


#### Shameless Sorority Sisters Swing Savage Shindig!

Innovations galore greeted the guests at the party. All of us know what trouble it is to find our derbies




Derby Pulverizer



Gertie and the girls often vacationed in splendor at Westport and other Wisconsin spas.





OUR own budding author from the northern part of the state, John Scrapple, is responsible for the literary epic of the year, "Lady Chatterly's Lover", a poig-

nant tale of the love of Hattie Chatterly, Theta pledge, and the daring Deke, Chauncey Fietlebaum. Not since "Decameron" has such an idyllic story come off the presses (wine presses).

Hattie, a transfer from Vassar, pledged Theta at Wisconsin at the tender age of twenty-seven and first met Chauncey, by chaunce, at the Theta open house this fall. Chauncey, charged with enough amatory electricity to woo a Delta Gamma (after drinking the famous Deke Highball: Two parts of Muriatic Acid to one part Copper Sulphate solution) lured Hattie from the Theta porch to the Phi Kappa Sig pier and there made love to her over the lake where the poor fish swim. Scrapple certainly deserves a big bouquet for turning out the Book-of-the Season. Rumors have it that it is being seriously considered for the Pukelitzer Prize.

We very strongly recommend "Lady Chatterly's Lover" from an educational standpoint, and predict that within a comparatively short time it will be in use as a textbook on the hill. Scrapple has done a marvelous piece of work in weaving the plot together, and we very much suspect that it is based in no small measure of his own experiences as a student at Wisconsin.








