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SPECIAL MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS

Madison, Wisconsin

Monday. August 30, 1943, 1:30 P.M.

President Hodgkins presiding

The meeting was called to receive and act on report of Personnel Committee and for transaction of such other business as may come before the meeting.

At the opening of the session, upon motion of Regent Sensenbrenner,

seconded by Regent Callahan, it was

VOTED, That the Regents go into Executive session. The President of the University, the Comptroller, the Secretary, stenographer and members of the press withdrew from the room.

The Regents reconvened at 2:40 P.M.

Roll call was taken.

PRLSENT: Regents Callahan, Campbell, Cleary, Glover, Grady, Hodgkins, Holmes, Kleczka. Sensenbrenner, Werner. All Regents present.

Regent Werner, Chairman of the Personnel Committee, read the following report of the Committee on the appointment of a successor to Dean Chris L. Christensen, Dean of the College of Agriculture:

> "To the honorable, the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin Gentlemen:

Your committee on Personnel, to whom was referred the task of searching for someone whom we might recommend to this board for appointment as Dean of the College of Agriculture, in the place of Dean Chris L. Christenson, resigned, bog leave to report as follows:

We have given the matter our most careful consideration and study and we realize fully the tremendous importance which this position holds, not only in the relation of the College of Agriculture to the University, but also, and more especially in the relation of the

College of Agriculture and the entire University to the State at large.

We have had the benefit of the counsel and advice of some of the leading agriculturalists, and farm organizations of the State and the nation in our study and investigation of the many names that were submitted to us for our consideration.

We are very pleased to report that after a very thorough and complete canvas of the country, we are able to recommend for your consideration, a man from our own campus. A man eminently qualified, in every particular, for this very important position. It is not necessary to dwell at length on his many qualifications for the reason that he is well known to all of you, as the Dean of our Graduate School. We hereby recommend for appointment as Dean of the College of Agriculture and Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station and Agricultural Extension Service of the University of Wisconsin, the Honorable Edwin B. Fred.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the report be approved that Edwin B. Fred be appointed Dean of the College of Agriculture and Director of the Agricultural Experiment Station and Agricultural Extension Service, the appointment to become offective September 1, 1943. A called vote was taken. All Regents present voting and voting aye.

Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Kleczka. it was VOTED, That the salary of Edwin B. Rred, the new Dean of the College of Agriculture, be \$8,000 per annum, 12 months basis, plus the use of the house and other perquisites that Dean Christenson had.

Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the special meeting of the Board held in Milwaukee on July 31, 1943 be approved as sent out to the Regents.

c) \$1,600.00 - Wilson & Company, Inc., Chicago, Allinois, for the renewal of an industrial fellowship in biochemistry to study the effects of processing upon the nutritive value of meat and meat by-products, 12 months beginning September 1, 1943, under the supervision of Dr. C. A. Elvehjem, and that the Comptroller be authorized to sign the agreement.

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(d) \$2,800.00 - A. E. Staley Manufacturing Company, Decatur, Illinois, for the establishment of an industrial fellowship in biochemistry to study the nutritive qualities of soybean meal, for two years beginning September 1, 1943, under the supervision of Professor P. H. Phillips, and that the Comptroller be authorized to sign the agreement.

(c) \$ 525.00 - Amendment to agreement between Pineapple Research
Institute of Hawaii and the University, covering an
addition to the industrial fellowship in home economics for research on pineapples, and that the Comptroller be authorized to sign the agreement.

(f) \$ 750.00 - DuPont deNemours & Company, Wilmington, Delaware, for the continuation of the DuPont postgraduate fellowship for the academic year 1943-44.

(g) \$2,500.00 - Kellogg Foundation, Battle Creek, Michigan, addition to the loan fund established by this Foundation for students in the School of Medicine.

(h) \$1,200.00 - The Upjoin Company, Kalamazoo, Michigan, for the continuation of research on trichomonas infections, in the Dopartment of Pharmacology, for one year beginning July 1, 1943, under the direction of Dr. A. L. Tatum.

(i) \$ 100.00 - Madison Drug Company, Madison, Wisconsin, for a scholarship for a needy freshman in the School of Pharmacy for the year 1943-44.

(j) \$ 300.00 - Oscar Rennebohm, Madison, Wisconsin, for the renewal of two scholarships of \$100 each, and an additional \$100 for a third scholarship, in the School of Pharmacy for the academic year 1943-44.

(k) \$ 100.00 - Douglas E. Hunt, Wautoma, and Raymond Langmack, Beaver Dam, for a scholarship in pharmacy, to be awarded to a needy freshman for the academic year 1943-44.

(1) \$3,500.00 - National Committee on Maternal Health, New York City, for the continuation of research studies on maternal health in the departments of medicine, urology and biochemistry for the fiscal year 1943-44, and that the Comptroller be authorized to sign the agreement.

Adopted.

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Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Werner, it was VOTED, That recommendation No. 1 under Education, recommendation No. 1 under Dean of Men, and Recommendation No. 1 (a) to (1) under Gifts and Grants be approved.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Sensenbrenner, it was VOTED. That the President be authorized to notify Dean Edwin B. Fred of his election by telegram.

Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Werner, it was VOTED, That the actions taken by the President since the June 26, 1943 meeting of the Board of Regents be approved and made a part of the records of this moeting.

President Dykstra discussed the matter of establishment of University work in Occupational Therapy and stated that it was to be presented to the Faculty this afternoon for approval. It seemed to be the sense of the Regents that this work was desirable and would be approved by the Regents if presented with Faculty approval.

The President stated that the Committee on Post-War Planning of the Legislature is now conducting hearings on plans for post-war new construction and that Senator Freehoff had suggested that a meeting be held soon with University representatives. It is understood that the Constructional Development Committee of the Regents and University administrative officers are authorized to meet with the Legislative Committee.

Upon recommendation of President Dykstra, and upon motion of Regent

Callahan, seconded by Regent Werner, it was

VOTED. That the appointment of Randall C. Swanson, extension specialist in farm safety, be approved, salary to be \$4,200 per annum on the 12 months' basis, beginning September 1, 1943, charge to \$10,000 allotment appropriated by the 1943 Legisla ture and approved by the Rogents July 31. 1943.

Upon recommendation of President Dykstra and upon motion of Regent Werner.

seconded by Regent Cleary, it was

VOTED. That the salary of J. J. Lacey, professor of animal husbandry, be adjusted for the academic year 1943-44 from \$4,450 to \$4,800, charge \$350 to item for Bliss, p. 100, fund 15AR, and \$4,450 to item for Lacey, p. 106, fund 15AE.

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President Dykstra referred to a communication from Dr. Stephen Duggan relating to Exchange Students. Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Werner, it was

VOTED, That this matter, plus the general question of scholarship sti-

pends, be referred to the Committee on Education to report to the Board.

(NOTE: Mr. Duggan's letter intimates that there will be sixteen Exchange Students, one for each institution participating.)

Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Grady, it was VOTED, That congratulatory messages be sent to Harry Stuhldreher, Ray Dvorak, Pat Harder and Tom Ferris regarding their participation in the ALA Star Game in Chicago on August 25, 1943.

Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Cleary, it was VOTED, That the President of the Board appoint a committee to prepare a resolution with reference to Miss Julia M. Wilkinson, Secretary to the President of the University, who died August 9, 1943.

The Secretary filed a letter from Albert Wilkinson McCurdy, thanking the Regents for the floral tribute sent to Miss Wilkinson's funeral.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE COMPTROLLER

The Comptroller reported that a communication had been received from the Army Air Forces stating that pre-meteorology courses would be terminated at the end of the present sessions. It is understood that this applies to 275 students in pre-meteorology B who will finish their work on September 18, and 152 students in pre-meteorology C who will finish their work in May, 1944.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Cleary, it was VOTED, That the State Personnel Board and the Emergency Board be requested to approve the following salary increases effective September 1, 1943 for civil service employees at the University whose names were inadvertently omitted from the list of salary increases filed with the Personnel Board on July 14, 1943.

Upon motion of Regent Glover, seconded by Regent Callahan, it was VOTED, That a budget of \$10,000 for salaries and wages be approved for the fiscal year 1943-44 from the Sum Sufficient Appropriation 26 providing for free instruction for Wisconsin citizens serving in the Armed Forces.

Upon motion of Regent Sensenbrenner, seconded by Regent Cleary, it was VOTED, That supplementing the authority which has been given the Comptroller to sign secret and confidential agreements with the government for war research, the Comptroller be authorized a lso to sign subcontracts with commercial organizations that have master contracts for confidential and secret war research with the government when such subcontracts are within the terms and scope of the master contracts for such research.

Upon recommendation of President Dykstra and upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was

VOTED, That Ross H. Bardell be appointed acting director of the University Extension Division in Milwaukee to the end of the war.

Upon recommendation of President Dykstra and upon motion of Regent Sensenbrenner, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was

VOTED, That Myron J. Lowe, Field Representative and Instructor, University Extension Division, be appointed to do part of the work of V.H. Sorensen, resigned.

and that his salary be increased from \$3,100 to \$3,300, \$200 to be charged to unused portion of Sorensen's salary.

Upon motion of Regent Holmes, seconded by Regent Cleary, it was VOTED, That the following recommendation of the Secretary be approved:

Cash \$400 and a mortgage for \$800, drawing 4% interest, payable semiannually, principal payments to be made as follows:

March, 1944 - \$200 September, 1944 - 200 March, 1945 - 200 September, 1945 - 200

This property is in the University trust funds and belongs to the National Teachers Seminary Fund.

The Secretary of the Board presented an offer of \$400 for 40 acres of a 160 acre farm at Iron River, Bayfield County, Wisconsin. Upon motion of Regent Holmes, seconded by Regent Cleary, it was

VOTED, That the matter be referred to President Hodgkins for his opinion as to the acceptance of this offer.

Upon motion of Regent Callahan, seconded by Regent Cleary, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the meeting of the Executive Committee held on August 12, 1943, be approved, ratified and confirmed.

Regent Callahan presented the following schedule of board meetings for the current year.

The May 26 meeting is the annual meeting which will be on Friday preceding Commencement Day.

Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Sensenbrenner, approved.

Regent Kleczka read the following report of the Educational Committee on the adjustment in University Extension fees and non-resident fees for students attending the summer session:

"To the Board of Regents, University of Wisconsin

The undersigned members of the Educational Committee instructed by your Board on June 26, 1943, to consider and report on two matters assigned to them for consideration, the first being the question of "Adjustment of University Extension fees", and the other "Non-resident fees for summer session students", beg leave to report as follows:

In view of the action taken by the 1943 Legislature as to the first matter under consideration, all the members of your Committee met at Milwaukee on July 30, 1943, with President Dykstra and Dean Frank O. Holt of the Extension Division. At the conclusion of that conference your Committee was unanimously of the opinion that the requested relief of adjustment of University Extension fees could not now be granted in view of the present condition of the University budget. If we take the enrollment in normal years as a

criterion, for instance the year 1939-40, an additional State appropriation of approximately \$32,730.00 for State centers and approximately \$41,898.00 for the Milwaukee center, or a total of \$74,628.00 would necessarily be required, if Extension fees had been on Madison basis at that time. It is logical to suppose that lower fees would increase the enrollment. The enrollment might conceivably double, with need for proportional increase in State appropriations. At the close of the War, it is reasonable to suppose that there will be large increases in College enrollments and a corresponding increase of enrollment in the Extension centers throughout the State. All predictions point in that direction. A University Committee has predicted a possible enrollment of seventeen thousand on the Madison campus alone, following the War,

To adjust the Extension fees on the Madison basis, involves a considerable, yet highly uncertain amount of money and your Committee is of the opinion that such adjustment of fees cannot be made unless and until the Legislature of this State appropriates a sum sufficient to take care of the difference in each receipts if Extension fees are placed on the Madison basis.

As to the "Non-resident fees for summer session students", your Committee recommends that no distinction be made for the following reasons:

- 1. Other States make no such distinction.
- 2. Foes paid by non-resident students attending the summer session merely add toward self-support of the School and enable a better and richer program of education to be given whenever more students attend the given courses. Increased enrollment of students reduces the cost of instruction. It must be borne in mind that normally the summer session school is self-supporting.
- 3. When superintendents or other students come from outside the State to attend the summer session, they make contact with students of this State giving thereby the resident students outside connections.
