

He has written over 200 essays for Natural History Magazine and authored Ever Since Darwin, The Panda's Thumb, Hen's Teeth and Horses Toes and Bully for Brontosaurus. Gould has received awards from the MacArthur Foundation Prize Fellowship, the Silver Nation Medal of the Zoological Society of London and the Edinburgh Medal.



For the past 15 years Union members have been venturing through the pristine wilderness of Canada on the Travel Center's annual Escape to Wabakimi. 
