
We've found more ways to save you money with our "How to Buy a House the Right Way," and "Buying a Camcorder" for those thinking of buying a video camera.

The Wisconsin Union Directorate (WUD) Art Committee is used to putting its heart into Union art exhibitions. This time they've gone a step farther by starting off the season with HEART PARTY, Jan. 15 through Valentine's Day, Feb. 14th. This exhibition in the Class of 1925 Gallery (MU) is by members of the Wisconsin Center for Paper Arts, a non-profit organization dedicated to preserving and promoting the art and craft of handmade paper.

And while viewing Lake Mendota's stilled and icy water, stop in to see the stilled and arty WATERCOLOR WISCONSIN '87. This 22nd annual state competitive exhibition will be shown in the Main and Theater Galleries (MU), Jan. 15 - Feb. 14. This exhibition is on loan from the Charles A. Wustum Museum of Fine Arts in Racine.

A reception/valentine party for HEART PARTY and WATER-COLOR WISCONSIN '87 will be Fri., Feb. 12, 5-8 pm, in the Memorial Union Galleries.

The Susan B. Anthony Gallery at Union South has SCULP-TURE: ON AND OFF PAPER from Jan. 15 - Feb. 14. About a dozen students will show their cast bronze sculptures. A reception on Fri., Jan. 29, 7-9 pm, will welcome these artists as well as help celebrate the (US) Red Oak Grill Grand Opening.

February and March exhibitions are being negotiated at this time but two Master of Art and Fine Art exhibitions are schedled for MU from Mar. 25 - Apr. 4 by previous award winning student exhibitors. Paintings and sculptures entitled "A POST MODERN FEAR" will be in the Main Gallery while the Class of 1925 Gallery will hold wearable metal sculptures.

April is CELEBRATE STUDENT CREATIVITY MONTH. On Fri., Apr. 8, "HERE'S HOW," an all day workshop for UW-Madison students, provides information about becoming a professional artist. This is provided free by WUD.

The 60th ANNUAL STUDENT SHOW, a competitive exhibition open to all UW-Madison student artists, will fill all MU Galleries from Apr. 15 - May 8. Entries are due April 7th.

All exhibitions are selected, designed and installed by "WUD Art Guys," student volunteers who work with the artists.

Gallery hours at Memorial Union are 10 am - 8 pm daily, with 10 am - 6 pm daily at Union South. Exhibitions are free and open to the Union public.

Hotel Renovations Complete






