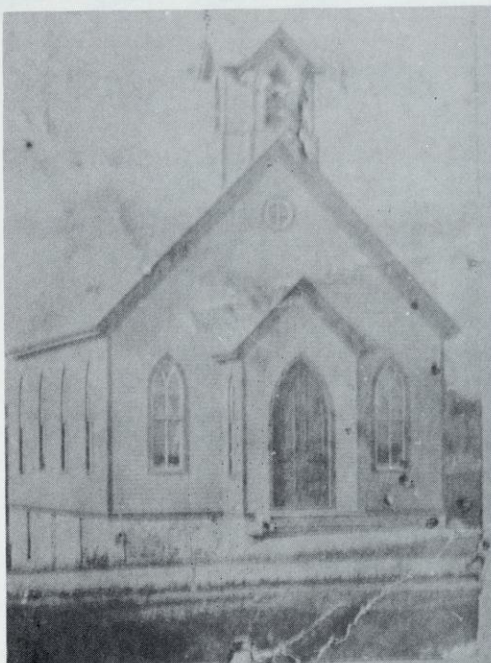

"The Waterford Township High School, opening September 4, 1905, will offer advantages equal to any high school in the state. Three courses are presented, the English, Scientific, and Modern Classical. The latter gives four years of Latin and two of German, both under the direction of instructors who have made a specialty of these subjects." August 24, 1905, Waterford Post files.

The first class to complete the full four year high school course was graduated June 17, 1909. The graduates were: Annie Anderson, Mary Weimer, Lawrence Jacobson, Olive Morse, Florence Patrick, and Olene Lapham.

"Basketball was the main feature in athletics, and it was crude and unorganized compared with today. We had to have a ball to play with then, and it cost \$5.00 To get that five dollars took a tremendous effort, and the ball lasted us several years. We had no coach. There was no organized league or conference. We coached ourselves and made a pretty good record against Rochester Academy, Burlington High School, and East Troy High School."



"The elderly gentleman on the receiving end of the trombone was George Lapham, who was school janitor in those ancient days. I fear that we tortured him in many more ways than merely tooting a horn at him."

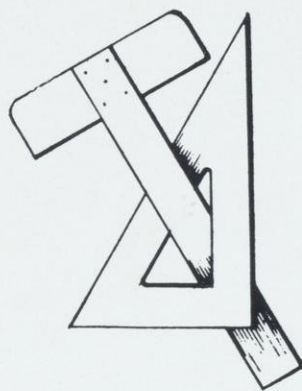


COMMERCIAL

INDUSTRIAL ARTS

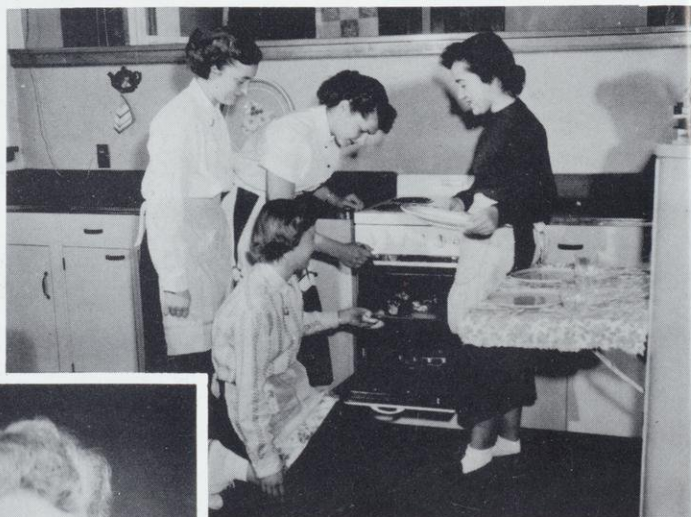

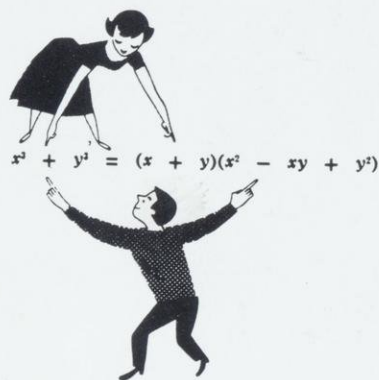
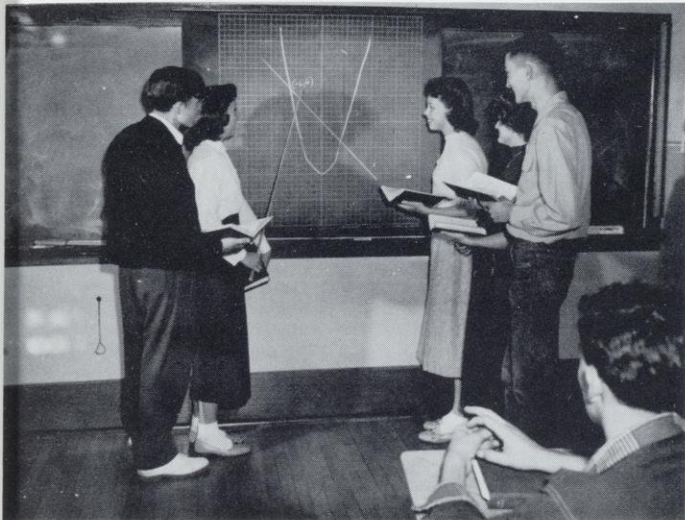
PHYSICS

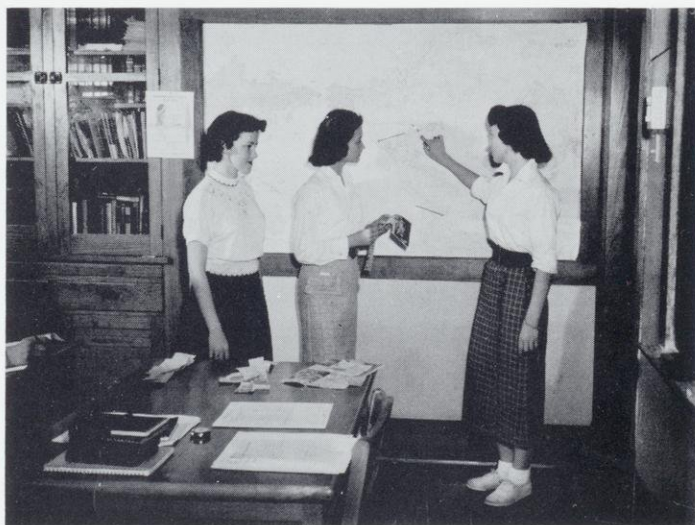
MATHEMATICS

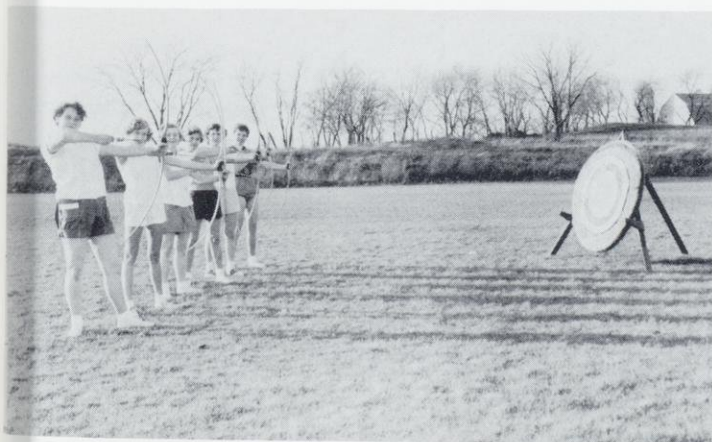

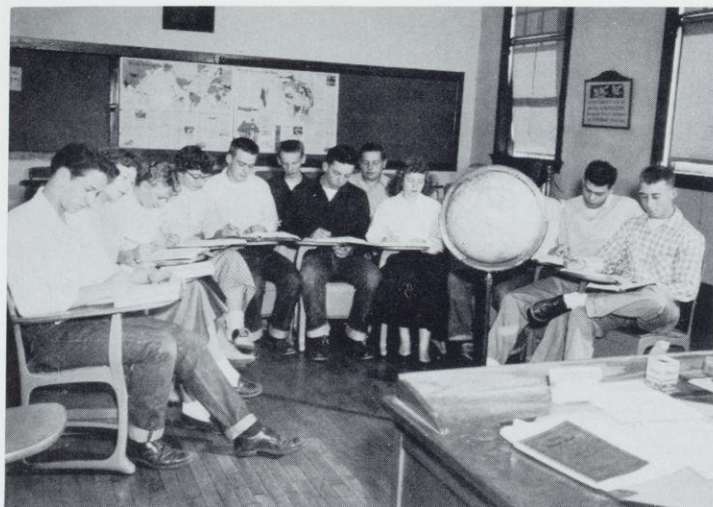


GIRLS' PHYSICAL EDUCATION

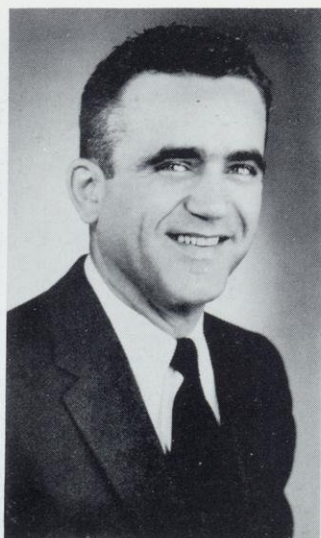

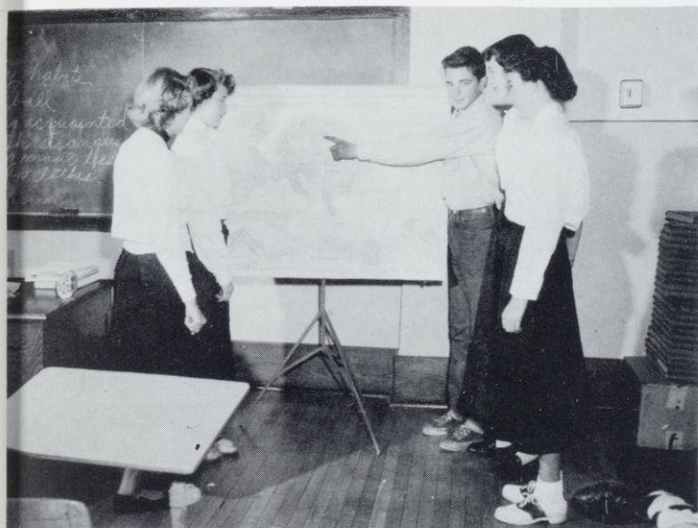

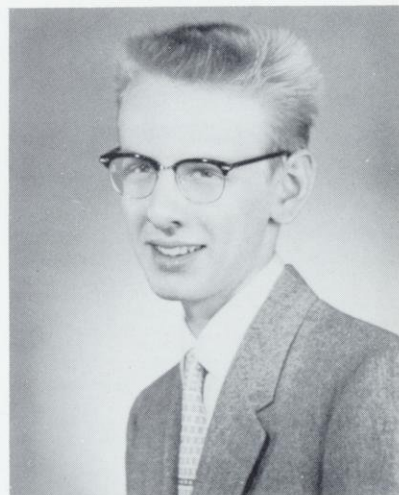
JOAN ALLARD

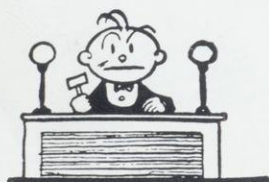

The bright spot of the season came when we played Pewaukee on their gridiron. It was a game played in the mud and rain. The score was deadlocked at 6-6.

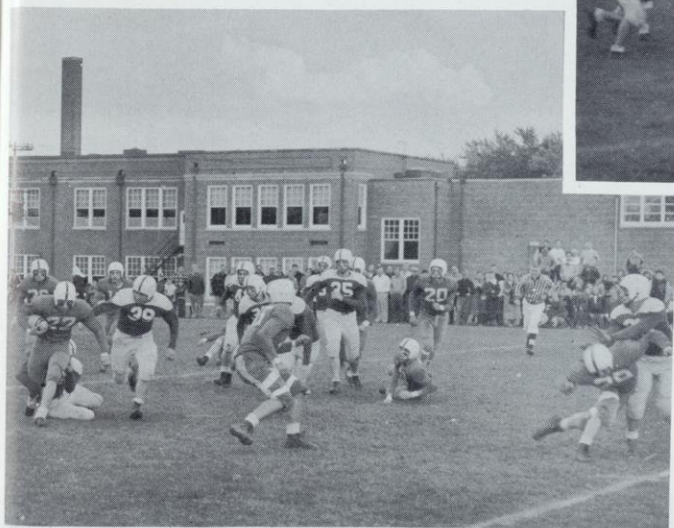
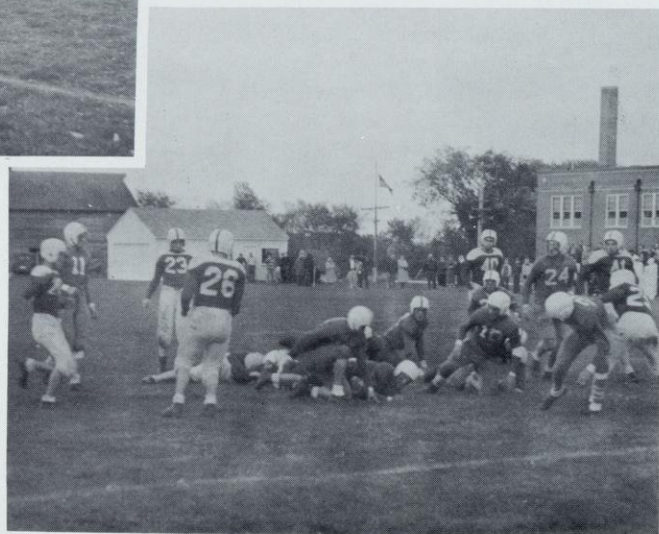
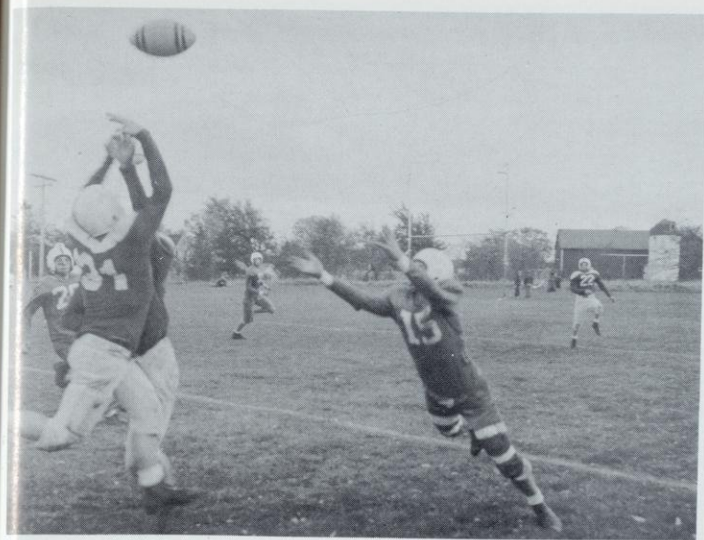
The rest of the season was a misery for the Wolves as one after another of our foes defeated us.

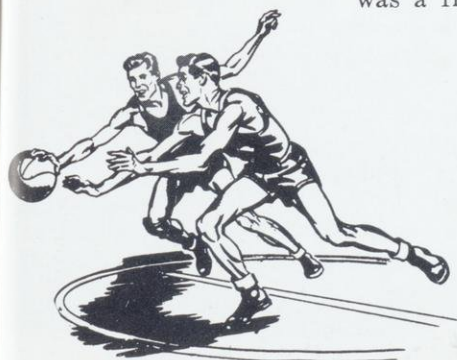
JUNIOR VARSITY
