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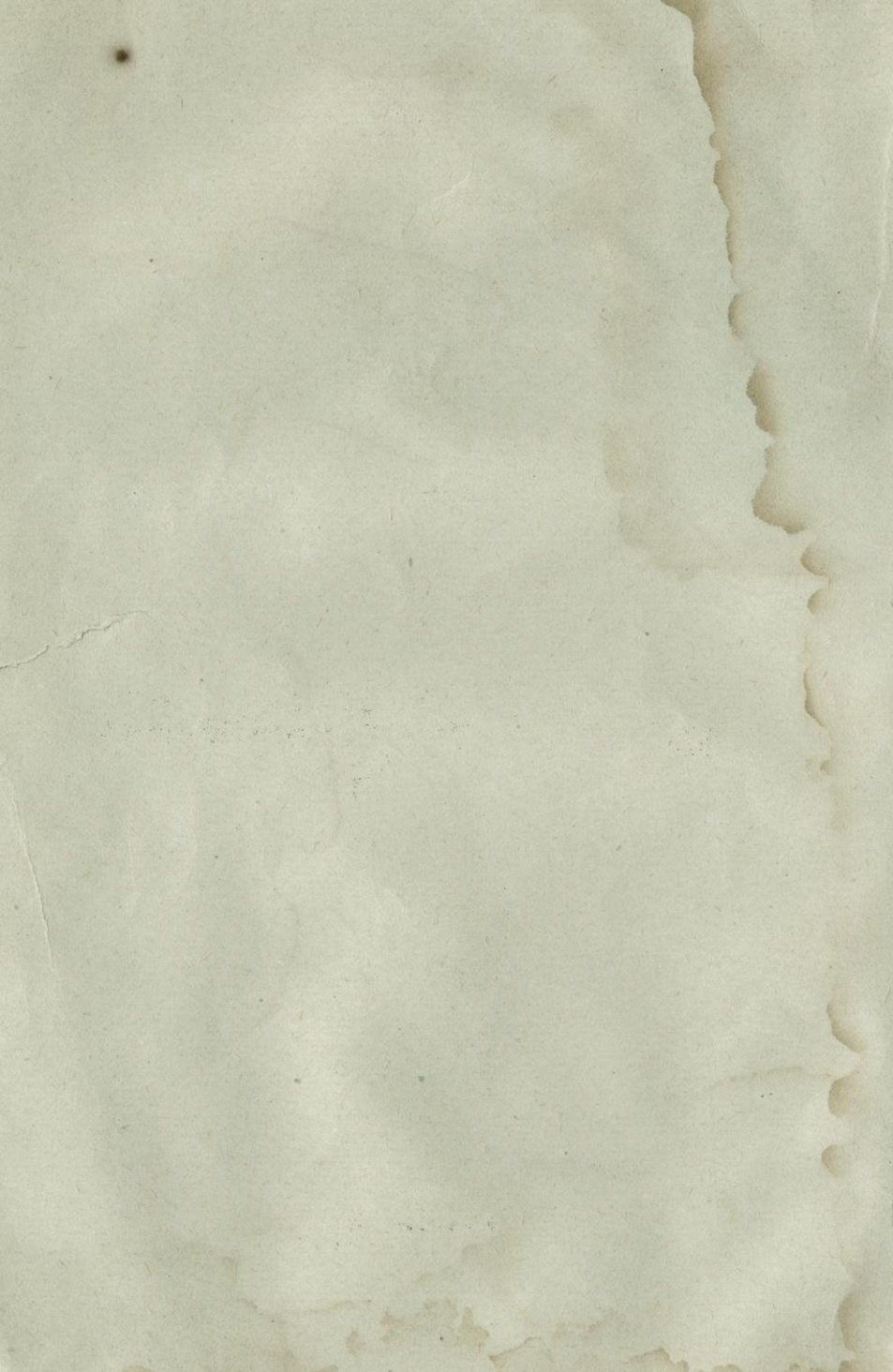

RULES AND REGULATIONS

ADOPTED BY THE TRUSTEES,

1. The foundation of a virtuous, useful and happy life, consists in early forming the habit of prompt obedience to proper authority. A ready compliance with the directions of the Principal and teachers is required.

2. Good manners and gentlemanly conduct are at all times required. The use of profane or indecent language, playing at games of chance, smoking or chewing tobacco, or using ardent spirits, and wicked practices of any kind, will subject the offender to expulsion.

3. No boisterous talking, laughing or playing is allowed at any time in any part of the building; and during study hours perfect quiet must be observed in and about it.

4. During study hours students rooming in the Seminary must remain in their respective study rooms, and no interruption of any kind can be allowed.

5. No Student is allowed to leave the village during the term, unless by special permission from the Principal.

6. The playing of croquet, billiards, and matched games of base ball is not allowed.

7. All students are required to attend public worship Sabbath morning; the service in the Seminary Sabbath afternoon, and the Bible class in the evening. Also the social meeting Friday evening.

8. Any persons injuring the building or furniture, will be required to pay all expenses incurred in making it good.

8. All books, pamphlets, periodicals, and reading matter of every kind brought into the Seminary, are subject to the inspection and approbation of the Principal. All novel reading is prohibited.

10. Neatness and simplicity of dress are earnestly recommended to the students; and parents are especially requested to provide simple wardrobes for their daughters, as experience shows that any attempt at fashionable display tends to counteract the best educational influences. Dress should, as far as possible, be made at home—if made here it is at too great cost of time and money. The young ladies are required to keep their own wardrobes in repair.

11. No person who is unwilling to keep these regulations, need apply for admission.

Parents are requested to communicate freely with the Principal.
