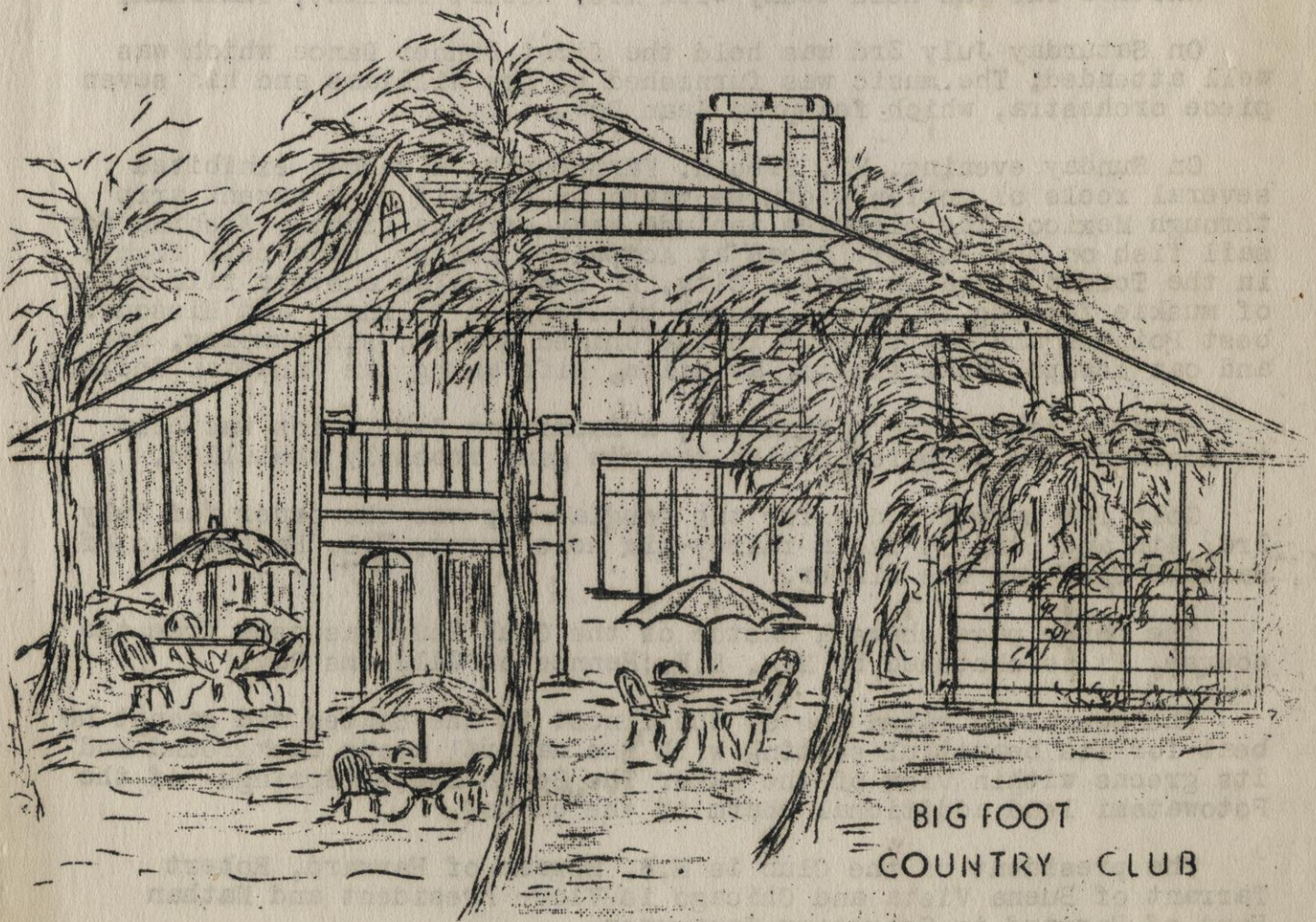

## FLOWERSIDE FARMS

Probably no one of the Chicago residents who have established homes on the shores of Lake Geneva has been so closely allied to the development of the shore itself and the general welfare of the community as Mr. S.B. Chapin, founder and head of S.B. Chapin & Co., Brokers, of New York and Chicago and "Flowerside Farms", the summer home of Mr. and Mrs. Chapin, an outstanding illustration of a love for the beautiful, carried on to its fulfillment in woodland, orchard, flower and vegetable gardens, and beautiful lawns.

When Mr. and Mrs. Chapin first came to Lake Geneva to spend the summer they occupied the home now owned and occupied by Mr. W.F. Best on Lake Street. Later they lived in the Mason B. Starring place on the south shore and in 1898 bought the first tract of land in what was the L.Z. Leiter subdivision on the north shore. Here in the virgin forest he commenced the building of a summer home and estate which has grown into hundreds of acres of farm land, comprising five farms, now managed by superintendents and run on a business plan. Brown Swiss dairy cattle is his hobby and in his herd can be found some of the best of the breed in the State.

When Mr. Chapin started landscaping the grounds of "Flowerside Farm", roads of course, were one of the problems. Fortunately just north of the lake shore homesite lay a gravel pit from which the gravel for roads and concrete work was secured, and when the roads were finished there lay a yawning gash across the hill which was anything but beautiful. However, it was not long 'til Mr. Chapin decided to heal that scar. The gravel pit was graded down to form a large barn-yard on which was erected a barn of most artistic design and lo! the picture was complete.

Mr. Chapin takes a keen pleasure in his recreations and a deep interest in the great outdoors. In the earlier years of his sojourn here he maintained a stable of saddle horses and hunters which he used to ride to the hounds' in the New England hills.

We feel that a story of "Flowerside Farms" would scarcely be complete without mention of Charles Ackerson, the foreman and gardener since 1909. Faithful attention to duty, a broad knowledge of his profession and a love for his work has made a success of his years and a beauty spot in the gardens and landscape.

Charles Ackerson was born at Ive, Sweden, where he attended the public schools, and as a boy took up the work of gardening. He worked for five years at Baekaskog, the summer seat of King Gustave of Sweden, and in 1884 came to America. He settled first at Sheffield, Ills., where he engaged in farming, and in 1891 came to the F.L. Chapman farm here.

He began his work at "Flowerside Farm" in 1901 where he still remains. In 1892 he married Miss Alma Bergman at Elgin, Ills. They have three children; Herbert, with the Westinghouse Electric Co. of Chicago; Goldie, with the Board of Education, Chicago; and Lester, who is with the financial department of S.B. Chapin & Co.

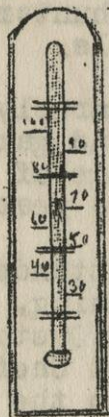

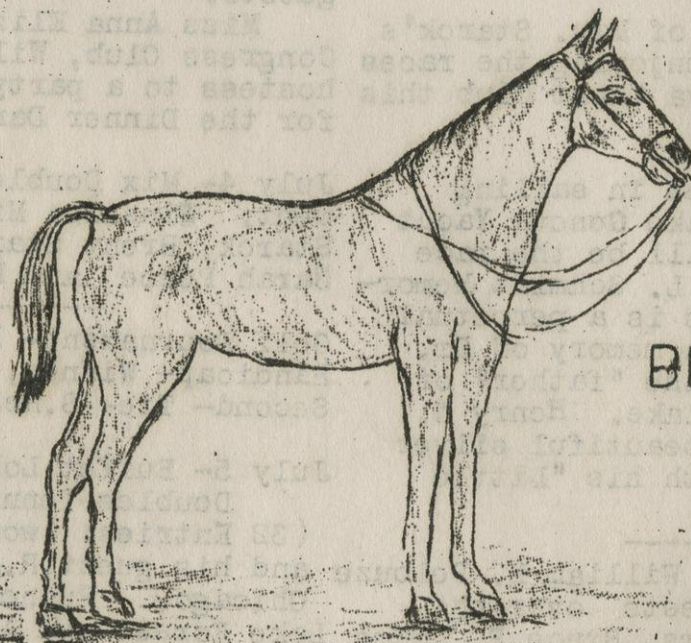

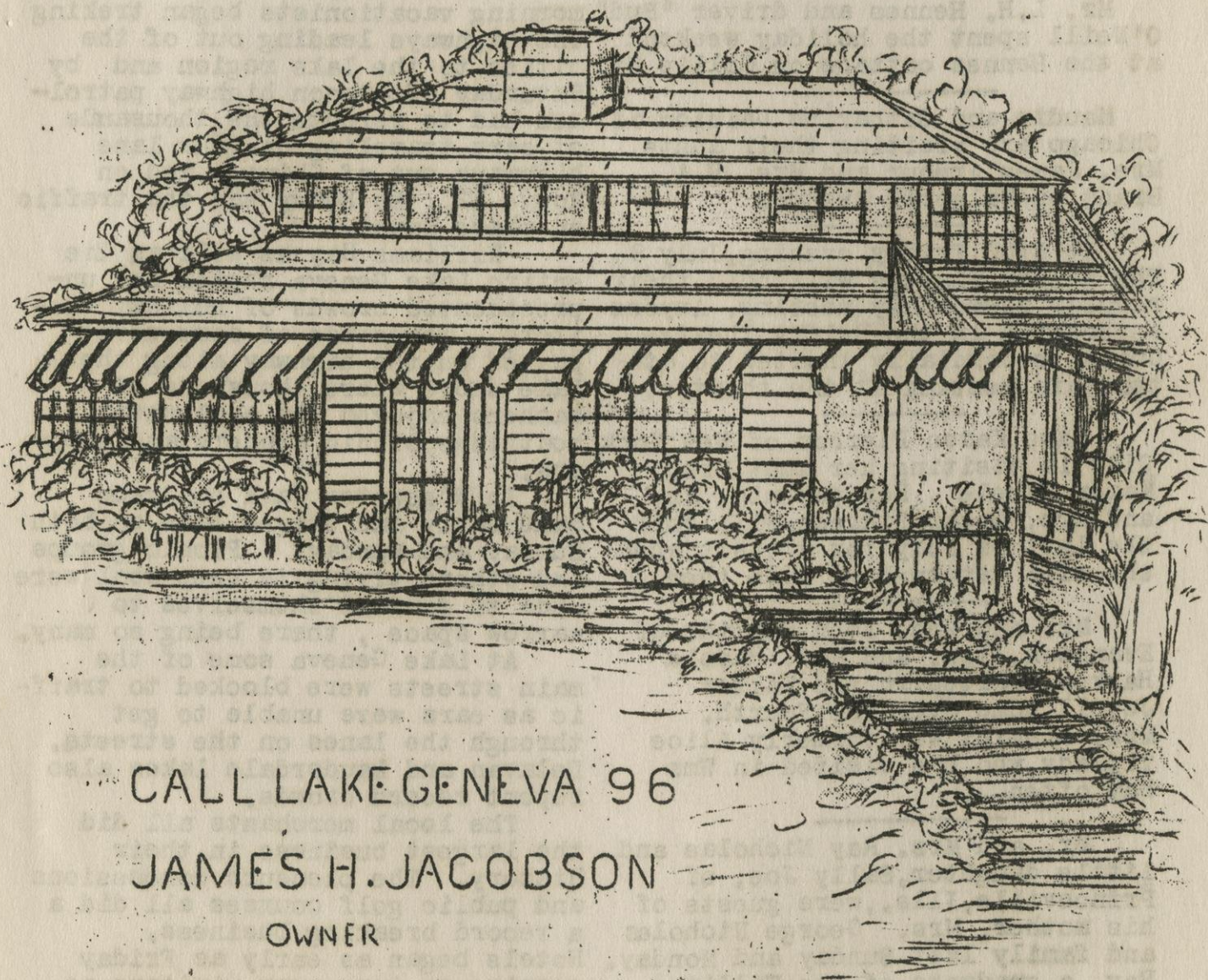

A College Camp this past week the Adult Education Council of Chicago is sponsoring an Institute and Conference on Adult Education. The general theme is "The Role of Adult Education in Democracy". 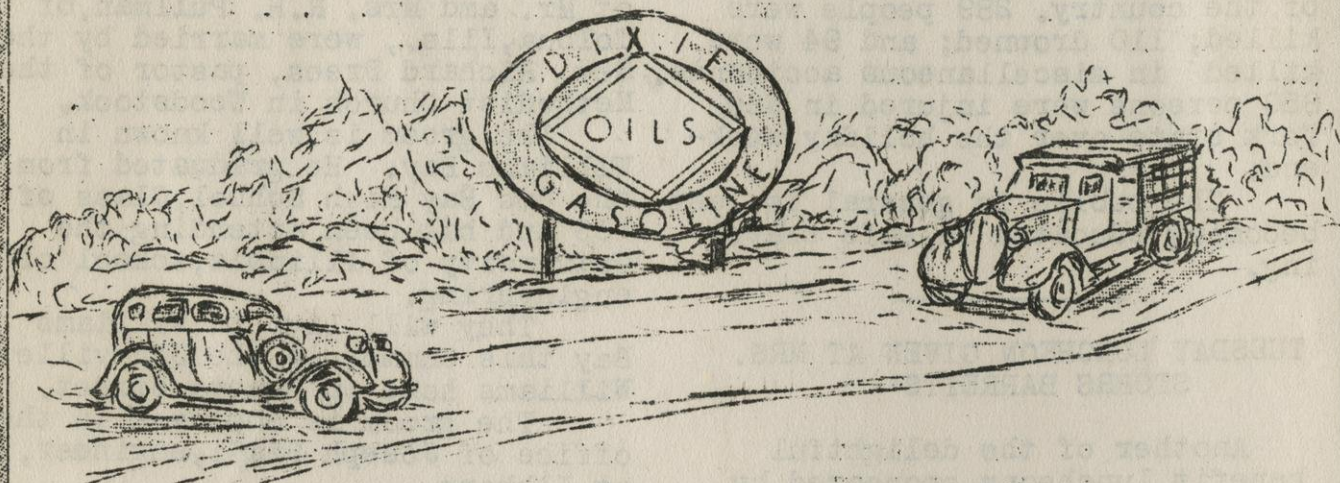

## EVOLUTION OF THE HOTEL

In 1791, Malachi Pollard, a Salem ship-owner, managed, "after much clamoring" to secure a single bed in a crowded Hartford Inn. In 1823, Nathaniel Rogers, proprietor of the Marlboro House in Boston, advised his guests that family worship was to be attended mornings and evenings and that the smoking of cigars would not be allowed.

In 1886 the United States Hotel at Saratoga Springs advertised itself as the largest in the world, and in 1895 Charles Baur of the Terre Haute House equipped his bell boys with rubber-tipped mallets, to be used in knocking at the doors of guests who wished to be awakened. In 1908 the late Mr. Statler startled the hotel world; his new Buffalo hotel had a bathroom for every bedroom. In 1935 the Waldorf Astoria in New York City was wired for television, air-conditioning had become a major industry, and American hotels had purchased six million cakes of soap.

What distinguishes the modern hotel from the early American Inn is that the inns made money, and the guest was never right. America's pioneer bonifaces, generally a surly and unaccommodating lot, were proud of their motto, "Treat 'em rough, especially Englishmen". One particularly churlish innkeeper in Coshocton, Ohio, is said to have seized and thrown out "by the scruff of the neck" Louis Philippe, future King of France. A Long Island tavern displayed on a placard this warning: "Four pence a night for bed; six pence with supper. No more than five to sleep in the same bed. No boots to be worn in bed."

At the end of three days unless you have paid in advance or established your credit, or you are known to the hotel, the credit manager is apt to step up to your room and take a quick, discreet look at your belongings. If you have an imitation leather bag, cheap clothing and a little of it, it is a point against you. An expensive pigskin suitcase is a definite asset.
