated Press and WBCA National Coach of the Year finalist.

Winning and attending the NCAA tournament is the rule rather than the exception for Albright, who left Northern Illinois in 1994 with a decade of accomplishments to her credit. The all-time winningest basketball coach at NIU, she held a 188-110 (.631) mark, and was 140-48 (.744) her last six years, which included five 20-win seasons and four NCAA tournament appearances. Her last two teams at NIU finished with 24-6 records, and were Mid-Continent regular-season or tournament champions and NCAA qualifiers.



A four-time conference coach of the year in the Big Ten and both the North Star and Mid-Continent Conferences, Albright began her coaching career in 1981 under one of the game's best in Pat Summitt at Tennessee. While a graduate assistant under Summitt, the Volunteers were NCAA Final Four participants in 1982, and NCAA quarter-finalists in 1983.

In 1983, she joined the University of Cincinnati coaching staff as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator. A year later she assumed the head coaching position at Northern Illinois where she established a program worthy of national recognition.

Albright has coached five players who have earned seven Kodak District IV all-America honors, two Olympic Festival athletes, four professional team members, and two USA team participants. She earned Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA) District IV "Coach of the Year" honors in 1995 and 1990.

Active in USA Basketball, she was the head coach of the 1996 USA R. Williams Jones Cup team which won the gold medal in Taipei, Taiwan, with a perfect 9-0 mark. In 1993, she was the assistant coach for Team USA which earned a bronze medal at the World University Games with a 6-2 record.


Albright assisted the 1992 USA Junior National team to a 4-1 record and silver medal performance in the Pan American Confederation World Championship in Mexico, qualifying the United States women for the 1993 Junior World Championship. A year earlier, she was the head coach of the gold medal-winning 1991 U.S. Olympic Festival South squad.

In 1999, Albright took the Big Ten all-Stars on a 10-day tour of Germany and Belgium posting a 3-1 record.

The Graham, N.C., native graduated cum laude in health and physical education from Appalachian State University in 1977, where she was a letterwinner in both basketball and volleyball. She taught high school for four years in Spartanburg, S.C., prior to beginning her collegiate coaching career at Tennessee.

Deeply committed to community service, Albright serves on the boards of several organizations including Buckets for Hunger Board of Directors; MACC Fund Board of Directors (Midwest Athletes Against Childhood Cancer); CAP Fund Board of Directors (Child Abuse Prevention); FCA (Fellowship of Christian Athletes) Board of Directors

She has been a featured speaker & clinician at: Wisconsin Basketball Coaches Association Fall Clinic; Minnesota High School Coaches Association Clinic; Iowa Basketball Coaches Association Fall Clinic; and the nationally renowned "Recruiter's Institute" Kevin O'Neill Coaches Clinic (Northwestern University).







A former graduate assistant coach at Penn State University from 1992-94, Crim continued her coaching career as the recruiting coordinator at the University of Kentucky from 1994-95. Kate Peterson, Assistant Coach



Kelly Kenny, Assistant Coach



The Big Ten Conference attendance leader in four of the past five years, Wisconsin has set school attendance records in each of the past five seasons. The Badgers set a total attendance record of 136,182 in 1999 in 18 home games, the third most total fans in the nation behind Tennessee and Connecticut.


The Badgers set a then-Big Ten single game mark of 16,329 in 1998, and have helped the Big Ten Conference lead the nation in attendance for the seventh straight season last year with a Big Ten national record average of 4,530 per institution.

The 1997-98 Badgers also set cumulative and conference-only games attendance marks with a record average 12,474 in eight Big Ten games. UW set its first five-figure average with 10,455 per game also in 1998. Wisconsin has ranked among the top seven schools nationally in attendance since 1995.

The entire UW women's basketball team traveled to Australia in May of 1999 and to Europe during August of 1995. Under NCAA regulations, schools are allowed to travel out of the country every four years. In Europe, the team played a four-game schedule earning a 3-1 record against national teams in England and Belgium in a 10-day tour. The Badger team was 2-2 on its 14-day tour of Australia.



Huff's Number 21 Retired

Theresa Huff, who played at Wisconsin from 1979-83, is the only woman player to have her jersey retired. Although only 5-11, the lithe center/forward became the school's all-time leading scorer and rebounder completing her career with 1,879 points and 1,201 rebounds.

Robin Threatt broke her 11 year-old scoring record with 1,901 points in 1993, and Barb Franke surpassed both Huff and Threatt completing her career with 1,994 points in 1996. But very few individuals will ever reach Huff's incredible 1,201 rebounding mark.


A Milwaukee native, Huff's career spanned the transition period from the AIAW to the NCAA governance. She led Wisconsin to its first post-season appearance reaching the quarter-finals of the AIAW National Championship, and she was a member of the first official Big Ten Conference team in 1981-82.

Huff distinguished herself as Wisconsin's first professional woman basketball player and was also the first American chosen to play in Spain in 1983-84. She was inducted into the University of Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame in 1998.

One of the premier athletic leagues in the nation, the Big Ten Conference is proud of its leadership in the arena of Athletics, particularly in women's athletics.

Big Ten women's athletics programs lead the nation in both women's basketball and volleyball attendance. In addition, the league receives more television exposure than any conference in the nation. More than 200 Conference athletic events are televised each year on national and regional networks.

Begun in 1895, the Intercollegiate Conference of Faculty Representatives (popularly known as the Big Ten) has changed little from its original philosophy of faculty control of athletics with emphasis on the student-athlete. Comprised of 11 institutions in eight states, the conference has long set the national standard for athletics and academics. As a whole, league institutions graduate student-athletes at overall rates between 10 and 22 percent higher than their peers at other Division I conferences. The conference celebrated its centennial anniversary during the 1995-96 season.

Women's athletics programs became affiliated with the Conference officially in 1981, although unofficial conference championships had been held among the member institutions since 1972. Penn State became the 11th university to join the conference in 1991.

Big Ten women athletes compete in conference championships in basketball, cross country, field hockey, golf, gymnastics, rowing, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball.


The Big Ten Conference began its conference basketball tournament that decides the automatic qualifier for the NCAA Championship in 1995. Penn State was the winner of the initial tournament, and successfully defended its title in 1996. Iowa surprised the league by winning the tournament title in 1997. No. 5 seed Purdue became the lowest seeded team to win the tournament in 1998 and won again in 1999 on its way to the NCAA national title.

The league title is based on the final regular season conference standings. All teams play a total of 16 games. Schools play six teams twice, and four teams once.

The 1999 Big Ten Conference tournament will be held on Thursday-Sunday, March 2-5 in Indianapolis, Ind. The tournament is a four-day single elimination playoff with all 11 teams participating. The top five seeds (as determined by conference standings) receive a first-round bye. The other six teams play each other in the first round, with the winners participating in the quarterfinals on Friday.

The conference champion has earned an automatic bid to the NCAA tournament since 1981. Purdue became the first Big Ten team to earn a national women's basketball title in 1999. PU also was an NCAA semifinals in 1994. Ohio State and Iowa advanced to the Final Four in 1993.

In addition to its athletic success, the Big Ten Conference has led the nation in basketball attendance for seven consecutive years. Six schools finished in the top 25 in attendance, and overall the league averaged a national record 4,530 spectators per game. It is the second-straight year the Big Ten has set the national mark.

BadgerBall's New Home



The Kohl Center replaced the UW Field House (1929) as the venue for UW basketball in January of 1998. A replica of the crest on the Field House was installed on the front fascia of the Kohl Center. The 10,000-pound crest welcomes fans to the 17,142-seat facility that also serves the university and the community for special events. The Kohl Center conveniently houses all aspects of BadgerBall including coaches offices, locker, study and training areas, practice and competitive facilities.

Wisconsin's new multipurpose athletic center is state-of-the-art with a capacity of up to 17,142 seats. BadgerBall's tipoff was Jan. 20, 1998, with Wisconsin averaging 13,260 in seven home games that first year. The facility provides the opportunity to host stage shows, concerts and athletic events such as the 1998 Division I NCAA Women's Volleyball Championship which was held in December of 1998.

The Kohl Center is the happy home for the UW Women's Basketball team having had its inaugural opening Jan. 20, 1998 with a declared sellout vs. the University of Iowa. At the current pace of success established by the women hoopers, the Kohl Center could very well become the home of the first Wisconsin women's basketball Big Ten championship team.

Since opening, the building has met with much success. Areas specific to the UW women's program were designed by the Wisconsin coaches with the women's program in mind. From computers to lounge areas to audio/video systems, the Kohl Center provides a competitive floor,

practice and study areas all in one place. The coaching offices are also located at the Kohl Center.

Major Benefactors

The building is named for U.S. Sen. Herb Kohl (D-Wisconsin), a 1956 graduate of the UW-Madison, who donated \$25 million to the project. Kohl's gift is the single largest private donation in University history. Kohl earned his Bachelor of Science degree in American Institutions from Wisconsin-Madison.

Former all-Big Ten basketball player Albert "Ab" Nicholas and his wife, Nancy Johnson Nicholas, pledged \$10 million toward the project. The facility's practice gymnasium is named the Nicholas-Johnson Pavilion and Plaza. Nicholas received his B.S. and M.B.A. degrees from the UW-Madison.

The Kellner family—Jack F. and his sons, Ted and Jack W. of Milwaukee gave \$2.5 million. All three Kellners received degrees from the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Capacity

The Kohl Center will seat 17,142 for basketball. That figure includes 7,500 seats in the lower seating bowl and 4,500 in each of the two balconies. The unique design of the Kohl Center (with two overhanging balconies) guarantees that all fans will be

close to the playing floor with excellent site lines. The facility seats approximately 14,000 for hockey, and between 15,000 and 17,000 for concerts.

Spacious Locker Rooms

The Kohl Center includes lockers for UW men's and women's basketball and hockey. Four other locker rooms (for visitors or multiple teams during WIAA tournaments) also are in the arena.

The 2,200 square-foot, state-of-the-art locker areas have been designed with the needs of student-athletes in mind including team organizational meetings, an athletes' social area, and study carrels. The athletes have a lounge area with sound system, video room, computers available in the study room, and, of course, a spacious dressing and shower area complete with multiple outlets and lighted mirrors.


Practice Pavilion

The Nicholas-Johnson Pavilion will house three full-size basketball courts to be used for practice sessions when the Kohl Center

is booked for other events. Pre-game booster club functions are also scheduled in the practice gym.


Check List of Team and Fan Amenities

- For the Athletes: Huge locker rooms that include attached lounges, video/meeting rooms, and study areas with practice facility attached.
- For the Coaches: Spacious offices with westward views of the campus including the Field House and Camp Randall Stadium.
- For the Support Areas: Sports medicine, sports information, concessions/catering, and physical plant have ample and convenient work areas. The UW ticket office has totally relocated to new offices in the Kohl Center.
- For the Fans and Suites: A state-of-the-art sound system has been implemented in the Kohl Center and TV monitors (capable of showing replays) are wired to the suites and above concessions stands



throughout the building.

- For the Fans: Extra-wide concourses (two), a number of food courts on both levels, numerous restrooms and merchandise outlets.
- Also For the Fans: The cantilever design replicates the overhang effect of the former Field House (1929) without the obstructions. Sightlines are tremendous from every seat. At center court, you can look up at three ascending, cheering spectator areas—an awesome and intimidating sight for our opponents.



Badgers Make Their World Mark



Members of the BadgerBall family have made their mark on the world of basketball. In 1996, Jane Albright returned victorious from Taiwan where she was the gold medal winning head coach for the Jones Cup team. Other members of the UW team have taken world tours as Big Ten all-Stars visiting such countries as Belgium, Denmark, England, Germany, Japan, Sweden, Austria, Hungary, Australia, Slovakia and the Czech Republic. Team travels have included the Northern Lights Invitational in Anchorage, Alaska in 1997. Wisconsin took its second foreign tour in May of 1999 to Australia visiting Sydney, touring the 2000 Olympic venue, diving at the Great Barrier Reef, and competing in four games in a 14-day tour. The team will tour New York City in November of 1999 on its trip to Rutgers.

BadgerBall mania has swept the State of Wisconsin and the world. Members of the Wisconsin team have participated in a number of world basketball tours. Current team members LaTonya Sims, Kelley Paulus, Dee Dee Pate and Missy Konieczny were members of the foreign-touring Big Ten all-Star teams. Sims and Konieczny joined Coach Albright touring with the 1999 Big Ten all-Stars to Germany

and Belgium. Paulus and Pate visited Denmark. Since its first tour in 1992, the Big Ten all-star team has also competed in Australia as well as a number of European countries and in Japan.


USA basketball tours also provide the opportunity to travel abroad. Head Coach Jane Albright returned from Taiwan in 1996, where her Jones Cup team brought home the gold medal. Former Badger Barb

Franke also competed in Taiwan and Canada as a member of two different USA teams.

Wisconsin is able to take a foreign tour every four years according to NCAA rules. The Badgers had the trip of a lifetime in 1999 spending 14 days seeing the sights of Australia while playing four games. BadgerBall had its first foreign tour in 1995 playing a four-game schedule while traveling to Paris, France, Antwerp, Belgium and London, England.

members of the National Academy of Engineering, five are in the National Academy of Education and 48 are fellows in the American Physical Society.



A Scenic Campus

One of the most picturesque college campuses in the country, UW-Madison covers 933 acres along the beautiful shores of Lake Mendota.

One mile from the capitol, traveling down historic State Street, the city was designed so the University and state would be linked, signifying the interrelated nature of the academic and political life of Wisconsin.

Madison's lakes, rolling hills, architecture, parks and arboretum have enhanced UW-Madison's reputation for scenic beauty.

Tree-lined Bascom Hill features a bronze statue of Abraham Lincoln, one of the University's most famous landmarks. Others include North Hall, the first building on campus; the Carillon Tower in front of the Social Science building; Library Mall, with its clock tower and fountain; and Picnic Point, which lies at the end of a 129-acre peninsula complete with hiking and biking trails—one of the most romantic spots on campus. Camp Randall Stadium is a fun place to be on a Saturday afternoon, especially during the infamous Fifth Quarter after a football game when the band entertains. The newly opened Kohl Center is home to the UW men's and women's basketball and men's ice hockey teams as well as a regular concert stop.

A favorite area for UW students to gather is the Memorial Union and its lake-side terrace. Here students can study or socialize against a backdrop of sailboats, canoes, sailboards, kayaks and swimmers, while enjoying the sunshine and breezes from Madison's largest lake, Mendota.

The Student Body

Over 40,000 students populate the UW campus, including more than 10,500 graduate and professional students in numerous fields.

Although a UW Board of Regents policy limits undergraduate enrollment from outside the state to 25 percent, the University still maintains one of the nation's most diverse student bodies.

Students hail from every county in the state and every state in the nation, as well as from 117 foreign countries. UW-Madison ranks sixth in the nation for total foreign student enrollment.


A greater effort is also being made to recruit and retain minority students and faculty. In the fall of 1998, African Americans, Hispanics, Native Americans and other minority groups accounted for more than nine percent of the student body.

The Community

Madison, located in southern Wisconsin, is not only pretty to look at but fun to be in. Draped around five lakes, "Mad City" is the home of the University of Wisconsin and the state capital.

With a diverse population of 203,211, Madison offers the "big city" spheres of politics, arts and entertainment, as well as the attributes of a small town. It is a family and action-oriented community that promotes participation in government, education, the arts, sports and recreational activities.

Madison was named the best place to live in America in 1996 by *Money* magazine. Again, in 1998 *Money* magazine rated Madison the best mid-sized city in the Midwest. The July 1995 issue of *Outside* magazine called Madison a "Dream Town." The magazine also rated Madison as one of the top 15 "great sports towns" in the country. *U.S. News and World Report* named it one of the country's 10 Hottest Cities. Madison was also featured on the front page of the Life section of *USA Today* on July 12, 1995.



WHERE WISCONSIN RANKS

Since 1910, the University of Wisconsin has ranked on the top 10 lists in every objective national faculty reputational survey. The quality of Wisconsin's undergraduate, graduate and research programs is recognized worldwide.

In 1999, *U.S. News & World Report* listed UW-Madison as eighth among public universities and 34th among all universities. The UW also rated in the top five for academic reputation among public universities.

Wisconsin was also ranked sixth in *Kiplinger's Personal Finance* Magazine Top 100 values in state universities in 1999.

The 1998 *Fiske Guide to Colleges*, the best-selling guide to colleges, gives the UW-Madison its highest academic ranking. In fact, UW-Madison is one of only eight public institutions in the country to receive the five-star rating.



Funding and Support

► **Federal Grants:** In 1998, UW-Madison received over \$261 million in federal awards.

► **Research and Development Funds:** UW-Madison ranked third in the country for research and development expenditures in 1997, with \$432 million, according to the National Science Foundation.

► **Tuition:** Over the last 10 years, tuition for undergraduates at the UW-Madison has been consistently lower than the average for Big Ten schools ranking second-lowest for resident tuition and third-lowest non-resident tuition of the public institutions.

► **Private Support:** With private gifts totalling \$220 million in 1998, Wisconsin ranks first among all public institutions and fifth among all institutions.

► **Alumni:** The Wisconsin Alumni Association has a network of chapters in 125 cities around the world helping to serve some 300,000 alumni. The chapters have raised \$4 million in scholarships.

► **Peace Corps Volunteers:** UW-Madison has the largest number of currently serving Peace Corps volunteers in the nation and has produced the second most total number of volunteers since the program's founding.

Degrees

► **Graduates:** Standard & Poor's 1996 survey lists Wisconsin as one of the nation's top producers of corporate executives, ranking second in producing bachelor's degree winners who go on to become corporate executives.

► **Doctoral Degrees:** UW-Madison is a national leader in doctoral degrees awarded ranking second in 1997. Between the school's founding and 1998, the UW-Madison awarded 34,012 doctoral degrees.

Departmental Academic Rankings

► **Liberal Arts:** In its ranking of graduate programs in the liberal arts in 1999, *U.S. News & World Report* cited UW-Madison's sociology department as tops in the country. The magazine also ranked library science, eighth; education, ninth; social work, ninth; economics, 10th; history, 11th; psychology, 12th; political science, 14th; English, 17th; fine arts, 19th; and music, 20th.

► **Science Programs:** According to *U.S. News and World Report's* annual graduate school ratings, published in 1999, seven UW-Madison science programs ranked in the top 20: speech pathology, first; audiology, fifth; computer science, ninth; veterinary medicine, ninth; chemistry, 10th; biology, 12th; math, 14th; geology, 17th; physics, 18th; and nursing, 18th.

► **Engineering:** In 1999, *U.S. News and World Report* ranked Wisconsin's College of Engineering tied for 11th in the nation. Three specialities ranked among the top


five in the country: nuclear, fourth; chemical, fifth; and industrial, eighth.

► **Business:** *Computerworld* ranked the business school's Information Systems program as one of the top 25 in the nation.

According to *U.S. News and World Report* in 1999, the business school is tied for 10th. The real estate program ranks second, insurance third, marketing seventh, general management eighth and accounting 14th.

► **Professional Schools:** *U.S. News and World Report* ranked four UW-Madison Schools or Colleges among the top 20 in the country: veterinary medicine, ninth; engineering, 12th; pharmacy, 16th; and nursing, 18th.

► **Libraries:** The UW-Madison has the 14th largest university library collection in the United States, with more than 5.8 million books in 45 libraries across campus.




UW-Madison Sets the Pace

- with the oldest Scandinavian studies (1875), psychology (1888), agricultural economics (1909), genetics (1910) and wildlife management (1939) departments in the United States
- in establishing the nation's first magnetic observatory (1876)
- in discovering Vitamins A (1913) and B (1916)
- with the oldest radio station in the nation—WHA—which began broadcasting in 1917
- as the Memorial Union became the first public university union to serve beer (1933)
- in finding in 1937 that niacin supplementation prevents pellagra, a deadly disease that killed 5,000 people a year
- in the synthesizing of genes. Molecular biologist Har Gobind Khorana synthesizes the first gene. He received the 1968 Nobel Prize in medicine for his work in genetic coding.
- in finding which wavelength of ultraviolet light produces skin cancer (1941)
- in discovering the anti-cancer drug, fluorouracil (early 1950s)
- as Elizabeth and James Miller, UW Medical School professor of oncology and professor emeritus of oncology, were the first to identify characteristics among chemicals that cause cancer (1950s, 60s)
- with launching the Orbiting Astronomical Observatory, the world's first true observatory in space
- in revolutionizing brain surgery, as Dr. Manucher Javid, UW Medical School professor of surgery, became the first neurosurgeon to use a solution from the age-old compound urea during brain surgery on a human (1957)
- in laying the foundation for the U.S. Food and Drug Administration adoption of Sun Protection Factor (SPF) on sunscreens (1960s)
- when the National Organization for Women (NOW) was first housed in Kathryn Clarenbach's faculty office on campus
- in finding that the anti-estrogen drug tamoxifen can prevent breast cancer from recurring in certain women who have had cancer previously (1980s)



- in developing new techniques to measure bone tissue loss, known as osteoporosis
- with the Biotron, a research building that can control environmental conditions for experimental purposes
- with bone marrow transplants. Using techniques developed at UW-Madison, the first bone marrow transplant in the U.S. was done at UW Hospital. A UW team also discovers how to predict the success of bone marrow transplants by matching genes.
- in finding evidence linking cancer in laboratory animals with saccharin and cyclamates
- as UW Hospital and Clinics develop the nation's first Mobile Critical Care Unit, which duplicates facilities of a hospital intensive care unit and laboratories
- with the first and only medical physics department in the nation to exist within a medical school
- with the development of the world's first genetically altered trees
- in organ preservation breakthroughs. In 1987, surgeon Folkert Belzer used a cold storage preservation solution to preserve dog livers up to 36 hours and dog pancreases up to 72 hours. Clinical use of this new solution decreases the need for emergency transplantation, increases the number of livers and pancreases available to people who need transplants, and improves organ sharing among transplant centers
- as a UW-Madison researcher describes the atomic structure of a common cold virus
- with the establishment of the Center for Dairy Research, the nation's first such center to be established at a university (1986)
- in improved world map projection developed by professor Arthur H. Robinson.
- in Hector F. DeLuca, discoverer of a "super vitamin-D" compound, and continuing techniques for synthesizing the compound



Administration



David Ward

David Ward was named chancellor of the University of Wisconsin in June 1993.

Ward has provided strong leadership for efforts to improve the quality of education. Changes inspired by Ward include enhanced student advising, particularly for underclassmen; expanded course access; a core curriculum; and increased opportunities for undergraduates to conduct research.

Ward serves on the Board of Directors of the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges and chairs the Big Ten Council of Presidents/Chancellors.

The chancellor was born in Manchester, England, and received bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Leeds. He earned a Fulbright Travel award to the United States in 1960 and received a doctorate from UW-Madison in 1963.

He served as chair of the geography department from 1974-77 and as associate dean of the Graduate School from 1980-87. He became vice chancellor for academic affairs in 1989, and in 1991, was named provost, chief deputy to the chancellor.



Jim Hoyt

Jim Hoyt, a professor in the UW's School of Journalism and Mass Communication, has served as the chair of the UW Athletic Board and as a UW Faculty Representative since 1991.

As Athletic Board chair, Hoyt oversees the governing body that supervises the day-to-day running of the athletic department. As a faculty representative, he serves on a number of committees of the NCAA, Big Ten Conference, and Western Collegiate Hockey Association.

A UW professor since 1973, Hoyt was the director of the School of Journalism and Mass Communication from 1981 to 1991. He teaches courses in the school's broadcast news sequence and has conducted extensive research on the effect of cameras in the courtroom. A former producer and editor for NBC News in Washington, D.C., he now consults for NBC News and a number of local television stations throughout the country. Hoyt received his bachelor's, master's and Ph.D. from Wisconsin.




Pat Richter

Pat Richter, a former UW student-athlete, professional football player, and successful businessman, was the perfect choice to become Wisconsin's athletic director in December of 1989.

An all-America tight end for Wisconsin's 1963 Rose Bowl football team, Richter had a distinguished career with the National Football League's Washington Redskins from 1963-71. He was inducted into the National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame and the Rose Bowl Hall of Fame.

Richter earned his bachelor's degree in landscape architecture from the UW in 1964, earning Academic all-America honors in 1962 and was named Wisconsin's Big Ten Medal of Honor recipient in 1963. He received his law degree from the UW in 1971. In 1995, he was inducted into the GTE/CoSIDA Academic Hall of Fame, and was honored as an NCAA Silver Anniversary Award winner for post-college achievements.

After employment with a Madison law firm, he joined the Oscar Mayer Foods Corp., and worked his way up to vice president of personnel.



Al Fish

Al Fish begins his 11th year as the administrative officer for the division overseeing facility planning, event management, technical services, equipment services and the University Ridge Golf Course. He also begins his second year of supervising the sports of football and men's and women's rowing.

Fish has been instrumental in the planning and construction of the Kohl Center, Fetzer Academic Center and Goodman Softball Complex. Future projects under Fish's direction include a new swimming facility, and new and expanded rowing facilities.

In 1989, Fish came to the division after three years as the Director of Policy and Budget for the Department of Health and Social Services. He worked as a liaison for Governor Tony Earl to the State Assembly, a budget analyst for the State Budget Office, and as a program evaluator for the Legislative Audit Bureau.

A 1973 graduate of Luther College in Decorah, Iowa, Fish was a four-year letterwinner in golf.



Cheryl Marra

Cheryl Marra begins her 10th year as an associate athletic director at Wisconsin. Marra oversees the men's and women's programs of basketball, golf, swimming and diving, and women's volleyball. She also serves as the primary women's administrator to the Big Ten Conference and the NCAA, and coordinates all booster clubs.

Under Marra's guidance, Wisconsin has served as host to the 1993 and 1998 NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Championships, which garnered record-setting attendances, and the 1998 NCAA Division I Women's Golf Championship.

Marra came to Wisconsin from Denison University where she served as the women's athletic director from 1983-90. She was an assistant professor in the physical education department, and the women's soccer and track and field coach.

Marra is actively involved on various NCAA and Big Ten committees.

A 1977 graduate of Slippery Rock State College with a bachelor's degree in physical education and health, Marra received her master's degree in physical education from Ohio State in 1983.



Mike Moss

Mike Moss begins his third year as the associate athletic director in charge of men's and women's ice hockey, men's and women's cross country and track, women's softball and wrestling. He also oversees the academic affairs and sports medicine departments as well as serves as the campus student-athlete services coordinator.

Moss served as a Director of Sports Operations for the Atlanta Olympic Games Committee from 1993-96. He was responsible for coordinating the sports of archery, boxing, cycling (road and track), equestrian, modern pentathlon and tennis.

Prior to his work with the Olympics, Moss served as the associate athletic director for business and student services at the University of California for 13 years.

Moss is a 1961 graduate of Ohio University with a bachelor's degree in journalism. He received his master's in science and physical education from California State University-Hayward. He is a retired lieutenant commander in the U.S. Naval Reserve.



Vince Sweeney

In his ninth year at Wisconsin, Vince Sweeney is the associate athletic director in charge of external and internal communications. He oversees the marketing, promotions, sports information, special events and fundraising areas as well as serving as the liaison with the Athletic Board and Alumni Association.

Sweeney is on the board of directors of the National Association of Collegiate Marketing Administrators and of the Greater Madison Convention and Visitor's Bureau. He is on the NCAA subcommittee on basketball marketing and is a consulting editor for Collegiate Sports Marketing. His department won two "Awards of Excellence" for Athletics Management magazine in 1995.

Prior to joining the UW, Sweeney worked for 13 years in sports journalism, where he earned several awards as a reporter and editor.

Sweeney is a 1978 graduate of UW-Madison with a degree in journalism and mass communication.



Jamie Pollard

Jamie Pollard is in his second year as the chief financial officer at Wisconsin. He is in charge of the accounting, budgeting, purchasing, travel and payroll for the department as well as supervises the ticketing and personnel departments.

Pollard comes to Wisconsin after serving as the associate athletic director for administration at the University of Maryland. He also served in a similar position at Saint Louis University from 1989-94. Prior to 1989, he was a staff accountant at Arthur Anderson & Company in Milwaukee.

Pollard, a 1987 graduate of UW-Oshkosh with a degree in business administration, won the 1987 NCAA Division III title in the 5000 meters. He is a certified public accountant and is a member of the College Athletic Business Managers Association.




Terry Gawlik

He oversaw all areas of NCAA compliance for the Cyclones including student-athlete recruiting, eligibility certification, financial aid and athletic participation. He also served as ISU's football program administrator from 1986-93.

Bald is a member of the National Association of Compliance Coordinators and has participated in several NCAA regional seminars.

A 1980 graduate of Loras College with a degree in marketing, Bald earned his master's degree in sports management from Western Illinois in 1985.

University of Wisconsin Athletics

The University of Wisconsin-Madison offers its student-athletes one of the premier intercollegiate athletic programs in the country.

As a member of the prestigious Big Ten Conference, Wisconsin offers its student-athletes the best in education, athletic opportunities, coaching and on-field competition at the NCAA Division I level.

Celebrating over 1000 years of competition in some men's sports, Wisconsin's men's teams compete in basketball, cross country, football, golf, ice hockey, rowing, swimming and diving, soccer, tennis, track and field, and wrestling.

Established July 1, 1974, the 12-sport women's athletic program offers basketball, cross country, golf, ice hockey, lightweight rowing, openweight rowing, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, track and field, and volleyball.

Wisconsin has ranked among the top 35 NCAA Division I programs for the past four years. In 1998-99, Wisconsin tied for 25th in the Sears/National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics Directors Cup competition, which recognizes the best Division I college sports programs in the nation.

Fifteen of Wisconsin's 22 sports qualified as teams or individuals for their respective national championships in 1998-99. The women's cross country team finished fifth at the NCAA Championship while the men's team was sixth. The football team won the Rose Bowl and ended the season ranked fifth while the women's volleyball team

advanced to the elite eight of the NCAA tournament for the second consecutive year. Individually, Badger athletes earned 35 all-American honors during the year.

Qualifying for post-season competition as teams or individuals were men's basketball, men's and women's cross country, football, men's and women's rowing, women's soccer, men's and women's swimming, women's tennis, men's and women's track and field, volleyball and wrestling.

Wisconsin was the unofficial 1998-99 Big Ten Conference All-Sports champion. The Badgers crowned two Big Ten team champions in women's cross country and football while second-place finishes were earned by women's soccer, women's tennis, women's outdoor track and volleyball.

Two Badger coaches were named the Big Ten Coach of the Year in their respec-




The women's cross country team won the 1998 Big Ten Conference Championship and ended its season with a fifth-place finish at the NCAA Championship.

tive sports while three athletes were named the Big Ten Athlete of the Year and three were named the Big Ten Freshman of the Year. Wisconsin athletes also claimed 17 Big Ten individual titles. A total of 77 all-conference honors were earned during the season.

Academic honors also came in with two athletes earning Academic all-American honors, seven earning Academic all-district honors and 134 student-athletes earning Academic all-Big Ten honors.

NCAA Championships


In the last seven years, the University of Wisconsin has played host to five NCAA Championships.

The Badgers have played host to the NCAA Men's Ice Hockey Championship in 1993 and 1997. The 1993 event sold out in three months, the fastest sell out in NCAA hockey history.

Wisconsin played host to the NCAA Women's Volleyball Championship in 1993 and 1998. The Badgers shattered the attendance records for the championship match and two-day event both years.

The UW was also the site of the 1998 NCAA Women's Golf Championship. The event was the first national championship held at University Ridge Golf Course and the first women's championship shown live on national television showcasing the Ridge.

The NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament will come to Wisconsin in 2002 when the Badgers play host to a regional in the Kohl Center.



The Wisconsin women's soccer team advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament in 1998 and finished second in the Big Ten Conference.

Student-Athlete Support Network

Academic & Student Services

The mission of the Academic Affairs Office is to provide student-athletes with the maximum opportunity for academic and athletic excellence. University of Wisconsin athletes have a history of academic success and much of the credit for that impressive record is due to the advising system available to the student-athletes.

Director **Alan Zussman** supervises a staff of six advisors which conduct the program offered to the nearly 700 student-athletes. The advising staff of **Mary Weaver-Klees, Craig Hudson, Chris Butler, Doug Tiedt, Liane Kosaki and Jerry Darda** have a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all university departments. The staff renders quality academic and personal support to student-athletes and assists coaches in providing the best possible collegiate experience.

For those student-athletes who request assistance, advising sessions are offered on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the athlete. Wisconsin athletes are degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The advising staff takes a personal approach to each athlete in determining his or her individual needs, personal or academic.

Student-athletes at Wisconsin receive recognition for outstanding academics in a number of ways. The Big Ten Conference honors scholar-athletes with Academic all-Big Ten honors while the UW Athletic Board recognizes Athletic Board Scholars for the highest grade point average in each sport. In addition, student-athletes may be nominated for Academic All-America honors through the sports information office.

The Fetzer Student Athlete Academic Center

Opened in the spring of 1997, the Fetzer Student Athlete Academic Center is the newest aid to Wisconsin student-athletes in achieving their academic goals.

The 15,000 square-foot, state-of-the-art facility serves the needs of all men and women student-athletes. The Center features an open area with carrels that can accommodate up to 30 students. There are 11 study rooms of different shapes and

sizes including a 55-seat auditorium. A computer room houses 22 PC's while the entire Center is wired with voice/data jacks and power ports.

Student-athletes can drop in before practice or between classes to study or meet with the advisors and grant-in-aid staff whose offices are also located in the center.



The Fetzer Student Athlete Academic Services center, a state-of-the-art facility located in the lower level of the McClain Center, opened in 1997. The \$2.1 million center is one of the best in the nation and includes 11 study rooms, a computer room, and a 55-seat auditorium.

Scholarships

UW-Madison is proud to offer to its prospective student-athletes one of the most comprehensive athletic scholarship programs in the nation. As a Division I member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), scholarships are awarded to athletes on a one-year renewable basis if scholastic and athletic commitment are maintained.

Scholarships are available in all varsity sports with the exception of men's rowing, which does not grant scholarships. Full scholarships include the cost of room and board in addition to tuition and fees. The selection of scholarship recipients is based on athletic ability and projected academic success at Wisconsin.

Endowed Athletic Scholarships

As more and more colleges and universities turn to innovative and effective ways of meeting the mounting financial challenges of supporting their intercollegiate athletic programs, it becomes increasingly evident that one of the most successful strategies is the establishment of endowed athletic scholarships.

At the University of Wisconsin-Madison, endowment funds to support athletic scholarships are normally created through gifts to the UW Foundation. A portion of the income from the endowed fund is used each year for scholarship support, and the remainder is reinvested

in the principal.

Sports Medicine

The goal of the sports medicine staff is to provide all University of Wisconsin student-athletes with high quality health care.

Wisconsin's Sports Medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

The sports medicine staff consists of team physicians, dentists, athletic trainers, and other medical and allied health professionals. The day-to-day care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Wisconsin athletes is supervised by a staff of 10 full-time and three graduate assistant N.A.T.A.-certified athletic trainers. Under the direction of head athletic trainer **Dennis Helwig**, the Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Staff members **Chuck Hart**,

Jan Helwig, Mike Johnson, Barb Pearson, Henry Perez-Guerra, Andy Rhodey, Heidi Stettler, Laura Walluk, and Andy Winterstein utilize functional measures, provide dietary analysis, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve flexibility.

The Sports Medicine facility in the McClain Center features an extensive collection of therapeutic and rehabilitation equipment including a 50-foot, two-lane-rehabilitation pool, and an on-site x-ray facility. Considered one of the nation's finest, the McClain Sports Medicine Center offers an environment conducive to expedient care, and a healthy return to competition.

Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affiliated with the world-renowned UW Hospitals and Clinics. Medical director **Dr. Ben Graf** is responsible for all services provided to our student-athletes. Orthopedic care is directed by team physician **Dr. John Orwin** while general medical care is directed by the head of primary care, **Dr. Greg Landry**.

In addition to the headquarters in the McClain Athletic Facility, auxiliary athletic training rooms are located in the Stadium, Natatorium, UW Field House and Kohl Center. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus.



Sports Information

Directing the communications for the 23 sports in the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics is the responsibility of the University of Wisconsin Sports Information Offices.

These offices utilize a variety of communications systems including the world wide web to provide student-athletes the opportunity to be recognized for their athletic endeavors.

The offices provide and maintain many resources such as records, fact sheets, photographic files, statistics, media guides and event programs in meeting the information requests of the media, coaches, administrators, opponents and the general public.

The director's of women's and men's sports information **Tamara J. Flarup** and **Steve Malchow**, and their respective staffs, maintain close contact with local, regional and national media as well as the athlete's hometown media in providing information. These offices prepare news releases, design sports brochures and media guides, and provide post-event results for print and electronic media, and the department's web pages. Besides the directors, members of the women's staff include associate director **Diane K. Nordstrom** and assistant **Paul Capobianco**, and several students. The men's staff includes associate director **Justin Doherty**, assistant director **Julie Kluge**, and interns **Britt Kinder** and **Brian Lucas**, as well as a number of student assistants.



Wisconsin Facilities

The lower level houses the Fetzer Student Academic Center, the headquarters of the Badgers Sports Medicine staff, a fully-equipped weight room and locker rooms for football, men's and women's track, softball, and men's and women's soccer.





Top: UW golfers have the opportunity to compete on one of the finest courses in the Midwest—University Ridge. The facility features a par-72, 18-hole course, 15,000-square foot practice green and 5,000-square foot chipping green. It was the site of the 1998 NCAA Division I Women's Golf Championship.

Left: The Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center or Shell features a 200-meter Martin rubber track surrounding four basketball/volleyball courts that double as throwing and jumping areas for indoor track meets. The Shell, which has a seating capacity of 2,500, was the site of the 1999 Big Ten Conference Indoor Men's Track & Field Championship.

Bottom Left: The Kohl Center, which opened in January of 1998, is the home of the Badger basketball and men's hockey teams. One of the finest on-campus athletic facilities in the nation, the \$76 million facility includes a separate practice gym, locker rooms and lounge areas, and coaches' offices.

Bottom Right: Weight training areas in the McClain Center and Camp Randall Stadium feature free weights and stereo music in spacious, carpeted rooms. Four full-time and two part-time weight training instructors monitor and advise all Wisconsin student-athletes.






The Wisconsin Field House, which seats 10,600, is the practice and competitive facility for the Badger volleyball team as well as the competitive facility for the wrestling squad. It features four locker rooms, and an athletic training area.



The swimming and diving teams have two pools for practice and competition—the Natatorium and Southeast Recreational Facility. The “Nat” contains an eight-lane, 25-yard pool equipped with an automatic Colorado Timing System and digital readout score board. The 50' x 40' diving well is fitted with three one-meter and two three-meter Dura (Maxi) Flex boards. The SERF (pictured above) features an indoor long course pool with movable bulkheads that more than double the program’s training space.



The Wisconsin tennis teams have the competitive advantage of playing year-round at one of the best college facilities in the United States—the Nielsen Tennis Stadium. The stadium features 18 tennis courts (12 indoor and six outdoor), five squash courts, one squash doubles court, and seats 1,500 spectators.



The Goodman Brothers Softball Complex on the west end of the UW campus opened during the spring of 1999. The facility has an NCAA-regulation, natural grass field with a centerfield distance of 225 feet, and left and right field foul line distances of 200 feet. The facility includes dugouts, locker areas, players’ lounge, grandstand seating for 1,600 and media facilities.

Wisconsin Traditions

Badger Nickname


The sports program's nickname "Badgers," was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin. The territory was dubbed the "Badger State," not because of animals in the region, but rather by an association with lead miners in the 1820's. Prospectors came to the state looking for minerals. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

The original badger mascot was too vicious to control. On more than one occasion, the live badger escaped handlers before a sideline hero recaptured the animal. It was decided in the interest of fan and player safety that Wisconsin's mascot would be retired to the Madison zoo.

In 1949, a student in the university's art department, Connie Conrad, was commissioned to mold a paper-mache badger head. Gymnast and cheerleader, Bill Sagal of Plymouth, Wis., was directed by homecoming chair Bill Sachse, to wear the outfit at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name. The rally committee opted for its own name: Buckingham U. Badger. The name is said by some to have originated in a line from "On,

Wisconsin" that exhorts the UW gridiron heroes to "buck right through that line."

"On Wisconsin"

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy of Chicago, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. The song was an instant hit at the Wisconsin campus and soon spread throughout the world, being very popular with military bands. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

the post-game concert was designed to give fans something to listen to on their way out of the stadium, but it developed into a post-game party as the band built in audience participation.

Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. Copyrighted by Sandlee Publishing Corporation in 1970, the song has become legendary at the University because of its polka-like rhythm. Band director Michael Leckrone said the song's popularity got started at a 1975 hockey game. "The crowd wanted to hear a polka," he said. "I didn't have any polkas. Just by accident, we had this beer commercial in the tunes we play. I told the band if we substituted the word 'Wisconsin' for 'Budweiser' it would work."

Leckrone said the song became a football tradition after a 1978 come-from-behind victory over Oregon. "Wisconsin was behind by three touchdowns, and the crowd was really dead. I played the song to get everyone pepped up. About 20 seconds after that, Wisconsin scored a touchdown. I played it again, and Wisconsin scored another touchdown. From then on, the band could never play enough 'Bud.'"

Varsity

The traditional arm waving that comes at the end of the song "varsity" was the 1934 brainchild of then-UW band leader Ray Dvorak. He had originally gotten the idea from University of Pennsylvania students who waved their caps after a losing game. Dvorak later instructed UW students to wave as a salute to UW President Glenn Frank.

Fifth Quarter

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as they play traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song. Originally,
