

#### Greeting.

To all new students entering the University, the Y. M. and Y. W. C. A. extends a hearty welcome, hoping that those who are strangers among us, will very soon come to feel at home in this our University.

To you we present this Hand-Book containing in condensed form information which we trust will be of value to you.

Do not consider yourselves strangers, but feel that you are among students who have the same grand object in view as yourselves,—improvement.

The members of these associations will gladly offer any assistance they can to you while you are establishing yourselves in your new homes, and becoming acquainted with your fellow-students. They may be found upon the days of examination in University Hall, room No. 2, ready to render any aid possible.

#### Directions to New Students.

Students desiring examinations for entrance will present yourselves at room No. 1 University Hall for registering. Here you will show your diplomas or certificates from other schools, if you

have such, or receive your examination cards, upon which the standings of your examinations will be recorded by the different professors. Students will be on hand to conduct you to the several rooms for examinations. Paper and pencil will be needed by you in your work. After having finished your examinations return to room No. 1 and receive your entrance card. Having presented this card to the secretary of the Board of Regents, opposite the Park Hotel. and paid the charges for general expenses, you will receive from him a card which you will show to your class officer and receive your class-card en. titling you to admission to your classes. This card must be shown to each of the professors to whom you recite.

All information concerning courses of study, etc., may be had by consulting the catalogue, which may be obtained at the president's room.

#### Rooms and Board.

Rooms and boards can be obtained at convenient distances from the University of which you may learn by consulting the Bulletin Board at University Hall.

#### Membership of College Association.

The membership of the College Association is limited to men in college.

Experience has proven the impracticability of uniting students and young men of the town in our organization. It is impossible to adjust the transient character of college life to the permanent life of town.

The young men in town, by being permanent members, unavoidably acquire an ascendency in the management of the work, which deprives the students of the feeling of responsibility which they ought to possess.

Many students cannot be as deeply interested in a mixed association as in a distinctively college institution. There is a kindred feeling among students which enables them to reach one another far more easily than they can be reached by any other class of men. It is very difficult to arrange hours for meetings suitable alike to college and town. Moreover, two associations, one in college and one in town, will set more persons at work and accomplish proportionately greater results.

The Young Men's Christian Association is one of the many departments of the church, the organization which Christ founded for reaching and saving men. It has been prosperous because of its vital connection with the divinely

appointed agency.

Accordingly the International Convention of the American Associations, assembled at Portland, Maine, in 1869, enunciated the following principle of membership, which is, and must be rigidly adhered to by all associations:

Resolved, That as these organizations bear the name of Christian, and profess to be engaged directly in the Savior's service, so it is clearly their duty to maintain the control and management of all their affairs in the hands of those who profess to love and publicly avow their faith in Jesus the Redeemer, as divine, and who testify their faith by becoming and remaining members of churches held to be evangelical. And we hold those churches to be evangelical which maintain the Holy Scriptures to be the only infallible rule of faith and practice, and believe in the Lord Jesus Christ (the only begotten of the Father King of Kings and Lord of Lords, in whom dwelleth the fullness of the godhead bodily, and who was made sin for us, though knowing no sin, bearing our sins in His own body on the tree), as the only name under heaven given among men whereby we must be saved from everlasting punishment.

Resolved, That the Associations organized after this date shall be entitled to representation in future conferences of the associated Young Men's Christian Associations of North America, upon

condition that they be severally composed of young men in communion with evangelical churches (provided that in places where Associations are formed by a single denomination, members of other denominations are not excluded therefrom), and active membership and the right to hold office be conferred only upon young men who are members in good standing of evangelical churches.

Strict conformity to this principle is attended with no difficulty whatever.

Men who have made no public profession of Christianity do not expect to be received into a Christian Association upon the same plane with those who have. Not being members of the church they do not ask to be admitted to its organizations as full members. While the active or controlling membership is limited to members of evangelical churches, the Association has wisely made provision for fellowship with a large class of young men whose characters are moral, very many of whom are in sympathy with Christianity and may by personal influence be led into the church. This agency is the associate membership, and such members sustain the same relation to the Association which persons sustain to the church, who, while not church members, are members of the congregation, attend the services, enjoy the social and many of the spiritual benefits of the church, although having no voice in its government. Young men who become associate members of the college Young Men's Christian Associations are brought into intercourse with Christian men which draws many of them to Christ. Among no class of men may this agency be employed more effectively than among students, whose first associations exert such a mighty influence upon their entire college and after life.

Members of the faculty are received into the Association and their relation to the work is exceedingly important. Their permanent conection with it enables them to exert an influence which is indispensable to the highest usefulness of the organization.

While many of the duties of the members are distributed by a wise appointment of officers and committees, there are some duties which cannot be so relegated but are common to all. Among these may be mentioned personal conversation with Christians, prayer for the unconverted, individual effort to lead them to the meetings and earnest persuasion to induce them to accept Christ, effort to increase the

membership, faithful attendance upon the meetings, hearty co-operation with the plans of officers and committees; in a word, cherishing in every department of Christian work the same interest which promotes the development of social and literary organizations.

#### Bulletin of Meetings.

Every Sunday afternoon a joint meeting of the Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. is held for prayer and conference in Room No. 2, of the Main Hall.

The Y. M. C. A. prayer meeting is held Thursday evening between the hours of seven and seven-thirty o'clock, in Room No. 2, Main Hall.

The Y. W. C. A. prayer meeting is held on Wednesday evening between the hours of seven and seven-thirty o'clock, in the music room, Ladies Hall.

The yearly business meeting of the Y. M. C. A. for the election of officers is held in May.

The business meeting of the Y. W. C. A. for the election of officers is held at the close of each term.

The regular business meetings of each association is held each alternate week.

A missionary meeting is held once a

month in place of the Sunday afternoon meeting.

The two associations give a reception to the new students at the beginning of the fall term.

A lecture course is being prepared, the first lecture of which will be delivered by Rev. W. H. Marquess, moderator of the general assembly of the Presbyterian church. Joseph Cook will also lecture for us at an early date.

The Wisconsin State Association of the Y. W. C. A. was organized at Whitewater, Jan. 1885, to which both city and College Associations are admitted.

A National Association of the Y. W. C. A. was organized at Lake Geneva, Aug. 12, 1886.

Seven states were represented in the Association and more will join it this fall. Its meetings will be held triennially.

There are 80 organizations of the Young Women's Christian Association, enlisting 2000 college girls in harmony with the work of the Y. M. C. A.

#### Madison.

In Southern Wisconsin is a cluster of four beautiful lakes to which still cling the quaint Indian names—Mendota,

Waubega and Kegousa.

Charmingly situated between two of these lakes is that most delightful city, whose loveliness led even the eloquent Talmage to exclaim: "If on God's green earth there is a place more beautiful I have not seen it!"

The fine State Capitol building, rising from an eminence in the heart of the city first attracts our attention.

Within are the State Offices, Legislative Halls, Supreme Court, State Law Library, Historical Museum and Art Gallery, also that invaluable collection of 200,000 books, the State Historical Library.

A pretty park surrounds the Capitol, and beyond this is the square in which may be found the principal business houses, the banks, Post Office, City Library and two of the numerous city churches.

Westward from the Capitol lie the University grounds, than which none finer are possessed by any institution of learning in the land.

A fine hill is the site of the numerous buildings, while boyond stretches out the University Farm.

Winding through the woods, and along the lake-shore is the beautiful and romantic University drive. The view of city, lakes and surrounding country, from the crest of University Hill is exceedingly charming.

Madison, although the Capital City and a railroad center, can boast of but few business interests. Its natural beauties render it a favorite residence city, and many are the beautiful homes throughout the city and along the lake ridges.

Opportunities for pleasure, recreation and the enjoyment of social advantages are not wanting.

Unusual gaiety prevails during the biennial sessions of the State Legislature. The city however, is eminently a literary and educational center.

Prominent among the pleasant attractions is the Monona Lake Assembly, held every summer at Lakeside, drawing many hundreds to the city to enjoy the rare literary treats afforded.

The University, many schools, libraries, literary societies, conventions, lecture courses, and indeed remarkable educational advantages of every description tend to make Madison, to the student especially, a congenial home.


