MINUTES OF MEETING of the BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN SYSTEM

Madison, Wisconsin

Held in Room 1820 Van Hise Hall Friday, September 8, 1972, 9:07 A.M.

President Kopp presiding.

PRESENT: Regents Christianson, Dixon, Fish, Gelatt, Hales, Kahl, Kopp, Lavine, McNamara, Murphy, Nellen, Neshek, Pelisek, Renk, Sandin, Solberg, Williams, Zancanaro, and Ziegler.

ABSENT: None. (NOTE: Mr. David Carley, on August 31, 1972, submitted to the Governor his resignation as a member of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System.)

Upon motion by Regent Christianson, seconded by Regent Dixon, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board held on July 14, 1972, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM

President Weaver reported on the establishment of management review procedures. He reported that the Central Administration was engaged in a careful review of management practices and procedures throughout the system. He noted that each of the central staffs of the merged systems conducted audits and management reviews of a variety of non-academic functions such as Residence Halls. food services, computing, etc., and that, since the time of the merger, both systems have made substantial progress in these procedures. He noted that, when the central staffs were merged, it was essential that audit and review procedures also be centralized. He explained that he had placed the internal audit responsibility under Vice President and Controller Reuben Lorenz, and the management review procedures under Vice President Robert Winter.

Noting that there had been some recent publicity concerning audit reports prepared by the Legislative Audit Bureau regarding some of these nonacademic activities on several of the campuses of the system, he stated that the Regents would be receiving from Vice President Lorenz an analysis of each of these reports that had come from the Legislative Audit Bureau. He explained that these reports would indicate the areas that have already been implemented and those that are in the process of being implemented insofar as it is feasible for us to bring these matters into somewhat tighter control. He assured the Regents that the Administration was doing everything possible to get our merged house in order with regard to internal audit and management practices, and he believed it was making substantial progress.

President Weaver reported on enrollment, noting that at this point in time it was not possible to provide a final Fall enrollment figure. He noted that there had been a regular time of starting the Fall session at nine of the universities and fourteen of the two-year centers with later starting dates at Milwaukee, Green Bay, and Parkside, and a still later starting date at River Falls. He reported that, on the basis of the preliminary data available, the enrollment was in the process of stabilizing itself, as had been anticipated, with a very modest increase in the total for the system as a whole, and with the principal increase being at Madison and Milwaukee. He reported that there was some decline at a number of the other campuses. He stated that this stabilization of enrollment was a product of a number of things, one was the dropping out of college enrollment of what the Carnegie Commission refers to as the reluctant defenders, and a drop off of the pressure of the draft, while another factor was the feeling of the economic pinch by some of the students who have dropped out for employment reasons.

President Weaver stated that the Regents had probably noted in the press that the Madison Campus Medical Center had received the first major construction grant from the federal government of over \$10,000,000, which Regent Fish would be reporting on in connection with the Report of the Physical Planning and Development Committee. He noted that there was still a smaller portion of federal funds that would be coming in connection with facilities for the nursing program, which, when received, hopefully within a few weeks, would make it possible to begin this large project which has been worked on for so long. He noted that it is a very complicated procedure trying to put funds together from so many sources for a project of such complexity and size. President Weaver stated that there were several personnel matters on which he would like to report to the Regents. He noted that Chancellor Klotsche had announced this week his intention of retiring at the end of this present academic year. He stated that Chancellor Klotsche has served the cause of higher education in this state with not only uncommon devotion and effectiveness, but, over a period of time, longer than has been possible for many people. He stated that he knew Joe Klotsche when he went, as a product of this graduate school, to Milwaukee to start teaching in 1931, and from that day of Assiwtant Professor to ultimately Associate Professor, then Dean, the President of the State Teachers College, then Provost of the first campus in addition to Madison in the University of Wisconsin, and finally Chancellor, serving that campus through a period of enormous growth, enormous transformation, and, he was sure the Regents would all share his feelings, with great distinction.

President Weaver reported that two members of the staff of the former Chapter 37 institutions were moving from Central Administration to campus assignments. One of these, Dr. Roy Heath, who has been for many years Director of Research and Development within the Chapter 37 administration, and was currently a program director on the University of Wisconsin System staff, will join the Chancellor's staff at University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh and will be working in areas of grant coordination and research development at that campus. The other one, Dr. David Witmer, formerly Director of Institutional Studies on the Wisconsin State Universities Central Staff, is to become Assistant Chancellor at University of Wisconsin-LaCrosse, with duties assigned in the area of budget, educational studies, and physical facilities on that campus. He expressed his good wishes to them as they undertake these new assignments on those campuses.

President Weaver reported on a national survey on graduate student tuitions at the national level that had been called to his attention by Dean Bock of the Madison Graduate School. He expressed the opinion that this report was significant to us, because it is a national survey that is not for publication, but the major dimensions of it he believed the Regents would find of interest. He read the following from Dean Bock's letter:

> "I enclose the results of a national survey on graduate tuition, prepared at the request of the Association of American Universities, which is the organization that encompasses the critical graduate schools of the U.S. It is the most up-to-date information now available. While we are not free to publish the document, we felt that these conclusions would be of interest to you. Among state supported schools, the resident tuition, graduate level, are mostly in the \$300 - \$360 per semester bracket. Wisconsin is in the middle of this main group. Only Ohio State University charges substantially more, \$465 per semester, and several charge less than \$250 a semester, including Indiana and Michigan State from the Big Ten. Texas charges \$50 per semester. The point though is that for non-resident graduate students, Wisconsin has erected the highest financial walls for isolation. The only school which is even near our \$1138 per semester fee are Michigan at \$1050, Minnesota at \$838, and two southern schools, North Carolina at \$999 and Florida at \$885. /This high barrier makes

Wisconsin less competitive for federal funds which train both resident and non-resident, graduate students, and as a result of our failing to properly recognize the share of costs bornéby Federal research and the indirect scientific and economic benefits which comes to our citizens because of graduate research, the high tuition also makes us a prime target for residency challenges by students, and does little to gain the simpathy of the courts who will hear these cases."

President Weaver stated this was simply a point that should be taken into account in our future considerations of these matters, since we certainly would not want to isolate our great graduate school on the Madison Campus as a result of a failure to properly place ourselves in the market for top graduate students, and the federal backing that they so often bring with them.

With reference to the presentations that had been made to the Regents on the preceding afternoon in the meeting of the Business and Finance Committee, by representatives of agricultural and veterinary medicine groups regarding a School of Veterinary Medicine, Presisent Weaver stated that he wanted to report that, subsequent to his report to the Board several months ago about a compact arrangement with the University of Minnesota, our staff has continued to pursue the investigation of this matter to see what the data actually do show and what the possibilities actually might be. He reported that on August 11 there was a conference between representatives of the University of Wisconsin System and the University of Minnesota, which was a candid discussion of the concerns that we have, as well as those of the Wisconsin Veterinary Association, and which resulted in alternative approaches to the problem.

Although the exploratory discussion left neither group in predetermined positions nor with any commitments, he reported that Dean Sorenson of the Veterinary School at the University of Minnesota and his faculty are in the process of drawing together a paper which will set forth the various alternatives that may exist for a cooperative relationship between our two universities. He explained that, when that paper is completed, people, both here and in Minnesota, including the faculty, interested legislative persons, professional associations and other groups will be permitted to study these alternate proposals, to see if we can find something that is of mutual benefit to both states.

He noted that, on the preceding day, the Regents had been informed that there were limitations on the kind of enrollment that would be possible for out-of-state students at the Minnesota School. However, he pointed out that there are two factors that should be noted, one being that, with the federal funds, the State of Minnesota is in a position to increase the size and capacity of its school so that it may be able to assure for Wisconsin residents some of that increased capacity, which should be at least a partial solution of the short run. The other being that a total analysis of this question would also be made for the long run, including all of the angles of cost of having a school of our own as well as looking at the possibility of utilizing some other Big Ten Veterinary Schools that we might be able to exchange with, such as Iowa State, Purdue, Michigan State, and Ohio State, which would perhaps give Wisconsin residents a choice among schools. He noted that we are trying to find ways of promoting this sort of inter-institutional compact, which he believed has great promise for us, not only in this very expensive field of education, but perhaps in some others as well.

President Weaver presented the Report of Non-Personnel Actions by Administrative Officers to the Board of Regents and Informational Items Reported for the Regent Record.

Regent Renk moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 263: That the Report of Non-Personnel Actions by Administrative Officers to the Board of Regents and Informational Items Reported for the Regent Record, relating to Chapter 36 and Chapter 37 Institutions (EXHIBIT A attached), be received for the record; and that actions included in the report be approved, ratified, and confirmed.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

President Kopp reported the resignation of Mr. David Carley as a member of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System. He stated that, as soon as the information reached him of Mr. Carley's resignation, he had reached him on the telephone and made every effort to make him reconsider. He stated that, speaking, not only for himself but also for the Board, he had pointed out the appreciation that he had for his service, and for his devotion to the cause of education, which has always been very evident to all of us, noting that Mr. Carley has always accepted any assignment that the Board, or he as President, had asked him to accept. He noted that Mr. Carley has been a great help in certain areas where he has special expertise, such as in the world of business and finance. President Kopp stated that he was sure that all the members of the Board would agree that his service on the Board will be sorely missed; and he stated that he was only sorry that he did not succeed in persuading him to reconsider.

Noting that one of the problems created by Mr. Carley's resignation was the fact that he had served as a member of the Business and Finance Committee, which resulted in it being essential that another member of the group of Governor Lucey's appointees be transferred to that committee at this crucial time. President Kopp announced that he was asking Regent Edward Hales to transfer from the Education Committee to the Business and Finance Committee, effective at this time.

President Kopp also noted that Mr. Carley had resigned as a member of the Higher Educational Aids Board. He explained that, under the merger legislation, two members of the Higher Educational Aids Board are appointed by the Governor after being nominated by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System. He also pointed out that this Board had another vacancy on the

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Higher Educational Aids Board, because he had received a letter of resignation from Regent Mary Williams stating that she wished to inform him of her resignation from the Higher Educational Aids Board, because of the lack of time due to her having accepted a teaching position in the Stevens Point Public Schools. President Kopp moted that he had served on the Higher Educational Aids Board for seven or eight years and felt qualified to say that he was well aware of the importance of the work of that Board. President Kopp stated that he had tried to persuade Regent Williams to reconsider her resignation but without success. He also noted that Regent Walter Renk had previously had some experience on the Higher Educational Aids Board.

President Kopp nominated Regent Renk for membership on the Higher Educational Aids Board, Regent Christianson moved that the nominations be closed and that the Secretary be instructed to cast a unanimous ballot for the nomination of Regent Walter Renk as a member of the Higher Educational Aids Board, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted.

Regent Neshek nominated Regent Sandin as a member of the Higher Educational Aids Board. Regent Ziegler moved that the nominations be closed and that the Secretary be instructed to cast a unanimous ballot for Regent Sandin as a member of the Higher Educational Aids Board, the motion was seconded by Regent Williams, and it was voted.

President Kopp stated he would submit these two resignations to the Governor, if they had not already been submitted, and at the same time would advise the Governor of the nominations by this Board as appointees to succeed the two resigned members of the Higher Educational Aids Board.

Regent Williams reported that the next meeting of the Higher Educational Aids Board would be on September 15.

President Kopp stated he was greatly pleased with the decision of the Circuit Court of Dane County, with Judge Norris Maloney presiding, in the socalled faculty back pay case. He reported that he had written a letter of congratulations to Robert H. Friebert for the manner in which he had handled the case. He also stated that the news that the Department of Administration and the Attorney General had decided not to appeal this case was very good news. He stated that the writ of mandamus ordering direct payment in this case had been issued, and he assumed that all the payments had since been made. President Kopp stated that he wanted to remind the faculty throughout the State that this action was instituted by this Board, because it felt our faculty would be unfairly treated if it was not possible to make payment of the so-called back pay, and because it felt it was obliged to obtain a judicial determination rather than relying, as normally, on the opinion of the Attorney General. President Kopp expressed the opinion that our record this year was pretty good, having also won the Roth case after about three years, after finally having to go to the Supreme Court of the United States to do so.

President Kopp reported that he had received a great many form letters regarding the use of the Madison Arboretum. Chancellor Young explained that these letters were passed out during registration week. He explained that the problem is that many people want to use the Arboretum. The scientists want it as a place to do research, the nature lovers want to walk around without being bothered, some people use it as a short cut to get to the west side of Madison, and cyclists like to use it also. He noted that this letter came primarily from bicycle people, who are suggesting that the law be changed so that the Regents would be allowed to let part of the highways be posted or marked off as bicycle lanes. He noted that the campus administration was working on the general interest of the bicyclists, but did not believe that they should have the exclusive use of the Arboretum. He noted that one of the things that had been done was to appoint a ranger, a trained zoologist, who has supervisory duties in the Madison Arboretum.

President Kopp reported that he received volumes of correspondence every day and tries to refer those that require some action to Dr. Weaver or Executive Vice President Haas to get the appropriate information assembled and passed on to the people who write. He noted, however, that it is very, very seldom that he receives any letters of appreciation. He noted that many letters are critical of what the Regents have done, and that the people do not have any conception of the complexity of the problem involved before they send the criticism, with the result that many people write with a solution that is, to them, crystal clear. He pointed out that these suggestions come from people in all walks of life. He explained that they try to courteously answer all these inquiries and answer them as fast as possible, but that it seems to be difficult for the public to realize that the Regents are devoting hours and hours of time. along with the staff, in an effort to work out the best solutions. He stated that he was making this report because of the increasing volume of criticism which he was sure would increase when the Legislature starts the consideration process in connection with the budget, and also because he wanted to inform the Regents how he and the staff try to handle these many inquiries.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

Regent Dixon presented the report of the Education Committee. Regent Dixon reported that he, as Chairman of the Education Committee, at the meeting of the Committee, had listed some of the concerns before that Committee and future ultimate concerns of the Board in the months to come. He explained that these included the student conduct code, student housing, dormitory hours and visitation privileges, faculty tenure, student representation, and student government on a campus-by-campus basis. Regarding the latter item, he explained that a number of questions have arisen and some study has been given to them, such as the following: Do campus elected officers really represent the student body? What measures can be taken to assure that the elected officers to indeed represent the student bodies? What should be the relationship between the elected student representatives and the Board of Regents? He stated that more complete information on these concerns would be presented at the October meeting of the Education Committee. Regent Dixon reported that the Education Committee had considered a resolution presented by Executive Vice President Haas, which had been requested by the Education Committee at the July meeting relating to unit advisory bodies, copies of which resolution had been sent to the Regents with the agenda materials. He explained that Executive Vice President Haas had discussed briefly the history of the Board of Visitors of the University of Wisconsin and observed that it was impossible for the Board of Visitors to serve the merged system as it formerly had served the Madison, Milwaukee, Green Bay, and Parkside Campuses. He further explained that the purpose of the resolution was to enable the continuation of the existing campus advisory bodies and to provide guidelines for the creation of such boards on campuses not now having them.

Regent Dixon explained that there was discussion in the Education Committee concerning such points as the need for such a resolution, to whom would the advisory boards report, the possible activity of the advisory board as a pressure group, and the desirability of creating a system-wide advisory board to the Board of Regents. He reported that the Education Committee voted to return the proposed resolution to the Unit Advisory Bodies Committee of the Council of Chancellors for reconsideration, with the stipulation that the Chairman of the Education Committee appoint two Regents to serve on that committee. For that purpose, Regent Dixon stated that he would like to appoint Regents Kahl and Sandin to work with that group.

Regent Dixon reported that he had left the meeting of the Education Committee at that point, and Regent Sandin, Vice Chairman of the Education Committee, had presided for the remainder of the meeting. Regent Sandin continued with the presentation of the Education Committee Report to the Board.

Regent Sandin moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 264: That the personnel actions taken by the President of the University of Wisconsin System under Regent Resolution #30, since those approved by the Regents on July 14, 1972, be approved.

Regent Sandin reported that the Education Committee had considered a proposal presented by Regent Lavine relating to an Associate Degree for the Center System (copy filed with the papers of this meeting). She reported that the Education Committee had reviewed the background of the differences between the Associate Degrees in the two former systems and had voted to refer the proposal to President Weaver and his staff, as well as to the Chancellors and faculty, for review and return to the Education Committee by the January 1973 meeting of the Committee. Regent Sandin moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Dixon, and it was voted:

Resolution 265: That the proposal by Regent Lavine for an Associate Degree for the Center System (copy filed with the papers of this meeting), be referred to President Weaver and his staff, as well as to the Chancellors and faculty, for review, and that it be returned to the January 1973 meeting of the Education Committee.

Regent Sandin reported that Regent Lavine had presented to the Education Committee a proposal to provide free auditing of classes by students over 65 years of age and for auditing by all students at half price. Regent Sandin reported that the Education Committee had voted that the proposal be referred to President Weaver and his staff, and to the Chancellors and faculty, for review, and that it be returned to the December 1972 meeting of the Committee with their reaction and a fiscal note, in order that it might be tried during the second semester of this school year.

Regent Sandin moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek, and it was voted:

Resolution 266: That the proposal by Regent Lavine relating to changes in the policy relating to auditing of classes be referred to President Weaver and his staff, and to the Chancellors and faculty, for review, and that it be returned to the Education Committee by the December 1972 meeting of the Committee, with their reaction and a fiscal note, in order that it might be tried during the second semester of this school year.

Regent Sandin moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 267: That the status of Harold P. Rusch be changed from Professor, Department of Oncology and Director, McArdle Laboratory for Cancer Research, Center for Health Sciences, Madison Campus, to Professor, Department of Oncology and Director, Wisconsin Clinical Cancer Center, Center for Health Sciences, Madison Campus, beginning September 9, 1972, with a salary increase from \$28,925 to \$31,500 on a nine-month basis.

Regent Sandin moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine:

Resolution 268: That Walter B. Rideout, Professor, Department of English, College of Letters and Science, Madison Campus, be designated Harry Hayden Clark Professor of English, Graduate School, Madison Campus. -9

Regent Renk inquired whether this designation carried any extra salary. It was explained that the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation provided a supplemental grant of \$25,000 for a five-year period, or \$5,000 a year, as an unrestricted grant to support this professor, but that it does not affect the salary in any way.

The question was put on the motion to adopt the above resolution, and it was voted.

Regent Sandin reported that the Education Committee had also considered requests for authorization to recruit a Dean for the Washington County Center, a request to recruit a Professor and Chairman of Bacteriology, and a request to recruit a joint position of Professor of Environmental Studies and Preventive Medicine.

Regent Sandin moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 269: That authority be granted to recruit a Dean for the Washington County Center, a Professor and Chairman of Bacteriology at University of Wisconsin-Madison, a Professor of Radiology at University of Wisconsin-Madison, and a Professor of Environmental Studies and Preventive Medicine at University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Regent Dixon resumed the presentation of the report of the Education Committee.

Regent Dixon stated that he wished to make an announcement of the appointment of a subcommittee of the Education Committee. He explained that he had received a number of communications, written and oral, questioning the policies involved in the University System's present search and screen committee procedures, and regarding some of the apparent weaknesses in the timing and degree of Regent input into this total process. He stated that, therefore, after having conferred with President Kopp and Vice President Pelisek, he was appointing a subcommittee of the Education Committee to analyze the resolution now covering this matter, to receive from the faculty, administration, chancellors, Regents, and students suggestions and advice and possible amendments to the old resolution, and even possible new resolutions, that may be brought to the Education Committee and ultimately to the Board as a comprehensive analysis of the problem, with recommendations for Board action. Regent Dixon announced the appointment of the following Regents as members of the Education Subcommittee on Search and Screen Procedures: President Kopp and Vice President Pelisek (as ex officio members), and Regents Nellen, Murphy, and Dixon, with the Chairman to be designated by the members.

President Weaver inquired whether it was intended that he should or should not proceed under existing rules pending results of this study. Regent Dixon stated that it would be his own judgment that it would be well to hasten the study and temporarily limit any such action.

President Weaver pointed out that he had one very important case, namely the chancellorship at Milwaukee, which he otherwise would have been proceeding on at this point, and he inquired of Regent Dixon whether he should hold up until the study is complete. Regent Dixon responded that he believed that might be the preferable action. Regent Fish disagreed, stating that he would like the question put to a vote of the Board as to whether the present method be deferred pending the report by the subcommittee. He stated that he recognized the validity of the request of the Education Committee, but that he did not think, at this time, we would want to defer, hinder, or delay the orderly procedures that we have been following.

President Kopp explained that Regent Dixon had conferred with Vice President Pelisek and himself, because people had spoken to him about this matter, and stated that the only question that they were called upon to determine was whether or not this was a matter within the jurisdiction of the Education Committee, or whether it should be handled by a special committee of the Regents. He stated that it was the opinion of Regent Pelisek and himself that, without any question, it was a matter clearly within the jurisdiction of the Education Committee, and that, if the Education Committee felt the matter needed to be considered, it was quite appropriate for Regent Dixon to proceed with the appointment of a subcommittee without Board action. He noted that the other matter brought up by Regent Fish, as to whether or not the Regents should suspend in the interim all search and screen processes, was an entirely separate matter, and one for the Board to determine.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Hales:

Resolution 270: That, pending the report of the Education Subcommittee on Search and Screen Procedures, the existing search and screen procedures be utilized.

Regent Solberg inquired as to how long this subcommittee would be working on this problem. Regent Dixon stated that he did not believe this was a traumatic matter, because this report would be returned to the Education Committee and the Board at the October meeting, and he expressed the opinion that this would not delay the reasonably orderly progress in this area. He stated that it seemed to him that this problem could never be approached or resolved at a time that something isn't pending, so he would like to have things chopped off until October, which he did not think was unreasonable.

Regent Solberg expressed the opinion that one month would not be an unreasonable delay, because of the type of office for which this study is being considered. He noted that he had just completed serving on the Regent liaison committee on selection of a Chancellor for the University of Wisconsin-Stout, and could see the areas where the search and screen process might stand some changes, or consideration for changes, or some definitions or policies.

Regent Nellen stated that, since he was a member of this subcommittee, he did not feel that he could become knowledgeable enough, or enlightened enough, to make any decision in one month or even a recommendation. He stated that he agreed with Regent Fish that the operations of the University cannot be held in suspension until this subcommittee comes back with a report.

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Regent Lavine pointed out that he had shared with Regent Solberg the experience with reference to the chancellorship at the University of Wisconsin-Stout, and noted that the procedures for such selections were markedly different in the former Chapter 36 and Chapter 37 systems. He stated he did not see any problem in going ahead with the Milwaukee situation while the work of this subcommittee is in process, and he stated that he would hate to set an arbitrary time on the submission of the subcommittee's report, because he felt it was important that we look at the search and screen process very thoroughly.

Regent Christianson stated that, from the experience that he had had, he would surely prefer that the procedures be studied carefully, because he was not particularly enthused about the way the procedures had worked out; and he stated that he hoped that a one-month delay would not demolish the system while the study was being made.

Regent McNamara pointed out that one of the important functions that the Board has is to continue to review its approaches to many problems. He expressed the opinion that, if the Board suspends action everytime it wants to study some problem or a new approach to a problem, it will become nothing but a study committee, doing nothing but reviewing past actions. He stated that he was in favor of continual review of whatever procedures we had in the past and examination of those procedures, and examination of those procedures in the light of current or anticipated needs, but that he was opposed to halting all action and using the study procedures as a means of delay. He stated that it seemed that the selection of a Chancellor at UW-Milwaukee is sufficiently important that we ought to proceed forthwith. He also noted that he understood the traditional methods of selecting officers of this great institution, methods which boards over the years used in response to needs, and that he could see no point in delaying activities just to restudy something that has grown in response to the needs of the University and the traditions of higher education.

Regent Williams expressed the opinion that the most important responsibility that the Board of Regents has to the State of Wisconsin is the responsibility for the appointment of Chancellors and the President of the University of Wisconsin System. She stated that, if there is a sufficient number of Regents who are dissatisfied with the present arrangement, she thought that was a good reason for delaying. She stated that the Board has not dealt with these socalled established procedures that long in this merged system that it must feel that it is bound by tradition; and she expressed the opinion that the time involved in this delay would not be great, and that it is important to feel confident in the procedure. She noted that this matter had not been discussed in the meeting of the Education Committee on the preceding day, and stated that she would have felt more comfortable about taking a position at this time if it had been discussed in the committee. She stated that she was going to support the delay and thorough examination of procedures, because she thought it was the most important task the Board has.

Regent Gelatt stated he was somewhat confused or ignorant of what the issue before the Board was, what is the problem with the present procedure, or who has objected to it, and what are the objections. Regent Dixon explained that there had been expressed to him concern on the part of a number of members of the Board over the timing of the opportunity for Regent input into the process of search and screen, so much so that it became obvious that there may be a serious flaw in the present resolution covering this matter, which would justify a brief delay in any further activity along this line. He stated that there is a grave question as to what degree the Regents can and should participate in the procedure and whether they are at present operating under a virtually rubber stamping policy.

Regent Neshek stated that he thought Regent Williams had indicated a very sound position, and that her point was well taken. He noted that the Board did not have to select a Chancellor for UW-Milwaukee until June of 1973, so that he did not think a month or a month and a half delay would make any great difference. He suggested that it might prove embarrassing to that committee to have the President commence the search and screen and then have the process changed in the middle. He strongly urged delay in this matter. Regent Fish stated that he was not inferring that the present procedures are correct or incorrect, and that that had nothing to do with his motion. He stated that this involves positions other than the Chancellor at UW-Milwaukee and inquired about the search and screen committees that are in process right now.

Regent Neshek stated that he understood that this related only to the selection of Chancellors. Regent Fish pointed out that a search and screen process takes many months for a campus as large as the UW-Milwaukee. Regent Neshek stated that June 1973 provides a substantial amount of time to work in; and he expressed the opinion that members of the Board who had been involved in search and screen procedures for chancellors to this point have shown a sincere interest in changing some of the procedures. He agreed that this is one of the most important responsibilities that the Regents have, and that, if they are not going to have sufficient input into the procedure, it is going to be a rubber stamping procedure, which he believed would not really be carrying out the statutory duty of the Regents.

There was considerable further discussion on the matter of suspending the present procedures pending the outcome of a study, and also of the fact that there was some dissatisfaction on the part of some of the members of the Board with the present procedures. Professor Michael Besel, Chairman of the University Faculty Council, urged the Regents to support the resolution that was before them; and he explained the work involved in the search and screen procedure for a Chancellor of the UW-Milwaukee, which is such that it was desirable to have no delay in this matter.

Regent Sandin pointed out that there is one basic difference in the selection of chancellors between the Chapter 37 institutions, where the Regents themselves did all the selecting, and the Chapter 36 institutions, where the search and screen committee was made up of central administration, faculty, and students which did the searching and screening, with the Regents being brought in later in the process.

Regent Renk noted that he had written to the President and Vice President of the Board with copies to all the Regents expressing his displeasure with the way the selection of the Dean of the Law School was presented, not that he was critical of the appointee, but that he knew very little of what had taken place in the selection process. However, he stated that he agreed with the resolution before the Board, expressing the opinion that the operation of this great institution cannot be stopped while waiting for a subcommittee to make a report. He stated that he was in favor of the Education Committee doing some research on this matter, and stated that he would like to appear before the subcommittee whenever it meets. Regent Dixon stated that all members of the Board would be more than welcome.

Regent Nellen expressed the opinion that the Regents were not in a position to come in with a recommendation on a subject of this importance in a month, since there are changes that have to be decided, there are questions of how it is going to be changed, if it is to be changed, and the question is going to come up whether the Regents are unduly meddlesome in the affairs of the University. He expressed the opinion that the Regents cannot come up with a recommendation for change in one month, and stated that, if the resolution passed, he would have to resign from the subcommittee.

Regent Lavine noted that, although the discussion seemed to be directed at the selection of chancellors, there are other search and screen operations under way now that are affected by the same process. He pointed out that we do have Regent involvement now, although we may not end up wanting the same kind of Regent involvement after this study is made; and he stated that, in view of that involvement, coupled with the principal of not stopping the ongoing operations of this large system, he believed it important that we go on with the process as it is and give as much time as it takes to studying it.

Regent McNamara expressed the opinion that a rather unfortunate inference had been left by some of the early discussion, particularly with reference to the comment that the Regents are rubber stamps. He suggested that, if certain Regents feel that they are rubber stamps, they should confine that comment to their own personal attitude. He stated that he did not feel that it was rubber stamping if he agreed with a reasoned judgment of a committee, which is a subordinate committee to this Board of Regents. He stated that rather, in his opinion, it is concurrence in their judgment.

Regent Solberg stated that he would like to make a motion to amend the resolution that was before the Board. Regent Solberg moved the adoption of the following amendment, and the motion was seconded by Regent Neshek:

That the search and screen process for the selection of a Chancellor for the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee be delayed until the adjournment of the next meeting of the Board of Regents on the 6th day of October, 1972.

In response to questions, Regent Solberg explained that the intent of his amendment was just to delay the search and screen procedures for the position of Chancellor at Milwaukee, and that the other search and screen procedures in progress would not be suspended at all.

Professor Edward Muzik, Chairman of the Association of University of Wisoonsin Faculties, noting that he had had some experience with the two former Boards of Regents and with the search and screen committees, expressed the opinion that, if you are going to hammer out a policy, it takes months of work on such things as dismissal procedures and tenure procedures; and he expressed the opinion that it would take a long time to study the search and screen procedures involving the members of the subcommittee and representatives of the faculty, whom he hoped would be involved. He urged the Board to vote against the proposed amendment. Regent Solberg stated that Professor Muzik's argument was not valid, since he was speaking of six or seven months, a period which would not be involved in the study by the subcommittee. He also stated that he did not believe that the concern expressed about stopping all the machinery of the University was a valid argument, because this is a very isolated situation that will come up only once every ten or fifteen years, perhaps, in this particular institution.

A roll call vote was taken on the above amendment moved by Regent Solberg, with Regents Christianson, Dixon, Murphy, Neshek, Sandin, Solberg, and Williams voting "Aye", and with Regents Fish, Gelatt, Hales, Kahl, Kopp, Lavine, McNamara, Nellen, Pelisek, Renk, Zancanaro, and Ziegler voting "No." The motion was declared lost on a vote of 7 "Ayes" and 12 "Noes"

A roll call vote was taken on the original motion (adoption of Resolution 270 above), with Regents Fish, Gelatt, Hales, Kahl, Kopp, Lavine, McNamara, Nellen, Pelisek, Renk, Zancanaro, and Ziegler voting "Aye", and with Regents Christianson, Dixon, Murphy, Neshek, Sandin, Solberg, and Williams voting "No." The motion was declared carried on a vote of 12 "Ayes" and 7 "Noes".

Regent Nellen inquired whether it was still the intention of the Education Committee to have the report from the subcommittee in thirty days. Regent Dixon responded that he hoped that there might be something productive to report by that time, but that he could not take a firm position on it. Regent Nellen stated that, therefore, he would ask to be replaced on the subcommittee, because he would be away for some time and could not put any input into the work of the subcommittee, and did not want to be part of something in which he had no input. He stated that he wanted to voice his feeling that the committee was acting a little to precipitously.

Regent Christianson inquired as to the procedure to be followed by the subcommittee, because he was concerned with the input that the various Board members might have. Regent Dixon assured him that there would be a meeting of the subcommittee at which there would be permitted communications and appearances, and certainly appearances by any of the Regents; and he stated that the meeting of the subcommittee would be announced.

President Weaver stated that, speaking in his capacity as the representative of the faculties of the Universities, he would like to be sure that the meetings or hearings of the subcommittee, or the taking of testimony by the subcommittee, would be properly fully communicated to the leadership of the faculties in order that they would have every opportunity to appear to express their views at whatever time and place the Regents find appropriate. He stated that he knew the faculties would want very much to be heard on this matter.

Regent Hales inquired whether the President of the System could now appoint a search and screen committee for the chancellorship of the Milwaukee Campus, if he was now ready to do so; and President Kopp replied in the affirmative. Regent Fish suggested that the Council/ of Chancellors should have input into it and discuss it at their next meeting, so that they can bring in the position of the chancellors, which he believed would be of great value to the Regents in making their evaluation.

REPORT OF THE BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

Regent Neshek presented the report of the Business and Finance Committee.

Regent Neshek noted that the list of Gifts, Grants, and U.S. Government Contracts, considered by the Business and Finance Committee, totalled \$1,538,924.53 for the Chapter 37 Institutions and \$32,690,158.18 for the Chapter 36 Institutions, pointing out that the total for the Chapter 37 Institutions is considerably higher than it has been in recent months, and that that for the Chapter 36 Institutions was approximately the same as for the comparable period last year. However, he noted that the new grant just announced for the Medical Center Facility, if it were included in the total, would put the total for the Chapter 36 Institutions much ahead of last year.

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 271: That, upon recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the gifts and grants for the Chapter 37 Institutions, and the gifts and grants for the Chapter 36 Institutions, listed in the statement of Gifts, Grants, and U.S. Government Contracts, presented at this meeting (copy filed with the papers of this meeting), be accepted and the appropriate officers of the University be authorized to sign the agreements; and that the Federal contracts listed therein be approved, ratified, and confirmed.

Regent Neshek explained the next four items related to bequests and trusts, referring to the explanatory material in the parenthetical statements following each of the resolutions as shown on the attached exhibits.

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the resolution relating to the bequest of Mrs. Mabel M. Bleck (Resolution 272, <u>EXHIBIT B</u> attached), the motion was seconded by Regent Renk, and it was voted.

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the resolution relating to the Faraday H. Bernhard Trust (Resolution 273, EXHIBIT C attached), the motion was seconded by Regent Renk, and it was voted.

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Regent Neshek moved adoption of the resolution relating to the bequest by Professor Helen C. Dawe (Resolution 274, <u>EXHIBIT D</u> attached), the motion was seconded by Regent Christianson, and it was voted.

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the resolution relating to the Gustav L. Toppel Bequest (Resolution 275, <u>EXHIBIT E</u> attached), the motion was seconded by Regent Renk, and it was voted.

Regent Neshek explained that Regent Renk, as Chairman of the Ad Hoc Committee of the Business and Finance Committee on Distribution of Bequests, had reviewed, at the meeting of the Business and Finance Committee, the guidelines drawn up by the ad hoc committee concerning distribution of bequests. Regent Neshek recalled that some months ago there was some discussion of the interpretation of particular bequests as to which of the institutions they should go to, and that the Business and Finance Committee had established an ad hoc committee to consider that matter, with Regent Pelisek as special counsel for that ad hoc committee. He expressed the opinion that the ad hoc committee had done an excellent job, and he reported that the Business and Finance Committee unanimously recommended to the Board the adoption of the proposed guidelines.

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the resolution concerning distribution of bequests (Resolution 276 (Policy-New), EXHIBIT F attached), and the motion was seconded by Regent Pelisek.

President Kopp stated that he wanted to be certain that all of the members of the Board realized that this is an important document, and that they should raise any questions that they might have if they do not know what it means. Regent Solberg pointed out that the Board should understand that these are purely guidelines, and that any bequest in a Last Will and Testament is subject to court determination.

The question was put on the above motion to adopt Resolution 276 (EXHIBIT F attached), and it was voted.

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 277: That the resolution adopted by The Regents of the University (Policy - of Wisconsin, on April 16, 1971, relating to the certification of lists for disburgements from University Appropriations and University Trust Funds, be rescinded; and that, in lieu thereof, the following resolution be adopted:

RESOLVED: That, as recommended by the President of the University System, one person shall be required to certify all lists covering disbursements from University Appropriations and from University Trust Funds;

(MORE)

AND, That the persons authorized to make such certifications shall be:

I. University Appropriations Disbursements:

- (1) The Secretary of the Regents, or
- (2) The Assistant Secretary of the Regents, or
- (3) The President of the University System, or
- (4) Any Vice President of the University System, or
- (5) Any Administrative Assistant designated by the Vice President and Controller.
- II. University Trust Fund Disbursements:
 - (1) Any one of the persons designated under I. above, or
 - (2) The Trust Officer, or
 - (3) Any Assistant Trust Officer.

Regent Neshek explained that the next resolution was necessary because the Legislature had provided a sum-sufficient appropriation for the payment of water charges; but, because the word "sewer" was not included in the statutory language, the sewer charges had to be paid from the operating appropriation. Consequently, this resolution was for the purpose of requesting transfer from the sum-sufficient appropriation to the operating appropriation.

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Renk, and it was voted:

Resolution 273: That, as recommended by the President of the System, the University Administration be authorized to request that the Board on Government Operations transfer \$90,000 and \$328,000 from 20.265(1)(b) and 20.285(1)(b) to 20.265(1)(d) and 20.285(1)(a), respectively, to cover sewer charges for 1972-73.

Regent Neshek explained that the next resolution also was related to a request to the Board on Government Operations for the transfer of funds, under which the Department of Natural Resources would transfer \$26,000 to the General Fund and the Board on Government Operations would then supplement the University of Wisconsin appropriation by the same amount from the General Fund.

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 279: That, as recommended by the President of the System, the University Administration be authorized to request that the Board on Government Operations supplement 20.285(1)(a) in the amount of \$26,000 to be used as matching money for topographic mapping.



Regent Neshek explained that the next two resolutions merely related to correcting the wording in Resolution 247, adopted on July 14, 1972, by the Regents, as requested by the federal agency involved.

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following two resolutions, and the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin:

- Resolution 280: That Resolution 247, adopted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System on July 14, 1972, relating to a grant for sewage treatment works at the Pigeon Lake Field Station, be rescinded for the purpose of correction.
- Resolution 231: That the President or any Vice President of the University of Wisconsin System be authorized to accept a grant offer made by the United States Environmental Protection Agency through the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources whereby the grantor agrees to provide not to exceed \$38,000 representing one-half of the cost of the Sewage Treatment Works to be installed at the Pigeon Lake Field Station near Drummond, Wisconsin (Contract No. WPC-WIS-577) subject to Central Administration making a thorough analysis of our total needs involving field stations and biological stations and if the need exists for continued use of this station, Central Administration is authorized to go ahead with this project.

With reference to the change from "President or any Vice President" to "President or any Vice President of the University of Wisconsin System" in the above Resolution 281, Regent Solberg brought up the point that there is a certain amount of confusion in Regent meetings when the President of the Board or the President of the System are addressed; and he wondered whether it might be proper to at some time consider changing the titles of the officers of the Board.

Regent Williams raised a question regarding the reference to the Central Administration making an analysis, in the second of the two above resolutions. Regent Neshek explained that that reference was contained in the original motion, because there had been some discussion at that time on whether or not this type of fund should be expended because there might be an overlapping of facilities, with the result that, at that time, the discretion was left to the Central Administration to make a review, which he stated he understood had been done and that the determination was that the facilities are needed.

Regent Neshek also explained that the Business and Finance Committee had received a complete report on all the field stations in the system, indicating the activities carried on and the amounts of revenues and operating expenses needed. He noted that the reports showed that our field stations are heavily utilized and will continue to be an important part of the educational program. Vice President Lorenz explained that reports had been obtained by Central Administration from each of the units that supervise field stations, which reports were summarized into about a two-page document, which had been distributed to the Business and Finance Committee on the preceding day, copies of which he agreed would be sent to all the Regents. The question was put on the motion to adopt the above resolution, and it was voted.

Regent Neshek recalled that a meeting of the Business and Finance Committee had originally been scheduled for this afternoon with all Regents invited to attend, and he announced that the matters to be considered at that meeting were all covered in the meeting of the Business and Finance Committee on the preceding day, so that it would not be necessary to hold the meeting this afternoon.

REPORT OF THE PHYSICAL PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

Regent Fish presented the report of the Physical Planning and Development Committee.

Regent Fish explained the first resolution relating to the return of the Deckner Avenue facility in Green Bay to Brown County, noting that Brown County had provided this facility to the Board of Regents at the time the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay was opened, with the clear understanding that, as new facilities were built at Green Bay, the University would move out of the Deckner Avenue facility. He explained that the Green Bay Board of Education has expressed an interest in the return of the Deckner Avenue facility, which is no longer needed by the UW-Green Bay, except with minor exceptions, temporarily for use for physical education purposes.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the resolution relating to the return of the Deckner Avenue facility in Green Bay to Brown County (Resolution 282, <u>EXHIBIT</u> <u>G</u> attached), the motion was seconded by Regent Solberg, and it was voted.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the resolution relating to property acquisition for the UW-Parkside East Entrance Road (Resolution 283, <u>EXHIBIT H</u> attached), the motion was seconded by Regent McNamara, and it was voted.

Regent Fish explained that the next resolution related to an agreement with the City of Madison and property owners for exchange of lands to accommodate street widenings and relocation of a portion of Whitney Way by the City of Madison. He pointed out that the University has property on both sides of Whitney Way, the Charmany Farm being located on the west side, and theRieder Farm on the east side. He stated that this agreement had been worked out to include the necessary easements agreeable to the City of Madison and the property owners involved.

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Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent McNamara:

Resolution 284: That the President or Vice President and Secretary or Assistant Secretary of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System be authorized to sign an agreement with the City of Madison and the owners of the parcel of land at the Southwest corner of Mineral Point Road and Whitney Way covering the sale of land, easements and exchange of land to accommodate the widening of Tokay Boulevard, Mineral Point Road and the widening and partial relocation of Whitney Way, all in the City of Madison, Dane County, Wisconsin. The President or Vice President and Secretary of Assistant Secretary are further authorized to sign the necessary deeds, easements and related documents. (Copy of agreement filed with the papers of this meeting.)

Regent Neshek inquired whether there would be any street assessments charged back to the property; and Regent Fish explained that the matter of the special assessments had been taken into account in determining the consideration to be received by the Regents, and that the Commissioners of Public Lands for the State of Wisconsin have agreed to pay for the special assessments levied over and above the \$77,500 which is to be received by the Board of Regents.

The question was put on the motion to adopt the above resolution, and it was voted.

Regent Fish explained that the State Building Commission had approved the increased costs referred to in the next resolution.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Solberg, and it was voted:

Resolution 235: That, upon recommendation of the Madison Chancellor and the Vice President for Administration, the Regents approve an increase from \$103,500 to \$185,000 in the University of Wisconsin-Madison "aid in construction" share for the City of Madison reservoir and well to be located at the base of Picnic Point.

Regent Fish noted that biographies of the two individuals referred to in the resolution naming two buildings at the University of Wisconsin Center-Rock County had been sent to the Regents with the agenda for this meeting.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 236: That, upon recommendation of the Ad Hoc Committee to Propose Names for Campus Buildings, University of Wisconsin Center-Rock Gounty, the Center System Chancellor, and the Vice President for Administration, and in honor of two distinguished citizens of Rock County origin, the Administration Building be named "A. Hyatt Smith Hall" and the Classroom Building be named "Roy Chapman Andrews Hall."

Regent Fish explained that the project covered by the next resolution will be financed by \$3,000 of Hill Farms reciepts and \$11,700 in specific gift and grant funds from Wisconsin Federation Cooperative.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Solberg, and it was voted:

Resolution 237: That, upon recommendation of the Madison Chancellor and the Vice President for Administration, the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System authorize the construction of a young stock barn at the Marshfield Experimental Farm at a total estimated project cost of \$19,700, to be funded from Hill Farm receipts and gift and grant funds, and to be constructed by University personnel.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Zancanaro, and it was voted:

Resolution 283: That, upon recommendation of the Madison Chancellor and the Vice President for Administration, the Board of Regents authorize the preparation of drawings and specifications, bidding and construction of an expanded National "W" Club facility and Intercollegiate Athletics Ticket Office at Camp Randall Memorial Stadium at an estimated project cost of \$100,000, to be financed by a gift from the National "W" Club.

President Kopp reported that Director Elroy Hirsch had several times indicated to him that he would very much like to have the Regents visit the various facilities at Camp Randall Stadium, which he felt was a sincere invitation that the Regents should honor in due course; and he suggested that perhaps this could be done on the day of one of the football games that the Regents would be attending.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent McNamara, and it was voted.

Resolution 289: That, upon recommendation of the Madison Chancellor and the Vice President for Administration, the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System authorize the design, bidding and construction of an Agricultural Engineering Research Laboratory at the Charmany Farms, Madison, at a total estimated project cost of \$33,000, with the funds to be provided from a USDA grant and Hill Farms receipts.

Regent Fish explained that funds for both the construction of the facility covered by the next resolution, as well as the total project operating cost for the facility, would be provided by a grant from the United States National Cancer Institute.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 290: That, upon recommendation of the Madison Chancellor and the Vice President for Administration, the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System authorize the design, bidding and construction of a Neutron Cancer Research Therapy Facility at the Physical Sciences Laboratory, Stoughton, at a total estimated project cost of \$40,000, to be financed by a grant from the National Cancer Institute.

Regent Fish explained that the funds to be used for the cost of the project covered by the next resolution were provided from funds segregated from the operation of the Married Student Apartments so that the other students, in single student housing, would not be paying for this project.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent McNamara:

Resolution 291: That, upon recommendation of the Madison Chancellor and the Vice President for Administration, the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System authorize the design and construction of an air conditioning system for the Eagle Heights Community Building at a total estimated project cost of \$13,720, to be provided by funds from the Madison Division of Student Affairs, University Residence Halls.

Regent Renk inquired why air conditioning was not included at the time of the construction of this building. Regent Fish explained that the building was designed to allow the addition of air conditioning, but that it was not installed at the time of original construction because it was not anticipated that such heavy summer usage of the building would develop as it did. He noted that this accounted for the relatively low cost of this installation at this time. The question was put on the adoption of the above resolution, and it was voted.

Regent Fish explained that the next resolution was necessary because the State Statutes provide that all state agencies acquiring real estate must compensate those persons displaced for the cost of moving to comparable facilities. He noted that this request involved some 75 or 78 parcels of land, the purchase of which had previously been approved by the Board.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine:

Resolution 292: That, upon recommendation of the Vice President for Administration, the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System authorize a request to the State Building Commission for an advance of \$250,000 of 1971-73 relocation assistance funds to pay the relocation costs for parcels authorized for purchase by the State Building Commission since the February 12, 1972, authorization.

President Kopp stated that he assumed that the payments would be made to the former land owners; and Regent Fish responded in the negative, explaining that the payments were made to the occupants of the property, who did not necessarily have to be owners.

The question was put on the adoption of the above resolution, and it was voted.

As an informational item, Regent Fish reported that the Physical Planning and Development Committee had received and reviewed the progress reports on construction and the report of actions by the State Building Commission. He reported that there are no present problems, with no present projects running behind schedule, which was also true for the projects in the design stage.

Regent Fish explained that the total estimated cost of \$3,391,500 for the project covered by the next resolution was about \$800,000 under the estimated figure.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the resolution relating to the Classroom Building at the University of Wisconsin-Lagrosse Campus (Resolution 293, <u>EXHIBIT</u> I attached), the motion was seconded by Regent Murphy, and it was voted.

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Regent Fish reported on the grant from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare for the Health Sciences Center at Madison to which President Weaver had referred earlier in the meeting. He explained that Phase I of the Medical Sciences Center project amounts to \$45,000,000, of which \$11,100,000 is to be provided from the general bonding authority in the 1963-65 budget, \$10,200,000 from the general bonding authority in the 1971-73 budget, and \$10,500,000 from the self-amortizing bonding authority in the 1971-73 budget, or a total of \$31,300,000, which left a net requirement of federal funds of approximately \$13,200,000. He explained that the University had filed a request for a grant from the federal government for the hospital portion, and \$5,600,000 for the School of Nursing portion.

He explained that the Department of Health, Education and Welfare this week had granted \$10,780,000 for the Medical School and Hospital portion, but that the decision on the grant for the Nursing School portion will not be made until a later date, so that we cannot move forward with the total project until we meet the minimum federal funding requirement that was established by the Legislature. He reported that the University Administration is cautiously optimistic about receiving adequate federal funds, which, when received, will permit us to go to bids immediately, so that construction might begin as early as January on Phase I of the Medical Center, which is expected to be completed in approximately three years.

Regent Renk stated that there seemed to be some movement in Madison, among the general public, about the location of the proposed University Medical Center, with some people wanting it on the east side of Madison. Regent Fish explained that there have been dozens and dozens of meetings on locations, etc., but that, to his knowledge, all the allocations have been made providing for the location near the Veteran's Hospital, and that there had been no administrative action of any kind concerning any relocation, because that would probably effectively stop the progress of the project, and would require going back through the entire program on federal funding.

Regent Renk inquired whether we had any contact with the Madison City Council. Executive Secretary Wendt explained that there had been contact with the Madison City Council, that the entire project had been presented for the benefit of the city several months ago, and that, on August 30, they had responded to a public hearing request of the City Council and spent three or four hours in presenting the plans for the Health Sciences Center and answering questions for the City Council and the public.

Regent Fish reported that the Physical Planning and Development Committee had held an executive session on the preceding day, with nothing to report at this time, and he announced that there was one item from that executive session that would require discussion in the executive session of the full Board.

President Kopp accounced that the next item was consideration of a formal action setting a special meeting of the Board to consider the 1973-75 University of Wisconsin System Biennial Operating Budget Requests. He read the following resolution:

Resolution 294: That a Special Meeting of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System be held at 3:00 P.M. on Thursday, September 21, 1972, in Room 1820 Van Hise Hall on the Madison Campus, for the purpose of acting on the recommendations of the Business and Finance Committee relating to the approval of the 1973-75 University of Wisconsin System Biennial Operating Budget Requests and such other matters as may properly come before the Board, with the understanding that this meeting may be recessed until such later time, on September 21, 22, or 23, 1972, as the Business and Finance Committee is ready to submit its recommendations to the Board.

President Kopp asked Regent Neshek, Chairman of the Business and Finance Committee, whether he cared to make any comments as to the possible progress as to the meetings on the budget, so that the Regents could plan their schedules accordingly. Regent Neshek stated that he hoped it would be possible for the Business and Finance Committee to complete its work on the Biennial Budget Requests and have the Biennial Budget Requests adopted by the Board not later than September 22. However, he pointed out that there will probably be generated a tremendous amount of inquiries, questions, reactions, and responses after the figures are put together on the budget requests.

He noted that Vice President Percy was hopeful that the administration would be able to mail to all the Regents by the middle of the next week the actual figures comprising the recommendations from the Central Administration on the budget. Regent Neshek also urged all the Regents to attend the meeting on September 13, at which time the Central Administration staff would further review some of the budget materials. He stated that his most optimistic viewpoint was that it might be possible to complete our budget matters on September 21.

Regent Renk moved adoption of the above Resolution 294, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted.

Regent Williams stated that she had a request to make of the Chancellors. She stated that she understood that there were several faculty members running for state and national offices, which she felt was very commendable, and she suggested that the Regents should take the stance that they want to encourage good people to run for office as part of our citizenship. She stated that it is important to have the people who are doing that not take any time away from their primary duties to their students, to their teaching, and to their position on the faculty, so she thought that it would be helpful if the chancellors gave the Regents information regarding what kind of arrangements had been made in the cases of faculty members running for political offices, particularly state and national offices.

Regent Solberg stated that he wanted to raise a point of clarification. He stated that it was his understanding that the search and screen committees search and screen out candidates for a position who they think are qualified and certify them to the President, or whatever administrative official they are to report to. He stated that he understood that they are to submit the names of all persons determined to be qualified for the position and are in no way to rank those persons. He noted, however, that he understood that, in some cases, they have limited the number, by some means, of persons that they will certify.

President Weaver explained that his request has been that the search and screen committees give him no less than three names, but there is no limit whatever on there being more names.

Regent Solberg suggested that, as a matter of clarification, it might be well to make it a matter of policy of the Board that the search and screen committees not limit the number of persons that they certify, but that they limit it only to those that are determined by them to be qualified for the position. President Weaver stated that it was his presumption that this was the way that they had performed. Regent Solberg stated that it was his understanding, as at Stout, that they had determined they would certify only five persons, which he thought in effect was ranking those that they thought were qualified. He stated that he wanted to be sure that that not be done in any of the search and screening processes.

Regent Solberg moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Christianson:

That the search and screen committees, used in our System for recommendations for positions to be filled, not limit artificially the number they are certifying, but certify all that they determine are qualified for the position.

President Weaver stated that it was his assumption that this was the way they were proceeding, and he stated that he certainly would try to clarify it. President Kopp stated that, in effect, the motion made by Regent Solberg, and seconded by Regent Christianson, directs the search and screen committees to certify the names of all candidates who they feel are qualified for the position whether it is three or thirty-four, including all people who they feel really qualify for the position, and that the ranking be done by the Chancellor or the President of the System as the case may be.

Regent McNamara stated that he would like to amend Regent Solberg's motion to refer this matter to the Education Subcommittee that is studying the whole problem. Regent Solberg stated that, if it was his prerogative, he would not accept the amendment, because it is a controversial thing, and that he was afraid there could be an area of misunderstanding. He stated that he saw nothing wrong with the matter being acted upon at this time. Regent NcNamara stated

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that, if the motion does not change the procedure, it is redundant; and that, if it does change the procedure, it merits study, which was the reason for his amendment. Regent Nellen seconded the motion by Regent McNamara to amend Regent Solberg's original motion.

Regent Lavine stated that, although he had spoken previously in behalf of not stopping the processes of the University, he thought that there was some need for clarification, since the point was well enough taken especially with some of the Regents and schools that are new to this process. Although it would not change the present rules, he thought it would clarify the rules; and he therefore would support defeating the amendment and supporting Regent Solberg's resolution.

There followed considerable discussion on whether, by reducing a list of qualified candidates to a lower number, a search and screen committee would be, in effect, ranking the candidates. There was also discussion of whether this matter could properly be considered in executive session, and President Kopp concluded that it could not be.

Regent Gelatt pointed out the question of how many names to be submitted has possibly been abused to some extent by the search and screen committees, in that they submit sometimes only five names, and once in a while it is almost clearly apparent that four aren't available for the position, and you are really left with one, unless you go back to the search and screen committee. Therefore, he stated, this is really something that the subcommittee should look into, clarifying the role of the search and screen committees; and that, since there has been a subcommittee established for that purpose, he would favor whatever action it is that would refer this matter for study to that subcommittee.

The question was put on the following resolution, amending the motion by Regent Solberg:

Resolution 295: That the following proposed resolution be referred to the Education Subcommittee on Search and Screen Procedures:

> That the search and screen committees, used in our System for recommendations for positions to be filled, not limit artificially the number they are certifying, but certify all that they determine are qualified for the position.

A roll call vote was taken on the adoption of the above resolution, with Regents Fish, Gelatt, Hales, Kahl, Kopp, McNamara, Nellen, Neshek, Pelisek, Renk, Sandin, Williams, Zancanaro, and Ziegler voting "Aye"; and with Regents Christianson, Dixon, Lavine, Murphy, and Solberg voting "No". The motion was declared carried on a vote of 14 "Ayes" and 5 "Noes".

Regent Solberg asked President Weaver, when he charges a search and screen committee, whether he is going to charge them to just search out and screen out qualified candidates. President Weaver stated that his charge to the committees would be consistent with that which he had given others, that he would like a minimum of three unranked names of people that the committee regards

as qualified, and that, if they find a larger number than that, a larger number is acceptable.

There was then discussion of whether or not the resolution by Regent Solberg as amended had to be acted upon. There was a difference of opinion, since the matter had been referred to the subcommittee by adoption of the resolution to amend the original resolution.

To avoid any possible confusion, President Kopp stated that he would ask for a vote on the original motion as amended, and it was voted.

Regent Williams stated that she would like to request that the search and screen committees take advantage of the very effective information system of the University of Wisconsin plus all the very able press in the state, in order to let the people of Wisconsin know who are members of the search and screen committees and to whom people may relay their suggestions. She expressed the opinion that there has been a tendency for these committees to act in obscurity so that no one knows to whom to send names. She suggested that the people on the search and screen committees should take, as part of their responsibility, the responsibility to let everyone know that they will accept names from everybody.

Noting that he had served as Chairman of the Search and Screen Committee for the Vice President for Academic Affairs, Professor Besel pointed out that the search and screen committee had sent letters to all faculty members throughout the entire system, had released news to the state press, and the national press, and had written letters soliciting names to all the major organizations involved in higher education around the country. He stated that that has been the procedure for search and screen committees in the past as far as the Chapter 36 institutions were concerned.

Regent Dixon announced that, since Regent Nellen had withdrawn from the subcommittee to study search and screen procedures and policies, he was appointing Regent Williams to replace him on the Education Subcommittee on Search and Screen Procedures.

Referring to the fact that President Kopp had noted that he received very few letters of commendation, Professor Muzik stated that he wanted the Board to know that the faculties were very appreciative of the efforts of the Board to get the faculty retro-active pay, and were very appreciative of the efforts of President Weaver, Vice President Percy, the chancellors, the administrators, and all the other faculty groups as well who participated in this successful effort.

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President Kopp announced that the meeting would be recessed for ten minutes, after which the Board would go into Executive Session, following which it would reconvene and would undoubtedly have several announcements to make.

The Meeting recessed at 11:50 A.M.

The Board went into Executive Session at 12:05 P.M., and arose from Executive Session at 1:40 P.M.

The meeting reconvened at 1:43 P.M.

President Kopp reported that the Board, in Executive Session, had unanimously adopted the following two resolutions:

Resolution 296: That Donald K. Swith be appointed to the vacant position of Vice President for Academic Affairs, Central Administration, University of Wisconsin System, effective immediately (September 8, 1972), at an annual salary rate of \$41,000, with the understanding that service will be part-time and intermittent between this date and March 1, 1973, and that payment for services will be in accordance with the periods of employment in the position.

Resolution 297: That Robert Sterling Swanson be named Charcellor of the University of Wisconsin-Stout and Professor of Industrial Education, University of Wisconsin-Stout, effective immediately (September 8, 1972), at an annual salary rate of \$36,400.

President Kopp noted that, in each of the above cases, the Regent liaison committees had interviewed the candidates chosen by the search and screen committees and had unanimously recommended the selections as recommended to the Board, and that the Board had unanimously approved the recommendations in both cases. He also noted that the Board made particular mention of the fact that it felt that the search and screen committees in these cases had done exceptionally fine jobs in coming up with the candidates presented to be interviewed by the Regent liaison committees.

President Kopp noted that there would be a press release available on the two appointments just announced, which would also include an announcement by President Weaver of the appointment of the search and screen committee for a successor to the Chance/Ior at UW-Milwaukee. He reported that that committee would consist of Vice President Donald Smith from the Central Administration, Richmond McQuistan of the UW-Milwaukee Administration, Professor Cornelius Cotter, Professor Joseph Baier, Professor Austin Chang, Professor Reginald Horsman, Professor Howard Schroeter, and Professor Lenore Harmone, all of the UW-Milwaukee Faculty, and two UW-Milwaukee students, Kathleen Mitchell and Jarden Eckels. He reported that President Weaver was asking Professor Cornelius Cotter of the Political Science Department at Milwaukee to serve as Chairman of this search and screen committee.

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The meeting adjourned at 1:47 P.M.

Agreement with the Educational Testing Service, Princeton, New Jersey, effective September 1, 1972, for an indefinite period, covering the establishment of a CLEP (College-Level Examination Program) at the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay. This lease covers approximately 800 square feet of space at 716 University Avenue. The monthly rental is \$225. In this space, the lessee operates the Denniston Uniform Shop.

The termination date has been changed from August 31, 1972 to December 31, 1972.

2. The present lease of 22,770 square feet of vacant land in the north half of Block 6, University Addition in the City of Madison, at an annual rental of \$1,680, has been modified to cover 43,395 square feet of vacant land at an annual rental of \$3,180. This land is owned by the Redevelopment Authority of the City of Madison and is in the 700 block along the south side of University Avenue. The University is using this land for a parking lot with the rental cost charged to parking fees. This leased land is adjacent to a University-owned parking lot.

Bleck, Deceased; that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin; and that administration of the fund be assigned to the Clinical Oncology Department, Madison Campus.

(The late Mrs. Mabel M. Bleck, of Wauwatosa, Wisconsin, made the following bequest in her will dated September 4, 1958:

"Upon the death of the survivor of my mother and my husband, or upon my death, if both my mother and my husband shall predecease me, my estate, or the remainder thereof, including all undistributed income, shall be distributed and paid over by my trustees to the Trustees and Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin, provided, that this gift shall be for the use of said University in scientific research for the benefit of all mankind and for no other purpose or purposes."

Mrs. Bleck died in Milwaukee on March 4, 1960, at the age of 72. She was a life member of the Milwaukee-Downer College Association, and was a former teacher in the West Allis Schools, but apparently did not attend the University of Wisconsin. The bequest is expected to approximate \$32,000.)

Bernhard, Madison, Wisconsin, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the trust established by Faraday H. Bernhard, Deceased; that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this trust, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this trust to the University of Wisconsin; and that, in accordance with the terms of the trust and upon recommendation of the Madison Chancellor, \$2,512.50 be added to the Unrestricted Student Loan Fund, Madison Campus, and \$8,793.76 be added to the Madison Campus Chancellor's Unrestricted Fund (Trust).

(The late Faraday H. Bernhard, of Madison, Wisconsin, established a Trust on September 18, 1933, terms of which, as they relate to the University of Wisconsin, read as follows:

"VI (g) - If, under any contingency not herein provided for, there should remain part of the Trust Fund in the hands of the Trustee for which there is no specified beneficiary as to either income or principal, then such principal and accrued income, if any, shall be paid over, forever discharged from this trust, as follows:

To University of Wisconsin, for loans to worthy students, one-fifth (1/5) thereof.

Any lapsed legacies shall be paid over to the University of Wisconsin."

We have received \$2,512.50 representing the 1/5 of the residue to be used for loans to worthy students, and an additional \$8,793.76 representing "lapsed legacies", which the Dane County Court has, by construction dated 6 July 1972, determined to be free of restriction as to any use by the University of Wisconsin.

Mr. Bernhard attended the University of Wisconsin at Madison in 1906-07, and died on January 13, 1934.)

Toepal, Deceased; that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin; and that administration of the bequest be assigned to the Madison Campus.

(The late Gustav L. Toepel, of Neenah, Wisconsin, made the following bequest in his will dated August 28, 1970:

"ELEVENTH: - All the rest, residue and remainder of my estate, I give, devise and bequeath as follows:

(c) Fifty percent (50%) thereof to The University of Wisconsin, Madison, Wisconsin, to be used in the establishment of a scholarship fund in memory of my son, Marinus G. Toepel, the income of which shall be made available to residents of Wisconsin possessing qualifications to do college work, who are not otherwise selected for scholarships, and who would be required to work to meet at least part of their subsistence and college expenses, but no such scholarship shall be continued for any recipient beyond any semester in which he has earned a grade point average of less than 2.0, or its equivalent."

Mr. Toepel was born on June 13, 1379, in Cleveland, Wisconsin, and died in Neenah, Wisconsin on December 25, 1971. His son, Marinus G. Toepel, in whose memory the scholarship is established, received his B.A. and M.A. from the Madison Campus in 1927 and 1936, respectively, and was chief of the Legislative Reference Library of the State of Wisconsin for many years. The University of Wisconsin portion of the estate is estimated at \$60,000.

Resolution 276

(Policy - New)

That the following guidelines be approved for determining the distribution of bequests, and also for the distribution of the proceeds of gifts and trusts, when the instruments under which they are made do not contain definite directions for distribution or when such directions cannot be obtained from the testators or grantors:

- When the bequest is to the "Regents of the University of Wisconsin" or merely to the "University of Wisconsin", the bequest should be used for those components of the University which were a part of the University at the time the will or trust was executed.
- 2. When the bequest is to the "Regents of the University of Wisconsin, Madison" or to the Regents of the University of Wisconsin "at", "in", or "of" Madison, disposition as in 1, above, should be made, the assumption being that reference to Madison is to locate the Regents rather than a designation of a particular campus.
- 3. If the bequest is to the "University of Wisconsin, Madison, Wisconsin", it shall be presumed that the bequest was intended for the Madison Campus subject to rebuttal of said presumption under the provisions of paragraph 5 and 6 hereof.
- 4. If the bequest is to the "University of Wisconsin-Madison" or to "the University of Wisconsin" "at", "in", or "of" Madison, then the proceeds of the bequest should be used for the Madison Campus since it can be assumed that a designation of location has been made.
- 5. In the administration of paragraphs 1 through 4, the campus attended by the testator or grantor, or a close relative, should be considered as influencing a choice in favor of the campus which he or she attended.
- 6. The administration of these guidelines should be subject to suggestions from the executor or trustee, or other extrinsic evidence.

Whereas, Brown County financed and constructed for use by the former University of Wisconsin Center System an educational facility known as the Deckner Avenue Building in Green Bay, and

Whereas, Brown County deeded this facility to the Board of Regents for use by the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay in initiating the programs of that campus, and

Whereas, Brown County has expressed an interest in the return of the Deckner Avenue facility in Green Bay, Wisconsin, for educational use by the Green Bay Board of Education, and

Whereas, upon completion of the College of Creative Communications and the College of Community Sciences buildings on the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay campus, it will be possible to remove all of our current uses of the Deckner Avenue facility except for the physical education portion of said facility, and

Whereas, Brown County is willing to arrange for our continued use of the physical education portion of said facility until such time as the Physical Education building is completed on the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay campus,

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved that the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System, upon completion of the aforesaid buildings, agrees to return the Deckner Avenue facility to Brown County.

Be It Further Resolved, that, the President or Vice President and Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a quit claim deed conveying the Deckner Avenue property to Brown County upon the completion and occupancy of the College of Creative Communications and the College of Community Sciences buildings, subject to satisfactory arrangements being made for the University's continued use of the physical education portions of the facility until such time as the Physical Education building is constructed and occupied on the UWGB campus.
