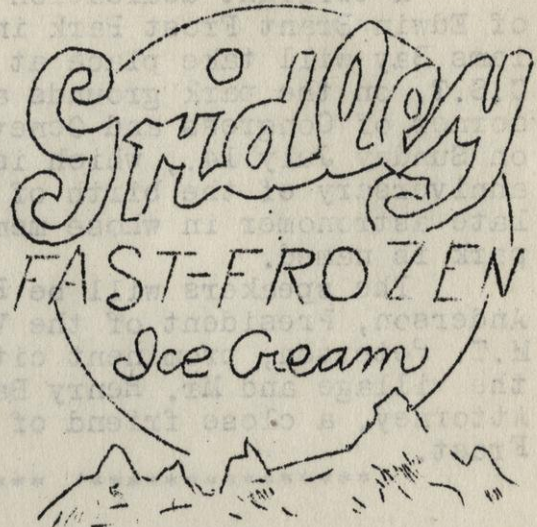

ACCIDENTS IN HOMES INCREASING

Of the Many hundreds of acci-
dents on the highways, by aero-
plane and drowning reported happen-
ing daily, look at the figures for
accidents happening in the home.

Home injuries cost the people
of this country 600 million dollars
a year according to figures compil-
ed by the Home Management Dept.,
College of Agriculture of Univer-
sity of Illinois..

There were 3000 more fatalit-
ies from home accidents in 1934
than in 1933. The total for the
past year from figures of the
National Safety Council was 33,000.
The estimated cost of both fatal
and non-fatal injuries in the home
during the year was \$4,400,000.
The cost of these injuries, includ-
ing wage loss, medical care and
overhead expense of insurance ,
amounted to 600 million dollars.

Many of the accidents causing
injury and death could have been
prevented. Carelessness in using
gasoline and kerosine in cleaning
and starting fires and lack of
knowledge in the treatment of in-
fections were the cause of over
half of the accidental deaths in
the home.

TOTAL ECLIPSE OF MOON JULY 15

Weather permitting, residents
of this vicinity may view a total
eclipse of the moon on the night of
July 15, according to Dr. Otto
Struve, director of Yerkes Obser-
vatory, Williams Bay. The moon will
be obscured as it passes through
the earth's shadow. While the moon
will not enter the shadow until
9:12 P.M. it will be dimmed for
nearly an hour before that by the
penumbra surrounding the shadow
proper. By 10.09 P.M., the eclipse
will be total, reaching its darkest
stage at midnight. The shadow across
the moon will not wholly disappear
until 1:43 the morning of July 16.

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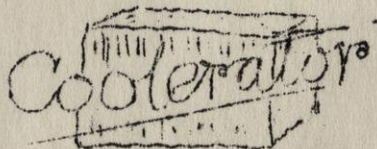

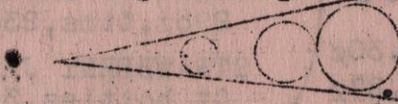

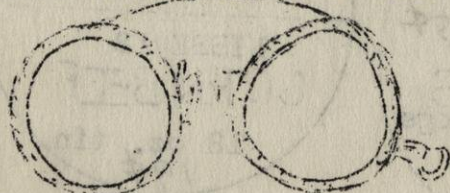
