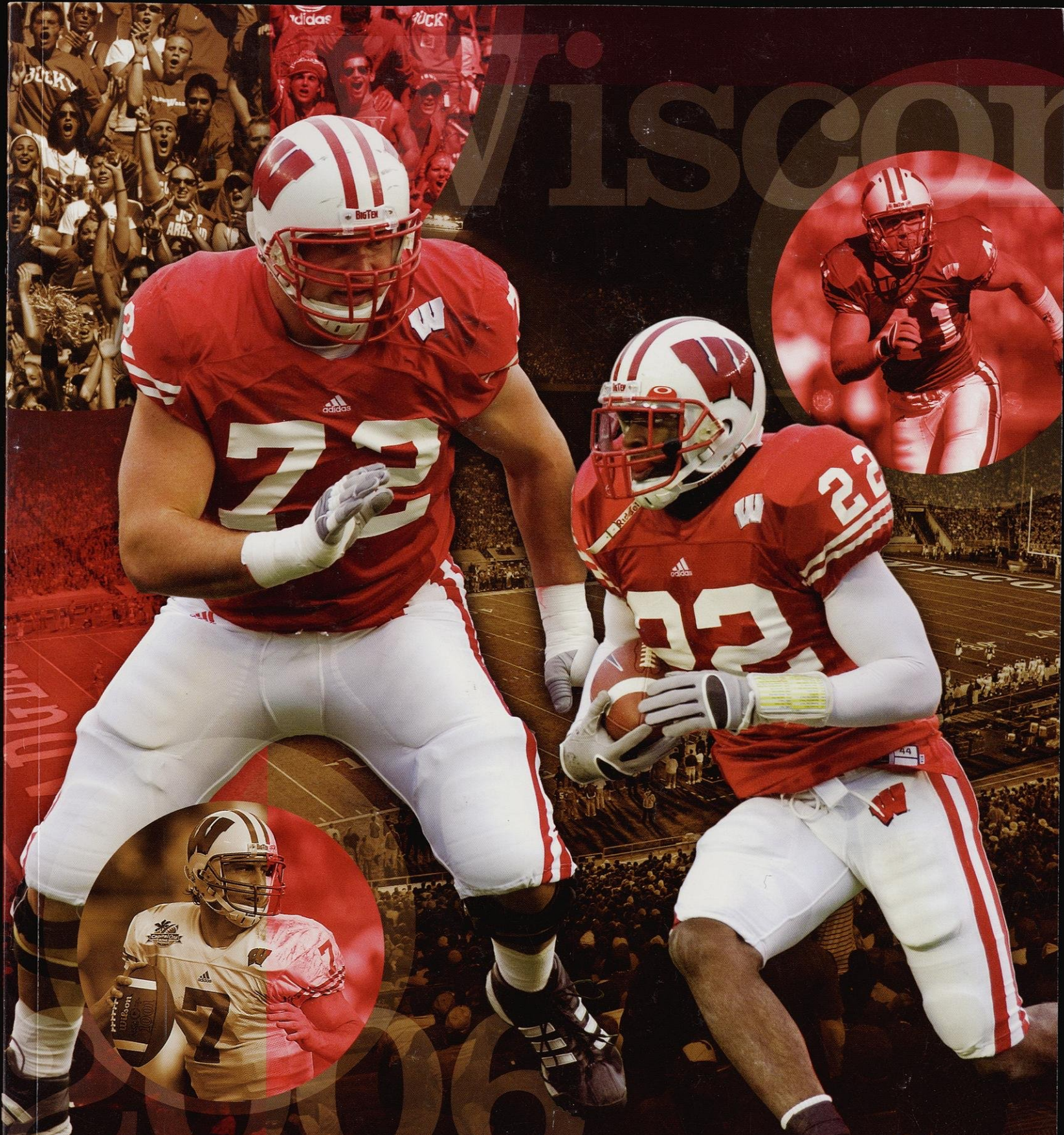

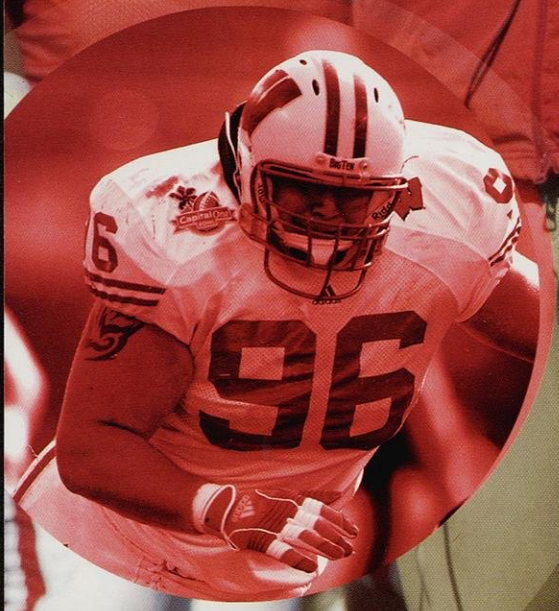
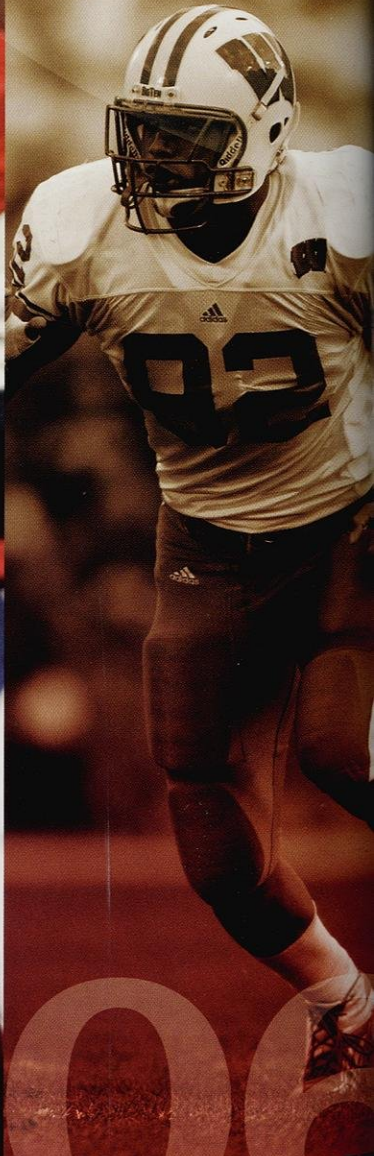

THIS IS WISCONSIN FOOTBALL

Sports Illustrated on Campus said last fall that Wisconsin has the best gameday atmosphere in the Big Ten Conference. That's quite a statement, but that may not go far enough. The fact is there may not be a better way to experience college football than spending a day at Wisconsin's fabled Camp Randall Stadium.

First of all, Wisconsin fans love a good time and they love to watch the Badgers win. There are plenty of both at Camp Randall. Badger backers arrive early - they are legendary tailgaters - and stay late, with thousands remaining inside the stadium to sing and dance as the UW Marching Band conducts its festive "5th Quarter" routine.

And there is nothing like the often-imitated-but-never-duplicated madness that is "Jump Around." Between the third and fourth quarters of every home game,

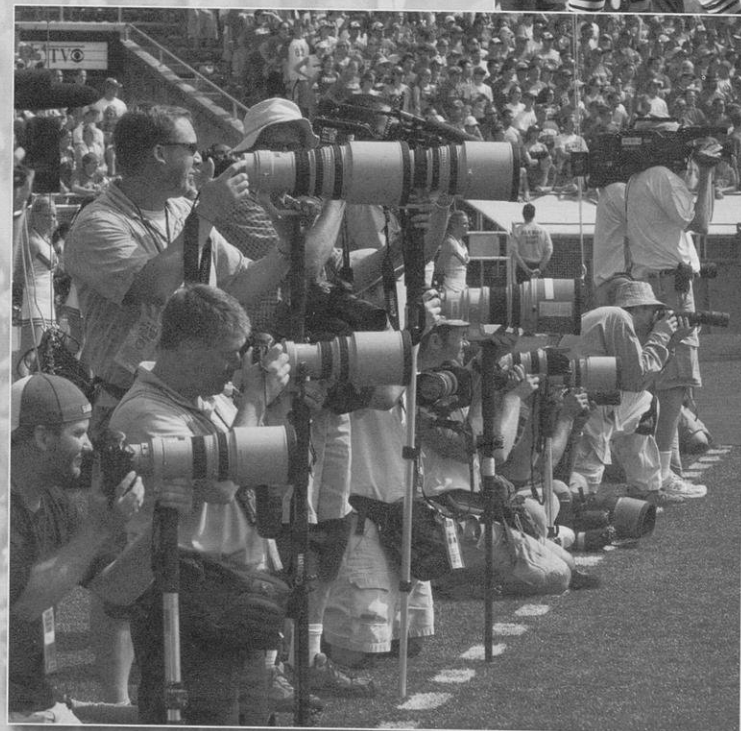
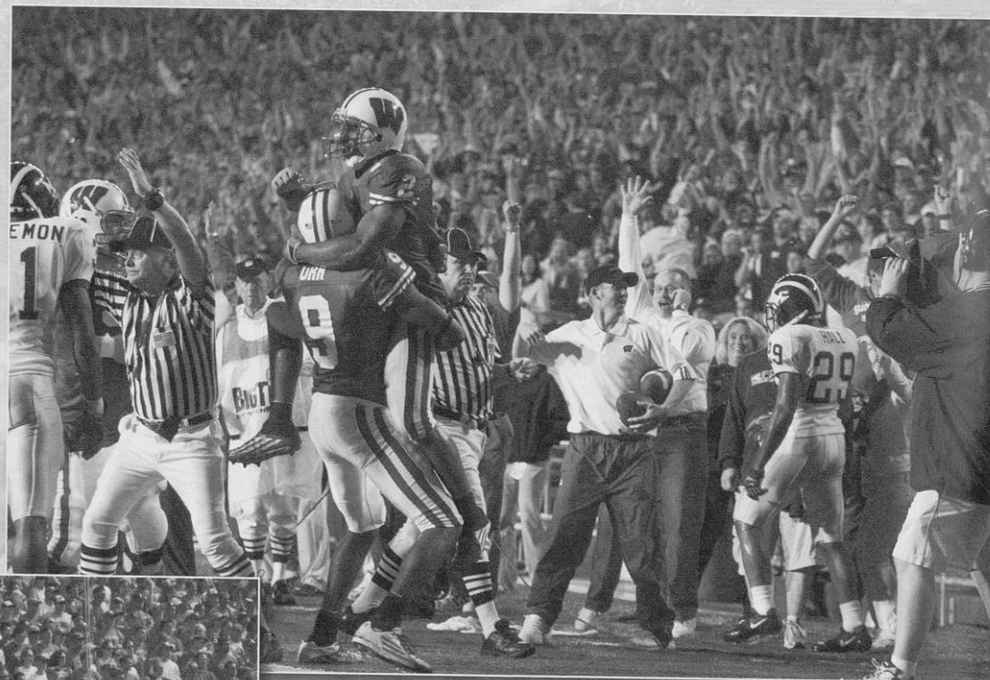
thousands of Wisconsin fans, band members (and sometimes even players) jump to the 1990s hip-hop tune by House of Pain. The stadium rocks and rolls and shakes and bakes!

Badger fans are also loyal. Camp Randall Stadium has witnessed crowds of at least 70,000 for 81 consecutive home games and 71 of them have been sellouts. The stadium record was set at the 2005 Iowa game when 83,184 fans packed the facility for former head coach Barry Alvarez's final game.

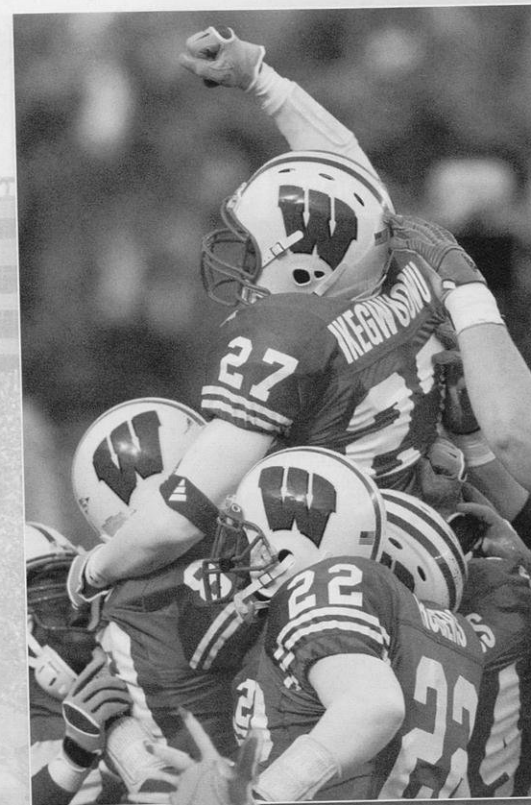
A Wisconsin football gameday experience is a tradition that has been handed down from generation to generation of Badger fans. From the cooking of brats to the marching of the band, from the singing of "Varsity" and the "Bud Song" to the chants of "Rooooonnn Daaaynnne!", from the ghosts of Crazylegs and the Horse to more recent heroes like Alvarez, Panos and Evans, the Badger gameday experience is a happening that any fan of college football will relish.

Since 1992, Wisconsin has compiled a 62-23-3 (.722) record at Camp Randall Stadium. In 2004 and 2005, the Badgers put together an 11-game home winning streak, the school's longest in the modern era.

Since the expansion of Camp Randall Stadium prior to the 2004 season, UW has averaged 82,460 fans at its home games. The Badgers have ranked 13th nationally in attendance in each of the past two seasons.



GAMEDAY!



Over the past two seasons, Wisconsin is 11-1 in games at Camp Randall Stadium. The Badgers have outscored their opponents 380-171 in those games for an average margin of victory of 17.4 points.

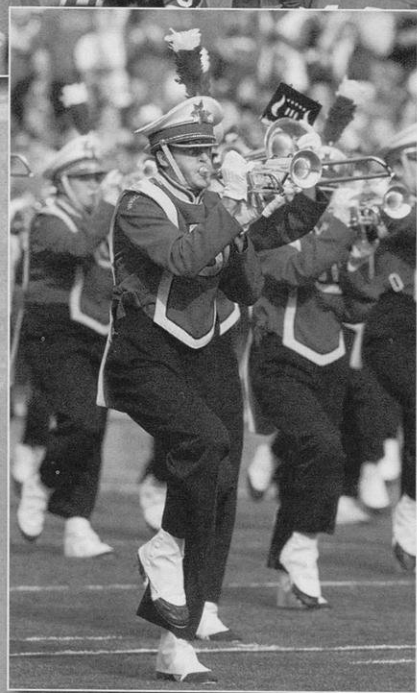

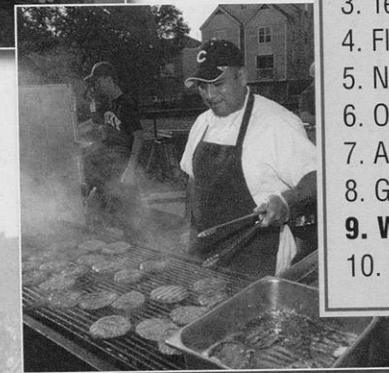

Bowling with the Badgers

UW consistently plays in - AND WINS - major bowl games!

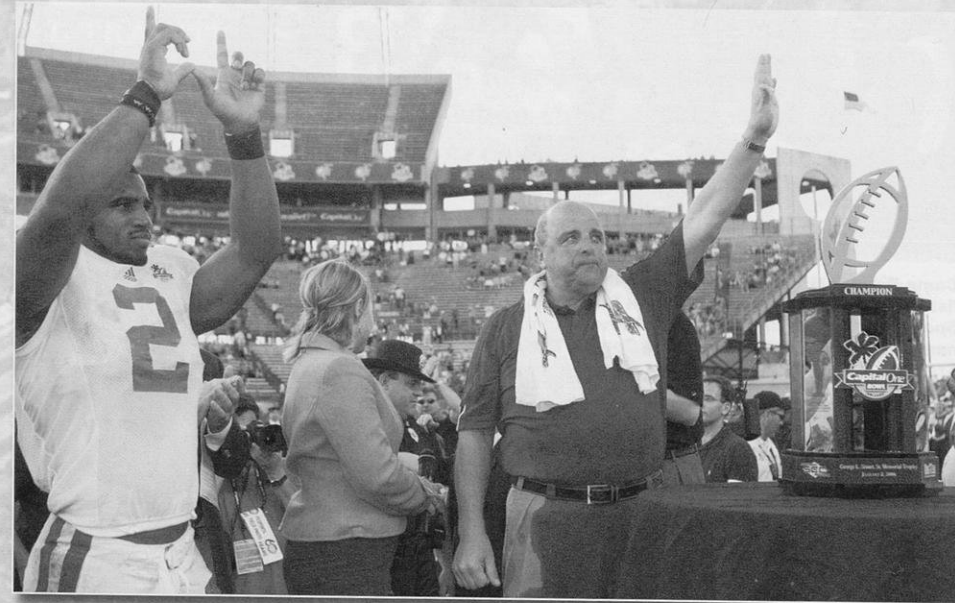
Over the last 13 seasons, no team in the country has won more bowl games than Wisconsin. The Badgers' eight bowl victories over that span ties them with Boston College, Nebraska and Ohio State. UW has participated in 11 bowl games over the past 13 seasons, a mark matched by only Ohio State and Michigan among Big Ten teams. During that time, the Badgers have made seven appearances in January bowl games, including three Rose Bowl wins.

Last season, Wisconsin played in its second consecutive January bowl game, trouncing seventh-ranked Auburn 24-10 to capture the Capital One Bowl. That contest marked the final game in the head coaching career of Barry Alvarez.

It was fitting that Alvarez's last game was a bowl victory since he led UW to an 8-3 (.727) record in bowl games. That is the best bowl winning percentage in NCAA history among coaches with at least 11 bowl appearances.

Bowl games with the Badgers are also a big hit with Wisconsin's renowned fans. In the past decade, thousands of fans have traveled to watch the Badgers in prime winter destinations like California, Florida, Arizona and Texas.

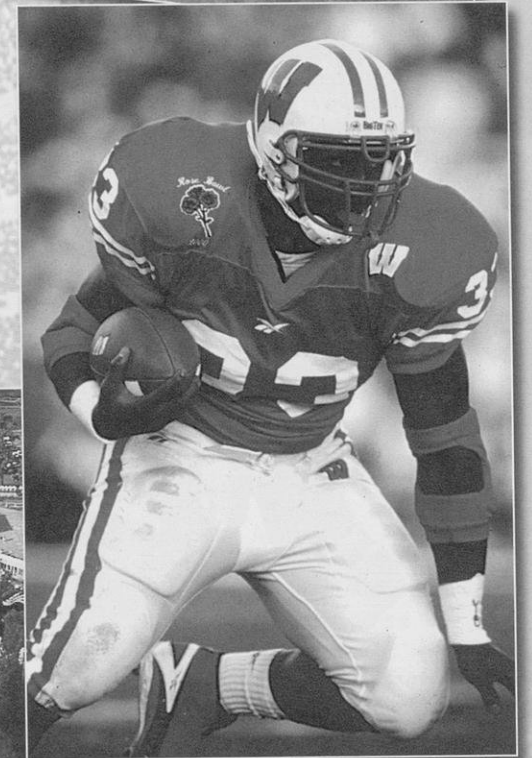
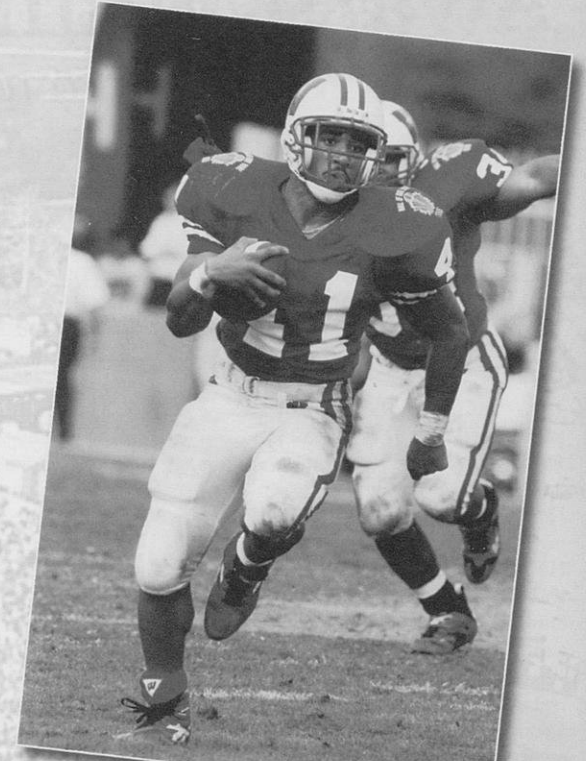

Award Winners

Badgers recognized among the nation's best!

Every great program is built on the shoulders of outstanding players. It is no different at Wisconsin. With the remarkable success of the football team in recent years has come national recognition for a number of Badger players.

The most well-known of those players is former running back Ron Dayne. The NCAA's all-time leading rusher, Dayne won the 1999 Heisman Trophy in a landslide, outdistancing runner-up Joe Hamilton of Georgia Tech by more than 1,000 points. As a senior, Dayne also won the Maxwell, Walter Camp and Doak Walker Awards.

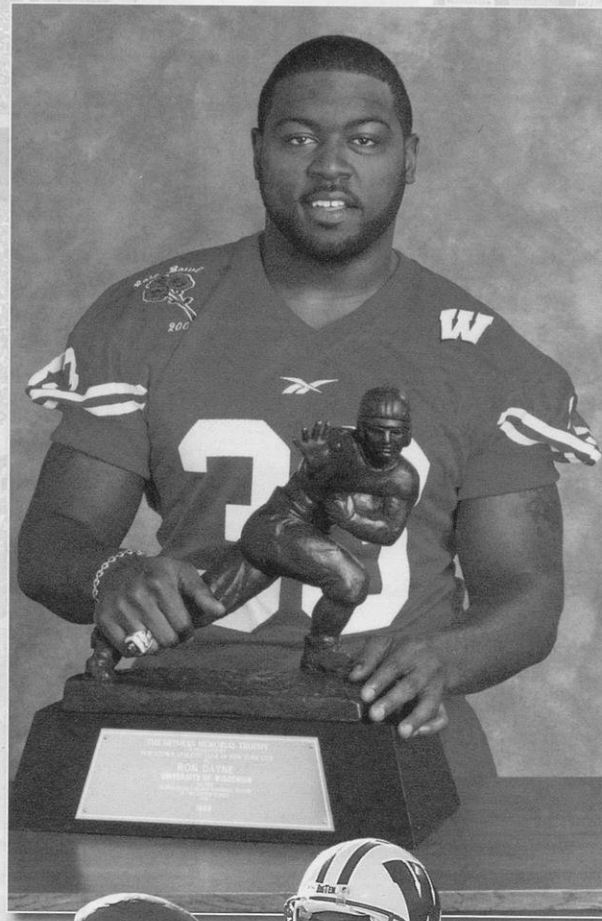
Dayne was the second Heisman Trophy winner from UW as Alan Ameche took home the award in 1954.

In recent years, Badger players have been fixtures on national award lists. UW players have been finalists for the Rimington Trophy (best center), Outland Trophy (interior lineman), Lombardi Award (lineman), Chuck Bednarick Award (defen-

sive player), Bronko Nagurski Trophy (defensive player), Ted Hendricks Award (defensive end), Fred Biletnikoff Award (receiver), Lou Groza Award (placekicker), Mosi Tatupu Award (special teams) and Ronnie Lott Trophy (defensive player).

In addition, Badger players walked away with two major awards in 2000. Cornerback Jamar Fletcher earned the Jim Thorpe Award as the nation's best defensive back while Kevin Stemke won the inaugural Ray Guy Award, given to the nation's best collegiate punter.

This year a number of UW players are in contention for major awards. Offensive tackle Joe Thomas, a preseason *Playboy* All-American, can be found on both the Lombardi Award and Outland Trophy watch lists. Punter Ken DeBauche was a second-team All-American last year and is one of the top candidates for the Ray Guy Award. QB John Stocco, is on the Maxwell Award watch list and DE Matt Shaughnessy is on the Ted Hendricks Award watch list.

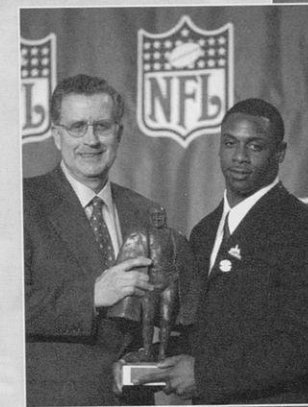
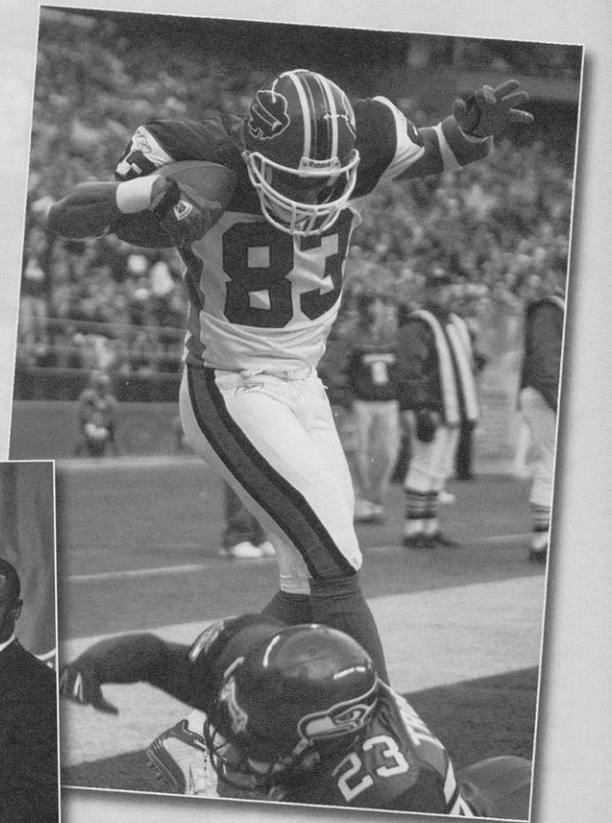


Since 1999, seven Badgers have been selected in the first round of the NFL Draft. That is tied for second-most in the Big Ten behind Ohio State.

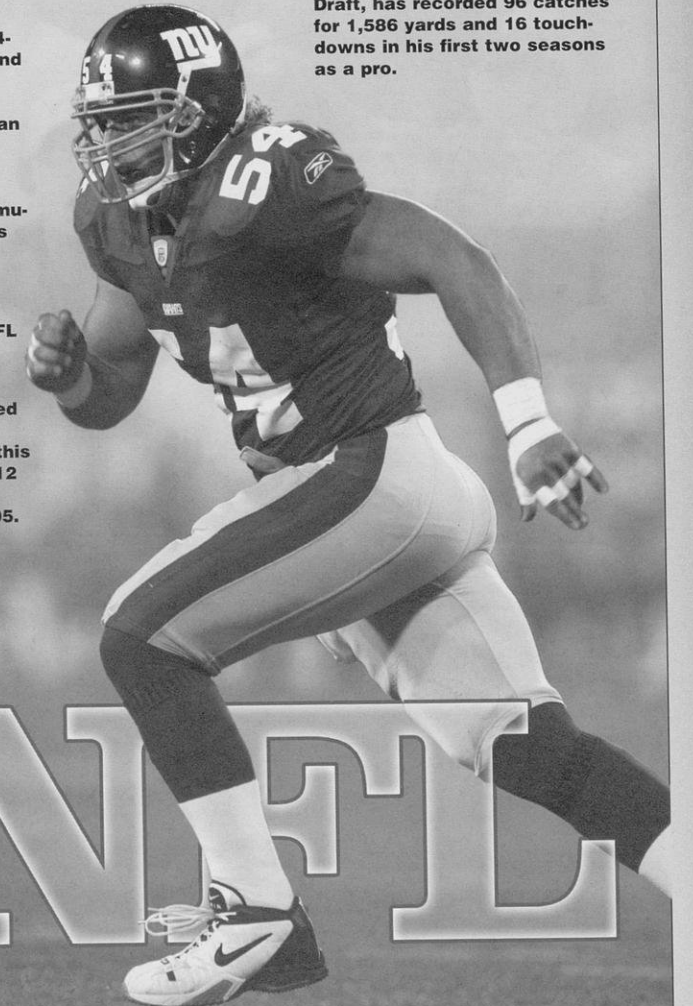

Prime Time Players

Wisconsin is a fixture on the national television scene

Over the past eight seasons, 93 of Wisconsin's 101 football games have been televised. That's an average of just one non-televised game per season. Of those 93 broadcast games, 76 have been televised nationally by either ABC, CBS, ESPN, ESPN2, FOX, or FOX Sports Net.

In the last four years, the numbers are staggering: 52 total games, 50 televised games, 44 national television appearances. That means 84.6 percent of the Badgers' games in the last four seasons have appeared on either ESPN (21), ESPN2 (13), ABC (9), or FOX Sports Net (1).

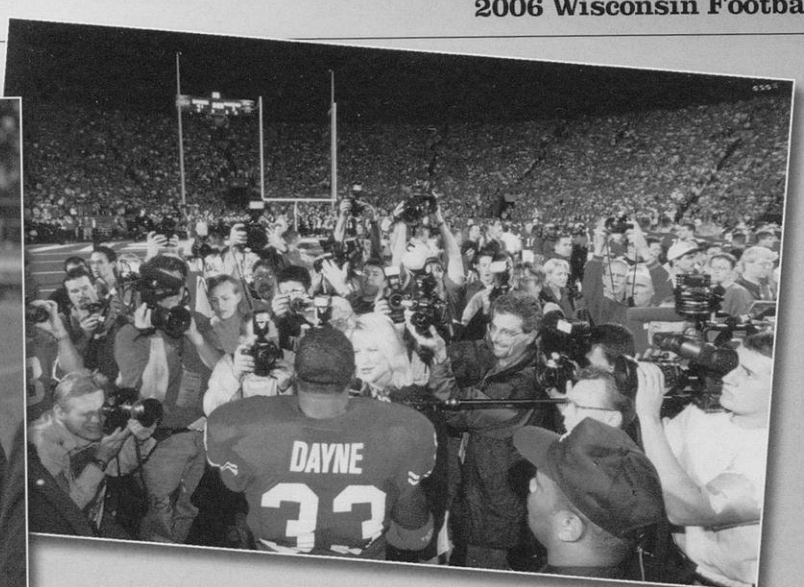
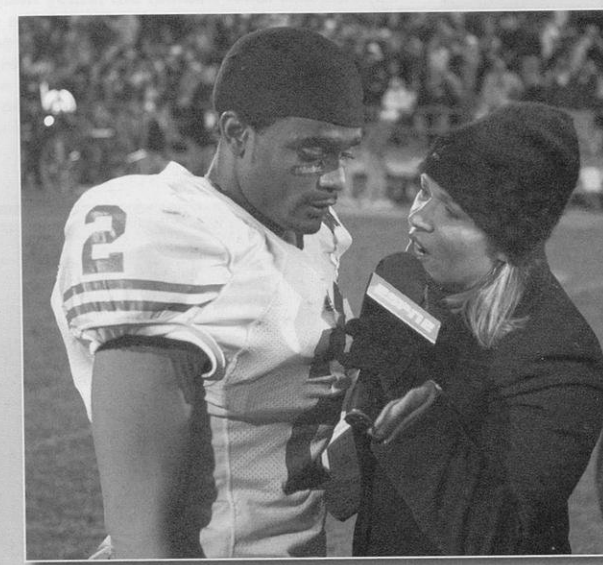
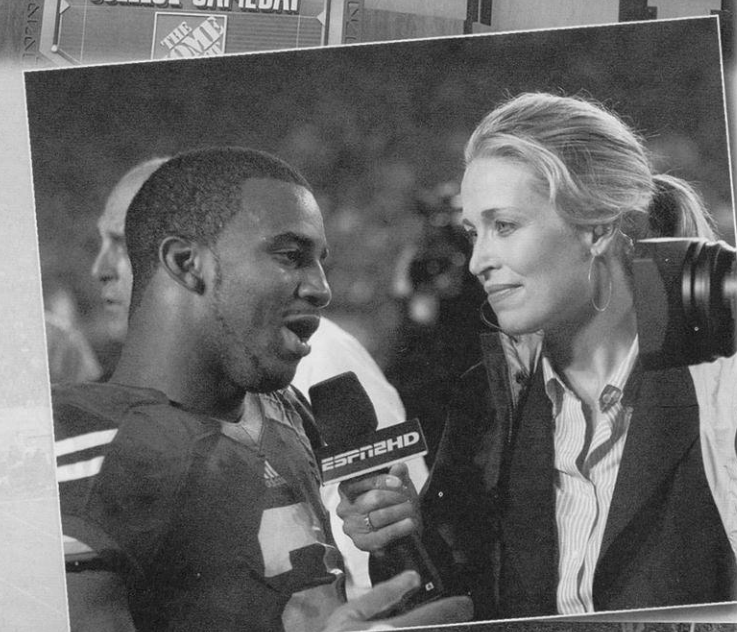
In those four seasons, UW has racked up some impressive numbers on television. The Badgers are 13-8 on ESPN, 10-3 on ESPN2 and 1-0 on FOX Sports Net.

When Big Ten fans aren't packing stadiums, they're watching the most comprehensive college football package on television. A partnership with ABC, ESPN, ESPN2 and ESPN Regional will allow the Big Ten to televise a record number of games again this fall. More than 90 percent of all Big Ten games will be shown on live TV in 2006, making the Big Ten the most-watched conference in the nation.

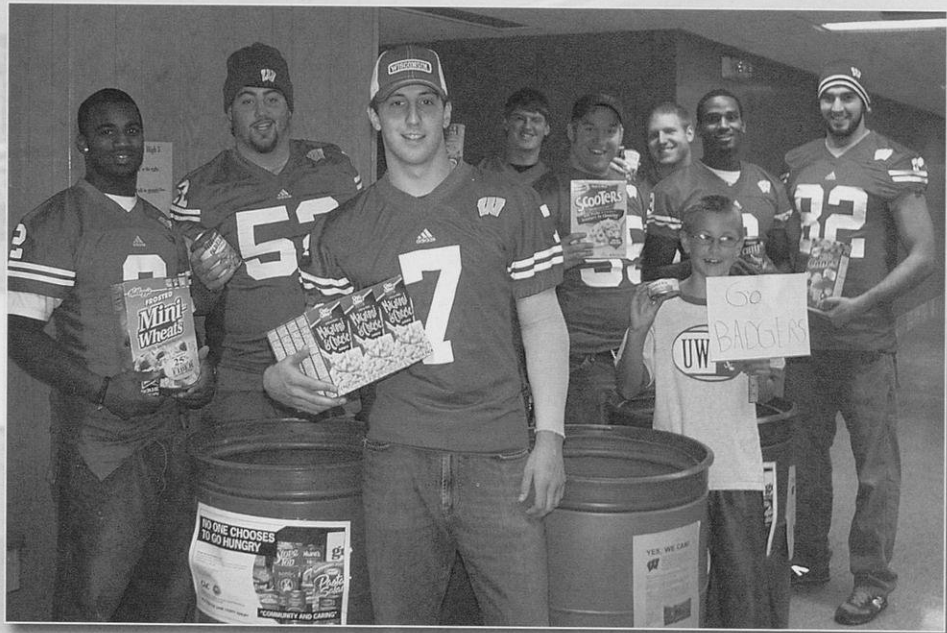
Badgers Giving Back

The Wisconsin Department of Athletics has a number of teams that regularly contribute to the city via outreach programs. The Madison community is truly supportive of the UW-Madison athletic teams and their student-athletes.

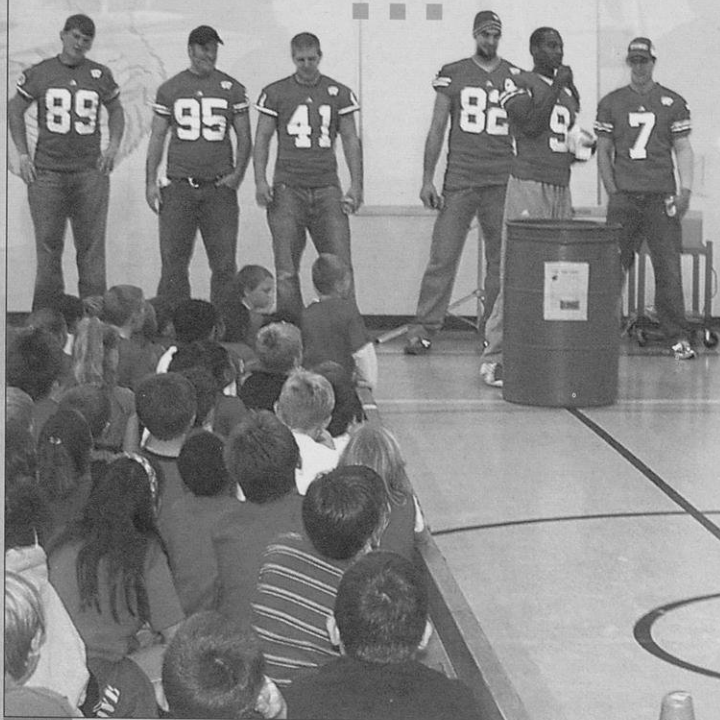
In appreciation for that support, many student-athletes volunteer frequently in community service projects. Every season, the football team works together on a community service project to give back to Madison.

Last season, seniors Jonathan Orr and Joel Nellis helped organize the "Yes, We Can" campaign. The UW football team, the Madison School District's Elementary Schools and the Community Action Coalition of South Central Wisconsin teamed up to assist the hungry in the Madison community.

From mid-September through mid-October, Madison Elementary School students were encouraged to bring canned goods or other non-perishable food items to school with them. Badger football players then visited the schools with the largest donations and, with the assistance of the Community Action Coalition For South Central Wisconsin, Inc., helped collect the food and deliver it for distribution to Dane County food pantries. The elementary schools that participated collected a combined 3,200 pounds of food, enough for approximately 2,500 meals.

In recent years, the football team has participated in a Habitat for Humanity project. In the spring of 2005, about 90 players and staff split up and performed tasks ranging from landscaping to house building on several sites in a relatively new neighborhood called Twin Oaks, located close to Stoughton Road just south of Madison.

UW hosted its annual "Kid's Fair" indoors on the turf at the McClain Center prior to the football team's Spring Game on April 22, 2006. The "Kid's Fair" includes interactive games, displays, autographs, photos with Bucky, and a number of athletic skills stations. Many Badger sports are represented at the fair and kids have an opportunity to meet current Badger student-athletes and coaches.



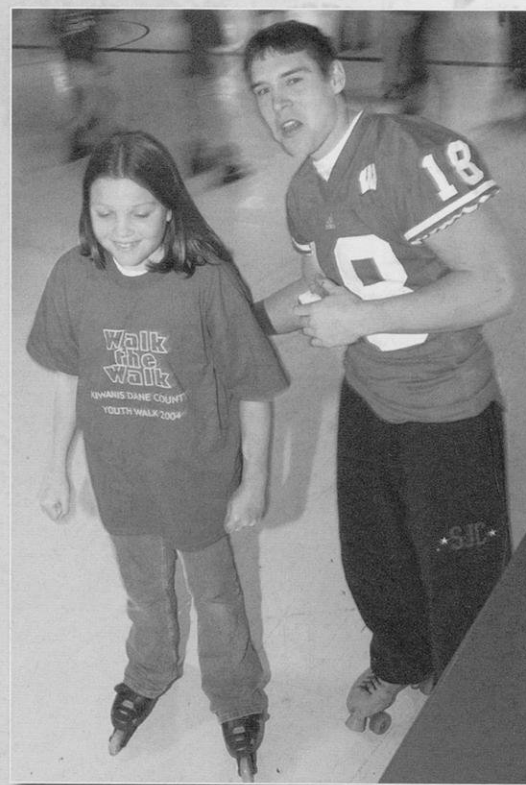

The Badgers also take time out on the road

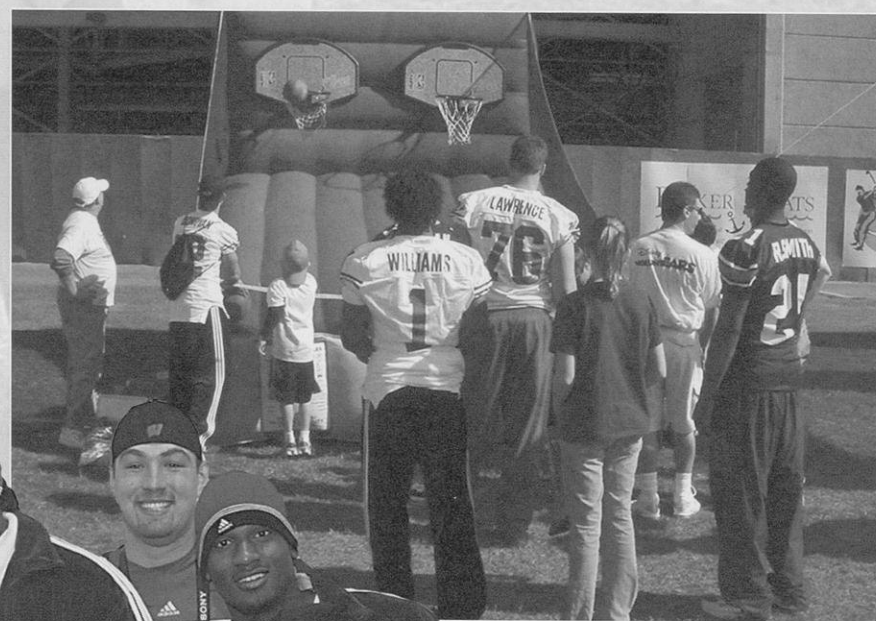

The Badgers don't just get involved in community service projects while in Madison; they also take time out while on the road, usually during bowl trips. Some of the events UW has participated in are kids' festivals, visits to local children's hospitals, as well as local elementary schools.

Badger fans got into the charitable act last fall in the wake of Hurricane Katrina. They helped raise \$59,478.54 for American Red Cross hurricane relief efforts during the Bowling Green game on Sept 3. A group of 40 Fan Ambassadors, along with another 25 student-athletes and staff members, collected approximately \$24,478.54 in donations from fans outside Camp Randall Stadium. The UW Athletic Department/National W Club also contributed \$35,000 as a portion of concession stand sales.

Along with the money raised at the season-opener, the Badgers invited approximately 20 families to a football practice and to dine with the team. The families were originally from Louisiana and had moved to the Madison area because of the hurricane. They were also presented with UW apparel as a welcoming gesture.

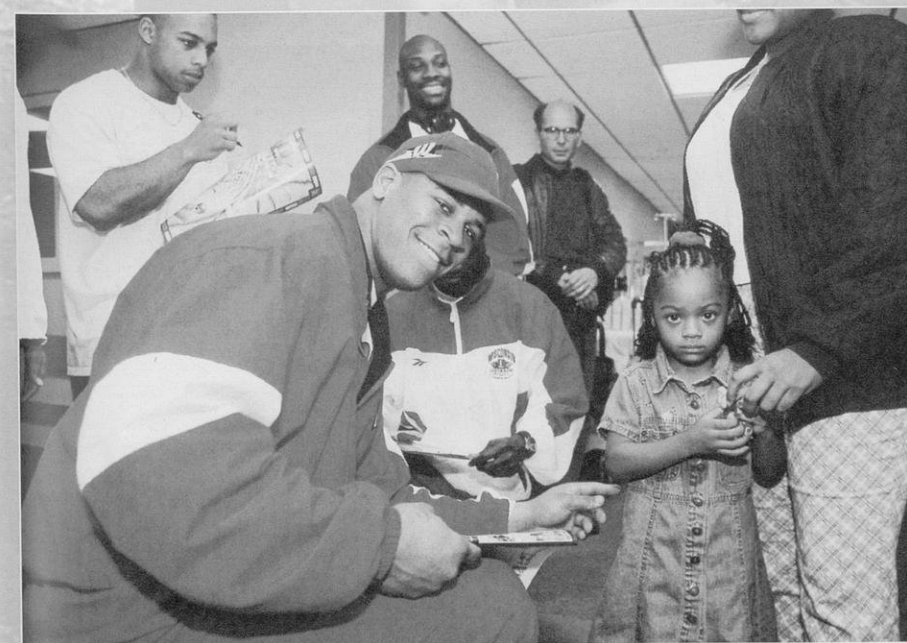

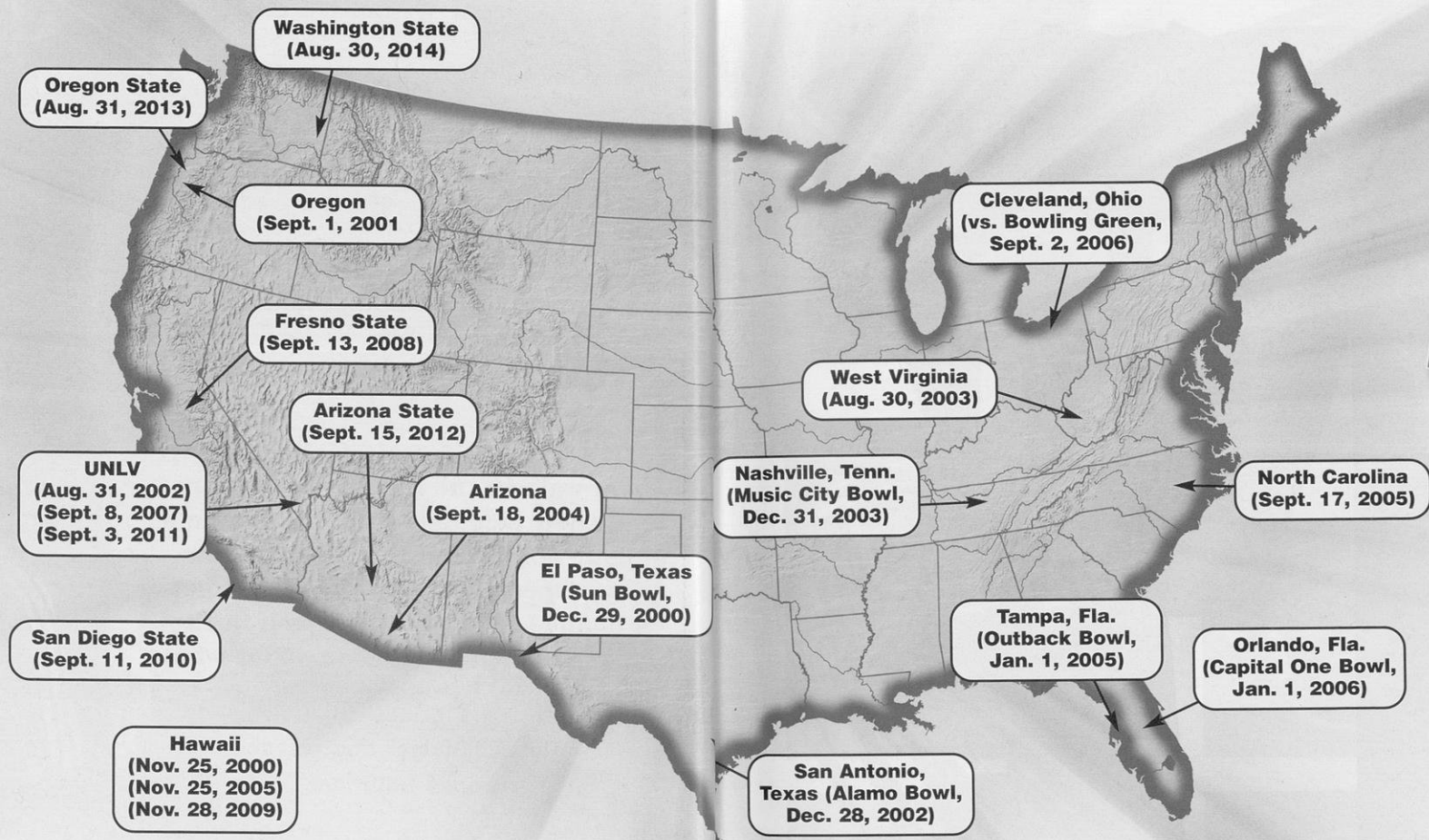
UW travels the country to fill out its schedule

The Wisconsin football team travels to a number of great locales and historic stadiums to play its games. In addition to all the wonderful college towns and famous stadiums around the Big Ten, the Badgers' non-conference schedule is filled with tremendous road trips to all regions of the country.

Within the past few seasons, UW has made trips to Hawaii, Las Vegas, Arizona, North Carolina, Oregon and West Virginia for road games. Coming up on the Badgers' schedule in the next few seasons are road trips back to Hawaii (2009) and UNLV (2007 and 2011), as well as games in Cleveland (vs. Bowling Green in 2006), at Fresno State (2008), at San Diego State (2010), at Arizona State (2012) at Oregon State (2013) and at Washington State (2014).

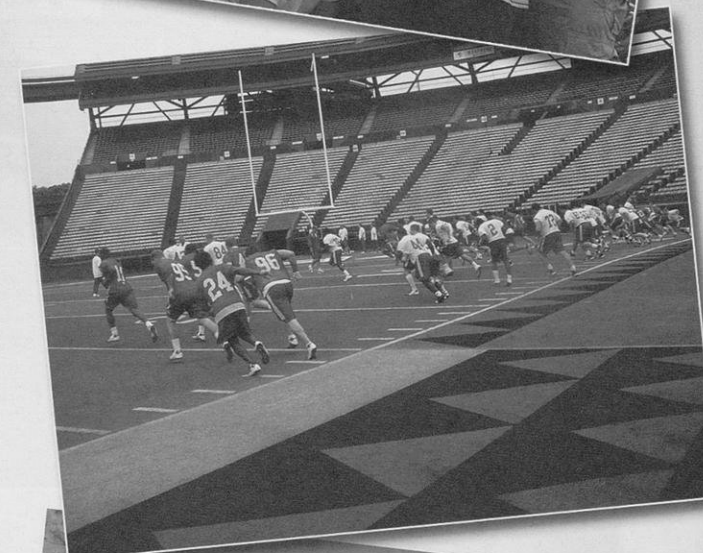
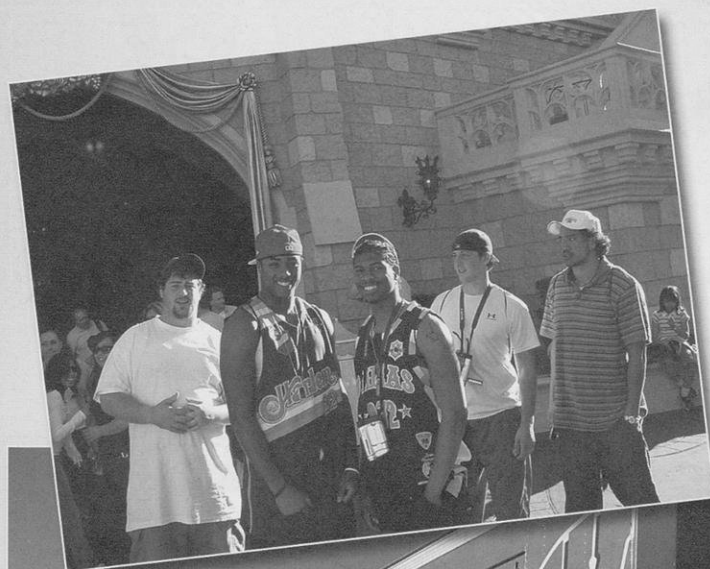
In addition to scheduled non-conference games, Wisconsin has made a number of great trips to bowl destinations recently. Just last season, UW spent a week in Orlando, Fla., at the Capital One Bowl. That was the Badgers' second consecutive winter trip to Florida after playing in the Outback Bowl in Tampa the year before.

In 2003, UW spent late December in Nashville, Tenn., at the Music City Bowl. The year before, Wisconsin and its fans invaded San Antonio, Texas, for the Alamo Bowl. Among the other bowl destinations the Badgers have visited recently are El Paso, Texas, (2000 Sun Bowl) and Pasadena, Calif. (1999 and 2000 Rose Bowl).

Camp Randall Stadium

One of college football's finest facilities – Camp Randall Stadium – completed a four-year, \$109 million renovation prior to the 2005 football season. The improvements are plentiful: new FieldTurf, new suites and club seats, new video scoreboards, new offices, increased seating capacity and better fan amenities like concession areas, restrooms and traffic flow.

The enhancements have not detracted from Camp Randall's charm but rather the stadium's character has been enhanced greatly by the improvements, ensuring that future generations of Badger fans will have a first-rate facility at which to watch the Badgers play on Saturdays.

Camp Randall was originally used as a Civil War training site. In fact, some 70,000 soldiers trained at the camp, which also included a hospital and a prison for Confederate soldiers on its grounds. Named for Alexander Randall, the state of Wisconsin's first wartime governor, Camp Randall Stadium opened in 1917 and was officially dedicated when the Badgers defeated Minnesota, 10-7, on Nov. 3.

The Wisconsin football offices are located on the eighth floor of Camp Randall and offer an excellent view of the inside of the stadium. The football offices were completed in the summer of 2004 during the recent renovation of Camp Randall.

Beyond the stunning view of the playing field, the football offices also house Wisconsin's three most recent Big Ten championship trophies commemorating league titles in 1993, 1998 and 1999 in the center of the lobby. Display cases recognize the Badgers' bowl game victories with the three Rose Bowl trophies from 1994, 1999 and 2000 in the center; UW's two Heisman Trophies; other major awards; and some of Wisconsin's greatest former players such as Ron Dayne, Paul Gruber and Pat Richter.

The football offices are the base of operations for the coaches and offer several meeting rooms to break down film and construct game plans. The coaches are surrounded by the rich history and tradition of the program as they work to bring in the next Big Ten title and mold the next Badger legend.

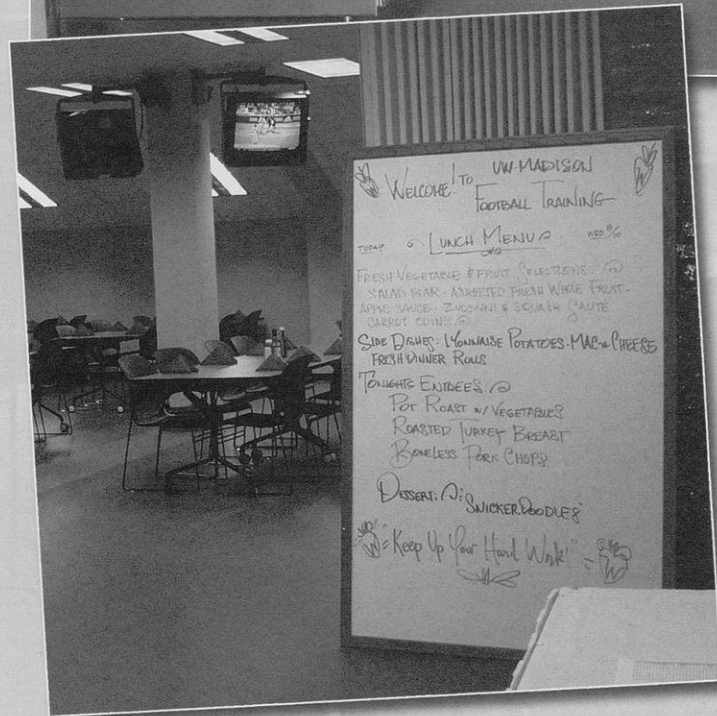

Quality food and service is provided by the Department of Athletics' food and beverage staff.

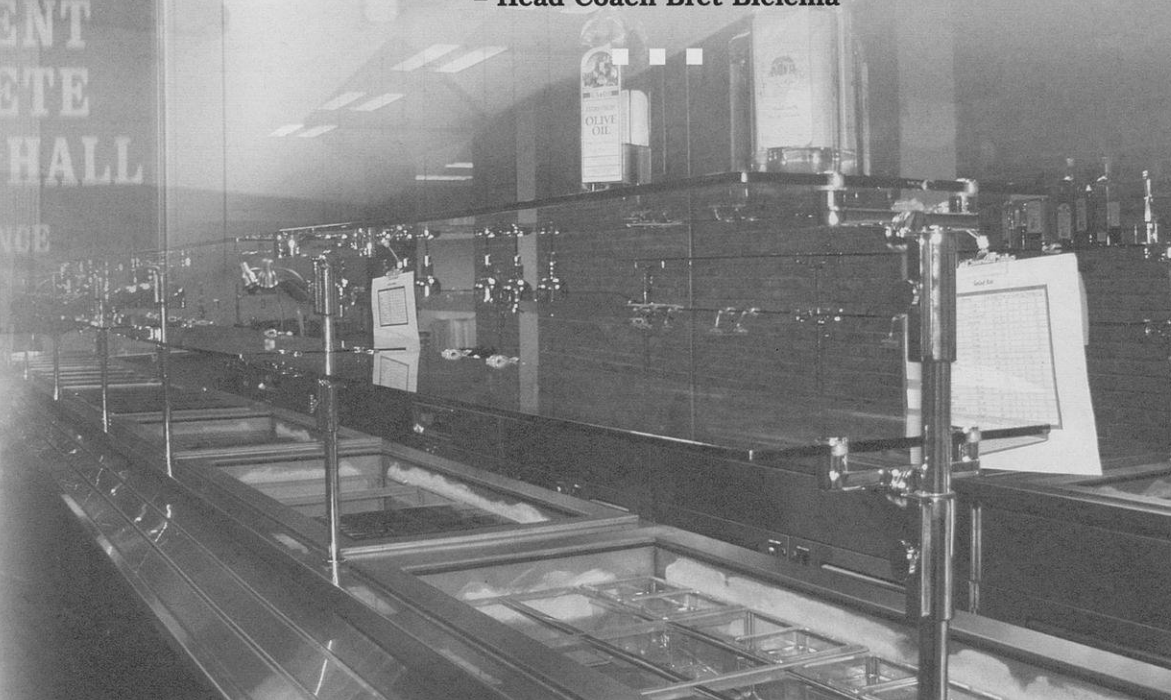

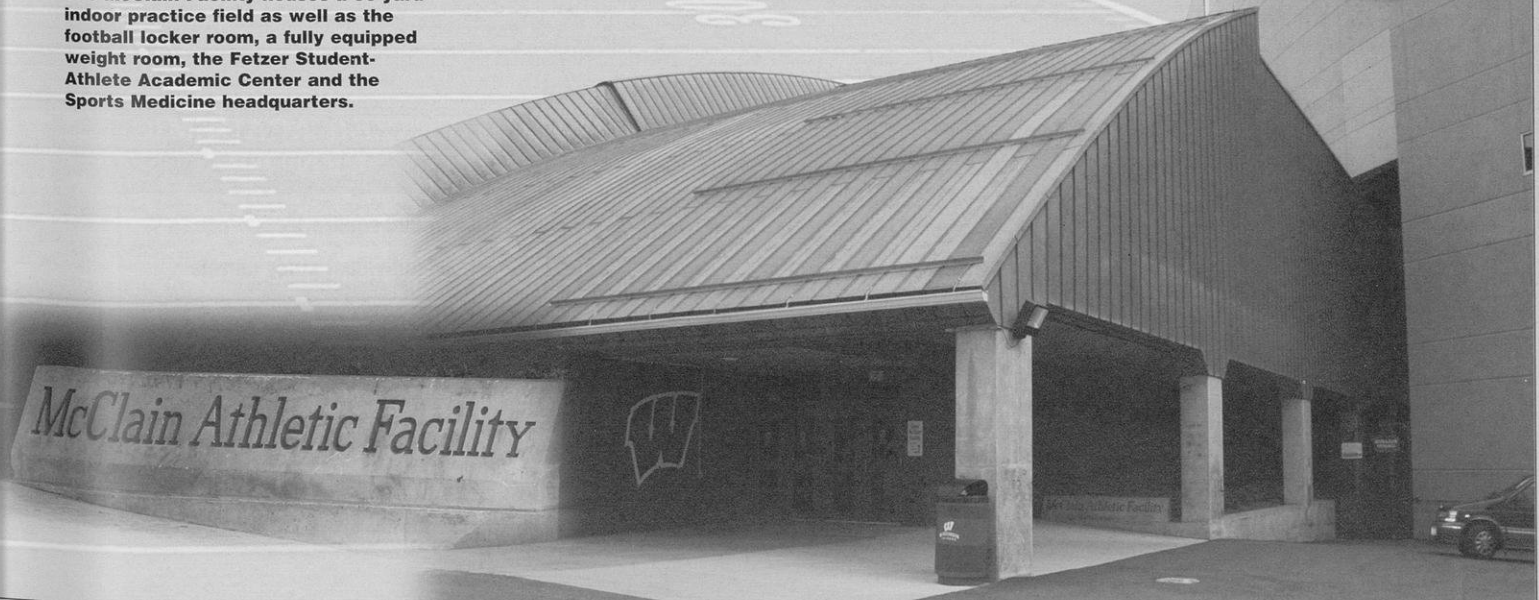
The Dave McClain Athletic Facility is the heart of the Wisconsin football program. Located adjacent to the northeast side of Camp Randall Stadium, the McClain Facility features a 90-yard indoor practice field with artificial turf and a ceiling high enough for kicking. The lower level of the complex houses the football locker room, a fully equipped weight room, the Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center and the Sports Medicine headquarters. The second level includes a 150-seat theater-style auditorium, classrooms for individual position meetings and a players' lounge. The 166,264-square-foot facility was completed in 1988 and is named in honor of former UW football coach Dave McClain.

Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center

The Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center, named after Wade and Betty Fetzer, provides for the academic needs of more than 700 student-athletes at the University of Wisconsin. The center is home to both the academic advising and learning support staffs of the Office of Academic Services.

The 15,000-square-foot, state-of-the-art facility is fully wireless and features a large open study area that is surrounded by nine small to mid-sized classrooms, a 55-seat auditorium, staff offices, a computer lab and a canteen area. The open study area has 30 individual carrels as well as several study tables. The state-of-the-art computer lab, under coordinator Jim Eisenmann, allows student-athletes to work on assignments, access online library or course materials and check their e-mail. The computer lab also has several checkout laptop computers for student-athletes who are traveling for competitions and other team-related activities.

The center features a staff of five advisors, four learning specialists, a life skills coordinator and a tutor coordinator. The staff monitors academic eligibility and progress while providing study groups for selected courses, access to tutors, and hosting a variety of academic and career planning events throughout the year.

Under the supervision of assistant athletic director Doug Tiedt, the advising staff of Chris Butler, Jerry Darda, Mary Weaver-Klees and Alan Zussman as well as tutor coordinator Jill Hadfield work along with learning specialists Dan Ott, Toni O'Keefe and Nancy Gatyas to render quality academic and personal support to student-athletes and assist coaches in providing the best possible collegiate experience. CHAMPS/Life Skills Coordinator Kelli Richards oversees programs in career and personal development as well as community outreach.

The staff, including program assistant Nancy Kreklow, has a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all university departments.

Student-athletes can drop in before practice or between classes to study or meet with the advisors and learning specialists. Sessions are offered on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the student-athlete. Athletes are degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The staff takes a personal approach to each student-athlete in determining his or her individual needs, personal or academic.

Student-athletes at Wisconsin receive recognition for outstanding academics in a number of ways on the national, conference and university level. The annual Student-Athlete Academic banquet recognizes student-athletes off the field of play by honoring over 200 athletes with a 3.5 or better grade point average. Additionally, the annual CHAMPS Cup competition recognizes the teams that succeed academically and are involved in community and campus events.

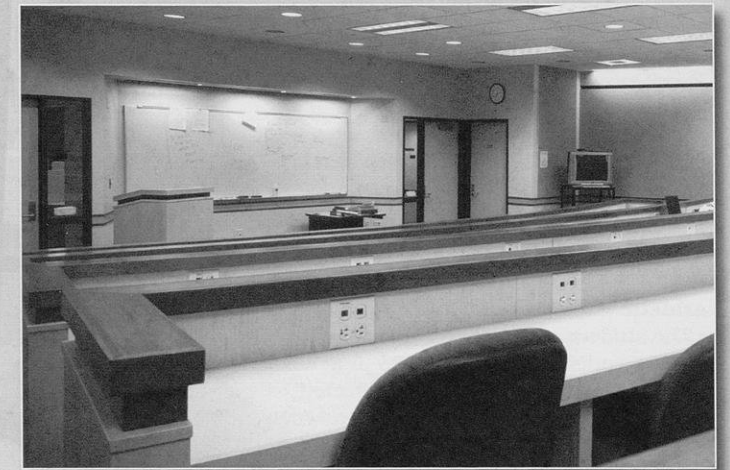

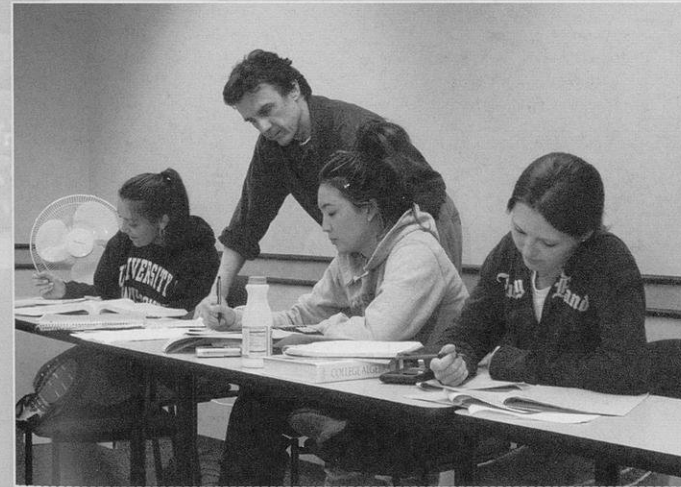

UW CHAMPS: A Program of Excellence

CHAMPS (Challenging Athletes Minds for Personal Success) is a total development program that uses athletics as a preparation for success in life. Under the direction of Kelli Richards, the goal of the CHAMPS program is to support student development initiatives that enhance the quality of the student-athlete experience within the university setting.

The UW's CHAMPS program was selected as one of four 2005 Program of Excellence recipients. The award is presented annually to schools that have displayed a highly effective and pervasive program benefiting their student-athletes in the five components of the program.

CHAMPS provides support and opportunities for UW student-athletes in the following areas:

Athletic Excellence

- The student-athlete advisory committee (SAAC) works with the CHAMPS program to make sure all of the student-athletes' needs and concerns are being addressed.

Academic Excellence

- Through the Fetzer Academic Center, advisors, tutors, mentors and learning specialists are available to all student-athletes.

- A one-credit, 10-week course available to freshman and sophomore student-athletes discusses issues that many incoming college students face in their transition, such as time management, alcohol abuse and nutrition.

- Scholarships and internships are available through the NCAA for student-athletes continuing their education.

- The Academic Excellence Banquet is held each April to recognize the many academic achievements of our student-athletes.

Personal Development

- The UW CHAMPS program requires all student-athletes to attend three personal development activities each year.

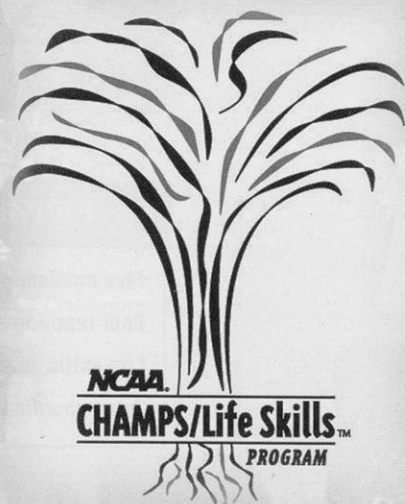
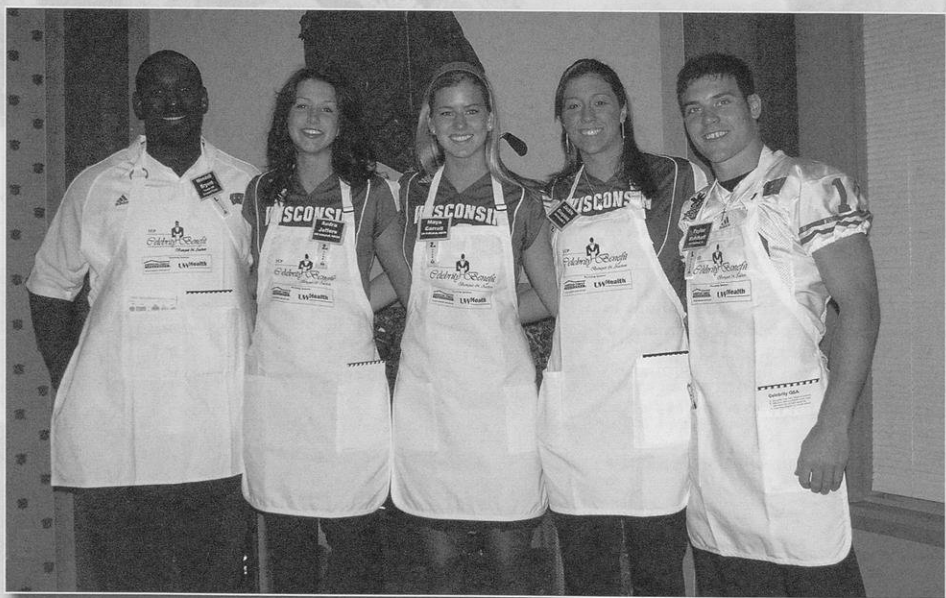
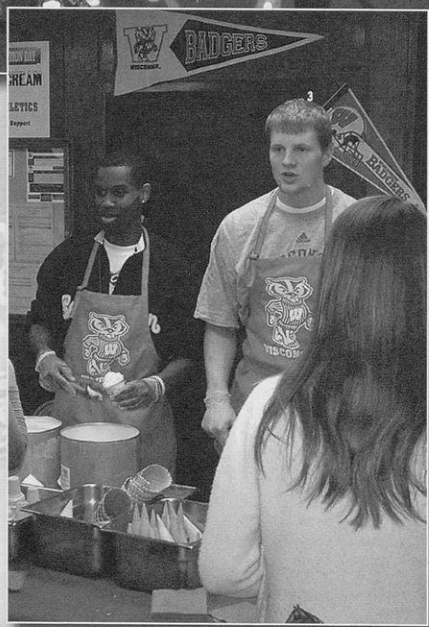
- Workshops are offered for teams as well as any student-athlete on topics such as safe sex, fiscal responsibility, alcohol, peak performance, multiculturalism and many others.

Career Development

- Workshops on various career topics are offered to student-athletes throughout the year. Topics include writing resumes and cover letters, interviewing tips, networking strategies, dining etiquette and job search strategies.
- Career assessment and career counseling is available for individuals as they work to declare a major and gain experience within their career field.
- UW Athletics partners with the National W Club and the Wisconsin Alumni Association as well as local corporations to assist student-athletes in finding jobs and internships as well as assisting in networking and career opportunities.
- UW Athletics hosts Career Night every January. This event is a networking dinner and career fair for all junior and senior student-athletes.
- Corporations also host information sessions and screening interviews within the Fetzer Center for student-athletes.

Community Service

- The CHAMPS coordinator organizes individual and team community service requests.
- Opportunities for involvement through one-time events as well as on-going volunteer opportunities in the Madison area.
- UW has structured programs, such as Bookin' It With Bucky. Through this program, athletes are scheduled to read in fourth grade Madison classrooms to encourage literacy and continued learning.

CHAMPS Cup

The CHAMPS Cup is an all-sport competition, rewarding teams who exemplify all aspects of the student-athlete.

Student-athletes earn points for their teams in six categories:

Academic Achievement
Teams receive points for their team GPA, scoring at least 925 mark in the Academic Progress Rate (APR) as well as points for individual academic all-conference honors.

Athletic Achievement
Teams that place in the top three of their conference are awarded points based on their finish. Conference champions—100 points; second place—90 points; third place—80 points.

Personal Enhancement:
Teams or individuals earn points for attending any CHAMPS/Life Skills on-campus event related to personal development.

Community Outreach:
Community service done as a team, with other student-athletes or individually, will be rewarded.

Badger Pride:
Points are awarded to teams that go the extra mile to support their fellow student-athletes by attending each other's sporting events. Each team will choose one competition in their traditional season that it will label as Badger pride night. Any athletes who attend this competition will receive points, individually or as a team.

SAAC Participation:
Teams will earn 10 points for each meeting they have two representatives in attendance.

The Scoring System:
Individual Points—Individuals will earn 100 points for their team for each individual effort. At the end of each week, the points will be divided by the number of student-athletes on the active roster for each sport.

Team Points—Team efforts, defined as 70 percent participation or 20 members, for all categories earn 100 points per event. All mandatory events require 100 percent participation in order to receive points.

Reward
One men's and one women's team will be recognized as the overall winners at the Academic Excellence Banquet in April. The men's and women's team with the highest GPA as well as the team with the most community service points will also be recognized at the banquet.

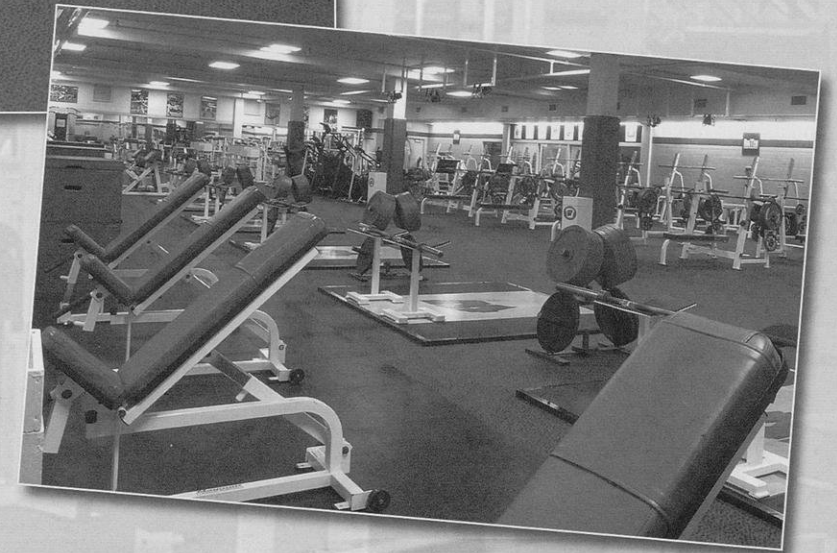
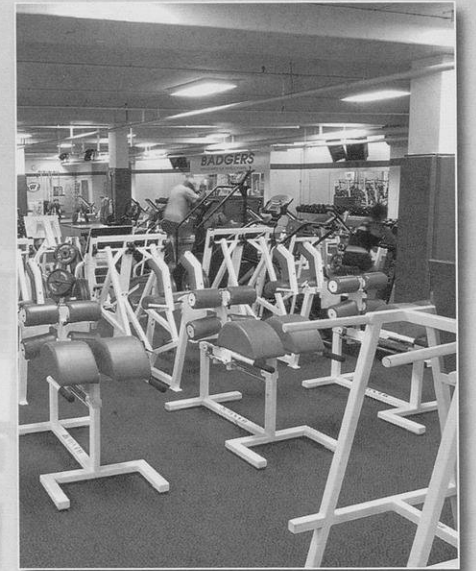
The Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a key component in all of the Badger success on the playing field. The goal of the program is to increase the overall performance of each student-athlete, prevent injuries and help athletes reach their potential.

Strength and conditioning coordinator John Dettmann and his six assistant coaches work with members of the Wisconsin coaching staff to develop training programs to enhance each athlete's performance.

Badger football players work on their strength programs in the McClain Center. The Kohl Center, home to Wisconsin basketball and hockey teams, also houses a state-of-the-art weightroom that is currently undergoing renovations.

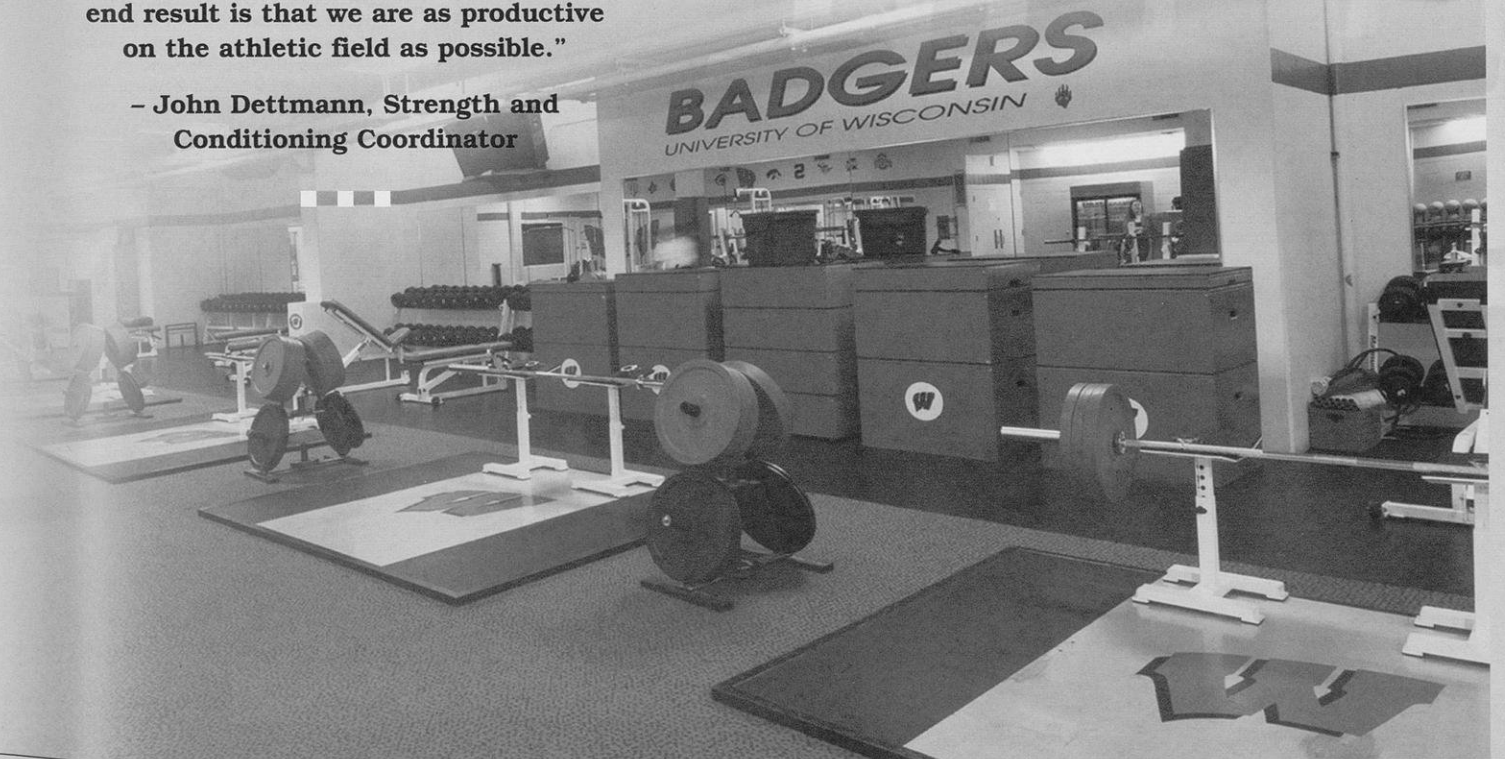
The McClain Center weightroom is the largest of the facilities and features more than 45,000 pounds of free weights and more than 50 weight machines. The room has seven squat racks, eight bench press stations, eight flat-to-incline benches, six Olympic lift platforms and numerous other free weight stations.

The Badger Den (left) has five power stations with each consisting of a platform for Olympic-style lifting as well as a squat rack, bench press, incline bench press, pull-up station and a dip station. There are three lat-pull machines and seated row machines, a complete set of dumbbells and a complete set of plyometric boxes.

Sports Medicine

Wisconsin's sports medicine staff provides all UW student-athletes with high quality health care. The sports medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

The sports medicine staff consists of a team of physicians, dentists, athletic trainers and a full-time nutritionist. The day-to-day care, prevention and treatment of injuries to Badger student-athletes is supervised by a team of 12 full-time and two graduate assistant National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA) certified and State of Wisconsin licensed athletic trainers.

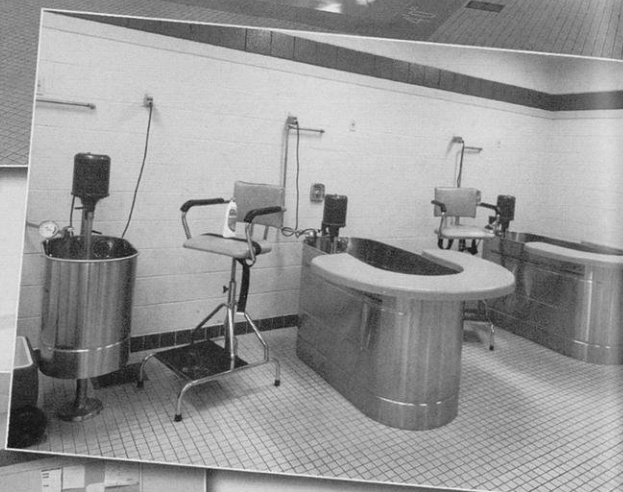
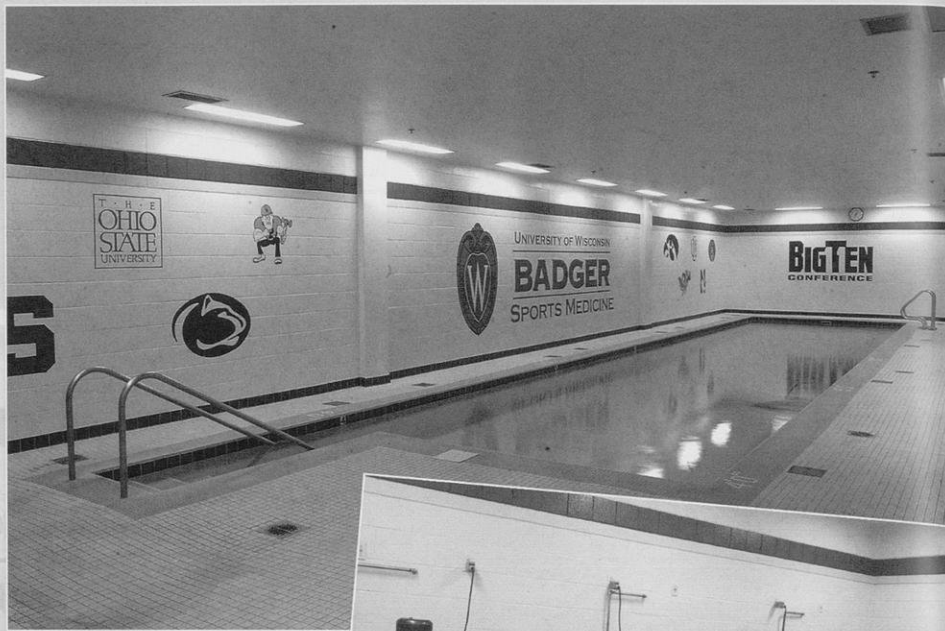
Under the direction of head athletic trainer Dennis Helwig, the sports medicine program focuses on injury prevention. The staff also utilizes functional measures, measures physiological capacity and outlines programs to improve flexibility.

Full-time nutritionist Jeremy Isenece provides dietary analysis and supervises training table meals to enhance the performance of student-athletes.

The sports medicine facility in the McClain Center features an extensive collection of therapeutic and rehabilitation equipment including a 50-foot, two-lane rehabilitation pool and an on-site x-ray facility. Considered one of the nation's finest, the McClain Sports Medicine Center offers an environment conducive to expedient care and a healthy return to competition.

Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affiliated with the world-renowned UW Hospital and Clinics.

In addition to the headquarters in the McClain Athletic Facility, auxiliary athletic training rooms are located in Camp Randall Stadium, the Natatorium, the UW Field House and the Kohl Center. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus.

Head Coach Bret Bielema

Bret Bielema is in his first year as head football coach at the University of Wisconsin. The second-youngest head football coach in the Division I-A ranks, he brings a remarkably strong background to the position.

Bielema was Wisconsin's defensive coordinator in 2004 and 2005, a period in which the program produced a 19-6 record under former head coach Barry Alvarez. The 2004 Badgers were sixth nationally in scoring defense and ninth in total defense. The 2005 club, which earned Wisconsin's first shutout since 1999, finished its 10-win season with a 24-10 victory over No. 7 Auburn in the 2006 Capital One Bowl; UW limited the high-powered Tigers to just 236 yards of total offense.

During Bielema's two years guiding the Badger defense, two players (DE Erasmus James and DB Jim Leonhard) earned first-team All-America honors and two others (DT Anttaj Hawthorne and DB

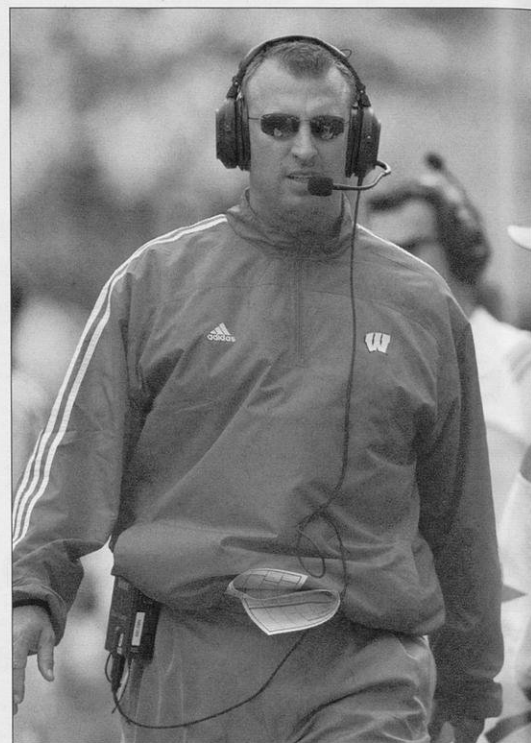
Scott Starks) were first-team All-Big Ten selections. While coaching the Badgers' linebackers, Bielema developed Mark Zalewski and Dontez Sanders, both of whom earned honorable mention all-conference acclaim.

Bielema was co-defensive coordinator at Kansas State under former head coach Bill Snyder from 2002-03. The Wildcats were 22-6 during Bielema's time there and finished in the top 10 nationally (in both 2002 and 2003) in scoring and total defense. The Wildcats won their first Big 12 title in 2003. Among Bielema's standout players at Kansas State were first-team All-American Josh Buhl, 2003 NFL second-round draft pick Terry Pierce and second-team All-Big 12 selection Bryan Hickman.

Prior to his years at Kansas State, Bielema spent nine seasons as an assistant coach at his alma mater, Iowa, where he worked for head coaches Hayden Fry and Kirk Ferentz. The 1997 Hawkeyes posted three shutouts and ranked No. 4 nationally in scoring defense. Bielema coached Fred Barr (first-team All-Big Ten), Vernon Rollins and Matt Hughes (both honorable mention All-Big Ten) at Iowa.

Head coaches for whom Bielema has worked—Alvarez, Snyder, Ferentz and Fry—have combined to win 547 games and guide their teams to 41 bowl games, so the first-year Badger mentor has learned from some of the best in the business.

Bielema earned four letters (1989-92) after joining the Iowa football program as a



walk-on. He was a member of Iowa's 1990 Big Ten championship team. A starter as a junior in 1991, he was a team co-captain as a senior. Bielema signed a free agent contract with the Seattle Seahawks and later completed his playing career with the Milwaukee Mustangs of the Arena Football League. Bielema has participated in 10 bowl games as a player or coach.

A 1992 graduate of Iowa with a bachelor's degree in marketing, Bielema was born in Prophetstown, Ill., on Jan. 13, 1970.

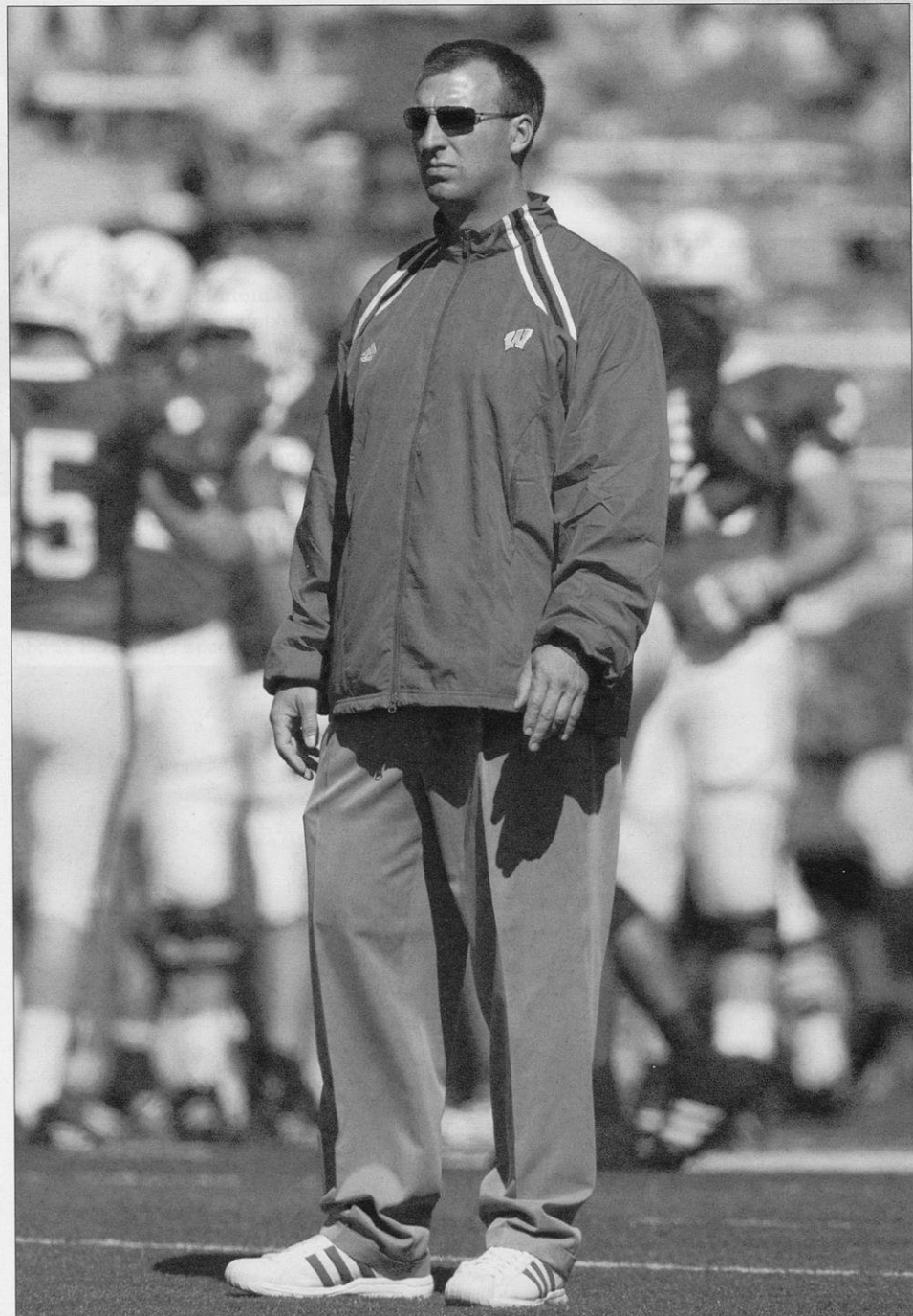
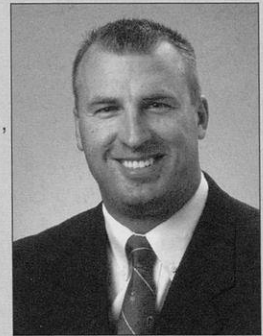

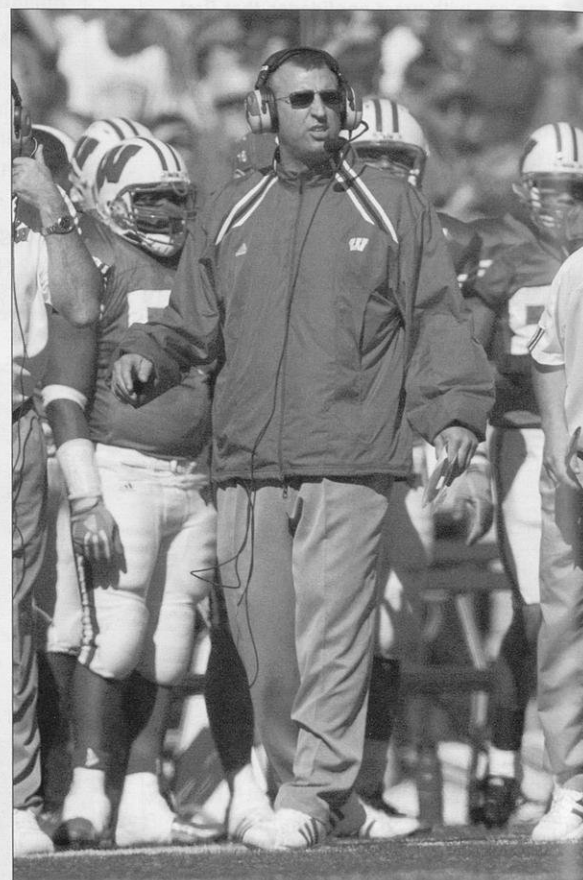

Q & A with Bret Bielema

How would you describe your general philosophy for running a football program?

"A football program needs to be run efficiently, without hesitation and with quick decision-making."

What is the "1-0 Philosophy" you so often speak about?

"The 1-0 philosophy means you take every day for what it is. Obviously we want to go 1-0 on every gameday, but we take that same approach throughout each week. If we have a great practice on Tuesday that will lead to a great practice on Wednesday and so on."

When did you decide you wanted to get into coaching and how did the process evolve?

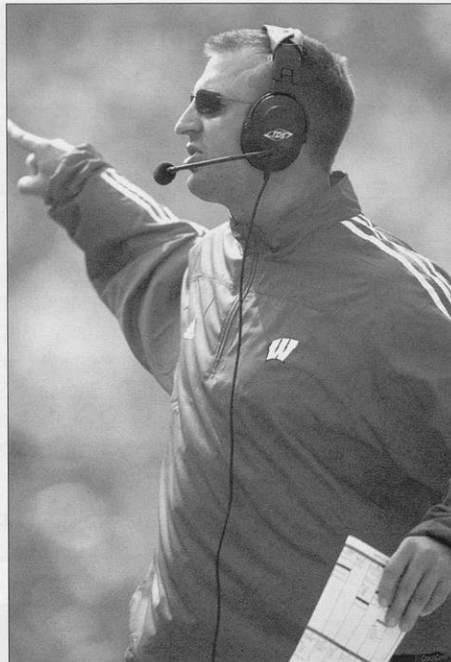
"I had great mentors when I was a college football player at the University of Iowa. I saw them work on a day-to-day basis and I saw the effect they had on me. That materialized into an opportunity for me to become a student assistant coach and then a graduate assistant, which eventually led to the position I'm in today."

What did you learn growing up on a farm and what lessons have you brought with you to this point in your life?

"On the farm my father made us work on a day-to-day basis. It was the same thing over and over, so we began to learn how to do things more efficiently. We also learned that you have to do things right the first time or else you will have to do them again later. I began to appreciate what hard work is all about and doing things well the first time."

You've worked for four successful college football coaches (Wisconsin's Barry Alvarez, Kansas State's Bill Snyder, and Iowa's Kirk Ferentz and Hayden Fry). What did you learn from each one?

"I don't think I realized how much working for those four individuals would come to benefit me the way it has to this point. Coach Fry was a great philosopher. He would try to get into our minds and really understood how to reach people mentally. Coach Ferentz took over the Iowa program from a coaching legend (Fry) much like I'm doing here at Wisconsin. What I took from Kirk was his vision and knowledge of where he was



taking the program even if others didn't realize it at the time. Coach Snyder was focused on being a hard worker. He would leave no stone unturned and then he would turn them over again. Coach Alvarez was the total package. He showed me you can capture the mind as well as the body. He had great vision for where he wanted to be and did that in a dual role as coach and athletic director."

How do you respond when you are asked about being the second youngest Division I head coach in the country?

"The funny thing about age is that the younger you are, the older you want to be

and the older you are, the younger you want to be. All I've done is accomplish a certain amount in a short period of time. That put me in position to have this job. This job wasn't given to me based on my age, it was based on what I did."

How would you describe the type of student-athlete you want in the Wisconsin football program?

"I believe at Wisconsin we need to have success in three areas. Our student-athletes need to be motivated academically so they can earn a degree from this university. Secondly, they need to have the desire and talents necessary for them to help us accomplish what we want on the football field. Finally, they need to be successful socially so they can combine the other two areas for a winning experience here at the University of Wisconsin."

What would you say are the differences (thus far) in being an assistant coach and a head coach?

"As an assistant coach you make recommendations and you understand where you were going because of the direction of the head coach. As the head coach, you need to make quick decisions and understand the consequences of your decisions. You also need to be able to lead people when they don't understand where they are going."

What will be going through your mind as you take the team out of the tunnel for the season-opener on Sept. 2?

"I will be wondering who will win the coin toss."

Bob Bostad

Tight Ends

Bob Bostad (pronounced BO-stad), a state of Wisconsin native who coached the offensive line at New Mexico from 1999-2005, is in his first season as an assistant football coach at Wisconsin.

Bostad coaches the Badgers' tight ends.

Bostad's 2005 offensive line, which paved the way for DonTrell Moore, the Mountain West Conference offensive player of the year and the nation's 10th-leading rusher, featured a pair of first-team all-conference selections, including center Ryan Cook and guard Robert Turner. New Mexico averaged 200 yards per game on the ground in 2005. Cook was a second-round draft choice of the Minnesota Vikings, while tackle Terrance Pennington was a seventh-round pick of the Buffalo Bills.

During Bostad's tenure at New Mexico, 14 Lobo offensive linemen earned all-conference mention, including seven first-team selections (both of those figures are tops in MWC history). Among the players Bostad coached at New Mexico were: tackle Claude Terrell, a third-team A.P. All-American and fourth-round draft choice of the St. Louis Rams (he started as a rookie for the Rams in 2005) and tackle Jason Lenzmeier, who became the first offensive lineman in conference and school history to earn MWC offensive player of the week honors in 2003.

The 2003 Lobos led the MWC in scoring (30.1 ppg) and ranked 11th nationally in rushing average (227 ypg). The 2002 New Mexico line allowed just 17 quarterback sacks in 14 games (352 passing attempts). New Mexico's 2001 club averaged 27.6 points per game, an improvement of more than eight points per contest over the previous year. The Lobos also averaged 376.8 yards per game of total offense in 2001, a jump of 110.2 yards per game over the 2000 campaign. Guard Jason Carson earned second-team all-conference laurels in 1999 (Bostad's first season at New Mexico), becoming the first Lobo offensive guard to do so since 1978.

Bostad was offensive line coach (1997-98) and offensive coordinator (1998) at San Jose State prior to his years at New Mexico. His top player with the Spartans was David Loverne, a first-team All-WAC selection and third-round choice of the New York Jets in 1999.

Bostad coached the offensive line at Cal State Northridge in 1995-96 and spent three seasons (1992-94) as an offensive line graduate assistant at Minnesota under head coach Jim Wacker.

Bostad got his coaching start at his alma mater, UW-Stevens Point, where he coached the offensive line from 1990-91.

Bostad graduated from UW-Stevens Point in 1989 with a degree in physical education. He was a four-year starter as a line-backer for the Pointers and earned all-conference mention each year. UW-Stevens Point won 33 games during his career and tied Pacific Lutheran for the NCAA Division III national title in 1987. Bostad earned a master's degree in kinesiology from Minnesota in 1994.

Bostad, 39, is a native of Pardeeville, Wis. He and his wife, Cara, have three daughters: Rachel, Bryn and Annika, and a son, John Robert.

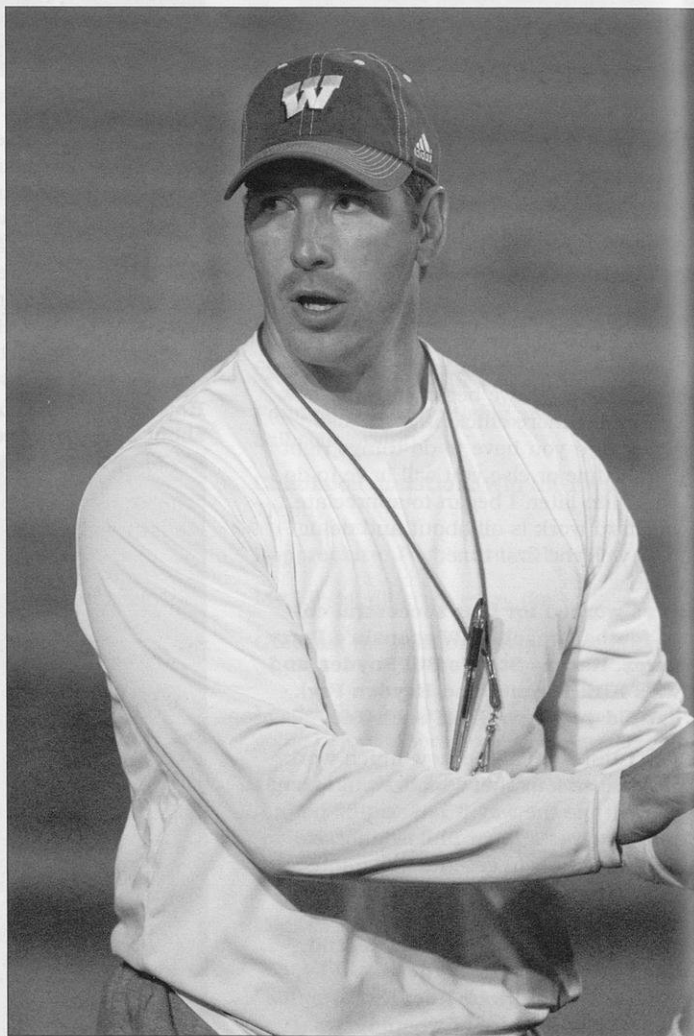
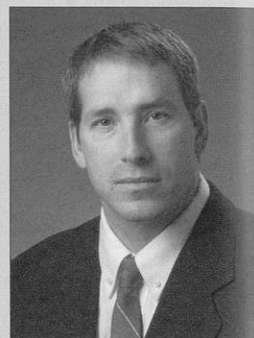

Paul Chryst

Offensive Coordinator / Quarterbacks

Paul Chryst is in his second consecutive season at Wisconsin and his third overall as an assistant coach for the Badgers.

Chryst, UW's co-offensive coordinator and tight ends coach last season, is now the program's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach.

Chryst, the Badgers' tight ends coach in 2002, returned to Wisconsin in 2005 and his impact on the UW offense was immediately evident. The 2005 Badgers set school records for points scored in a season (446) and for season scoring average (34.3 ppg). UW scored at least 40 points six times in 2005. The Badger passing game was much improved, with QB John Stocco setting school season records for passing yards (2,920), passing TDs (21) and pass completions (197). Wisconsin's aerial attack distributed the ball widely, as wide receivers caught 110 passes, running backs made 61 receptions and tight ends made 29 grabs.

Wisconsin has earned significant upset wins in bowl games during Chryst's two seasons on the staff. The Badgers won the 2002 Alamo Bowl, 31-28 OT, over 13th-ranked Colorado and defeated seventh-ranked Auburn, 24-10, in the 2006 Capital One Bowl.

Chryst was offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Oregon State in 2003-04. He helped the Beavers rank No. 6 nationally in passing yardage per game (328.1) and 10th in total offense (463.0 ypg) in 2003. The 2003 Beavers became the first team in NCAA Division I history with a 4,000-yard passer, 1,500-yard rusher and two 1,000-yard receivers. The Beavers were seventh in the nation in passing yardage (308.8 ypg) in 2004. Among the Oregon State stars he coached were RB Ken Simonton, the school's career rushing leader, QB Derek Anderson, who left as the Pac 10's No. 2 career passing leader, RB Steven Jackson, a 2004 first-round draft choice, and TE Tim Euhus, a fourth-round pick of Buffalo in 2004.

Chryst came to Wisconsin in 2002 after serving as an assistant coach with the San Diego Chargers, where he developed Freddie Jones into one of the NFL's top tight ends, as well as coaching Steve Heiden, now a starter with the Cleveland Browns.

Previously, Chryst was an assistant coach at Oregon State (1997-98), the Saskatchewan Roughriders (1996), Illinois State (1995), the Ottawa Rough Riders (1994), UW-Platteville (1993) and the World League's San Antonio Riders (1991-92). He was a graduate assistant at West Virginia (1989-90).

Chryst was a three-time football letterwinner at Wisconsin, where he earned a degree in political science in 1988. He added a master's degree in educational administration from West Virginia in 1990. Paul's brother, Rick, is commissioner of the Mid-American Conference. Another brother, Geep, is an assistant with the Carolina Panthers. Paul's late father, George, was a longtime head coach at UW-Platteville and a former Badger player and assistant coach.

Chryst and his wife, Robin, have three children: Katy, JoJo and Danny.

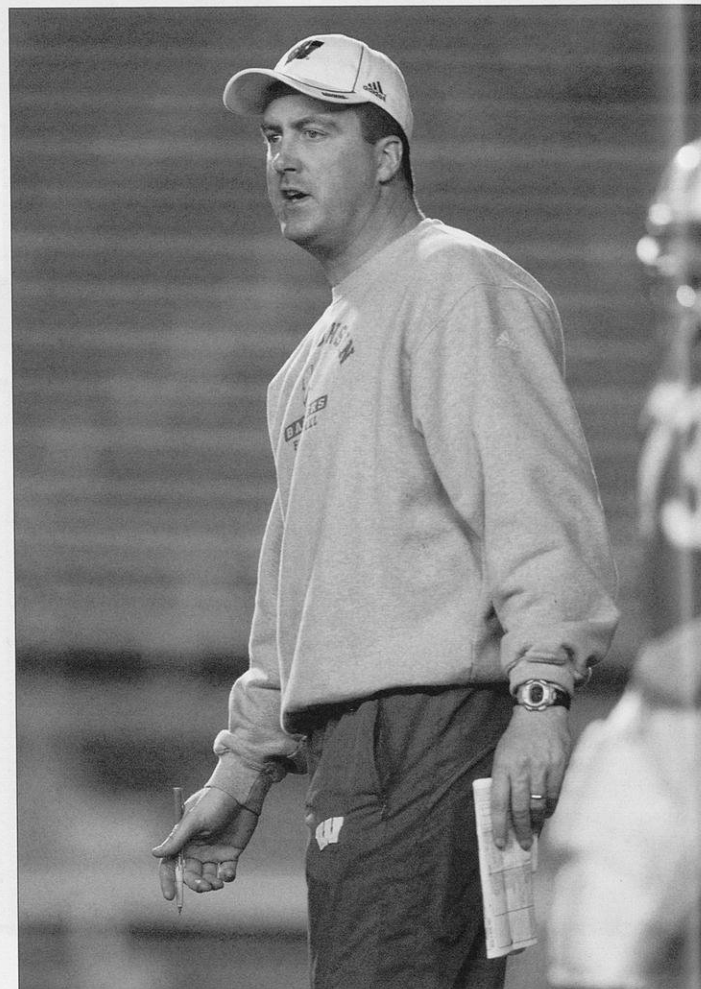

Kerry Cooks

Defensive Backs

Kerry Cooks, defensive backs coach at the University of Minnesota last season, is in his first year as defensive backs coach at Wisconsin.

Cooks comes to Wisconsin after one year coaching the Golden Gophers' secondary. Minnesota qualified for the Music City Bowl last season, while Cooks' unit allowed opponents to complete just 56.8 percent of their passes (fourth-best in the Big Ten). That figure dropped to 55.3 percent in conference games, tied for second in the league with Penn State.

Prior to his year at Minnesota, Cooks coached defensive backs and assisted on special teams for one season (2004) at Western Illinois. Under Cooks' direction, the Leathernecks limited opponents to a Gateway Conference-best 157.2 passing yards per game; held opponents to the lowest completion percentage (45.4) in the conference; and finished second in the league with 17 interceptions.

Cooks began coaching at his high school alma mater, Nimitz High (Texas), in 2003 before joining the staff at Kansas State as a graduate assistant for the 2003 campaign. While at Kansas State, Cooks worked mostly with defensive game plan preparation and assisted with the Wildcats' secondary. Kansas State registered an 11-4 record in 2003 and won a Big 12 title with a defense that was sixth nationally in total defense, eighth in scoring defense, 12th in pass efficiency defense and 17th in rushing defense. The Wildcats earned a trip to the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl after limiting each of their last six opponents to 14 points or less, including Oklahoma, the nation's highest-scoring team.

Cooks was a four-year letterwinner and two-year starter as a strong safety at Iowa from 1994-97. He was a team captain as a senior and earned All-Big Ten honors and a spot in the East-West Shrine Game. A fifth-round draft choice of the Minnesota Vikings in 1998, Cooks also played for Green Bay, Atlanta and Jacksonville before retiring from the NFL in 2001. He also played for the Chicago Enforcers of the XFL in 2001.

Cooks has played or coached in six bowl games. A 2000 graduate of Iowa with a bachelor's degree in sociology, Cooks' wife's name is Valencia.

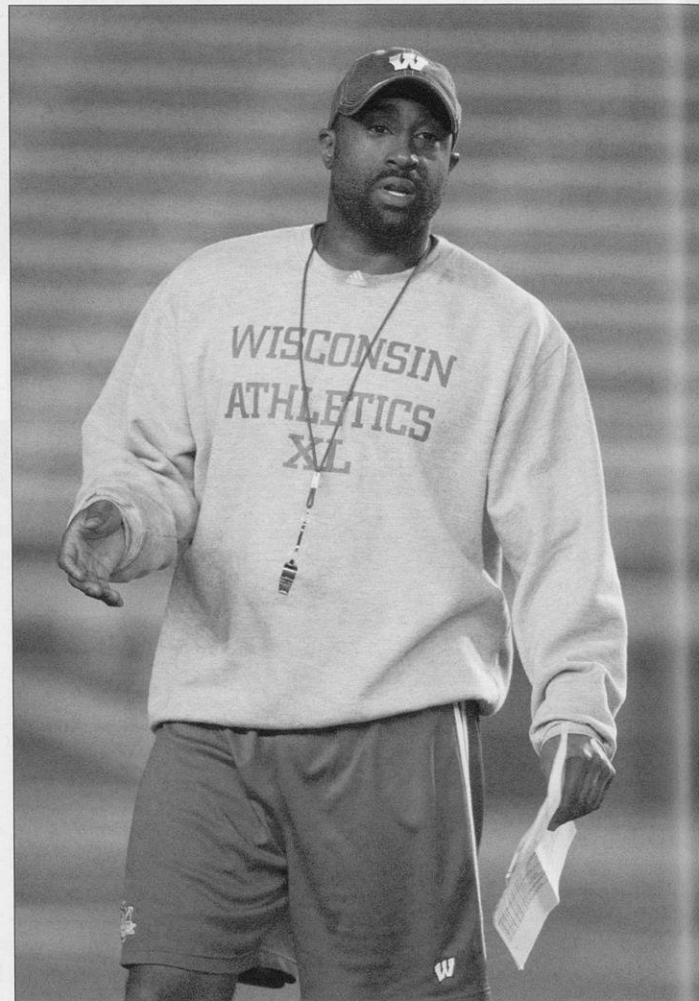
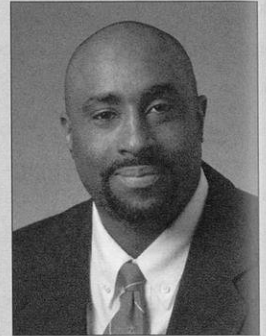

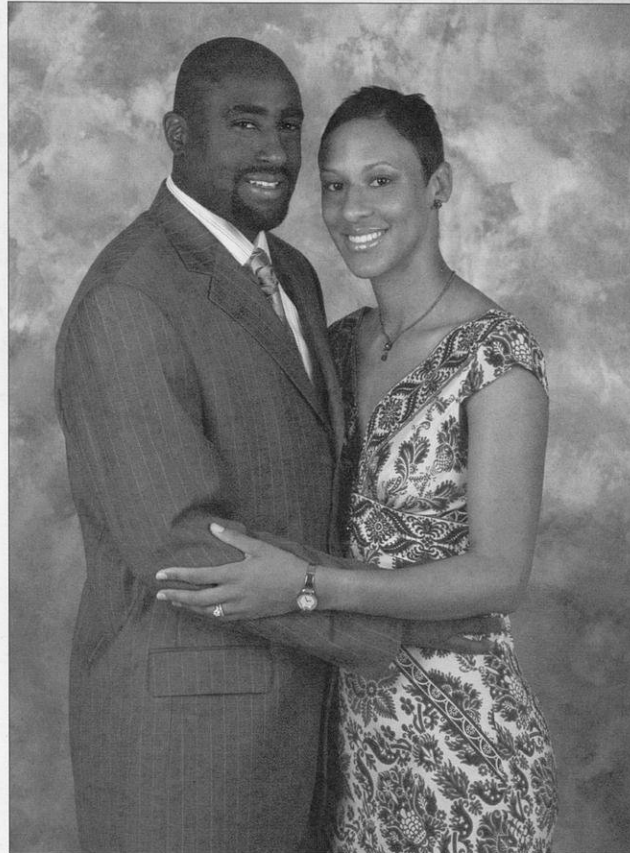

Dave Doeren

Co-Defensive Coordinator / Linebackers / Recruiting Coordinator

Dave Doeren, who ascended to become the co-defensive coordinator at Kansas after just three seasons, is in his first season as an assistant coach at Wisconsin. Doeren serves as co-defensive coordinator, linebackers coach and recruiting coordinator for the Badgers.

Doeren has risen quickly through the college coaching ranks. Since 2002 he has served as the linebackers coach and recruiting coordinator at Kansas. He was promoted last summer to co-defensive coordinator. The Jayhawks, who routed Houston, 42-13, in the 2005 Fort Worth Bowl, led the Big 12 Conference and ranked No. 3 nationally in rushing defense (83.3 ypg) this past season. Kansas also was No. 2 in the Big 12 and 11th nationally in total defense (303.3 ypg). KU linebacker Nick Reid was a two-time, first-team All-Big 12 selection, a third-team A.P. All-American and was the Big 12 Defensive Player of the Year in 2005. Three other Jayhawk linebackers (Banks Floodman, Kevin Kane and Brandon Perkins) were named honorable mention All-Big 12 in 2005.

Doeren went to Kansas after spending two seasons as the secondary coach (as well as one season as recruiting coordinator) at Montana. The Grizzlies won the NCAA Division I-AA title in 2001. Doeren coached seven all-conference defensive backs at Montana, including two who earned All-America honors. The Grizzlies were 28-3 with two conference championships during Doeren's two seasons.

Prior to his time at Montana, Doeren was a two-year (1998-99) graduate assistant at Southern California. The 1998 Trojans led the nation in interceptions with 24 (including five that were returned for TDs). USC led the nation in turnover margin in 1999 and was second nationally in interceptions with 21 (including five returned for TDs).

Doeren started his college coaching career as an assistant at Drake from 1995-97. He coached linebackers all three years and became defensive coordinator in 1997.

Doeren began coaching (wide receivers and defensive line) at Shawnee Mission (Kan.) Northwest High School in 1994. A graduate of Bishop Miege High School in Shawnee Mission, Doeren was a four-year letterwinner at Drake and earned Academic All-America honors as a senior.

The 34-year-old Doeren, who has coached in three bowl games and two national championship contests, is a native of Shawnee Mission, Kan. He and his wife, Sara, have three sons: Jacob, Luke and Connor (born in April of 2006).

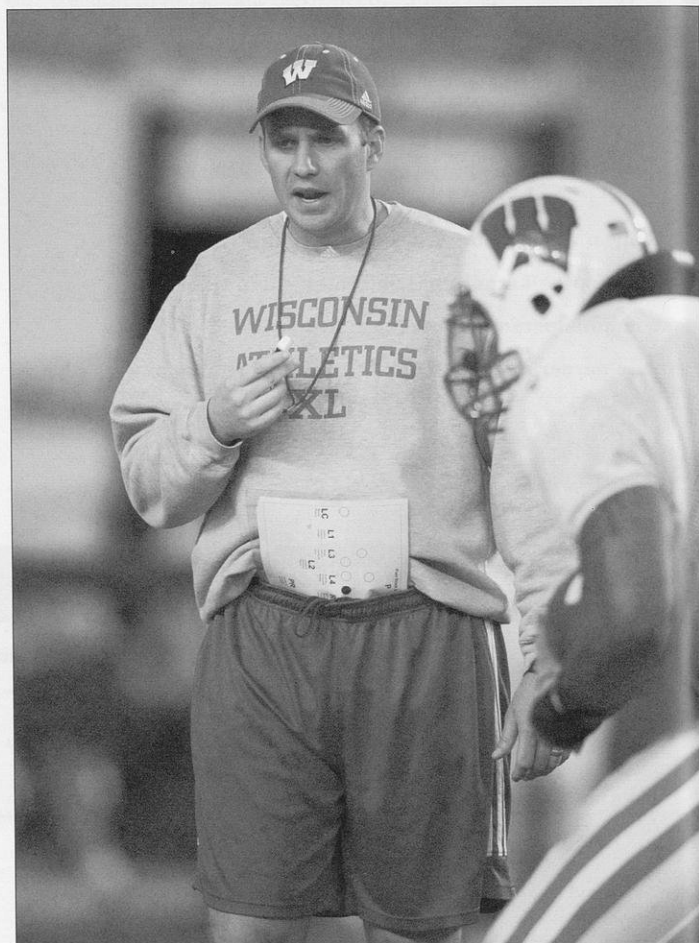

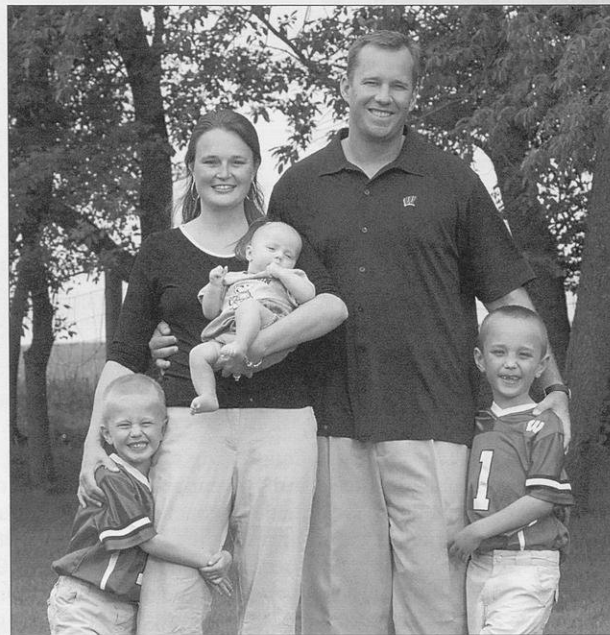

Mike Hankwitz

Defensive Coordinator

Mike Hankwitz is in his first season as Wisconsin's defensive coordinator.

Hankwitz spent the past two seasons as defensive coordinator and outside linebackers coach at Colorado. He served as the program's interim head coach for the Buffaloes' 2005 Champs Sports Bowl appearance against Clemson. CU won the Big 12 North Division title in both 2004 and 2005. Hankwitz had gone to Colorado after serving as Arizona's defensive coordinator (and later interim head coach) in 2003.

Prior to his stint at Arizona, Hankwitz was the defensive coordinator and outside linebackers coach (he also coached inside linebackers and punters) at Texas A&M (1997-2002) where he guided the Aggies' famed "Wrecking Crew" defense. Among Hankwitz's standout players at Texas A&M was Dat Nguyen, who won the Lombardi and Bednarik Awards, as well as being named Chevrolet Defensive Player of the Year in 1998.

Hankwitz spent two seasons (1995-96) as defensive coordinator and inside linebackers coach for head coach Glen Mason at Kansas. The 1995 Jayhawks recorded the school's first 10-win season since 1905, played in the Aloha Bowl and were ranked 10th in the final national polls.

Hankwitz enjoyed a highly successful 10-year run as defensive coordinator (along with responsibilities for outside linebackers, inside linebackers, the secondary, punters and the punt team) at Colorado from 1985-94. Colorado put together the nation's fifth-best record (58-11-4) from 1989-94, including a national title in 1990, three Big 8 titles, two appearances each in the Orange and Fiesta Bowls and six national top-20 rankings (including three top-five finishes). The Buffs' 1989 and 1991 teams set the school record for fewest points allowed (150) in a season. Among Hankwitz's standout players at CU were Jim Thorpe Award winners Deon Figures (1992) and Chris Hudson (1994), and Butkus Award winner Alfred Williams (1990).

Hankwitz was defensive coordinator (with additional responsibilities for the secondary, punters, punt team) at Western Michigan from 1982-84 and outside linebackers and punting coach at Purdue from 1977-81. Prior to his time at Purdue, Hankwitz was the outside linebackers and secondary coach (along with punt return and punt rush) at Arizona from 1973-76.

Hankwitz began his coaching career as a graduate assistant (1970-72) at his alma mater, Michigan, under head coach Bo Schembechler. As a defensive G.A., Hankwitz helped the Wolverines to two Big Ten titles, a 30-3 record, three top-10 national rankings and a 1971 Rose Bowl appearance.

Teams for which Hankwitz has coached have had a winning record in 30 of his 36 years. Ten of those clubs won conference titles and 12 more were league runners-up. He has coached in 21 bowl games. Hankwitz also has coached 14 first-team All-Americans (including four straight punters at Colorado), five conference defensive players of the year, 44 first-team all-conference choices and seven team MVPs. He has recruited eight players who went on to play in the NFL.

The 58-year-old Hankwitz is a native of Ludington, Mich. He was a three-year football letterwinner for the Wolverines and started on the 1969 Big Ten championship squad that played in the Rose Bowl. Hankwitz earned a B.S. in education in 1970. He and his wife, Cathy, have a son, Jacob, 12.

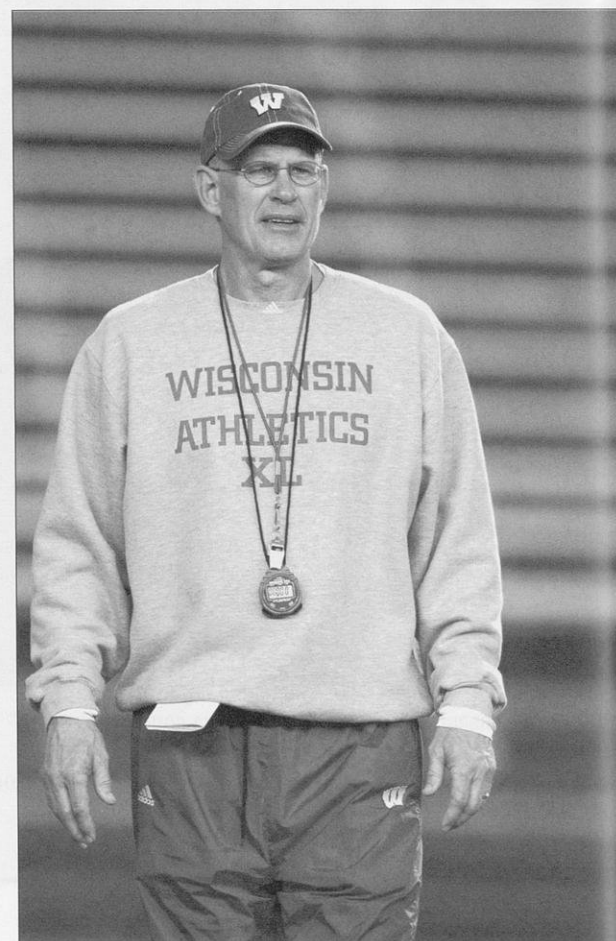
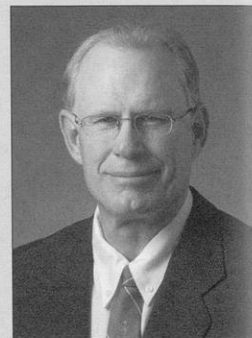

Henry Mason

Wide Receivers / Assistant Recruiting Coordinator

Henry Mason is in his 12th season coaching wide receivers at Wisconsin.

Under Mason's guidance, Wisconsin has consistently produced some of the nation's best pass-catchers since the mid-1990s. Mason has, in fact, coached five of the top eight receivers in school history during his tenure with the Badgers.

Mason's most recent standouts were Brandon Williams and Jonathan Orr, both of whom were selected in the 2006 NFL Draft. Williams, a 2005 second-team All-American, finished his career ranked first in receptions (202) and second in yards (2,924) at Wisconsin. Orr is third all-time at UW with 19 touchdown catches and eighth in school history with 1,824 receiving yards.

Mason also coached Bedford, Ohio, products Lee Evans and Chris Chambers. Evans, a 2001 Biletnikoff Award finalist and first-team All-American, is UW's career leader in receiving yards (3,468) and touchdowns (27). A 2004 first-round draft choice of the Buffalo Bills, Evans holds the Big Ten record for receiving yards in a season with 1,545 during the 2001 campaign. Chambers, a second-round draft pick of the Miami Dolphins in 2001, is fourth on the school's list for career receiving yards with 2,004. Chambers caught a TD pass in the 2006 Pro Bowl.

Early in Mason's career at Wisconsin, while the Badgers were primarily riding the talents of running back Ron Dayne, Tony Simmons and Donald Hayes developed into standout receivers and eventual NFL draft picks. Simmons, No. 5 on UW's career receiving yardage list with 1,991 and No. 2 in career receiving TDs with 23, was a second-round draft choice of the New England Patriots in 1998. Hayes, eighth on the school's career yardage list with 1,575, was a fourth-round choice of Carolina in 1998.

Two other Mason-coached Badger receivers have played in the NFL: Ahmad Merrit, who signed with the Chicago Bears as a free agent in 2001 and recorded a 1,000-yard season in 2002; and Nick Davis, a free agent signee of the Minnesota Vikings in 2002.

Prior to coming to Wisconsin in 1995, Mason coached receivers at Western Michigan from 1991-94. The Broncos led the Mid-American Conference in passing in three of Mason's four seasons. Mason was head coach at Smith-Cotton (Mo.) High School from 1982-90. His 1988 team became the first in 13 years at the school to post a winning record. Mason also was an assistant coach at Baker University (1981) and was an assistant coach at Lexington (Mo.) High School (1979-80).

Mason, who has coached in nine bowl games with the Badgers, is a 1979 graduate of Central Missouri State, where he lettered in football and baseball. He was drafted by the Baltimore Colts and played one season with the St. Louis Cardinals.

Mason's wife's name is Debbie.

Randall McCray

Defensive Line

Randall McCray, who coached the defensive line and linebackers during the past three seasons at Toledo, is in his first season as Wisconsin's defensive line coach. McCray was recruiting coordinator and safeties coach at Rice for about two weeks prior to coming to Wisconsin.

The 36-year-old McCray coached Toledo's defensive line last season, helping the Rockets to a 9-3 record (MAC West Division co-champions) and a 45-13 GMAC Bowl win over UTEP. Toledo was 21st nationally in total defense last season (316.8 ypg) and led the MAC in scoring defense (21.8 ppg), total defense, pass defense efficiency (111.0), tied for first in sacks (31) and finished second in rushing defense (125.6 ypg). McCray coached the Rockets' linebackers during his first two years at Toledo. The Rockets won the MAC title in 2004.

In his first season at Toledo, McCray was faced with replacing two first-team All-MAC linebackers, David Gardner and Tom Ward, from the previous season. The two players who stepped in, Anthony Jordan and Brock Dadrill, finished the 2003 season ranked fifth and sixth, respectively, in the MAC in tackles.

In 2004, Jordan and David Thomas finished second and third, in tackles on the team, with 107 and 91, respectively. Jordan's total placed him 15th in the league.

McCray was assistant head coach and defensive coordinator at Illinois State in 2002 after serving as defensive coordinator and inside linebackers coach for the Redbirds from 2000-02. In 2002, McCray guided Gateway Defensive Player of the Year Boomer Grigsby to three All-America nods and a third-place finish for the Buch Buchanan Award (top defensive player in Division I-AA football). McCray also coached two other All-Americans at linebacker, Galen Scott at Illinois State and Ronnie Merritt at Murray State.

McCray coached inside linebackers at Murray State (1997-99) and became the Racers' defensive coordinator in 1999; defensive ends at Bethune-Cookman (1996); was in charge of quality control at Clemson (1995); defensive line at Tennessee-Chattanooga (1993-94) and was a graduate assistant at South Carolina from 1991-92.

A two-year letterwinner as an outside linebacker and running back at Appalachian State, McCray was a member of the Mountaineers' 1987 Southern Conference championship team, as well as two teams that advanced to the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs.

McCray earned a bachelor's degree in communications from Appalachian State in 1991 and a master's degree in higher education from South Carolina. A native of Monroe, N.C., McCray and his wife, Michelle, have a son, Matt (4).

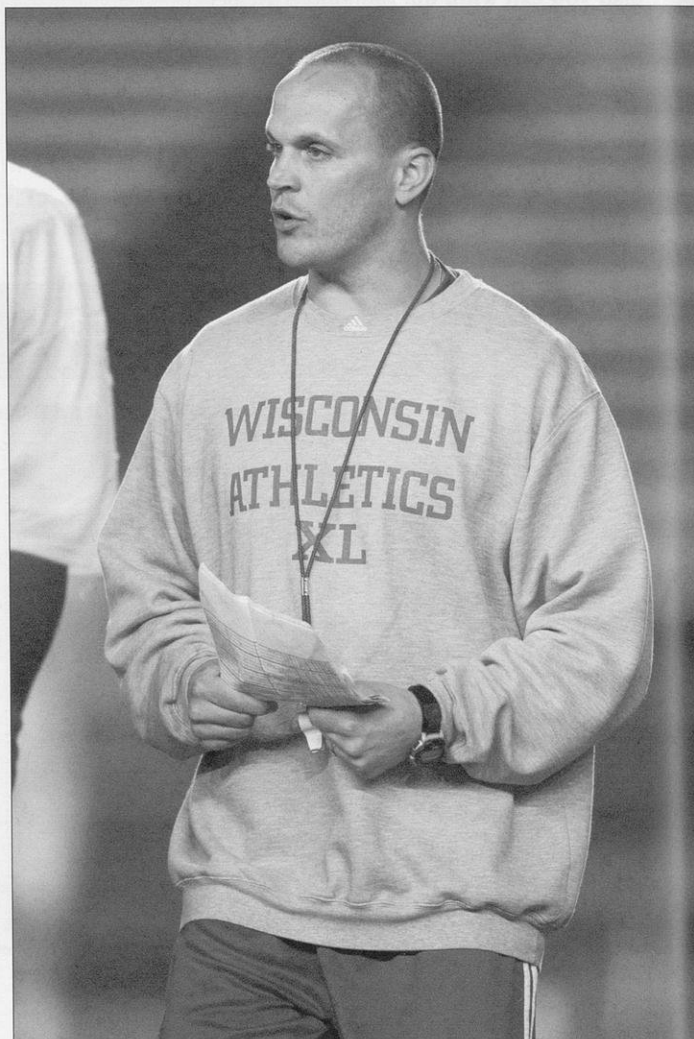
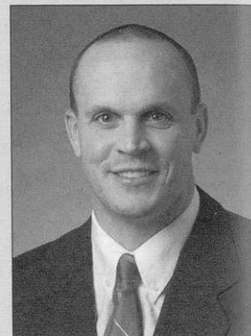

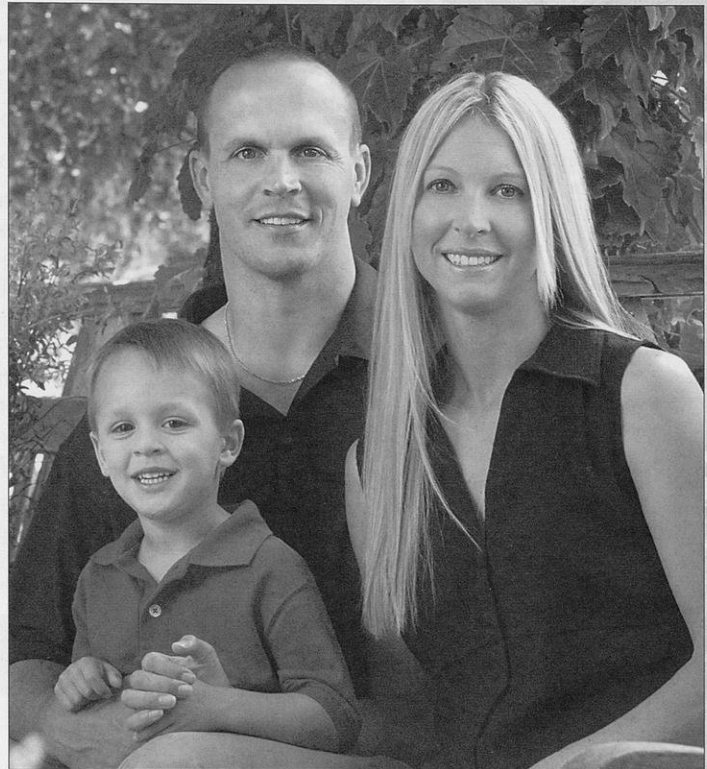

Palcic went to Atlanta after spending 19 of the previous 21 seasons coaching offensive linemen at seven different universities, including Wisconsin. He coached the 1993 UCLA offensive line that matched up against the Badgers in the 1994 Rose Bowl. Palcic tutored the Southern California offensive line in 1992 and helped the Trojans to a Freedom Bowl appearance. He was offensive line coach at Ohio State from 1986-91, a period during which the Buckeyes played in two Hall of Fame Bowls, a Cotton Bowl and a Liberty Bowl.

Arizona's offensive line was under Palcic's direction from 1984-85 (the Wildcats played in the Sun Bowl during that time). A two-year stint (1982-83) with the Canadian Football League's Toronto Argonauts (1983 Grey Cup title) was preceded by a four-year (1978-81) stop as Wisconsin's offensive line coach under head coach Dave McClain.

Palcic was Ball State's offensive line coach in 1976-77 (he went to Wisconsin with McClain, who was Ball State's head coach) and Dayton's linebackers/offensive line coach in 1974-75. He got his college coaching start guiding Ball State's linebackers as a graduate assistant in 1973.

Among the college players Palcic has coached are: current Baltimore Raven All-Pro tackle Jonathan Ogden (UCLA); All-America tackle Tony Boselli (USC); first-team All-Big Ten offensive linemen Bob Maggs, Jeff Uhlenhake, Joe Staysniak, Jeff Davidson and Alan Kline (all at Ohio State); All-American Ray Snell (Wisconsin); first-team All-MAC guard Mitch Hoban (Ball State).

Palcic, 58, is a native of Gowanda, N.Y., and has a bachelor's degree in education (1971) and a master's degree in education (1974), both from Dayton. He was a linebacker for the Flyers from 1968-70. He and his wife, Theresa, have three children: Joe (currently the defensive coordinator at Indiana); Amy (an assistant in the Cleveland Browns media relations office) and Monica, who is married to Philadelphia Eagles LB Mark Simoneau.

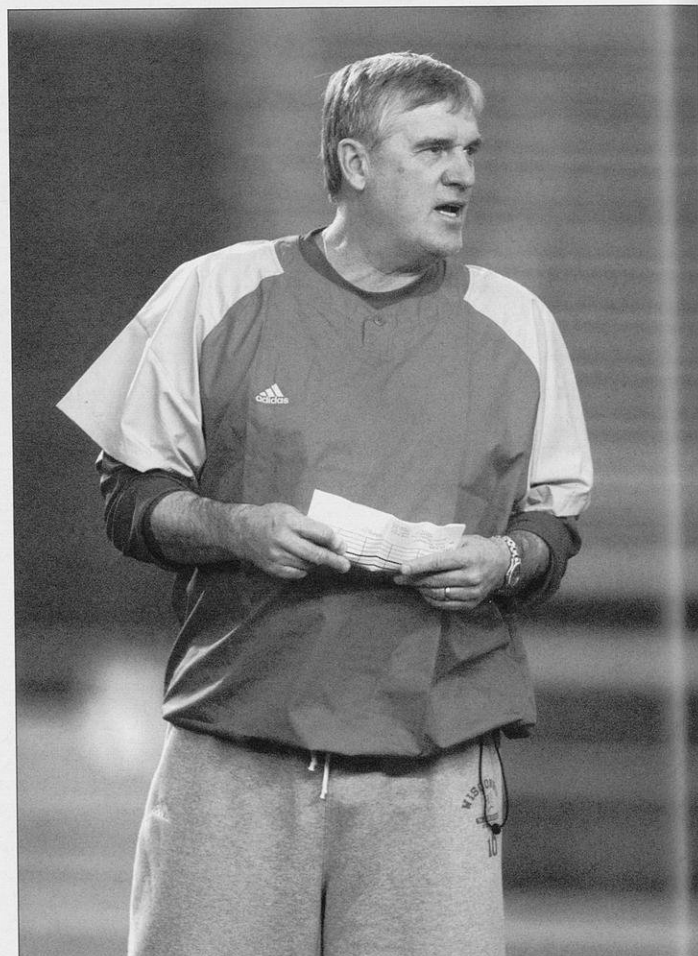
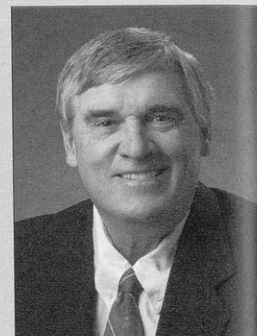

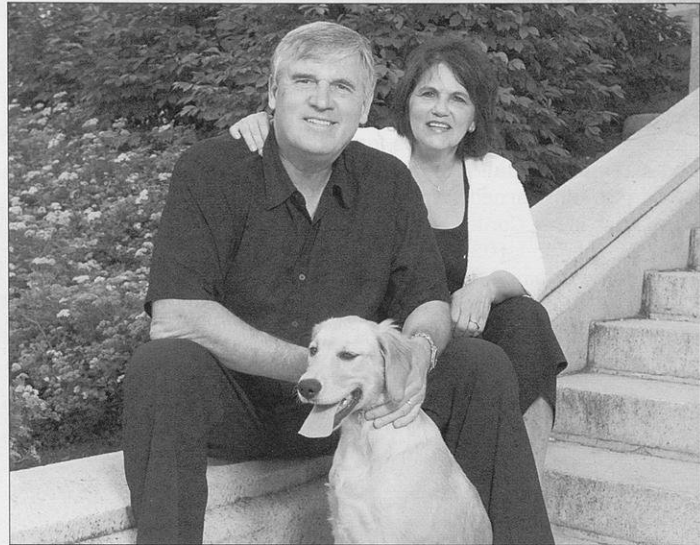

John Settle

Running Backs

John Settle is now in his first season as running backs coach at Wisconsin.

Settle most recently served eight seasons as running backs coach at Fresno State, where he tutored six 1,000-yard rushers, including Wendell Mathis, who rushed for 1,313 yards and 15 touchdowns along with making 19 catches for 156 yards and a TD for the Bulldogs last season. Bryson Sumlin earned second-team All-Western Athletic Conference honors (WAC) when he ran for 1,102 yards and 12 TDs in 2004. He was joined that season by Mathis, who rushed for 995 yards and 12 scores, making Fresno State one of only two schools in the nation with two running backs ranked among the national top 50. In 2003 Dwayne Wright became the third Bulldog in three seasons to surpass the 1,000-yard mark when he gained 1,038 yards. Rodney Davis set the school rushing record with a 1,586-yard campaign in 2002. Paris Gaines carried for 1,044 yards in 2001. Settle also developed Derrick Ward, the 1999 team rushing leader, freshman All-American and current New York Giant. In addition, Settle coached 1998 WAC Pacific Division Offensive Player of the Year and 1,000-yard rusher Jamie Kimbrough.

Settle went to Fresno State after a three-year stint (1995-98) as an offensive assistant with the Cleveland Browns/Baltimore Ravens franchise under head coaches Bill Belichick and Ted Marchibroda. During that time he coached running backs like Lorenzo White, Leroy Hoard, Earnest Byner and Priest Holmes. Settle began his coaching career at his alma mater, Appalachian State, where he assisted with running backs in 1994.

Settle was a four-year letterman (1983-86) as a running back at Appalachian State, where he played one season for current Texas head coach Mack Brown and another three years for Sparky Woods, currently the running backs coach at Alabama. Settle finished as the school's career rushing leader with 4,409 yards (then third-most in NCAA Division I-AA history) and 43 touchdowns. He was the Southern Conference Player of the Year as a senior after rushing for 1,661 yards and 20 TDs. The two-time All-American also scored a conference-record five TDs against Davidson.

Settle signed with the Atlanta Falcons as a free agent and played for coaches Jerry Glanville and Marion Campbell. He played a total of six seasons in the NFL, including four with Atlanta (1987-90) and two with the Washington Redskins. He accumulated 1,594 yards of total offense (1,024 rushing and 570 receiving) in 1988, becoming the first free agent in NFL history to rush for 1,000 yards in a season. He was named to the Pro Bowl and the All-Madden Team in 1988. He registered three 100-yard rushing performances and three 100-yard receiving games that season. He also played for the Redskins' Super Bowl championship team in 1991.

A 1989 graduate of Appalachian State with a degree in criminal justice, Settle and his wife, Karen, have three children: Jonathan, Leighton and Devynn. Settle's No. 23 was retired by his alma mater and he was inducted into the school's hall of fame in 1994.

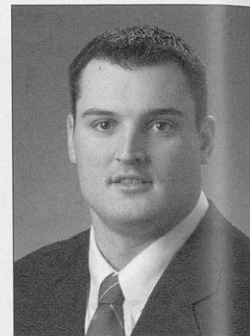
Jake Sprague

Sternquist, a native of Belvidere, Ill., earned a bachelor's degree in physical education from UW-Whitewater in 2004. His wife's name is Kalen.



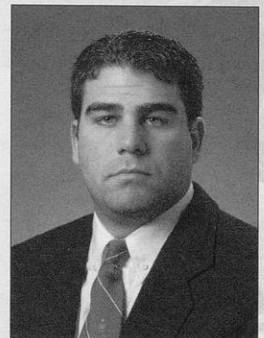

Powell is a native of Madison, Wis. She is a graduate of Parks College in Denver. She worked as a travel agent prior to coming to the UW.

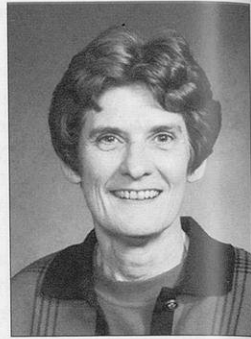

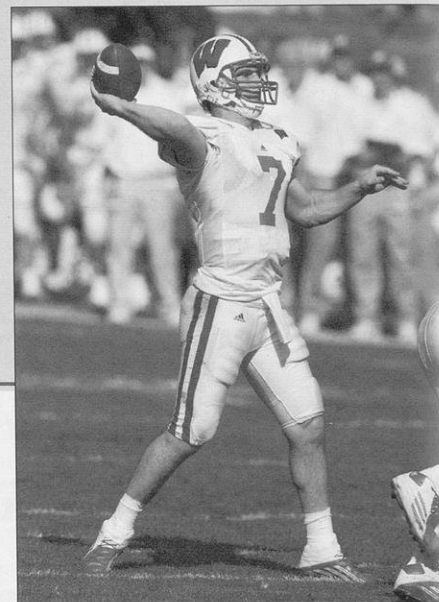
2006 BADGERS

- ▶ Only 11 NCAA Division I programs have won at least 19 games during the past two seasons combined and the Badgers are one of them. Wisconsin also won more games (19) in 2004 and 2005 than any other Big Ten school.
- ▶ Wisconsin is coming off a 2005 season in which it registered a 10-3 overall record and culminated in a 24-10 victory over seventh-ranked Auburn in the 2006 Capital One Bowl.
- ▶ Bret Bielema is the nation's second-youngest Division I-A head coach. He is 36 years old with a birthdate of Jan. 13, 1970.
- ▶ There are 119 Division IA football teams and when the Badgers host Penn State on Nov. 4, 2006 the game will feature the nation's youngest (Bret Bielema) and 119th-youngest (Joe Paterno) head coaches.
- ▶ The UW will play seven home games in 2006, including four Big Ten contests and three non-conference tilts. Wisconsin last played seven home games in 2003.
- ▶ Wisconsin has won 11 of its last 12 games at Camp Randall Stadium. The Badgers had their modern-era school-record 11-game home winning streak snapped in last season's home finale with Iowa.
- ▶ Among Big Ten schools, only Wisconsin, Ohio State and Michigan have been to at least 11 bowl games in the past 13 seasons. Wisconsin has a better bowl winning percentage (.727) during that time than either the Buckeyes (.583) or Wolverines (.538).
- ▶ Wisconsin last year set a school record for points in a season (446) and for season scoring average (34.3).
The Badgers lost eight starters from that offense, but do return QB John Stocco, who set UW season records for passing yards (2,920), passing TDs (21) and completions (197). Stocco is currently No. 3 on the school's career passing yardage list (5,042).
- ▶ Among QBs returning in 2006, only Boise State's Jared Zabransky "won" more games (20) as a starter the past two seasons than Wisconsin's John Stocco (19-6 record in 2004 and 2005 combined).
In fact, only Southern California's Matt Leinart (25), Texas's Vince Young (24) and Zabransky quarterbacked their teams to more wins than Stocco over the past two seasons.

WINNINGEST DIVISION I PROGRAMS THE PAST TWO SEASONS

Only 11 NCAA Division I programs have won at least 19 games during the past two seasons and Wisconsin is one of them. In fact, the Badgers' 19 victories in 2004 and 2005 are more than any other Big Ten team. Here are the 11 winningest teams of the past two seasons combined.

QB John Stocco set the Wisconsin record for passing yards in a season in 2005.

- ▶ Wisconsin's defense returns eight starters from a unit that shut down seventh-ranked Auburn in the 2006 Capital One Bowl. The Tigers entered the game averaging 34.2 points and 425.6 yards per contest. UW won the bowl game 24-10 and held Auburn to just 236 yards of total offense.
- ▶ Wisconsin figures to be particularly strong on its defensive line, where it returns eight players who have started at least once during their careers. That group includes 2005 honorable mention All-Big Ten honorees DT Nick Hayden and DE Matt Shaughnessy.
Remarkably, seven of those eight players will return for the 2007 campaign, as well (DE Joe Monty will be the only senior this season).
- ▶ Wisconsin's defense was third in the Big Ten last season with 31 QB sacks. Twenty-seven of those 31 sacks were by players who return in 2006.
- ▶ A number of players have changed positions since last season, among them Travis Beckum (DL to TE), Jarmal Ruffin (DB to WR) and Andy Crooks (LB to TE).
- ▶ Wisconsin led the Big Ten in turnover margin with a +13 figure that ranked 11th nationally in 2005. The Badger defense forced at least two turnovers in nine games and at least one in every game.
- ▶ Wisconsin returns two of the Big Ten's top special teams performers in punter Ken DeBauche and kicker Taylor Mehlhaff.
- ▶ DeBauche was a 2005 consensus first-team All-Big Ten selection and second-team All-American (SI.com) after leading the conference with a school-record 44.8-yard average.
- ▶ Mehlhaff's 98 points in 2005 were the second-most ever in a season by a Badger kicker. Mehlhaff also made 14 of 17 field goal attempts from inside 50 yards.
- ▶ Wisconsin's newly renovated Camp Randall Stadium was a big hit with Badger fans. UW sold out the entire 2005 campaign before it began and set a stadium record when 83,184 attended the final home game of the Barry Alvarez era on Nov. 12, 2005.
- ▶ Wisconsin, which has ranked 19th or higher in national attendance average in each of the past 13 seasons, has drawn a crowd of at least 70,000 fans to 81 consecutive home games. Among those 81 games, 71 have been sellouts.
- ▶ The Badgers averaged a school-record 82,551 fans during their six-game home schedule in 2005. That ranked 13th nationally.

1896 Western Conference Champions

After opening the season with seven victories, the Badgers tied Northwestern 6-6 and lost to the Carlisle Indians. Despite the late-season swoon, the Badgers claimed the inaugural Western Conference title. The Badgers' tough defense registered shutouts in six of their seven victories. The loss to the Carlisle Indians was the first night game in school history (played indoors at the Chicago Coliseum).



1897 Western Conference Champions

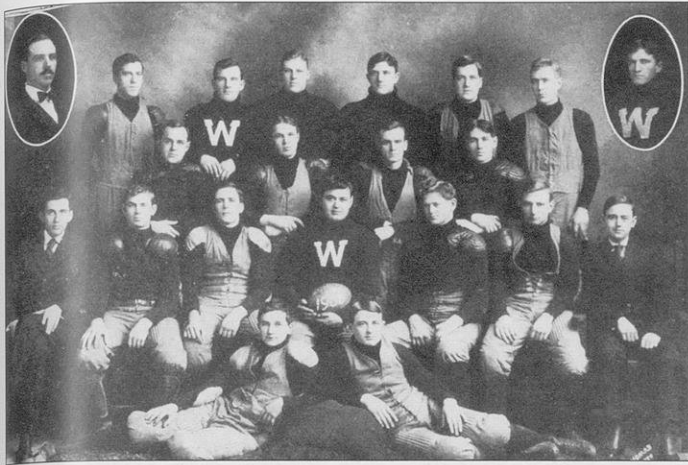
Wisconsin won its second straight conference title and registered eight shutouts on the way to a 9-1 mark. The only loss was a 6-0 decision to the UW Alumni. Victories over Minnesota, Chicago and Northwestern propelled the Badgers to the Western Conference title. Australian kicker Pat O'Dea, the famed "Kangaroo Kicker," booted 14 field goals. It was the second league title for Coach Phil King.



1901 Western Conference Champions

Phil King's Badgers won nine straight games to become the first undefeated team in school history. Using a potent offense and stingy defense, Wisconsin defeated every opponent by at least three TDs and recorded eight shutouts. The Badgers outscored the opposition 317-5. Wisconsin's slate included two wins over high school teams and conference wins over Chicago and Minnesota.

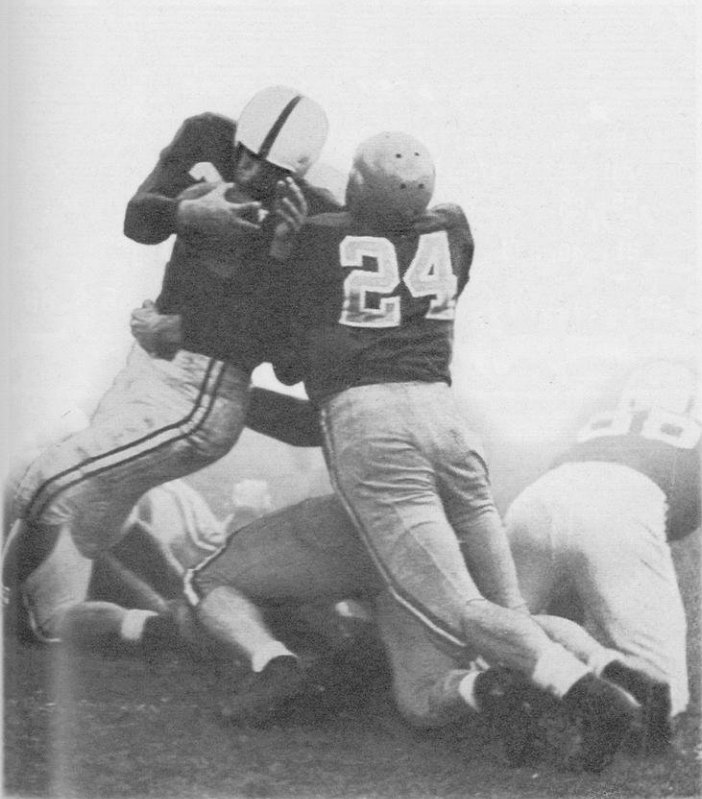
1906 Western Conference Champions

Although traditional league powers Minnesota, Michigan and Chicago were missing from the schedule due to a faculty reform movement, Wisconsin claimed a share of the conference championship with the Gophers. Coach Dr. C.P. Hutchins' team posted Western Conference wins over Iowa, Illinois and Purdue by a combined score of 63-15.

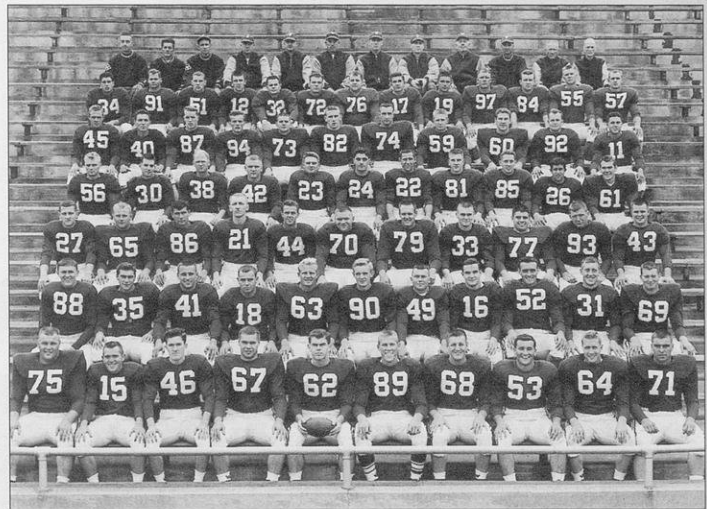


1912 Western Conference Champions

The Badgers ended their third undefeated (7-0) season with a 28-10 win at Iowa. Coach William Juneau's squad was the last Badger team to post a perfect record. Led by consensus All-America tackle Robert "Butts" Butler, the Badgers placed a school-record nine players on the All-Western Conference team. Wisconsin registered four shutouts and allowed only 29 points all year.



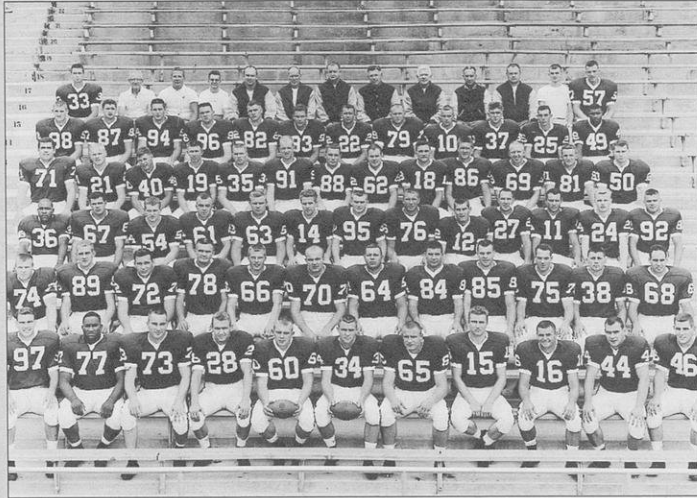
Alan Ameche recorded the first 1,000-yard rushing season by a Badger in 1952. He led the Big Ten with 1,079 rushing yards that season and finished his career in 1954 with an NCAA-best 3,345 yards.



1952 Big Ten Conference Champions

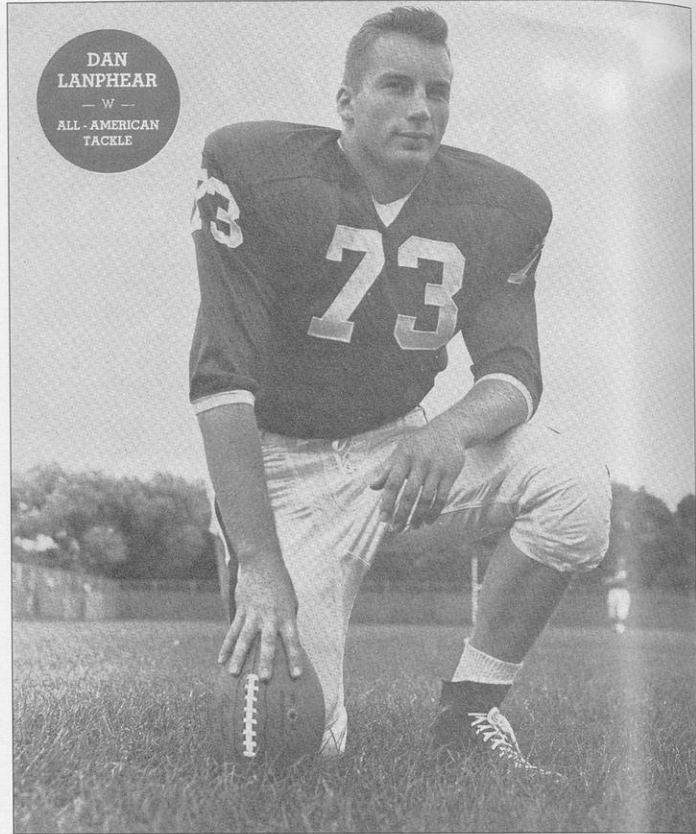
Following a 20-6 win over Illinois in the second game of the season, Wisconsin sat atop the polls as the nation's No. 1 team. The Badgers lost the following week, but went on to a 6-3-1 record and the school's first Rose Bowl appearance. After losing to USC 7-0 in Pasadena, the Badgers ended the season ranked 10th by United Press International and 11th by Associated Press.

Needing a victory in the regular-season finale to clinch a league title, Wisconsin beat Minnesota 11-7. It was the Badgers' first undisputed title since 1912. At the Rose Bowl, Washington scored 17 points in the first quarter on the way to a 44-8 win. All-Big Ten QB Dale Hackbart and All-Big Ten guard Jerry Stalcup were stars on a club that finished the season ranked sixth by AP and UPI.

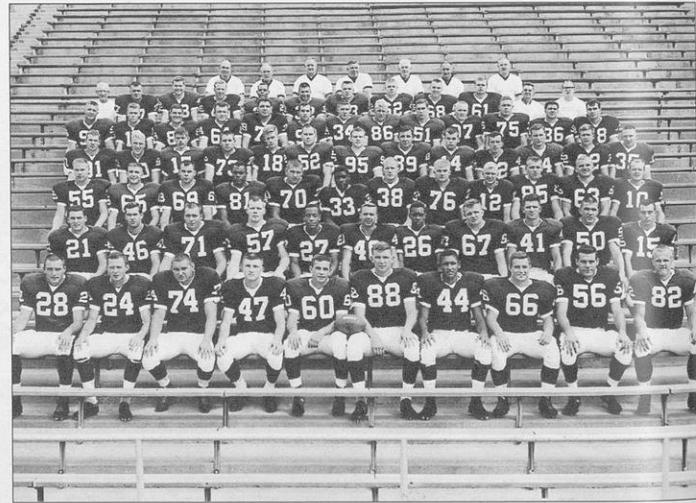


Left tackle Dan Lanphear was a consensus All-American and first-team All-Big Ten selection in 1959.

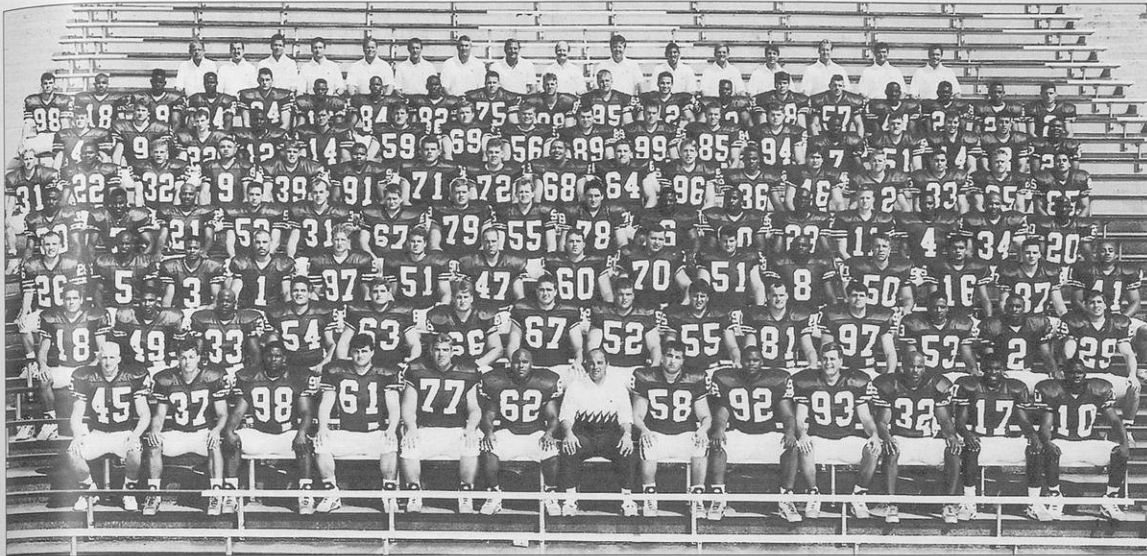

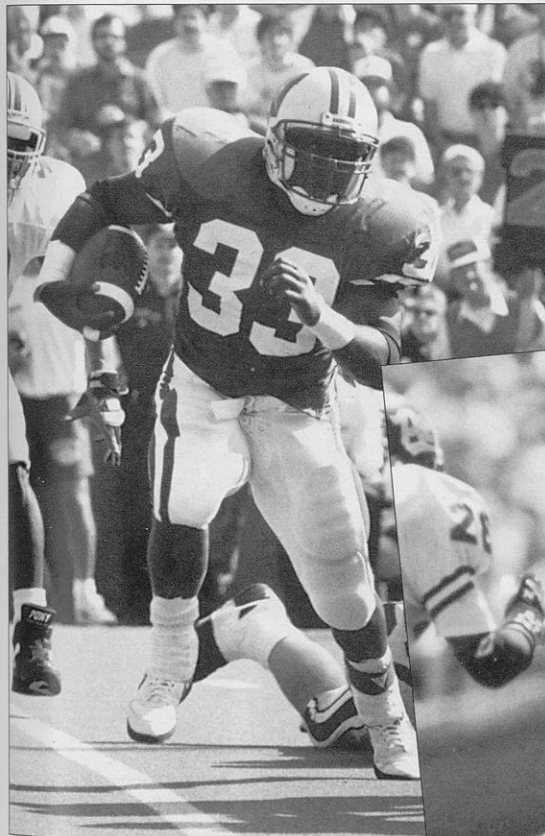
1962 Big Ten Conference Champions

Ron Vander Kelen set a Rose Bowl record with 401 yards passing as UW scored 23 straight points in a fourth-quarter rally. Pat Richter was a consensus All-American after catching 49 passes.



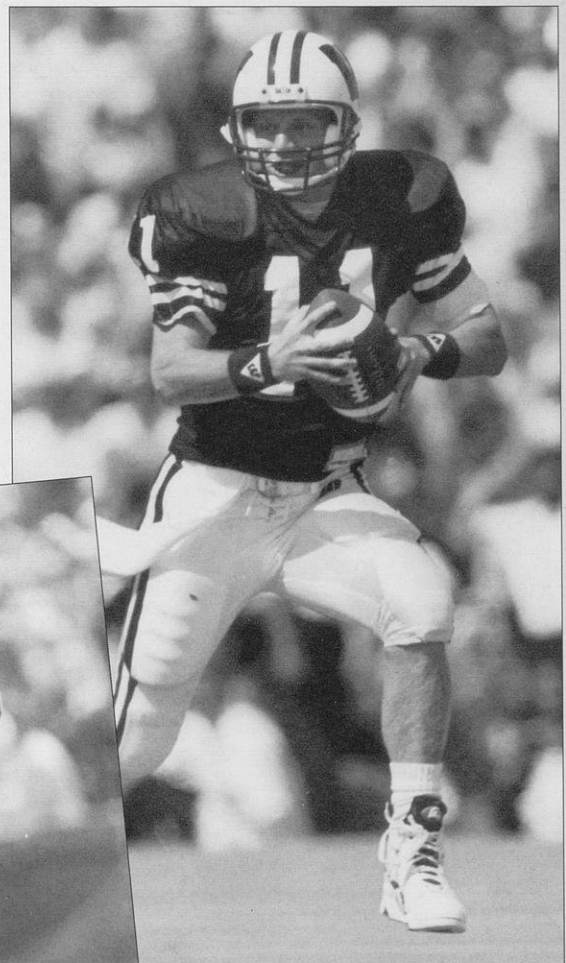
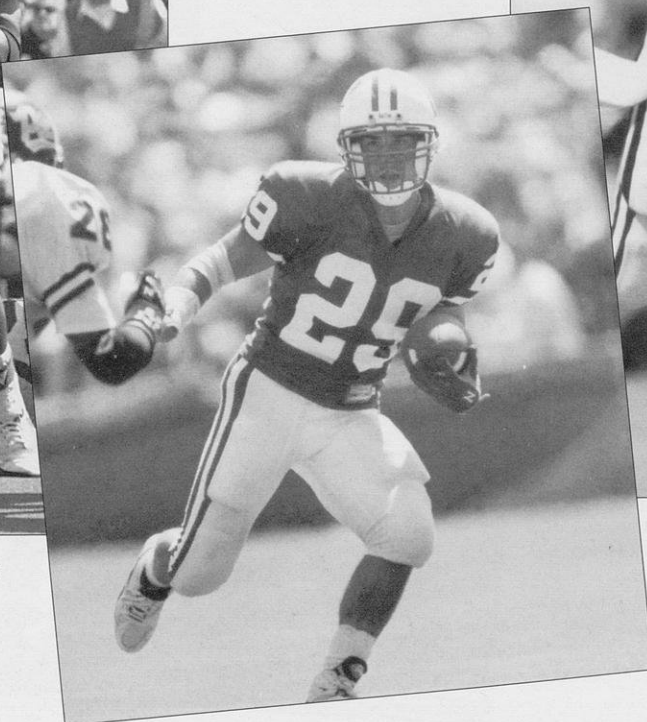
1993 Big Ten Conference Champions

The 1993 Badgers established a new standard of excellence, shattering school records and earning numerous honors. After claiming Wisconsin's first Big Ten title in 32 years (a co-championship with Ohio State), the Badgers defeated UCLA 21-16 in the Rose Bowl. The 10-1-1 club set a Wisconsin record for wins and boasted eight first-team All-Big Ten players, including Big Ten and Rose Bowl MVP Brent Moss. Wisconsin ended the season ranked fifth and sixth by the coaches (CNN/USA Today) and media (Associated Press), respectively.



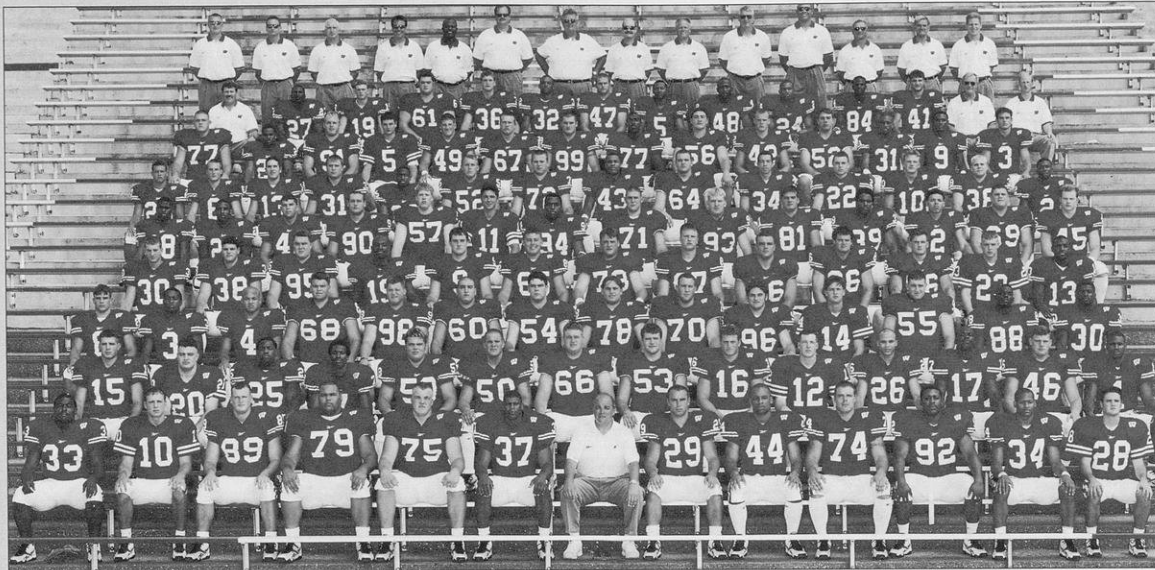
Brent Moss (above) was named Big Ten and Rose Bowl MVP as he rushed for 1,637 yards in 1993.

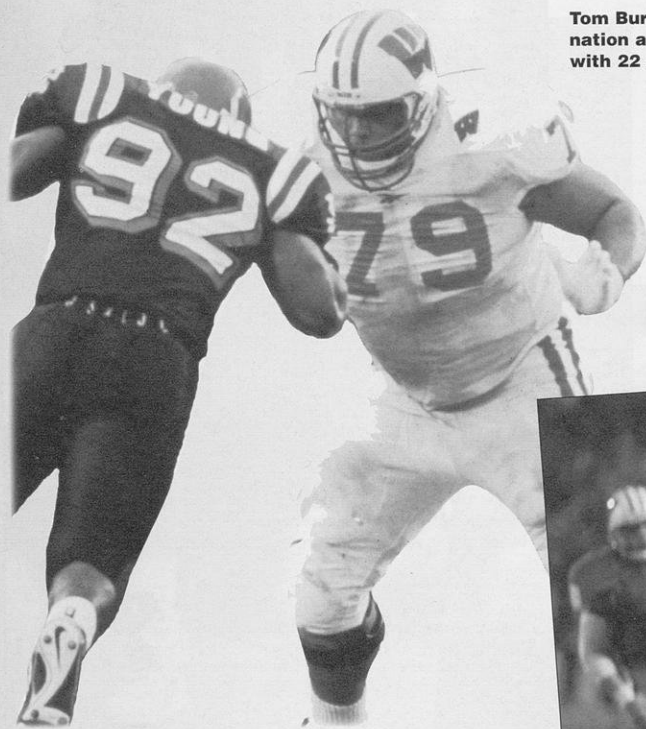

1998 Big Ten Conference Champions

The 1998 Badgers concluded the winningest campaign in school history with a 38-31 Rose Bowl victory over sixth-ranked UCLA. The 1998 club opened the season with a nine-game winning streak and registered the best winning percentage (.916, 11-1) in the modern era at the UW. Aaron Gibson was a finalist for the Lombardi Award and Outland Trophy and Ron Dayne was a finalist for the Doak Walker Award. Tom Burke led the nation in sacks and Jamar Fletcher topped the NCAA in interceptions. Wisconsin was first nationally in turnover margin and scoring defense.

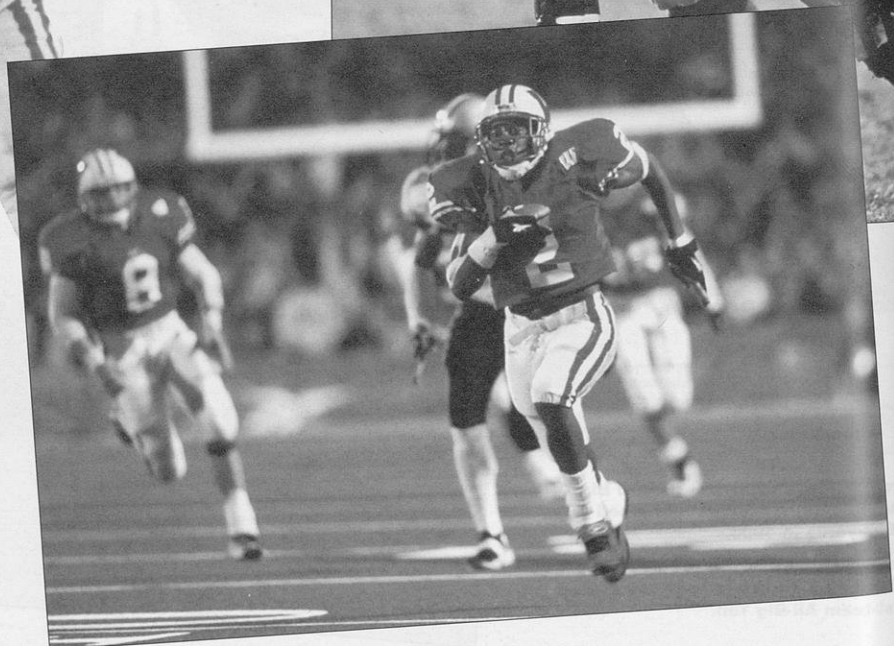
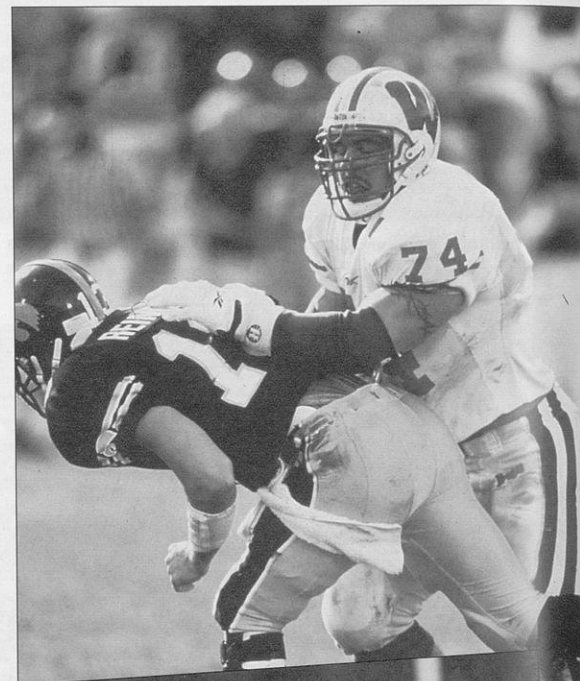

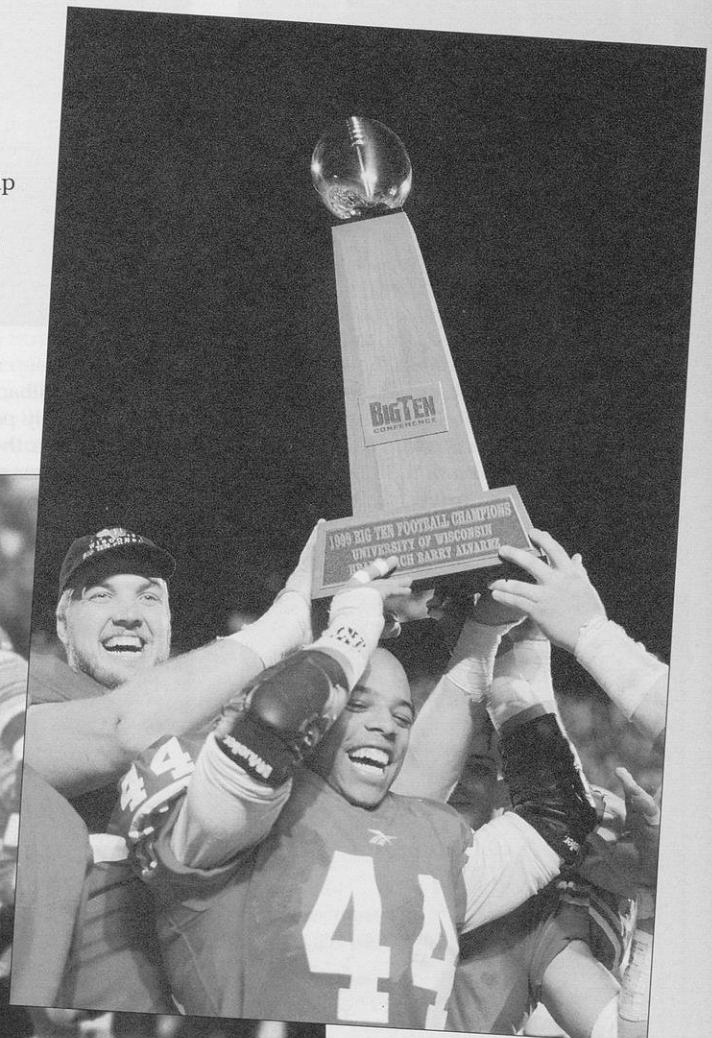
Tom Burke (right) led the nation and set a UW record with 22 sacks in 1998.

The 1999 Badgers ended the season with an eight-game winning streak after splitting their opening four contests. A 17-9 win over Stanford in the Rose Bowl allowed UW to become the first Big Ten school in history to win consecutive games in "The Granddaddy of them all." Wisconsin won its first undisputed Big Ten championship since 1962 and finished fourth in each of the final national polls. Ron Dayne was the consensus national player of the year and won the Heisman Trophy. Chris McIntosh and Jamar Fletcher joined Dayne as first-team All-Americans.



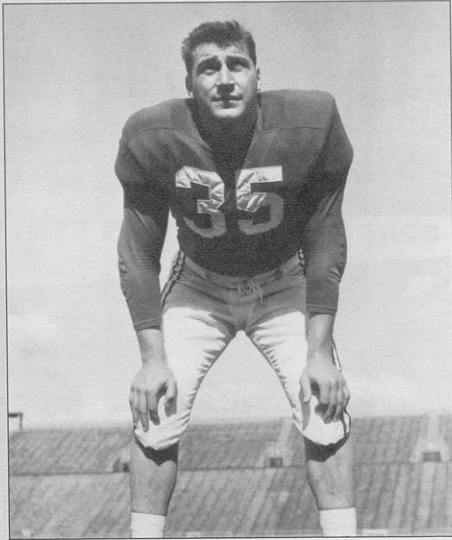
Captains Chris McIntosh and Donnel Thompson (above) hoist the 1999 Big Ten Championship Trophy.

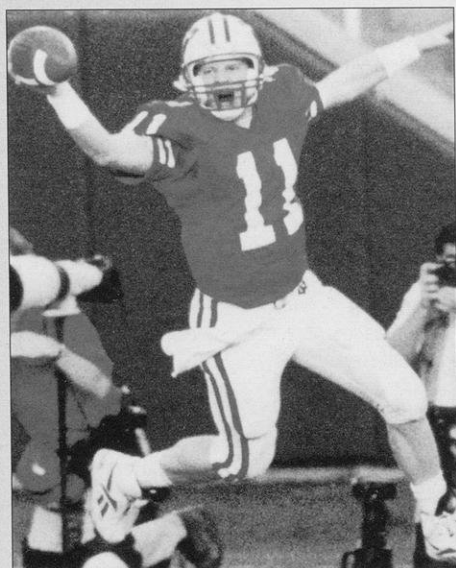

In truth, the Badgers' Ron Dayne rambled his way to four touchdowns and the UW defense got a stop in the final minute to earn a hard-fought 38-31 Rose Bowl triumph over the sixth-ranked Bruins.

UCLA's defense struggled to stop Dayne, whose 246 yards rushing were one yard shy of the game record. The Badgers mixed in some timely running (65 yards) and passing (154) from QB Mike Samuel in building a 31-21 lead in the third period.

The Bruins cut the lead to three on Jermaine Lewis' second TD and were driving again when freshman Jamar Fletcher intercepted All-American Cade McNown and returned the pick for a TD.

Once again, UCLA battled back and pulled within 38-31. The Bruins' last drive started on their 46-yard line with 1:42 left. Three incompletions by McNown set up Wendell Bryant's game-clinching sack on fourth down.

More than 55,000 Badger fans enjoyed the school's second Rose Bowl win. Dayne's record-setting performance earned him bowl MVP honors.

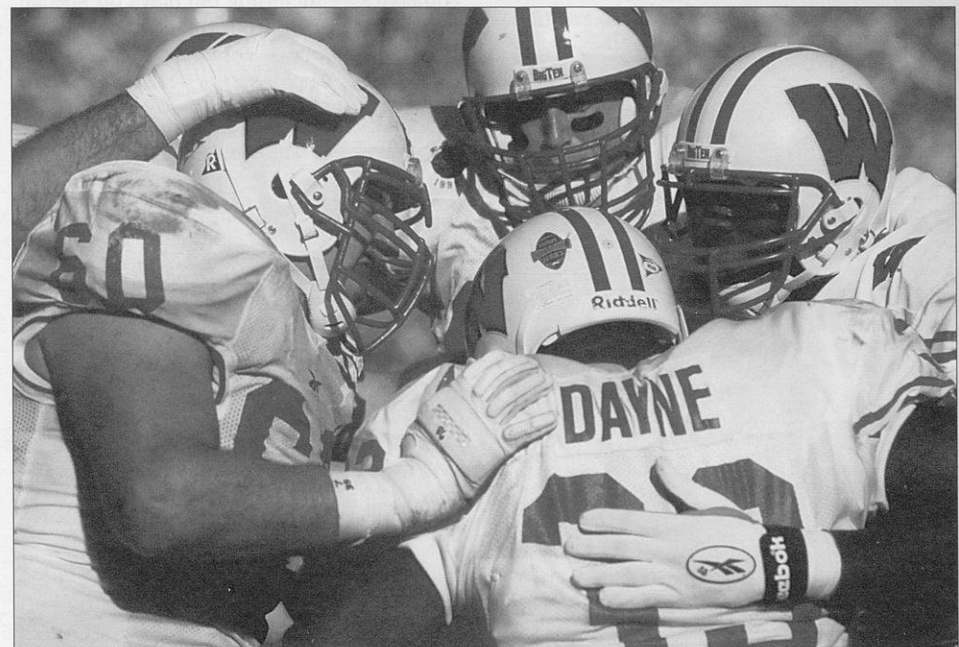

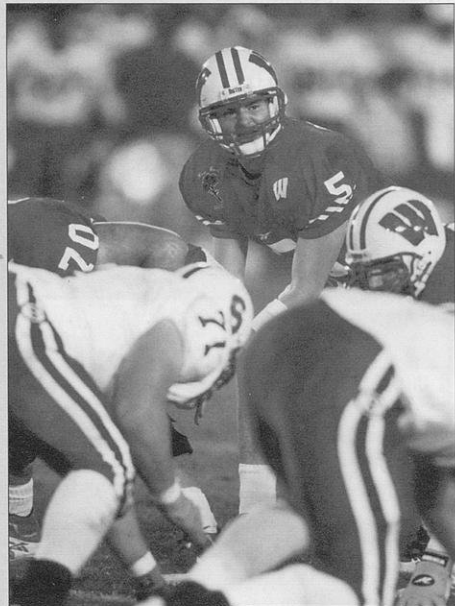

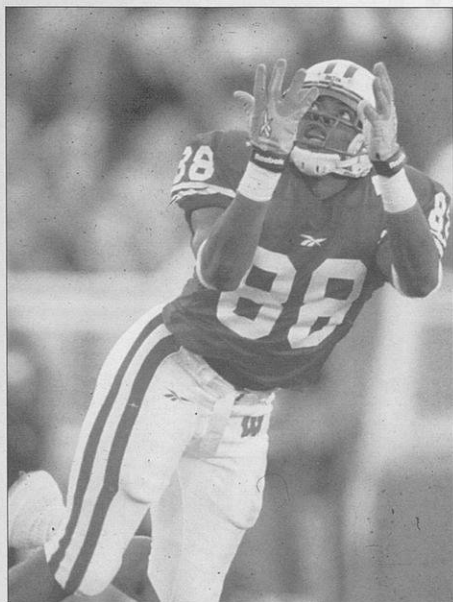

Dayne, whose 64-yard run on the second play of the second half energized the Big Ten champs, gained game MVP honors for the second year in a row. Dayne's stats in his final game as a Badger included 200 yards on 34 carries.

The Badger defense bottled up Stanford's running attack all game and limited the Cardinal to minus five yards rushing (tied for the second-best mark in school history). QB Todd Husak threw for 258 yards, but UW's defense dictated the action for most of the game.

Wisconsin had a 17-9 lead in the second half on TD runs by Dayne and Brooks Bollinger, but it took another defensive stand to clinch the win. Stanford's final drive ended when Husak was sacked on fourth down with just over a minute left.

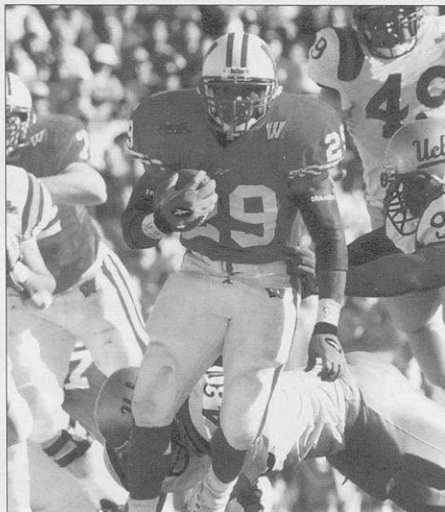

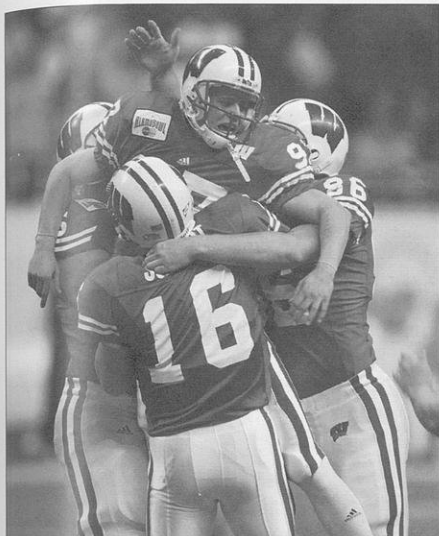

2003 Music City

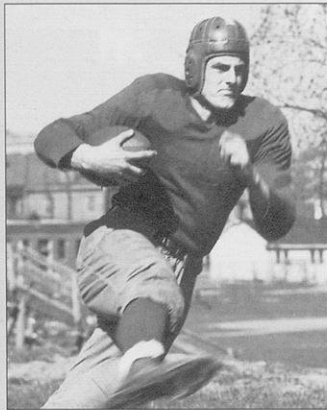

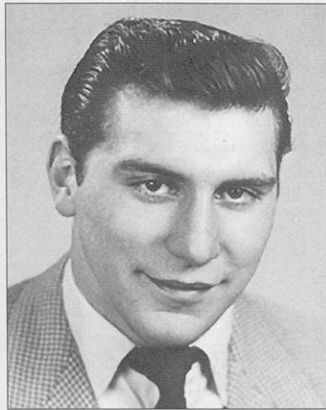

#40 Elroy Hirsch

Elroy Hirsch played only one season (1942) at UW, but he was one of the most beloved sports figures in school history. Hirsch, nicknamed "Crazylegs," rushed for 786 yards for Wisconsin's 8-1-1 team in 1942. He starred for nine years with the L.A. Rams and later served as UW's Director of Athletics (1969-87).



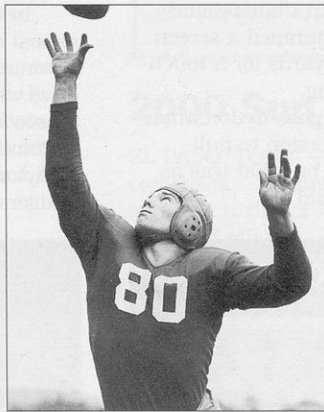
#35 Alan Ameche

Alan Ameche, the 1954 Heisman Trophy winner, was a three-time All-American and ended his career as the NCAA's all-time rushing leader. He led the Badgers to the 1953 Rose Bowl and rushed for 133 yards in that game. The four-time NFL Pro Bowl pick was inducted into the College Hall of Fame in 1975.



#83 Allan Shafer

The memory of former quarterback Allan Shafer is continued with the "Living Memorial" Scholarship that is given in his name. Shafer was fatally injured during the 1944 Wisconsin-Iowa game. Shafer is one of two Badgers (Jay Seiler is the other) to die from a football-related injury.



#80 Dave Schreiner

Dave Schreiner, the two-time All-America end, was named Western Conference Player of the Year in 1942. Schreiner lettered three years at the UW as an end, both on offense and defense. He is a member of the National Football Foundation and W Club Halls of Fame. He was voted to the UW's all-time team in 1969.

Strength and Conditioning Association. At UW, his primary responsibilities include assisting in all aspects of sports conditioning for the football team.

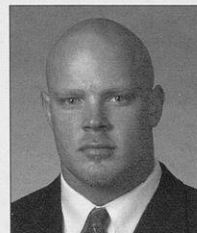

services for the student-athletes in 23 sport programs. His supervision also includes sport nutrition services, coordinator of the department's drug testing program and HIPAA coordinator for privacy of the student-athletes medical records.

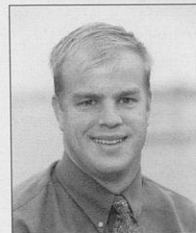

Assistant Trainer, seventh year

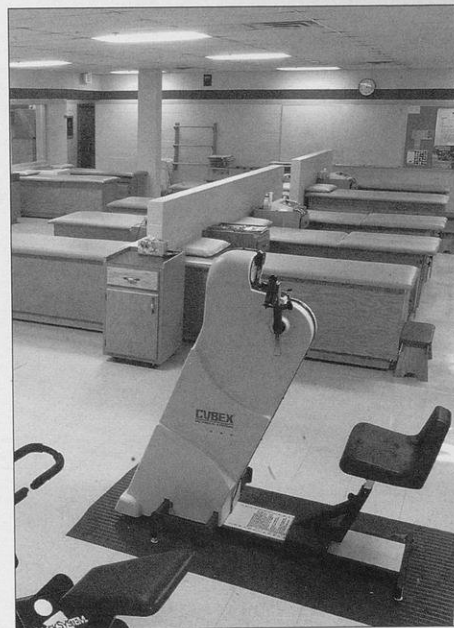

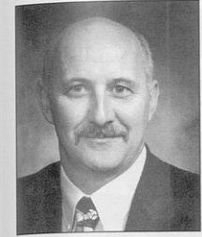

Terry Calloway is in his ninth year overall at Wisconsin, which includes two separate stints. His second term with the Badgers began in July 2001.

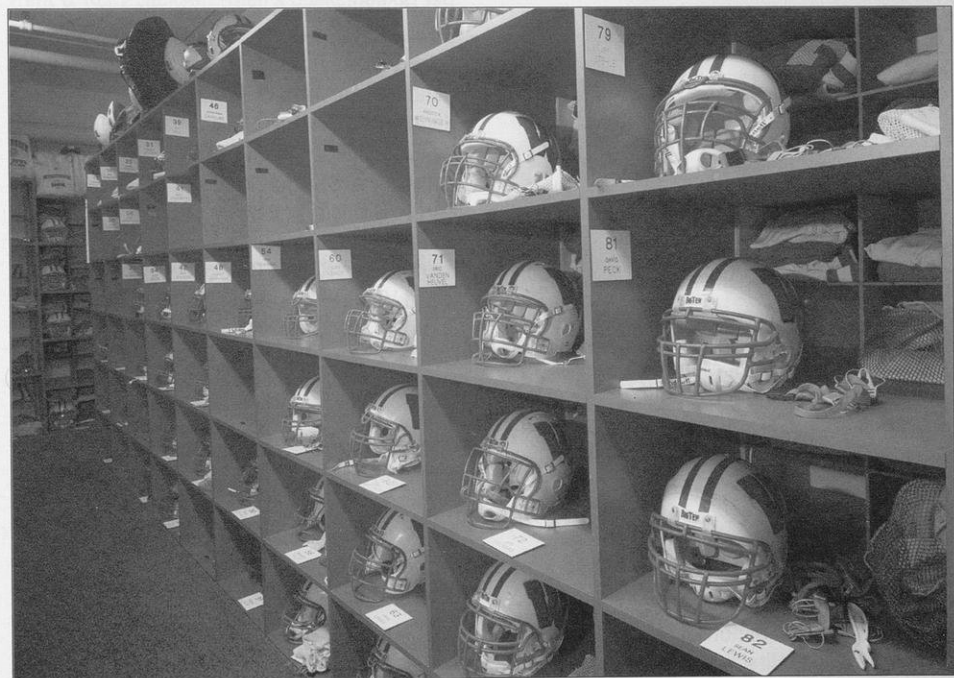
Calloway is responsible for packing equipment for road trips and also

2005 News and Notes

► Following his performance in the Capital One Bowl, RB Brian Calhoun was named MVP and became just the second player in NCAA Division I history to amass 1,500 yards rushing (1,636) and 500 yards receiving (571) in the same season. He finished with school single-season records of 22 rushing TDs and 348 rushing attempts.

► UW earned its fourth 10-win season in program history. All four came under head coach Barry Alvarez's direction.

► Wisconsin head coach Barry Alvarez concluded his career with a record of 118-73-4, including 8-3 in bowl games.

► QB John Stocco set UW season records in passing yards (2,920), passing TDs (21) and completions (197). On UW career lists, he is No. 3 in passing yards with 5,042.

► Along with last year's undefeated home season (6-0), this year's team won its first five home games to extend its home winning streak to a school-record (modern era) 11 games. Iowa snapped the streak in UW's final home game of the year.

► Wisconsin started this season 5-0 for the fifth time in the 16-year Alvarez era. In the previous four seasons in which they started 5-0 under Alvarez, the Badgers averaged 9.5 wins per year.

► UW tied its school record for road wins with four, a feat achieved five times previously (last done in 2000).

► The Badgers set a school record for points in a season by scoring 446. The previous mark was the 1999 team's 409 points.

In addition, this year's squad broke the school scoring average mark with its 34.3 ppg; the 1999 team had the previous high with 34.1 ppg.

► Wisconsin scored at least 40 points in six of its 13 games, matching an Alvarez-era high (the 1999 team also accomplished that feat). UW hit the 40-point mark just seven times from 2000 through 2004.

► In its first two games this season, Wisconsin scored a combined 121 points, the most for UW in consecutive games in the modern era. The previous high was 105 points in the first two games of the 1957 season (60 vs. Marquette and 45 vs. West Virginia). The all-time school record for points in back-to-back games is 167 in the first two games of the 1915 season (82 vs. Lawrence and 85 vs. Marquette). That was also the last time UW had scored at least 50 points in consecutive games.

► The Badgers led the Big Ten with a +13 turnover margin (27 gained, 14 lost), which ranked 11th nationally. Wisconsin committed zero or one turnover in nine of its 13 games. Meanwhile, the Badger defense forced at least two turnovers in nine games and at least one in every game.

► Wisconsin opponents averaged more penalty yardage per game (64.1) than the opponents of any other Big Ten school.

► The Badgers also led the Big Ten in net punting with a 39.3 ypp average (12th-best nationally) and tied for first in punt returns with a 14.7 ypr average (tied for 10th nationally).

► UW won the time-of-possession battle in nine games this year and its 31:35 per game average ranked second in the Big Ten.

► The Badgers' red zone offense (86.7 percent success rate) was second-best in the conference, while their red zone defense (allowing 75.5 percent) was third-best. In addition, UW scored a Big Ten-high 42 touchdowns from the red zone.

► After finishing 10th last season in pass efficiency (109.3), UW jumped to third in the Big Ten with a 149.6 rating in 2005. No other league school made as big an improvement.

► Wisconsin had two plays named the Pontiac Game Changing Performance of the Week, giving it three in two years. The first was WR Brandon Williams' 85-yard kickoff return vs. Bowling Green and the other was Jonathan Casillas' blocked punt

that was recovered by Ben Strickland in the end zone for the game-winning TD at Minnesota.

► UW had eight Big Ten Player of the Week awards—RB Brian Calhoun (offensive, named Sept. 4 and Oct. 31), WR Brandon Williams (co-special teams, Sept. 11; special teams, Oct. 2), P Ken DeBauche (special teams, Sept. 18), QB John Stocco (offensive, Nov. 28), LB Donte Sanders (defensive, Nov. 28) and K Taylor Mehlhaff (special teams, Nov. 28).

► Among Big Ten schools, only Wisconsin, Michigan and Ohio State have been to at least 11 bowl games in the past 13 seasons. However, UW's bowl winning percentage (.727) is better than both Ohio State's (.583) and Michigan's (.538).

► By defeating No. 7 Auburn in the Capital One Bowl, the Badgers earned their fifth victory over an Associated Press top-10 team during the Alvarez era.

► Camp Randall Stadium was sold out before the season began in 2004 and again in 2005. The Badgers have ranked 19th or better in national attendance average in each of the past 13 seasons.

► Wisconsin has drawn a crowd of at least 70,000 fans to 81 consecutive home games. Among those 81 games, 71 have been sellouts.

► The listed capacity for Camp Randall Stadium this season was 80,321. The Badgers set a stadium record when 83,184 fans attended the Iowa game on Nov. 12, 2005.

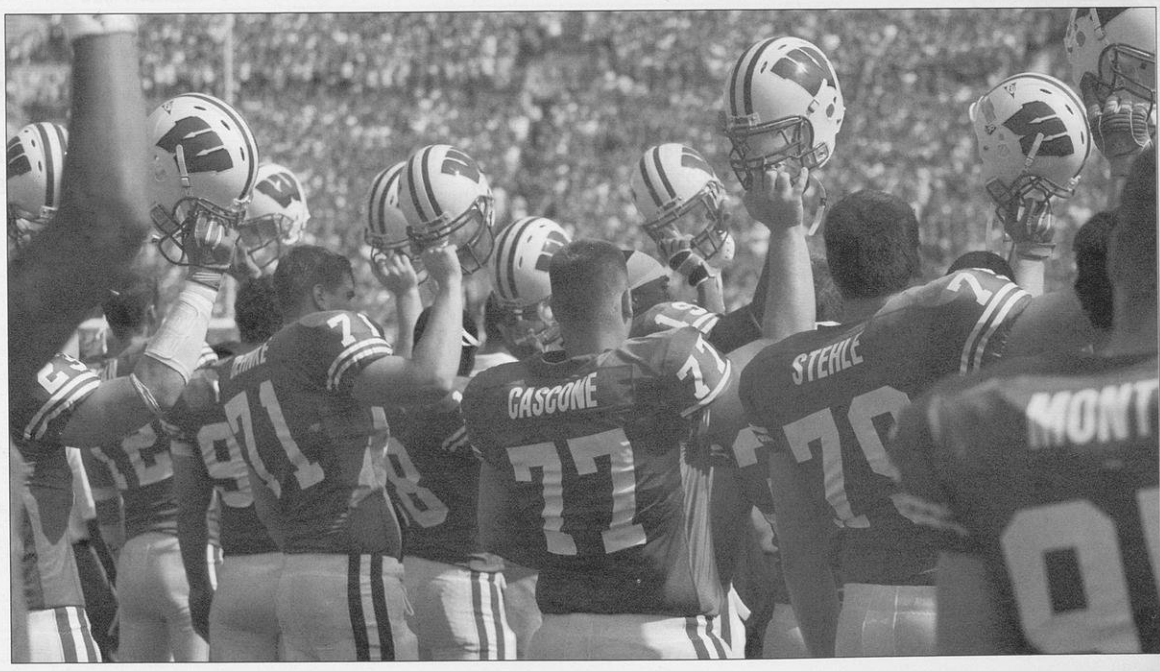

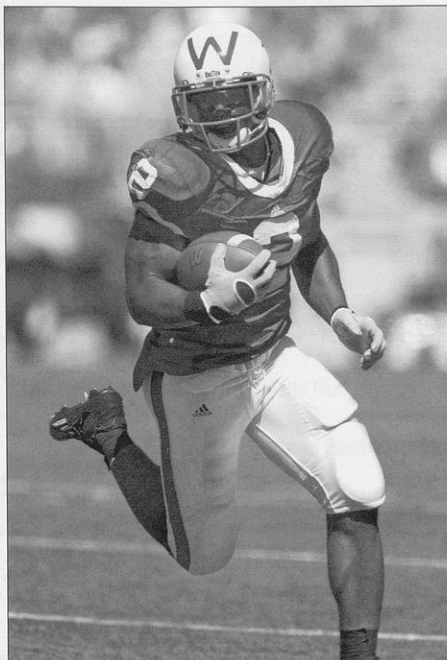
Wisconsin 65 Temple 0

ORLANDO, Fla. -- Junior RB Brian Calhoun rushed for 213 yards and a touchdown, and junior QB John Stocco threw for 301 yards and two scores, as Wisconsin defeated seventh-ranked Auburn 24-10 in the Capital One Bowl at Citrus Bowl Stadium.

The Badgers amassed 548 yards of total offense against a Tigers team that entered the contest allowing just 294.09 yards per game, ninth best nationally. They did it behind Calhoun, who became just the second player in Division I-A history to record 1,500 yards rushing and 500 yards receiving in the same season.

They also did it through the strength, poise and agility of Stocco, who connected with Brandon Williams for 173 yards and one TD. That score moved Stocco to No. 1 on the single-season list for TD passes (20) at Wisconsin.

Evjue Communications Center & Sideline Passes

Requests for 2006 Wisconsin football credentials (print, electronic and parking) must be made online. Contact the Wisconsin Athletic Communications Office for instructions.

Sideline credentials will be issued only to accredited photographers and reporters on assignment. You must display your credential prominently to be on the field level. Media members cannot work between the 25-yard lines as recommended by the NCAA in its game management manual.

Credentials will be mailed if time permits. Those passes which cannot be mailed will be left with the parking attendant (white vehicle) at the entrance of Lot 17 on Engineering Drive (north end of the Stadium).

Credentials will be issued according to the following priorities: 1) TV and radio stations originating a live broadcast; 2) national publications, newspapers filing for the following day's publication and news outlets designated by the visiting SID; 3) TV and radio stations covering for nightly news; and 4) other requests, which will be evaluated on a space-available basis. Spouses, friends, non-workers and children are not allowed in the media areas as dictated by the NCAA. Anyone violating these standards will be denied credentials to future games.

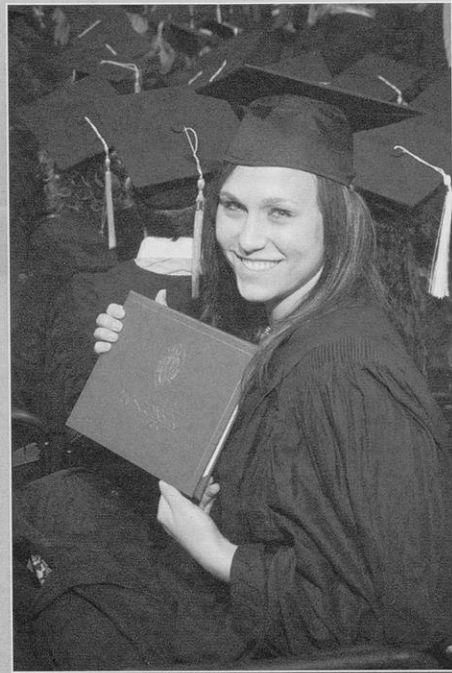

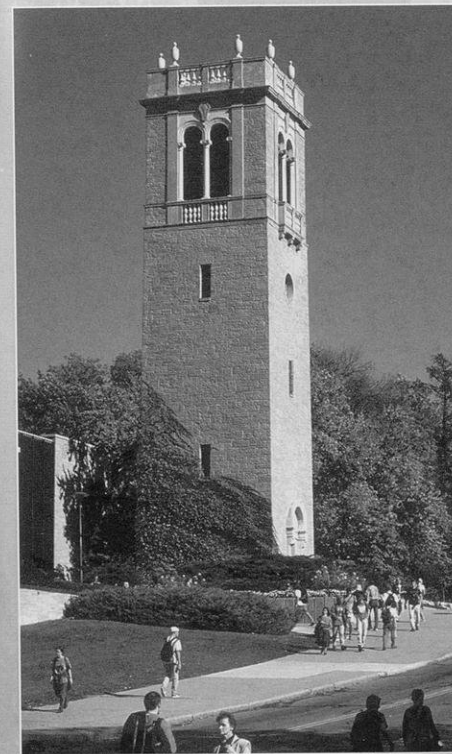

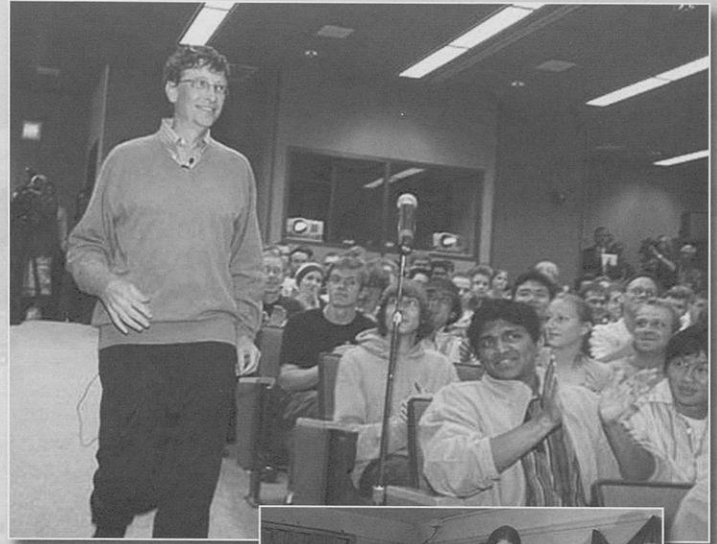
Student Life

The Wisconsin Film Festival features more than 100 independent films, documentaries, experimental films and shorts from around the world.

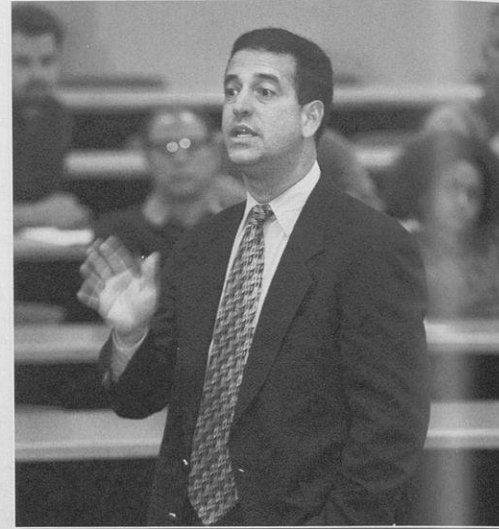

Chancellor John D. Wiley



John D. Wiley, chancellor of the University of Wisconsin–Madison, is the 27th leader of the university. He assumed office January 1, 2001.

From 1994–2000, Wiley served as the university's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs. From 1989–94, Wiley was dean of the UW–Madison Graduate School and the university's senior research officer. From 1986–89, he served as associate dean for research in the College of Engineering.

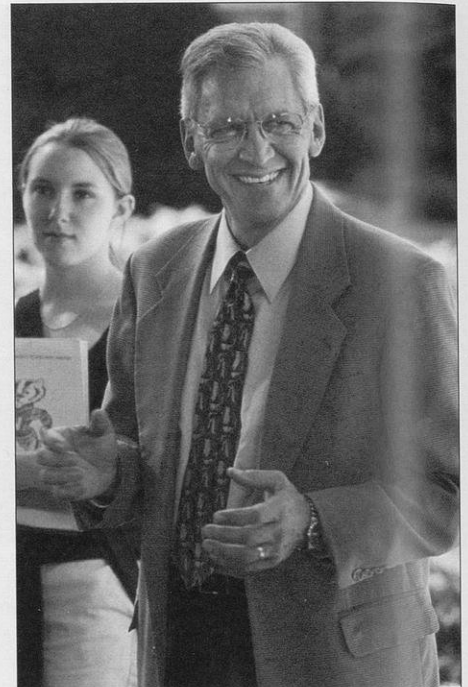
In his campus-level positions, Wiley has represented the institution for a variety of external constituencies, including alumni groups, the boards of trustees of univer-

sity-affiliated foundations and other organizations, domestic and international inter-university cooperatives, chambers of commerce and service clubs, the state legislature and governmental bodies, the UW System Administration, and the UW System Board of Regents. He also has been deeply involved in fundraising from individual and corporate donors, and charitable foundations.

As provost, Wiley was chief operating officer and deputy chancellor, working closely with deans, faculty, academic staff and student committees in the exercise of shared governance and the overall management of the institution. As graduate school dean, Wiley oversaw all aspects of graduate study, grant submission, agency liaison, research infrastructure and centers, and technology transfer.

Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964; attended graduate school at UW–Madison as an NSF Fellow and received master's and doctoral degrees in physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively. He joined the technical staff of Bell Telephone Laboratories at Murray Hill, N.J., from 1968 to 1974 and then spent a year at the Max Planck Institute in Stuttgart, Germany as an awardee of the Alexander von Humboldt Senior U.S. Service Award for Research and Training.

Wiley joined the UW–Madison faculty in the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering in August 1975. His research and teaching focused on a variety of topics related to semiconductors and other materials and processes important to

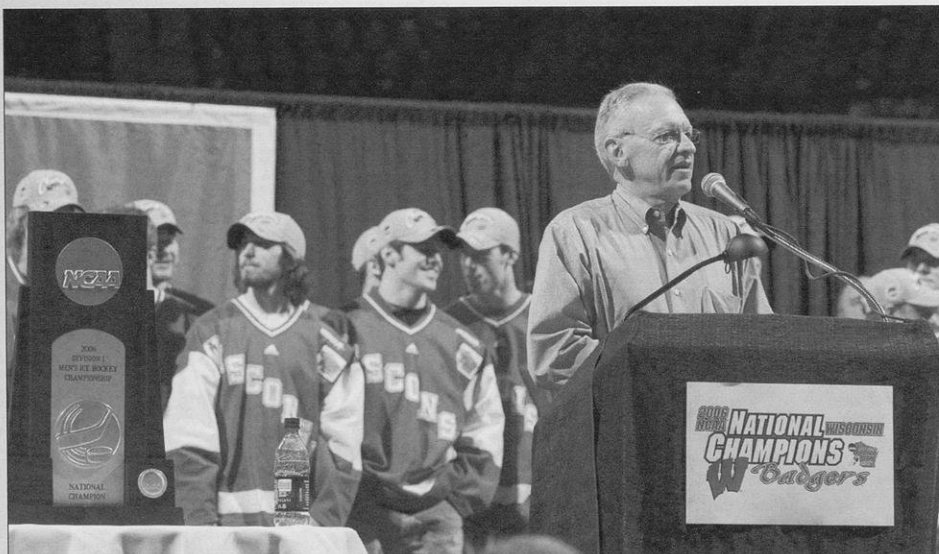


the electronics field. He is a co-founder of several highly successful research centers, including the Center for X-ray Lithography and the Engineering Research Center for Plasma-Aided Manufacturing. From 1982 to 1986, he chaired the Materials Science Program, a graduate-level, interdepartmental-committee program for master's and doctoral degrees.



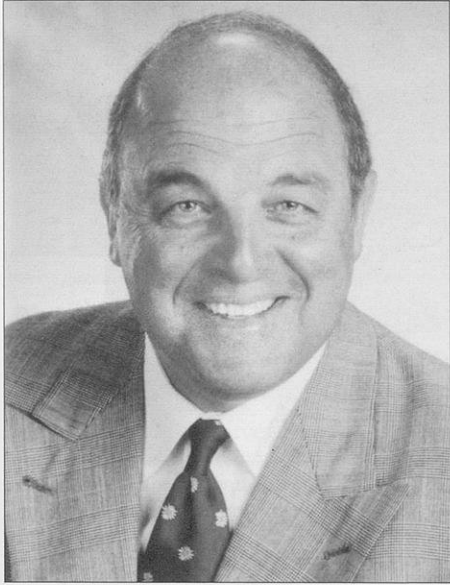

Director of Athletics Barry Alvarez



Barry Alvarez is in his third year as UW Director of Athletics, but his first without the additional title of head football coach.

For 16 years (1990-2005), Alvarez guided Wisconsin's football fortunes. He piloted the Badgers to three Big Ten Conference and Rose Bowl titles (including back-to-back in 1998-99) en route to becoming the winningest football coach in school history (118-73-4 record).

Alvarez was just the 10th coach in Big Ten history to win 100 games at one conference institution. His 8-3 (.727) record in bowl games with the Badgers is the best in college football history (among coaches with at least 11 bowl appearances). The 2004 AFCA Region 3 Coach of the Year, he also was the 1993 national coach of the year, a two-time Big Ten coach of the year and a finalist for ESPN's coach of the decade (1990s) honor.

In 2004-05, Alvarez served as athletic director and football coach and has been at the forefront of the revival of the Badger athletic program during his entire tenure in Madison.

He is a 1969 graduate of Nebraska, where he played linebacker and went on to earn his master's degree. He received a Distinguished Alumnus Award from his alma mater in 2003.

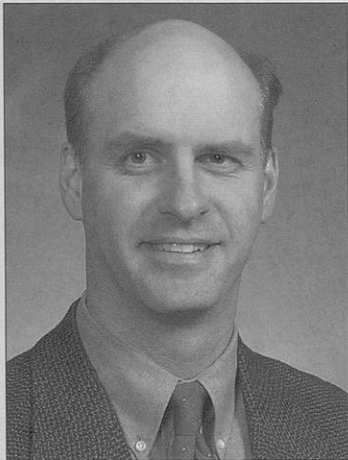

Senior Associate Doug Beard

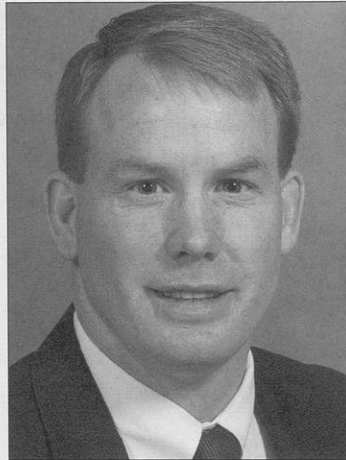
Doug Beard is in his fifth year on the UW administrative team. He was promoted to senior associate athletic director for administration on Feb. 1, 2006. Senior Associate Shawn M. Eichorst

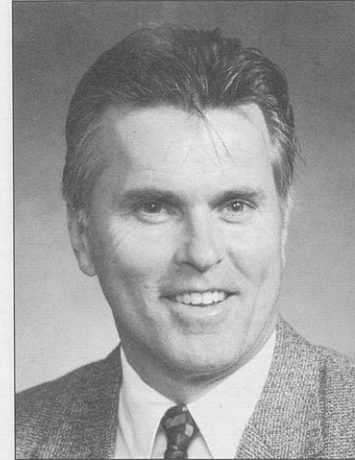
Shawn M. Eichorst is in his first year as senior associate athletic director. Eichorst's responsibilities include oversight of men's basketball, academic services, compliance, trademark and licensing, contractual matters as well as liaison with UW administration, the Athletic Board, the Big Ten Conference and state government.

Eichorst came to the UW from South Carolina where he served as the athletic department's chief administrative officer for two years as well as serving as interim athletic director in June of 2005. Eichorst previously served as the director of athletics at UW-Whitewater from June of 1999 through December of 2003. Under his leadership, UW-Whitewater developed into one of the nation's top Division III athletic programs.

He serves on the Executive Committee of the Sports Management Institute and is a past member of the NCAA Division I Student-Athlete Reinstatement Committee. Eichorst is a member of the State Bar of Wisconsin and is a past member of the State Bar of Wisconsin Board of Governors.

Senior Associate Vince Sweeney

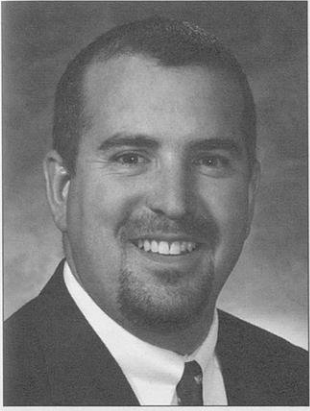

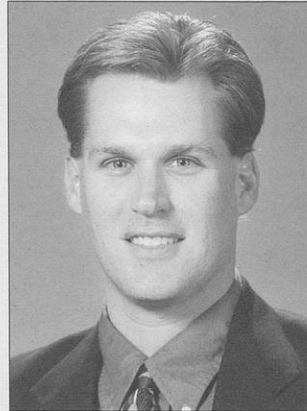
**Associate Director

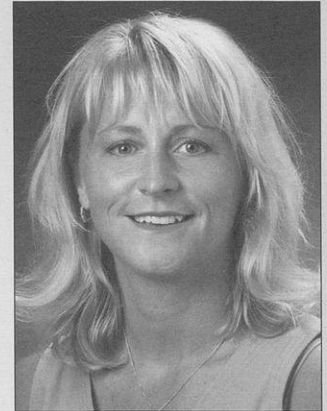
**Associate Director

Neubauer Pientka oversees all phases of the fundraising program. She also serves on the Board of Directors for the Madison Chapter of the Executive Women's Golf Association and previously served on the board of directors for the National W Club.

A graduate of the UW with a bachelor's degree in journalism, Neubauer Pientka was a Badger tennis All-American and four-time All-Big Ten selection. She earned Academic All-Big Ten honors three years and currently ranks seventh in career singles wins and third in career doubles wins.

Neubauer Pientka is married to Jim Pientka and has two stepchildren, Jack (7) and Jessica (4).

A Winning Athletic Program

In 2005-06, the University of Wisconsin won an astounding three NCAA championships in the same school year. The Badgers also added a national title by the women's lightweight rowing team and three individual national championships.

The men's cross country started the season off by winning its fourth national title in program history in November. Senior Simon Bairu won his second consecutive individual title.

In March, the women's hockey team won its first NCAA title. It was just the second NCAA postseason appearance and first run at the Frozen Four for the Badgers.

Wisconsin became the first school in NCAA history to win both the women's and men's ice hockey championships when the Badger men won the program's sixth title two weeks after the women.

The women's lightweight varsity eight crew won its third consecutive title at the Intercollegiate Rowing Association National Championships in 2006.

Junior Chris Solinsky earned two individual national titles in 2006. He won the 3,000 meters at the NCAA indoor championships for the second consecutive year and added the 5,000-meter title at the NCAA outdoor championships.

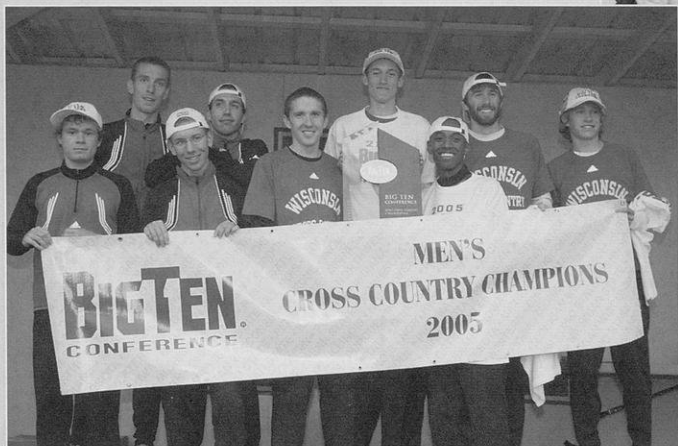

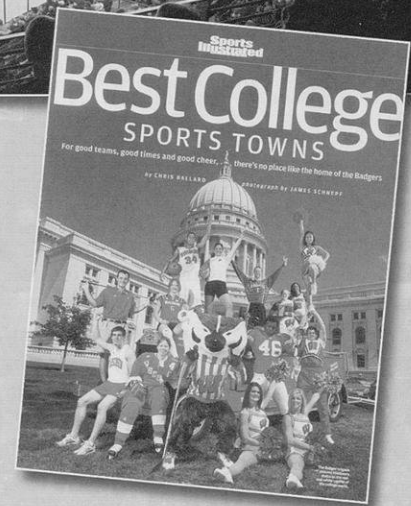
Attendance Leaders

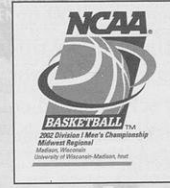
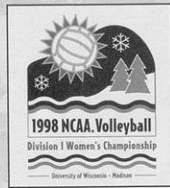
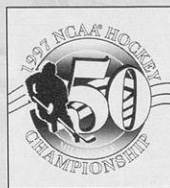
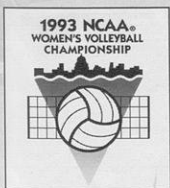


Above: UW hockey ranks among the top two teams in the nation for attendance for both men and women.

NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP HOSTS



Since 1993, the UW has hosted six NCAA championships and one NCAA men's basketball regional. Madison will also be the site of a hockey regional in 2008.

The Badgers played host to the NCAA Men's Ice Hockey Frozen Four in 1993, 1997 and 2006. All three events were sell-outs including the 2006 crowd that saw Wisconsin win the national title.

Wisconsin played host to the NCAA Women's Volleyball Championship in 1993 and 1998. The Badgers shattered the attendance records for the championship match and two-day event both years.

The UW was also the site of the 1998 NCAA Division I Women's Golf Championship. The event was the first national championship held at

University Ridge Golf Course and the first women's championship shown live on national television.

The NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament came to Wisconsin in 2002 when the Badgers played host to a regional in the Kohl Center.

Wisconsin Traditions

Badger Nickname

The nickname "Badgers" was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin, which was dubbed the "Badger State." The name didn't come from the animals in the region, but rather from an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

In 1949, a student wore a badger outfit with a papier-mâché head at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name—Buckingham U. Badger.

Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. The song has become legendary at the UW because of its polka-like rhythm.

Fifth Quarter

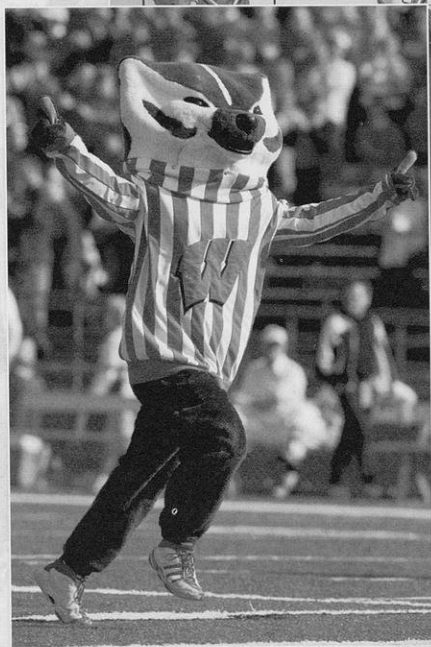
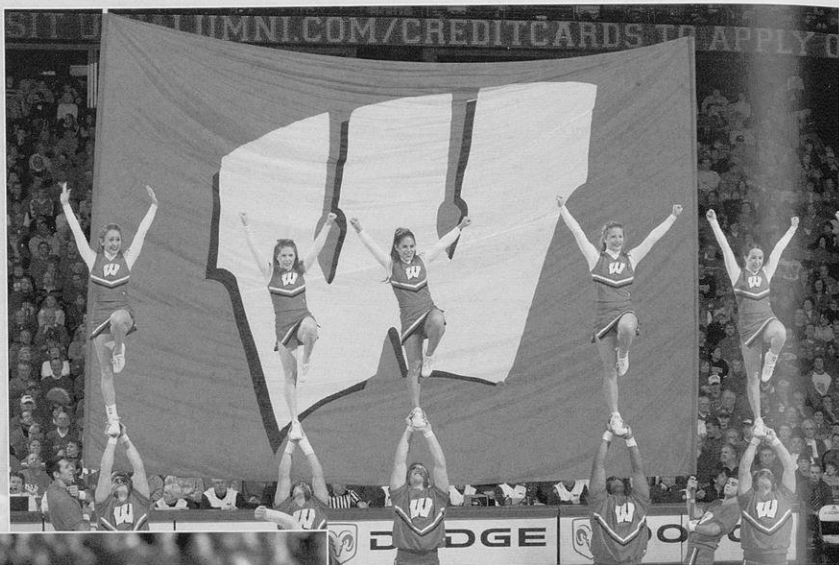
The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as it plays traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song.

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

Hall of Fame

The UW Athletic Hall of Fame was established in 1991 to recognize and honor former student-athletes and staff for their exemplary athletic achievement and contributions to the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department.

This is the Big Ten Conference



The Big Ten Conference is an association of 11 world-class universities whose member institutions share a common mission of research, graduate, professional and undergraduate teaching and public service. Intercollegiate athletics has an important place within the mission.

Founded in 1896, the Big Ten has sustained a comprehensive set of shared practices and policies that enforce the priority of academics in student-athletes' lives and emphasize the values of integrity, fairness and competitiveness.

Big Ten universities provide in excess of \$89 million in athletic scholarship aid to more than 8,400 men and women student-athletes who compete for 25 championships, 12 for men and 13 for women.

In 2005-06, the Big Ten distributed over \$117 million in revenues to its 11 member institutions. Conference institutions sponsor broad-based athletic programs with more than 270 teams.

Big Ten Universities ...

- are members of the nation's only conference whose constituency is entirely composed of institutions that are members of the AAU, a prestigious association of major academic and research institutions in the United States and Canada.
- have more than four million living alumni and over 300,000 undergraduate students attending Big Ten universities.
- house on their campuses nine of the nation's 30 largest academic libraries. Conference libraries hold more than 66 million book volumes and institutions freely share their materials with other league members.
- host more than 70 Nobel laureates as faculty, students, researchers or alumni
- enroll students of whom over 40 percent have graduated in the top 10 percent of their high school class, while 74 percent graduated in the top quarter of their class.

Big Ten Athletics ...

- since 1992, the Big Ten has created in excess of 2,000 new opportunities for women student-athletes and established 28 new women's teams.
- based on the federal graduation rate average for the 1995-98 freshman classes, Big Ten student-athletes graduated at 70 percent compared to 62 percent for all Division I student-athletes. As a conference, student-athletes tend to graduate at rates consistent with the general student body (71 percent). In 2006, the NCAA also introduced a new calculation- the Graduation Success Rate (GSR) - that accounts for transfer student-athletes. The Big Ten's GSR was 81 percent compared to the Division I average of 76 percent.
- recognized 1,992 Academic All-Big Ten honorees during the 2005-06 academic year, the highest total in the last decade. Over the past five years, the Conference has annually acknowledged nearly 1,700 student-athletes as Academic All-Conference honorees.
- has claimed at least four team national championships in seven of the last nine full seasons, including six national titles during 1999-2000 alone, the most for the conference in more than a decade. Big Ten national champions in 2005-06 included Northwestern women's lacrosse and three national crowns for Wisconsin in men's cross country and men's and women's ice hockey. The conference has also produced team national crowns in the sports of basketball, fencing, field hockey, football, golf, gymnastics, soccer, softball, synchronized

BIG TEN 9-11 SCHOLARSHIP FUND

Following the national tragedy on Sept. 11, 2001, the Big Ten, through its intercollegiate athletic department revenues, pledged a \$1 million scholarship contribution to assist the families of those affected by the terrorist attacks. The Big Ten made a presentation to Lumina Foundation for Education and the Citizens' Scholarship Foundation of America™ (CSFA) to provide undergraduate and graduate degree scholarships at Big Ten member institutions. The conference's donation is called the "Big Ten 9-11 Scholarship Fund." The \$1 million contribution will be drawn from conference reserves, which are generated as a result of football and men's basketball participation in NCAA, bowl and regular season television opportunities.

swimming, tennis, volleyball and wrestling over those nine seasons.

- led all conferences with nine institutions appearing among the top 30 in the 2005 Excellence in Athletics Cup, which was established in 2004 by the Laboratory for the Study of Intercollegiate Athletics at Texas A&M to recognize all-around achievement in athletics. The athletic departments for all NCAA Division I schools were evaluated based upon on-field success, graduation rate indicators, gender equity indicators and efficiency in using financial resources. While conferences were not ranked in the second annual study, the Big Ten was rated as the best among the six major conferences in the initial Excellence in Athletics Cup. The conference ranked among the top two in four categories including first in overall graduation rates and achieving gender equity and second in African-American student-athlete graduation rates and NCAA postseason competition.
- showcased more than 300 events that were televised nationally, regionally and locally last year, representing over 600 hours of programming.
- are among the national attendance leaders in football, men's and women's basketball and women's volleyball. During 2005-06, more than 8.2 million fans attended Big Ten home contests in those sports.

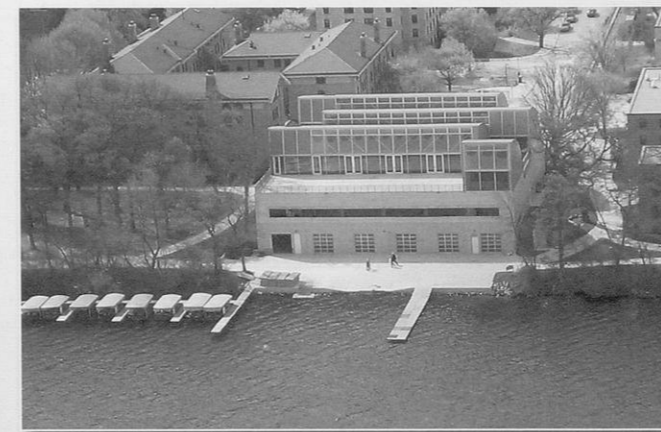

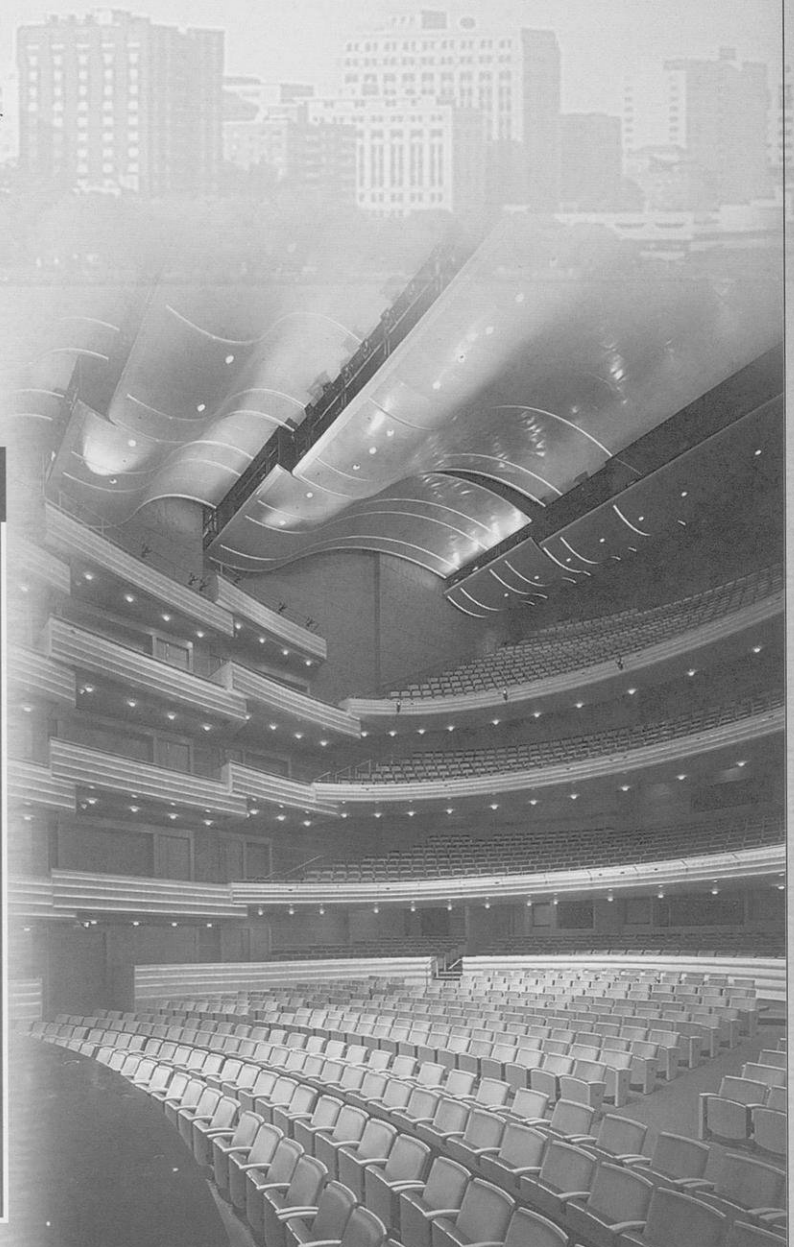
- Madison is one of only a few cities in the world built on an isthmus. Downtown Madison is set on a narrow strip of land between two glacial lakes—Lake Mendota and Lake Monona. A total of five area lakes, plus more than 250 parks and 120 miles of designated bike routes within the city limits provide an abundance of year-round outdoor activities, from hiking, biking, swimming and sailing to cross-country skiing, ice skating, and ice fishing.
- The Wisconsin State Capitol is the city's signature landmark. No building in Madison may be built higher than the 284-foot white granite dome of the Capitol, which is modeled after our nation's Capitol.
- State Street, a one-mile pedestrian mall linking the Capitol Square to the beautiful lakeside campus of the University of Wisconsin, is lined with diverse ethnic eateries, eclectic boutiques, galleries, coffeehouses and more.
- Famed architect Frank Lloyd Wright spent his childhood years in Madison and returned to live in the area at the height of his international fame. The Madison area is home to a generous selection of Wright-designed buildings.
- Ecologist Aldo Leopold, conservation pioneer John Muir, playwright Thornton Wilder, novelist Jacquelyn Mitchard, actor/comedian Chris Farley, Olympians Beth and Eric Heiden and composer/performer Ben Sidran are other notable people associated with Madison.

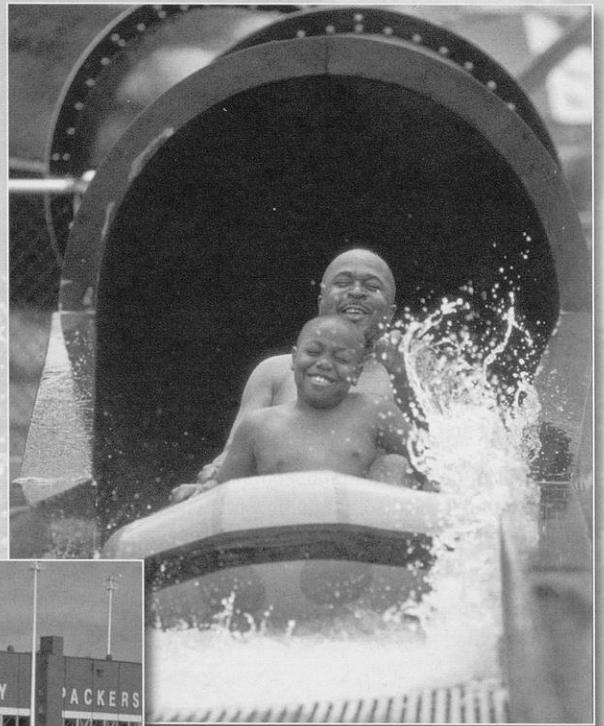
