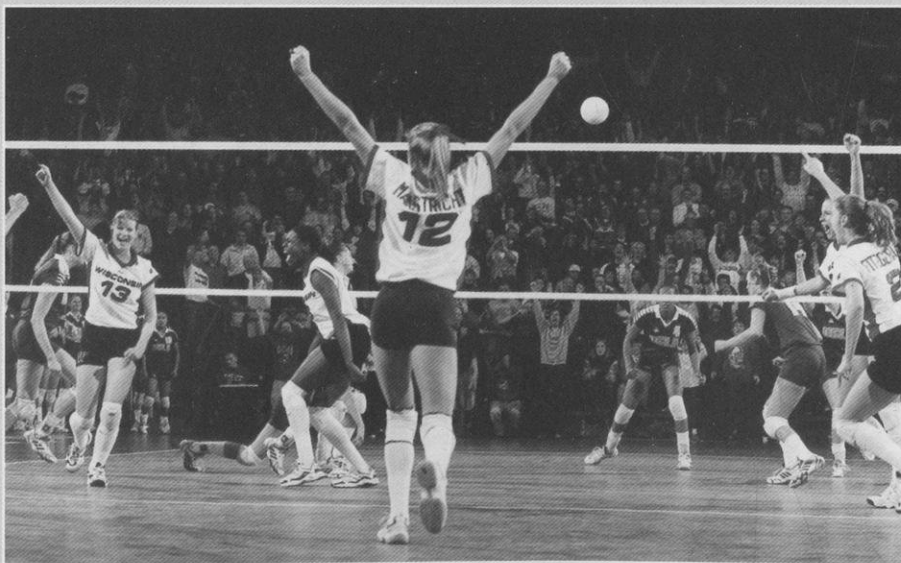

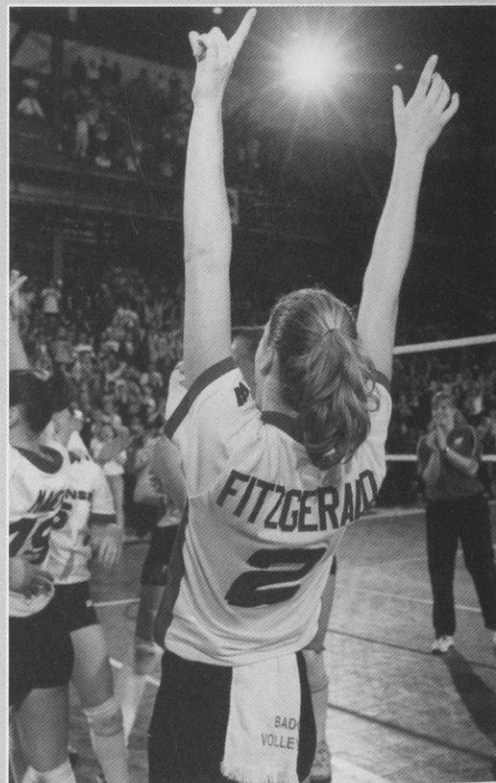

UW perseveres to earn a trip to Richmond

When the match was finally over, University of Wisconsin middle blocker Sherisa Livingston collapsed to the court. A variety of emotions filled her face—joy, relief, satisfaction.

Within seconds, she was mobbed by her teammates, forming a massive group hug right there on the UW Field House floor. Nearby, UW assistants Robert Pulliza and Christy Johnson high-five and embraced. And at the back of the court, away from the pile of players, Badgers senior outside hitter Jenny Maastricht knelt

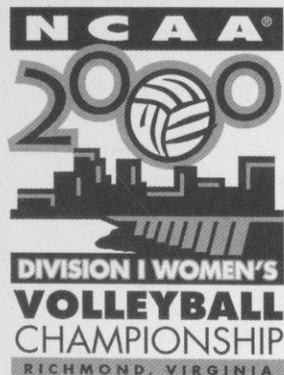

Badgers win conference championship

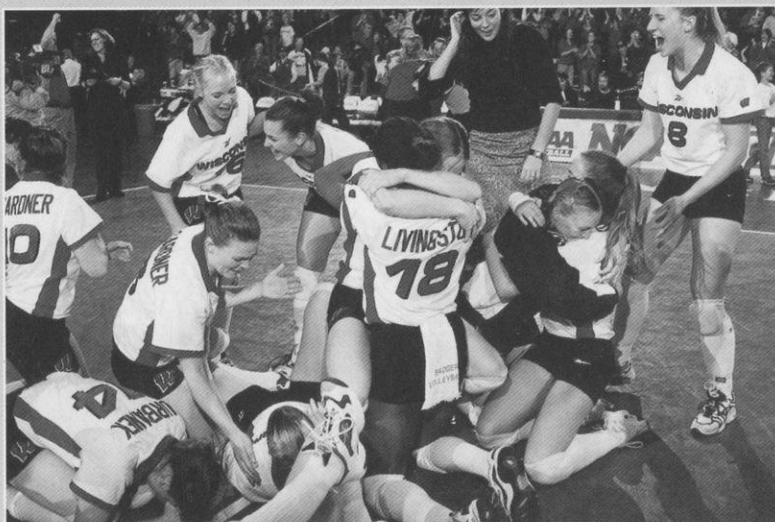
UW sweeps Michigan State and takes title outright when Minnesota falls.

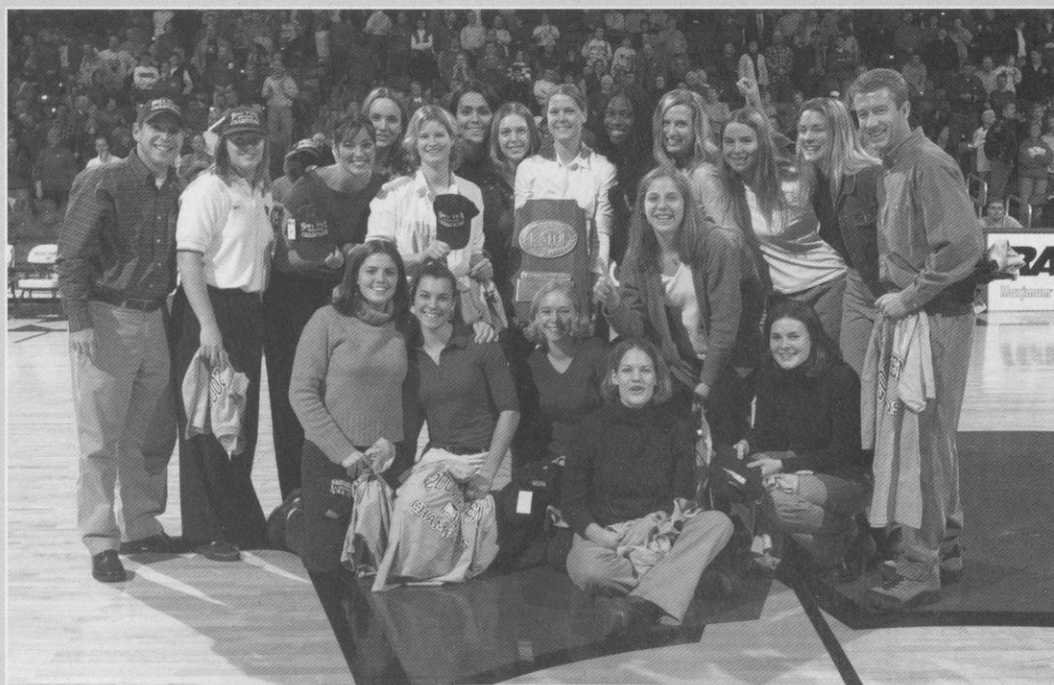
Wisconsin won its third Big Ten Conference title in 2000 and its second outright championship. The Badgers battled Minnesota all season long for the league title with teams sharing the conference lead most of the year.

The Badgers opened the 2000 league season with a 3-0 win over defending NCAA and Big Ten champion Penn State in front of 3,549 fans in the UW Field House. Wisconsin won its next two matches by 3-0 scores before facing 19th-ranked Ohio State. The Badgers won the first two games against the Buckeyes to set the UW record for consecutive games won at 35 but Ohio State

came back to win the last three games and the match to hand Wisconsin its first conference loss of the season.

The UW won its next 11 matches including a 3-0 win at No. 5 Minnesota, a 3-1 win over No. 19 Michigan State at home, a 3-1 win over No. 7 Minnesota in the Field House and avenged its earlier loss to Ohio State with a 3-1 win in Columbus. The winning streak came to an end as Wisconsin lost at 11th-ranked Penn State, 2-3.

The Badgers wrapped up the Big Ten season with four straight wins and clinched a share of the title with a win at Michigan State on Nov. 25. Conference co-leader Minnesota was playing at Ohio State with the Gophers winning the first two games. Before the Badgers left the Spartan arena, the team knew that the match was going to five games. But the Badgers didn't know they had won the title outright until coach Pete Waite called the Ohio State press row while the team was stopped at a gas station in Lansing. Upon hearing the news, the team piled out of their vans and a spontaneous celebration erupted much to the dismay of the shocked gas station attendant.

● 1997 Co-Champions Record: 19-1

Wisconsin shared the 1997 Big Ten Conference with Penn State as both teams finished with 19-1 records.

The Badgers opened the season with three straight wins, all over ranked teams, before travelling to State College, Pa., for their first match-up with the Nittany Lions. Penn State, which was

ranked No. 1 at the time, came out on top 3-0 to take the league lead.

Wisconsin rebounded by winning its next six matches before facing Penn State at home on Halloween night. This time it was the Badgers who came out on top 3-1 in front of 6,118 fans in the UW Field House. The UW won its last nine matches of the season and clinched a share of the title with a 3-0 win over Iowa at home on Nov. 29.

● 1990 Champions Record: 16-2

Wisconsin won its first Big Ten Conference title in 1990, when there were still only 10 teams in the league.

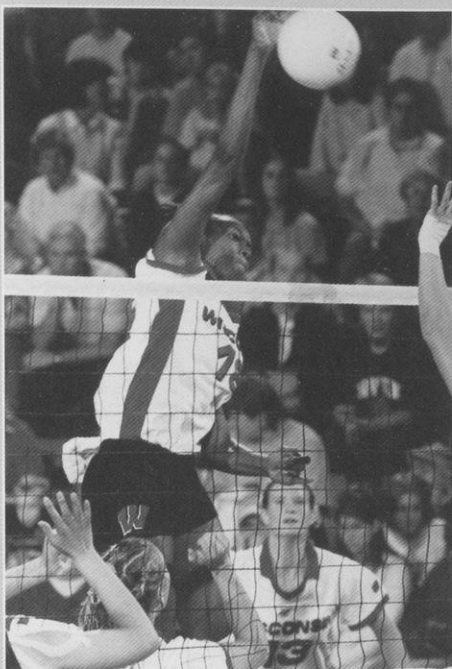
The Badgers won their first four matches of the season before losing at Indiana, 0-3. Wisconsin rebounded with eight straight wins including a 3-1 win over league-leading Purdue in the Field House. The Boilermakers returned the favor in November with a 3-1 win in West Lafayette, Ind.

The Badgers maintained a one-match lead over the Boilermakers throughout the last two weeks of the season. Wisconsin clinched the title on the road with 3-0 wins at Michigan and Michigan State in the last weekend of the conference season.

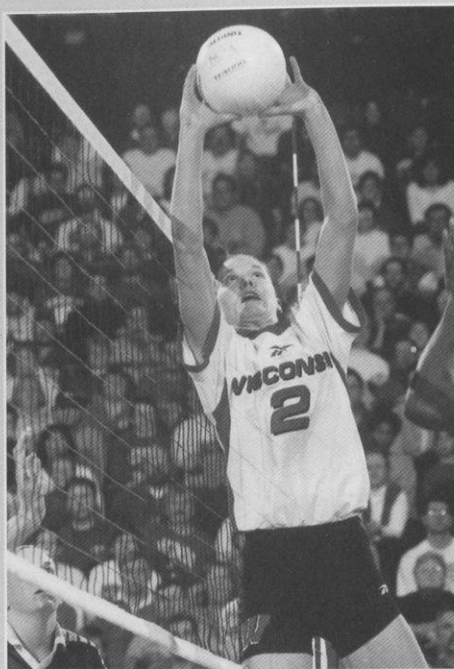
● Sherisa Livingston

First Team, 2000
Simi Valley, CA

Sherisa became the first Wisconsin player to earn first team all-American honors in 2000. She led the Badgers to an appearance in the NCAA Championship match as well as NCAA Midwest Region and Big Ten Conference titles. The 6-2 middle blocker led the team with 5.19 kills per game, setting the UW season record for kills with 654, and with a .373 hitting percentage, which also set the UW season record. In addition, Livingston led the team with 1.38 blocks per game.

Livingston was named the 2000 co-Big Ten Player of the Year and the 2000-01 Wisconsin Female Athlete of the Year. She is a two-time all-Big Ten selection and a three-time all-region selection. Livingston was also named the 1998 Big Ten Freshman of the Year.

A seven-time all-tournament selection, Livingston was a member of the U.S. Junior National Team in 1998 and 1999, and was named the best blocker at the 1999 World Junior Championships.



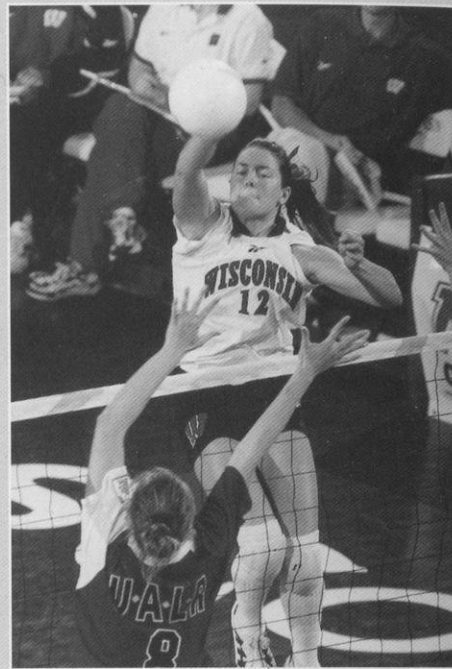

Second Team, 2000
New Orleans, LA

Lizzy Fitzgerald earned second-team all-American honors in 2000. The 6-1 setter guided the Badgers to an appearance in the NCAA Championship match as well as NCAA Midwest Region and Big Ten Conference titles. She averaged 13.76 assists per game, which ranked 17th in the nation. Fitzgerald set the UW four-game match for assists with 78.

Fitzgerald became the first UW player to earn AVCA National Player of the Week honors on Sept. 25, 2000. She also earned all-Big Ten and all-region honors. Fitzgerald is a four-time all-tournament selection including being named to the NCAA Championship and NCAA Regional all-tournament teams in 2000.

Fitzgerald trained with the U.S. National A-2 program during the summer of 1999 and 2001.

Jenny Maastricht earned second-team all-American honors in 1999 after leading the Badgers with 3.80 kills and 0.32 service aces per game. The right-side hitter also ranked second on the team with 1.11 blocks per game.

Maastricht was one of the Badgers' most versatile players ever. She came to the UW as a middle blocker and switched to right-side hitter as a sophomore. After playing two years in that position, the 6-1 Maastricht was switched to left-side hitter as a senior.

Maastricht was a two-time all-Big Ten and all-region selection. She was named the AVCA National Player of the Week on Oct. 30, 2000, and was also a two-time Big Ten Player of the Week. Maastricht earned six all-tournament honors during her career.

In February of 2001, Maastricht was selected to train with the U.S. National Team. She was also part of the A-2 program in 1999.

Kelly Kennedy is Wisconsin's only two-time all-American earning second-team honors in 1997 and 1998. She led the Badgers to back-to-back appearances in NCAA regional finals and a share of the 1997 Big Ten Conference title.

Kennedy ranks second on the UW's career list for hitting percentage at .339. She also ranks third in kills (1,406), third in block assists (454) and third in total blocks (555).

The 6-4 middle blocker was a three-time all-Big Ten selection and a two-time all-region honoree. She was a five-time all-tournament selection and a three-time Big Ten Player of the Week.

Kennedy trained with the U.S. National Team A-2 program in 1999 and is currently a member of the USPV.

**Second Team, 1997
Milwaukee, WI**

Amy Lee earned second-team all-American honors in 1997 after leading the Badgers to a share of the Big Ten Conference title and an appearance in the NCAA Regional final.

Known for her powerful left-handed kill, the 6-0 opposite hitter led the Badgers with 3.74 kills per game as a senior. She also ranked third on the team with 1.05 blocks per game.

Lee ended her career as the UW's all-time kill leader with 1,661 and ranks first in total attempts with 4,129. She also ranks fourth in block assists with 430 and seventh in total blocks with 454.

Lee was a unanimous pick for the 1997 all-Big Ten team and also earned all-region honors. She was a eight-time all-tournament selection and a three-time Academic all-Big Ten honoree. She currently serves as the Badgers' Director of Volleyball Operations.

● Laura Abbinante

**Second Team, 1996
Itasca, IL**

Laura Abbinante became Wisconsin's second all-American and its first setter to earn the honor in 1996. She guided the Badgers to the NCAA Regional Semifinals in 1996 and to the NIVC title in 1995. Abbinante averaged 13.32 assists per game as a senior, which ranked 19th in the nation.

The 5-9 setter is the UW career record holder for assists with 5,833. She also ranks in the top 10 in service aces, digs, block assists and total blocks.

Abbinante is a two-time all-Big Ten and two-time all-region selection. She was an 11-time all-tournament selection and competed in two U.S. Olympic Festivals.

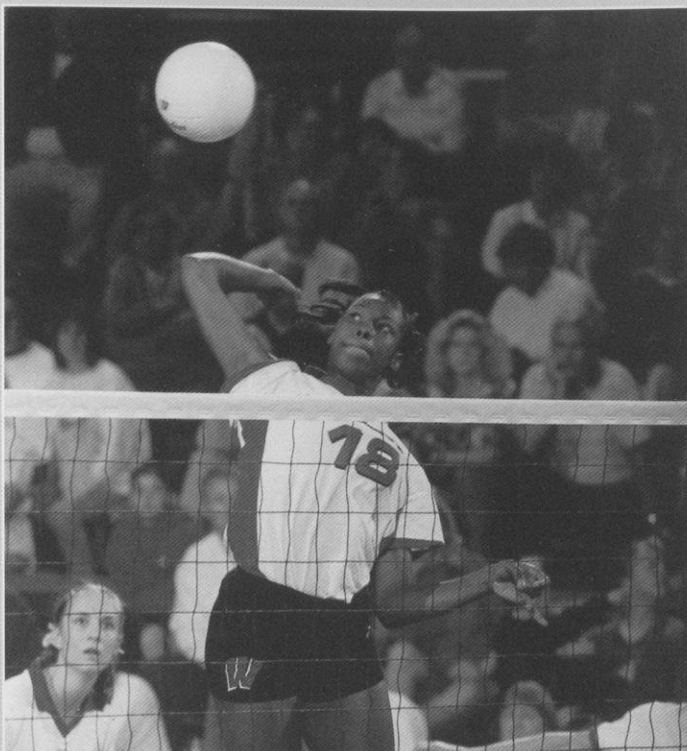

Dalton, IL**

Lisa Boyd set a number of firsts for Wisconsin Volleyball. She was the first all-American earning second-team honors in 1990 leading the Badgers to their first NCAA Tournament appearance. She was the first Big Ten Player of the Year leading the UW to its first conference title.

The 6-0 middle blocker ended her career ranking among the top 10 in every career category except assists. She still ranks third in block solos (113), fourth in total blocks (523) and fifth in block assists (410).

Boyd was a unanimous all-Big Ten selection in 1990 and an all-region honoree. She led the Big Ten in blocking in 1989 and 1990 and was a three-time Big Ten Player of the Week. Boyd was named the most valuable player of the inaugural NIVC in 1989 as the Badgers won the team title. She was also named the UW's Female Athlete of the Year for 1990-91.

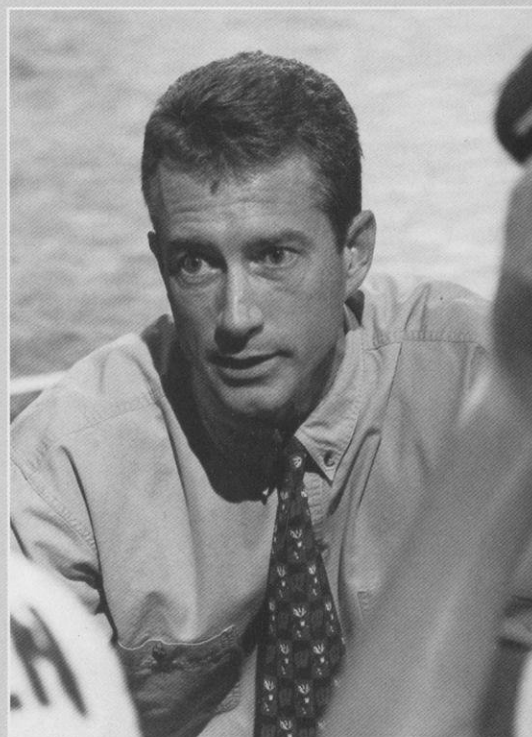

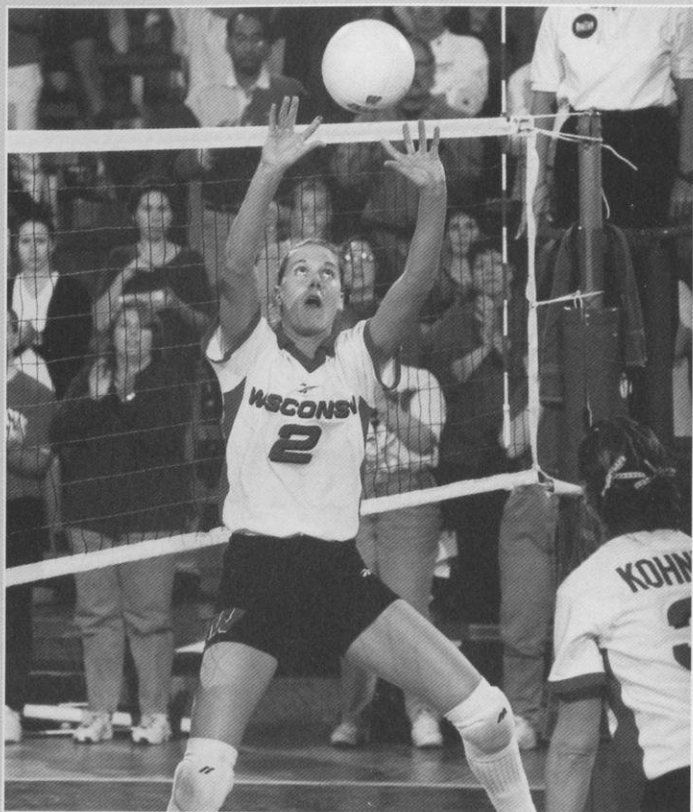

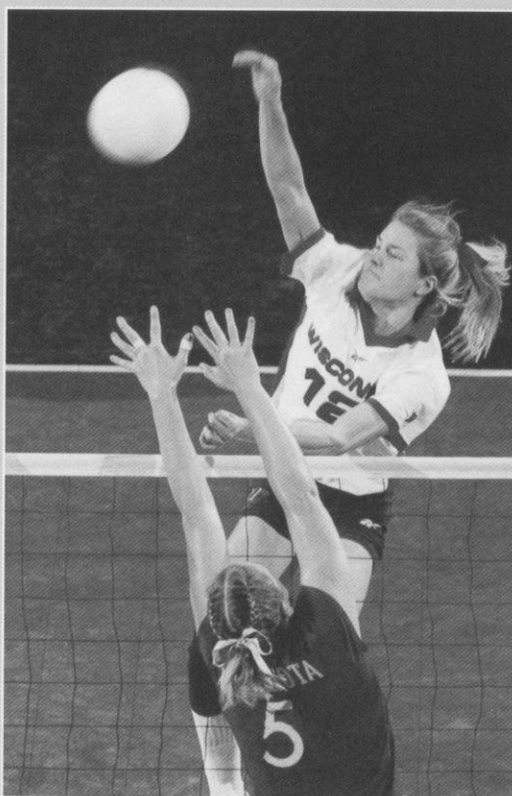

Academic Excellence

The University of Wisconsin-Madison is one of the finest institutions of higher education in the world. 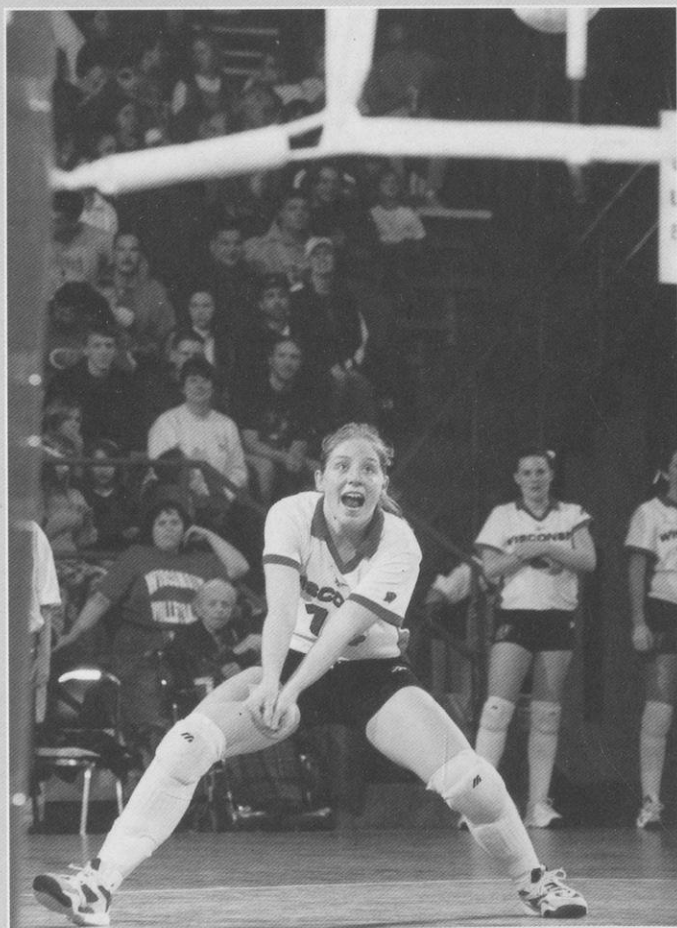

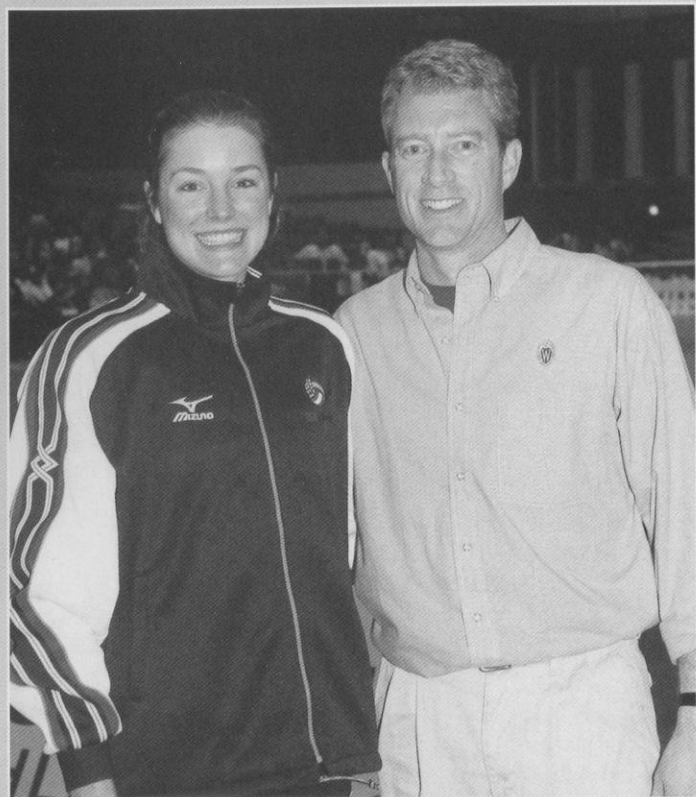

Senior Lizzy Fitzgerald was part of U.S. National Team A-2 program, which is for current college athletes, this past summer and also in 1999. In 1999, she was joined by Maastricht and Kelly Kennedy at the training camp.

Senior Sherisa Livingston was also selected to travel with the U.S. National Team to a tournament in Switzerland during the summer of 2000. She did not compete with the team but experienced the highest level of international competition. Livingston was a two-time member of the U.S. Junior National Team. She competed in the 1999 World Junior Championship where she was named the Best Blocker.

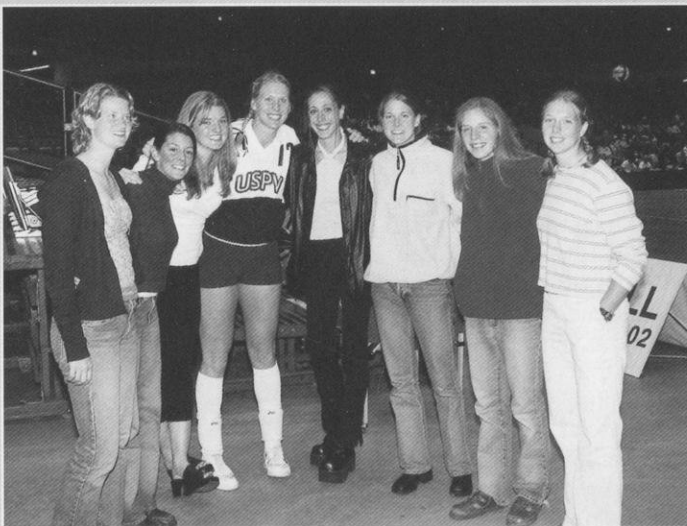
Livingston and Erin Byrd won gold medals at the 1998 NORCECA Championship defeating a team from Mexico which included Claudia Rodriguez.

Wisconsin Field House

The first time you walk into the UW Field House during a volleyball match, you feel the excitement that is Wisconsin Volleyball. The band is playing, the fans are yelling "Point Wisconsin", Bucky Badger is dancing, and the UW team is on the court winning!

Badger fans make the UW Field House one of the loudest and most intimidating venues for opposing teams in the nation. Wisconsin consistently ranks among the top 10 in the nation in attendance and Badger fans are known for being very knowledgeable about the sport of volleyball.

● Badgers' Home

The Wisconsin Field House has been the permanent home of the Badger volleyball team since 1986. In 1998, the volleyball team took over sole possession of the Field House adding a Sport Court and improving its locker room facilities.

The first volleyball match played in the Field House was on Oct. 23, 1977, when the U.S. Men's National Team played Cuba. The first women's match followed soon after when Wisconsin played host to the 1977 Big Ten Conference Championship on Oct. 29.

It wasn't until 1980 that the Badgers again competed in the Field House playing host to two tournaments. Wisconsin's play in the Field House was sporadic until 1986 when the official move to the Field House occurred.



Wisconsin ranks among the top 10 teams in the country in attendance and has led the Big Ten Conference in attendance five times.

● A Tough Place to Play

Since 1990, when the Badgers won their first Big Ten title and competed in their first NCAA tournament, the Field House has become one of the toughest places to play in the country. Wisconsin has ranked among the top 10 in national attendance for the last 11 years including third-place rankings in 1997 and 2000. In 1997, the Badgers set the Big

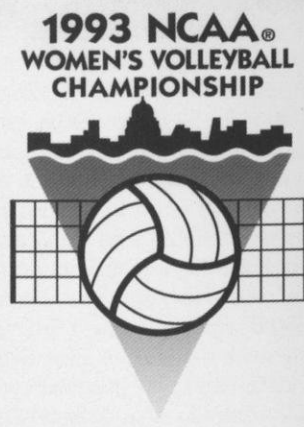
Ten Conference record with 3,457 spectators per match. Wisconsin has led the league in attendance five years—1990, '91, '94, '97 and 2000.

● 1993 NCAA Championship

The Field House was the site of the 1993 NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Championship which drew record crowds. A total of 21,085 watched the two-day event including 11,155 for the championship match. That figure set the then-NCAA single-match attendance record and still ranks as the No. 5 volleyball attendance figure of all time.

The Field House was also the site of the No. 7 attendance of all time when 10,935 fans watched the Badgers defeat Illinois in the first round of the 1990 NCAA tournament.

● Volleyball Specific

With the Kohl Center opening, the Badger volleyball team is the sole occupant of the Field House in the fall. One significant improvement is a permanent Sport Court for all UW home matches and practices. The Badgers also moved into refurbished locker room facilities with a team lounge and study area separate from the team's home locker room.

The Field House has a total of four locker rooms for hosting tournaments as well as an athletic training room and equipment room.

Badgers In Europe

The Wisconsin volleyball team, which finished second at the 2000 NCAA Championship, celebrated its record-setting season with the Badger Volleyball Victory Tour. The Badgers departed Madison on May 19 for a 16-day tour of Italy, Switzerland and France. Under NCAA rules, member institutions may participate in a foreign tour in any sport every four years.

"It was an awesome trip and I think it made us all more open to the differences in people and places," said UW coach Pete Waite. "We experienced some great things

It wasn't all fun for the Badgers as they also practiced and played four matches against some tough competition. The team finished with a 3-1 record.

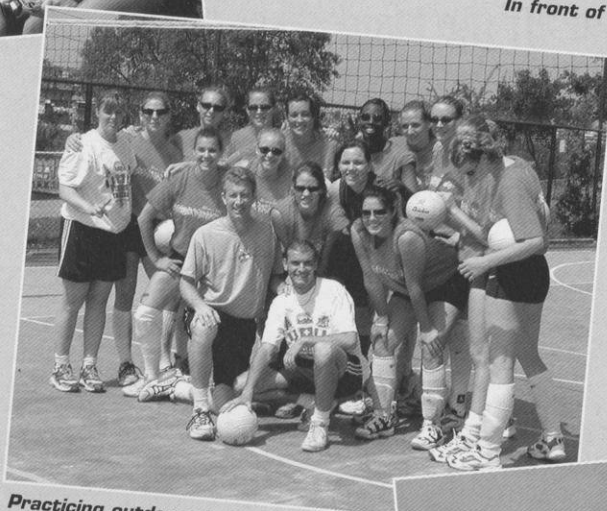

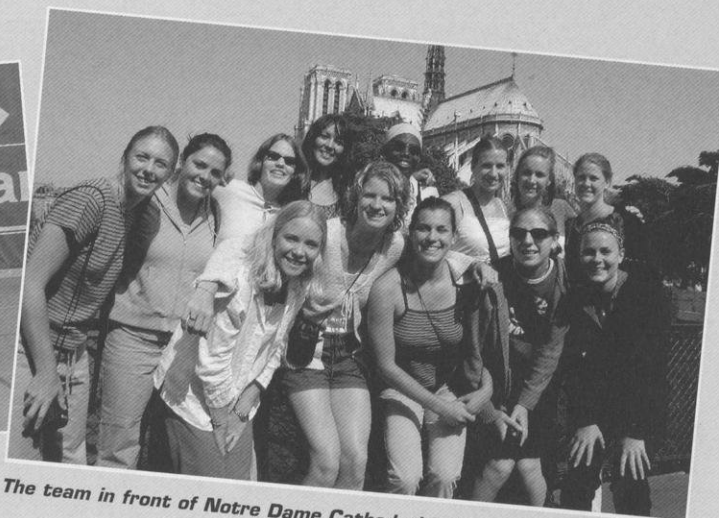

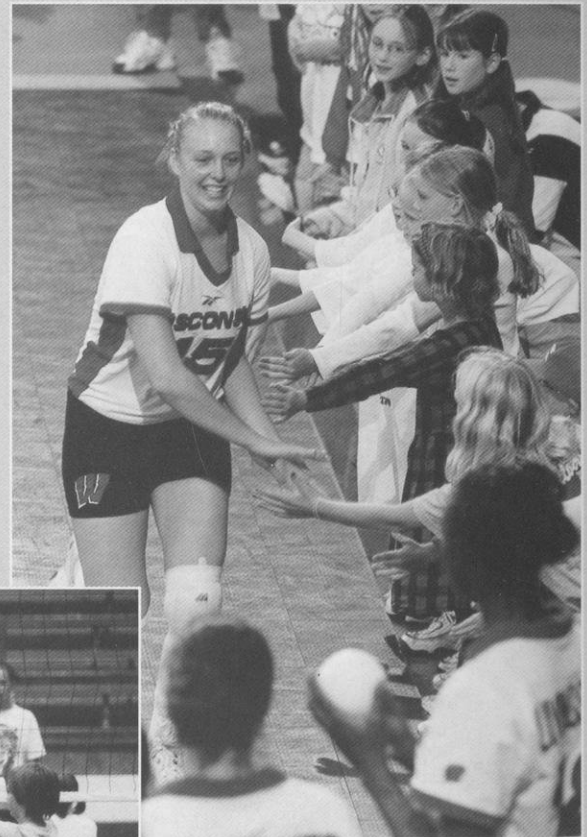

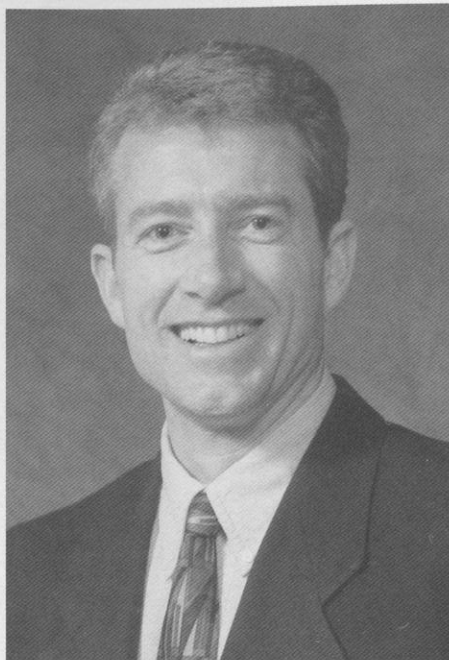
For Pete Waite, the 2000 season at the University of Wisconsin was a dream come true. Waite, who was only in his second year with the Badgers, guided the UW to the NCAA Championship match, the NCAA Mideast Regional title and the Big Ten Conference Championship. He was named the AVCA Mideast Regional and Big Ten Coach of the Year.

Wisconsin finished the season 33-4 overall and won the Big Ten with an 18-2 mark. Waite, a native of Monona, Wis., who became the Badgers' head coach in April of 1999, has a two-year record of 55-14.

In his first year at Wisconsin, he led the Badgers to a 22-10 overall mark advancing to the second round of the NCAA Tournament. Wisconsin finished third in the Big Ten Conference at 14-6.

Waite, 41, has coached three all-Americans, seven AVCA all-region selections, five conference players of the year, and 24 first-team all-conference honorees. He has had six athletes on all-newcomer teams and two earn newcomer of the year recognition. In 2000, Sherisa Livingston became the first UW player to earn first-team all-America honors while Lizzy Fitzgerald earned second-team honors. Livingston was also named the Big Ten Co-Player of the Year while Claudia Rodriguez was named the Big Ten Freshman of the Year.

Waite came to Wisconsin from Northern Illinois University where he was the all-time winningest volleyball coach in program history. He had an 11-year record of 266-102 (.723 winning percentage) including nine 20-win seasons.



The Huskies were 81-19 (.810) in his last three years including three consecutive NCAA tournament bids. Northern appeared in four NCAA tournaments under Waite, advancing to the second round three times including in 1997 when it lost to national runner-up Penn State. The Huskies also appeared in the National Invitational Volleyball Championship in 1991, '92, and '94, and declined an invitation to the NIVC in 1995.

Northern Illinois won eight regular-season conference titles and six conference tournaments under Waite. The Huskies won the 1998 Mid-American Conference regular season title and the 1997 MAC tournament. He has earned

three conference coach of the year honors including the 1997 Mid-American Coach of the Year.

Prior to being named the head coach at Northern Illinois, Waite spent two years as an assistant coach at Illinois State. In 1984 and 1985, he was the head coach at Moraine Valley Community College in Palos Hills, Ill., leading the Cyclones to the 1985 North Central Community College Conference championship. Waite was named the conference coach of the year in 1985.

Waite spent one year as the director and coach of the Chicago Power Junior Volleyball Club in Orland Park, Ill., and two years as a coach with the 2nd City Junior Volleyball Club in Chicago.

He started his coaching career in 1981 at Muncie (IN) Northside High School and spent the next year as a junior varsity coach at his alma mater, Monona Grove (WI) High School. Waite also coached one year at Bremen High School in Midlothian, Ill.

Waite played volleyball and graduated from Monona Grove High School. He played volleyball at Ball State University in Muncie, Ind., from 1977-81 with a team that consistently ranked in the top 10 nationally. The 1979 Cardinal squad finished fourth in the NCAA tournament after winning the Midwest Intercollegiate Volleyball Association title with a perfect 14-0 record. Waite received all-MIVA honors his junior and senior years, and was named team co-captain and co-MVP in 1980. He received his bachelor's degree in education from Ball State in 1981.

Waite and his wife, Carrie, have two sons, Ryan, 17, and Eric, 14.

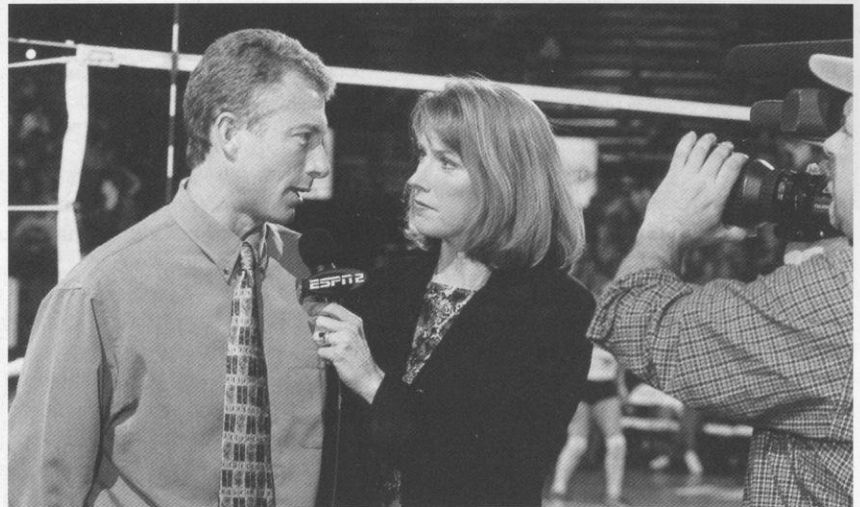

Q&A with Coach Waite

Why should a student-athlete choose to attend the University of Wisconsin?

I've seen a lot of other schools and I think the University of Wisconsin ranks among the best in the nation. Besides having some of the best academic programs, it has two important areas that put it above many other schools. Being surrounded by two large lakes and the state capital, it's one of the most beautiful campuses anywhere. Along with that, we have a very loyal and large fan base that makes the Field House a fantastic place to play. Our program can offer a great education, a beautiful city, a well-balanced social life, and fans that other schools wish they had. I could go on and on, but the UW has the whole package.

What kind of student-athletes are you recruiting to the University of Wisconsin?

I want players who are serious about their academics. People who are here to get a degree they will be proud of while playing for a team they will remember forever. I want people who love the game now and who will love it when they're done. People who are well-rounded academically, athletically, and socially.

What goals have you set for the Wisconsin program and each individual player?

Some goals we set are private, between the players and the staff. I think that's important in order to keep everyone focused on the task. We ask each player to leave her comfort zone and grow as a person and as a member of the team.

We'll always be aiming to be the top team in the Big Ten along with being one of the top teams in the country. We want to prepare ourselves for the opportunity to succeed.

How would you describe your coaching style?

I'm a teacher, it's always been a part of me even before I became a coach. I look for our weaknesses and do everything I can to eliminate them. I'm firm and fair, not a yeller. I expect a lot of my players while at the same time, I'll work hard to help them enjoy their time with the program. It's a game; it should be fun. I offer them a lot of variety in practices so that time flies by. I want players to love the game, play from their hearts, and dare to dream. When they do that, the wins will come.

You chose to return to your hometown of Madison after coaching in the collegiate ranks for over 10 years. What made you want to come back and accept this position?

Part of my decision to return was for my wife Carrie and my sons, Ryan and Eric. Madison is such a great place to live that I wanted them to be able to enjoy it too. The other part was the excitement of the high level of play and the great athletes the University of Wisconsin attracts. The Big Ten is the best conference in the country, and that makes our players raise their level of play higher than they could ever imagine.

You have almost 20 years of coaching experience. What have you learned in your years of coaching that you bring to the UW program?

I've been a college coach for over 16 years, and was a full-time club coach for three years before that. I've learned that patience pays off. I enjoy seeing a player learn a new skill just as much as I enjoy the championships. I bring the philosophy that building a quality program means taking care of the players, not taking short cuts and leaving players in your wake.

I know that developing winners is not just about me. There has to be a great staff and we have that. The players need to believe, trust, and try. I'm here to guide them and give them the freedom to blossom when they're ready to grow.

What strengths does your coaching staff bring to the University of Wisconsin program and its athletes?

I think we have one of the best coaching staffs in the country.

Christy brings the wisdom of a person who led her team to a national championship in college. She has an analytical eye to break down opponents and find ways for us to win.

Rod will be a great addition to our staff. His has a wealth of experience as a coach and player on the national and international levels.

This is a great staff who loves what they do. The Badger players and I are lucky to be able to be in the gym everyday with these coaches. They are both winners.

The Big Ten Conference is one of the toughest leagues in the nation for women's volleyball. What does it take for athletes to compete on the Big Ten level?

Not just one of the toughest, it is the toughest! Players have to battle and fight to say on top. That's what makes it great. You have no choice but to play your best because there are so many good players and teams. Those are the players we want to become Badgers: those who love a challenge and are ready to fight. To be the best, you have to play the best.

Wisconsin made it to the NCAA Championship match in 2000. What has this done for the program? What is it going to take to remain at this level?

Earning a trip to the NCAA Championship match really gave us a lot of respect nationally. As we go out on the recruiting trail now, we hear a lot of comments from people who were pulling for us. Making it to the final match showed people that we were for real, that we had really earned our way there by beating some great teams.

To stay at the elite level, we need to bring in the top recruits who can see themselves playing for the national championship in a Badger uniform. We've been getting some attention from the top players in the country already, so I'm excited about the future of the program.

What do you enjoy most about coaching at the University of Wisconsin?

The players, the staff, the support, the Field House, the Band, Bucky, the huge fan turnout, all the other great sports and coaches, the lakes, State Street, the Capital, the zoo, the Big Ten, my family nearby . . . I love this place!

● Christy Johnson

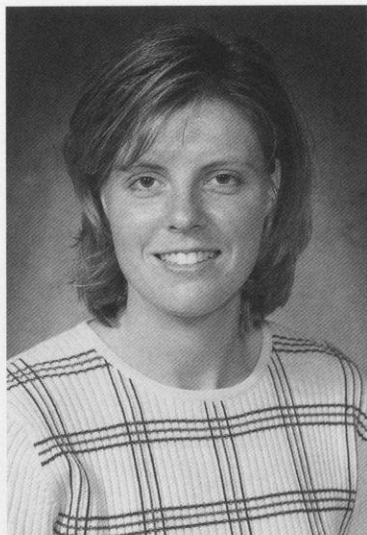
Christy Johnson, a two-time all-American at the University of Nebraska, enters her fifth year as an assistant coach at Wisconsin. She spent her first two years as an assistant under John Cook and is in her third year under Pete Waite.

Johnson, 27, provides the Badgers with crucial NCAA experience. She also guided setter Colleen Neels to two all-Big Ten honors.

Johnson earned all-American honors for the Huskers in 1994 and 1995. She was the starting setter on the 1995 Nebraska team that won the NCAA Championship. The Huskers made four NCAA tournament appearances and won three Big Eight titles during Johnson's years. A two-time all-district selection and two-time all-Big Eight Conference honoree, Johnson was also named to the 1995 NCAA Championship all-tournament team, the 1994 and 1995 NCAA Regional all-tournament team, and the 1994 and 1995 Big Eight Conference all-tournament team. In addition to her athletic honors, Johnson was a 1995 second-team Academic all-American and a three-time Academic all-Big Eight honoree.

Johnson has international experience as a member of the 1989 U.S. Junior National team and as a member of the 1993 U.S. National "B" Team. She played with the Nebraska Tornadoes of the National Volleyball Association for two seasons leading the Tornadoes to the league championship in 1998.

A 1996 graduate of Nebraska with a bachelor's degree in education, Johnson spent one year coaching at Millard North High School in her hometown of Omaha, Neb. She also served as a coach in the River City Juniors Volleyball Club program for two years.



● Rod Wilde

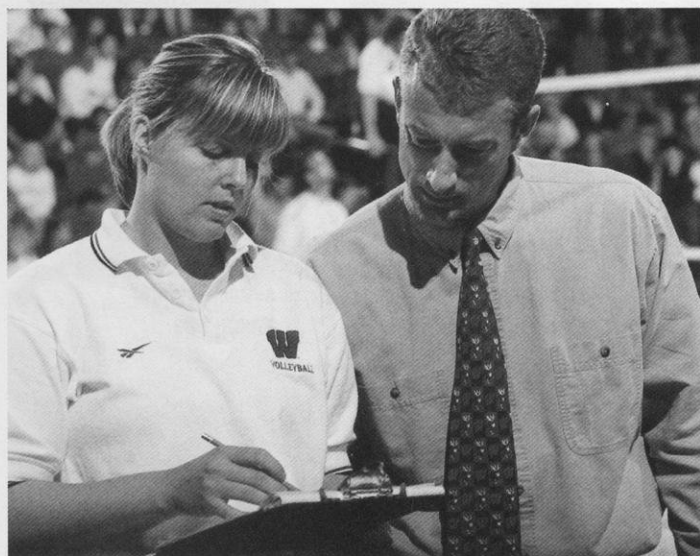
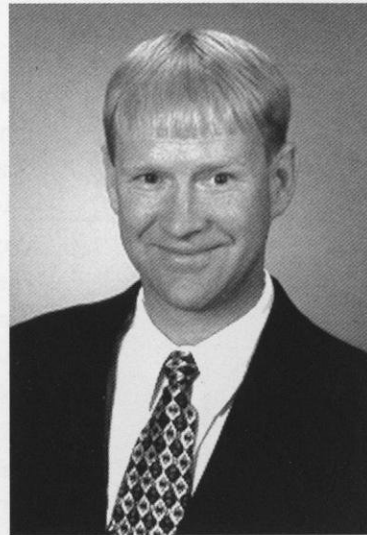
Rod Wilde, a member of the 1984 U.S. Olympic gold medal team and a NCAA champion as both a player and coach, begins his first season as an assistant coach at Wisconsin.

Wilde, 44, was a member of the United States volleyball team that won a gold medal at the 1984 Olympics. A member of the U.S. National Team from 1982-84 and again from 1989-91, Wilde also served as an assistant coach with the U.S. men's national team from 1993-2000. He was selected as an assistant coach to both the 1996 and 2000 Olympic teams. He also aided the U.S. to a bronze medal at the 1994 World Championships. In 1999, Wilde was the head coach of the U.S. Pan-American team.

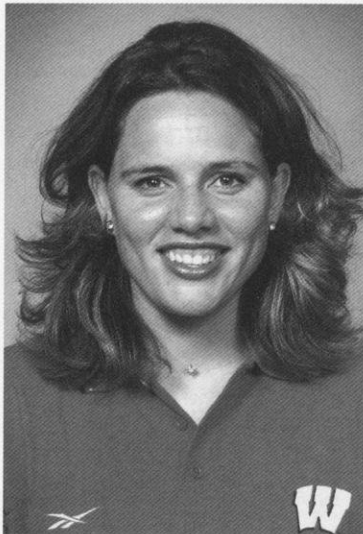
The former manager of the High Performance Programs with U.S.A. Volleyball (USAV), Wilde oversaw all aspects of the USAV programs for high school athletes including the Junior and Youth national teams.

Wilde was a three-time all-American at Pepperdine University, setting the Waves to the 1978 NCAA Championship. He returned to Pepperdine as the men's head coach from 1985-87 leading the Waves to the 1986 NCAA Championship. Wilde also served as the head men's coach at UC San Diego from 1991-93 and as the head women's coach at Drake University from 1984-85.

Wilde is a 1980 graduate of Pepperdine University with a bachelor's degree in kinesiology and a minor in physical education. He is a native of Fort Dodge, Iowa, and his wife, Kris (Hey), is a native of Milwaukee. She was an all-state volleyball and basketball player at Wauwatosa East High School and led the Red Raiders to the Wisconsin state high school titles in both volleyball and basketball in 1980.

Former Badger all-American Amy Lee begins her second year as the UW's Director of Volleyball Operations. She is in charge of team travel and practice arrangements, serves as the camp and Side Out Booster Club liaison, team academic coordinator and assists with all administrative matters.

Lee, 25, earned second-team all-American honors in 1997. She led the Badgers to a share of the Big Ten Conference Championship that season and was a unanimous all-Big Ten selection. Lee earned all-AVCA District 2 honors and was named to the NCAA Regional all-tournament team. She earned seven all-tournament honors in her career and was also a three-time Academic all-Big Ten selection.

The Milwaukee native is the UW's all-time career leader in kills with 1,661 and in attack attempts with 4,129. One of the best all-around players in UW history, Lee also ranks fourth in block assists, seventh in total blocks and 10th in service aces.

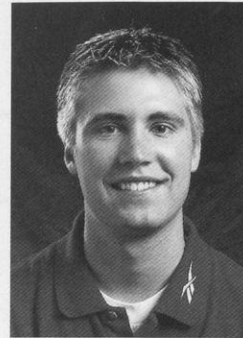

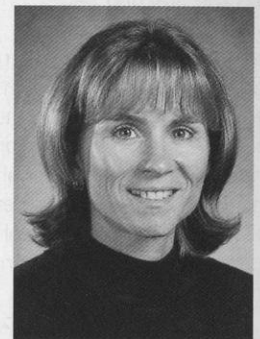

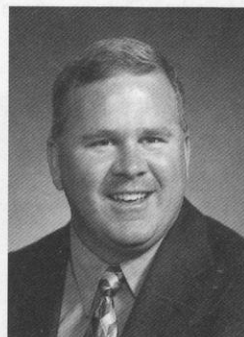

Badgers Ready to Roll Again in 2001

Maybe it was the day spent at Islands of Adventure theme park in Florida, but for the Wisconsin volleyball team, the 2000 season was a thrill ride from start to finish.

"If I had written the script myself, I couldn't have made it much better," says UW coach Pete Waite. "It was the kind of season most athletes, coaches and fans only dream of. But we lived it and it was a fantastic ride."

The Badgers opened the 2000 season at the SunTrust Invitational in Gainesville, Fla. After losing to Florida in the championship match of the tournament, the Wisconsin team spent a day in Orlando at the tourist attraction enjoying the thrill rides and adventures.

It could have been the rides on the Incredible Hulk roller coaster or maybe the ride through The Amazing Adventures of Spiderman but whatever it was, Wisconsin came away with the super-power needed to lead it to its best season ever.

The Badgers went on to win their next 11 matches including tournament titles at the Sugar Bowl Classic in New Orleans and the InnTowner Invitational at home. Wisconsin opened its Big Ten Conference season with a win at home over defending NCAA champion Penn State and remained atop the league standings throughout the season. The Badgers clinched the title outright at Michigan State on the last night of the regular season.

What followed could only be described as an almost perfect ending. The Badgers played host to first and second round NCAA Tournament matches defeating Bucknell and Northern Iowa, respectively. Wisconsin played host to a NCAA regional for the second time in school history defeating Kansas State in the semifinals and winning a five-game thriller over UCLA to advance to its first NCAA Championship. The third-seeded Badgers upset second-seeded USC in the semifinals before losing to Nebraska in the championship match in a very tight five games.

So will the 2001 season be as exciting and full of adventure as last year?

"I know that no two seasons are ever exactly alike so I make sure to enjoy the great ones when they fall into place," says Waite,

who was named the 2000 Big Ten and AVCA Midwest Regional Coach of the Year.

"I think we'll be putting a very good team on the floor this season. Our first goal, as always, is going after the Big Ten Championship. Another trip to the final four will certainly be on our wish list as well."

Two All-Americans Return

Leading Waite's team will be all-Americans Sherisa Livingston and Lizzy Fitzgerald. Returning two all-Americans is a first for the Wisconsin program and with both being seniors, Waite is counting on their experience and leadership.

"Lizzy and Sherisa made huge strides in their games last year and I expect they'll do it again this season," says Waite. "They've set standards for themselves and for their teammates that they'll strive for together."

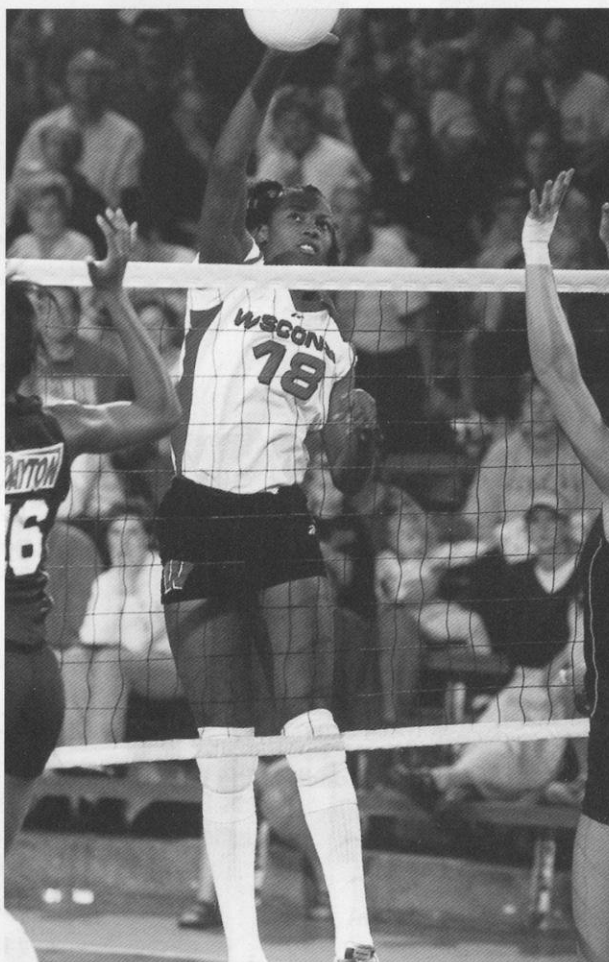
Livingston, a 6-2 middle blocker, became the first UW player to earn first-team all-American honors being named by the AVCA and *Volleyball Magazine* in 2000. She was a dominating front-row player for the Badgers, leading the team with 5.19 kills, while hitting a team-high .373 percent, and 1.38 blocks per

game. The Simi Valley, Calif., native set the UW season record for kills with 654 and needs only 299 kills to become Wisconsin's career kill leader. Livingston was also named the Big Ten co-Player of the Year and earned AVCA all-region honors.

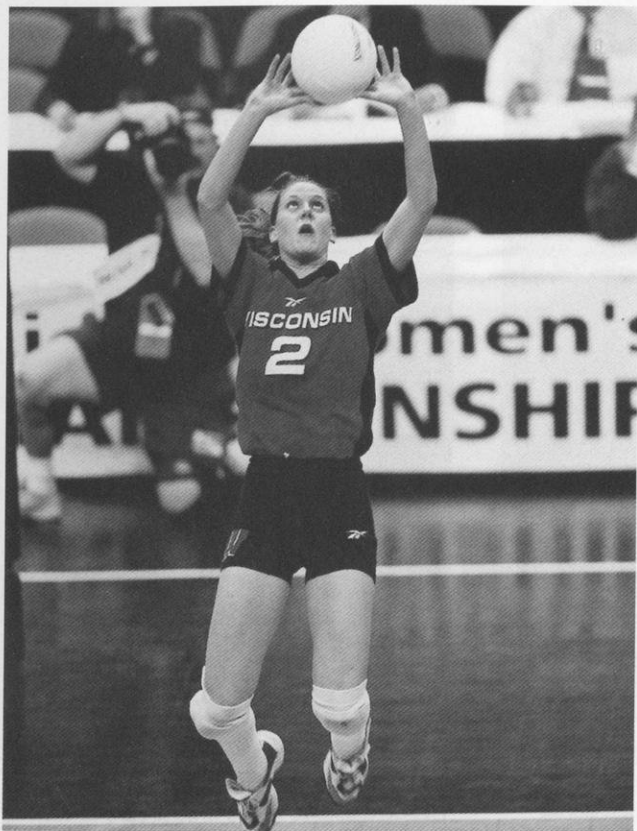
A candidate for national player of the year honors in 2001, Waite thinks Livingston will put the team's goals before her own.

"I'm sure Sherisa would be honored to earn a great award like that but I'm sure she'd give it up in a heartbeat if it meant getting a national championship," explains Waite. "She and the entire team will be focused on winning matches together. If she receives a player of the year award, which she is very capable of, she and her teammates will have earned it together."

Fitzgerald, a native of New Orleans, came into her own as the Badgers' starting setter in 2000. After splitting time with Morgan Shields early in the season, the 6-0 Fitzgerald started the last 28 matches of the year. She earned second-team all-American honors after averaging 13.76 assists, 2.56 digs, 1.24 kills and 0.85 blocks per game. Fitzgerald was named the AVCA/Sports Imports Division I National Player of the Week on Sept. 25 becoming the first UW player to receive national

player of the week honors. She was also named all-Big Ten and all-region.

"This year we have even more veterans on the team," says Waite. "A lot of these athletes played in the national championship match and that experience will help them play with even more confidence. I think having been in the fifth game of the NCAA Championship last

year, they'll want to be there again even more this season. Everyday in practice, they'll be working even harder so that they again have a shot at the title."

Replacing Three Starters

The Badgers lose two starters—all-American Jenny Maastricht and Meggan Kohnen—as well as key defensive specialist Jamie Gardner to graduation. The UW will also be without the services of 2000 Big Ten Freshman of the Year Claudia Rodriguez, who chose to return to her native Mexico.

"We won't know until practices start and maybe even into the first week of the season who is going to fill these positions," says Waite. "The spot

that looks most clear right now is defensive specialist. Korie Gardner has matured well over the spring and she's ready to step right into her big sister's spot."

Gardner played in 10 matches as a true freshman. She averaged 0.64 digs and 0.27 service aces per game. The 5-8 Gardner had career highs of three service aces at Northwestern and two digs twice.

In addition to Livingston and Fitzgerald, Wisconsin also returns two-year starter Erin Byrd at outside hitter. Byrd, a 6-0 junior, has been the Badgers' defensive leader the last two seasons. She led the team with 3.05 digs per game as a sophomore recording double-figure digs in 19 matches. Byrd also averaged 1.39 kills per game.

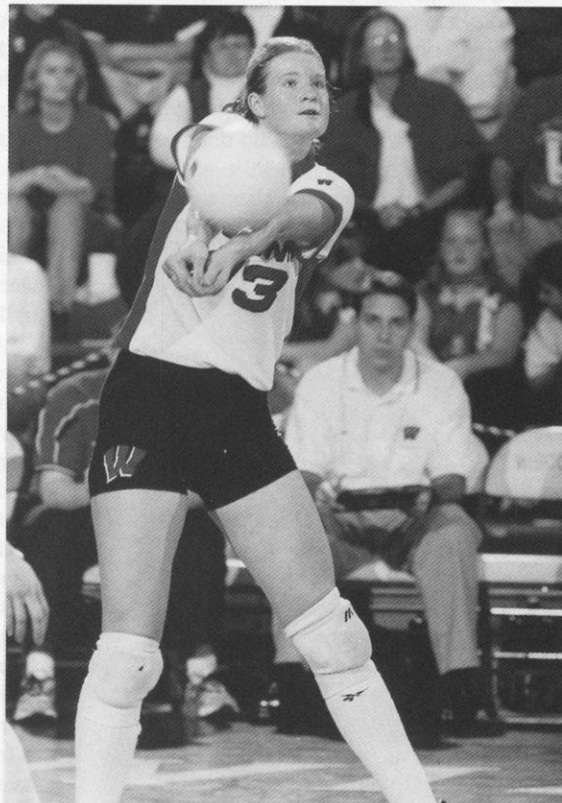
Another key defensive player for the Badgers is senior Sara

Urbanek. A transfer from Northern Illinois University, the

5-9 Urbanek saw her first action in a Badger uniform last season. She played primarily in the back row for the opposite hitter where she ranked fourth on the team with 2.60 digs per game. Urbanek also ranked second on the team with 31 service aces.

Redshirt junior Lori Rittenhouse is the leading candidate to replace Rodriguez at opposite hitter. The 6-1 Mankato, Minn., native started three out of the last four matches of the season after Rodriguez dislocated her shoulder prior to the NCAA Regional semifinals. She recorded a career-high eight blocks against Kansas State and a season-high seven kills against Nebraska in the championship match. Rittenhouse averaged 0.93 kills and 0.60 blocks per game last year.

Lisa Zukowski, who impressed Badger fans with her competitiveness and quick arm swing as a true freshman, earned a starting outside hitter spot during the 2001 spring season. The 5-10 sophomore saw limited playing time last year averaging 0.74 kills and 0.89 kills

per game. She recorded a career-high nine kills and 13 digs at Ohio State.

Marie Meyer has played a reserve role her first three seasons at Wisconsin and is ready to challenging for a starting position at middle blocker this year. The 6-1 senior played in only six matches in 2000 but hit an impressive .556 percent while averaging 1.50 kills and 0.50 blocks per game. Offensively, Meyer was a perfect five-for-five against Northwestern and three-for-three at Purdue.

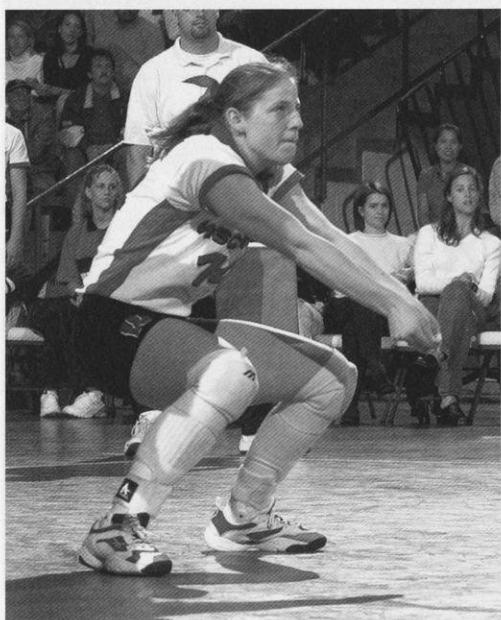
As back-up setter, Shields is hoping to redshirt the 2001 season. The 5-11 junior started four matches last year when she averaged 10.30 assists per game. Shields had a career high six kills and five blocks against Northern Iowa early in the season.

Also seeing limited action at defensive specialist were Angie Sanger and Jill Maier. Sanger, a 5-4 Madison native, and Maier, a 5-7 native of Oak Creek, Wis., both played in two games.

"This team prepares very well for opponents and they figure them out as the match goes on," says Waite.

● Newcomers Fill Holes

With the loss of three starters, Waite will have to rely on his newcomers to fill some big shoes. Luckily for Waite, one of his newcomers has already played two years on the collegiate level.

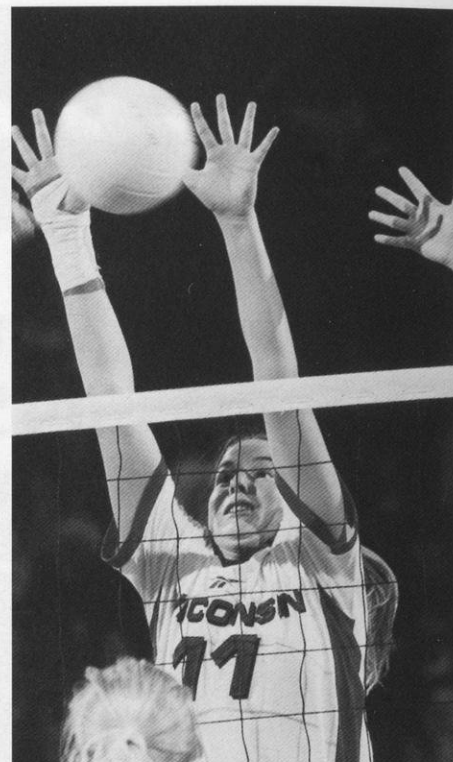
Amy Hultgren becomes the second player from the University of Texas in as many years to transfer to Wisconsin. She follows Meggan Kohnen from Texas to Wisconsin. Like Kohnen, the 6-3 middle blocker is also a native of Iowa. Hultgren, who has two years of eligibility remaining, saw action in every match as a freshman and sophomore, starting 17 in her career. As a sophomore, she led the Longhorns with 1.14 blocks per game and ranked second on the team with a .310 hitting percentage.

"I'm really happy to have Amy joining our program this season," says Waite. "She'll be a real presence in the front court for us. The fact that she's transferring in with two years of college experience under her belt is a real bonus."

In addition, Waite also has three of the top 40 freshmen in the country joining his program. The trio of Aubrey Meierotto, Jill Odenthal and Marian Weidner was ranked sixth in the nation by *Volleyball Magazine*.

"I think a couple of these players will earn their way into the starting line-up right away," says Waite of his freshmen. "I'm really happy with this group on paper. Now they need to come in and blend with the returnees as soon as they can."

Meierotto, a 6-1 outside hitter, was ranked seventh by *Volleyball Magazine* based on the impact she is expected to make in college volleyball. A native of Washburn, Wis., Meierotto led her high school to the 2000 Wisconsin State Division 3 Championship. She set a tournament record with 87 kills in two matches, including 50 kills in the championship match. Meierotto was a member of the 1999 U.S. Girls Youth National Training Team.

Odenhal, a 6-0 opposite hitter/setter, ranked 37th in *Volleyball Magazine's* list of the top 50 preps in the country. She is a 1999 AAU All-American and was named the 2000 conference player of the year. A native of Geneva, Ill., Odenthal was a three-time all-conference selection and a member of the *Chicago Daily Herald* and *Beacon News* all-area teams.

Weidner, a 6-2 outside hitter, ranked 33rd in *Volleyball Magazine's* list. She earned all-American honors at the 1999 and 2000 AAU Junior Nationals and was also named a *Student Sports Magazine* all-American. Weidner, a native of Warrenville, Ill., led Sports Performance to the 2001 AAU Junior National Championship and also won a gold in 1999. She was named the outstanding player at the 1999 National Junior Classic.

"I look at the start of each season pretty much the same way," says Waite. "We'll get into practices and see how the incoming players blend with the returning squad. We know we're after some lofty goals so we'll work hard every day to give ourselves the best opportunity to win when it's time."

● Schedule Features Nine Ranked Team

The time for the Badgers to win will come immediately at the start of the season. Wisconsin's 2001 schedule features nine teams which were ranked in the final USA Today/AVCA Coaches poll including No. 1 Nebraska, No. 3 Hawai'i, No. 4 USC, No. 6 Penn State, No. 8 Pacific and No. 9 UC Santa Barbara. Other ranked teams are No. 11 Minnesota, No. 15 Ohio State and No. 24 Northern Iowa.

All 10 ranked teams participated in the 2000 NCAA Tournament and will be joined on the Badgers' schedule by post-season qualifiers Ball State, Cincinnati, Duke, Michigan, and Michigan State.

"Our pre-conference schedule has no easy teams on it so we'll have to ready to play hard every time we step on to the court," says Waite. "The Big Ten? Tough as always but we wouldn't want it any other way. To win the Big Ten is so tough that it makes the achievement even more gratifying."

The Badgers will face the Huskers, Rainbow Wahine and Tigers in the seventh annual State Farm Volleyball Classic presented by the National Association of Collegiate Women Athletic Administrators

(NACWAA) on Aug. 24-25 in Stockton, Calif. The tournament is the only pre-season volleyball competition allowed by the NCAA with participating teams playing one week prior to the official season opening.

"It's a great honor to play in the NACWAA Tournament. It's just like playing in the NCAA Championship again and that will give us a jump start on the season," says Waite.

Wisconsin will face USC, UC Santa Barbara and UC Irvine at the UC Irvine Invitational in Irvine, Calif., before returning home for two consecutive tournaments in the UW Field House.

The Big Ten season will again be a battle with four teams having ended the 2000 season ranked in the top 15 in the country.

"We have so many great opponents on our schedule that we'll prepare for each match knowing it's a big one," says Waite.

In one way, the Badgers already have a step up on their competition. The Wisconsin team spent 16 days in late May travelling to Italy, Switzerland and France sightseeing and competing.

"It was an awesome trip and I think it made us all more open to the differences in people and places," says Waite. "We experienced some great things together and those bonds will help us when we

need it during the season."

It wasn't all fun for the Badgers as they also practiced and played four matches against some tough competition. The team finished with a 3-1 record.

"Everyone really had time to get to know each other better, players and staff," says Waite. "During our regular season travel, we have short trips focused on the competitions. This was a long time together where they had to deal with adversities everyday."

The Badgers are ready for another fun-filled season in 2001 and with the right preparation, who knows what sort of ride the season will bring?

Badgers Record Best Season Ever

WISCONSIN FINISHES SECOND IN NCAA CHAMPIONSHIP

For the first time in program history, the Badgers advanced to the NCAA Championship match.

Third-seeded Wisconsin defeated second-seeded USC, 3-0, to advance to the national championship match. Top-seeded Nebraska defeated fourth-seeded Hawai'i, 3-1, in the other semifinal to also advance. The Badgers faced the Huskers, who are led by former UW coach John Cook, in the championship match, losing 2-3.

The Badgers ended the season 33-4 (.892 winning percentage), which is the second highest winning percentage in program history. The record is 30-3 (.909) set in 1997.

30 WINS AGAIN Wisconsin recorded the fifth 30-win season in program history and its seventh consecutive 20-win season in 2000.

The Badgers' 33 wins is the second highest in program history. The season record is 40 wins set in 1978.

Wisconsin opened the 2000 season with a 13-1 record, the best start ever for a team coached by Pete Waite. Waite's 1997 team at Northern Illinois opened the season 12-1, his previous best start.

LIFE'S A GAS Wisconsin knew that it had won a share of the 2000 Big Ten Conference title when it defeated Michigan State, 3-0, on Nov. 25 in East Lansing, Mich. Conference co-leader Minnesota was playing at Ohio State with

the Gophers winning the first two games. Before the Badgers left the Spartan arena, the team knew that the match was going to five games. But the Badgers didn't know they had won the title outright until coach Pete Waite called the Ohio State press row while the team was stopped at a gas station in Lansing. Upon hearing the news, the team piled out of their vans and a spontaneous celebration erupted much to the dismay of the shocked gas station attendant.

The championship is the third overall for the UW and the second outright title. Wisconsin won the 1990 championship and shared the 1997 title with Penn State.

WISCONSIN RANKED SECOND The Badgers ended the 2000 season ranked second in the *USA Today*/AVCA Coaches poll. The ranking is the highest ever for a UW team and the highest season-ending ranking ever. The previous highest ranking was fourth in 1997 and tied earlier this season. The previous best season-ending ranking was fifth in 1997.

The Badgers also ended the season ranked second in the Ballicora Computer Rankings. The rankings take into account games won and lost, and the strength of the opposition.

The Big Ten was rated the second strongest conference in the nation with an average ranking of 37.8. The Pac-10 led the rankings with an average of 28.6.

HOLD THAT LINE In 37 matches, only seven UW opponents hit better than .200 percent (.314 by Ohio State on Nov. 5; .264 by Nebraska on Dec. 16; .256 by Illinois on Nov. 17; .231 by UCLA on Dec. 9; .228 by Illinois on Oct. 21; .223 by Michigan on Nov. 24; and .212 by Ohio State on Sept. 29).

Wisconsin held its opponents to a negative hitting percentage three times (-.135 by UNLV on Sept. 1, -.010 by Rice on Sept. 16 and -.203 by Bucknell on

Dec. 1) and a zero hitting percentage once (.000 by Purdue on Nov. 18). On the season, UW opponents hit .140 percent.

The Badgers' improved defense was the key to holding down their opponents' offense. Wisconsin averaged 3.10 blocks and 17.17 digs per game.

On the offensive side, Wisconsin connected on .274 percent of its attacks, which ranks second on the UW season record list behind the .281 percent set in 1998. The Badgers hit over .400 percent twice and over .300 percent 17 times during the season.

AGAINST THE RANKINGS The Badgers were 8-4 against ranked team this season including upsetting three higher-ranked teams. The Badgers' 3-0 win over then-No. 2 USC on Dec. 14 was the highest ranked team that Wisconsin has defeated since downing then-No. 3 USC on Sept. 12, 1998. It is also the highest ranked team that coach Pete Waite has defeated in his 13 years of coaching

LIVINGSTON, MAASTRICHT-A POWERFUL COMBINATION In the 27-year history of the Wisconsin program, the Badgers have never had such a powerful hitting duo as Sherisa Livingston and Jenny Maastricht. Combined, the two accounted for 1,210 kills or 55 percent of the teams' total.

Livingston, a 6-2 middle blocker, set the UW season record with 654 kills this season. Maastricht, a 6-1 outside hitter, added 556 kills, which ranks third on the UW season list.

Wisconsin has had only four hitters—including Livingston and Maastricht this season—total over 500 kills in a season.

WISCONSIN IN THE NCAA TOURNAMENT The Badgers made their fifth consecutive and ninth overall appearance in the NCAA Tournament in 2000.

Wisconsin is 16-9 in the tournament after advancing to the NCAA Championship match, the first time in program history. Prior to the 2000, the Badgers had advanced to the regional finals (Elite Eight) twice, in 1997 and 1998. Wisconsin has finished among the top 16 teams in the NCAA Tournament seven times including 2000.

HOME SWEET HOME The Badgers finished their 2000 home season with a 10-match home winning streak. Wisconsin was 16-1 in the UW Field House this season. Then-No. 19 Ohio State handed the Badgers their only home loss on Sept. 29. The loss also snapped the UW's 12-match home winning streak.

The Badgers are 72-9 (.889 winning percentage) in the UW Field House since 1996. Wisconsin was 12-2 at home in 1996, 16-2 at home in 1997, 16-1 at home (3-0 in the Kohl Center) in 1998, and 12-3 at home in 1999. Eight out of nine of the UW's home losses have been to top-20 opponents.

WISCONSIN RANKED THIRD IN

ATTENDANCE The Badgers ended the 2000 season ranked third in national attendance. The ranking is the highest for the Badgers since 1997.

The Badgers averaged 3,139 fans per match, which ranked second only to the UW season record average of 3,457 set in 1997. Hawaii led the nation with 6,986 per match while Nebraska ranked second with 4,224 fans per match.

In 2000, Wisconsin had seven attendances that ranked among the top 30 on the UW's all-time list. The Badgers drew a season-high mark of 5,392 against Minnesota on Oct. 28, which ranks 10th on the list. Wisconsin also drew the No. 11 mark when 4,946 watched the NCAA Regional final against UCLA on Dec. 9.

WISCONSIN RANKED IN NCAA STATS

The Badgers appeared in four team categories in the 2000 NCAA statistics.

Wisconsin was fourth in winning percentage at .892 percent (33-4), 11th in hitting percentage (.274), 15th in blocks per game (3.10), 18th in kills per game (17.32), and 24th in assists per game (15.49).

Individually, Sherisa Livingston was tied for 14th in hitting percentage (.73) and 15th in kills per game (5.19). Lizzy Fitzgerald ranks 17th in assists per game (13.76).

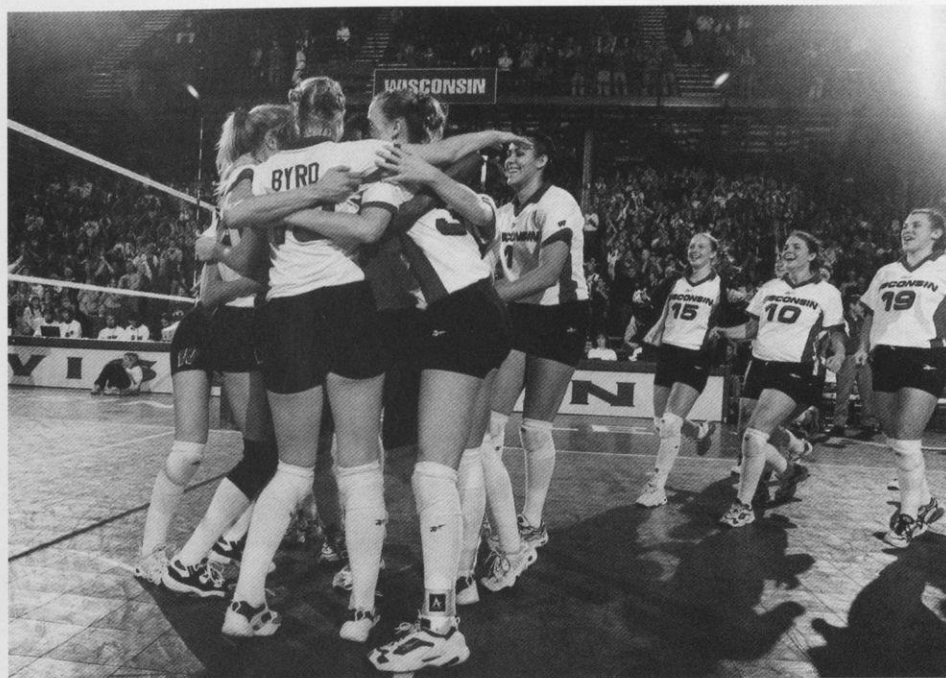

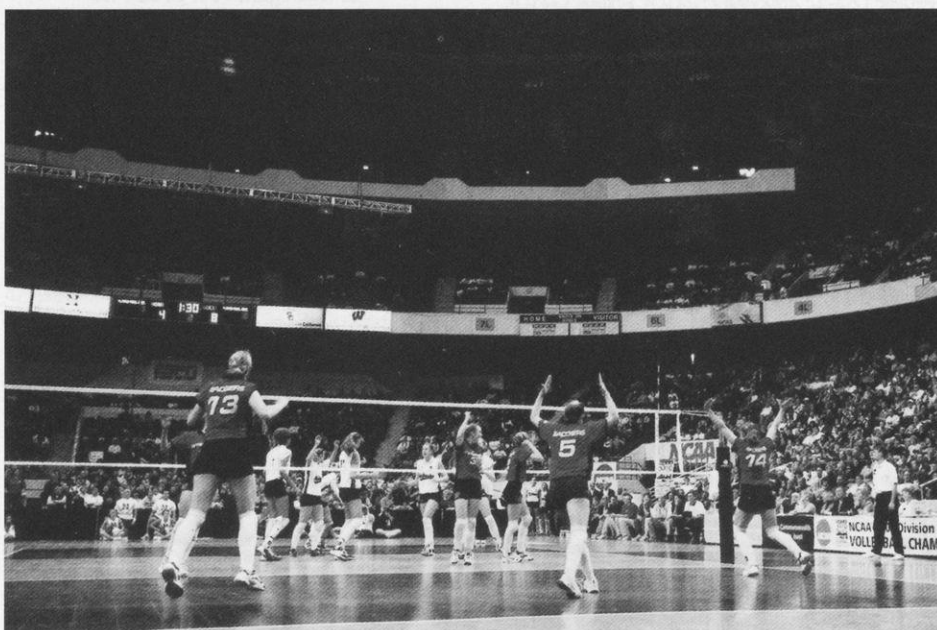

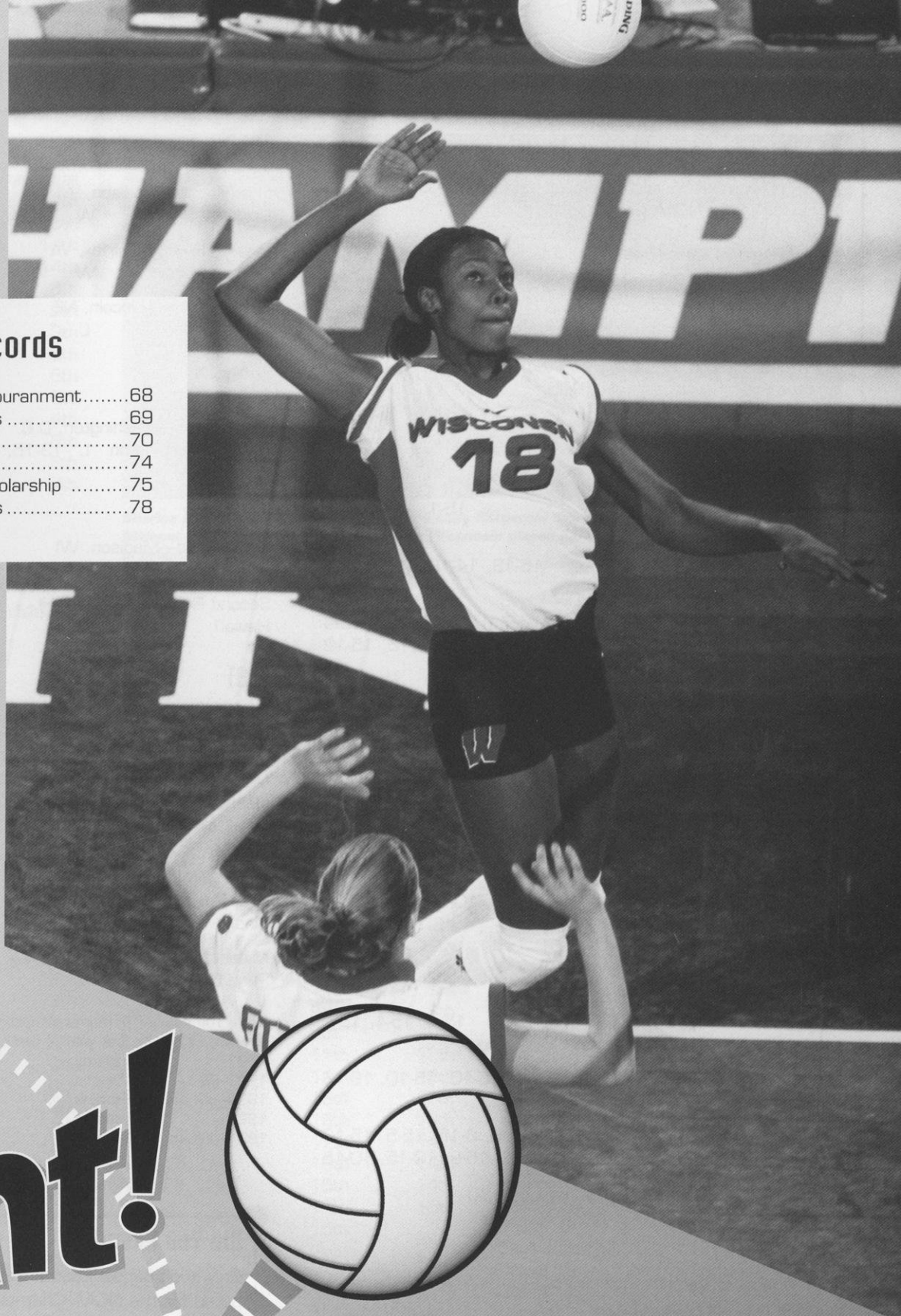

In the last 11 years, Wisconsin has made nine appearances in the NCAA Tournament. The Badgers are 20-9 in the post-season tournament. Wisconsin's best finish came in 2000 when it advanced to the NCAA Championship for the first time in program history. The Badgers have also made two appearances in NCAA Regional finals (elite eight). The UW has appeared in the "Big Dance" seven out of the last eight years including the last five in a row.

In addition to NCAA post-season play, the Badgers also won the National Invitational Volleyball Championship twice during its seven-year history. Wisconsin won the inaugural NIVC in 1989 and the final championship in 1995.

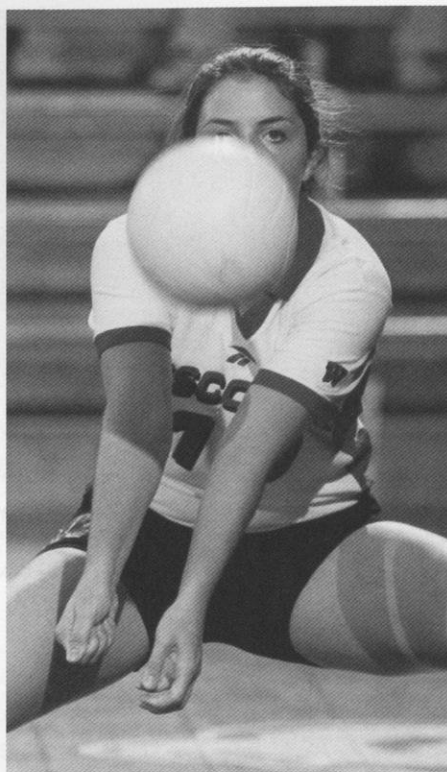

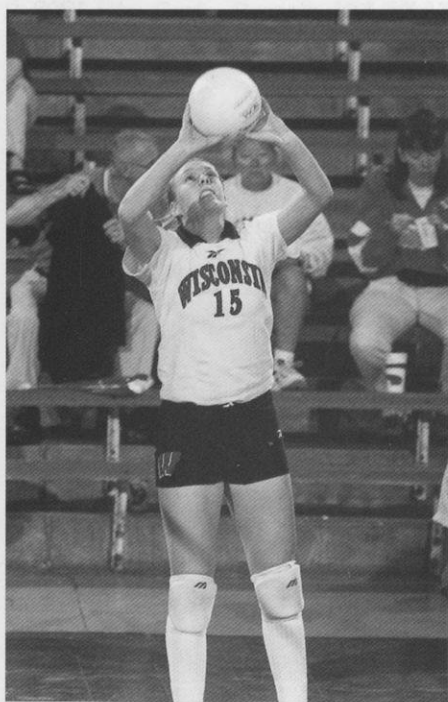

Steve Lowe Memorial Scholarship

When Steve Lowe unexpectedly passed away on Aug. 22, 1991, the University of Wisconsin and the Madison community lost a true friend and a winner on and off the court.

With Lowe at the helm, the Badger volleyball program burst onto the national scene. In 1989, he directed the Badgers to the title in the inaugural National Invitational Volleyball Championship, their first post-season appearance ever.

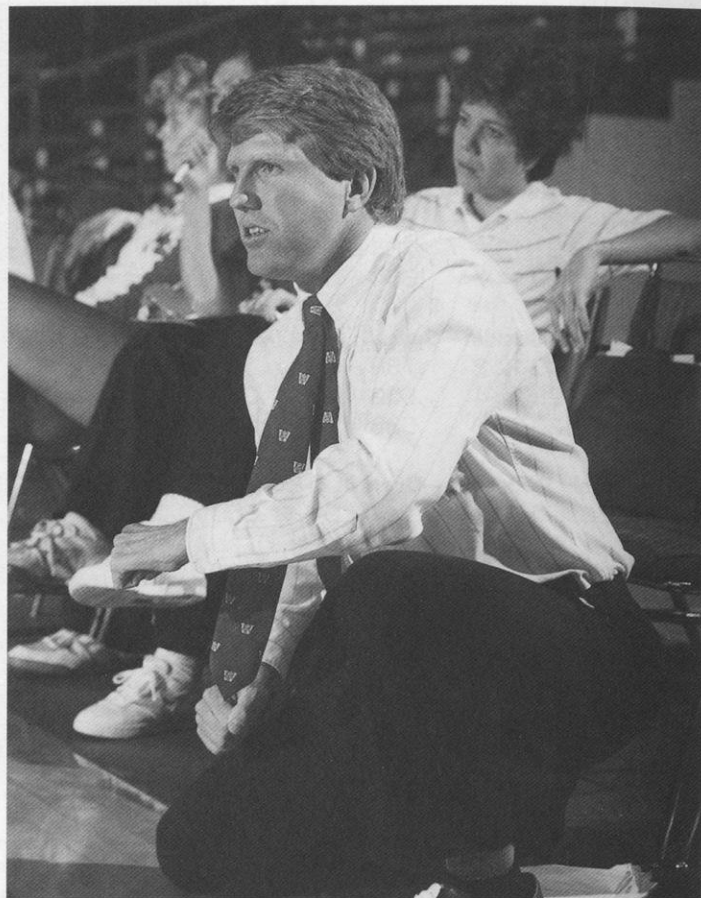
The following year he steered Wisconsin to its first Big Ten Conference title, its first NCAA tournament appearance and first national ranking, finishing 10th in the final 1990 NCAA poll. Lowe also produced Wisconsin's first volleyball all-American with Lisa Boyd earning second-team honors in 1990.

Lowe, who had a 108-64 career record in five years at Wisconsin, earned 1990 Big Ten and AVCA Mideast Coach of the Year honors.

Every year Wisconsin's Big Ten Conference home opener will be designated "Steve Lowe Night" in honor of the former coach. This year's match is Friday, Sept. 21 versus Michigan State.

In addition, a Badger volleyball player who exemplifies Steve's love of the game is named the recipient of the Steve Lowe Memorial Scholarship. This year's honoree is Sara Urbanek.

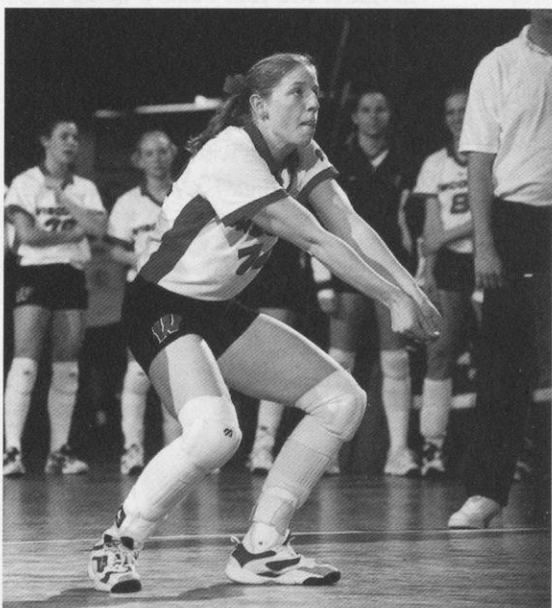

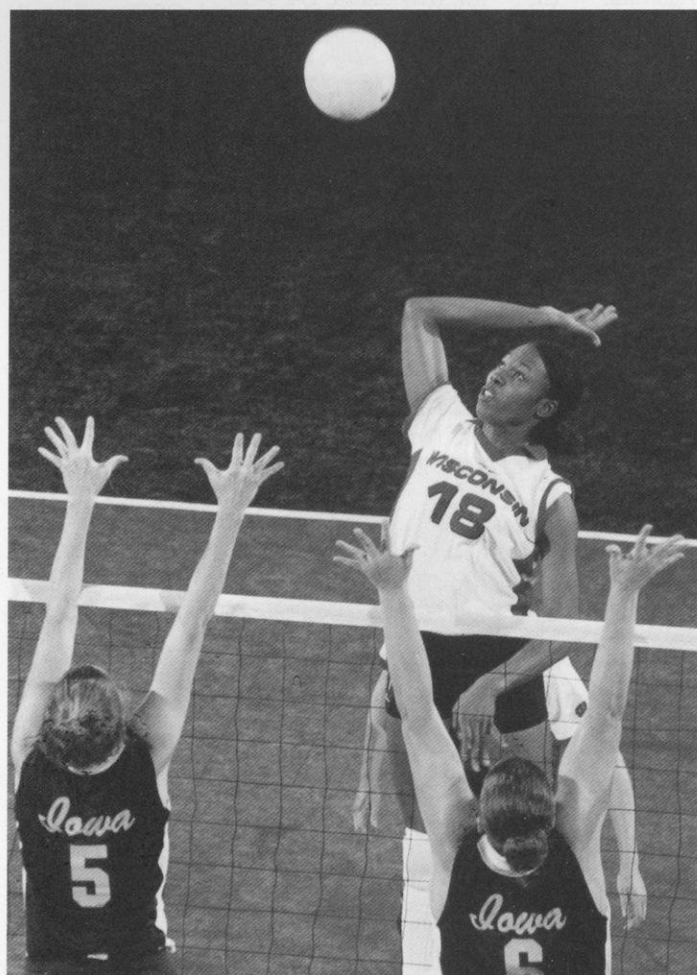

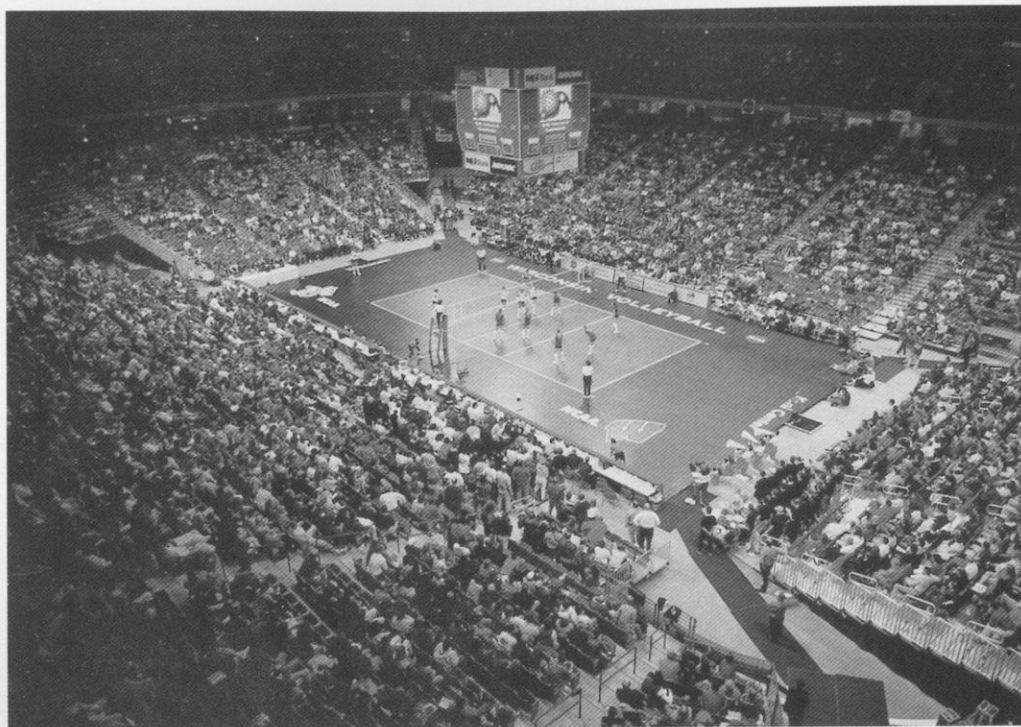

Bottom: Wisconsin first played host to the NCAA Championship in 1993 drawing a then-record crowd of 11,155.

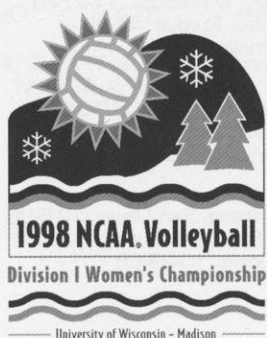
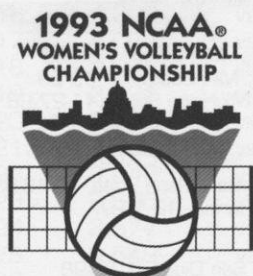
● Wisconsin Sets Attendance Records

The University of Wisconsin has served as the host to the NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Championship twice in the last seven years. Wisconsin is only the third university to play host to the championship more than once.

In 1998, the UW set the NCAA single-match attendance record when 13,194 spectators watched the finals of the championship. Wisconsin also set the NCAA semifinal attendance

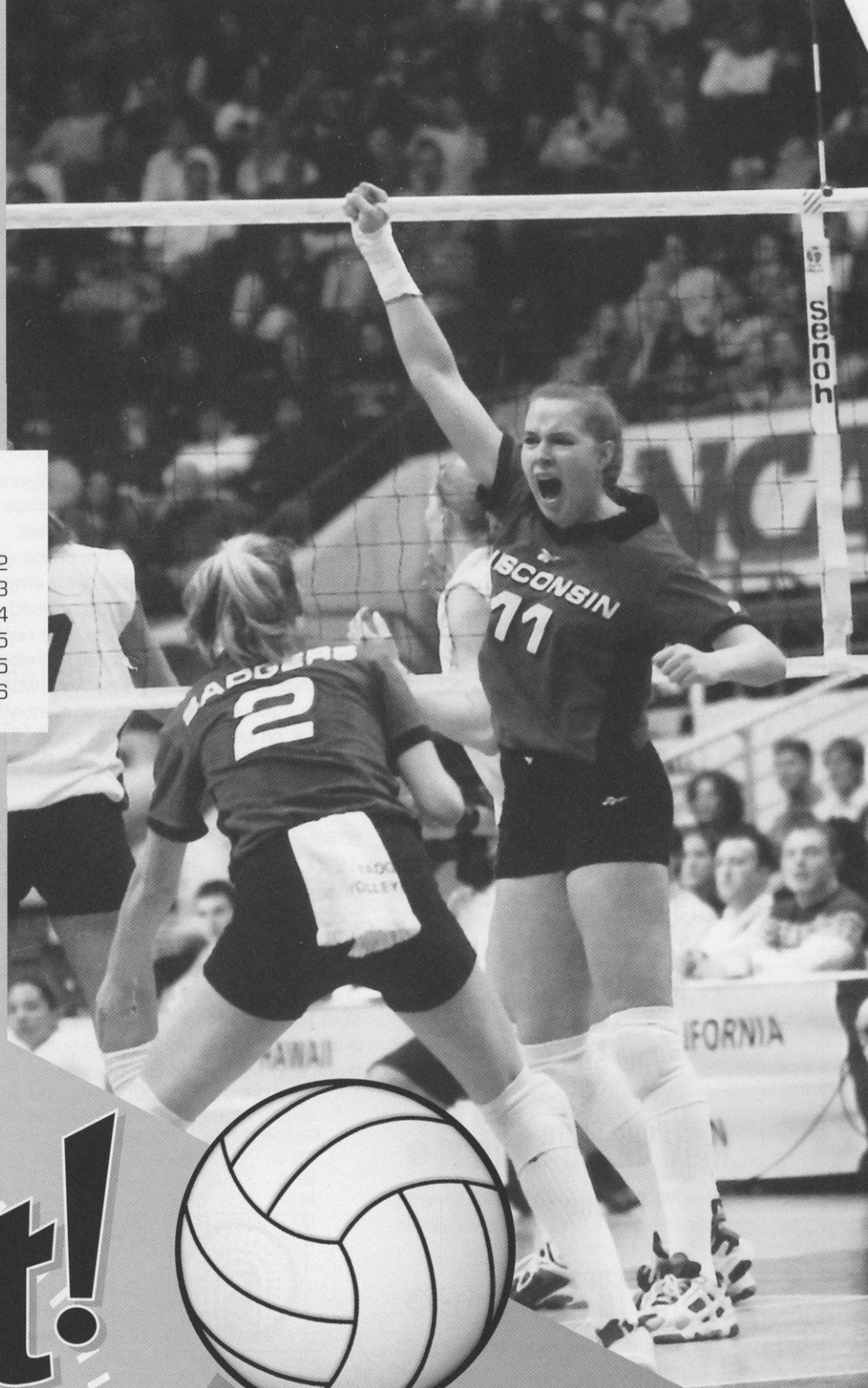
record of 12,327 bringing the two-day total to 25,521, which broke the championship record of 21,086 set in 1997 at the Spokane Arena.

Wisconsin first played host to the championship in 1993, drawing record crowds to the UW Field House. A then-record attendance of 21,085 watched the two-day event including 11,155 who watched Long Beach State defeat Penn State in the championship match. That figure still stands as the No. 5 volleyball attendance figure of all time.

One of the premier athletic leagues in the nation, the Big Ten Conference is proud of its leadership in the area of athletics.

Big Ten athletics programs lead the nation in football, men's basketball and volleyball attendance. In addition, the league receives more television exposure than any conference in the nation. More than 250 Conference athletic events are televised each year on national and regional networks.

Begun in 1895, the Intercollegiate Conference of Faculty Representatives (popularly known as the Big Ten) has changed little from its original philosophy of faculty control of athletics with emphasis on the student-athlete. Comprised of 11 institutions in eight states, the conference has long set the national standard for athletics and academics. As a whole, league institutions graduate student-athletes at an overall rate of 10 percent higher than their peers at other Division I conferences.

Women's athletics programs became affiliated with the Conference officially in 1981, although unofficial conference championships had been held among the member institutions since 1972.

Big Ten women athletes compete in conference championships in basketball, cross country, field hockey, golf, gymnastics, rowing, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball.

The Big Ten Conference volleyball champion is determined by the match record within the conference. Teams play a double round-robin schedule facing each other at home and away, for a total of 20 matches.

The conference champion earns an automatic bid to the NCAA tournament. In 2000, the Big Ten was represented by six universities in the NCAA Volleyball Championship.

Members of the Big Ten Conference have competed in the NCAA Championship match 12 times including Wisconsin in 2000. Penn State won the 1999 NCAA Championship and is a six-time participant. Illinois and Ohio State have each made two championship appearances and Michigan State one.

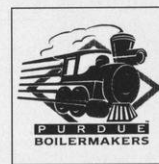
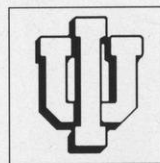
For seven of the last 10 years, the Big Ten Conference has led the nation in volleyball total attendance. In 2000, the league drew a total of 234,559 spectators for the season, which was first in the nation.

Six schools ranked in the top 25 nationally for average attendance. Wisconsin ranked third in the nation and led the Big Ten with an average of 3,139 spectators per match. In 1997, the Badgers set a conference record with 3,497 spectators per match.

Minnesota and Penn State both ranked in the top five nationally with averages of 2,557 (4th) and 2,355 (5th), respectively. Illinois ranked 16th, Purdue was 20th and Michigan State 22nd.

Did You Know?

The Big Ten Conference has led the nation in total volleyball attendance seven out of the last 10 years including in 2000.

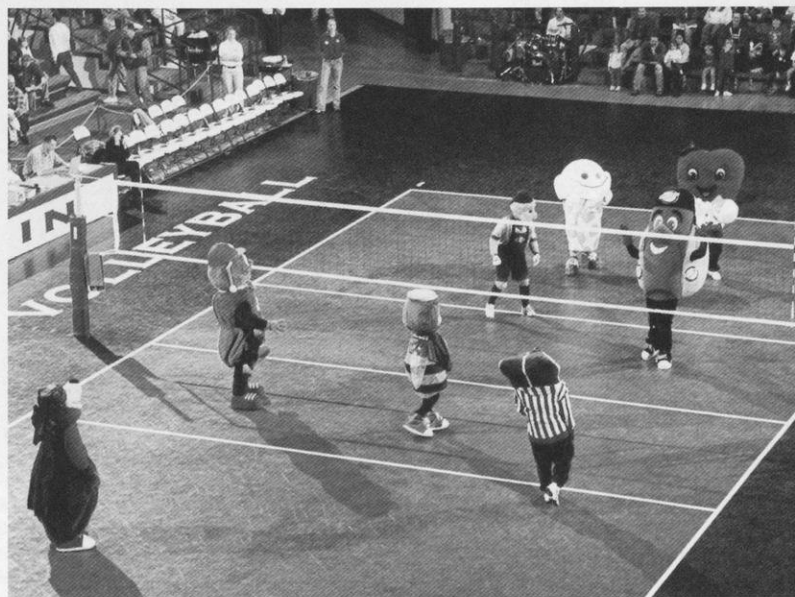

The flagship school of the state UW system, UW–Madison has always sought to return the fruits of teaching and research to Wisconsin residents. The founders of the university developed the "Wisconsin Idea" ensuring "the beneficent influence of the university (be) available to every home in the state." UW–Madison





offers the only public schools of law, medicine and veterinary medicine in the state.

● A Scenic Campus

One of the most picturesque college campuses in the country, UW-Madison covers 933 acres along the beautiful shores of Lake Mendota.

One mile from the Capitol, traveling down historic State Street, Bascom Hall serves as a centerpiece to campus. It sits atop the beautiful tree-lined Bascom Hill, which offers a magnificent view of downtown Madison. The city was designed so the University and state would be linked, signifying the interrelated nature of the academic and political life of Wisconsin.

Madison's lakes, rolling hills, architecture, parks and arboretum enhance UW-Madison's reputation for scenic beauty.

Points of interest on campus include a bronze statue of Abraham Lincoln on Bascom Hill; North Hall, the first building on campus; the Carillon Tower in front of the Social Science building; Library Mall, with its clock tower and fountain; Picnic Point, a 129-acre peninsula of woods, trails and beaches that juts out into Lake Mendota; and Science Hall and the Armory-Gymnasium, both of which are National Historic Landmarks.

A favorite area for UW students to gather is the Memorial Union and its lakeside terrace. Here students can

study or socialize against a backdrop of sailboats, canoes, sailboards, kayaks and swimmers, while enjoying the sunshine and breezes from Madison's largest lake, Mendota.

Camp Randall Stadium is the place to be on a Saturday afternoon, especially during the infamous Fifth Quarter after a football game when the band entertains. The newly opened Kohl Center is home to the UW men's and women's basketball and men's ice hockey teams as well as a regular concert stop.

● The Student Body

More than 41,000 students populate the UW campus, including more than 10,900 graduate and professional students in numerous fields.

Although a UW Board of Regents policy limits undergraduate enrollment from outside the state to 25 percent, the University still maintains one of the nation's most diverse student bodies.

Students hail from every county in the state and every state in the nation, as well as from 102 foreign countries. UW-Madison ranks sixth in the nation for total foreign student enrollment.

A greater effort is also being made to recruit and retain minority students and faculty. In the fall of 2000, African Americans, Hispanics, Native Americans and other minority groups accounted for more than nine percent of the student body.

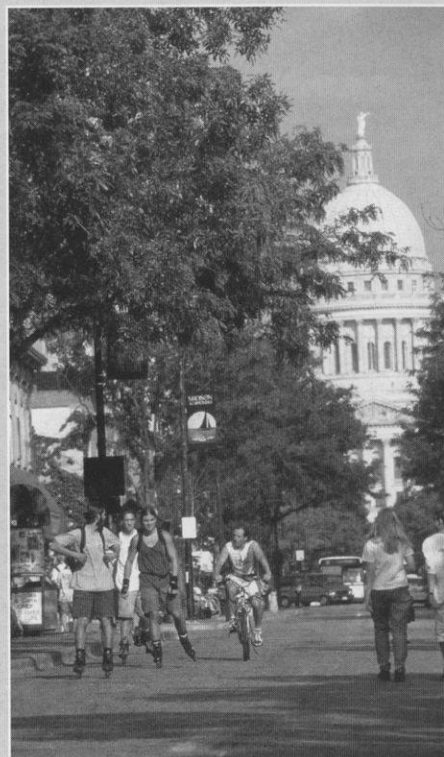

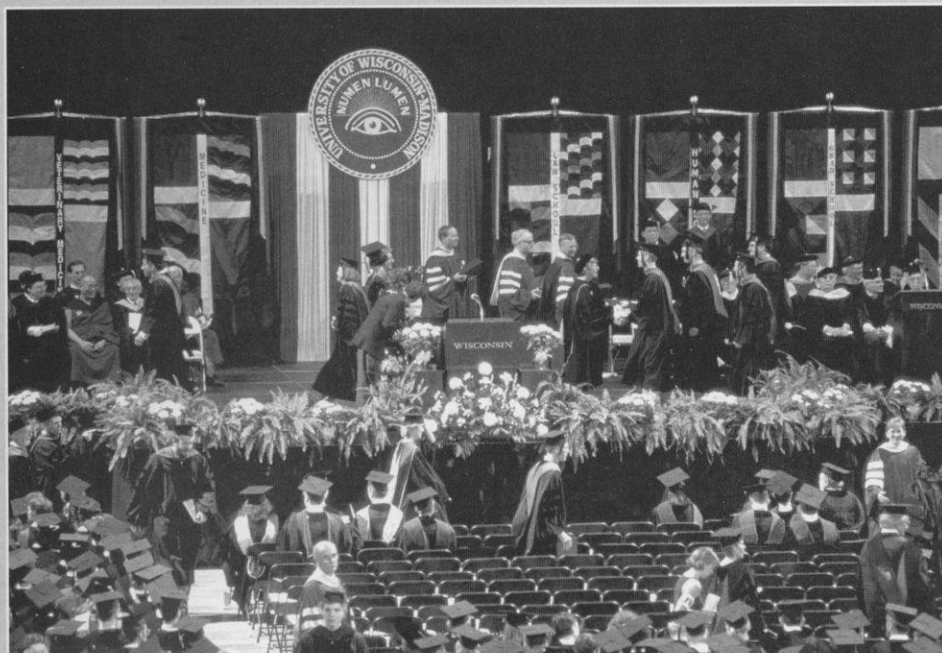
● City of Madison

John Wiley was named chancellor of Wisconsin in January 2001 becoming the university's 27th leader.

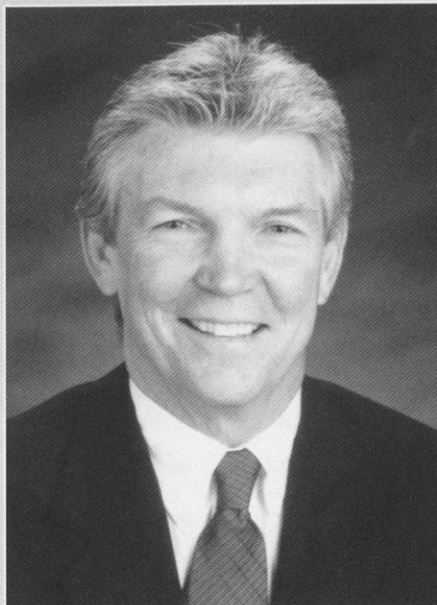
Prior to being named chancellor, Wiley served as the university's provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs. He was also the dean of the Graduate School and the university's senior research officer.

Wiley joined the Wisconsin faculty in the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering in 1975. He was the co-founder of several highly successful research centers.



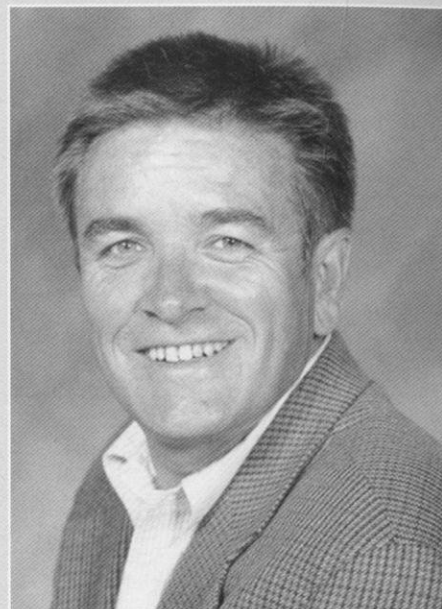
● Pat Richter

David McDonald, the former chair of the UW Athletic Board, is in his first year as the Special Assistant to the Chancellor for Athletics.

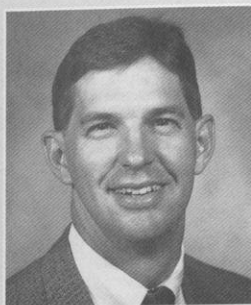
McDonald, a professor in the History department, was a member of the board since 1994 and chaired the committee for one year.

A native of Saskatchewan, Canada, McDonald earned his bachelor's and master's degrees at the University of Toronto. He received his Ph.D. from Columbia University.



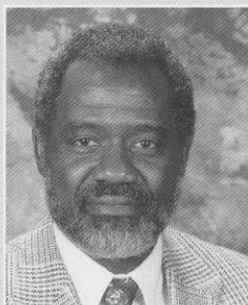

Wisconsin Athletics—A Winning Program

The University of Wisconsin–Madison offers its student-athletes one of the premier intercollegiate athletic programs in the country.

As a member of the prestigious Big Ten Conference, Wisconsin offers its student-athletes the best in education, athletic opportunities, coaching and on-field competition at the NCAA Division I level.

Celebrating over 100 years of competition in some men's sports, Wisconsin's men's teams compete in basketball, cross country, football, golf, ice hockey, rowing, swimming and diving, soccer, tennis, track and field, and wrestling.

Established July 1, 1974, the 12-sport women's athletic program offers basketball, cross country, golf, ice hockey, lightweight rowing, openweight rowing, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, track and field, and volleyball.



The Wisconsin men's and women's cross country teams both won the Big Ten Conference Championship on their home course in 2000. The women won a record-tying sixth consecutive title while the men's team won its second consecutive championship.

● One of the Nation's Best

In the last six years, Wisconsin has ranked among the top 35 NCAA Division I programs in the nation. In 2000–01, the UW ranked 19th in the Sears/National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics Directors Cup competition, which recognizes the best college sports programs in the country.

Seventeen of Wisconsin's 23 sports qualified as teams or individuals for their respective national championships in 2000–01. The volleyball team finished second at the NCAA Championship while the men's cross country team was fifth. The wrestling team finished 10th as Donny Pritzlaff won his second consecutive individual title at 165 pounds.

Qualifying for post-season competition as teams or individuals were men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, football, women's golf, men's hockey, men's and women's rowing, women's soccer, softball, men's and women's swimming, men's and women's track and field, volleyball and wrestling.



The Wisconsin men's rowing team won the Ten Eyck Trophy, which signifies overall program excellence at the Intercollegiate Rowing Championship, for the second consecutive year.

The University of Wisconsin regained its title as the No. 1 overall athletic program in the Big Ten Conference in 2000-01. The Badgers lead the league's all-sports standings last season after finishing third in 1999-2000. Wisconsin has finished first three times and second five times since 1990-91.



The Badger men's track and field team won its second consecutive Big Ten Triple Crown in 2000-01, sweeping the conference titles in cross country, indoor track and outdoor track. Wisconsin is shown celebrating its Big Ten Outdoor Track and Field title.



The Wisconsin volleyball team won the 2000 Big Ten Championship and finished second in the NCAA Tournament.

The Badgers crowned five Big Ten team champions in men's and women's cross country, men's indoor and outdoor track, and volleyball. The women harriers won a record-tying sixth consecutive title while the men's harriers won their second consecutive title. The Badger men's track and cross country teams won the Big Ten "Triple Crown", conference titles in all three running sports, for the second consecutive year and for the fifth time in the last seven years.

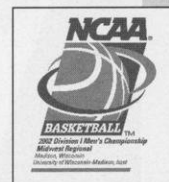
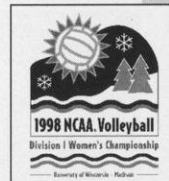
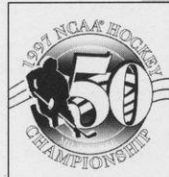
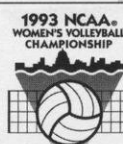
In the last eight years, the University of Wisconsin has hosted five NCAA Championships.

The Badgers have played host to the NCAA Men's Ice Hockey Championship in 1993 and 1997. The 1993 event sold out in three months, the fastest sell-out in NCAA hockey history.

Wisconsin played host to the NCAA Women's Volleyball Championship in 1993 and 1998. The Badgers shattered the attendance records for the championship match and two-day event both years.

The UW was also the site of the 1998 NCAA Division I Women's Golf Championship. The event was the first national championship held at University Ridge Golf Course and the first women's championship shown live on national television showcasing University Ridge.

The NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament will come to Wisconsin in 2002 when the Badgers play host to a regional in the Kohl Center.



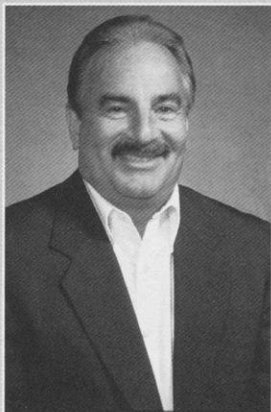
Academic & Student Services

The mission of the Academic Affairs Office is to provide student-athletes with the maximum opportunity for academic and athletic excellence. University of Wisconsin athletes have a history of academic success and much of the credit for that impressive record is due to the advising system available to the student-athletes.

Director Alan Zussman supervises a staff of five advisors and three learning specialists which conduct the program offered to the nearly 750 student-athletes. The advising staff of Mary Weaver-Klees, Thomas Browne, Chris Butler, and Jerry Darda along with learning specialists Doug Tiedt, Mary Ellen Rock and Nancy Gatyas, have a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all university departments. The staff renders quality academic and personal support to student-athletes and assists coaches in providing the best possible collegiate experience.

For those student-athletes who request assistance, advising sessions are offered on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the athlete. Wisconsin athletes are degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The advising staff takes a personal approach to each athlete in determining his or her individual needs, personal or academic.

Student-athletes at Wisconsin receive recognition for outstanding academics in a number of ways. The Big Ten Conference honors scholar-athletes with Academic all-Big Ten honors while the UW Athletic Board recognizes Athletic Board Scholars for the highest grade point average in each sport. In addition, student-athletes may be nominated for Academic All-America honors through the sports information office.

● Fetzer Student-Athlete Center

Opened in the spring of 1997, the Fetzer Student Athlete Academic Center is the newest aid to Wisconsin student-athletes in achieving their academic goals.

The 15,000 square-foot, state-of-the-art facility serves the needs of all men and women student-athletes. The Center features an open area with carrels that can accommodate up to 30 students. There are 11 study rooms of

different shapes and sizes including a 55-seat auditorium. A computer room houses 40 PC's while the entire Center is wired with voice/data jacks and power ports.

Student-athletes can drop in before practice or between classes to study or meet with the advisors and grant-in-aid staff whose offices are also located in the center.



Endowed Athletic Scholarships

As more and more colleges and universities turn to innovative and effective ways of meeting the mounting financial challenges of supporting their intercollegiate athletic programs, it becomes increasingly evident that one of the most successful strategies is the establishment of endowed athletic scholarships.

At the University of Wisconsin-Madison, endowment funds to support athletic scholarships are normally created through gifts to the UW Foundation. A portion of the income from the endowed fund is used each year for scholarship support, and the remainder is reinvested in the principal.

Sports Medicine

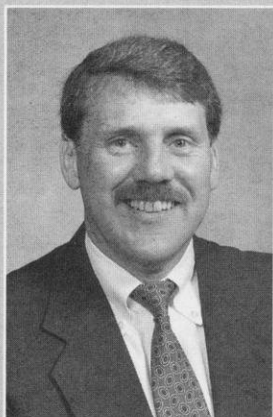
The goal of the sports medicine staff is to provide all University of Wisconsin student-athletes with high quality health care. Wisconsin's Sports Medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

The sports medicine staff consists of team physicians, dentists, athletic trainers, and other medical and allied health professionals. The day-to-day care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Wisconsin athletes is supervised by a staff of 11 full-time and two graduate assistant N.A.T.A.-certified and State of Wisconsin licensed athletic trainers.

Under the direction of head athletic trainer Dennis Helwig, the Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Staff members Beth Cranley, Chuck Hart, Andy Hrodey, Jan Helwig, Mike Moll, Henry Perez-Guerra, Heidi Stettler, Laura Walluk, and Ian Woods utilize functional measures, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve flexibility. Full-time nutritionist Jeremy Isensee provides dietary analysis and supervises training table meals to enhance the performance of the student-athletes.

The Sports Medicine facility in the McClain Center features an extensive collection of therapeutic and rehabilitation equipment including a 50-foot, two-lane-rehabilitation pool, and an on-site x-ray facility. Considered one of the nation's finest, the McClain Sports Medicine Center offers an environment conducive to expedient care, and a healthy return to competition.

Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affiliated with the world-renowned UW Hospitals and Clinics. Medical director

Dr. Ben Graf is responsible for all services provided to our student-athletes. Orthopedic care is directed by team physician Dr. John Orwin while general medical care is directed by the head of primary care, Dr. Greg Landry.

In addition to the headquarters in the McClain Athletic Facility, auxiliary athletic training rooms are located in the Stadium, Natatorium, UW Field House, and the Kohl Center. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus.

Strength & Conditioning

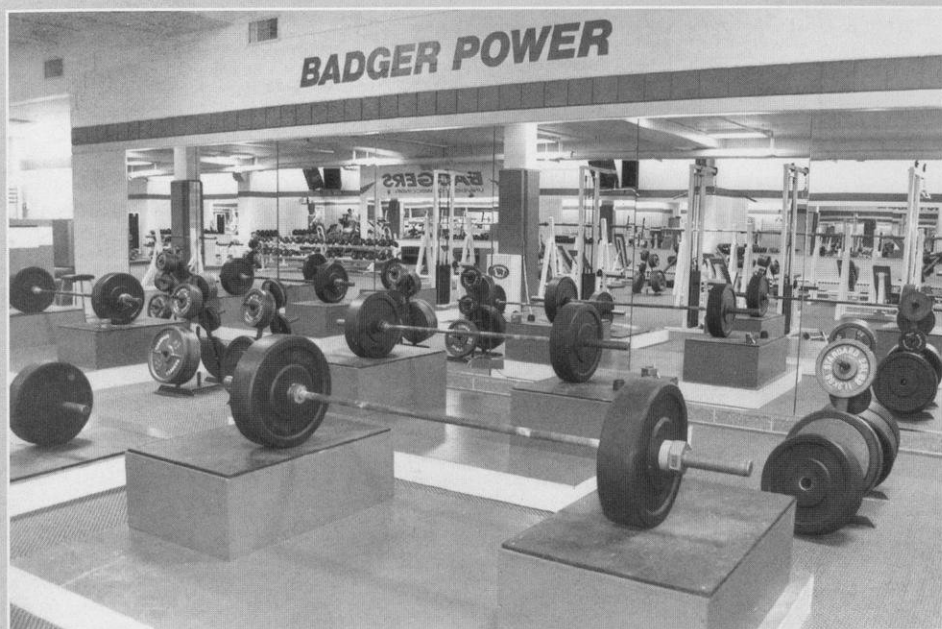
The Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a key component of all of the Badger teams' success on the playing field. The program's goal is to increase the overall performance of each student-athlete, prevent injuries and help athletes reach their potential.

Head strength and conditioning coach John Dettman along with assistant coaches Brian Bott, Ryan Feek, Paul Goodman, Scott Hettenbach and Andrea Tyndall work with the UW coaches to develop training programs to enhance each athletes' performance.

Badger athletes work on their strength programs in weight room located in the McClain Center, Camp Randall Stadium and Kohl Center.

The McClain Center weight room is the largest of the facilities and features over 45,000 pounds of free weights and over 50 weight machines. The room has seven squat racks, eight bench press stations, eight flat-to-incline benches, six Olympic lift platforms and numerous other free weight stations.

The Badger Den is comprised of purely free weight equipment. There are five power stations with each station consisting of a platform for Olympic style lifting as well a squat rack, bench press, incline bench press, pull up station and a station to do dips. There is also three lat



The weight room in the McClain Center features over 45,000 pounds of free weights and over 50 weight machines.

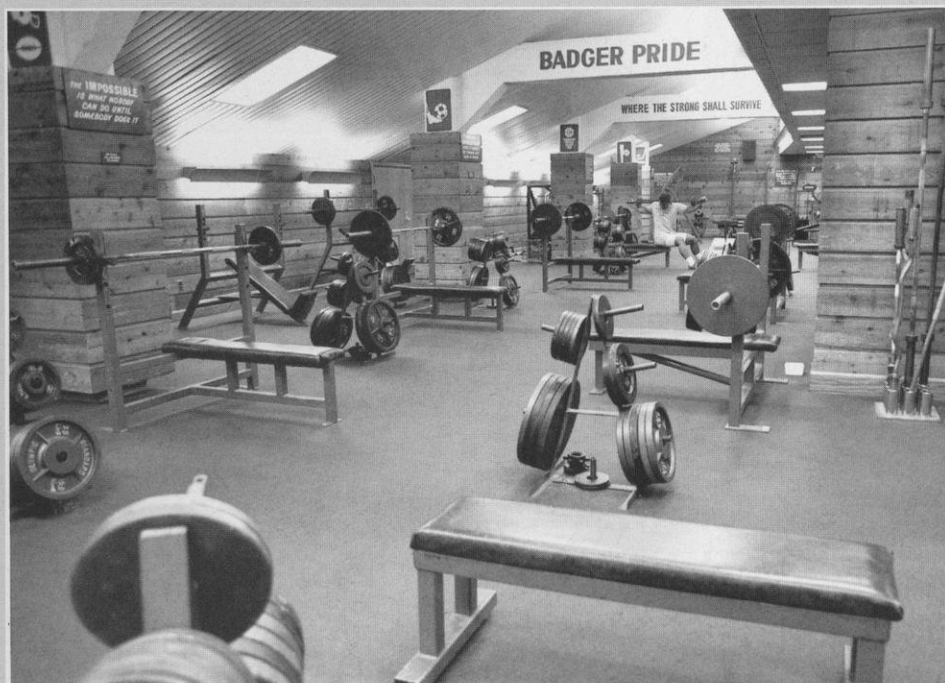
pull machines as well as seated row machines. The Stadium weight room also has a complete set of dumbbells from five pounds up to 85 pounds. There is also a set of plyometric boxes for plyometrics as well as for alternative leg exercises.

Facilities



The McClain Athletic Facility features a 90-yard indoor practice field with newly resurfaced artificial turf. The lower level houses the Fetzer Student Academic Center, the headquarters of the Badgers' Sports Medicine staff, a fully-equipped weight room and locker rooms for football, track, softball, and soccer.



The Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center or Shell, which seats 2,500 fans, features a 200-meter Martin rubber track with throwing and jumping areas in the infield.



The Kohl Center is the home of the Badger basketball and hockey teams. One of the finest on-campus athletic facilities in the nation, the \$76 million facility includes a separate practice gym, locker rooms and lounge areas, and coaches' offices.

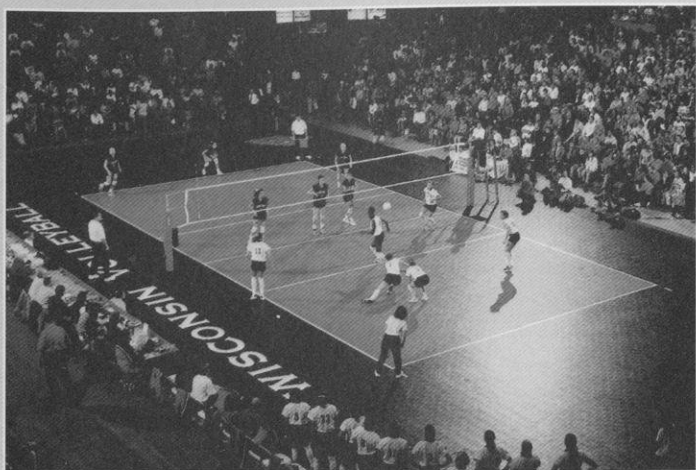

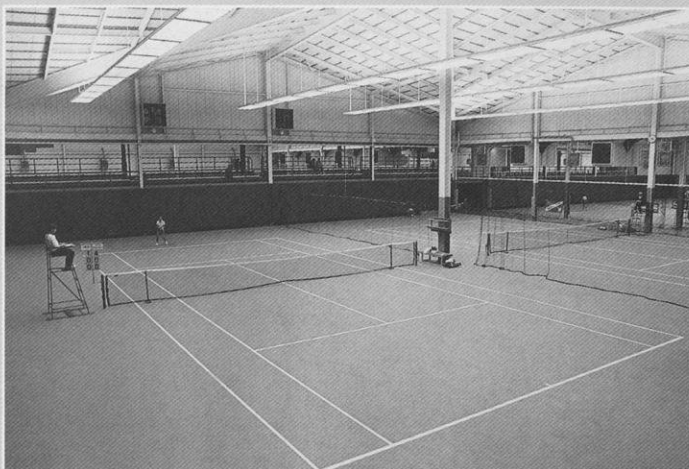


The Goodman Brothers Softball Complex has an NCAA-regulation, natural grass field with a centerfield distance of 220 feet, and left and right field foul line distances of 200 feet. The facility includes dugouts, locker areas, players' lounge, grandstand seating for 1,600 and media facilities.





The Wisconsin Field House, which seats 10,600, is the practice and competitive facility for the Badger volleyball team as well as the competitive facility for the wrestling squad.



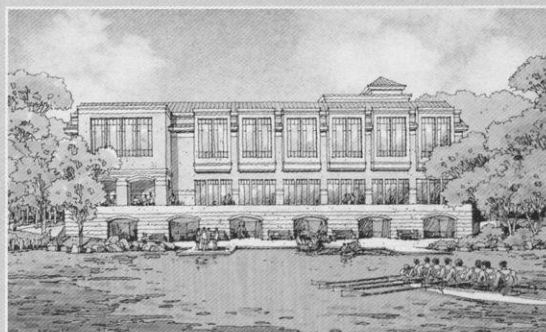
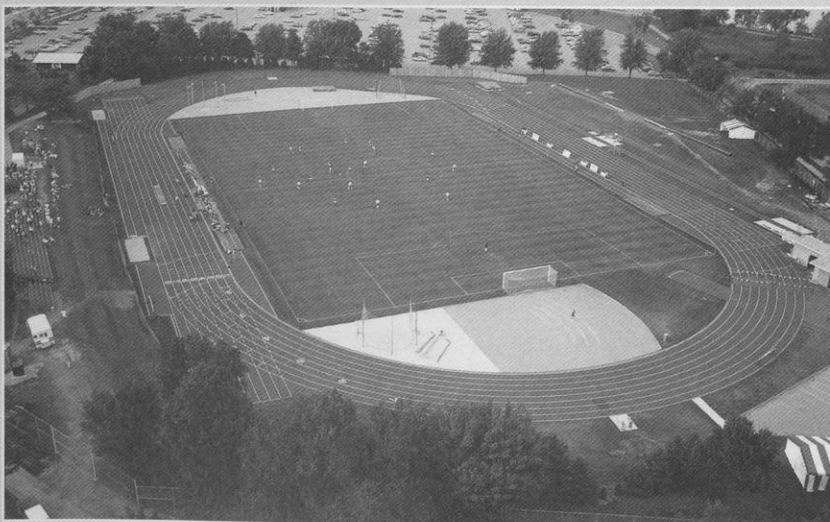
Nielsen Tennis Stadium is the year-round home of the Badger tennis teams. The stadium features 18 tennis courts (12 indoor and six outdoor), five squash courts, one squash doubles court, and seats 1,500 spectators.



The swimming and diving teams have two pools for practice and competition—the Natatorium and Southeast Recreational Facility. The "Nat" contains an eight-lane, 25-yard pool equipped with an automatic Colorado Timing System and digital readout score board. The 50' x 40' diving well is fitted with three one-meter and two three-meter Dura (Maxi) Flex boards. The SERF (pictured above) features an indoor long course pool with movable bulkheads that more than double the program's training space.



University Ridge, one of the finest golf courses in the Midwest, features a par-72, 18-hole course, 15,000-square foot practice green and a 5,000-square foot chipping green.

Wisconsin Traditions

● Badger Nickname

The sports program's nickname "Badgers," was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin. The territory was dubbed the "Badger State," not because of animals in the region, but rather by an association with lead miners in the 1820's. Prospectors came to the state looking for minerals. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

● Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

The original live badger mascot was too vicious to control. On more than one occasion, the badger escaped handlers before a sideline hero recaptured the animal. It was decided in the interest of fan and player safety that Wisconsin's mascot would be retired to the Madison zoo.

In 1949, a student in the university's art department, Connie Conrad, was commissioned to mold a paper-mache badger head. Gymnast and cheerleader, Bill Sagal of Plymouth, Wis., was directed

by homecoming chair Bill Sachse, to wear the outfit at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name. The rally committee opted for its own name: Buckingham U. Badger. The name is said by some to have originated in a line from the school song, "On, Wisconsin" that exhorts the UW gridiron heroes to "buck right through that line."

● Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. Copyrighted by Sandlee Publishing Corporation in 1970, the song has become legendary at the University because of its polka-like rhythm. Band director Michael Leckrone said the song's popularity got started at a 1975 hockey game. "The crowd wanted to hear a polka," he said. "I didn't have any polkas. Just by accident, we had this beer commercial in the tunes we play. I told the band if we substituted the word 'Wisconsin' for 'Budweiser' it would work."

Leckrone said the song became a football tradition after a 1978 come-from-behind victory over Oregon. "Wisconsin was behind by three touchdowns, and the crowd was really dead. I played the song to get everyone pepped up. About 20 seconds after that, Wisconsin scored a touchdown. I played it again, and Wisconsin scored another touchdown. From then on, the band could never play enough 'Bud.'"

● Fifth Quarter

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as they play traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song. Originally, the post-game concert was designed to give fans something to listen to on their way out of the stadium, but it developed into a post-game party as the band built in audience participation.



Badger fans are known throughout the nation for their support of Wisconsin teams both at home and on the road.

● On Wisconsin

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy of Chicago, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. The song was an instant hit at the Wisconsin campus and soon spread throughout the world, being very popular with military bands. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

● Varsity

The traditional arm waving that comes at the end of the song "Varsity" was the 1934 brainchild of then-UW band leader Ray Dvorak. He had originally gotten the idea from University of Pennsylvania students who waved their caps after a losing game. Dvorak later instructed UW students to wave as a salute to UW President Glenn Frank.

"Var-sity! Var-sity! U-rah-rah! Wisconsin! Praise to thee we sing Praise to thee our alma mater U-rah-rah, Wisconsin!"

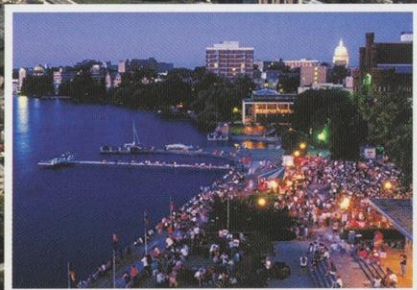
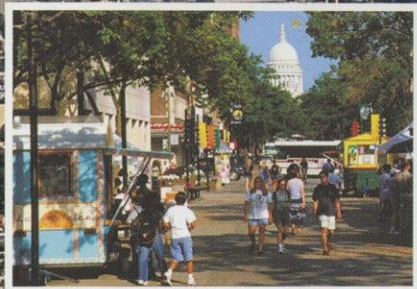
