REGULAR MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Madison, Wisconsin



Tuesday, November 10, 1931, 2 P.M.

PRESENT: Regents Callahan, Richardson, Wilkie; President Frank, Business Manager Phillips, Secretary McCaffrey.

Director George Little was present to report on the donations received for the proposed tank house and presented a schedule of costs. (Copy on file.) It was VOTED, That the Athletic Council be authorized to proceed

with the construction of the tank house to the extent of the funds available.

Upon recommendation of President Frank, it was VOTED, That there be allocated from New Construction Special, Appropriation \$16,900 reserved for Radio, the sum of \$5087 for the completion of the remodeling and equipment of the old agronomy building for the departments of genetics and veterinary science. (Note: Total cost, \$10,867, of which \$5780 was previously budgetted.)



### RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE BUSINESS MANAGER

1. That the purchase of the J. D. Thomas farm in Washburn County, Wisconsin, described as the northwest quarter, the northwest quarter of the northeast quarter and all that part of the north half of the southwest quarter lying north of the highway, all in Section 33 in Township 39, North of Range 12 West, containing 243 acres more or less, from the State Annuity and Investment Board for \$7,500 be approved. The money for the purpose was appropriated by the Emergency Board October 15, 1931.

Acly, a vice-president of the First National Bank, to receive the deposits for the First National Bank at the office of the University Avenue National Bank, be accepted, but with the understanding that the depository bond will have proper rider attached, giving authorization for this procedure.

The Business Manager presented plans for the vivarium to be constructed on land adjoining the Biology Building. It was VOTED, That the plans be approved and authority granted to advertise for bids. Estimated cost \$10,000.
