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REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN

Racine, Wisconsin

Held in Main Conference Room of Wingspread Conference Center, Racine

Friday, September 15, 1967, 10:00 A.M.

President Greenquist presiding

The convening of the meeting was deferred from 9:00 A. M. to 10:00 A.M., due to a tour by the Regents of the site of the University of Wisconsin - Parkside.

PRESENT: Regents DeBardeleben, Friedrick, Gelatt, Greenquist, Kahl, Nellen,

Pasch, Renk, and Ziegler.

ABSENT: Regent Werner.

There being no objection, President Greenquist ordered that the minutes of the Regular Meeting of the Board held on July 7, 1967, stand approved as sent out to the Regents.

REPORTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY.

In presenting the list of Gifts, Grants, and U.S. Government Contracts, (copy filed with the papers of this meeting), President Harrington referred to

Page 91. of the list, showing the totals received to date for this year as compared with the approximate date of the previous year. He pointed out that the large total included in this list was due to the fact that a meeting of the Regents had not been held in August. He called attention to the supplemental grant, on page 92. of the list, of \$800,000 from the Ford Foundation to establish a Center for Development in the College of Letters and Science. In the summary on page 91. of the list, he called attention to the large sum received for research, which depended heavily for funds from the federal government. He pointed out that some of the larger federal grants were from prior year federal appropriations, and suggested that it could not be assumed that the grants from the federal government would be maintained at that level.

Upon motion by Regent Pasch, seconded by Regent Nellen, it was VOTED, That the gifts and grants listed in the statement of Gifts, Grants, and U.S. Government Contracts, presented at this meeting (copy filed with the papers of this meeting), be accepted and the appropriate officers of the University be authorized to sign the agreements; and that the Federal contracts listed therein be approved, ratified and confirmed.

Vice President Clodius presented the recommendations relating to the Report of Personnel Actions by the President of the University and relating to the Report of Non-Personnel Actions By Administrative Officers And Of Informational Items Reported for the Regent Record.

Upon motion by Regent DeBardeleben, seconded by Regent Friedrick, it was Voted:

- 1. That the approximately 7,000 actions by the President of the University since the last meeting of the Regents, relating to appointments, resignations, leaves of absence, and changes of status of faculty personnel with rank less than that of Associate Professor and other non-classified civil service personnel with salaries at the annual rate of \$12,500 or less, on file with the Central Business Office and the Secretary of the Faculty; and to non-resident tuition remissions, be approved, ratified, and confirmed.
- 2. That the Report of Non-Personnel Actions By Administrative Officers To The Board Of Regents And Informational Items Reported For The Regent Record (EXHIBIT B attached) be received for the record; and that actions included in the report be approved, ratified, and confirmed.

President Harrington presented the following recommendation:

That the preliminary plans and specifications be approved and authority be granted to prepare final plans and specifications for the Madison Communication Arts Building at a project cost of \$9,625,000.

President Harrington asked Vice Chancellor Atwell to explain the above recommendation. President Harrington pointed out that direction of the work relating to the development of facilities had been shifted from Vice President Engman to Director Wallace Lemon.

Vice Chancellor Atwell referred to the outline specifications and budget estimates for the Communication Arts Building, on the Madison Campus, copies of which had been distributed to the Regents, showing a total estimated cost of \$9,625,000. He explained the facilities to be included in this project, which would be located in the 800 block on the south side of University Avenue, which is one of the four blocks of the University Avenue Urban Renewal Project. He explained that inclusion of this project in the University Avenue Urban Renewal Project would result in a saving to the University of from \$300,000 to \$400,000 in the cost of the land. He explained that, of the total cost, \$2,500,000 was estimated to come from gifts and grants, and \$7,125,000 would be financed from state funds.

University Architect Sites showed a plot plan of the project; explained the proposal to close North Murray Street north of West Johnson Street; and explained the proposal to construct a pedestrian bridge across University Avenue in this area. He showed and explained floor plans and a model of the project.

Regent DeBardeleben moved approval of the above recommendation, the motion was seconded by Regent Kahl, and it was voted.

President Harrington presented the following recommendation:

That the preliminary plans and specifications be approved and authority be granted to prepare final plans and specifications for the Madison academic facility to be located at 600 North Park Street at a revised project cost of \$8,357,974 to be provided by \$5,773,674 from State Building Funds, \$1,840,000 from gifts and grants, and \$744,300 from self-amortizing funds, and that authority be granted for the University administration to request from the State Building Commission additional state funds in the amount of \$854,674.

Vice Chancellor Atwell explained that this project was an academic complex to be built at 600 North Park Street, across from the Memorial Union Building; and that it would include space for an undergraduate library, facilities for the Library School, offices and instructional space for the departments of

English and Philosophy, and parking space in the building, costing an estimated \$744,300, which would be amortized from parking fees.

University Architect Sites recalled that this project had previously been presented to the Regents at the concept stage. He showed and explained the location of the project on a plot plan, and explained the floor plans and a model of the project. He noted that the exterior of the building would be primarily brick with stone and brick trim. He referred to the outline specifications and the estimated budget for this project, copies of which had been distributed to the Regents, and noted that the estimated cost was \$854,674 above the previous budget estimate.

Regent DeBardeleben inquired whether this proposal, relating to the 600 North Park Street facility, had been presented to the State Building Commission on September 11. Vice Chancellor Atwell replied in the affirmative, explaining that consideration by the State Building Commission had been deferred for a month in order to permit the Bureau of Engineering to further study the parking facilities aspect of this project. Regent DeBardeleben inquired as to the reaction of the State Building Commission to the estimated increase in the cost of the project; and Vice Chancellor Atwell explained that the State Building Commission had not acted on the increased cost estimate, but that it had been approved by the Bureau of Engineering. Regent Gelatt inquired as to what plans had been made for the use of space in Bascom Hall to be vacated by the departments to be moved into the 600 North Park Street facility. Vice Chancellor Atwell explained that the Space and Remodeling Committee had not decided how to allocate the space in Bascom Hall, but that it probably would be used for some of the work of the humanities. Renk inquired whether this project eliminated some of the College of Engineering buildings. Mr. Sites replied in the negative, explaining that it would involve the razing of several old buildings, which had formerly been used by the College of Engineering, but which were now being used for other purposes. Regent DeBardeleben inquired whether the State Building Commission on September 11 had approved going ahead with the Communication Arts Building; and Vice Chancellor Atwell replied in the affirmative.

Regent Pasch moved approval of the above recommendation, the motion was seconded by Regent Nellen, and it was voted.

Vice Chancellor Atwell asked Dean Pound to present the following recommendation, since the Hancock Experiment Station is under the jurisdiction of the Madison Campus:

That the construction of facilities be approved at the Hancock Experiment Station to consist of an office-laboratory-conference building and a residence at an estimated project cost of \$131,000 to be financed by \$88,250 Hill Farm Receipts and \$42,750 gift funds.

Dean Pound explained that the Hancock Experiment Station, located in the central sands area of the state, consisted of 285 acres, with the entire physical plant consisting of the old farmstead, and without office facilities, storage facilities, or research accommodations. He recalled that, two decades ago, this was a depressed, declining agricultural section of the state; and that due to research at the Hancock Experiment Station, it has been transformed into one of the largest and most productive agricultural segments of the state to be found anywhere, particularly in the field of vegetable production and processing. He explained that the local people were very interested in this project, and that six counties in the sand area proposed to appropriate \$32,000 toward this project, with an additional \$28,000 being pledged by local growers and individuals, with the understanding that the University would provide matching funds. Dean Pound explained that the total cost of the project, including an amount of \$17,250 for equipment, would be \$148,250. He explained that the funds pledged by the counties and the local growers and individuals were a minimum.

Regent DeBardeleben suggested that the Regents be provided with a report, at some future meeting, as to the disposition to date of the receipts from the sale of the University Hill Farms.

Regent Ziegler moved approval of the above recommendation, the motion was seconded by Regent Renk, and it was voted.

President Harrington presented the following recommendation, and asked Chancellor Klotsche to explain it:

That the concept be approved of the UWM Union Addition, prepared in accordance with the authorization granted at the January 1967 meeting of the Board of Regents.

Chancellor Klotsche explained that this presentation was at the concept stage in the planning, noting that the Regents had authorized the preparation of the preliminary plans and specifications at the Regent meeting on January 13, 1967. He recalled that, when the first addition to the UW-M Union was finished in 1963, it was recognized at that time that the facility would be inadequate for the future growth of the institution. He estimated that, when this proposed addition is completed in 1970, the enrollment at UW-M will be about 20,000 students. He reported that this addition to the UW-M Union was estimated to cost about \$6-1/2 million, plus the cost of providing the parking facilities in the building. He noted that planning for major facilities at UW-M contemplated including parking facilities in them, as is true of the proposed dormitories and the Science Complex. Somewhat less than 500 parking spaces are planned for the UW-M Union, he reported.

Regent DeBardeleben inquired whether the long delay, since this project was first considered by the Regents, was due to the fact that the facility was not needed. Chancellor Klotsche replied in the negative, explaining that the delay was the result of many factors, including the desire to include parking in the facility and problems related to the method of financing the project. Regent DeBardeleben inquired as to how this project would be financed; and Chancellor Klotsche explained that the Student Union portion would be financed by the segregated student fee, and the parking facilities by parking revenue.

Director of Planning and Development, William Murphy, showed and explained the plot plan, floor plans, and a model of this project. He explained that this project included, in addition to the additional facilities, some remodeling in the existing structure. He showed architectural elevations of the proposed addition, which he explained were not in architectural detail, but merely for the purpose of showing the masses of the structure. Referring to the outline specifications and budget estimate of this project, Mr. Murphy noted that the total project cost was estimated at \$8,146,517, which included parking facilities and utility extensions, as well as the cost of the major structure.

Regent Friedrick moved approval of the above recommendation, the motion was seconded by Regent DeBardeleben, and it was voted.

President Harrington asked Vice President Engman to report on the status of the Marshfield Dormitory proposal. Vice President Engman reported that some investigations were being made as to whether there were any federal assistance funds that could be made available to St. Joseph's Hospital at Marshfield to provide such a dormitory for nurses. He also reported that further consideration of this project was being given by the Wood County Board and the Marshfield City Council. Chancellor Adolfson reported that the Joint City-County Building Committee (Marshfield and Wood County) had been working on this proposal, and that he expected that they would have a recommendation so that a recommendation could be made to the Regents at the October meeting. Regent DeBardeleben inquired as to the direction of the thinking of the Joint City-County Building Committee regarding this project. Chancellor Adolfson thought consideration was being given to recommending that a 120 bed dormitory be constructed to be financed through the State Building Commission, with the funds to be amortized over a thirty year period. Regent DeBardeleben inquired whether this would lead to the construction of dormitories at other University Centers; and Chancellor Adolfson replied in the negative, stating that this was a special situation.

President Harrington presented the following recommendation, and asked that Director Wallace Lemon explain it:

That The Regents of the University of Wisconsin concur in approval by The Coordinating Committee for Higher Education of "Proposal for an Interstate Agreement Between Wisconsin and Michigan to Develop Higher Educational Opportunities in the North", as set forth in CCHE #30, 1967, Working Paper, April, 1967, (copy filed with the papers of this meeting).

Director Lemon explained that the 1965 Legislature had enacted legislation authorizing the Coordinating Committee, subject to the approval of the Joint Committee on Finance of the Legislature, to enter into interstate

agreements to improve educational opportunities in Wisconsin and adjacent areas of other states. He reported that, with the cooperation of the Director of the Marinette University Center and of the staff of the Coordinating Committee for Higher Education, agreements had been worked out involving the Marinette University Center, the Bay de Noc College at Escanaba, Michigan, and the Gogebic College in Ironwood, Michigan. He explained that, under these agreements, the Marinette University Center would regard residents of Menomonee County, Michigan as in-state students for tuition and admission purposes, and the Bay de Noc Community College in Escanaba, Michigan would regard residents of Marinette County, Wisconsin as in-state students for tuition and admission purposes, and the Gogebic Community College in Ironwood, Michigan would regard residents of Iron County, Wisconsin as in-state students for tuition and admission purposes. He reported that there currently are about 71 students from Wisconsin attending these two Michigan institutions and about 67 students from Michigan attending the Marinette Center. He explained that the net fiscal effect of these agreements would be to reduce the amount of student fee income for Wisconsin by about \$41,000 and by about the same amount for Michigan.

Regent DeBardeleben moved approval of the above recommendation, the motion was seconded by Regent Gelatt, and it was voted.

President Harrington announced that, because of need to hold Regent committee meetings during this morning, there would not be discussion at this time of the next item on the agenda, relating to a report on consequences of the 1967-68 operating budget on the University, but that Vice President Clodius would distribute to the Regents at this time copies of a "Special Budget Report to the Regents", (EXHIBIT B attached), which would be brought up for discussion by the Regents in the afternoon session of this meeting.

President Greenquist reported on meetings of the Coordinating Committee for Higher Education and of the Plans and Policies Subcommittee of the Coordinating Committee, which had been held since the last meeting of the Regents. He reported that, in addition to matters relating to the State Universities and the Vocational, Technical and Adult Schools, matters considered included the selection of eight advisory committees and of various items relating to pending legislation. Some of the latter included interstate compacts, educational television, and tuition grants. He explained that the pending legislation on tuition grants would increase the aid to students in private schools. He stated that he had raised the question of what the cost of these tuition grants would be to the state; and indicated that further consideration of this item would be taken up by the Plans and Policies Subcommittee on September 23. He reported that the pending legislation providing that the site of the Green Bay Campus be changed was opposed by the Coordinating Committee. He reported that Bill 901,A, which would provide free tuition for freshmen and sophomores in the University and the State Universities

was discussed, but that the Coordinating Committee had deferred making a recommendation, pending further study by the Coordinating Committee staff. President Greenquist reported that the Plans and Policies Subcommittee had informally discussed the proposed bill by Assemblyman Froelich, which would provide legislative control over salaries at educational institutions, except for the classified civil service. He reported that he had made a motion opposing any legislation making such salaries subject to control by the Legislature or a legislative committee. He stated that the Plans and Policies Subcommittee had approved that recommendation, which would be presented at the September 28 meeting of the Coordinating Committee.

Regarding Bill No. 901, A, to provide free tuition for freshmen and sophomores, Regent Ziegler inquired whether the administration, in appearing at the legislative hearing on that bill, had implied that this Board backed that bill. Regent DeBardeleben explained that, in 1961, this Board had unanimously gone on record in favor of reducing tuition, with the thought of eventually returning to the concept of free higher education. He stated that the Coordinating Committee for Higher Education, by a divided vote, had also supported a gradual reduction and a return to the concept of free tuition. Regent Ziegler stated that this current Board was not unanimously in favor of free tuition. Regent DeBardeleben stated that the Coordinating Committee had studied this matter at great depth for a long time, and that he believed that the administration had no alternative but to state that position. Regent Nellen stated that, if this bill progresses further, this Board will have to reexamine its position. President Harrington explained that Vice President George Field had appeared at the legislative hearing on this bill, and, faced with the problem of a hearing being called at a time when there was no Regent meeting, he presented the affirmative position, but took care to state that this current Board had not taken a position on it, although he did point out the past position of the Regents. President Harrington suggested that this bill, coming from minority members of the Senate, was not likely to move: rapidly toward passage at this time. Regent Renk stated that, as of today, he was not in favor of reducing or eliminating tuition, and consequently believed that further consideration should be given to this matter by the Regents before any further appearances are made on the bill. President Harrington stated that the official position of this present Board is that tuition should not be more than 20% of the cost of education of an in-state student. He noted that an earlier Board, in discussing the long range future of the University, had taken the same position, but had said that tuition should be reduced and eventually eliminated, which was the position approved by the Coordinating Committee. He also noted that some members of this present Board had suggested an increase in tuition above the 20% factor. Regent Nellen suggested that a discussion of the philosophy of no tuition fee at all might be placed on the agenda for a future meeting. Recalling that he was on the Board in 1961, Regent Gelatt recalled that the matter of reducing tuition was considered in connection with the report of The Special Regent Committee on The Future of The University, of which Regent Watson was Chairman. He recalled that a number of votes were taken on that question, which were not always uananimous, although the final vote was.

President Harrington stated that he wanted to put his emphasis on the "not more than 20%" factor, because there is a very large debate in this country on this question. He referred to proposals that the students should pay the full cost of instruction, and that, if necessary, the students should borrow the funds to pay the full cost and pay it back over their working lifetimes. He explained

that this proposal, supported by some private colleges in the East, was not supported by all private colleges and was uniformly opposed by public institutions and the various associations, such as the National Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges, the Association of State Universities, and the National Association of Junior Colleges, which cover somewhat over a million students. President Harrington reported that the public institutions were asked to draw up a document on the plight of the public schools with respect to financing. As a result of that request, he reported, Professors William H. Young and Robert Taylor had prepared a document to show the difficulties that public institutions have fallen into, entitled "An Opportunity For a Major American Advance Through Higher Education", (copies of which had been sent to each Regent, and a copy of which is on file with the papers of this meeting). He explained that this document suggested that perhaps the federal government should provide funds to hold down tuition. He noted that this was not a document approved by the Regents, but that a national committee on which he was serving had been asked to prepare it. President Harrington suggested that the tuition question might be an appropriate item for discussion by Regent Gelatt's Special Regent Committee on The Future of The University of Wisconsin.

In connection with the report on legislative matters, President Greenquist reported that he had appeared before the Joint Study Committee on Civil Service, which was redrafting the state civil service laws. He explained that the proposed legislation was very broad and would place all of the professors and the academic staffs, as well as the administrative staff, under the classified civil service. He reported that at the hearing he had opposed the bill in principle, on the grounds that it would violate the entire philosophy and background of the academic world. He explained that he and Vice President Field had recommended amendments to the proposed legislation to eliminate the academic staff and the administration from the classified service. Vice President Field explained that the appearances before the Joint Study Committee on Civil Service had been for the purpose of the Committee obtaining information; and that that committee still had to decide whether it would introduce a bill. If the bill is introduced, he reported, it would be referred for additional hearings and the Regents would have an opportunity to see the final draft of the bill before appearances were made on it.

President Harrington stated that he would assume that the Regents would support the kind of appearance that President Greenquist had made on this proposed legislation. Upon motion by Regent DeBardeleben, seconded by Regent Nellen, it was VOTED, that the position of President Greenquist. taken before the Joint Study Committee on Civil Service, be supported by this Board.

Regent DeBardeleben stated there was another matter relating to outside controls and influence on the University. He referred to a report sent to the Regents by Vice President Cafferty covering reports from the Legislative Audit Bureau for 1966-67, including a recommendation for presudit of the University Trust

Funds. He stated that he assumed that that recommendation was not now being carried out; and Vice President Cafferty indicated that that was correct, and that it was assumed that the previous position of the Regents in this matter still prevailed. Regent DeBardeleben stated that he believed it was the sense of the Regents that they did not want to change the present procedure of not preauditing Trust Funds.

The meeting recessed at 11:27 A.M. for committee meetings.

The meeting reconvened at 1:55 P.M., September 15, 1967, Main Conference Room, Wingspread Conference Center, Racine, with President Greenquist presiding.

PRESENT: Regents DeBardeleben, Friedrick, Gelatt, Greenquist, Kahl, Nellen,

Pasch, Renk, and Ziegler.

ABSENT: Regent Werner.

The meeting continued with further consideration of the Reports and Recommendations of the President of the University.

President Harrington asked Dean Luberg to report on the research seminars with executives and leaders in the professions, which had been held during the summer. Dean Luberg reported on the series of seminars which had been held on the Madison Campus during the summer, which were held to explore the possibilities for interpreting fundamental research for executives and people in the professions. He reported that the research areas covered included enzymes. genetics, meteorology, engineering, computer science, and medical engineering. He pointed out that, in the last twenty years, as much research has been done as was done in all prior recorded history. Regents Pasch and Renk, who had attended several of the seminars, reported that the people attending were very interested in the presentations and undoubtedly went away with a much better understanding of the extent of the research activities of the University. President Harrington noted that he had attended one of the seminars and was well impressed with it. He pointed out that such seminars made it possible for specialists in the various research areas to be understood by people who were not trained in their specialties. He thought the seminars were successful on a trial basis, and suggested that perhaps they should be tried on a larger scale.

At the request of President Harrington, Director Wallace Lemon distributed to the Regents a copy of a proposed statement by the University of Wisconsin Board of Regents relating to the proposal of expanding medical education in the Milwaukee area. President Harrington stated that the question of medical education in Milwaukee was a very complicated one, which the Regents had previously discussed. He recalled that the Regents, in December 1965, had directed the University administration to explore the problem of a University of Wisconsin - Milwaukee medical school. He stated that the position of the Regents in this matter was very clear. Noting that the Madison Medical School takes in about 180 freshmen and turns out about 100 doctors a year, and that Marquette Medical School also turns out about 100 doctors a year, he stated that it was obvious that in the future more doctors will be needed. He recalled that the Regents had felt that plans should be made for a third medical school in the state, and that UW-M was the obvious place for one. He recalled that Dr. Coye of the Madison Medical School faculty had been named to head a study regarding the establishment of a Medical School at UW-M; and that Director Lemon had also been assigned to work on this problem. President Harrington pointed out that it became evident that this was a problem of concern to a great many people, and that Governor Knowles had appointed a Task Force on Medical Education, headed by Mr. Donald Slichter, to study this problem. He reported that the Task Force on Medical Education had reached the point where it needed specific proposals, and had received a specific proposal from the Milwaukee County group. He reported that the committee had requested information as to the position of the University of Wisconsin in this matter. He stated that it was, therefore, imperative that the Regents make some expression in this regard; and he distributed copies of a proposed statement by the Regents (EXHIBIT C attached), which he felt was in line with the position previously expressed by the Regents. He read the statement distributed. He also distributed copies of a letter addressed to the Chairman of the Governor's Task Force on Medical Education from the Lutheran Men of America of Wisconsin regarding this subject (EXHIBIT D attached). President Harrington stated that the University of Wisconsin was very seriously interested in the medical question posed in Milwaukee, and felt that something should be done about it. He pointed out that the resources of the Madison Medical School would be used to assist in the development of a Medical School at UW-M.

Regent DeBardeleben inquired whether there was any reason, assuming that the Legislature would provide the additional funds, why this program could not be initiated in 1968 instead of 1969. Director Lemon replied that it would depend on the ability of the University to get staff and facilities, which would be difficult to do. Regent Nellen inquired whether the reference to a beginning would refer to a curriculum in medicine or a curriculum in pre-medicine. He stated that this was a very ambitious plan, and expressed the opinion that he did not see how it would be feasible to have a medical school start from "scratch" within a period of less than four or five years. He stated that we should not mislead anyone to believe that four years after the idea is conceived that we are going to have a graduating class in medicine. Director Lemon agreed that the question of how fast this proposal could move forward needed further examination. He expressed the opinion that the enrollments for the time being in the Medical School at Madison could be increased rather fast for the first and second year students, with the problem then remaining of making arrangements for the clinical experience for the third and fourth years. He pointed out that with resources available in Madison, particularly in the basic sciences, expansion could be undertaken there for a period of some time until it could be phased into the Milwaukee operation. President Harrington pointed out that we would not be starting out from "scratch" in developing a Medical School at UW-M, since there is some work at Milwaukee in the pre-mediarea, which has been built up in the past twelve years. He noted that the strength in the medical area at Madison would be available to support the development at Milwaukee, but agreed that it would not be an easy job.

Regent Nellen agreed with what had been said with respect to the position of the Regents in regard to a Medical School at UW-M. He stated that the Regents had always considered that this would be a third medical school in the state and in no way would replace or be competitive with Marquette Medical School. He stated that the Regents, as reasonable people, would realize that it is necessary and imperative to the medical needs of this state that Marquette continue to operate a Medical School. He pointed out that they have done a wonderful job and have graduated 100 students a year without public funds, and should be encouraged to continue to do that. He believed that a third medical school would be able to meet the present and future expanded needs in the field of medicine in Wisconsin. He noted that newspaper articles had indicated that the Marquette Medical School needs financial aid, and he referred to a reference that it needed \$1-1/3 million at this time. He suggested that that was a rather insignificant amount of money to keep a medical school in operation. Regardless of the legality of whether the state would contribute to a private school, he expressed the opinion that it certainly would be money well-spent to keep the school in operation. However, he expressed the opinion that, if state funds could be provided to aid the Marquette Medical School, it should not be funneled through the University of Wisconsin, because it would not be feasible to have a medical school with a dual administration. He stated that he wanted to emphasize that this plan was to provide medical training in addition to that provided by the Marquette Medical School, which he hoped would continue to operate.

Regent Gelatt recalled that, in 1965, when the Regents requested an investigation of the feasibility of establishing a Medical School at UW-M, he felt that the demands for medical personnel were such that about 300 doctors a year should be graduated in the state, on the basis of figures that had been furnished by Acing Dean Crow and subsequently by Dean Eichman of the University of Wisconsin Medical School. He stated that to him that implied more than two medical schools in the state. He expressed the opinion that, if medical training is to be expanded in Milwaukee with state tax money, it should be a UW-M Medical School. He stated that he joined with Regent Nellen, in a strong, fervent wish that the Marquette Medical School continue at its present level. He did not believe that it was necessarily essential to have state money to maintain it. Regent Gelatt stated that he favored the proposed statement presented by President Harrington, and moved its approval. The motion was seconded by Regent Renk.

Regent Ziegler suggested that, in line with the discussion, and in order to set the record straight, the proposed statement might be amended by inserting "as a third such school in the state" after "University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee" (in the first line on page 2. of EXHIBIT C attached). As an alternative, he suggested the possibility of inserting in the statement the words "we urge the continuation of the Marquette Medical School at its present level". He did not believe the statement, as presented, met the issue head-on as far as the Marquette Medical School was concerned. Noting that the Marquette Medical School has performed a great service for the people of the state, he stated that throwing that student body on the tax roll would have quite an impact on our already high taxes. He stated that he wanted to complement the Marquette Medical School on what it has done and urged its continuation, in order to help meet the medical needs in this state.

Regent DeBardeleben expressed the opinion that the words "necessary to meet the expansion goals", on the second page of EXHIBIT C attached, made it clear that it is not our intention to supplant or take the place of any existing medical resources which exist in this state, whether private or public, but rather to meet the need for increased medical training. He expressed the opinion that the question of the continuance of the Marquette Medical School was not the business of this Board, and that it was not the business of this Board to say whether state money should be used for such a private enterprise. He was of the opinion that, by saying that we will meet the expansion goals, it is clearly indicated that the continuance of the Marquette Medical School is contemplated. However, he stated that he could not subscribe to the statement that it was imperative to the people of the state to the extent that tax money should be used that Marquette Medical School should continue.

Regent Friedrick pointed out that there certainly was a great deal of interest, not only in Milwaukee, but also in the southeastern part of the state, in the establishment of a medical center to serve the people in the Milwaukee, Racine, Kenosha, and Waukesha areas. He suggested that the establishment of a medical center in which the University of Wisconsin, both Madison and Milwaukee, as well as Marquette, could cooperate would certainly be a means of accelerating the establishment of a medical center. Noting that the Marquette Medical School has been in the field of medical education for many years, he stated that, at present, he had no reason to fear that it would not continue, although it has had difficulties. He pointed out the difficulty of integrating public and private institutions; and posed questions as to which hospitals would be used for clinical work in connection with such a medical center. He pointed out that Marquette Medical School has utilized the facilities of both the Milwaukee County Hospital and of the Veterans Administration Hospital. He recommended doing everything possible to accelerate the establishment of a Medical School at UW-M, although he recognized that there were problems that would have to be worked out with respect to a Milwaukee area medical center.

Regent Pasch stated that it went without saying that the history of the Marquette Medical School has been well written, and that the people who understand and appreciate it will not let it be discontinued. Agreeing that the University should establish a Medical School at UW-M, and noting that the University has plans to expand the Medical School at Madison, he inquired whether the University would have staff to help develop the Medical School at UW-M. Regent Renk inquired whether it would be better economically for the University to have two medical schools or merely increase the size of the one in Madison to turn out about 200 graduates. Director Lemon explained that the Governor's Task Force on Medical Education had adopted goals which contemplated expansion at Madison from 100 to 125 immediately and in Milwaukee from 100 to 150 as soon as possible, with further expansion in Madison from 125 to 150 between 1975 and 1985, and in Milwaukee from 150 to 200 by 1985. He pointed out that the Task Force, without saying who should do it, arrived at this recommendation on the basis of an analysis of the manpower needs and taking into consideration the availability of clinical resources and the feeling that the Milwaukee community has a much larger population base, which seemed to indicate it to be the area wherein the development of the goal of 200 medical graduates could more logically take place. Pointing out that the Madison Medical School has had a long history of serving the state, as the Marquette Medical School also has had, President Harrington emphasized that the Madison Medical School has a

very substantial research development, and that this research, for example in the cancer field, has been of very great benefit for the entire country. He expressed the opinion that asking the Madison Medical School to take over the entire medical education needs of the state would be very damaging to the Madison Medical School and its research function. He stated that it would be impossible for the Madison Medical School to expand to the level of 300 graduates, and that it would be damaging to the school.

Regent Pasch inquired as to the need to wait eight years to increase the number of graduates at the Madison Medical School from 100 to 150. Director Lemon explained that it was partly due to the problem of moving the Medical School at Madison to a new site and partly was geared to the availability of facilities. Noting that Dean Eichman had recommended expanding the Madison Medical School to 125 graduates, Regent Nellen pointed out that it would require a larger plant than we have at present. He noted that the expansion of the Madison Medical School plant was only at the concept stage at the present time. He inquired whether it would be correct to state that, if we had to accept a priority for medical facilities, we / would give first priority to expansion at Madison to reach the goal of 125 graduates before starting another medical school. President Harrington stated that it was difficult to answer such a question. President Harrington pointed out the problem of having to operate in a pattern established by other people making statewide decisions. He stated that he assumed that the Madison Medical School enrollment would be increased, but that, at the same time, the needs in Milwaukee for medical training would remain.

The question was put on the motion to approve the statement by The University of Wisconsin Board of Regents, relating to the medical education needs of the state (EXHIBIT C attached), and it was voted.

The meeting recessed at 2:45 P.M. for a public hearing.

A public hearing was held at 2:45 P.M., on Friday, September 15, 1967, in the Main Conference Room, The Johnson Foundation Wingspread Conference Center, Racine, Wisconsin, on the Proposed Order of The Regents of the University of Wisconsin Amending Rules (EXHIBIT E attached), at which no appearances were made in favor of, or in opposition to, adoption of the Proposed Order.

The meeting reconvened at 2:46 P.M., on Friday, September 15, 1967, Main Conference Room, The Johnson Foundation Wingspread Conference Center, Racine, with President Greenquist presiding.

Immediately prior to the reconvening of this meeting, a public hearing, as required by statute, had been held on the Proposed Order of The Regents of the University of Wisconsin Amending Rules (EXHIBIT E attached).

Upon motion by Regent DeBardeleben, seconded by Regent Pasch, it was VOTED, That the Order of The Regents of the University of Wisconsin Amending Rules (EXHIBIT E attached), which revises Section UW 1.07(12) of the Wisconsin Administrative Code, be adopted.

The meeting recessed at 2:48 P.M., for a meeting of the Special Regent Committee on The University of Wisconsin of The Future.

The meeting reconvened at 3:51 P.M., with President Greenquist presiding

Regents DeBardeleben, Friedrick, Gelatt, Greenquist, Kahl, Nellen, PRESENT:

Pasch, Renk and Ziegler.

ABSENT: Regent Werner.

President Greenquist asked Vice President Clodius to report briefly on the affect on the University of the 1967-68 operating budget.

Vice President Clodius referred to a "Special Budget Report to The Regents", copies of which had been distributed to the Regents during the morning session of this meeting (copy attached as EXHIBIT B).

Vice President Clodius stated that the essence of this report was the erosion of the University of Wisconsin. He explained the chart, which followed the first page of the report (EXHIBIT B attached), and which indicated the reductions which had been made in the University of Wisconsin 1967-69 budget requests from the amounts that had been originally approved by the Regents. He noted that details of these reductions were spelled out in Sections I. A. through D. of the report. Vice President Clodius then pointed out the highlights of the balance of the report, and stated that there was not much joy to be found in this analysis.

Regent Gelatt inquired whether there was any prospect of any favorable action on the request by the Regents, through the Coordinating Committee for Higher Education, for improvement in the retirement benefits for the University faculty. Vice President Clodius reported that a meeting of the Coordinating Committee for Higher Education would be held the following week, and stated that he would anticipate that the Coordinating Committee would recommend to the Legislature that the request for improvement in retirement benefits for the University faculty be approved.

Regent DeBardeleben inquired whether President Harrington had any suggestions as to how to reduce the harm to the University as indicated in this report. President Harrington stated that there would not be much opportunity in the Fall session of the Legislature to obtain approval of major changes in the budget appropriations. However, he stated that a suggested program could be presented for discussion at the next meeting of the Regents covering items on which efforts might be made in the Fall session of the Legislature.

President Greenquist presented the Report of the Executive Committee. (EXHIBIT F attached).

Upon motion by Regent DeBardeleben, seconded by Regent Kahl, it was VOTED, That the resolutions adopted by the Executive Committee since the July 7, 1967 regular meeting of the Board, as set forth in EXHIBIT F attached, be included in the record as official actions of the Executive Committee.

Regent Pasch presented the Report of the Educational Committee.

Upon motion by Regent Pasch, seconded by Regent Friedrick, it was VOTED, That the U. W. Athletic Board Statement of Policy Relative To Employment of Coaches And Specialists Employed By The U.W. Division Of Intercollegiate Athletics (EXHIBIT G attached) be approved in principle; and that, subject to the approvals required under said statement of policy, the Director of Intercollegiate Athletics be authorized to sign contracts covering such employment.



In approving the 1967-68 annual budget at its July meeting, the Board of Regents asked the administration to report on the extent to which the budget level of operation approved for 1967-68

- I. Would result in further quality deficits
- II. Would be affected by inflationary trends
- III. Would affect faculty salary levels relative to other institutions.


These questions must be answered within the broader context of the Regents' 1967-69 biennial budget request and its proposed quality level of operation relative to the actual biennial and annual budget levels approved by the Legislature.

I. Quality Deficits

The chart on the following page (la) indicates the extent of reductions made in the Regents' biennial budget request by the CCHE, the Governor's office, and the Legislature. The shaded area atop each of the three columns to the right of the Regents' request column represents a reduction in the Regent-recommended quality operating level for 1967-69. The final budget authorized by the Legislature (right column) was \$50,000,000 less than recommended by the Regents. Reductions and shifts were made in the following areas:

Those reductions which will have a particularly significant impact on quality levels of operation include:

(1) Complete Elimination of Quality Control Item

\$11,656,000

The CCHE halved and the Governor eliminated this key remedial item. A decade of periodic underfunding of enrollments and absence of improvement funds had eroded our base. The key indicators of this problem were increasing student/faculty ratios and increased use of teaching assistants at Undergraduate level.

The result of this reduction will simply and sadly be the continuance of this deficit from year to year. Hopefully, the new enrollment money methodology will check the enrollment-related deficit at its present level. However, in the only retroactive application of this methodology, underenrollment in 1966-67 required us to lapse \$1.5 million from the 1966-67 base upon which the biennial budget was built.

The student/faculty ratio at the time we prepared our biennial budget request was 23 to 1. The utilization of teaching assistants in undergraduate programs on our Madison campus had risen to 35%. Comparable figures for 1967-68 must await completion of the budget salary analysis and reporting of fall enrollments. There is little chance that the situation will improve; indeed, there is every indication that it will worsen.

(2) Other Work Load Items

An \$854,000 increase in the forced savings requirement will serve to offset apparent gains elsewhere. The deferral of \$765,000 for the State's share of new computing equipment effectively stalls our ability to attract the major portion of support from the Federal government and thus delays necessary additions to our instructional and scientific computing capability in face of demands which will soon saturate existing equipment.

(3) Complete Elimination of Library Improvements on All Campuses

This cut was particularly damaging. The Joint Finance Committee, in reviewing our request, concluded that enrollment-related library funds "seemed sufficient," and eliminated \$2.6 million for library improvements.

Among the essential improvements was a modest increase in Center System holdings to bring each Center to just under one-half the minimum recognized standard for two-year institutions. It should be noted that the Regents specifically increased the administration's initial recommendation in this area.

Our biennial budget request noted that libraries, second only to faculty, are a University's major educational resource and "a key determinant of educational quality." Elimination of the library improvement item will result in serious underfunding for the new undergraduate library on the Madison campus, and development of UWM's new library facility will be impaired.

The budget trailer bill before the fall session of the Legislature provides for partial restoration of the library improvement item. It is our only hope for staving off an erosion of library quality.

(4) Other Program Improvement Reductions

"Program improvements" represent changes necessary for <u>existing</u> programs (a) to keep pace with the changing state of the art and knowledge and (b) to meet the ever-changing and expanding needs of society. Reductions or shifts in this area were sizable, ranging from 72% to 100%.

The 75% reduction in the improved instruction category will have the most significant impact on quality levels. Failure to keep pace in selected areas with changes in the state of the art and knowledge being conveyed to students will limit the scope of the students' educational experience and thus their ability to cope with the complexities of their particular fields. Our students must be aware of the latest developments if they are to use them as a point of departure for still newer and better developments in the years to come. Our educational program must keep abreast of a changing body of knowledge and technology if we are to remain at the forefront of service to society. This often requires investment in new equipment, departure from current modes of instruction, and bold experimentation within the teaching and learning experience. Such advances (indeed, such keep-up) cannot be accomplished with enrollment funds which merely sustain the nature and level of instruction from the prior year.

The Regents' biennial request included \$7.9 million for 1967-68 program improvements. The 1967-68 Regent-approved budget provided \$697,641. This amount, less than 10% of the original request, when broken down in six categories between four of six major units, results in single items of from \$10,450 to \$135,000. Clearly, many existing program areas in critical need of improvement will suffer and with them the overall quality level of education offerings.

(5) New Programs

With the 1967-68 funds provided for new programs, the University will be able to initiate only a few truly new activities. A Center for Public Policy in Madison (\$54,870) and a School of Architecture in Milwaukee(\$15,750) are all that remain in new directional thrust for a University which has traditionally been a leader. Increased reliance on Federal funds and Federal direction is a natural consequence of modest State support for new programs.

The 1967-68 portion of new program allocations shown below clearly indicates a severely limited utilization of University potential:

The \$322,018 amounts to 16/100 of 1% of the total 1967-68 budget or 4/10 of 1% of the State appropriation.

II. Effects of Inflationary Trends

The Governor's continuation of a previous policy of not recommending funds for general price increases will have the effect of decreasing the University's purchasing power by an estimated \$1,000,000 in each year of the 1967-69 biennium. Of the many indices of inflationary trends, two seem particularly applicable to the University of Wisconsin.

First, the Wholesale Price Index during the most recent biennium (1965-67) indicates that the purchasing power of the dollar dropped about 5% in that period. The 1967-69 budget does not provide funds to cover that decrease nor the comparable one expected during the current biennium.

Second, commodity price comparisons compiled by our purchasing department for the past two years indicate that for the more specific supply items purchased by the University, prices have risen 8.9%. Equipment costs have gone up about 11%.

Applying a minimum 5% annual price increase figure for supplies and capital (exclusive of books) against our 1967-68 budget base for these items, yields about \$1,000,000. This illustrates what inflationary trends can "cost" the University in purchasing power each year. The fact that the 1967-69 budget provides no rectification for 1965-67 or provision for 1967-69, except for library books, assures a sizable loss in purchasing power. The CCHE strongly supported the inclusion of funds for price increase adjustments in recommending the U.W. budget to the Governor.

III. Faculty Salary Levels

A full response to the question regarding faculty salary levels relative to other institutions must await receipt of their data. The only comparative data now available relate to merit increase percentages approved by State legislatures for Big 10 public institutions. These appear below prefaced by a profile of the Regents' faculty salary program as it moved through CCHE, the Governor, and Legislature.

These percentages provide some indication of how our faculty salary program fared relative to this limited group. The University of Wisconsin ranks sixth out of nine in 1967-68 and is below the average for all other institutions. This suggests that the CCHE goal of second among Big 10 public institutions will not be attained. We expect that our position relative to others in the top 30 Ph.D. producing institutions will suffer in some categories.

It would appear from these indicators that the assumptions upon which the Regents' faculty salary program was built will be borne out. The Regent-suggested 7% will be nearer the "keep-up" figure for 1967-68 and 1968-69. The AAUP salary report for 1966-67 gives some indication of the trends; it reflected average percentage increases for the four faculty ranks in public institutions at 6.9% (Professors), 6.9% (Associate Professors), 6.7% (Assistant Professors), and 7.2% (Instructors).

We anticipate increasing difficulty in holding our own in faculty competition during the biennium. Our total compensation position continues to be among the poorest due to lower State contribution toward retirement program.

We can report at this time our tentative budget salary averages for 1967-68 relative to 1966-67:

STATEMENT BY THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN BOARD OF REGENTS

University officials were recently asked in a meeting of the Governor's Task Force on Medical Education what the University would propose to meet the manpower goals adopted by the Task Force calling for the expansion in the Milwaukee community of first-year medical student places to 150 as soon as possible, and to 200 places by 1985.

The University Board of Regents has, for some time, been concerned about the need for additional medical education resources in the Milwaukee area. In December, 1965, the Regents directed the University administration to make a study of the feasibility of establishing a Medical School at the University of Wisconsin - Milwaukee.

The study was undertaken under the direction of Dr. Robert Coye and a high-level University committee. The aims adopted for the study were first, to determine the demand and need for medical education, and second, assuming existence of the need, to define the kind of programs to be undertaken and to develop the cost estimates, methods, and procedures for carrying out the programs.

The first part of the study was under way when Governor Knowles appointed his Task Force to review the overall manpower needs of the state. This part of the study was completed and the Task Force has adopted the conclusions of Dr. Coye's study entitled <u>Wisconsin Physician Manpower 1966</u>: <u>Characteristics</u> and Future Needs as representing the minimum needs or goals for Wisconsin.

Now that the study of demands and needs has been completed, the Task Force has adopted as minimum goals the expansion in the Milwaukee community to 150 first-year medical student places as soon as possible, and to 200 places by 1985, and since this will require considerable public funding through the State Legislature, and since the University is the state's instrument for providing medical education services, the University Regents hereby propose, subject to CCHE and Legislative review and approval, that a School of Medicine be established immediately as a part of

the University of Wisconsin - Milwaukee with the mission of providing medical education services necessary to meet the expansion goals identified by the Task Force for the Milwaukee community. Further, the Board of Regents directs the University administration to proceed to develop the necessary plans, procedures, and estimate of costs for implementing a program during the 1969-71 biennium.

In developing these plans and estimates, the University administration should examine the feasibility of utilizing the resources of the University Medical School in Madison so as to provide expanded medical educational opportunities in Milwaukee during the transition period until programs are fully developed at the University of Wisconsin - Milwaukee. The administration should also seek to coordinate the plans with the proposed Milwaukee Medical Center and medical planning generally in southeastern Wisconsin.

We make this proposal in the spirit of wanting to carry out our responsibilities for providing medical education to help the state to better meet its growing medical needs.

Lutheran Men in America of Wisconsin views with concern several aspects of the proposals of the Governor's Task Force on Medical Education as reported by the local newspapers.

Lutheran Men in America of Wisconsin can only speak directly and authoritatively for its own membership, but it has strong reason to believe that its views are shared by a very large portion of the whole citizenry.

The Governor's Task Force on Medical Education is, we believe, a good start, but we are concerned that its views are too restricted and that its proposals are based on thinking of the "too little" and "too late" kind.

We also fear that the Task Force recommendations may not be coordinated with the proposed Milwaukee Medical Center plans.

While we welcome Marquette Medical School's interest in the medical center and as a major force in medical education, we cannot accept domination of the medical eduction in this area by any sectarian medical school regardless of the church controlling it.

Interestingly, the Milwaukee Journal on July 14th, 1967 commented editorially: "the hub of a Medical Center is a strong medical school. The Marquette School of Medicine has tried to be this but lacks the wealth for some of the costly specialized forms of training it would like to provide. As a private institution it cannot rely on tax support from the state".

Obviously neither can county tax money be used to support a religiously connected and religiously dominated medical shool. There is doubt that the public would give wide spread support to such a sectarian venture.

No doubt Marquette Medical School will try to overcome some of its problems by affiliation with the Milwaukee County General Hospital by having the hospital buy and maintain equipment and program, which while nominally hospital projects, are in fact for Marquette Medical School use and under its control. Some subterfuge can, and undoubtedly will, lead to prompt and aggressive legal action to prevent such a course being followed. We feel that we need an aggressive and urgent policy to establish a strong publicly supported non-religious medical school in the Milwaukee area, either in connection with the medical center or elsewhere, to counter balance sectarian domination.

We feel strongly that free exercise of medical practice, as the individual physicians conscience and ethics may dictate, is essential. But the difficulty of achieving it is borne out by The American Medical Association's House of Delegates meeting in Atlantic City in June of this year. During that meeting a new policy on therapeutic abortion was established and in taking action, the House of Delegates commented that it recognized that many of its physician members would oppose therapeutic abortion on moral or religious grounds.

This is not to imply that we either favor or oppose the AMA policy or have any policy on abortion but merely to illustrate the difficulties inherent in medical practice in religiously dominated medical schools and hospitals.

Excellent local hospitals, not affiliated with Marquette Medical School obviously will not get interns or program support. Consequently available equipment and facilities will languish instead of being used as part of the wide area service which Hospital Area Planning Committee and others have been recommending and which would prevent needless duplication of facilities by and at the Medical Center.

Rather than create religious strife and sectarianism, another non-sectarian medical school would broaden the environment to a truly cosmopolitan medical milieu that would produce more doctors and bring medical referrals into this area.

We fear that the Task Force is overwhelmed by the difficulties and cost of the job and is influenced by the University of Wisconsin's desire to first get the medical school in Madison moved and enlarged.

But Wisconsin has lagged far behind its neighbors and in meeting its needs for so long that a more courageous and daring approach is a positive essential. We urge the Task Force to be more aggressive and imaginative in its proposed solutions.

CRDER OF THE REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN AMENDING RULES

Pursuant to authority vested in The Regents of the University of Wisconsin by Section 36.06 Wisconsin Statutes, The Regents of the University of Wisconsin hereby amends rules as follows:

Section UW 1.07(12) of the WISCONSIN ADMINISTRATIVE CODE is amended to read:

UW 1.07(12) Drunkenness or disorderly conduct of any kind is prohibited. The use or possession of intoxicating liquors or fermented malt beverages with an alcoholic content of more than 5% by weight is prohibited on all university property, except in faculty and staff housing, and, at suitable times under decorous conditions, in faculty and staff dining and meeting facilities.

The amendment contained herein shall take effect as provided in section 227.026(1), Wisconsin Statutes.

RESOLUTION OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN RELATING TO THE LEASE AND SUBLEASE OF CERTAIN BUILDING PROJECT SITES, AND THE FINANCING OF SAID PROJECTS BY THE WISCONSIN STATE AGENCIES BUILDING CORPORATION

WHEREAS, The Regents of the University of Wisconsin, a body corporate, created and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Wisconsin (hereinafter called the "Regents"), did, on the 15th day of March, 1958, adopt a resolution designating the Wisconsin State Agencies Building Corporation (hereinafter called the "Corporation") as the organization with which arrangements are to be made from time to time for the financing and construction of University of Wisconsin buildings; and

WHEREAS, the Regents have heretofore entered into Leases and Subleases with the Corporation relating to the Madison Classroom No. 1 Building Project, the Madison Numerical Analysis & Statistics Building Project, the Madison South Lower Campus Building Project, and the Madison Earth and Space Science Complex (Stage I) Building Project (herein collectively called "Projects") and have approved certain Assignments relating to the financing of the Projects by the Corporation; and

WHEREAS, the Regents and the Corporation desire to revoke and rescind said Leases, Subleases and Assignments and to undertake new Leases, Subleases and Assignments with respect to the Projects; and

WHEREAS, there have now been prepared and presented to the Regents revised forms of Leases, Subleases and Assignments relating to the lease of the sites of the Projects to the Corporation for the purpose of the construction thereon by the Corporation of the Projects and the subleasing of the Project sites and the Projects to be constructed thereon by the Regents from the Corporation; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN, AS FOLLOWS:

- l. That the revised forms of Leases between the Regents and the Corporation providing for the lease to the Corporation by the Regents for the term of years and for the rental payments stated therein the premises described therein and constituting the sites of the Projects, as presented to and considered by this Committee, are hereby authorized and approved, and the President or Vice-President, together with the Secretary of the Regents, be and they are hereby authorized and directed, for and on behalf and in the name of the Regents, to execute and deliver said Leases to the Corporation.
- 2. That the revised forms of Subleases between the Corporation and the Regents providing for the sublease to the Regents by the Corporation of the premises and buildings and improvements to be constructed thereon and constituting the respective Projects, as presented to and considered by this Committee, are hereby authorized and approved, and the President or Vice-President, together with the Secretary of the Regents, be and they hereby are authorized and directed, for and on behalf and in the name of the Regents, to execute said Subleases.

- 3. That the revised forms of Assignments to be executed by the Corporation with respect to the rentals and other moneys payable by the Regents to the Corporation under the respective Subleases for the purpose of assigning said rentals and other moneys to the Paying Agent under the resolutions of the Board of Directors of the Corporation authorizing the issuance of its Bond Anticipation Notes for the purpose of financing the Projects, and thereafter to the Trustee under the Trust Agreement to be undertaken by the Corporation for the purpose of definitively financing the Projects, as presented to and considered by this Committee, are hereby approved, and the President or Vice-President, together with the Secretary of the Regents, be and they hereby are authorized and directed, for and on behalf and in the name of the Regents, to execute the Acknowledgement of Notice of Assignment appearing upon each of said Assignments.
- 4. That the aforesaid officers of the Regents be and they hereby are authorized and directed to make, execute and deliver all such additional and supplemental documents and to do and perform such acts and to take such actions as may be necessary or required for the consummation of the transactions provided for and contemplated by the aforesaid revised Leases, Subleases and Assignments and the construction and financing of the respective Projects by the Corporation.
- 5. That all resolutions, orders or other actions of the Regents in conflict with the provisions of this resolution, to the extent of such conflict, are hereby superseded, repealed and revoked.

University of Wisconsin Division of Intercollegiate Athletics

U.W. ATHLETIC BOARD STATEMENT OF POLICY RELATIVE TO EMPLOYMENT OF COACHES AND SPECIALISTS EMPLOYED BY THE U.W. DIVISION OF INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS.

A. General Policies:

- 1. All full-time head coaches, full-time assistant coaches and other full-time specialists (otherthan those who now have tenure) shall be employed under temporary appointment as defined in Chapter 10A.06 of Laws and Regulations governing the University of Wisconsin as adopted by the Faculty on January 6, 1964 and by the Regents on January 10, 1964 and specific terms shall be fixed by contract. Part-time head coaches shall be employed on contract basis. Other part-time coaches and specialists shall be employed as needed without contract using appropriate University employment forms. For University budget purposes all contract personnel will be listed as "specialist". Their programmatic titles (e.g. Head Coach) will be specified by the Athletic Board in consultation with the Chancellor's Office.
- 2. The contracts may be from ten months to three years as determined by the Athletic Board and University Administration.
- 3. Generally, contracts for individuals employed on an annual basis shall be from July 1st through June 30th. Other terms may be used which are more suitable for a particular sport.
- 4. Contracts for individuals on a ten month basis shall be from September 1st through June 30th unless otherwise specified.
- 5. Contracts for coaches will cease to be in effect on the starting date of employment elsewhere or if it is the coach's own decision to resign the position.
- 6. All salaries of persons employed by the Division of Intercollegiate
 Athletics are budgeted from funds of the Division of Intercollegiate
 Athletics unless such persons have teaching assignments with the

- Department of Physical Education (Men) whose salaries are then budgeted from funds of both the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics and the Department of Physical Education (Men).
- 7. Contracts shall indicate the starting salary of the individual with stipulation that an increase of salary amount, if any, shall be made in accordance with the University and Athletic Department's policy regarding salaries and budgetary items.
- 8. Specific provisions of the contracts shall be recommended by the Director of Athletics and approved by the Athletic Board, the Chancellor, the President and the Regents.
- 9. Effective date of initial contracts under this policy statement shall be July 1, 1967 unless otherwise specified.
- 10. All coaches and specialists must abide by the University of Wisconsin and Big Ten Conference policies and all regulations regarding performance standards.
- 11. Dismissal for cause prior to the normal termination of an individual contract shall be in accordance with and as defined in Chapter 10B of the Laws and Regulations of the University of Wisconsin as adopted by the Faculty on January 6, 1964 and by the Regents on January 10, 1964.

B. Provisions for Specific Personnel:

- 1. Full-time head coaches (employed on annual or ten month basis):
 - a. Head coaches employed on an annual (12 month) basis shall have a three year open-end contract beginning July 1 unless otherwise specified.
 - b. Head coaches employed on a ten month basis shall have a three
 year open-end contract for three (3) successive 10 month periods
 beginning September 1 of each year unless otherwise specified.

c. Contracts (annual or ten month basis) of Head coaches shall be renewed automatically unless a notice of termination of employment is given. The notice of termination of employment shall be given prior to January 1. If notice of termination is given, the salary shall be paid to such individual through the following June 30th. The salary payments shall cease on the starting date of employment elsewhere by such individuals.

2. Part-time head coaches, full-time assistant coaches and full-time Specialists employed on an annual or ten month basis:

- a. Those employed on an annual (12 month) basis shall have a one year open-end contract beginning July 1 unless otherwise specified.
- b. Those employed on ten month basis shall have a ten month open-end contract beginning September 1 unless otherwise specified.
- c. Contracts (annual or 10 month basis) shall be renewed automatically unless a notice of termination of employment is given. The notice of termination of employment shall be given prior to January 1. If notice of termination is given, the salary shall be paid to such individual through the following June 30th. The salary payments shall cease on the starting date of employment elsewhere by such individuals.

3. Part-time assistant coaches:

Part-time assistant coaches shall have no contracts but shall be employed as needed in each sport on a basis mutually agreeable to the head coach and the Director of Athletics using University employment appointment forms.

4. Part-time Specialists:

Part-time specialists shall have no contracts but shall be employed as needed on a basis mutually agreeable to University Officials and the Director of Athletics using University employment appointment forms.
