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REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS

Madison, Wisconsin

Wednesday, March 11, 1936

The meeting was called to order at 9:25 A.M., President Wilkie presiding

PRESENT: President Frank; Regents Backus, Baker, Brown, Callahan, Christopherson, Combs, Gates, Grady, Gundersen, Hones, Mead, Miller, Richards, Runge, Wilkie.

ABSENT: None.

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President Wilkie read the recommendations of the Committee of the Whole, passed on March 10. Action was then taken, as follows:

1. V That an opinion be requested of the Attorney General as to the legality of paying employees in the classified service salaries below the minimum prescribed by the Bureau of Personnel, by temporary waiver.

By called vote the recommendation was adopted, all Regents present voting and voting "Aye".

2. That the recommendations of the President be approved, except No. 9 in Letters and Science, which is a recommendation for the transfer of two salaries from the Theatre Revolving Fund to 1-A. Science, bb .3 4 17

Called vote was taken, all Regents present voting and voting "Aye". Regent Grady, who was not present at the time of the roll call, had stated at the meeting of the Committee of the Whole that he wished to be recorded as voting "No" on recommendation No. 9 in Letters and Science.

A RESOLUTION EXTENDING THE TIME FOR COMPLETING THE CARILLON AND APPURTENANCES CONTRACT ON PWA PROJECT NO. 8855

WHEREAS, The Regents of the University of Wisconsin (hereinafter referred to as "Owner") and Gillett and Johnston, Ltd. (hereinafter referred to as "Contractor") have entered into a contract for the performance of certain work, let in accordance with the terms of an offer made by the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works, on behalf of the United States Government, to aid in financing the construction of a project known as PWA Docket 8855, Carillon and Appurtenances.

WHEREAS, it is provided in the said contract that, in the event the said work is not completed by the 1st day of March, 1936, the said Contractor shall, as liquidated damages, be liable to the said Owner in a total amount computed on the basis of \$25.00 for each day the said work remains uncompleted after the aforesaid date; and

WHEREAS, for the reasons hereinafter enumerated, it has become impossible for the Contractor to perform the said contract within the contractual date for completion; viz.,

> Severe winter weather that delayed the transportation of the carillon and appurtenances from the Foundry to Madison, and also delayed the installation in the tower. These conditions were beyond the control of the contractor.

Resolved, (1) That faculty control as referred to in the Conference Rules includes the reviewing power of the Board of Regents, but involves a primary jurisdiction in a faculty committee or board in respect to intercellegiate athletics.

(2) That the recent action of the Board of Regents as to personnel in the department involved the exercise of this reviewing power of the Board of Regents, and that the action of the Regents did not violate any rule of faculty control as expressed in the rules of the Conference or the rules and regulations of this University. (3) The Regents recommend to the faculty that the Athletic Board be reconstituted so as to be chosen as follows: 4 members chosen from the faculty by the President of the University in conjunction with the University Committee, 2 alumni members chosen by the President from a panel of 6 nominees presented by the Alumni Association, and 1 student who shall be the President of the Student Athletic Board; such appointments being subject to confirmation by the Board of Regents.

(4) That in the administration of the affairs of the Department of Intercollegiate Athletics, including matters of budget and personnel, the power to initiate action is lodged in such Athletic Board.

(5) The power to initiate action in matters of budget and personnel is the power to nominate and recommend to the President. If these recommendations are approved by the President they are subject to veto or acceptance by the Board of Regents as in the administration of all other departments of the University.

(6) The power to initiate an action after being exercised by the Athletic Board does not lapse in the event that the recommended action fails to receive the approval of the Board of Regents but reverts to the Athletic Board for further consideration and recommendation subject to the right and obligation of the Board of Regents to act or modify action where there is an emergency and the necessities of good administration require such action.

We are advised the above action has the concurrence of the faculty committee on conference with Regents and will be recommended to the faculty for approval.

To facilitate action, the Executive Committee of Com to act the Regents is hereby authorized to act upon any appointments a appointment to the newly constituted Athletic Board. New alt.

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In cases where a class is discontinued or the meeting day of the class is changed after a student has registered, the entire amount of the fees paid will be refunded upon the written application of the student.

All applications for refunds must be made in writing.

The late registration fee and the additional fee for deferred payments are not refundable. Applications for cash refunds not covered by the first paragraph must be made before noon of the third Saturday following the beginning of the class; a registration fee of 20% will be retained from each class fee.

A student withdrawing who notifies the office in writing during the period from the fourth to the sixth week inclusive after the beginning of the class will receive a credit memorandum card covering a fraction of the fee paid, according to the following schedule:

Fourth	ı Week	- 75%
Fifth	Week	- 70%
Sixth	Week	- 65%

This card is not transferable except to a member of the immediate family of the person to whom it is issued and may be applied on a future enrollment provided it is used within two years from the date of issue.

The business office of the Milwaukee Center may in unusual cases extend the period indicated above for the granting of credit cards in instances where the student withdrew before the end of the sixth week of school but failed, for some unavoidable reason, to make application for a credit refund until after the end of the six-week period.

#### AS Milwaukee Day Classes

Partial refunds to students withdrawing from the day classes are made upon the following basis if written notice is given at the time of withdrawal: Within two weeks from the first day of instruction, 80% refund; within four weeks, 60%; within six weeks, 40%; within eight weeks, 20%; after eight weeks, no refund.

#### Correspondence Instruction

No fee is refunded because a student cannot begin or carry on a course for which he has once registered. If an application for instruction is rejected, the full amount of the fee is returned.

A student may transfer from one course to another or transfer his course to a member of his immediate family. For lessons completed before the transfer is made, seventy cents per lesson is charged residents of Wisconsin and one dollar per lesson is charged non-residents of Wisconsin.

#### Class Instruction

No refunds are made after the third meeting of the class. The full amount of the fee is refunded if withdrawal is made before the close of the third meeting.

No refunds are made for rental of books after the third meeting of the class. The Secretary presented the following recommendations:

That upon recommendation of Dean Holt the Student Loan Fund for the Milwaukee Center of the Extension Division, accepted by the Regents August 2, 1933, be transferred for administration at Milwaukee by a committee there to be named by the Dean; that the two unpaid notes

That not to exceed \$50.00 of the funds in the Tripp Estate 5. be made available to the Arboretum Committee for the purchase of grain for the feeding stations and for minor repairs.
