The DANE COUNTY MEMORIAL COLISEUM

Wisconsin plays its home games in the beautiful and spacious Dane County Memorial Coliseum. There are 8,000 theatre type seats and space for 630 additional seats and standing room making the capacity for hockey 8,630. It is the largest college hockey arena in the nation. The ice surface is regulation 85 x 200 feet.



RECORD ATTENDANCE

Wisconsin hockey has attracted record crowds to the Coliseum ever since the Badgers joined the Western Collegiate Hockey Ass'n in the 1969-70 season. Badger fans set college hockey attendance records for six consecutive years starting in 1970 thru 1975. The 1975 total of 185,683 fans that saw 22 home games was the most fans ever to watch a college team during one season. During the 1975-76 season Badger backers established a new record for average attendance per game with 8,471 per game average.

Wisconsin Hockey History

The "modern" era in Wisconsin hockey history began in March of 1962 when then-Athletic Director Ivan Williamson announced that the Badgers would return to intercollegiate hockey competition for the 1963-64 season — after a 28-year layoff.

Long-time Madison hockey backers, John Riley and Art Thomsen, coached the early Badger icers; and quickly formed a respectable hockey club. On the night of December 6, 1963, Wisconsin's Chan Young scored at 5:10 of the first overtime period to give the Badgers their first win of the modern era, 3-2, over Macalester College of St. Paul, Minn.

Wisconsin went on to post an 8-5-3 record in its first year, playing mainly teams from small colleges in Minnesota, Michigan and Illinois.

The following season the Badgers won 14 games and lost nine. That year the Badger icemen, in an effort to upgrade the level of competition, added eight games against opponents from the Western Collegiate Hockey Conference (WCHA). They lost all eight.

Undaunted by their lack of success, the Badgers in 1965-66 scheduled six games

against WCHA foes. True to form, they lost the first five; but the final margins were decidedly closer than they had been the previous year — 3-2 to Colorado College, and 3-1 and 5-3 to Michigan State.

Then on the evening of February 22, 1966, it finally happened. The Badgers had battled back from a three-goal first-period deficit to pull even with the Minnesota Gophers at the end of regulation time, 4-4. Barely two minutes into the sudden-death overtime period, junior wing Jim Petruzates snared an errant Gopher pass and unmolested, fired a 20-foot slap-shot past the sprawling Minnesota goalie. Wisconsin hockey had come of age.

John Riley retired as coach after the 1965-66 season and was replaced by 35-year-old Robert N. Johnson; a Minnesota native, a former professional baseball player, and the hockey coach at Colorado College.

In his first season, Johnson expanded the Wisconsin schedule to 26 games; adding eastern powers Brown, Providence and Army, plus the Austrian National team; and finished at 16-10.



The following year, led by national scoring champion, Bert DeHate, the Badgers improved their season mark to 21-10. DeHate, a sophomore from St. Paul, Minn., finished the year with 77 points on 47 goals and 30 assists, including seven hat tricks. A mid-term graduate in 1969-70, DeHate played in only 20 games that year, but still ranks as the all-time leading Wisconsin scorer with 188 career points.

Wisconsin's hockey fortunes continued to improve as the Badgers won 22, lost 10 and tied two in 1968-69; including, for the first time, a winning record (11-9-2) against WCHA competition. With his team's record to show, Bob Johnson began lobbying for Wisconsin's admittance into the prestigious conference.

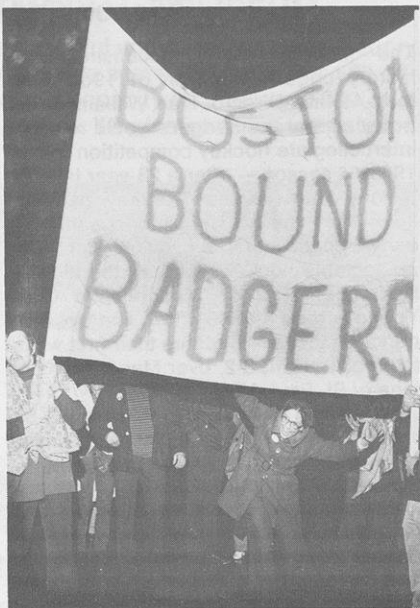
On March 30, 1969, the Badgers were admitted to the league, and quickly proved a worthy entry by placing fourth in the standings. All first-year teams previously had finished dead last. It was also the year the Badgers made their initial appearance at the NCAA Tournament in Lake Placid, N. Y. Led by the "Freshman Flyer" line of Max Bentley, Tim Dool and Norm Cherrey, the Badgers finished third in the tourney, and became recognized as a national power.

Following the tournament, defenseman John Jagger, from Sault St. Marie, Ontario, became Wisconsin's first hockey All-American.

In 1970-71, the Badgers again played well, finishing with a record of 20-13-1; but Wisconsin fans, who were packing the Dane County Coliseum in record numbers, had another goal in mind — a national championship. It was not to be that year; or the next, when Wisconsin again placed third at the national tournament.

With a blazing start in 1972-73, the Badgers won 10 of their first 11 contests. They finished 18-9-1 in league play and earned the right to travel to Boston for their third try at the NCAA title. In one of the most electrifying games in tournament history, Wisconsin beat semi-final opponent Cornell, 6-5 in sudden-death overtime. Sophomore Dean Talafoos scored with five seconds left in regulation time; and again just 33 seconds into the extra period to send the Badgers into the championship game for the first time ever.

Although they fell behind league rival Denver early in the title game, the young Badgers were determined to leave Boston a winner. With workmanlike precision, the Cardinal and White came back to muster a



4-2 decision; and with it, the national championship.

As hard as it was to reach the top, it proved even harder to stay there for Wisconsin. The Badgers have not returned to the NCAA meet since their championship season. In each of the last three seasons, the Badgers have been eliminated in WCHA playoff battles — each time by the Michigan State Spartans. Those seasons were not failures by any stretch of the imagination, however. In 1973-74 Wisconsin finished with a fine 18-13-5 record; and in 1974-75 the Badgers won 24, lost 12 and tied two.

Even last season, when the Badgers suffered through their first losing season of the modern era, there were some bright spots. The loss of two starters, plus Coach Johnson, to the Olympic team; and the loss of all-American defenseman Brian Engblom to the pros, left interim coach Bill Rothwell with a young and inexperienced team. But, with a late-season surge, the Badgers moved from tenth to seventh in the league before losing to Michigan State in the playoffs.

And for the seventh consecutive season Wisconsin led the nation in attendance in 1975-76, with a total of 152,476 for 18 home games. This year, with a total of 26 lettermen to work with, Coach Johnson and the Badgers could return to the rank of champions.

BOB JOHNSON
Head Coach — 10th Season

After taking a year leave-of-absence to coach the U.S. Olympic team, Badger mentor Bob Johnson returns this season to direct the fortunes of his 10th Wisconsin hockey team. Johnson's nine-year record at Wisconsin is 200-98-13, and his overall college coaching record is 229-149-16. Under Johnson's guidance, hockey at Wisconsin has moved from a non-revenue sport, to one of three income-producing sports at the school. Johnson's team won the NCAA championship in 1973 — the third time the Badgers qualified for the tournament. The Badgers also won three consecutive Big Ten titles, starting in 1972; and have led the nation in attendance every year since 1969.

Johnson took over the coaching reins at Wisconsin in 1966. For three years the team operated as an independent before joining the tough Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA) for the 1969-70 campaign. That young band of upstarts surprised the hockey world that year by finishing fourth in the league when all other first-year teams previously had finished last. The Badgers then went on to their first NCAA tournament and finished third.

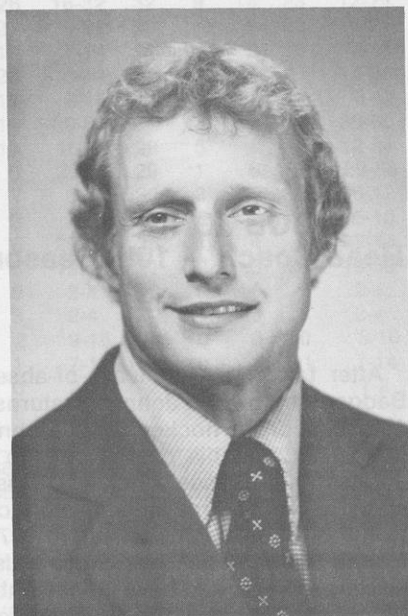
Johnson has coached the last four U.S. National teams, including the 1975-76 team which participated in the Winter Olympics in Innsbruck, Austria. That team compiled an overall record of 42-20-2, including three wins and three losses in Olympic competition, for fourth place. The spirited play and gutsy performance by the Olympians gained the respect of the hockey community around the world, and earned Johnson the 1976 Meritorious Service Award from the Amateur Hockey Association of the United States (AHAUS).

The 45-year-old Johnson is a native of Minneapolis, Minn. He played hockey and baseball at the University of North Dakota in 1950-51; and at the University of Minnesota from 1952-54. Bob started his coaching career at Warroad (Minn.) High School in 1956 after Army duty in Korea and a brief minor league baseball career, before moving to Roosevelt High School in Minneapolis for the next six years. In 1963 Johnson started a three-year stint at Colorado College as hockey and baseball coach. His CC hockey teams com-

piled a 29-51-3 record. In baseball, he was named Coach of the Year for the NCAA College division Rocky Mountain District in 1964 and 1965.

Bob received a Bachelor of Science degree from Minnesota in 1954; and holds a Master of Education degree, also from Minnesota. Along with his coaching duties at Wisconsin, he is also a professor in the Physical Education Department.

Bob and his wife Martha are the parents of five children.



GRANT STANDBROOK

Assistant Coach - 1st Season

Grant Standbrook comes to Wisconsin this year after coaching the U.S. National team, with Bob Johnson, for the past three years. Standbrook was the assistant coach for the 1974 U.S. team which won the World "B" Tournament; and for last year's U.S. Olympic team which tied for third in the competition in Innsbruck, Austria.

A native of Winnipeg, Manitoba, Standbrook graduated from the University of Minnesota-Duluth in 1961. He lettered in hockey two years at UM-D, and was an alternate captain in 1960-61.

Standbrook, 39, began his coaching career at Churchill High School in Winnipeg in 1961. In 1963, he began a three-year coaching stint at Greenway High School in Coleraine, Minn., where his teams posted a won-lost record of 56-21-2.

Standbrook joined the coaching staff at Dartmouth College in 1966; and became the head hockey coach in 1970 — a position he held for five years. At Dartmouth, Grant also coached soccer and lacrosse. He was a member of the Canadian championship soccer team in 1962 and '63.

Grant and his wife Joy have three children.

Coach Bob Johnson Looks At 1976-77 . . .

GOALTENDING—"Goaltending appears to be a strong point in 1976-77 for the Badgers, with the return of Mike Dibble — one of the fine college goalenders in the country. He's been a regular for two and a half years and has a wealth of experience. We expect great things out of Mike. Backing up Mike are two players from last year, Julian Baretta and David McNab. Both Baretta and McNab, at times, played very well last year. The threesome will give us a solid position at goaltending."

DEFENSE—"Defense also appears to be a strong spot for the Badgers. The entire defensive crew returns. With the addition of Olympic captain John Taft, and incoming freshman Ron Griffin, it appears there'll be a real battle for positions. The defense will be led by Taft and All-American Craig Norwich. The other regulars returning will be John Gregory, Brad Mullens, Norm McIntosh, Ian Perrin, Bobby Suter and John Suter. It appears it'll be a real battle to see who gains the six positions on the Badger defense."

CENTER—"Mike Eaves has been the leading scorer for Wisconsin the last two years and gained valuable experience with the U.S. National team in 1976. Dave Lundeen and Dave Herbst, both proven veterans, also return. Mark Johnson, an incoming freshman, will battle the three centers for a starting position."

LEFT WING—"Left wing appears to be the strongest of the forward positions. Steve Alley returns from the Olympic team to give us added depth and scoring. Mark Capouch, George Gwozdecky, Les Grauer, Rod Romanchuk and Clark Kavalinas will all fight for the other three spots."

RIGHT WING—"A real question mark looms in the right wing spot. Tom Ulseth is the only proven scorer back. Mike Meeker should give us some scoring, and Murray and Brad Johnson are veterans returning. We may move some of the left wingers or a center to this position to give us the scoring. This position holds the key to our scoring since we have had problems on the right side."



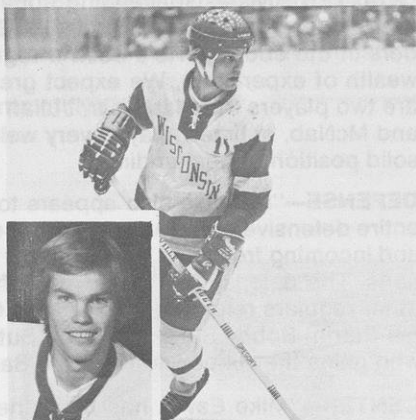
Badger Profiles

Left Wing, Senior, 6-0, 185
Anoka, Minnesota; Born December 29, 1953

Back with the Badgers after a year's leave-of-absence with the Olympic team ... Scored 62 points for the Olympians in 64 games, including a goal and an assist in Olympic competition in Innsbruck, Austria ... Also played for the U.S. National team in 1974 and again in 1975 ... A Badger tri-captain in 1974-75, Steve was also the leading goal-scorer that year with 23 (48 total points) ... Played for Wisconsin's 1973 NCAA championship team ... Won all-state and all-metro honors at Anoka High School in 1972, and was the leading scorer in the state of Minnesota with 74 points ... Enrolled in the School of Business.

COACH'S COMMENT: "Steve's a real workhorse who has had a great career at Wisconsin. With his experience with the Olympic team he should give us the leadership we need."



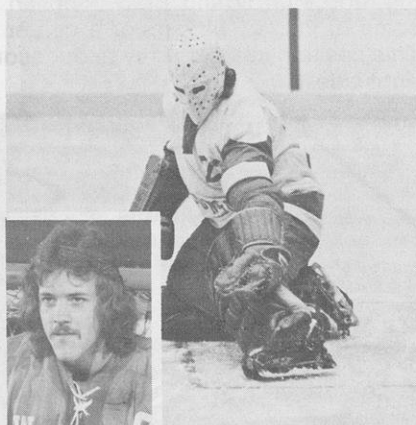

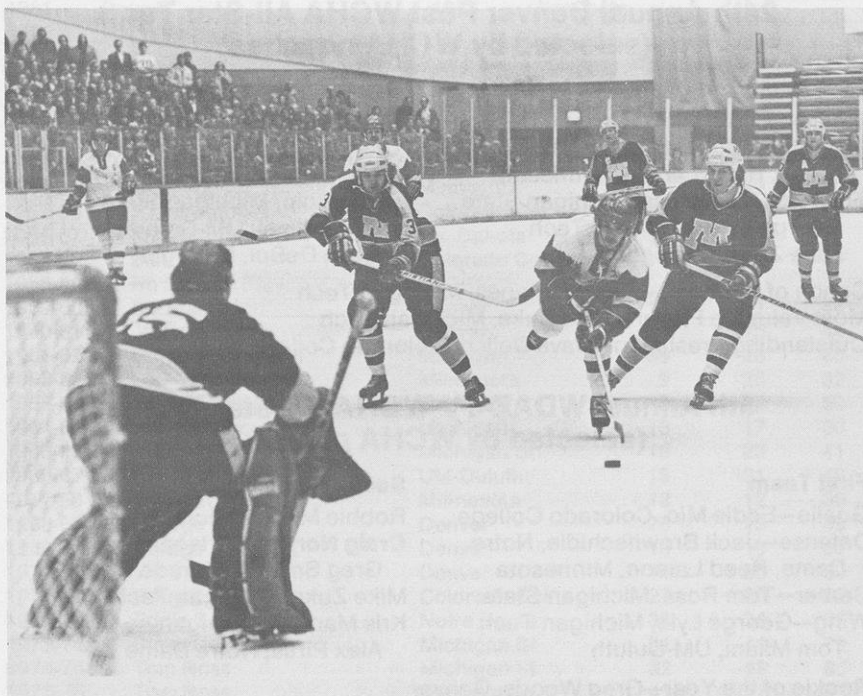
1976-77 Outlook:
