





Badgers Face The Citadel in Inaugural **Big Ten Network Broadcast**

The Wisconsin football team (2-0) takes on The Citadel (2-0) today at 11 a.m. This will be the first Badger football game televised by The Big Ten Network. Thom Brennaman, Charles Davis and Charissa Thompson will handle the commentary.

UW is ranked seventh in both the Associated Press poll and the USA Today/Coaches' Poll. The Citadel is not ranked.

The Badgers are coming off a 20-13 win at UNLV on Sept. 8 while The Citadel defeated Webber International 76-0. This is the start of a three-game homestand for UW.

THE SERIES

This will be the first meeting between the Badgers and The Citadel ... this will be UW's first-ever game against a school from South Carolina ... this will be Wisconsin's first game against a school with military ties since beating Air Force 38-0 on Sept. 15, 1979 ... the Bulldogs are members of The Southern Conference, the same conference as Appalachian State, which defeated Michigan on Sept. 1 ... the last team from the Football Championship Subdivision (formerly Division I-AA) UW faced was Western Illinois on Sept. 9, 2006 (34-10 Wisconsin victory) ... the Badger men's basketball team faces Wofford this season, also a member of The Southern Conference







Today's Game at Camp Randall



Sophomore P.J. Hill ran for 147 yards on 30 carries in Wisconsin's win over UNLV last week. It was the second 30-carry performance of his career.

Key Notes to Consider

- ♦ Wisconsin is 22-1 in its last 23 regular-season non-conference games, including wins in the last 14 straight. UW's only loss during that span was a 23-5 setback at home against UNLV on Sept. 13, 2003.
- Wisconsin has more wins (33) than any other Big Ten school since the beginning of the 2004 season. Ohio State is second with 32

Dating back to last season, Wisconsin has won 11 consecutive games. That is the longest active winning streak in the country. That is tied for the second-longest winning streak in school history (also had 11 straight wins from 1999-2000). The longest is 17 games from 1900-02.


- ♦ The Badgers entered the fourth quarter against UNLV trailing 10-9 and also trailed 13-12 after Sergio Aguayo's field goal with 7:43 remaining. The comeback win was UW's first fourth-quarter comeback since Oct. 28, 2006 against Illinois. Wisconsin has six fourth-quarter comebacks since the start of the 2004 season.
- ♦ Wisconsin is one of five programs in the nation with no more than one home loss since the start of the 2004 season. The Badgers are 19-1 at Camp Randall Stadium during that time. The others are Boise State (20-0), Southern California (19-0), Louisville (19-0) and Florida (21-1).

General Notes

- The Badgers have won eight straight games at Camp Randall Stadium, tied for the eighth-longest home winning streak in school history.
- lacktriangle During that eight-game home winning streak (since the start of 2006), UW has scored at least 30 points six times. The Badgers are averaging 32.1 points in those games, compared to 10.3 for their opponents.
- ♦ The official game time temperature for the Badgers' game at UNLV was 98 degrees. That makes this the warmest game UW has played in since 1950 (as far back as the records go).

Wisconsin has been ranked among the top seven in both polls in each of the first three weeks this season. The last time UW was ranked among the top 10 in each of the first three weeks was 2000.

- ♦ The Badgers have been ranked in the Associated Press Top 25 for 40 of the past 51 weeks, dating back to the start of the 2004 season.
- ♦ Wisconsin sold out its entire allotment of home game tickets prior to the start of the season for the third consecutive year. UW sold a total of 69,270 season tickets for the 2007 campaign. Camp Randall Stadium has played host to 26 straight sellouts. In fact, the Badgers have a drawn at least 70,000 fans to 89 consecutive home games (among those 89 games, 79 have been sellouts).

Ofensive Notes

- ♦ Senior quarterback Tyler Donovan is 40 in his four career starts. In those galaes, Donovan is 66-of-105 (62.9 percert) for 958 yards, eight touchdowns and just one interception. His passing efficiency or those four games is 162.74.
- Donovan's main target in his four sta ts has been senior wide receiver Luke Sw n. Swan has 19 catches for 407 yards and four TDs in Donovan's starts. Six of Sw n's receptions have gone for at least 30 ards.
- ♦ Taylor Mehlhaff's field goal as time exp red in the second quarter of the UNLV gan e marked the 11th time in the last 14 gan es that Wisconsin has scored in the last two minutes of the first half (and second time this season). The Badgers scored a to al of 62 points (eight TDs and two field goals) in the last two minutes of the first half last season.

P.J. Hill rushed for 147 yards on 30 carries. It was his first 100-yard rushing effort of the season and ninth of his career. It was just the second time in Hill's career that he has carried the ball at least 30 times in a game. His career high is 35 carries vs.

Northwestern on Oct. 7, 2006.

- ♦ The Badgers rushed for 210 yards against UNLV, their first 200-yard rushing performance since running for 241 yards against Purdue on Oct. 21, 2006. UW rushed for at least 200 yards in five of the first eight games last year but in none of the last five contests.
- ♦ Tight end Garrett Graham caught his second touchdown pass in as many weeks with a 3-yarder against UNLV. He did not catch a pass last year as a redshirt freshman.

Special Teams Notes

♦ Senior kicker Taylor Mehlhaff's 51-yard field in the fourth quarter vs. UNLV was his third field goal of at least 50 yards in his career and tied for the second-longest kick of his career. His career long is 52 yards against Arkansas in the 2007 Capital One Bowl.

first two games. His average of 23.4 yards per return is fourth in the Big Ten. His 37-yard return in the fourth quarter vs. UNLV was his longest of the season and set up UW's game-winning touchdown.

Defensive Notes

- ♦ Wisconsin allowed just 48 rushing yards to UNLV. That was the Badger defense's best effort against the run since giving up just 36 yards on the ground to Penn State on Nov. 4, 2006. UW has given up fewer than 100 yards rushing in six of the last 14 games.
- ♦ UW has given up 265 yards in the first quarter of its two games this season. In the remaining six quarters, they have allowed just 369 yards.
- ♦ Sophomore free safety Shane Carter's interception in the fourth quarter against UNLV was the first of his career and the first forced turnover for the UW defense this season.
- ♦ Since 2004, when Bret Bielema became UW's defensive coordinator, the Badgers are 25-1 when they have given up 20 or fewer points.

Chancellor John D. Wiley



hancellor John D. Wiley has more than four decades of experience with the University of Wisconsin–Madison, having been a graduate student, a professor, and an administrator during his illustrious university career. Assuming office on January 1, 2001, he is the 27th person to lead the university since its founding in 1848.

As UW-Madison's chief executive officer. Wiley is responsible for the overall vision and direction of the university. He represents the institution for a variety of constituents, including alumni groups, chambers of commerce and service clubs, the state legislature and governmental bodies, the UW System Administration, and the UW System Board of Regents. A prominent figure in higher education, he chairs both the Big Ten Council of Presidents and Chancellors and the board for the Council on Higher Education Accreditation, and is a member of the National Security Higher Education Advisory Committee. He also serves on several local and community boards, including the William T. Eviue Foundation and the Greater Madison Chamber of Commerce. He also has been deeply involved in

fundraising from individual and corporate donors and charitable foundations.

From 1994-2000, Wiley served as UW-Madison's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs. In this role as the university's chief operating officer and deputy chancellor, he worked closely with deans, faculty, academic staff, and student committees in the exercise of shared governance and the overall management of the institution. Prior to becoming provost, he was dean of the Graduate School and the university's senior research officer, and from 1986-89, he served as associate dean for research in the College of Engineering.

Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964. He attended graduate school at UW-Madison as a National Science Foundation Fellow, receiving master's and doctoral degrees in physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively. He joined the technical staff of Bell Telephone Laboratories at Murray Hill, N.J., from 1968-1974, and then spent a vear at the Max Planck Institute in Stuttgart, Germany as an awardee of the Alexander von Humboldt Senior U.S. Service Award for Research and Training.

Joining the UW-Madison faculty in the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering in August 1975. Wiley began a productive career in teaching and research, focusing on topics related to semiconductors and other materials and processes important to the electronics field. He is a co-founder of several highly successful research centers, including the Center for Xray Lithography and the Engineering Research Center for Plasma-Aided Manufacturing. From 1982-86, he chaired the Materials Science Program, a graduate-level, interdepartmental-committee program for master's and doctoral degrees.

I am committed to helping ensure that our teams achieve the highest standards of excellence, not just in competition, but also in integrity, values and character.


In addition, athletics offers the university another opportunity to connect with alumni and friends.



Director of Athletics Barry Alvarez



arry Alvarez is in his fourth year as Director of Athletics at the University of Wisconsin and secol without the additional title of head to ball coach. Alvarez, who began his ever as athletic director in April of 2004, we we as athletic director and football coach in 2004–05 and in 2005–06.

Alvarez's first year as Director of
Al eletics (without the football duties) was
a memorable one as Wisconsin won four
na ional titles (men's cross country, men's
an I women's hockey and women's lightwe ght rowing) during the 2005-06 athlet c campaign. The Badgers also won five
co ference titles.

The UW maintained its winning ways in 2006-07 with the men's track and field term winning its first NCAA title. The women's hockey team repeated as NCAA champions as Wisconsin finished 16th in the Directors' Cup rankings.

Badger student-athletes also showed their capabilities off the field of play during the fall of 2007 when they registered the highest cumulative grade point average for a fall term in department history. Thirteen teams also finished with record high grade point averages for either the fall or spring semester.

Alvarez guided Wisconsin's football fortunes for 16 seasons (1990–2005). He has been at the forefront of the revival of the Badger athletic program during his entire tenure in Madison. He piloted Wisconsin to three Big Ten and Rose Bowl ities (including back-to-back in 1998–99) en route to becoming the winningest football coach in school history (118-73-4 record).

Alvarez was just the 10th coach in Big Ten history to win 100 games at one conference institution. His 8-3 (.727)

record in bowl games with the Badgers is the best in college football history (among coaches with at least 11 bowl appearances). The 2004 AFCA Region 3 Coach of the Year, he also was the 1993 national coach of the year, a two-time (1993 and 1998) Big Ten coach of the year and a finalist for ESPN's coach of the decade (1990s) honor.

Alvarez is a 1969 graduate of the University of Nebraska, where he played linebacker and went on to earn his master's degree. He received a Distinguished Alumnus Award from his alma mater in 2003.

Alvarez and his wife Cindy are cocampaign chairs in the effort to bring a Gilda's Club, a free support center for families dealing with cancer, to Madison. Alvarez also serves on the board of directors for the MACC Fund (Mideast Athletes Against Childhood Cancer).

Alvarez and his wife are the parents of three children—daughters Dawn (Mrs. Brad Ferguson) and Stacy (Mrs. Mike Delzer); son Chad (wife Stephanie). Barry and Cindy are grandparents to Joe and Jake Ferguson: Grace and Jackson Delzer; and Scarlet and Barry John Thomas Alvarez.

Head Coach Bret Bielema

ne would be hard-pressed to draw up a better head coaching debut than the one Wisconsin's Bret Bielema fashioned in 2006.

The third-youngest head coach in Bowl subdivision football, Bielema has proven that age is just a number. He has shown that determination, hard work, organization and enthusiasm—all traits Bielema embodies—count the most when sizing up an individual's qualifications.

Biclema guided the Badgers to a 12-1 overall record and 7-1 mark in the Big Ten (good for a second-place tie with Michigan). Wisconsin capped its recordsetting 2006 season with a 17-14 win over Arkansas in the 2007 Capital One Bowl. No previous Wisconsin team had won more than 11 games in a season. In addition, Bielema became just the third rookie head coach in NCAA Division I history to pilot his team to 12 victories.

Bielema's efforts were rewarded when he was named the 2006 Dave McClain Big Ten Coach of the Year. Bielema also was named one of five finalists for the Bear Bryant National Coach of the Year Award and was a finalist for the 2006 Schutt Sports Division IA Coach of the Year Award.

Wisconsin surprised most observers outside the program by setting school records for overall wins (12) and regular-season victories (11), as well as tying the UW mark for conference victories (seven). The Badgers did it with a defensive unit that ended the 2006 regular season ranked among the top three nationally in pass defense, pass efficiency defense, total defense and scoring defense. And they

did it with an offense led by a pair of seniors (QB John Stocco and All-America tackle Joe Thomas), a young but talented offensive line, the Big Ten Freshman of the Year (P.J. Hill) at tailback and an emerging corps of receivers, including John Mackey Award semifinalist Travis Beckum.

Bielema was Wisconsin's defensive coordinator in 2004 and 2005, a period in which the program produced a 19-6 record under former head coach Barry Alvarez. The 2004 Badgers were sixth nationally in scoring defense and ninth in total defense. The 2005 club, which earned Wisconsin's first shutout since 1999, finished its 10-win season with a 24-10 victory over No. 7 Auburn in the 2006 Capital One Bowl; UW limited the high-powered Tigers to just 236 yards of total offense.

During Bielema's two years guiding the Badger defense, two players (DE Erasmus James and DB Jim Leonhard) earned first-team All-America honors and two others (DT Anttaj Hawthorne and DB Scott Starks) were first-team All-Big Ten selections. While coaching the Badgers' linebackers, Bielema developed Mark Zalewski and Dontez Sanders, both of whom earned honorable mention all-conference acclaim.

Bielema was co-defensive coordinator at Kansas State under former head coach Bill Snyder from 2002–03. The Wildcats were 22-6 during Bielema's time there and finished in the top 10 nationally (in



both 2002 and 2003) in scoring and total defense. The Wildcats won their first Big 12 title in 2003. Among Bielema's standout players at Kansas State were first-team All-American Josh Buhl, 2003 NFL second-round draft pick Terry Pierce and second-team All-Big 12 selection Bryan Hickman.

Prior to his years at Kansas State, Bielema spent nine seasons as an assistant coach at his alma mater, Iowa, where he worked for head coaches Hayden Fry and Kirk Ferentz. The 1997 Hawkeyes posted three shutouts and ranked No. 4 nationally in scoring defense. Bielema coached Fred Barr (first-team All-Big Ten Vernon Rollins and Matt Hughes (both honorable mention All-Big Ten) at Iowa.

Head coaches for whom Bielema has worked—Alvarez, Snyder, Ferentz and Fry—have combined to win 553 games and guide their teams to 42 bowl games, so the second-year Badger mentor has learned from some of the best in the business. The last four teams (2002–06) for which Bielema has coached accumulated a 53-13 record.

Bielema earned four letters (1989–92) after joining the Iowa football program as a walk-on. He earned a scholarship after his first year and was a member of Iowa's 1990 Big Ten championship team. A starter as a junior in 1991, he was a team co-captain as a senior. Bielema signed a free agent contract with the Seattle Seahawks and later completed his playing career with the Milwaukee Mustangs of the Arena Football League. Bielema has participated in 10 bowl games as a player or coach.

A 1992 graduate of lowa with a bachelor's degree in marketing, Bielema was born in Prophetstown, Ill., on Jan. 13. 1970.

Jinior Linebacker DeAndre Levy

eAndre Levy is the kind of guy you'd want in your family. He is loyal. He is loving. He is appreciative. He cares.

Levy is a guy who is not afraid to tell you how blessed he is to have the close, tight-knit family that he does.

He knows he grew up with more than many of his friends, meaning he had the support of both his mother and father, and had a good relationship with his siblings, Sean (23) and Sheena (22).

Born and raised in Milwaukee, Levy had more friends than he could count who grew up without one parent or both.

Yet, it is one thing to grow up with a close family like he did and another thing to recognize how blessed he was.

But, Levy is just that kind of person.

"A lot of people I went to school with didn't have both of their parents, so that is one thing that I am blessed to have—both parents active in my life, supporting me in whatever I did," Levy said. "I know that is a key thing to have in a family household ... support from your parents throughout your whole life. I know a lot of people who don't even know some of their parents."

Much of Levy's good nature and attitude can be credited to his parents, Rodney and Paula.

Growing up and still today, Paula works as a secretary for a medical association, while Rodney is employed at Bradley

Corporation.

But, Levy said, they have never missed a game, not since he was six or seven years old. It didn't matter if Levy was playing football, basketball or baseball, his parents came to every one.

"That is one thing I am still kind of surprised at," Levy said. "They made time regardless of what else was going on. They always found time to support me."

Levy, who earned his second letter last season and was named Academic All-Big Ten, started 13 games at Sam linebacker. He finished the 2006 campaign as the team's fourth-leading tackler with 50 stops and lead the team with six quarterback sacks for 38 yards.

With such a household growing up, one would think Levy's family had some influence on him concerning football.

Not exactly.

"That is the thing," Levy said. "No one in my household is really athletic. I am kind of the first one. My mom and dad have always supported me. My dad made sure I was doing something, but he never forced me or anything."

Instead, Levy basically did it on his

"I was always motivated on my own to get out and do something," he said. "My dad always was there helping me, but it didn't really go beyond playing basketball in the backyard."

In truth, his older brother Sean actually was the first one to start playing football, but never stayed with it. When Levy was old enough, his parents signed him up and he "kind of liked it" and continued to do it every year.

In the present day, Levy and his family are still relatively close. He said it is more difficult now because he is in Madison and his family is back home in Milwaukee.

But, being the parents that they are, Rodney and Paula still get to all of their son's games.

"This year they are probably going to come to every game with the exception of Penn State, just because of the distance, time and money."

And, how often does Levy go home?

"I try to make it home once or twice a month, but when I'm in season, I'm pretty much wrapped up," Levy said. "I know it's kind of hard for them with us being in the house for 18 or 19 years and just kind of going off. They still want to see me, so I do that for them."

Just because he's that kind of guy.



Cameday at Wisconsin ...

There's Nothing Else Like It

n 2005, Sports Illustrated on Campus said that Wisconsin has the best gameday atmosphere in the Big Ten Conference. That's quite a statement, but that may not go far enough. The fact is there may not be a better way to experience college football than spending a day at Wisconsin's fabled Camp Randall Stadium.

First of all, Wisconsin fans love a good time and they love to watch the Badgers win. There are plenty of both at Camp Randall. Badger backers arrive early – they are legendary tailgaters – and stay late, with thousands remaining inside the stadium to sing and dance as the UW Marching Band conducts its festive "5th Quarter" routine.

And there is nothing like the oftenimitated-but-never-duplicated madness that is "Jump Around." Between the third and fourth quarters of every home game, thousands of Wisconsin fans, band members (and sometimes even players) jump to the 1990s hip-hop tune by House of Pain. The stadium rocks and rolls and shakes and bakes!

Badger fans are also loyal. Camp Randall Stadium has witnessed crowds of at least 70,000 in every game since the 1993 season-opener, a span of 14 years and 88 games. Seventy-eight of those games have been sellouts, including the last 25 in a row. The stadium record was set at the 2005 lowa game when 83,184 fans packed the facility for former head coach Barry Alvarez's final game.

A Wisconsin football gameday experience is a tradition that has been handed down from generation to generation of Badger fans. From the cooking of brats to the marching of the band, from the singing of "Varsity" and the "Bud Song" to the chants of "Rooconnn Daaaynnnel," from the ghosts of Crazylegs and the Horse to more recent heroes like Alvarez, Panos and Evans, the Badger gameday experience is a happening that any fan of college football will relish.

"But the thing that really stands out about Wisconsin

is how the team is just such an integral part of the community there. In a lot of ways, Camp Randall is what college football is all about."

Since the expansion of Camp **Randall Stadium** prior to the 2004 season, UW has averaged 82,057 fans at its home games. MENARDS The Badgers have ranked among the top 15 nationally in attendance in each of the past Dean three seasons.

Since 1992, Wisconsin has compiled a 69-23-3 (.742) record at Camp Randall Stadiu Over the past three years, th Badgers are 18 in home games







Home of the Badgers

ne of college football's finest facilities
— Camp Randall Stadium – completed a four-year, \$109 million renovation prior to the 2005 football season. The improvements are plentiful: new FieldTurf, new suites and club seats, new video scoreboards, new offices, increased seating capacity and better fan amenities like concession areas, restrooms and traffic flow.

The enhancements have not detracted from Camp Randall's charm but rather the stadium's character has been enhanced greatly by the improvements, ensuring that future generations of Badger fans will have a first-rate facility at which to watch the Badgers play on Saturdays.

Camp Randall was originally used as a Civil War training site. In fact, some 70,000 soldiers trained at the camp, which also included a hospital and a prison for Confederate soldiers on its grounds. Named for Alexander Randall, the state of Wisconsin's first wartime governor, Camp Randall Stadium opened in 1917 and was officially dedicated when the Badgers defeated Minnesota, 10-7, on Nov. 3.





Badger Nickname

The nickname "Badgers" was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin, which was dubbed the "Badger State." The name didn't come from the animals in the region, but rather from an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

In 1949, a student wore a badger outfit with a papier-mâché head at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name-Buckingham U. Badger.

Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. The song has become legendary at the UV because of its polka-like rhythm.

Fifth Quarter

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as it plays traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song.


The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

Hall of Fame

The UW Athletic Hall of Fame was established in 1991 to recognize and honor former studentathletes and staff for their exemplary athletic achievement and contributions to the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department.


In appreciation for that support, many student-athletes volunteer frequently in community service projects. Every season, the football team works together on a number of community service projects to give back to Madison.

But before he does that, the New Berlin, Wis., native wants to take a break from schooling for awhile.


"I am going to take a year off after school is over and enjoy my life a little," Landgraf said. "I'll hopefully live somewhere on the beach and be a beach bum."





n the field, Jack Ikegwuonu is a shutdown cornerback who earned first-team All-Big Ten honors by the coaches a year ago. Off the field, Jack is local kid who is living his iream of playing football for the Badgers. Playing football, however, wasn't always a dream for Jack. Growing up, Jack's dream b was to be a surgeon, and both of Jack's parents are in mediine. His mother, Patty, is a nurse, while his father, Fidelis, is in amily practice.

"I was always interested in the medical field," said kegwuonu. "Both of my parents have always wanted at least one their kids to be involved in medicine."

When asked what has happened to his dream of becoming a

argeon, Jack, a sociology major, laughed.

"When I got to college I realized becoming a surgeon takes little smarts, too. Right now, I'm really focused on football, nut maybe one day, when it all ends, I can go back to medical school."

Jack grew up on the far west side of Madison and was like ny other local kid growing up. His first job was as a paperboy hen he was in grade school. He also worked at Point Cinemas nd at Rogan's Shoes on Odana Road. Most would assume hat someone who was named honorable mention All-American ke lkegwuonu must have been playing football since they can em mber. This is not the case for Jack, though. The 6-1 junior gyer really thought about a day when he'd run out of the tunnel Camp Randall Stadium because he didn't actually begin playg botball until eighth grade. That's when Jack's little league ase ball coach noticed his athleticism and told him to come out rtie football team.

He saw that I could run the bases pretty well, and I was retry quick in centerfield," said Ikegwuonu. "So he told me to ome out and play football."

t was there that a star was born.

Jack went on to be a standout at Madison Memorial High shool where he earned first-team all-state honors as a split end nd lefensive back. His talents were even a surprise to him.

I didn't really realize I was good at football until my junior ar of high school," said Ikegwuonu. Once he became a serious otball player and started to understand the game, Jack began avir g more attention to Barry Alvarez's Wisconsin squad. It was bund that time that he attended his first Badger football game the fall of 2003.

The first memory I have is when Lee Evans caught five uch downs against Michigan State," said Jack. "That was my st Badger game and it was a pretty good one to be at." Ikegwuonu wasn't just a fan of the football team though, he

gan following Wisconsin basketball and hockey as well, and is


a fan today.

"I was a huge fan of Michael Finley. I still try to get to as any of the basketball games as I can," said Ikegwuonu. Jack was a multi-sport athlete in high school, lettering in sketball, soccer, and football all while also being a dancer. en asked if Jack's athleticism would make him good for other sport, senior wide receiver and Wisconsin track star Paul bbard responded with a smile.

"I could definitely see him being a sprinter," said Hubbard. a matter of fact I asked him two years ago to come out and do ck. The way he runs he could easily tear that track up. I was

trying to bribe him to come out there."

After an impressive senior year in which Jack had 1,000 ds receiving and 15 touchdowns on offense as well as making tackles and nine interceptions on defense, he made the short mey across town and arrived on the UW campus in the fall of 14. If you assume that State Street and downtown would be same old thing for Jack, you're wrong. He never really came intown when he was in high school, so it was all pretty new to Lack never considered going anywhere other than UW.



Ikegwuonu's touchdown-saving tackle on Arkansas running back Darren McFadden in the 2007 Capital One Bowl helped the Badgers defeat the Razorbacks 17-14.

"Wisconsin or bust. This is where my heart was at," Ikegwuonu said.

After redshirting his freshman year, Jack is now playing in his third year for the Badgers and has gone up against some serious competition during his four years of practice at UW. It was his job to defend against two of UW's most productive receivers, Brandon Williams and Jonathan Orr. Williams and Orr rank second and eighth, respectively, on UW's all-time receiving list. Not to mention the man who was throwing the ball to them, John Stocco, who is Wisconsin's second leading career passer.

Jack goes hard during every practice, helping to not only improve himself, but also the Wisconsin receiving corps.

"He pushes me in every single aspect of the game," said Hubbard. "He doesn't give me any freebies. Every ball that I catch on him or every ball that I almost catch on him I have to work that hard to get it. He makes you work for every inch, he makes you work for every yard and that's something that makes us all

Even though he is a big-time college athlete now, Jack hasn't forgotten where he came from. He tries to get home and see his parents as much as possible.

"I go home almost every day or at least about four or five times a week," said Jack. Being a native of Madison hasn't just benefited Jack though, it has helped his teammates in adjusting as well.

"When a lot of guys come here they don't know what's going on," said Hubbard. "They don't know where the hang-out spots are or where not to go. People ask Jack, since he's from Madison, Where should we go?' and 'What should we do and what should we not do?' and it definitely helps to keep a lot of people out of trouble."

Living in one place for almost two decades is a very long time and Jack is interested in spreading his wings and seeing what else there is outside of Madison.

"I've been here my whole life, basically 18 years," said Ikegwuonu. "So, I plan on moving when I am done with college and going out and seeing the world. I want to travel."

There are many places that Jack wants to see and visit. "I want to get out of the country and go to Europe and Africa."

But not before he's done thrilling the Badger fans in his hometown.



w book analyzes andid community onversations on race

W-Madison political science professor has ien a deeper look at community-based consations about race in a new book.

Katherine Cramer Walsh, who specializes in ic dialogue on politics, recently published lking About Race: Community Dialogues and Politics of Difference.

"This seemed, at first, to be a creative way avoiding doing anything about race relations," says. "But I've become kind of enamored of process. People in the conversations were sincere and pretty intense, often against wishes of the facilitators."

People generally resort to two paths to oncile problems about race, either by focuson unity and similarity or by stressing the ortance of multiculturalism, she says.

"These conversations, I thought, would very multicultural and have a limited use. ause polls have shown that doesn't resonate the American public," she adds. "Instead, ticipants in these discussions did this combalancing of unity and difference.

Wash identified 400 cities in 46 states that aged in these types of discussions, and her arch zeroed in on five programs — three in consin and two in Illinois.

The unity theme was often the starting t for the discussions, but they quickly took other directions when people discussed differences.

UW students techconnected, security conscious

UW-Madison students are adopting new technology tools in a big way, and they're being more careful about privacy and security.

Those findings are part of the annual Student Computing Survey conducted in February and March by the Division of Information Technology (DoIT). The survey measures trends in student use of UW-Madison computing services, tracks awareness levels and assesses demands for new and existing services.

The survey shows that technology is popular with students: 97 percent use e-mail; 92 percent search the Web with Google; 88 percent use cell phones; 78 percent use Wikipedia; and 76 percent use digital cameras.

Almost 80 percent of the students surveyed reported owning a laptop, up from 64 percent in 2006 and 56 percent in 2005. Desktop computer ownership is steady at 48 percent, but down from 61 percent in 2005.

Computer security is increasingly important to students. Eighty-four percent report that they never intentionally share a password, up from 76 percent in 2006. More students se backups as important; only 9 percent say they never back up their data, a marked improvement over 2006, when 40 percent said they never backed up their work.

The survey was delivered online using a random sample of 1,246 UW-Madison undergraduate, graduate and special students, of whom 356 responded.

Technology savvy helps soup up state weather forecasts

Since arriving at UW-Madison in 2005 as a freshman, Jordan Gerth has taken a lead role in a project that is making campus weather research tools available to frontline forecasters in Wisconsin's National Weather Service (NWS) regional offices.

With a shared goal of improving weather prediction, researchers from the Space Science and Engineering Center (SSEC) have collaborated for years with NWS forecast offices in Milwaukee, La Crosse and Green Bay to translate weather research into more accurate forecasts. But the fresh perspective provided by Gerth, an atmospheric and oceanic sciences major and undergraduate researcher with the SSEC's Cooperative Institute for Meteorological Satellite Studies (CIMSS), helped the team give a facelift to the ongoing collaboration. Gerth developed an intricate software interface that gives NWS forecasters direct computer access to UW-Madison's wealth of satellite meteorology

Forecasters improve their predictions by comparing different types of weather data, such as details about clouds, rain or snow, temperature and wind speed. This data comes from many sources, including information from weather stations, measurements from weather balloons and observations from satellites. To ensure that forecasters can easily access UW-Madison's diverse array of satellite data, CIMSS researchers need to put the information directly into the National Weather Service's unique processing software system, the Advanced Weather Interactive Processing System (AWIPS).

This system allows forecasters to view images created from several different sources simultaneously, allowing for detailed comparisons that can indicate which forecast technique will give the most accurate prediction starting from the current weather conditions. Accommodating this system was a significant hurdle faced by the CIMSS team. That's where Gerth comes in. As soon as he arrived, Gerth began to pick apart the software system to get it working on his personal computer so that the group could patch UW-Madison satellite data into the NWS system. At the National Weather Service, several different machines handle the various tasks that comprise AWIPS. In addition to condensing the system onto one machine, Gerth also had to figure out the messages that tell the system how to process the data.

Not even the folks at the weather service know exactly how the computer system works, so Gerth had to guess. In June, almost two years after he started, Gerth finally cracked the last bit of code. "It's like you have a shape that has 24 little points on it and you have a hole with 23 little points on it," Gerth explains. "That just right fit is needed. There's only one fit, and it has to be perfect."

UW has participated in 12 bowl games over the past 14 seasons, a mark matched by only Ohio State and Michigan among Big Ten teams. During that time, the Badgers have made eight appearances in January bowl games, including three Rose Bowl wins.

Last season, Wisconsin played in its third consecutive January bowl game, defeating 12th-ranked Arkansas, 17-14, to capture its second straight Capital One Bowl. The win gave UW its school-record 12th victory of the season.

The Badgers had won just one bowl game prior to 1994. Since then, UW is 9-3 in postseason play, including 6-2 in January bowl games. Wisconsin has defeated teams from the Pac 10 (four times), SEC (twice), Big 12 (once), ACC (once) and WAC (once) during the last 14 seasons.

Bowl games with the Badgers are also a big hit with Wisconsin's renowned fans. In the past decade, thousands of fans have traveled to watch the Badgers in prime winter destinations like California, Florida, Arizona and Texas.

end Travis Beckum gave Wisconsin a 17-7 lead over Arkansas in last year's Capital One Bowl. The Badgers went on to win the game 17-14, their second consecutive Capital One Bowl victory.

Pat Richter (elected in 1996) was a two-time All-America end and led the nation in receiving as a junior.






pt. 17, 1994 — Jeff Gold of the men's soccer am moved up to second place on the individual wring record list for most shots in a single game the nine as UW beat Tulsa in overtime, 5-4.

Sept. 18, 1994 — Women's soccer player Marci Miller tied the Big Ten record for most assists in a game with three against Colorado College (five other Big Ten players have tied this mark).

Sept. 20, 1986 — Julie Fautsch of the UW volleyball team set the individual match record for most solo blocks with nine against Juniata College. The Badgers defeated Juniata 15-3, 10-15, 15-7, 16-14 in the first match of the Penn State Invitational.

Sept. 20, 1986 — Andy Rectenwal of the men's soccer team set the Wisconsin individual scoring record for most goals in a game with four against Michigan. Aaron Lauber later tied that mark with four goals against Northwestern in 2001.





Behind the Scenes With ...



Assistant Director of Marketing and Promotions Brian Chullino is responsible for the music that is played inside Camp Randall Stadium during game day.

After the Badgers give up a third-down conversion, do you ever feel as if you had some responsibility because of the song you played?

I definitely did when I first started playing music. These days I really don't beat myself up for playing one thing or another ... you just do the best you can given the situation. There are certain songs which are specifically tabbed as "third-down clips," so it can be a toss up as to which one to go with. Obviously I know which ones get a better response than others and I'll use certain clips accordingly. I've never been a fan of using a clip over and over again. You'll watch NFL games on TV and hear "Machinehead" at least a dozen times and each time it seems to garner less reaction.

How many songs do you have on your iPod?

Believe it or not, I don't own an iPod. I've gotten by on CDs burned from iTunes, which is currently at around 7,500 tracks. There's pretty much anything you could ask for on there. If I were still a student, or found myself needing something portable, I'd be

Who is responsible for the mix tape that is played prior to the game while the team is warming up?

The pre-game mix is also handled by the Marketing department. This is one of the harder processes music-wise that I go through all year long. The football office submits a list of music that the players want and I have to go through and sort out what is fit for public consumption and what is not. As you might imagine, a student-athlete's song list can sometimes stray from what the average fan might want to listen to ... so it becomes a balancing act of getting the fans and players excited.

How many requests do you get from people wanting that playlist?

Usually a few times a year, a school will call saying how their team really liked the pre-game music and could they get a song list, etc. That's always a nice compliment when you get that kind of feedback.

What was it like when you first played "Jump Around?"

That was before my time here with the Athletic Department. Kevin Kluender, Assistant Athletic Director of Marketing, holds that high honor. Apparently he randomly played it and it was very well received. It was Kevin who decided that if it was played at a specific time at every game, it might be kind of fun. Well, the rest is history. I still joke with him that he should get a cut from all the t-shirts you see the students wearing around. I don't see any other song surpassing what that song has done for the overall environment of a football game. That is pretty much the holy grail of fan involve-

What's the most prevalent complaint you've gotten?

That's pretty easy to answer since we're on the subject of "Jump Around." A few years back, a decision was made to not play that song due to some concerns over the structural integrity of Camp Randall Stadium. When the clock ran down on the third quarter and nothing was played, the students weren't too happy and took it out on the "sound guy." I felt like I was three inches tall. That was the only time I ever thought about someone saying or doing something to me on my way out of the press box. Not fun.

Up to this point, I have enjoyed a certain level of anonymity. So thanks for writing this!

What's the craziest request/advice you've

There was a student intern begging and pleading with me to play "Take Me Home Tonight" by Eddie Money. He insisted that it would be a smash hit. For those in attendance for the home opener this year, you saw how well that went over. I'll admit, people belted out the chorus, but the beginning of that song is pretty slow. I blame myself for not doing some editing work on that one. You live and you learn.

Is everything programmed in the computer or do you go by feel?

Hardly anything is programmed, actually. Songs are put in various categories and then it's a matter of following the flow of the game. There are certain songs that lend themselves better than others in certain situations.

Are you available for weddings and Sweet 16s?

As long as they're not on football Saturdays.

A Great Time to Be a Badger!

n 2006-07, the University of Wisconsin continued its winning ways, claiming two NCAA championships. UW has now won five national titles over the last two seasons. The Badgers also added two individual national titles and won four conference crowns last year.

Wisconsin won the 2007 NCAA Indoor Men's Track & Field Championship, crowning the first national title for a UW track and field team. The title was also the first-ever for a Big Ten Conference team.

Senior Chris Solinsky earned two individual national titles in 2007. He won the 5,000 meters at the NCAA indoor championships and claimed his second consecutive title in the 5,000 meters at the NCAA outdoor championships.

The women's hockey team became the first UW program to repeat as NCAA champions since 1985 when it won the 2007 title. The Badgers claimed their second straight title, becoming the third school to repeat at national champions.

Wisconsin also won Big Ten titles in men's cross country, men's indoor track and field and men's outdoor track and field as well as the WCHA title in women's hockey.

In addition, five UW programs also set records for most wins in a season—men's basketball (30), women's basketball (23), football (12), women's hockey (36) and wrestling (19). The football team captured its second consecutive Capital One Bowl title while the men's basketball team was ranked No. 1 in the country on Feb. 19, a first in school history.





The Big Ten Conference is an association of 11 world-class universities whose member institutions share a common mission of research, graduate, professional and undergraduate teaching and public service. Intercollegiate athletics has an important place within the mission.

Founded in 1896, the Big Ten has sustained a comprehensive set of shared practices and policies that enforce the priority of academics in student-athletes' lives and emphasize the values of integrity, fairness and competitiveness. Big Ten universities provide approximately \$94 million in direct financial aid to more than 8,400 men and women student-athletes who compete for 25 championships, 12 for men and 13 for women. Conference institutions sponsor broad-based athletic programs with more than 270 teams.

Big Ten Universities

- are members of the nation's only conference whose constituency is entirely composed of institutions that are members of the AAU, a prestigious association of major academic and research institutions in the United States and Canada.
- have more than four million living alumni and over 300,000 undergraduate students attending Big Ten universities.
- house on their campuses 10 of the nation's 35 largest academic libraries.
 Collectively, conference libraries hold nearly 70 million bound volumes and the institutions work collaboratively to build and share their resources with other league members.

Big Ten Athletics

 Over the past two years, the Big Ten has reached a series of milestone media agreements to provide the conference with its greatest television exposure ever, including extensions with CBS (for basketball) and ABC/ESPN (for football, basketball and volleyball) and the creation of the Big Ten Network, a national network devoted to Big Ten athletic and academic programs. The Big Ten Network operates 24 hours a day, 365 days a year since it launched in August of 2007. It will showcase a wide array of sports as well as original programming produced by conference institutions and represents a 20-year partnership between the Big Ten and Fox. The conference's new media agreements will result in the broadcast of more than 500 events nationally and regionally beginning with the 2007–08 academic year, compared to 300 events in the final year of the previous agreements.

- · The NCAA collects two types of graduation rates-the federal graduation rate, which accounts for all entering freshmen who receive aid and graduate within six years. and the Graduation Success Rate (GSR), which reflects the mobility of student-athletes by accounting for transfers. Based on the most recent federal graduation rate average for the 1996-99 entering freshmen classes, Big Ten student-athletes graduated at 71 percent. In comparison, the student body at conference institutions graduated at 73 percent while all Division I studentathletes graduated at 62 percent. The Big Ten's GSR was 82 percent compared to the Division I average of 77 percent.
- The Big Ten recognized 2,018 Academic All-Big Ten honorees during the 2006–07 academic year, the highest total in the last decade. Over the past five years, the Conference has annually acknowledged more than 1,800 student-athletes as Academic All-Conference honorees.

Sports programming will include live coverage of more major men's and women's events than ever before, along with news, highlights and analysis, all complemented by hours of university-produced campus programming.

The network is available to all cable and satellite carriers and television distributors nationwide, with most programs offered in stunning high-definition television. The Big Ten Network is a joint venture between subsidiaries of the Big Ten Conference and Fox Cable Networks.




- · The Big Ten claimed seven team national championships during the 2006-07 season, just one shy of the conference record of eight national titles established during the 1955-56 campaign, while also finishing as the runner-up in five other sports. The Big Ten has earned at least four national crowns in eight of the last 10 seasons. Big Ten national champions in 2006-07 included Michigan State men's ice hockey, Minnesota wrestling, Northwestern women's lacrosse, Penn State fencing and men's gymnastics and Wisconsin women's ice hockey and men's indoor track and field. The conference has also produced team national crowns in the sports of basketball, cross country. field hockey, football, golf, soccer, softball, synchronized swimming, tennis and volleyball over the last decade.
- Big Ten Conference schools are among the national aftendance leaders in football, men's and women's basketball and women's volleyball. During 2006-07, more than 8.7 million fans attended Big Ten home contests in those sports.



#35 Alan Ameche

Alan Ameche, the 1954 Heisman Trophy winner, was a three-time All-American and ended his career as the NCAA's all-time rushing leader. He led the Badgers to the 1953 Rose Bowl and rushed for 133 yards in that game. The four-time NFL Pro Bowl pick was inducted into the College Hall of Fame in 1975.



#40 Elroy Hirsch

Elroy Hirsch played only one season (1942) at UW, but he was one of the most beloved sports figures in school history. Hirsch, nicknamed "Crazylegs," rushed for 786 yards for Wisconsin's 8-11 team in 1942. He starred for nine years with the L.A. Rams and later served as UW's Director of Athletics (1969-87).



#88 Pat Richter

Pat Richter, who led the nation in receiving as a junior, was a consensus All-American in 1962. A two-time first-team All-Big Ten selection, he paced the conference in receiving in 1961 and 1962. A member of the Washington Redskins for eight seasons, Richter later returned to UW to serve as director of athletics (1989-2004).



#80 Dave Schreiner

Dave Schreiner, the two-time All-America end, was named Western Conference Player of the Year in 1942. Schreiner lettered three years at the UW as an end, both on offense and defense. He is a member of the National Football Foundation and W Club Halls of Fame. He was voted to the UW's all-time team in 1969.



#83 Allan Shafer

The memory of former quarterback Allan Shafer is continued with "Living Memorial" Scholarship that is given in his name. Shawas fatally injured during the 1944 Wisconsin-lowa game. Shafis one of two Badgers (Jay Seiler is the other) to die from a foolball-related injury.







Two former Badger gridiron stars (Alan Ameche and Pat Richter) have been inducted into the CoSIDA Academic All-America Hall of Fame.

To gain admittance to the Hall, student-athletes must be former Academic All-Americans who distinguished themselves off the playing field after graduation.






NCAA Post-Graduate Scholars

NCAA Guidelines



What Every Badger Fan Should Know

With increasing numbers of NCAA rules governing outside intervention in recruiting, coaches cannot afford to have any extra "help" in recruiting elite student-athletes to the University of Wisconsin. The penalties are too severe.

Here are some tidbits of information concerning you and Badger athletics ...

You are a "representative" of the UW's athletics interests (i.e., booster) if any of the following apply:

a) you are an alumnus of the University of Wisconsin;

b) you have ever made financial contributions to the athletics department, to an athletic booster organization of the UW, or to a UW athletics program;

c) you have ever helped to arrange employment of enrolled student-athletes and/or National Letter of Intent signees;

d) you have ever been involved in any way promoting the Badger athletic program

Once an individual is identified as an "athletics representative/booster," the person retains that identity forever, even if that person no longer contributes to or supports the athletics program.

NCAA Bylaw 13.01.5 states: In Division I, a representative of the UWs athletics interests is prohibited from making in-person, on-or-off campus recruiting contacts, or written or telephonic communications with a prospect or the prospect's relatives or legal guardians.

A prospect is any student who has started classes for the ninth grade. In addition, any student younger than ninth grade could become a "prospect" if they receive any benefits from an institution or a booster. Student-athletes enrolled in preparatory school or two-year colleges are also considered prospective student-athletes.

What Can You Do?

If you know of a high school or junior college student-athlete who might want to attend the UW, the only permissible activity for a representative is to call the appropriate UW coach.

Extra Benefit Rule

A representative of UW athletics interests cannot provide an "extra benefit" to a prospective or enrolled student-athlete. An extra benefit is any special arrangement by an institutional employee or a booster to provide for a student-athlete or a student-athlete's friend or relative a benefit not expressly authorized by NCAA legislation. Some examples of prohibited activities are:

a) providing gifts or reduced cost services;

b) providing a loan, or arranging for or co-signing a loan;

 c) employing relatives or friends of a prospective student-athlete as an inducement for the enrollment of the prospect;

d) providing use of an automobile;

e) providing rent-free or reduced-rent housing;

f) providing tickets to an athletic, institutional or community event;

g) entertaining or contacting a prospective student-athlete or a prospective student-athlete's family on or off campus;

h) offering student-athletes, or their relatives or friends, the opportunity to purchase items, even at face value, not adequately publicized as available for sale to the general public; or

i) promising to provide any of the

According to NCAA rules, the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department reserves the right to withhold any benefit or privilege associated with their athletic department (i.e., booster clubs, ticket privileges, etc.) from individuals that are involved in a violation of NCAA legislation.

Employment

A representative of athletics interests is permitted to provide employment for student-athletes under the following conditions:

- The student-athlete's compensation can't include any remuneration for value or utility that the student-athlete may have for the employer because of the publicity reputation, fame or personal following that he or she has obtained because of athletics ability:
- The student-athlete may receive compensation for only work actually performed; and
- The student-athlete's compensation must be at a rate commensurate with the going rate in that locality for similar services.

With more than 700 student-athletes competing at the UW, the Department of Athletics encourages businesses to hire Badger student-athletes. Camp Randall Stadium Policies



Conduct Code

In order to keep Wisconsin football games as enjoyable as possible for our fans and their families, we ask that you respect others around you. If a ticket holder's conduct endangers or disrupts players, coaches, officials or other patrons, the University reserves the right to remove the ticket holder from the premises. No refund will be made in such cases. Stadium violations (body passing, throwing objects, and possession of alcohol 21 or older) and object passing may result in a \$181 fine.

Smoke-Free Facility

Smoking is prohibited in all state-owned buildings, including Camp Randall Stadium. Designated smoking areas are located within the stadium perimeter.

Entry / No Re-entry

Please enter the gate printed on your ticket to allow for the most efficient entry to the stadium. Gates open 90 minutes prior to kick off. Fans may not leave the stadium and then re-enter during the game. If an emergency arises, check with gate security.

Express Lines

Fans are encouraged not to bring any carry-ins. Fans with no carry-ins will enjoy the use of Express Lines at all gates, with the exception of the student entrance at Gate 5.

Alcohol

No alcohol may be brought into the Stadium. Possession may result in police arrest and a fine of \$181. The fine for first offense for underage possession/consumption of alcohol is \$243.

Guest Services Center

For general game day information, visit the Guest Services Center located under Section YZ, in the south end zone concourse.

Emergencies

In the event of a medical emergency, immediately notify a security guard, usher, police officer or paramedic in your area. UW Health First Aid Stations are located in the upper deck at Section FF, in the 5th level concourse behind Section T, and under Section YZ in the south end zone concourse.

In case of an emergency it is possible to contact a patron during a game if you know their exact seat location by calling (608) 265-8676. No announcements will be made over the stadium sound system.

Lost and Found

If you lose an article on game day, please go to the Guest Services Center located under Section YZ, in the south end zone concourse, or call (608) 265-8676. For lost-and-found inquiries on non-game days, please call or visit the Camp Randall Welcome Center in Kellner Hall (608-262-1866).

Items Not Permitted

For the safety and security of all patrons, certain items are prohibited, including, but not limited to: any food or beverage items, cans, bottles, coolers, thermoses, backpacks (gym, duffel and tote), luggage, strollers, laser pointers, banners, flags, signs, noisemakers, weapons, balloons, beach balls or umbrellas. All patrons entering Camp Randall Stadium are subject to search. Storage facilities are not available for checking prohibited items.





Earl "Jug" Girard joined former Badger Football greats in the University of Wisconsin Hall of Fame. As a seventeen year old freshman in 1944, Girard made an instant impact on the gridiron for UW. The Marinette, Wisconsin native was named First-Team All-American by Look Magazine and was considered a "Freshman Sensation" by the Western Conference. Girard held team records for most pass attempts (23) in a single game and for most passing yards (125) in a single game. Girard also tallied punting records that season, recording the most punts in a game (8) and most punting yards (298).

After serving in the US Army, Girard returned in to UW in 1947 to set NCAA and Big Ten records for most punt return touchdowns in a single game (2).

Girard was drafted in the first round by the Green Bay Packers. During his 10 year career in professional football, Girard also played for Detroit and Pittsburgh. Girard was an extremely versatile player, seeing time at end, punter, quarterback, and defensive back. Girard also played professional baseball for the Cleveland Indians.



Inside the Program

At every Badger home game, more than 80,000 fans in Camp Randall Stadium and millions more watching on TV witness the UW coaching staff and players in action.

What they don't see is the behind-the-scenes workings of the UW Athletic Department that makes the games enjoyable for the fans and the

There are hundreds of UW Athletic Department employees that work all yeek and long hours on Saturdays o make Badger football games the events they have become.

This week we profile the event nanagement department.

n football gamedays at Camp Randall, the stadium buzzes with activity as every branch of the UV Athletic Department works together to nake sure that fans have the greatest experience possible. One department that you may not see from the stands works had d to make sure that each staff is able to lo its job and that everything proceeds see mlessly.

Headed by Assistant Athletic Director for Event Operations Todd Nelson, the Event Management staff coordinates all of he different elements of gameday at Camp Randall. From the pregame tailgases to the arrival of the visiting team and on-field entertainment during the game, Event Management has a hand in each part of the gameday atmosphere that Bedgers fans know so well.

Planning for the new season begins just as the previous one ends. "From the time one football season is over, we start planning for the next year," Nelson said. "We do that by having a number of meetings throughout the summer months leading up to our first home game."

In those meetings, the Event
Management staff coordinates with each
individual department to discuss specific
portions of the gameday atmosphere.
Then all of that information is compiled
and distributed to the entire athletic
department.

"One of the big things that we do is consolidate the information that we have gathered and pass it out to our staff so that they can do their individual parts that make gameday successful," said

For Nelson and the Event Management staff, gameday starts early regardless of what time kickoff is at. Prior to the game, the staff's main concerns come in the form of special events and game preparation.

"One of the areas we're looking at are pregame functions on the North Practice Field and in the Field House to make sure that the W Club and groups like that have their functions ready to go," Nelson explained.

"We also need to be thinking about officials and especially the visiting team, to make sure that we've got their busses covered, that we know when the team is arriving and that the police escort is set up to get the team to Camp Randall through the traffic in Madison."

Beginning one hour prior to kickoff, every element of the gameday operation is choreographed by the Event Management staff. The script includes specific times for the teams to come out for warm-ups as well as when the UW Band takes the field for its pregame performance. The purpose of the script is to make sure that the staff, both teams and even the TV production crew broadcasting the game knows exactly what to expect and when.

"That last hour leading up to kickoff is all timed out specifically to the last second so we're ready to go live on the air with our network partner that's working with us for that game," explained Nelson.

During the game, the Event Management staff must react to all of the unexpected incidents that take place each gameday. These can range from weather emergencies to medical issues both on the field and in the crowd. The goal is to plan for every possible event and respond swiftly and appropriately to the unpredictable ones.

"We spend months planning for seven home football games," Nelson said, "and we plan it out the best that we can so that we're able to deal with emergencies when and if they come up as quickly and efficiently as possible so that the fans can enjoy the game."


Following the game, the Event Management staff has safety as its top priority as the teams leave the field and the fans leave Camp Randall after the Fifth Quarter. The work day ends long after the last fans have departed the stadium.

As soon as one game concludes, the staff moves on to assess that event and plan for the next one. "We never look at it as something that we're used to because every game is different," said Nelson. "We treat each game as a new event."

In the end, the true purpose of the Event Management staff is to make sure that every Badger gameday runs smoothly and that fans can experience the best possible atmosphere. The next time you're at a UW event, take a moment to appreciate the choreographed chaos that the Event Management staff helps make possible.







Final Thoughts



Each week, Justin Doherty, UW's assistant athletic director for communications, will offer a look at the Badger football program. In his position, Doherty has unique access to the coaches and players and a good understanding of their experiences. This week he talks about the UNLV post-game activities.

ne thing I've learned over the years is I never know just what our staff will encounter during post-game interviews after our road games.

Rudy Nigl, one of the interns in my office, and I were running around last Saturday night at UNLV making sure Coach Bielema and our players fulfilled their post-game media obligations. I usually get Bret to his radio interview with Mike Lucas and then on to meet with the rest of the media for 10 or 15 minutes. Rudy last week handled notifying certain players they'd been requested for interviews by our local media.

UNLV's post-game set-up for the visiting team is unique. It's one of the few places where we do all of our interviews outside under the stars. There's sort of a small courtyard-style area outside the visiting locker room and we just bring Bret and our players out there. It's the same area where Coach Alvarez did his post-game press conference in the dark five years ago after the power had gone out at UNLV's Sam Boyd Stadium.

So, as Rudy and I were facilitating things, one of our other support staff members told me P.J. Hill was looking for me. P.J. wanted to know what his rushing total was for the game. Seemed like a strange request from P.J. He's never been the type to worry too much about his statistics, let alone seek me out for them after a game.

I didn't have the stats with me yet, so I text-messaged one of our other assistants, Brian Lucas, up in the press box to send me P.J.'s yardage total. Anyone who watched that game knows what a workhorse P.J. was, so I wasn't surprised to find out he had gained 147 yards on 30 carries. But I was still sort of curious why he wanted to know.

I approached him at his locker and noticed a football there next to him. Turns out it was a game ball that P.J. intended to give to his father for a birthday present. He had written a note on the ball and wanted to include his rushing yardage total from the game. Pretty cool.

A little while later I'm walking linebacker Elijah Hodge out to the courtyard area to meet the media. One of the stadium security workers approaches me and tells me we need to stop the interviews for just a few seconds. There was going to be a couple loud "pops" and they didn't want to startle anyone. Elijah asked me what was going on and, for some reason, I said: "Hang on just a second, they've got to blow something up." Understandably, he sort of did a double-take and responded: "Blow something up?!"

That's when the last of the leftover fireworks were launched. Each time UNLV scored a touchdown, fireworks went off (thankfully only once that night). Apparently there were two left. I think we can credit our defense for that. They needed to be spent, however, so we all waited for the two big "bangs" before resuming interviews.

We've done post-game interviews in nice, air-conditioned rooms as well as spaces so small you can't really even walk around. We've done them inside and outside, in stadium weight rooms and stadium boiler rooms. But that was the first time we were interrupted for leftover fireworks.


