Upon motion of Regent Mead, seconded by Regent Gundersen, the recommendations of the President were adopted.

A recommendation of Dean Snell of the Extension Division was presented, to increase the salary of Mertin C. Little, Assistant Dean, \$275, or one-half the amount of his salary waiver. Regent Berger moved that the recommendation be concurred in, the motion being seconded by Regent Sholts. Called vote was taken. Regents voting "Aye", Berger and Sholts. Regents voting "No", Baker, Christopherson, Clausen, Drexler, Gundersen, Mead, Runge. The motion was declared lost.

The following recommendations of Dean Christensen were presented:

- (a) That Dr. Harry Steenbock, Agricultural Chemistry, be compensated for summer service for the summer of 1932, to be paid \$750, less 13% waiver, net \$652, to be charged as follows: \$287 to summer session savings, \$365 to Agricultural Economics, half-time assistant, p. 75.
- (b) That Professor W. A. Sumner, Agricultural Journalism, be compensated for summer service for the summer of 1932, to be paid \$119, less waiver 11%, net \$106; to be charged to summer session savings.

Upon motion of Regent Mead, seconded by Regent Runge, these recommendations were adopted.

President Frank presented the recommendation of Dean Sellery that the rule relating to retirement at the age of 70 be suspended in the case of Professor John R. Commons and that he be appointed to continue in service at the pleasure of the Board. (Professor Commons reached the age of 70 on October 15, 1932.)

Upon motion of Regent Gundersen, seconded by Regent Berger, adopted.

President Frank presented communications from the Wisconsin Highway Commission and from Professor E. F. Bean, outlining arrangements for state geologists to carry on certain geographical investigations, the Highway Commission to pay the expenses. geophysical

Upon motion of Regent Drexler, seconded by Regent Gundersen, the plan as outlined was approved.

President Frank presented the names of Walter Alexander and J. P. Riordan as alumni members of the Athletic Board for the current year.

Upon motion of Regent Sholts, seconded by Regent Drexler, it was voted that these appointments be approved.

Regent Sholts presented the following recommendations of the Business Manager to the Executive Committee:

1. That the following action of the Regents taken on June 18, 1932, be rescinded:

"That fourth year medical students be relieved of the infirmary fee for one semester, \$4.50, and that they be required to deposit that amount in an insurance fund; fund to be administered by the business manager",

and that the following recommendation be approved:

"That upon the recommendation of Dr. Bardeen, fourth year medical students be relieved of the infirmary fee for one semester, \$4.50."

Adopted.

V2. That upon the recommendation of Dean Christensen, \$235 be transferred from the item for Assistant $\frac{1}{2}$, Agricultural Economics, to Agricultural Administration, Clerical and Labor. Adopted.

dieal hool cee Upon motion of Regent Sholts, seconded by Regent Drexler, it was voted that recommendations 1 and 2 of the Business Manager be adopted and that the minutes of the meetings of the Executive Committee held on June 21, July 5, August 2, August 20 and August 26, 1932, be approved, ratified and confirmed.

The following recommendation of the Trust Fund Committee was

That the sale of the James Fitzgibbons farm (in which the University had \$4000 invested and the State Annuity Board \$6000) for \$10,000, be approved; \$6000 of the money received to go to the State Annuity Board, \$2000 to the Regents and the Regents to take a \$2000 mortgage for three years, at 5% interest; the Regents and the Annuity Board to share equally a commission of \$300, the cost of the abstract and the taxes for 1932.

Upon motion of Regent Mead, seconded by Regent Sholts, adopted.

At the meeting of the Committee of the Whole held on Friday, October 14, a committee of the State Medical Society, consisting of Doctors S. E. Gavin, Fond du Lac; Frank W. Pope, Racine; Gregory Connell, Oshkosh; John Yates, Milwaukee; Joseph Dean and R. H. Jackson, Madison; and Mr. J. G. Crownhart, Madison, Secretary, appeared and presented the report of the special committee of the State Medical Society to study admissions at the State of Wisconsin General Hospital. It was decided to appoint a committee of the Regents to consider the matter and President Clausen announced that he would appoint as such committee Regents Mead, Wilkie, Callahan, Gundersen, Berger. (President Clausen ex officio.)

The Business Manager presented a plan to absorb the drop in receipts of student fees, amounting to approximately \$90,000. (Plan on file)

Upon motion of Regent Mead, seconded by Regent Drexler, it was voted that the plan be approved and that the President and Business Manager, with the approval of the Executive Committee and the Chairman of the Finance Committee, be authorized to adjust the amounts in the event that the purchase of the Rieder Farm is to receive further consideration.

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Upon motion of Regent Runge, seconded by Regent Sholts, it was

VOTED, That the salary adjustment of eleven persons in the College of Agriculture, made necessary by salary reductions from federal funds, be approved. (New schedule, <u>EXHIBIT D</u>, attached.)

Upon motion it was VOTED, That the Business Manager, Mr. J. D. Phillips, be selected to represent the Regents at the meeting of the Association of Governing Boards of State Universities and Allied Institutions to be held at Ann Arbor, Michigan, November 16-19, 1932.

Upon motion of Regent Berger, seconded by Regent Drexler, it was

VOTED, That Loyal Durand be appointed to succeed himself as member of the Board of Visitors for the term ending July 1, 1936.

Upon motion of Regent Runge, seconded by Regent Sholts, it was

VOTED, That A. C. Kingsford, of Baraboo, be appointed to succeed H. W. Kircher as a member of the Board of Visitors for the term ending July 1, 1933. (Mr. Kircher died August 13, 1932.)

Regent Berger presented the following recommendation:

That contingent upon the City of Milwaukee conveying to the Regents of the University of Wisconsin free of incumbrance lots 2-6 and 7 and 8 and 9 except the east 30 feet of 8 and 9 which is to be used for street widening on Sixth Street and the south half of lot 10 all in block 166, City of Milwaukee, the Regents agree to request the Legislature for funds for the purchase by condemnation of the south half of lot 10 and all of lot 1 with the understanding that the east 30 feet of lot 1 will be deeded to the City of Milwaukee for the widening of Sixth Street.

Upon motion of Regent Berger, seconded by Regent Gundersen, it was voted that the matter be referred to the Constructional Development Committee for report at the next meeting of the Board.

(20, 13d. Oct 26/3 4, p.7)

The application of Leon Perssion for readmission to the Medical School was considered and upon motion of Regent Sholts, seconded by Regent Runge, it was voted that the application be denied.

Mr. Joseph A. Padway and Mr. George M. Pizer appeared before the Committee of the Whole on October 14 to request a reduction in interest rate on the loan on the property owned by the Jewish Center of Milwaukee, upon which the Regents hold a mortgage. The matter is to be considered by the Executive and Trust Fund Committees.

CHANGES IN CURRICULUM REQUIREMENTS IN THE COLLEGE OF AGRICULTURE

1. In regard to the requirements for a joint major, the following is approved:

The major consists of a minimum of 15 elective credits in a department. Not more than five credits in certain courses outside the given department may be substituted for an equivalent number of credits within the major department if reported in advance to the faculty.

In case a student is interested in a line of endeavor involving more than one department, he may select as a major study a minimum of 25 elective credits of suitable related work in two or more departments. In the latter case the program must have the approval of the Executive Committee not later than the middle of the junior year.

In either of the above cases, not more than 25 elective credits in any one department may count toward graduation.

2. The statement to appear in the circular regarding the mathematics requirement should read as follows:

"Mathematics 71, 1, or 51", -with a footnote to the effect that students who are certain they wish to continue mathematics beyond the required course should elect Mathematics 1; students who are to major in Agricultural Engineering should normally choose Mathematics 51; a student who carries Mathematics 71 with success will be permitted to take Mathematics 2 if he desires to continue his training in mathematics.

3. In regard to electives to be taken outside the College, the statement in the circular should read as follows:

"Twenty elective credits shall be taken outside the College, preferably in the junior and senior years."

Note. The effect of the above change will be to require the student to elect 20 credits which must be taken in some other College or Colleges of the University than the College of Agriculture. It seemed impossible to place any restrictions regarding these electives without handicapping one or more departments in what appeared to be a rather serious way.
