



Media Information

Media Credentials

UW Women's Basketball credential requests should be made in writing and in advance through Tam Flarup at the Wisconsin Athletic Communications Office, (608) 263-5502. Game-day credentials for the Kohl Center will be left with the parking attendant at Lot 91 east of the Kohl Center or at the table at the media entrance off Frances Street.

Parking

Parking for media during Wisconsin basketball games is reserved on a limited basis near the Kohl Center. Special arrangements must be made in advance. Please contact the Athletic Communications Office for parking credentials at least one week in advance of the event.

Media Services

Working facilities for all media are located courtside at the Kohl Center. Electrical outlets are available at every seat. Telephone lines must be installed in advance of the game by calling Jamie Buchanan at the Kohl Center, (608) 265-8546. Event programs, media guides, event notes and computerized statistics will be available in the interview/work room adjacent to the main floor at the Kohl Center. The credentialed media entrance is on the Frances Street side (east) of the Kohl Center adjacent to the media parking area and near Gate A. The media entrance is open two hours before tip-off.

Photographers

Photographers may work from either end of the Kohl Center court in the designated section. Photographers may not work from in front of team and scoring benches, or in front of media row. Contact Jason Davenport at the Kohl Center, (608) 265-4705, to arrange for the rental of strobe lights.

Post-event Interviews

All post-event interviews will be conducted in the media interview room located adjacent to the Kohl Center main court. The large interview area contains recording couplers for hookup to the house sound system for TV and reporters. The visiting coach and players will be interviewed approximately 10 minutes follow-

ing the completion of the event. The Wisconsin coaches and players will follow immediately. All requests for interviews should be directed to Athletic Communications personnel prior to the completion of the event. The Wisconsin portion of the post-event interviews will be video live streamed on uwbadgers.com.

Practice and Interviews

The UW women's basketball practices are open to the media and the public. Interviews are generally conducted after practice on a designated day. Media must contact Tam Flarup at (608) 263-5502 at least one day in advance to arrange player or coach interviews. Practices begin in September this season on a limited basis. The first official practice will be Saturday, Oct. 15.

Lisa Stone appears every Monday during the season at the weekly UW news conference at approximately 1 p.m. in the Kohl Center media room. In addition, weekly Big Ten teleconferences with all 11 coaches will be held every Tuesday, from 9-11 a.m. CST, beginning Jan. 4 through the Big Ten tournament.

Television Broadcasts

Many UW games will be televised this season. The Badgers will appear nationally

on Fox Sports Net several times and Comcast. The Badger game at Michigan State Feb. 12 will be on ESPN2.

Wisconsin Public Television and local cable channel UPN14 have not announced their plans for local and statewide coverage.

Women's Basketball on its statewide network. The WPT announce team features veteran announcer Ken Syke, and former UW player Karie Cattanach. Syke has

been calling play-by-play on television for more than two decades at the high school and collegiate level.

The Badgers have made several national broadcast appearances including CBS twice, once last season. Wisconsin has also appeared on ESPN and ESPN2 numerous times.

**Radio Broadcasts**

Mike Heller, a 19-year veteran of the sports broadcasting arena, begins his second season as the radio voice of the UW Women's Basketball team. Heller will broadcast all of the Badgers' home and away regular season games and tournament appearances as part of the Learfield Communications package heard locally on WIBA AM 1310 and WTSO AM 1070. His voice will also be available on the Web audio broadcasts on uwbadgers.com.

A 1987 graduate of the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh, Mike worked as a television sports anchor for 10 years, including stops in Rhinelander, Madison, and Memphis, Tenn.

A PGA of America member, Mike has worked in the golf business since 1995, and began his own company AGES Golf two years ago. He has worked as a golf professional in Madison and was the head golf professional at "The Springs" in Spring Green, Wis.

Mike has also been a regular on Madison talk-radio since 1996. He joined ESPN Radio in June of 2003, and was the nightly host of "The Bullpen Show" on WTSO Radio 1070 last year.


Mike and his wife Kristen have four daughters.

Flarup is responsible for the publications and all facets of media support for Wisconsin women's basketball.

Flarup was recognized for her long-time contributions to collegiate women's basketball as the recipient of the prestigious Mel Greenberg national media award in 2004. Presented at the NCAA Final Four, Flarup was nominated for the award by Badger Coach Lisa Stone.

A member of the NCAA Communications Committee, Flarup has worked every NCAA Women's Basketball Final Four since 1995. She has served on numerous committees for CoSIDA, the national organization for sports information, including as a member of the national board from 1998-2001.



2004-05 Badger Season in Review


Wisconsin (12-16, 5-11) finished the Big Ten regular season in eighth place and defeated Indiana (10-18, 3-11) in the double overtime in the first round of the Big Ten Tournament. UW bowed out to Ohio State, 70-46 in the quarterfinals. It was the first Big Ten tournament victory since 2002.

◆ Last year, the Badgers also finished tied for eighth in the Big Ten with a 4-12 record. The 12-16 record was an improvement over the 2003-04 final mark of 10-17, and the best record since 2002.

◆ In the last conference game of the season, Wisconsin recovered from a 15-point second-half deficit to come within two points, before losing to Purdue in West Lafayette, 69-59. The Badgers finished 3-11 on the road last year.

Badger Coach Lisa Stone

◆ Head coach Lisa Stone completed her second season at Wisconsin and is just three wins shy of her 400th career victory. Completing her 20th season of coaching, Stone is 397-151 overall (.724 winning percentage). She ranks 18th in all-time career win percentage among active Div. I coaches. Stone was 10-17 in her opening year at Wisconsin, which was the first losing season in her coaching career.



2004-05 Individual Notes

◆ **Jolene Anderson (Port Wing, Wis.)** was named the 2005 Big Ten Freshman of the Year by both the conference coaches and media. She also earned third team All-Big Ten honors. She becomes the fourth UW player to earn the Freshman of the Year Award.

◆ With a game-high 26 points at Purdue, Anderson set Wisconsin's frosh scoring mark with 470 points breaking the previous record of 459 set by Jessie Stomski in 1998-99. She finished the season with 497 points, averaging 17.8 points per game to break a 27-year-old record for the best season scoring average by any UW freshman since Pam Moore averaged 15.7 points per game in 1977-78.

◆ Anderson came to Wisconsin with impeccable scoring credentials and has not disappointed. The team's leading scorer with 17.8 points per game, she was the only freshman who ranked among the top 15 in Big Ten scoring (fourth) and was the third highest scoring freshman in the country (44th). She also ranked sixth in 3-pt. goals made (1.89) and 17th in rebounding with 5.6 per game. She had double-figure scoring in all but three games.

◆ Anderson paced UW in scoring 16 times in 28 games including 11, 20-point games. She set the frosh scoring records for points (477) and average (17.8), 3-point goals made with 53 and attempted with 165. Her career-high of 29 points vs. UW-Green Bay and Santa Clara were the third most points scored by a UW freshman. The last time a freshman led UW was in 1979-80, when Theresa Huff averaged 14.1 points per game.

◆ Freshman guard **Janese Banks (Indianapolis, Ind.)** shot the most free throws for Wisconsin connecting on 100-131 for 76.3 percent). Against Santa Clara (12/16), she was a perfect 9-of-9 to go along with career highs of 23 points and nine rebounds. She led UW in scoring at the Big Ten tournament with 39 points in two games to become UW's second-leading scorer with 10.6 points per game.

◆ The Big Ten assists leader in 2003-04 with 5.8 per game, **Stephanie Rich (Crawfordsville, Iowa)** finished third in

the league with 4.07 assists per game. Against Michigan State on Jan. 13, she notched a season-high 10 assists. UW's third leading-scorer (10.2 ppg), she finished her career just 22 points shy of scoring her 1,000th point.

◆ Junior **Annie Nelson (Hudson, Wis.)** had a career year. After playing in just 20 games (91 career minutes) in her first two seasons, she played in every game last year and earned her first start against Marquette (12/1). She was Wisconsin's leading rebounder, averaging 6.8 per game, and she led UW with a career-high 14 points at Penn State. She established career highs with 13 rebounds, three steals, three blocks and four assists. She was 10th in Big Ten offensive rebounding with 2.21 per game.

◆ **Ashley Josephson (Onalaska, Wis.)** led the team in scoring in 2003-04, with 12.3 points per game. She served as a reserve last year but came off the bench to score a career-high 29 points vs. Iowa. She averaged 6.4 points per game, and is still UW's career leader in 3-point goal accuracy hitting 94-231 for 40.7 percent. She broke her nose in practice Dec. 22 and missed the Purdue game Dec. 30.

◆ Two freshmen (**Jolene Anderson, Janese Banks**) started every game for the Badgers. It was the first time UW started two freshmen since 1998-99, when Jessie Stomski and Tamara Moore both started in the sixth game of the season.

◆ **Danielle Ward and Janese Banks** were 2004 Gatorade State Players of the Year. Ward was Wisconsin's choice, while Banks was selected for Indiana.

2005 Academic All-Big Ten

The Badgers had four student-athletes who were named Academic All-Big Ten. With 75 citations, the Badgers have had more conference academic honorees than any other Big Ten school since the award was first granted in 1986.

2005-06 Badger Season Preview

The building blocks were being put in place in 2004-05, as Wisconsin improved to 12-16 under second-year coach Lisa Stone. Continued improvement is expected from a team that returns three starters, two of whom were freshmen last year.

The Returnees

Jolene Anderson (Port Wing, Wis.) was the Big Ten Freshman of the Year and returns as the leading scorer for the Badgers averaging 17.8 points per game which ranked fourth in the Big Ten and 44th nationally. Anderson is coming off a summer with USA basketball as a member of the USA U19 team that won a gold medal in the FIBA World Games in Tunisia. Anderson was second on the team in rebounding with 5.6 per game, and second in assists with 3.4 per game.

The other freshman starter was Janese Banks (Indianapolis, Ind.), who ranked second in team scoring with 10.6 points per game. She spent the summer playing with the Big Ten All-Star team in Europe.

But Stone also expects big contributions from the senior class led by returning starter Annie Nelson (Hudson, Wis.). Nelson led the team in rebounding with 6.8 caroms per game, and added 5.9 points. Jordan Wilson (Naperville, Ill.)

ended the season on a high note making clutch free throws at the Big Ten tournament and started in 16 games averaging 6.0 points and 4.1 rebounds. Guard Ashley Josephson (Onalaska, Wis.) was a primary reserve last year averaging 6.4 points per game. She was the leading 3-point shooter in percentage hitting 37.3 percent of her shots, and is UW's career percentage leader hitting 40.7 percent. She was the leading scorer as a sophomore averaging 12.3 points per game. Kjersten Bakke (DeForest, Wis.) rounds out the senior class. Bakke returned from ACL surgery at the end of her sophomore year and contributed 1.9 points and rebounds in 26 games last year.

UW's large five-person freshman class last year also included Shari' Welton (Calumet City, Ill.) who played in 23 games and averaged 1.2 points and one rebound per game. At 6-4, Danielle Ward of Milwaukee, Wis., the 2004 Gatorade Player of the Year, was the tallest player on the court for UW last season and averaged 4.4 points and 3.0 rebounds per game. Akiya Alexander (Evanston, Ill.) subbed at the point guard spot and averaged 1.4 points and 0.5 assists per game. Alexander, Banks, Ward, Welton, and Wilson are all products of the same AAU team, the Chicago Hoops Express.


The Newcomers

Wisconsin welcomes three newcomers including 6-4 freshman Caitlin Gibson (Jefferson, Wis.), who led her team to the Wisconsin Division II state title. An AP All-State first team performer, Gibson became the school's all-time leading scorer averaging 18.5 points and 9.4 rebounds her senior season. She also placed second in the Wisconsin state shot put competition.


Christine Spencer (Traverse City, Mich.) will also add to the fire potential for the Badgers. The 6-1 McDonald's All-American nominee and Wendy's High School Heisman finalist averaged 25.6 points and 12.1 rebounds during the fall season. Also joining the Badgers as a walk-on is Brittany Cannon, a 5-10 guard from nearby Mt. Horeb, Wis.

Graduation Losses

The Badgers lost two senior starters in three-year point guard Stephanie Rich (Washington, Iowa), who last season averaged 10.2 points and 4.0 assists per game.

Also graduated was part-time starter is Ebba Gebisa (West Lafayette, Ind.), who averaged 3.6 points and 2.6 rebounds per game.

The Badgers finished eighth in the Big Ten with a 5-11 record, and won their first game at the conference tournament since 2002, with a 75-74 double-overtime thriller over Indiana. The 12-16 overall mark was also the best since going 19-12 in 2002.

The Schedule

The Wisconsin schedule features 17 home games and seven teams that appeared in the NCAA tournament last year. NCAA Runner-up champion Michigan State leads another strong Big Ten Conference contingent that also includes the 2004 NCAA Final Four participant, Minnesota.

In a featured event, the women's basketball team joins the UW football team in Hawaii over Thanksgiving with one game played each day from Nov. 25-27.

The Badgers open the 16-game Big Ten Conference season Dec. 29 at Purdue. The Big Ten home opener is New Year's Day with Northwestern. The Big Ten tournament will once again take place at Conseco Field House in Indianapolis March 2-6.

2005-06 Badger Chat with Coach Stone

Coach Stone begins her third year with Wisconsin basketball. In this preseason Badger Chat, Stone reflects on last season, her current players, and her goals for 2005-06.

You're settling into your third season now. What do you consider your primary accomplishments so far at Wisconsin?

"I truly believe we have made great progress. Every year we have improved and gotten better. One notable accomplishment was our double-overtime win over Indiana in the 2005 Big Ten Conference Tournament. Also, Jolene Anderson and Janese Banks represented our program overseas this summer. Their success combined with our returning players, and newcomers, bodes well for our future."

What motivation does your staff and players have from last year's improved record and first-round Big Ten Tournament victory?

"Our first-round victory in the Big Ten Tournament was a wonderful way to end our second season. To advance one more game in the tournament, gave us great incentive for the future. It also served as a great motivator for us to continue to take positive steps forward."

Our ultimate goal this year is post-season play. I believe the taste of success that we experienced at the Big Ten Tournament last year provides great fuel for this year's team."

What are the team goals this season?

"Our team goals remain consistent each year. We want to win the Big Ten Conference regular season title, win the Big Ten tournament, advance to the NCAA tournament, and eventually win a national championship. These are goals that I have had for 21 years."

Our team has to aim high, reach for the stars, and every single day in practice, it's imperative that we keep these things in mind. Our philosophy is "Team Unity." Our basketball team, in particular this year, has to demonstrate an ability to outwork opponents as a unit.

Every year, I feel our team is coming together more and more. We have tremendous leadership with four seniors that are now in their third season with

my coaching staff. This is imperative to our success because they understand my staff; understand my personality, and the way we want to get things done.

We might be undersized in some cases. We might be on the road in a very tough environment, but we will respect everyone we play and fear no one. We need to raise our intensity level, and our ability to outwork opponents' together, heart and soul, every time we step onto the court. With this type of mentality, success will happen for this team

You have a solid nucleus of four seniors, all captains. What do you hope their signature will be on this program?

"I want our four senior captains to leave a stamp of success on Wisconsin Women's Basketball. Success can be measured in many different ways. Annie Nelson has made tremendous improvement from the first day on campus to now her senior season, and she is one I believe can be used as an example of what happens when you work hard. Annie provides great leadership. She is a great student. She has become one of our best rebounders and post defenders. We look to Annie to demonstrate her work ethic to the rest of our team."

Jordan Wilson needs to have a big senior year, and she wants that more than anything. She is our veteran post and knows what playing in the Big Ten is like. Jordan is small, but she can score inside as well as outside.

Ashley Josephson came off last season serving a different role than she was used to. Ashley will do whatever it takes for this program to be successful. I look to Ashley to demonstrate maturity, her scoring prowess from outside, handling the basketball, and showing poise and confidence on the perimeter for us.

Finally last but not least, is Kjersten Bakke. Every single day Bakke is going to outwork people, play hard, she's extremely coachable, and does whatever it takes to make this team better.

The one thing our four seniors haven't experienced is playing in the postseason. My goal for them is to reach a postseason tournament. Their stamp on this program will be the first team of the Stone era to enter a postseason tournament. I am going to push this senior class to enjoy every moment we have together. We have to work harder than our opponents, to put ourselves in the position to be playing beyond the Big Ten Conference tournament."

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

Since the award was initiated in 1986, Wisconsin has garnered 75 Academic All-Big Ten honors which ranks first among Big Ten basketball teams for the most academic honorees in the history of the conference. The Badgers had four Academic All-Big Ten honorees in 2005.

You return the Big Ten Freshman of the Year in Jolene Anderson. Talk about what she brings to the team, especially after winning a gold medal with the USA Basketball U19 team.

"Jolene traveled to Tunisia, Africa, and throughout the United States last summer. Her experiences are so much more than the game of basketball. She learned about the United States and being a United States citizen, traveling overseas, and seeing other parts of the world. Jolene's experience has allowed her to grow, mature, and become an improved communicator both on and off the court.

Because of her experience overseas, she has become an even more confident basketball player. Playing for the United States of America, winning a gold medal, and standing on the medal stand was a dream come true for Jolene. If she can use these experiences to the best of her ability, Jolene is going to have a great sophomore season."

What do you think Janese Banks gained from her Big Ten tour experience?

"Janese Banks played on the Big Ten Tour Team that was made up primarily of upperclassmen. She was able to learn from great players like Crystal Smith from Iowa, and Cyndi Valentin from Indiana. Both are fourth- and fifth-year seniors

who have experienced a lot. Janese was anxious to come back and share some of her stories with me and talk about things other programs do to help their teams be successful.

Sharing knowledge from one player or program to ours is great. Janese had to play point guard with this team, and we may need her to do the same for us this season. She also went to a point guard camp to improve her ball-handling skills and outside perimeter game. This in itself shows great commitment and effort to become a better player."


You still have one of the youngest teams in the Big Ten with nine players who are either freshmen or sophomores and no junior class. What are the coaching demands with such a youthful group?



Discuss your other returnees and the newcomers.

"Danielle Ward is a player that is still learning the game. She was raw coming in, and has worked a great deal with Donna Freitag, and she will continue to improve. She is gifted athletically, and if she continues to learn and understand the game, she will be a very special player."

Akiya Alexander has unlimited potential. If Akiya can produce the way we know she can, it will be a fun year for her with the opportunity to step into the point guard position.

Shari' Welton is a great rebounder, strong and physical, and can do some great things for us. This season I look to her to step in and contribute even more.

I'm excited about our freshmen. Caitlin Gibson was here this summer, and has committed herself to getting better. She has great hands, solid footwork, and solid post moves on the block. I'm excited to watch her develop.

Chris Spencer has a tremendous work ethic. She is a multidimensional player, and she will do whatever we ask of her. Chris is well-conditioned and ready for her freshman season. Both Chris and Caitlin already are great representatives of our program."

You had a change in your coaching staff this year. Talk about what Tasha McDowell brings to the team.

"Tasha McDowell is an amazing addition to our staff. We are blessed to have her part of our Badger family. She has stepped right in and hit the ground running. Tasha is an experienced recruiter and great communicator. She is a well-rounded individual with strong family values.

Tasha has connected very well with our players and staff. We've taken a great step forward, and our recruiting classes are evidence of that."

After two seasons, describe where you are in implementing your coaching system and your philosophy.

"Our first year was getting acclimated to each other. Last year I felt our implementation was visible. Our tempo of the game improved, as well as our ability to press and change defenses. We have the ability to adapt to whomever we're playing. "This season, my offensive schemes will be geared around player personnel. We expect to continue our up-tempo style of play, and taking care of the basketball. Our players are continuing to become more familiar each year. Our up-tempo offensive style of play is also exciting for fans to watch.

Defensively, we need to improve. Our goal is to be one of the top defensive teams in the conference. Our team is well-conditioned; therefore, our ability to provide pressure on the ball will be a key to our success."

Talk about the schedule.

"I'm excited about our schedule. Our trip to Hawaii will be very special. We're traveling with the (UW) football team; which

is amazing. It shows the family atmosphere we have at Wisconsin, and the comradery we have with Barry Alvarez and his staff. The trip will be a team building experience. It is an opportunity to see another part of the country together, and in this case, cheer on the football team as well. Our non-conference schedule is very competitive and will provide this team great preparation for the rigors of the Big Ten Conference season.

The Big Ten Conference certainly demonstrated its strength in the post season last year, and flexed its muscle in the NCAA tournament and in the WNIT. It's a great inspiration for me to see Michigan State play for a national championship. Our league prepares us to take our program to the next level because we play against some of the best teams in the entire country."

What about academic support for student-athletes?

"Words cannot express enough how important Mary Weaver-Klees, David Harris, Doug Tiedt, and Nancy Gatyas are to the success to our program. In my mind, the Fetzer Center is the No. 1 academic center in the country. I am impressed, amazed, thankful, and grateful for the academic services they provide."

WISCONSIN'S RECORD ATTENDANCE

Wisconsin led the Big Ten in cumulative attendance four years, and has ranked among the top 15 in the nation in attendance since 1995. Wisconsin is home to several Big Ten Conference attendance records including the all-time best average with 10,455/game in 1998. UW set a league record with an average of 12,274 attending Big Ten games that same year.








Badger Coach Lisa Stone



A Wisconsin native from nearby Oregon, Lisa Stone began her career with the Badger program in April, 2003. She came to Wisconsin from Drake University where she served as head coach three years, taking the Bulldogs to the 2002 NCAA Championship Sweet 16.

A proven winner in four different programs, Stone began her tenure with the Badgers with an 18-year career collegiate record of 375-118 (.761) which ranked ninth in overall



winning percentage among active Division I coaches.

Stone had the first losing season of her coaching career in 2003-04, as she faced a refurbishing project at Wisconsin. With the addition of just one recruit, she took a team that finished 7-21 in 2003, to a 10-17 record in that first year.

Armed with five new recruits, an insatiable energy and desire to succeed, her second season with the Badgers brought a team that had the best record at UW since 2002.

Equally important to Stone is having student-athletes who are accomplished in the classroom as well as winning on the court. Stone's 2004 Badger team boasted seven Academic All-Big Ten honorees and the team had a cumulative grade point average of over 3.0. The 2005 team had four Academic All-Big Ten honorees.

Her team's academic record at Drake included the 2001 team which ranked sixth nationally, and her 2002 team which ranked 15th nationally in the Women's Basketball Coaches Association's Academic Top 25.

Stone's basketball record at Drake was also successful posting a 64-27 (.703) record in three years. With a 25-8 record, her 2002 team had the best record and the highest national ranking (20th) at the school in 20 years. Drake was 23-7 in Stone's first season before bowing out in the first round of the NCAA tournament.

Recognition for her coaching success came in 2002 with an invitation to join USA Basketball as an assistant coach to Marsha Sharp of Texas Tech. Team USA won the gold medal at the 2002 World Championships for Young Women Qualifying Tournament in Ribeirao Preto, Brazil.

Prior to Drake University, Stone built one of the top NCAA Division III programs in the nation at UW-Eau Claire. The two-time Division III national coach of the year and five-time Wisconsin Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (WIAC) coach of the year, took a program that had only one winning season in its history, and guided 11 squads to 20-win seasons and 11 appearances in the NCAA Division III tournament. She compiled a 277-59 (.824) record in her



12 seasons, which ranks second all-time for most wins in the league's history.

In each of Stone's last nine seasons at UW-Eau Claire, the Blugolds won at least 22 games and never lost more than six. UW-Eau Claire completed its best season in 1999-2000, winning its first 28 games before falling in the Division III NCAA Sweet 16 to the eventual national champion.





Stone began her coaching career at Cornell College (Mt. Vernon, Iowa) where she had a 34-32 record in three years as head coach from 1985-88. At 23, she was the youngest four-year college coach in the nation when she led the Rams to three consecutive Southern Division titles in the Midwest Conference.

As a player, Stone (then Lisa Anderson) earned four letters each in tennis, basketball and track during her high school career. She led the Class A Oregon Panthers to the Wisconsin state basketball tournament in 1979 and 1980, earning first-team all-state honors as a senior and second-team recognition as a junior.

She played her collegiate ball at the University of Iowa from 1980-84, where she earned her bachelor's degree in 1984. She added a master's

degree in athletic administration from Iowa in 1986. At Iowa, Stone played for one of the country's outstanding coaches in C. Vivian Stringer. She was a four-year standout at point guard, scoring 1,129 points which ranks 14th in Iowa history.

Stone is tied for seventh on Iowa's career steals chart with 177, ranks seventh in career assists (322) and 23rd in career rebounds (331). She also owns a share of the Hawkeye record for steals in a game (nine). Three times Stone served as Iowa's captain and twice was the Hawkeyes' MVP. She won the 1984 Big Ten Medal of Honor recognizing her as one of the top scholar-athletes in the conference.

Stone and her husband Ed, a certified public accountant, are the parents of Allison (13) and Tyler (10).





Assistant coach Donna Freitag returned to Madison in 2003 after coaching positions at Bradley University and Drake University. A native of Oregon, Wis., and lifelong friend of head coach Lisa Stone, Freitag began her basketball coaching career at the University of Wisconsin serving as an assistant women's coach from

1986-94. She followed Stone to Wisconsin after three years as the associate head coach at Drake University.

Freitag, a former head coach and assistant coach at Bradley University in Peoria, Ill., serves as a co-recruiting coordinator and post coach at Wisconsin. She also is instrumental in scouting opponents.



Donna Freitag and head coach Lisa Stone have been lifelong friends and were basketball teammates in both high school and college. They were reunited on the hardwood as coaches at Drake University and now at Wisconsin.

Taking over the Braves program in 1996, after two years as an assistant coach, Freitag compiled a 37-69 record during four seasons as Bradley's head coach. In her initial campaign in 1996-97, the Braves won seven consecutive games, finished fourth in the MVC and won the school's first-ever MVC tournament game by upsetting perennial power Southwest Missouri State.

Prior to her stint at Bradley, Freitag spent eight seasons (1986-94) as an assistant coach for the Badgers. While at Wisconsin, Freitag was an integral part of a rebuilding process that turned a struggling Wisconsin program into a nationally recognized team that received its first bid to the NCAA tournament in 1992.

Freitag grew up in the same neighborhood as Stone, and the two played high school and college basketball together. Both Stone and Freitag were members of Oregon's state qualifying team in 1979. Freitag earned first-team all-conference honors and was the team MVP that year.

Freitag again joined Stone for her final two seasons at the University of Iowa after earning first team all-conference and MVP honors in her first two years at UW-Platteville. At Iowa, Freitag was named the Hawkeyes' team captain and most valuable player during her senior season in 1982-83. She went on to play two seasons of professional basketball for Team Tivoli in Dublin, Ireland, from 1983-85.








Stephanie Schmitz, Assistant Coach

Sports Medicine Karen Bloch

Karen Bloch became a staff athletic trainer at Wisconsin in 2003. This will be her first season with UW women's basket-

ball after serving as the primary person for women's softball and soccer.

As the staff trainer for basketball, tennis and spirit squad, she provides evaluation, treatment, and rehabilitation of athletes' injuries. Other daily duties include coverage of physician clinics, supervision of the athletic training room, and passive education.

In 1998, she received her Bachelor's of Science degree in Physical Education-emphasis in Athletic Training from Western Illinois University where she was on the Dean's List and an All-American Scholar. She was a two-year basketball letter-winner (1995-97) at WIU serving as team captain in 1997. She was an All-Academic Mid-Continent Conference, First Team honoree two years. She also played two years at Danville Community College (1993-95).

After completing an internship with women's soccer at the University of Minnesota in the fall of 1998, she became a temporary assistant athletic trainer for track and field.

In the fall of 1999, she pursued her Masters of Science degree in Health and Human Performance at Oklahoma State University where she worked with softball and football. During the

summers of 2000 and 2001, she was also one of the athletic trainers for the Women's Professional Softball league in Florida. She also worked with the USA National Softball team in 2001.

Prior to taking the position at Wisconsin, she worked at the United States Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs as a one-year Athletic Training Fellow. In 2004 she was invited by the USOC to provide sports medicine coverage on a 17-day road trip to Germany for USA Bobsled team at the 2004 World Cup. Responsibilities included emergency triage and daily restorative treatments for elite, Olympic athletes.


Bloch holds certification with the National Athletic Trainers Association and the National Strength and Conditioning Association. She also owns her own business, Key Concepts, which specializes in sports enhancement and injury prevention.

Bloch's Philosophy

Too many athletes practice poor technique without the benefit of proper con-

ditioning and biomechanical advice. Years of repetition using these poor techniques can create long-term physical damage for these athletes and limit their ability to improve their skills or continue participation at the next level. It is my philosophy to educate athletes, parents and coaches about the optimal way to improve performance and decrease risk of injury due to the physical stresses of training.

Bloch's Keys to Injury Prevention

- To improve sport performance through education and the reinforcement of specific aspects of biomechanics, core strength, balance, and stretching techniques.
- To provide recommendations for injury prevention through comprehensive, full-body training, emphasis of proper sport techniques, and use of preventative equipment.
- To educate parents and coaches as an important factor in maintaining an athlete's skill and interest in their sport.
- To provide recommendations for stretching, strengthening, and proper technique based on the most current research.



The Kohl Center has been the home of UW basketball and hockey since January of 1998. In 2004, a state-of-the-art video scoreboard and ring beam were added enhancing the game atmosphere even more.

From its opening in January of 1998, the Kohl Center has become the happy home for the UW basketball and hockey programs. From lounge areas to lockers and training areas, the Kohl Center provides a competitive floor, practice and study areas for the student-athletes. The coaching offices are also located at the Kohl Center.

Major Benefactors

The building is named for U.S. Sen. Herb Kohl (D-Wisconsin), a 1956 graduate of the UW-Madison, who donated \$25 million to the project. Kohl's gift is the single largest private donation in University history.

Former all-Big Ten basketball player Albert "Ab" Nicholas and his wife, Nancy Johnson Nicholas, pledged \$10 million toward the project. The facility's practice gymnasium is named the Nicholas-Johnson Pavilion and Plaza. Nicholas received his B.S. and M.B.A. degrees from the UW-Madison.

The Kellner family—Jack F. and his sons, Ted and Jack W. of Milwaukee—gave \$2.5 million. All three Kellners received degrees from the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Seating Capacity

The Kohl Center seats 17,142 for basketball. That figure includes 7,500 seats in

the lower seating bowl and 4,500 in each of the two balconies. The unique design of the Kohl Center (with two overhanging balconies) guarantees that all fans will be close to the playing floor with excellent site lines. The facility seats approximately 14,000 for hockey, and between 15,000 and 17,000 for concerts.

Practice Pavilion

The Nicholas-Johnson Pavilion houses three full-size basketball courts to be used for basketball practice sessions when the Kohl Center main floor is booked for other events.

The area is naturally lit, and has its own restrooms and loading dock. It can be set with a stage and often is utilized for pre-event functions, luncheons, and other large-group gatherings.

Locker Areas

The Kohl Center includes lockers for UW men's and women's basketball and hockey. Four other locker rooms are also available for multiple teams attending the WIAA state tournaments also held in the arena.

The 2,200 square-foot, state-of-the-art locker areas have been designed with the needs of student-athletes in mind including team organizational meetings, an athletes' social area, and study carrels. The athletes have a lounge area with sound system, video room, and, of course, a spacious dressing and shower area complete with multiple outlets and lighted mirrors.

Check List of Team and Fan Amenities

- For the student-athletes: huge locker rooms that include attached lounges, video/meeting rooms, and study areas with practice facility attached.
- For the coaches: spacious offices with westward views of the campus including the Field House and Camp Randall Stadium.
- For the support areas: sports medicine, sports information, concessions/catering, and physical plant have ample and convenient work areas. The UW ticket office is also located in the Kohl Center.
- For the fans and suites: a state-of-the-art sound system has been implemented in the Kohl Center and TV monitors are wired to the suites and above concession stands throughout the building. A new video-replay scoreboard and exciting ring beam were added in 2004.
- For the fans: extra-wide concourses (two), a number of food courts on both levels, numerous restrooms and merchandise outlets.
- Also for the fans: the cantilever design replicates the overhang effect of the Field House without the obstructions. Site lines are tremendous from every seat.

At center court, you can look up at three ascending, cheering spectator areas—an awesome and intimidating sight for the opponents.




The coaching offices (top right), are located on the second floor of the Kohl Center, and the locker areas (above) are spacious and state-of-the-art.

Strength and Conditioning Coach Bryan Miller



Bryan Miller returns for his second year as the strength and conditioning coach for the Badger Women's Basketball Team.

Miller was born and raised in Chicago, Ill., where he graduated with a degree in marketing from North Park University in 1999. He was captain of the football team and competed as a powerlifter in the squat, bench, and deadlift.

Following college, Miller accepted an internship at Northwestern University, where he worked directly with the football and men's basketball teams. Miller also served as the head strength and conditioning coach at North Park University and the wide receivers coach for the football team.

Miller became the assistant strength and conditioning coach at Northern Illinois University in 2000, where he worked with its football, men's basketball, volleyball and softball teams. During his four-year tenure at Northern Illinois, Miller completed his master's degree in exercise physiology as well as contributed to several published training articles.

During the summer, from 2001-04, Miller worked as an intern for the Chicago Bulls of the NBA. While with the Chicago Bulls, Miller had the opportunity



Strength and Conditioning Association, a Certified Club Coach with United States of America Weightlifting and is a Specialist in Sports Conditioning with the International Sports Science Association.

Miller's Philosophy

Miller's personal strength and conditioning philosophy consists of implementing science-based training principles that focus on athlete and position-specific sport requirements. His comprehensive year-round training program physically and mentally prepares each athlete for the basketball season and focuses on force application, force absorption, neuromuscular control, injury prevention and power development.



Strength and conditioning coach Bryan Miller believes, "As the level of athlete continues to evolve, so must their training. Catering to an athlete's strengths and weaknesses is crucial for giving the individual an opportunity to reach his or her athletic potential."

The University of Wisconsin is a world-class university, nationally and internationally recognized for its academic excellence, incredible students, inspiring faculty, exceptional value, and an amazing campus and community.

The UW was founded in 1848 with the first class of 17 students enrolling on Feb. 5, 1849. Today, Wisconsin ranks as the nation's ninth largest university with 41,169 students.

On a single campus, students can find a complete spectrum of liberal arts studies, professional programs and student activities. As one of the nation's first land-grant universities, Wisconsin maintains a strong research emphasis in agricultural and life sciences. Award-winning research spanning the academic disciplines, however, has earned Wisconsin a place among the world's elite institutions of higher education. The quality of its undergraduate, graduate and research programs is recognized around the world.

The flagship school of the state system, UW-Madison offers the only public schools of law, medicine and veterinary medicine in the state and is one of only two state-supported schools to offer doctoral degrees.

One of the most picturesque college campuses in the country, Wisconsin sits along the shore of beautiful Lake Mendota. The city of Madison and the University were designed to be linked, signifying the interrelated nature of academic and political life at Wisconsin.


Growing with the times to meet changing needs in education and research has kept the university great. With an eye to the future, the university continues to change, guaranteeing a community and environment where true learning can take place.







Chancellor John D. Wiley

Chancellor John D. Wiley has worked to amplify the Wisconsin Idea and build on the research and teaching strengths that have made the University of Wisconsin so rich in accomplishment and tradition.


Since being named as the UW-Madison's 27th chancellor on Jan. 1, 2001, Wiley has aimed to enhance the university's role in creating a new, more viable economic future for Wisconsin while opening avenues to innovation and learning.

Wiley has presided over unprecedented growth on the west side of campus, which is being transformed into one of the nation's great health-sciences centers.

He also has mapped an east side redevelopment that will create a vibrant arts-and-humanities district to anchor the lower State Street area.

The chancellor has been a leader in efforts to expand on-campus student housing to meet demand, stem high-risk drinking and integrate athletics into the mainstream of university life. Wiley has reached out to the private sector by creating the Office of Corporate Relations to serve the increasing needs of the business community and help to build a more prosperous Wisconsin economy.

Wiley received his bachelor's degree in physics from Indiana University in 1964; attended graduate school at UW-Madison as an NSF Fellow and received master's and doctoral degrees in physics in 1965 and 1968, respectively.



Athletic Director Barry Alvarez


Barry Alvarez is in his second year as the only person among Bowl Championship Series schools serving in the dual role of Director of Athletics and Head Football Coach. The Badger football coach since 1990, he is in his second campaign as athletic director.

Alvarez has been at the forefront of the revival of the Badger athletic program during his entire tenure in Madison. He has guided Wisconsin to three Big Ten and Rose Bowl titles (including back-to-back in 1998-99) en route to becoming the winningest football coach in school history (108-70-4 record).

His 7-3 (.700) record in bowl games with the Badgers is among the best in college football history. The 1993 national coach of the year, he is a two-time (1993 and 1998) Big Ten coach of the year and was a finalist for ESPN's coach of the decade (1990s) honor.

Alvarez is a 1969 graduate of the University of Nebraska, where he played linebacker and went on to earn his master's degree. He received a Distinguished Alumnus Award from his alma mater in 2003.

Alvarez and his wife, Cindy, are the parents of three grown children: daughters Dawn (Mrs. Brad Ferguson) and Stacy (Mrs. Mike Delzer); and son Chad (wife Stephanie). Barry and Cindy are grandparents to Joe and Jake Ferguson, and Grace and Jackson Delzer.

NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS



Since 1993, the UW has hosted five NCAA championships and an NCAA men's basketball regional. Wisconsin will add another national championship when hockey returns to the Badger state in 2006. Madison will also be the site of a hockey regional in 2008.

The Badgers played host to the NCAA Men's Ice Hockey championship in 1993 and 1997. The 1993 event sold out in three months, the fastest sell-out in NCAA hockey history.

Wisconsin played host to the NCAA Women's Volleyball Championship in 1993 and 1998. The Badgers shattered the attendance records for the championship match and two-day event both years.

The UW was also the site of the 1998 NCAA Division I Women's Golf Championship. The event was the first national championship held at University Ridge Golf Course and the first women's championship shown live on national television.

The NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament came to Wisconsin in 2002 when the Badgers played host to a regional in the Kohl Center.

Badger Nickname

The nickname "Badgers" was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin, which was dubbed the "Badger State." The name didn't come from the animals in the region, but rather from an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

In 1949, a student wore a badger outfit with a papier-mâché head at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name—Buckingham U. Badger.

Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. The song has become legendary at the UW because of its polka-like rhythm.

Fifth Quarter

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as it plays traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song.

On, Wisconsin

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

Hall of Fame

The UW Athletic Hall of Fame was established in 1991 to recognize and honor former student-athletes and staff for their exemplary athletic achievement and contributions to the University of Wisconsin Athletic Department.

Badgers in the Community

The Madison community is extremely supportive of the University of Wisconsin athletic teams and its many student-athletes. In return for that support, many student-athletes and staff members take time out of their busy schedules to show their appreciation and involvement in the city of Madison and Dane County through their community service efforts.

Volunteering allows student-athletes to have a positive and meaningful impact on the Madison community. Whether it is building home with Habitat for Humanity, visiting sick children at local hospitals, being a mentor as part of Big Brothers, Big Sisters or reading to grade school children with the Bookin' it with Bucky, UW student-athletes make a difference.

Student-athletes are encouraged to assist with community service projects all year long. The student-athlete in each sport who donates the most hours to community service during the year is recognized with the community service award.

The athletic department also donates a number of tickets and memorabilia to local charities for fund-raising purposes.





Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center


The Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Center has been helping Wisconsin student-athletes to achieve their academic goals since 1997.

The 15,000-square-foot, state-of-the-art facility serves the needs of all student-athletes. The center features an open area with carrels that can accommodate up to 30 students. There are eight study rooms of different shapes and sizes, including a 55-seat auditorium. A state-of-the-art computer lab, under coordinator Jim Eisenmann, is networked to allow access to email, the library system's electronic catalog and the web while the entire center is wired with voice/data jacks and power ports.

Associate Athletic Director David Harris supervises a staff of five advisors, four learning specialists, a life skills coordinator and a tutor coordinator who conduct the academic services offered to the more than 700 student-athletes. The advising staff of Tom Browne, Chris Butler, Jerry Darda, Mary Weaver-Klees and Alan Zussman as well as tutorial coordinator Jill Hadfield work along with learning specialists Doug Tiedt (assistant director), Dan Ott, Toni O'Keefe and Nancy Gatyas to render quality academic and personal support to student-athletes and assist coaches in providing the best possible collegiate experience. The staff, including program assistant Nancy Kreklow, has a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all university departments. Study groups, tutors and a variety of academic and career planning are available throughout the year.

Student-athletes can drop in before practice or between classes to study or meet with the advisors and learning specialists whose offices are located in the center. Sessions are offered on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the student-athlete. Athletes are degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The staff takes a personal approach to each student-athlete in determining his or her individual needs, personal or academic.

Student-athletes at Wisconsin receive recognition for outstanding academics in a number of ways on the national, conference and university level. The annual Student-Athlete Academic banquet recognizes student-athletes off the field of play.



The Fetzer Student-Athlete Academic Services Center, a state-of-the-art facility located in the lower level of the McClain Center, opened in 1997. The \$2.1 million center is one of the best in the nation and includes eight study rooms, a computer room, and a 55-seat auditorium.

CHAMPS LIFE SKILLS PROGRAM

The University of Wisconsin CHAMPS (Challenging Athletes Minds for Personal Success) is a total development program that uses athletics as a preparation for success in life. Under the direction of Kelli Richards, the CHAMPS program provides support and opportunities for student-athletes in the following areas:

To support the academic progress of the student-athlete toward intellectual development and graduation.

Athletic Excellence

To build philosophical foundations for the development of athletic programs that are broad-based, equitable and dedicated to the well-being of the student-athlete.

Personal Development

To support the development of a well-balanced lifestyle for student-athletes, encouraging emotional well-being, personal growth and decision-making skills.

Career Development

To encourage the student-athlete to develop and pursue career and life goals.

Service

To engage the student-athlete in service to his or her campus and surrounding communities.

Endowed Athletic Scholarships

Sports Medicine

The sports medicine staff provides all University of Wisconsin student-athletes with high quality health care.

Wisconsin's Sports Medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

The sports medicine staff consists of team physicians, dentists, athletic trainers, and a full-time nutritionist. The day-to-day care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Badger athletes is supervised by a staff of 12 full-time and two graduate assistant National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA) certified and State of Wisconsin licensed athletic trainers.


Under the direction of head athletic trainer Dennis Helwig, the Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Full-time athletic trainers Karen Bloch, Beth Cranley, Chuck Hart, Andy Hrodey, Laura King, Mike Moll, Clark Pearson, Henry Perez-Guerra, Kristen Walker, and Ian Wood as well as graduate assistant trainers Holli Schaible and Nicole Gehrich utilize functional measures, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve flexibility.

Full-time nutritionist Jeremy Isensee provides dietary analysis and supervises training table meals to enhance the performance of the student-athletes.


The Sports Medicine facility in the McClain Center features an extensive collection of therapeutic and rehabilitation equipment including a 50-foot, two-lane-rehabilitation pool and an on-site x-ray facility. Considered one of the nation's finest, the McClain Sports Medicine Center offers an environment conducive to expedient care and a healthy return to competition.

Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affiliated with the world-renowned UW Hospital and Clinics. Medical director Dr. Ben Graf, an orthopedic surgeon, is responsible for all services provided to student-athletes. Orthopedic care is also provided by team physician Dr. John Orwin and Dr. Lee Kaplan. General medical care is directed by the head of primary care, Dr. Greg Landry, and he is joined by Dr. David Berhardt, and Dr. Kathleen Carr.

In addition to the headquarters in the McClain Athletic Facility, auxiliary athletic training rooms are located in Camp Randall Stadium, Natatorium, UW Field House, and the Kohl Center. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus.

Strength & Conditioning

The Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a key component in all of the Badger teams' success on the playing field. The program's goal is to increase the overall performance of each student-athlete, prevent injuries and help athletes reach their potential.


Strength and conditioning coordinator John Dettmann along with assistants Brian Bott, Ben Herbert, Scott Hettenbach, Bryan Miller, Mike Potenza and Greg Young work with the UW coaches to develop training programs to enhance each athlete's performance.

Badger athletes work on their strength programs in weight rooms in the McClain Center, Kohl Center and Camp Randall Stadium.

The McClain Center weight room is the largest of the facilities and features more than 45,000 pounds of free weights and more than 50 weight machines. The room has seven squat racks, eight bench press stations, eight flat-to-incline benches, six Olympic lift platforms and numerous other free weight stations.

The Kohl Center weight room is equipped with five custom-built free weight power platforms and 4,000 pounds of free weights. The room has nine pieces of cardiovascular equipment and three Vertimax jump trainers.

The Badger Den has five power stations with each station consisting of a platform for Olympic style lifting as well as a squat rack, bench press, incline bench press, pull-up station and a dip station. There are three lat-pull machines and seated row machines, a complete set of dumbbells and a complete set of plyometric boxes.

The Southeast Recreational Facility (shown above) features an indoor long course pool with movable bulkheads.





Huff's Number 21 Is Retired

Theresa Huff, who played at Wisconsin from 1979-83, is the only woman player to have her jersey retired. Although only 5-11, the lithe center/forward became the school's all-time leading scorer and rebounder completing her career with 1,879 points and 1,201 rebounds.

Robin Threatt broke her 11-year-old scoring record with 1,901 points in 1993, and Barb Franke surpassed both Huff and Threatt completing her career with 1,994 points in 1996. But no one has ever reached Huff's incredible 1,201 rebounding mark.

A Milwaukee native, Huff's career spanned the transition period from the AIAW to the NCAA governance. She led Wisconsin to its first post-season appearance reaching the quarterfinals of the 1982 AIAW National Championship. She was a member of the first official Big Ten Conference team in 1981-82. Huff distinguished herself as Wisconsin's first professional woman basketball player and was also the first American chosen to play professionally in Spain in 1983-84. She was inducted into the University of Wisconsin Athletics Hall of Fame in 1998.



2001-02: The Badgers made their sixth NCAA tournament field as the No. 8 seed in the Midwest Region. UW lost to Arizona State, 73-70, in the first round at Nashville, Tenn.

2000-01: The 25th-ranked Badgers made their fifth NCAA tournament field as the No. 7 seed in the East Region. UW was upset in the first round by 10th-seed Missouri, 68-71.


1997-98: The Badger team was appointed the No. 6 seed in the West Regional taking on the 11th-seeded Virginia Tech Hokies. The Hokies upset the 23rd-ranked Badgers in the opener, 64-75.

1995-96: The Badger team tied the highest seed in NCAA bids at sixth in the Mideast Region. The Badgers won the first round game with a 74-60 win over the Pac-10's Oregon, and lost to the host school Vanderbilt, 94-82.

1994-95: The Badgers assumed the No. 10 seed in the Midwest region and won their first-ever NCAA game in a one-point, 73-72 thriller over No. 23 Kansas. The Badgers lost to No. 5 Texas Tech in the subregional final in Lubbock, Texas.

1991-92: The Badgers received their first NCAA bid after a 20-9 season and third-place Big Ten finish (13-5 record). Wisconsin, the sixth seed in the West Region, lost to Montana in the first round in Madison, 74-85.

1981-82: The Badger team qualified for the Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women (AIAW) national tournament losing in the quarterfinals at Texas, and finishing the season with a 21-13 record for the most wins in Badger history (until 1996). Wisconsin won the Midwest AIAW Regional tournament (MAIAW) to advance to the national championship. UW won its first game, 60-59, over Colorado to enter the Elite Eight before losing to host and No. 6 Texas, 61-73.

Big Ten Conference Basketball

One of the premier athletic leagues in the nation, the Big Ten Conference is proud of its leadership in the arena of athletics.

Big Ten women's athletics programs have led the nation in both women's basketball and volleyball attendance. In addition, the league receives more television exposure than any conference in the nation. More than 200 Conference athletic events are televised each year on national and regional networks.

Begun in 1895, the Intercollegiate Conference of Faculty Representatives (popularly known as the Big Ten) has changed little from its original philosophy of faculty control of athletics with emphasis on the student-athlete.

Comprised of 11 institutions in eight states, the conference has long set the national standard for athletics and academics.

Women's athletics programs became affiliated with the conference officially in 1981, although unofficial conference championships had been held among the member institutions since 1972. Penn State became the 11th university to join the conference in 1991.

The Big Ten Conference began its conference basketball tournament to decide the automatic qualifier for the NCAA championship in 1995. Purdue has won six of the last eight titles and became the Big Ten's first NCAA champion in 1999. The Boilermakers were the NCAA runners-up in 2001 and also took



part in the Final Four in 1994. Ohio State and Iowa advanced to the Final Four in 1993. Penn State was a Final Four team in 2000, while Minnesota was a national semifinalist in 2004. Michigan State, who won its first Big Ten tournament in 2005, continued its run in the postseason, and advanced all the way to the national title game but fell to Baylor, 84-62. A Big Ten team has been to the Final Four five of the past seven years.

The league title is based on the final regular season conference standings. All teams play a total of 16 games. Schools play six teams twice and four teams once.

The 2006 Big Ten Conference tournament is set for March 2-6 at Conseco Fieldhouse in Indianapolis. The tournament is a four-day single elimination playoff with all 11 teams participating. The top five seeds, determined by standings, receive a first-round bye. The other six teams play each other in the first round, with the winners participating in the quarterfinal round on Friday.

The winner will receive the conference's automatic bid to the NCAA tournament.
