All classmates of 1911 will join to extend to our dear Alma Mater, so great, so noble, and so resourceful, their inestimable love—uppermost ever in our minds will be the desire to promote her welfare, and we pledge ourselves to strive fearlessly in behalf of the principles propounded to us during our brief residence of four years. THE outlook of the season of 1910 was exceedingly bad. The squad of the preceding year was riddled, while the few men eligible to play in the fall lacked experience and weight. From the outset it seemed to be destined that Wisconsin was to have a bad year. Determined to make the best of the conditions, however, with the hope that something lucky would turn up, Coach Barry started practice with much vigor and spirit. An entire new back field had to be built up of material entirely unknown to the coaches. With only two weeks' practice, we met Lawrence, a team which had already played two games, and had reached a stage of development far advanced to that attained by Wisconsin. However, in spite of the team's lack of practice and experience, a credible showing was made. The final score of 6 to 6 indicated that much would have to be accomplished in order to win from Indiana, a team which had remained almost intact for four years, and which had already played three games. For the first time in history we were defeated by Indiana by a score of 12 to 3. The result of these two games showed Wisconsin's weakness and necessitated the shifting of players to strengthen these weaknesses. Against Northwestern's team, which was the best in years, Wisconsin should have won, but only succeeded in tying them. Minnesota, the strongest team in the conference, outclassed us in almost every department. With the practice gained from the five games played, and with the confidence obtained from having overwhelmed every opponent, Minnesota succeeded in piling up a score of 28 to Wisconsin's 0.

With such a record, the fellows seemed discouraged, the coach dismayed, and the students down-hearted. But with a "come back" seldom seen, the men rallied. Coach Tom Barry worked with the squad as no coach ever worked before. During the week preceding the Chicago game, all the wrinkles were ironed out. Several new shift plays were perfected. By Saturday, November 19, Wisconsin had a smooth working machine, made up of eleven men working as one, with a grim determination to win. The result was that Wisconsin defeated Chicago, 10 to 0.

The showing of the year was as expected. We won one game. We beat Chicago. The season's result has, let us hope, served one good purpose, and that is to arouse the student interest in the realization that if something is not done to better athletics, Wisconsin will lose her prestige.

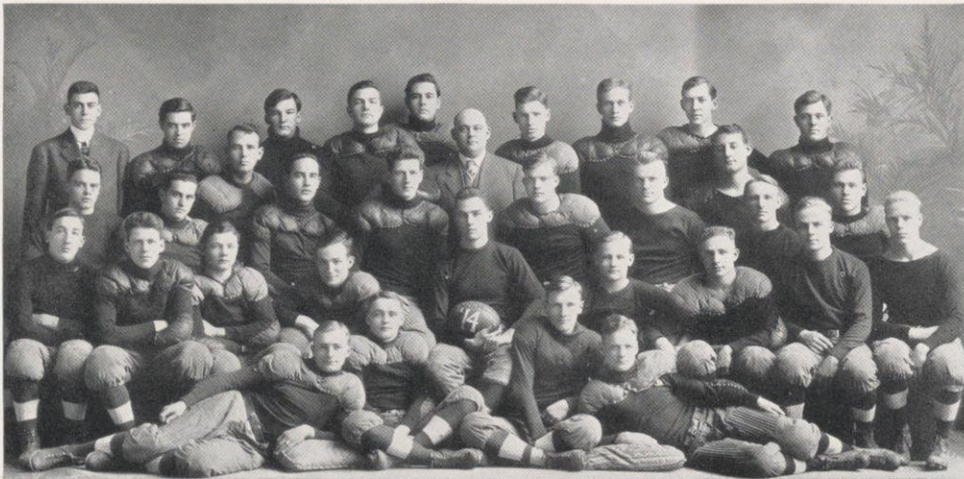

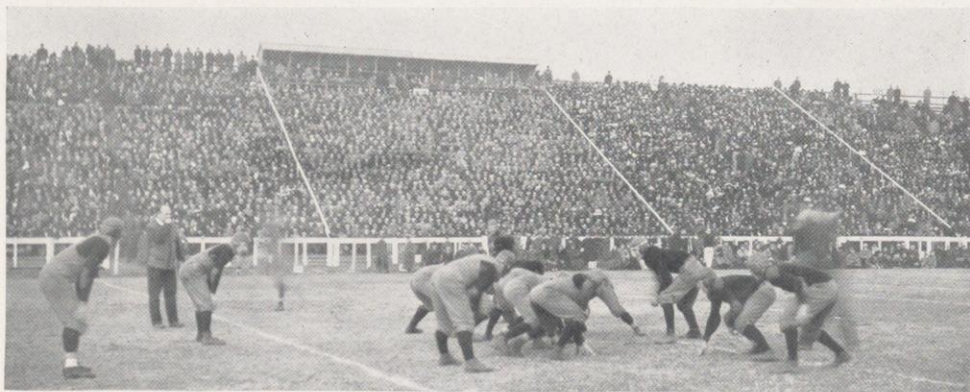

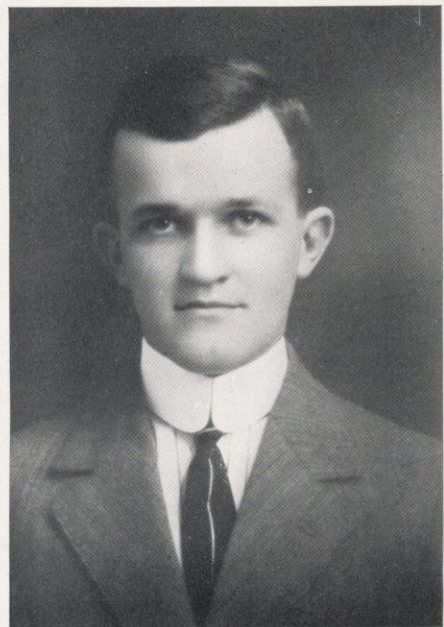

THE spring of 1910, as far as track was concerned, started out like a regular puzzle. No one knew exactly where Wisconsin stood. Her chances could be called bright or otherwise, all depending on the optimistic character of the dopester. In the first place, Dr. Hutchins had resigned in February, and for a long time it was undecided whether or not there would be a successor appointed who could handle track work. Finally, the happy news came that Coach Lathrop of Harvard had been secured. He was all that the boys could hope and wish for, and the way he started things going and aroused interest, made track stocks boom. More men turned out than had ever come out in any previous year, and he seemed to know and be interested in them all.

The indoor work did not amount to much, and we were beaten by Chicago in the relay, held on March 19; but after a short vacation, outdoor work was commenced. Coach Lathrop was on the field from eight in the morning till six at night, and he kept all interested. He had the track and field in excellent condition, and Dame Fortune smiled on us most kindly and gave us a grand, early spring, but prosperity along these lines seemed too much for us. About the middle of April, Coach Lathrop was stricken with apoplexy, brought on by over-exertion, and this started things going wrong. The men had barely started to work in their various events and now they had lost their coach. Here was shown the caliber of Wisconsin spirit. The enthusiasm aroused by Coach Lathrop kept them at their work, and they stood nobly by their captain, upon whom devolved the duty and responsibility of coaching. To make matters worse, the early spring changed back into winter and rain. Snow and cold were the daily weather forecasts. Not to be daunted, most of the fellows stuck to their regular work, and were duly rewarded, for at the request of the track team Dr. Hutchins consented to postpone his regular business and devote his time to the track team. Gradually the state of things improved. Under his most excellent coaching men were changed around till they were in their correct events, and when Illinois came up on May 7, they found a real team waiting for them. Only one great setback was still felt, and that was that the university's strong man, the best shot putter and discus thrower in the West, except Osthoff, was declared ineligible by the faculty, and his loss was severely felt thruout the season.

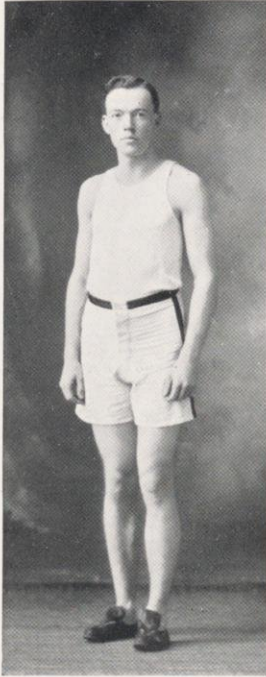
The Illinois meet had long been feared, and with the winning of it, all the members of the track team became encouraged, and all were happy and enthusiastic. The spirit of the team was excellent. Each one helped the other and was willing to give up a coveted first to save himself for some other event.

Minnesota proved an easy victim, and the week after this the Badgers took Stagg's aggregation into camp by one of the worst defeats Chicago has ever suffered in track work, and in so doing won the dual championship of the Conference teams. She had one of the best all around teams ever turned out and what was more, the entire team worked in harmony. Most of the team was composed of Sophomores and Juniors, and it was from the former class that such men as Adams, Gillette, Wiskocil, Banker, Buser, and Cleveland made their first appearance. The latter was the find of the season, when in one of the gamest finishes ever seen, he beat East of Illinois.

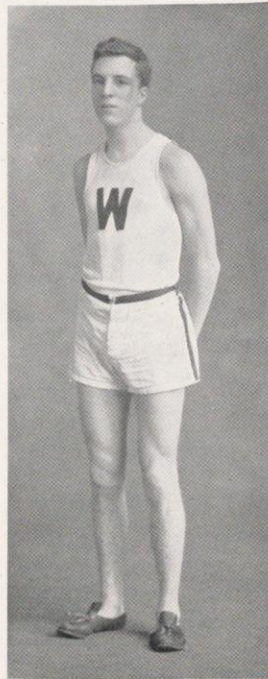
After winning the dual championship, Wisconsin got to work in earnest in order to make a showing at the Conference. The chances here were small, for in watching dope it was seen that the Conference would be the fastest yet pulled off and that most of the non-conference schools entering would cut right into Wisconsin's points. With great skill, Dr. Hutchins nursed the strength of the few men who were to represent the Badgers at Champaign, and when June 4 arrived, he had all of them in fine shape. The 9 points they won don't tell the entire story. That could only be obtained by actually witnessing the meet and seeing the excellent and game work done by the entire team. This meet, in which Wisconsin finished seventh, closed one of the most successful track seasons Wisconsin has ever had, and found her with the title of "Dual Champions of the Conference."

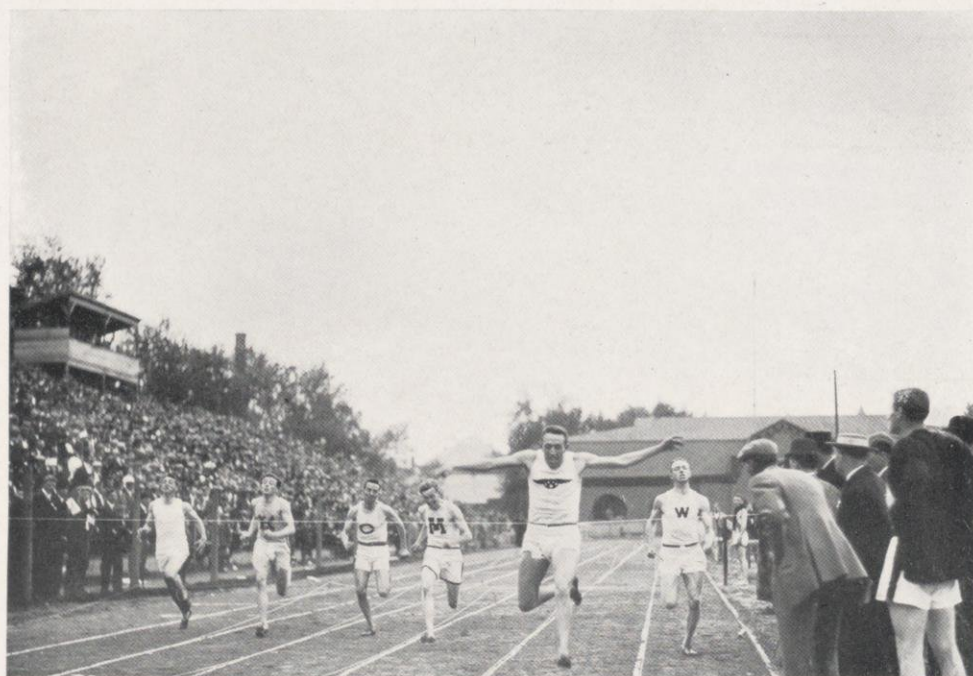

THE season of 1910 closed with failure at Poughkeepsie. To win the Intercollegiate Boat Race on the Hudson has been thus far the unattainable goal toward which every crewman, loyal student, and alumnus has constantly looked forward to. Defeat has repeatedly been our lot and we are still looking forward, with some anxiety perhaps, toward the first victory. A victory, a constant cry for a victory each year, takes hold of us with renewed force. Do we desire to give up in our efforts for this glory because we have thus far been unable to attain it? Each disappointment to one who has worked faithfully for a whole year for a single chance to win glory for his alma mater arouses a determination that makes him do all in his power to supply more than the one-eighth of the energy necessary to force the shell over the line first. Every man sent out east last year solemnly declared he would do all in his power to give Wisconsin a winning crew, and that his energy would not be spent in just rowing, but also in looking up new material, in helping to keep those out for the crew eligible and in arousing enthusiasm for rowing.

This means, with the increased interest shown, that better material will be developed, for certainly material is at hand in a school of our enrollment. With the proper spirit predominant everywhere there would be no such thing as sending a crew east consisting of men who are not physically as perfect as could be desired. There would be no 150-pound men in the boat when we all know that 20 pounds more is absolutely essential for the strain of a four-mile boat race. Our men will do wonders, but they cannot do the impossible. We can win with the proper material. That we have the material here is shown by the fact that each year brings out thirty or forty freshmen of truly remarkable builds. When the clouds of the first semester exams are cleared away less than 25 per cent of these are still eligible. The interest and competition of the remaining eight or ten is lost. Our freshmen must be made to constantly realize during their first semester what is more than likely to happen to them if they do not work harder than a freshman thinks is necessary. Remove this annual disaster and our crews will soon be second to none. Every one can assist in this. The fact that we are so far from the Hudson is no disadvantage, except perhaps financially, but it puts a little more pleasure into all the work and is a wonderful attraction for freshmen. Let us all keep these fundamental facts in mind and see if we cannot do better. We are trying a new coach and he deserves co-operation so that he may have the situation fully in hand and bring about the desired results.

The class of 1910 has had two victories in rowing, their freshman race on the Hudson and the varsity race with the University of Washington last June. The men from Washington were recognized to be of a bigger and better rowing build, but they were unable to keep up to the pace set by the Wisconsin crew, simply because they had not received as good coaching. Nevertheless, the subsequent rowing on the Hudson proved that our crew had not had enough practice for the endurance of a four-mile race such as is rowed at Poughkeepsie.

Coach Ten Eyck has ended four years of faithful service. He didn't produce a victory in the varsity race, although it is admitted his second varsity crew was good enough to do so. Patient, kind, and shrewd as he was, and deserving of much better results, he has left Wisconsin with the keen disappointment that he failed to produce results.

Six of the Japan veterans were eligible, as were also Pitcher Bob Fucik and several promising Sophomores. An exceptionally early spring made it possible to start out-door practice earlier than it had been started for several years. All the positions were promptly filled, with the exception of first base and right field. Through the loss of Mike Timbers, first base was not regularly filled during the whole season. No less than four different men held the position in the nine games played, and it was an ever present point of weakness of the team.

Our first game, which was to have been with Northwestern, was called on account of the weather, a most unfortunate circumstance, for the Methodists were not overly strong and a victory at the outset would have gone a long ways toward imbuing the team with confidence.

Chicago took the next game, and a week later the team went to Lafayette, where the weather man again snatched a victory from our grasp. In the fourth inning, with the score 6 to 2 in our favor, the game was called on account of a heavy rain. We had knocked their pitcher out of the box in the third inning and everything was in our favor.

From this on things did not seem to go as they should. Although Pitchers Nash and Fucik pitched tip-top ball and the fielding behind them was good, we could not win our games. The main reason for this was our inability to hit the ball at the critical time. The games we did win were won by holding our opponents to as small a score as possible.

In spite of these things, we ended the season by tying Chicago for third place, with Illinois and Purdue, in first and second places respectively. With the close of the season, Fucik, Nash, Pergande, and Culver ended their careers in college athletics. The prospects for next year are bright, for there is plenty of material, if it can be obtained and developed. With Coach Barry and Captain-elect Flanagan at the helm, we should have a winning team in 1911. Best wishes.

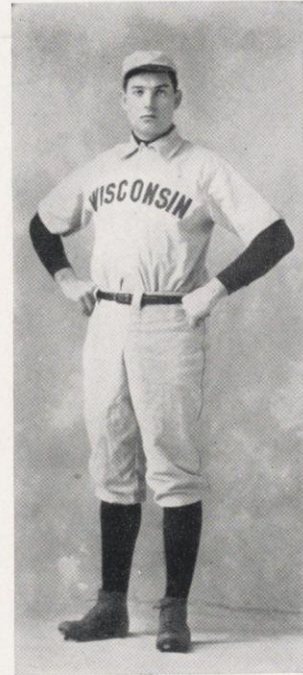

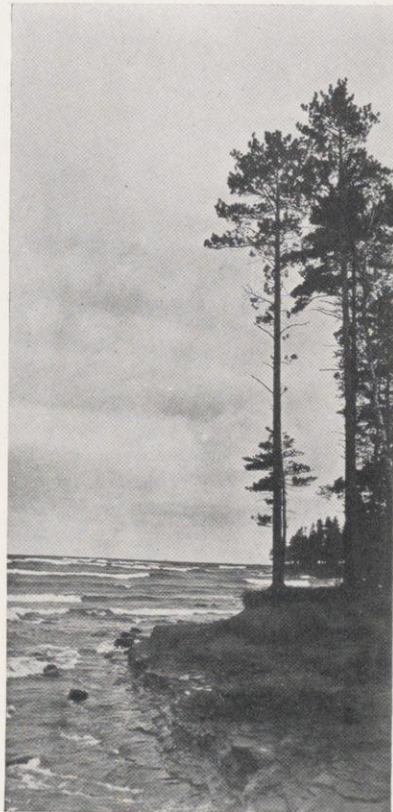


THE CAMPUS—AFTER DARK

On the whole it has been a very successful year—financially—and if the faculty is abolished next year as several have suggested, we should have a championship team at Wisconsin.

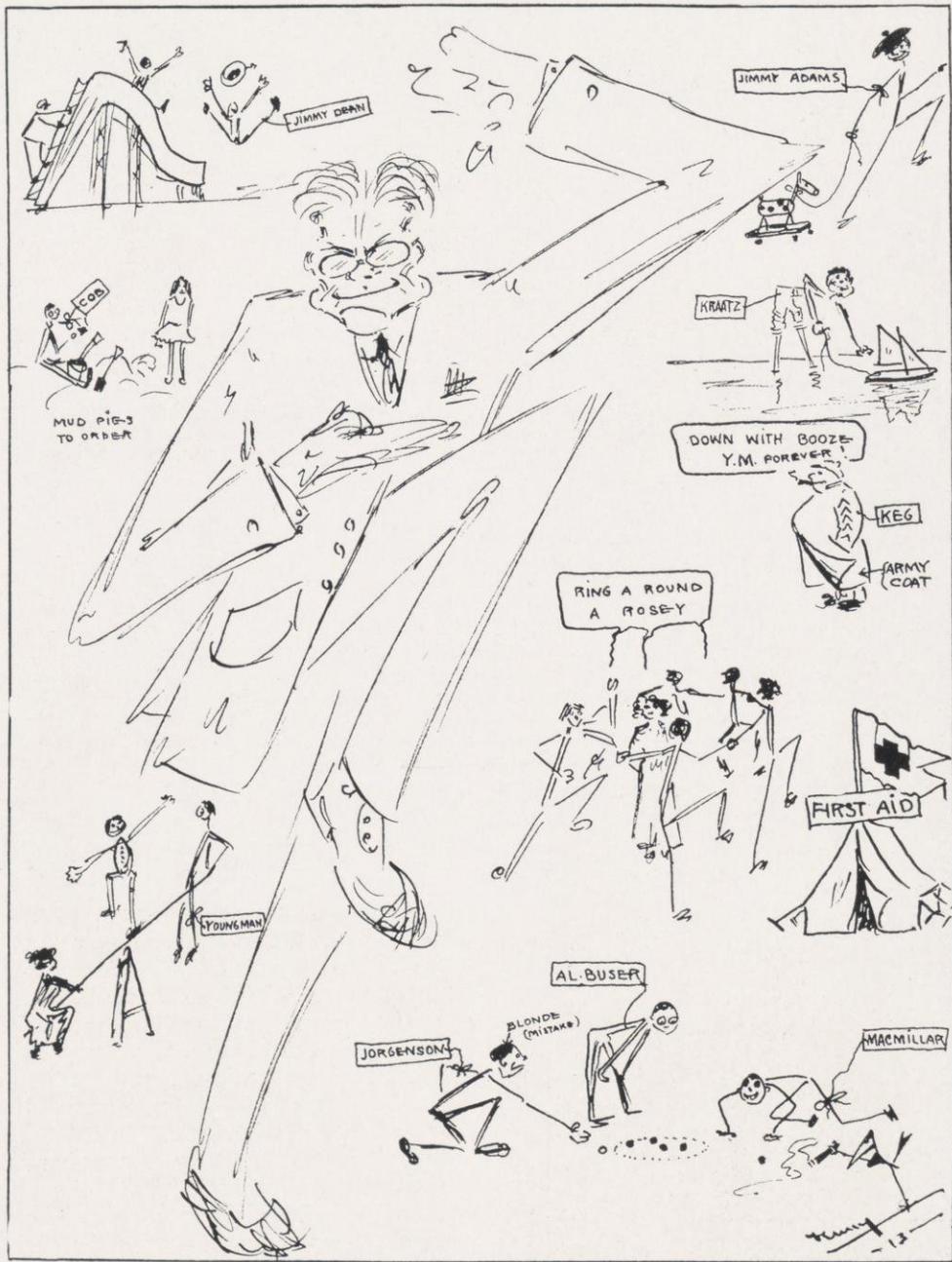

ROBERT LEARY'S VIVID STORY OF VOLITION TO DISCOVER MIDDLETON.

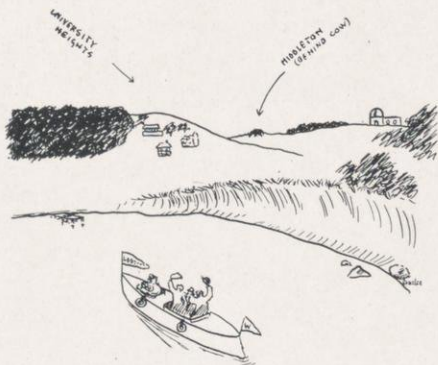

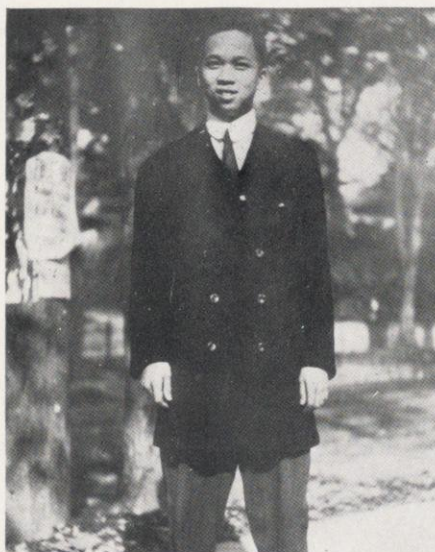

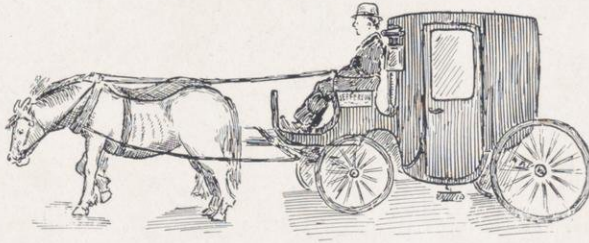

DRINK BEER AT VARSITY

Wisconsin Students Quit Using Water When Ten Contract Typhoid.
