Dear Friend-

The book, "With lalice Towards Some", which you sent arrived last teck, to be exact on Nov. 2. From the greeting which you penned on the cover, it seems that you sent the book in July. The delay was caused by the censorship of all foreign mail which has been in vogue since the start of the war. We are now receiving mail, which was sent from the States in August. But for almost eight weeks none of us heard from anyone back home. Those weeks yere certainly ones of exile.

One more word about the book. It was delightfully interesting-I finished it in two sittings. I intend to read it again after it has finished "making the rounds." Those of us who have read it enjoyed it much, especially, as all of us are more or less acquainted with British and Chicago and has been an manners, being now inhabitants of British India. Then again, as we often travel in peaceful timesfrom America to England on British vessels, we usually get our fill of English formality. Coming over I spent two days in London, it was enough.

If any more of your patrons have other interesting books which they would like to get rid of, we could use them over here. There are a: few other faithful friends who keep us supplied with newspapers

and magazines.

I have just returned from Shillong, Assam, a hill town, where I spent a month away from the heat, dirt and stink of the plains, getting an answer to my prayer. Shillong provides a tingling wind alright,. In fact I almost froze at night. The atmosphere was zestful and keen, and I met a family of tourists from America. It was a delightful month, but now it is all over until another year.

Did you have a chance to get away for a vacation? Of course, you

will say what place is better than etc. I agree too, if the pictures you sent, and the "Bay Leaves" are any indication of the beauty of Williams Bay.

To be on the safe side, let me now wish you, your husband and "arren. and all the readers of this letter a very Herry Christmas and a very Happy New Year." As ever,
