WILLIAMS BAY FIRE DEPARTMENT  
ASSISTS LAKE GENEVA FIRE DE-  
PARTMENT AT STURGES FIRE

A three- eleven alarm was sounded by Lake Geneva Fire Department in an effort to put out the fire on Tuesday.

The Lake Geneva, The Town of Linn, and the Bay Departments were on hand.

The Sturges home which is atop the hill on the north side of 36 and 50 above Lake Geneva Manor was a total wreck. The first floor was made of stone and the upper two stories were of frame construction.

Mr. Benton Sturges and his sister Catherine were just sitting down to dinner when they smelled smoke and on investigation found that the upper floor was ablaze. The fire is supposed to have started from a defective chimney or sparks.

Mr. Sturges said that the home was built in 1883 by his father, Buckingham Sturges, one of three brothers who built on Lake Geneva in the early days. The brothers were bankers in Chicago during the Chicago Fire. They were Shelton, George and Buckingham.

Fortunately time permitted the removal of the beautiful old style furniture which abounded in the great mansion. Thousand of the volumes in the library were carried to safety together with the furniture, etc. and stored in the barn on the 20 acre estate.

Mr. Sturges was seen carrying the roast that was still intact to the home of the Henry H. Porter, Jr. who were opening their home to their old time neighbors.

Mr. Porter said that his father had been entertained by Buckingham Sturges family while his home was being built.

The Lake Geneva School did not open that afternoon and the boys helped to carry furniture.

## YERKES OBSERVATORY MAY BE MOVED

Much comment was heard in the Bay the first part of this week when it was learned thru the press that the President of the University of Chicago, Robert Maynard Hutchins, was considering moving the members of the faculty and the equipment from the Yerkes Observatory here to be located at the new McDonald Observatory, completed a year ago, on Mt. Locke at Fort Davis, Texas, of which Dr. Otto Struve is also director. The 40 inch refractory telescope at Yerkes is still the largest of its kind ever built, while the telescope at McDonald Observatory is an 82 inch reflector. The instrument at Yerkes weighs 20 tons.

Williams Bay was selected as the site of the Yerkes Observatory because of the absence of smoke, dust jar and the glare of city lights, and its accessibility from Chicago. It was selected from 20 tracts offered, all within 100 miles of Chicago. The original 53 acres was donated by John Johnston, Jr., who laid out the original Grand Terrace Subdivision. The present value of the observatory and equipment is over half a million dollars.

The Yerkes Observatory was built here in 1897. Prof. George E. Hale, was the first director.

The original 53 acres has been increased to 80 acres with a shore line of 530 feet and a pier.

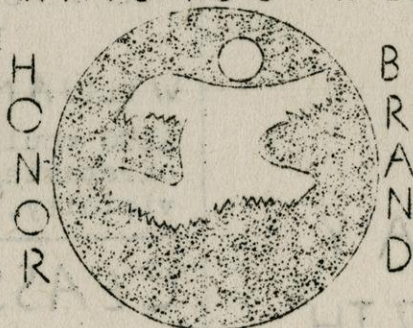
