Otoe Village on the Platte River Sept. 18, 1853

Sir

I have the honor to inform you of my safe arrival at this place last evening. I found the Otoes well, and just returned from their hunt. They have received me with respect and treated me with great hospitality. I propose holding a council with them to-morrow; I shall proceed with as little delay as possible to the Pawnee villages about eighty miles west; It is my present intention to take a delegation of the Otoes and Pawnees to Fort Leavenworth to make peace with the neighboring tribes with whom they are at war. My own health is feeble before I had fully recovered from the Cholera, I was attacked by the fever and ague; but I am now recovering, and I trust shall have strength to discharge the important duties of the mission.
