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### SPECIAL MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE REGENTS

ladison, Wisconsin

Saturday, May 17, 1930, 10:00 A. M.

Held in the office of the Business Manager following a joint session of the finance committee and the executive committee, at which Regents Callahan, Butler, Richardson, Clausen, Mead, Faast, President Frank, Business Manager Phillips and Secretary McCaffrey were present.

A communication was presented from Stuart H. Markham, of Milwaukee, offering to the regents the balance in the Caroline S. Markham Estate, whereupon the following recommendation of the Secretary was adopted:

That the offer of Stuart H. Markham, of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, the surviving trustee of the Estate of Mrs. Caroline S. Markham, to turn over to The Regents of the University of Wisconsin the sum of \$21,977.98, to be held in trust to permanently endow the Albert H. Markham Memorial Traveling Fellowship, be accepted; that the annual net income each year, beginning July 1, 1931, be awarded by the regents as a traveling fellowship to a student in one of the departments of language and literature upon recommendation of a faculty committee representing these departments; that the further offer of Stuart H. Markham of \$1200 to be credited to the University Trust Funds Income to provide for the Albert H. Markham Memorial Traveling Fellowship for the year 1930-31, be accepted.

VOTED, That the Summer Session fees for the Creative Arts course be increased from \$5 to \$10.

The Business Manager presented a proposal from L. B. Allison to operate a summer camp for boys at the University. It was VOTED, That the proposal be declined.

The Business Manager stated that the recent law relating to vacations for civil service employees, fixing the maximum which the regents may grant to three weeks and asked for advice as to what vacations should be allowed the labor class, who have heretofore had vacations of two weeks. It was

VOTED, That the term of vacation to this class be extended to three weeks if, after a study of the cost, it was found that the amount does not exceed \$1000.

The offer of D. W. Moore for the purchase of the late William H. Kipp's interest in the lease on forty acres described as the SE \(\frac{1}{4}\) of the NE \(\frac{1}{4}\) of Section 35, Township 5 North, Range 8 West, Grady County, Oklahoma, for \(\frac{1}{2}20,000\), was discussed. Professor Twenhofel attended the joint session and advised with the regents on the matter.

Upon motion of Regent Butler, seconded by Regent Richardson,

it was

VOTED, That the offer be declined, subject to the opinion of the Attorney General as to whether the lease may be retained by the regents rather than converted into money, and subject to determination of whether Oklahoma laws impose onerous or impossible obligations upon the regents in event of the depletion of the gas wells.
