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

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# HISTORICAL SKETCH OF THE CITY OF JANESVILLE, WIS.

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## ITS PROGRESS AND PROSPECTS.

(For a number of facts relative to the early history of Janesville, we are indebted to the valuable history of Rock County, published in 1856 by the Rock County Agricultural Society and Mechanics' Institute, edited by Hon. Orrin Guernsey. Also to Hon. A. T. Gray, formerly Secretary of State of the State of Wisconsin, and J. J. R. Pease, Esq.)

The famous Black Hawk war, sometimes irreverently called the "Sauk fuss," beside its other happy consequences, contributed to hasten the settlement of the upper Valley of Rock River. The frontiersmen who chased that Chief and his braves across the Wisconsin, and finally routed them on the eastern bank of the Mississippi, on returning to their homes, in addition to their stories of the hardships and perils they had encountered, told of the loveliness of the region through which they had passed, of its beautiful streams, prairies, and openings, and but a year or two elapsed before immigration began to direct its course hither. The early settlers of Janesville could distinguish in the broad ravine, now familiarly known by his name, and which lies on the southeast of the present city, the vestiges of a camp which the Indian Chief had occupied in the course of his last campaign. Brands that had been used in his camp fires were still to be seen, and poles that had formed the frame work of his lodges, were yet standing, and the "trail" of the pursuing army of General Atkinson, was then plainly marked upon the sod of the prairie for miles to the north and south.

The pioneers of immigration, to this and similar portions of Wisconsin, had before them brighter prospects, and experienced far less of toil and privation, than those who led the way in the settlement of Western New York, Ohio and Indiana. Of personal peril from the savage, or from influences of climate promotive of disease, they had nothing to brave or to suffer. A fair and fertile land was spread before them, ready for the hand of the husbandman; seeming, indeed, to have, at some day not very remote, been the home of civilization, and to have been abandoned, after a long course of careful cultivation, to become the hunting ground of the red man. It could not well be called a wilderness. There were no dense forests to be hewn down to make way for the farm of the settler. The oak openings, while they added beauty

to the landscape, were no hindrance to its rapid occupation for the uses and purposes of agriculture. The adventurers from the hills and villages of the East were delighted to find a climate free from every miasmatic taint, and singularly salubrious. There was in brief no obstacle to a speedy settlement of the country, and when once the tide of emigration westward, in quest of new homes and better fortunes, was turned this way, it soon rolled on with rapidly increasing volume. The spot upon which the city of Janesville now stands became the central point of the influx of population to the Southern portion of the valley of Rock River in Wisconsin.

In the month of October, 1835, John Inman, George Follmer, Joshua Holmes, William Holmes, Jr., and Milo Jones, now residing at Fort Atkinson, Wisconsin, came here, and the four first-named set up a cabin on the south bank of the river, opposite the "Big Rock." This rock was an old land-mark of the Indians, crowned with a growth of beautiful cedars, and although since considerably cut down, is still a prominent object near the northern end of the Monterey bridge. The river was ordinarily fordable at this point, and the place of passage was known as the "Big Rock ford."

The first settler of the county of Rock, who brought with him his family and household goods, was Samuel St. John, of Vermont, who, with his wife and three children arrived here in the month of November, 1835. Before the coming of the parties above mentioned and the St. Johns, Thomas A. Holmes and a comrade had been here on an exploring tour, in the month of June, 1835. His residence was then in Milwaukee, the trading post of Solomon Juneau. He is now living at Shakopee, in Minnesota.

Doctor James Heath and wife, who in 1848 emigrated to California, and soon after died there, joined the little band of squatter sovereigns in January, 1836, and the cabin roughly put together in the autumn of 1835, gave shelter to them all until the following spring. A log hut, sixteen by eighteen feet, formed somewhat close and narrow quarters for eleven people, with two married couples in their number; especially so, as it received an accession to its population, soon after New Year's day, by the birth of a son to the St. Johns—the first white child, it is believed, born in the upper valley of the Rock—certainly the first in the county of Rock. He was named Seth B. St. John, and is now a resident of Columbia county, Wis. Mrs. St. John, his mother, did not long survive his birth, she died in the month of June following. Her grave is marked by a monument upon a knoll in sight of the road to Beloit, near the southern line of the city, and by her side is buried her husband Samuel St. John, who died here some years after while visiting his brother Levi St. John.

In the month of August next following, George Holmes, one of the sons of Judge Holmes, also died.

The second child born within the line of the city, was Mary Catharine Holmes, daughter of John and Hannah Holmes. This was on the 31st of August, 1836.

The third was a son of Henry Janes, born in the fall of the same year, now in California.

On the 9th of March, 1836, Judge William Holmes removed to this place from Michigan City. He brought with him all of his family, except those of his sons who had gone before him to spy out the land. His family consisted of his wife, Rachel, five sons, Thomas, George, John, William and Joshua, and two daughters, Catharine, (now Mrs. Volney Atwood,) and Lucinda, (now Mrs. Wells, of Kalamazoo, Mich.) Of the sons, William, Joshua, and Thomas were already in Wisconsin, the two first named residing here. Mrs. Holmes, the two daughters, John and his family, and George accompanied the Judge and Joshua Clark. Judge Holmes and his wife died here a few years since at the house of their son-in-law, Volney Atwood. The Judge made his way gradually from the Western part of Pennsylvania, where he was born and grew up to manhood, towards this region which so recently was considered to form a portion of the Far West. First he removed to Newark in Ohio; thence to the neighborhood of Laporte in Indiana; thence to Michigan City, whence he came, as has been said, to the place of his present abode. He had the true spirit of a pioneer, and the intelligence, integrity, and good temper which rendered him a valuable co-operator with those who were to lay the foundations of a new community.

Soon after his arrival here the Judge prepared to build himself a home, selecting for its situation a pleasant spot near the edge of the bluff, over looking the river, and about thirty-five rods south of the present park in the 4th Ward, it was a frame, and the lumber of which it was built was cut with a whip-saw, by Robert and Daniel Stone, now residents of the town of Fulton, who came here in the spring of 1836, shortly after the arrival of Judge H. Before the completion of his new mansion, he lived about six months in a cabin situated a few rods south of the river, on the high ground in the rear of what is now Miltimore's quarry.

With the exception of the Holmes family there were then no settlers within what are now the city limits, nor indeed in the county, on the west side of the river. In June 1836 Judge Holmes and Sons purchased a large tract of land, now included within the city and adjoining it on the west. The village of Rockport, as it now appears incorporated in the city map, was laid out in the autumn of 1835, by Thomas Holmes.

For the space of nearly ten years after the first settlement improvement was confined to the east side of the river and Main street of the old village. In addition to those of whom we have given some account as the earliest settlers here, a number of other emigrants arrived in the course of the year '36. Henry F. Janes, in honor of whom the city has its name, came with his family, and his brother Edward; John P. Dickson, with his wife; W. H. H. Bailey and wife, Levi St. John, who died 4th of March, 1861, and family, and others, enough in all to make a pleasant society.

Henry Janes, who arrived in the month of June, selected for his claim the land upon which the county seat was subsequently located.

He immediately prepared to establish himself as a permanent settler, and built a cabin upon the spot where "Lappin's Block" now stands. Janes' cabin became the tavern of the settlement, and with its subsequent additions of the same character with the main building, formed a welcome, if not very commodious resting place for travelers. Mr. Janes also established a ferry here, near the site of the present Milwaukee street bridge, and Janes' Ferry became one of the institutions on the route westward to the mines and the Mississippi. Mr. Janes was succeeded as landlord and ferry-keeper by Chas. Stevens, and subsequently Mr. J. P. Dickson took his place, and remained in it until the erection of the Janesville Stage House, by Mr. Stevens, in the autumn of 1838. This "House" stood on the site of the present "Myers House," and Stevens was a great favorite of the public and known far and wide. He had the reputation of keeping the best public house west of Lake Michigan. Before the establishment of Janes' Ferry, the passage for teams across the river here was at the ford by the "Big Rock." A ferry was soon established at the latter point, however, by Judge Holmes, and many travelers sought his place, in preference to the more crowded quarters they had to put up with at the upper or Janes's Ferry.

In the neighborhood of the young settlement, now beginning to gather strength and numbers, the Popes, Anson W., and Virgil, Daniel Smiley, Marcus Fenton, Jason Walker, Aaron Walker, Alfred Walker, David Hume, Geo. W. Ogden, and S. D. Butz, located claims, and addressed themselves to the work of improving their new homes with befitting energy.

In the year 1837 came a considerable number of settlers, making their homes here and in the neighborhood, who afterwards had much to do with the town and its affairs. Among these were Hon. Edward V. Whiton, for many years the Chief Justice of our State, and in Territorial days, a leading lawyer and politician; he died here April 12, 1859. Volney Atwood, Charles Stevens and family, Dr. Guy Stoughton and family, Seymour Stoughton, Theodore Kendall and wife, Harvey Story, Wm. and Joseph Spaulding, Geo. H. Williston, E. J. Hazard, Geo. R. Ramsey, and D. A. Richardson and family. Most of these settled in Janesville.

The year of '36 is one to which reference is commonly made by all who then lived in the West, and by those in other quarters whose attention was called to this portion of the Union, when they wish to show what wild speculation in public lands, and village and city sites, can effect towards the bankruptcy of a new country. This spirit of speculation was then as reckless in this quarter as in any part of the Territories and new Western States.

And Rock county did not escape the mania then prevailing for the laying out of large towns on paper, and selling out shares in them to those anxious to become suddenly rich, or to grow rapidly more so. "Rockport," now included within the city of Janesville and "Wisconsin city," located to the S. W. of the present city limits, were among these early speculations.

To secure a point for a town which might obtain the advantage of being in time the seat of justice of a county, was then a great desideratum. Janesville had to contend for this object with "Wisconsin city," Rockport, Beloit, and other sites. When the boundaries of the county, however, came to be defined, this, it was evident, was the place best fitted to receive the honor and advantage of being the capital, and it had already, notwithstanding much opposition from those interested in other localities, been designated as such by the Territorial Legislature.

The Territorial Legislature of 1836-7 sat at Belmont, in La Fayette county. At that session the county seat of Rock was established upon that part of the fractional quarter of section 36 on the East side of the River, it being a portion of Janes' claim. The county was set off from Milwaukee in 1836, and with Walworth, was attached to Racine until the Spring of the year 1839.

No action, however, in regard to the county seat was taken under the law of 1837; the county of Rock then having a town organization only, as a part of Racine county.

Mr. Janes, in the spring of 1837, platted the land in the neighborhood of his home on the east side of the river, for the village which was to perpetuate his name; but the land was not brought into market by the United States until September, 1839. Rock county was finally organized and the county seat established at Janesville, under a territorial law passed, February 13, 1839, and by virtue of an act of Congress the county made a pre-emption upon the land claimed by Janes' the act giving this privilege as to land upon which a county seat should be located. In May 1840, the county put the land in market. The claims of Mr. Janes and the county were therefore in conflict, but the matter was adjusted between them, the county quit-claiming to claimants and settlers, for a nominal consideration, what had previously been conveyed to them by Janes.

In 1839 Judge Irving held the first session of the Rock County District Court. His Honor sat in a room in the Stage House, and there assembled the prominent lawyers of the Territory, to aid him in the administration of justice.

Lucius G. Fisher was elected Sheriff of the ~~new county~~; Wm. H. H. Bailey, Register of Deeds, and Clerk of the County Commissioners - W. S. Murray, Wm. Spaulding, and E. J. Hazard, County Commission; ers. Daniel Smiley and Hiram Brown were the first Justices of the Peace appointed to deal out law and equity in the new town. They were exercising their jurisdiction here very soon after the first settlements were made.

In 1841, in the early part of the year, the erection of a court house was commenced. D. A. Richardson was the contractor, and in the month of January, 1842, the frame was up and covered. In December of the same year it was nearly completed, and was ready for use. James Chamberlain completed the building. It was a plain wooden edifice, built upon a plan very generally adopted throughout the west,

and served its purpose until the summer of 1859, when it was destroyed by fire. No movement was made toward the building of a court house, in place of the one burned, till the summer of 1869, when the county contracted for the erection of the one now being built, on the site of the old one. The designs and present appearance of the work on the new Court House indicate something in the way of architectural beauty for our city to be proud of. Its cost is to be about \$100,000.

The old jail, which was a wooden crib, was situated south of the public grounds, between Main and Bluff streets. It was a structure of very little strength, and in the summer of 1849, the prisoners confined in it, or supposed to be confined, sometimes went out under the cover of night, to bathe in the river, steal melons, and otherwise amuse themselves, returning quietly to their quarters, when they were through with their recreations.

In April, 1837, a post office was established here, Janesville having become, through the active agency of Gen. Wm. B. Sheldon, a centre for several post-routes. This gentleman was a member of the Territorial Legislature, and took a strong interest in the advancement of the new town, laboring zealously to procure for it every possible advantage in this, as in other matters likely to promote its welfare. Gen. Sheldon died in 1847, and is buried by the side of his wife and daughter, Mrs. Isaac Woodel, in "Oak Hill Cemetery." Two of his daughters, Mrs. J. Y. Scammon and Mrs. M. D. Ogden are now residing in Chicago.

The first bridge erected here over Rock River was the work of three enterprising men, Charles Stevens, Thomas Lappin, and Wm. H. H. Bailey, in 1842. Its cost was two thousand dollars, and it was a glorious, at all events a very comfortable thing for travelers, when they could pass across by something else than a rough scow, and a line of wire. It was a toll bridge for a number of years, and notwithstanding the accommodation afforded by it, there were those who would grumble at the rates, and complain of monopoly and extortion. This construction answered its purpose for more than ten years, and a more convenient and handsome one followed. This, in turn has given way to the present substantial structure.

Thus far we have some of the incidents, and the names of some of the most prominent of those who led the way in the foundation and organization of the little community expected and destined to grow to the proportions of a fair village or city, as good fortune, enterprise and industry might determine. The place upon which they settled with such expectations was well chosen, and time and the course of events have proved their good judgment and sagacity.

The settlement of new territories in those days, however, was not the easy task that it has since become, when railroads and steamboats furnish constant and rapid means for travel and the transportation of freight. Had the lines of railroad from the east to Lake Michigan been then completed, it would not have required six years time to gather here a population of three hundred and thirty-three in number, and that was

all that Janesville could muster in 1843. Among the earlier settlers named and now residing here or in the vicinity, we find John P. Dickson and wife, Mrs. W. H. H. Bailey, Volney Atwood and wife, Theodore Kendall and wife, Geo. H. Williston and wife, (Mr. Williston is now City Clerk,) John L. Kimball and wife, D. F. Kimball, Thomas Lappin, John Inman, William and Joseph Spaulding, and Geo. R. Ramsey.

In the year 1843 we may date the commencement of the substantial growth of our town. It was then that the first steps were taken for the improvement of the ample water power here afforded by the noble stream which adds so much beauty to the locality. Its importance was well understood here by the early settlers, and at as early a day as circumstances would permit, steps were taken to put it to practical use.

At the session of the Territorial Legislature of 1843, A. Hyatt Smith, then but a short time in the county, procured the passage of an act authorizing the construction of a dam across Rock River at Janesville. The parties named in the act, to be associated with Mr. Smith, were Charles Stevens, Wm. H. H. Bailey, and Lewis E. Stone.

In the spring of 1844, Smith, Bailey & Stone contracted with one Phelps to build a frame and plank dam at the bend of the river. Phelps having been engaged, during most of the summer, in preparations for the performance of his contract, was suddenly taken sick, and died.

Smith, Stone & Bailey, soon afterwards made a division of their interest in the lands they had purchased together, Stone selling to the other two his interest in what is designated on the city map as "Smith & Bailey's Addition."

In the winter of 1844-5, Messrs. Smith & Bailey entered into a contract with the Hanchetts, under which the H. brothers were to build a dam and grist mill. The Messrs. H. soon erected a dam, but it was imperfect and unsatisfactory. Smith subsequently purchased the interests of the Hanchetts in their contract, and proceeded immediately to perfect the dam.

In the autumn of 1845, James McClurg, of Maysville, Chatauque county, New York, purchased one half of the interest of Mr. Smith in the power, and commenced energetic preparations for the building of a mill. While these were in progress, Martin O. Walker, of Chicago, purchased an interest, and about the same time J. B. Doe purchased a share. Smith finally bought out McClurg's interest, and the property then stood in the names of Smith, Walker & Doe, to whom the credit is due of completing the first grist mill here called the "Big Mill." The erection of this mill was, for those days, an enterprise of great magnitude, and it was pushed forward with great energy through obstacles well fitted to discourage any but the sagacious and sanguine projector who had the chief charge of it. Ira Miltimore, still one of our active business men, was the architect who planned and superintended the details of the improvement.

The dam erected for this power is composed of heavy stone, rubble,

timber and plank, with earth and gravel, and notwithstanding some accidents, has served its purpose well.

In 1844, Daniel A. Richardson erected the first substantial brick block for business purposes. It was until lately known as "Richardson's Commercial Block," is three stories high, and situated on Main street.

July 3d, 1844, a steamer from St. Louis arrived at the port of Janesville. On the glorious 4th, almost all the adult inhabitants of Janesville embarked upon her for parts above on the river and enjoyed the trip "hugely."

In the next year, Mr. D. F. Kimball, or to call him by the familiar name by which he is best known here, Frank Kimball, one of the earliest settlers of Janesville, built a small brick building on West Milwaukee street, in which the first goods were sold on the west side of the river.

The year '45 is memorable for the establishment of the first newspaper published in the county. On the 14th of August of that year, Levi Alden, of New Hampshire, with a partner, commenced the publication of the Janesville Gazette, which has continued here without interruption, and has grown to be regarded as one of the most important "institutions" of our place, having latterly, for several years, been a daily and weekly journal. It was Whig in its politics, when there was a party of that name, and is now one of the leading Republican organs of the State. The Gazette establishment is now owned by the "Gazette Printing Company," of which Hon. A. M. Thomson is the President.

Besides the *Gazette*, we now have the *Recorder*, a weekly, by Vee-der & St. John. Republican, the *Times*, weekly, democratic, by A. O. Wilson.

The "Northern Farmer," weekly, by O. F. Stafford, and "Our Folks at Home," by F. D. Carson..

About the first of January, 1846, the Janesville Academy was opened for the instruction of children and youths of both sexes. The Rev. Thomas J. Ruger, an Episcopal clergyman, who still resides here, beloved and respected for his amiable disposition, his sound learning, and his exemplary piety, was at the head of the institution. A. Hyatt Smith was the president of its board of trustees.

About the middle of March, 1845, Frink & Walker commenced running a tri-weekly line of stages between Janesville and Milwaukee, which was a matter of great rejoicing here.

On the 15th of Dec. 1848, the telegraph line reached Janesville.

In the autumn of this year the improvement of the water power in the southern portion of the town was commenced by Ira Miltimore. A wing dam was put in here, which was mostly swept away in 1852. Afterwards improvements on a more extended and permanent scale were projected and undertaken by A. Hyatt Smith, and to his enterprise we are indebted for the development of this great water power

A dam of cut stone is now completed, two hundred feet in length,

and of the height of five feet and a little over. The stone used above the foundation are of large size, from three to three and a half feet in width, and from six to ten feet in length, with a thickness of fourteen inches. They are so dressed as to secure a close joint, and are laid in hydraulic cement. The base of this structure is eighty feet in width and the upper course is twenty-eight feet wide. An apron is extended out, also of heavy stone, making a solid sloping pavement, while behind this mass of solid masonry there is a lining of rubble and chip stone and clay well packed, so that it is next to impossible that the water above can have any passage, except where it should, over and not through the work. The whole structure rests upon a wide foundation of heavy stone, reaching a depth of from ten to sixteen feet. The heavy stone piers of the bridge, erected here, were so constructed as to fit and join into the masonry of the dam, forming a portion of it, and adding largely to its strength.

From the north end of the dam extends down the river, for half a mile, a heavy embankment, which is intended to be greatly enlarged and strengthened, and this encloses the head race for the supply of power. At its outlet the fall is ten feet. The power thus created is sufficient to drive over eighty run of stone, and the supply of water will be ample in every season. The low lands on the north side of that reach of the river above the dam have been flowed, and a lake formed from one-third to a half a mile in width, and a mile in length. Leading to the bridge is Centre avenue, destined to be one of the most beautiful streets in the city, being eight rods wide, and extending north to Milwaukee street.

In January, 1849, a meeting was held to promote the project of a railroad to bring the valley of Rock river, throughout its length, into communication with the lines of railroad stretching toward Chicago from the East. The Madison and Beloit railroad company had been incorporated at the first session of the State Legislature, which was held in the summer of 1848. This was always a favorite project with the people of this valley. The meeting referred to was addressed by Wm. B. Ogden, of Chicago, A. Hyatt Smith, and others. The gentleman last named was especially active in the forwarding of this enterprise, and for several years devoted his abilities and energy to its prosecution, rendering service to this part of the State, and particularly to the town of his residence, that attracted to him a large share of the public attention, and won for him the esteem of those most directly interested in the welfare and advancement of this portion of Wisconsin.

The project of "Union Schools" which has since been so well and thoroughly developed, and carried into operation, began now to be discussed. On the 12th of May, 1849, a large meeting of citizens was held, at which speeches were made by several prominent gentlemen, and it was resolved that the subject of education in the village should receive a greater share of attention and effort. The reader will find in this di-

rectory, an article prepared by Prof. W. D. Parker, principal of the High School, exhibiting the highest condition of our Schools.

On the 30th of August a meeting was held at the Court House, to adopt measures for procuring the location here of the State Asylum for the Blind. This institution was not long afterwards established here, and the building which stands in an elevated situation in the southern part of the city, is now one of its principal ornaments.

The surveys for the Madison and Beloit Railroad, afterwards called the Rock River Valley Union Railroad, and now the Chicago and Northwestern Railway, were commenced on the 17th day of August, 1849.

The Rock River Valley Road soon began to make progress. On the 10th of July, 1851, ground was broken for its construction at Fond du Lac, in the presence of a large assemblage of citizens from the counties lying along the river; A. Hyatt Smith, then President of the company, performing the interesting ceremony. Eighteen miles of the road, south from Fond du lac, were constructed, and work was about the same time commenced on the line from Chicago, and pushed North with considerable vigor.

The first State Agricultural Fair of Wisconsin was held at Janesville commencing Oct. 1, 1851. The ground occupied was the fine level, to the east of the Court House, where the elegant residence of Mrs. Timothy Jackman now stands.

In the summer of 1852, the Southern Wisconsin Railroad Company, chartered for the construction of a road from Janesville to the Mississippi, was organized at the Stevens House. This line of road was afterwards taken by the Milwaukee & Mississippi Company, and under their auspices was completed, in 1858, to the village of Monroe, the county seat of Green county, a distance of thirty-six miles.

On the 5th January, 1853, the M. & M. Railway being completed to Janesville, the event was duly celebrated.

The railroad connections with the East, which had so long been anxiously hoped for, and so much discussed, seemed to be near at hand. The people of Janesville began to believe that the promise of growth and importance as to which they had speculated would at no distant day be realized, and that here might be built up a city to rival the most populous and prosperous of the inland cities of the East. Dr. John Mitchell, then the editor and proprietor of the Democratic Standard, advocated earnestly and ably the propriety of obtaining a city charter, and for a place numbering nearly five thousand inhabitants something else than a township government seemed indeed, to be necessary. It was thought best by the people that we should have a municipal organization, separate from that of the town of Janesville. Accordingly the legislature of '53 incorporated the city of Janesville, with its present boundaries. Enough of space is included within its limits for a city of many thousand people, but, large as is the plat, it is even now well occupied, over a large proportion, with business buildings and residences, and year by year the vacant spaces are rapidly filling up.

On the first Tuesday in April, 1853, A. Hyatt Smith was elected Mayor of the new city.

The year 1854 was marked by the same steady but rapid progress. Every principal branch of business was extending, and on all sides could be noted the signs of improvement, and the evidences of growing wealth and substantial prosperity.

The population of the city in 1855 was ascertained, by the census taken under State authority, to be over seven thousand, an increase of more than two thousand, since the early part of the year 1853.

In 1856, among the public improvements specially to be noted, was the construction of the bridge between Court and Pleasant Sts., under the superintendance of Wm. Macloon.

From the foot of Centre Avenue to Miltimore's quarries, another most substantial and durable bridge, with cut stone piers, and strong wooden superstructure, was erected in the same year, and is now known as the "Monterey Bridge."

The Chicago, St. Paul and Fond du Lac Railroad was completed to Janesville, in November, 1856. This was formerly known as the Rock River Valley Union Railroad, and now is styled the Chicago & Northwestern Railway. About the first of October, 1859, its track was laid to Oshkosh, and the whole line from Chicago to that place, put in successful operation, and in November 1862, the line was extended to Green Bay.

Having thus briefly sketched the leading events in the history of our town, and the progress of improvement from the early days to the present time, it is appropriate to add some remarks relating to its present condition, its various advantages, and its probable future.

The facilities for manufacturing by water power, the improvement of which has been noted in some detail, are coming every year more into use, and from this time onward, it may safely be predicted, they will attract the attention of men of capital, and induce the investment of means in manufacturing establishments, until the full capacity of the power shall be exhausted in the propulsion of machinery. The situation of Janesville, also, peculiarly fits it to become a great manufacturing town. The county of Rock is one of the best agricultural districts in the West. Its soil is equal in fertility to that of the best lands in any of the Western States, and there is scarcely an acre within its limits, which cannot be profitably used for farming purposes. In addition to Rock, there are considerable portions of the adjoining counties, for which Janesville is a market. At the present time this is, it is believed, as a wheat and general produce market, next to Milwaukee, the most important in the State. The early establishment of flouring mills here is one of the causes which have brought this about.

Another principal cause is in the fact that the town stands at the intersection of the railways, leading to Chicago, and to Milwaukee, and here the produce dealers of these cities compete for the trade of a large and rich surrounding territory. Our own produce dealers have, also,

done their part, by a liberal course of business, to promote the interests of the city.

From an early day, down to the present time, a very large trade has been done here in general merchandize. Our merchants have kept up with the needs and demands of a widely extended circle of customers, and have enjoyed a reputation for liberal dealing. Dry goods, hardware, groceries, and other descriptions of goods have been sold at prices uniformly moderate, when compared with the trade of other inland towns, and this fact has always had an influence in the highest degree favorable to the interest of the place.—Our mercantile establishments are upon a scale as to extent, amount of stock, quality of goods, and the style in which they are fitted and furnished, that would be creditable to older and much larger towns.

As yet nothing has been said of the merits of the site upon which our fair young city is built. On this object, every citizen of Janesville, is apt, at times, to speak in such enthusiastic terms, that those who listen to the description of what they have not yet seen, are likely to take it with many grains of allowance. But all strangers who visit the place, and pass through its different wards, and wide extent of streets, are charmed with the beauty of the landscape, and its admirable adaptation to the purpose for which it was chosen and has been improved. There is here a pleasing variety of surface, all in harmony, in no part of it abrupt or rough; affording the choicest sites for residences, in profusion, and at the same time convenient and handsome streets for the uses of business. On the East side the ground rises rather rapidly, from the second street running parallel with the river, to the fine plateau of prairie which stretches away for miles beyond, and on the brow of this rise, which is diversified with grassy knolls, and here and there with beautiful groves, for a distance of two miles or more, are sites for villas and cottages. many of which are occupied, not to be surpassed in any town in the Union. The same may be said of the high land which rises from the river, on the south side of its westerly reach, on both sides of the State Asylum for the Blind. On the west side the ground rises from the river, with an easy grade towards the west and northwest, and just beyond the limits of the town, in the direction last named, commences the high rolling land forming a part of the famous Rock Prairie.

The year 1869, now just closed, is remarkable for the growth and extension of the town and the revival here of business of all descriptions, the spirit of enterprise on all hands exhibited, and the cheerful countenances of our prominent business men, are tokens of a general prosperity, based upon strong foundations, and destined to grow. year by year, with a rapidity greatly augmented over that of any previous period in the history of Janesville. The few local causes that disturbed the harmony of our citizens have disappeared and all are laboring with the energy and intelligence for which they are distinguished, to maintain her rank in business importance among the cities of Wisconsin.

## THE WISCONSIN INSTITUTION

For the education of the blind is located at Janesville. It was at first supported by contributions of the citizens. It was however soon adopted by the state, which has since maintained it on a scale corresponding with the ability of Wisconsin. The buildings stand in a beautiful grove on a bluff overlooking the southwestern part of the city. That which is occupied as residence and school building, is an imposing edifice of cut stone, five stories in height. Its design may be best described as a central structure, with longitudinal and transverse wings, the latter extending further to the rear than the central building. The west wing has just been completed. That on the east is not yet erected. Length of present buildings 175 feet; greatest depth of wings, 85 feet. It will accommodate about 110 pupils—as many as will probably need room there for 15 or 20 years. A view of the building appears in these pages.

There is also a fine brick building for a shop 60 by 40 feet, where the young men are taught broom making. Cost of building and grounds about \$150,000.00. The Institution is placed by the state in the hands of trustees, residents of Janesville and vicinity, who serve gratuitously. Dr. R. B. Treat has been president of the Board for the past ten or twelve years.

All blind children of Wisconsin are received, boarded and instructed free of charge. The branches of knowledge usually studied in our common schools and academies are taught; and many of the pupils become astonishingly proficient in the various sciences. Music receives special attention as being peculiarly adapted to relieve the wearisomeness of their lives of darkness, and affording to some, who are more than ordinarily skilful, a means of future support.

The Institution is under the direct charge of Thomas H. Little, who, with the assistance of a corps of skilful teachers, mostly ladies, has brought it to a degree of efficiency which entitles it to rank second to no institution of its size in the country. It is well supplied with books in raised letters, and great quantities of peculiar maps and apparatus of various sorts for conducting this difficult branch of education.

The number of pupils during the last year was 69. The appropriation of the state for current expenses of the year was \$18,000. The Institution, in common with the other Benevolent Institutions of the State, is subject to frequent visits of the Governor, and an annual inspection of a committee of the Legislature. For many years the unvarying tenor of the reports of these officers is such as to establish for it an enviable reputation throughout the state for economy and usefulness.



## PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

Free schools on the New England plan were established in Janesville as early as 1840. They were believed to meet the requirements of the people until the fall of 1855, when they became a unit and out of their organization in 1856, the present system of graded schools was established. The years 1856,—7,—8,—9, seems to have been remarkable for the interest displayed by all citizens in promoting educational facilities, and the Board of education seems to have worked fully up to the demands of the times in directing the citizens energies. During those years the building now used for High school and grammar departments, intermediate and primary departments of 3d Ward, and the buildings of the 2d and 4th Wards, were erected at a cost of \$65,000, and were occupied by 700 pupils. Though in 1859 the accommodations were in excess of the demand, yet with the increase of population, the seats were filled by 1863, and out of subsequent demands in 1867 came the plan for a new building in the 1st Ward, from which has been wrought the elegant structure now seating 300 pupils. The interests of the people have suffered from lack of educational facilities, principally from want of buildings suitable for the purposes, and from inaccessibility in inclement weather. These obstacles are now in part overcome.

The object of this Institution is to furnish the blind children of the State a good education specially adapted to their condition, thereby fitting them to take intelligent and useful part in the affairs of life.

Instruction is given in those subjects which are usually taught in our best public schools, and also in music, both vocal and instrumental, and in various kinds of work.

**The Institution is supported by the State, and no charge is made for board or tuition.**

For the purposes of education, all children are regarded as practically blind whose vision is so defective as to prevent them from receiving the benefit of common schools.

From ten to fourteen is the most favorable age for entering the Institution.

The session of the Institution commences on the first Monday of September in each year, and closes on the last Wednesday in June following.

No person of imbecile or unsound mind, or of confirmed immoral character, will be knowingly received into the Institution; and in case any person shall, after a fair trial, prove incompetent for useful instruction, or disobedient to the wholesome regulations of the Institution, such pupil will be thereupon discharged.

It is believed that a considerable number of blind children are growing up in ignorance, in the State; and the attention of ministers, doctors, teachers and other persons of extensive acquaintance with the young, is specially invited to the matter, in the hope that they will use their influence to have such children sent to school before it is too late.

All persons are requested to send the names and addresses of blind children of their acquaintance to the undersigned.
